## **Overview**

This memo provides an update to the Controller's Office report *Evaluation of Pilot Programs Funded to Reduce the Jail Population* issued in May 2018. The purpose of this report was to evaluate the effectiveness of the five pilot programs supported by the Mayor's Office in fiscal year 2018 to reduce San Francisco's jail population. However, only two programs were implemented in time for this evaluation – the Public Defender's Pretrial Release Unit and the District Attorney's Weekend Rebooking. The Controller's Office concluded the following about each of these programs:

"It is unlikely that either program will on its own substantially contribute to the City's goal of reducing the jail population by 83,220 bed days a year. Each program is designed to serve a segment of the jail population that is in jail for a short period of time and occupies few jail bed days a year. Even at a full level of implementation, the populations served do not account for enough bed days each year to make a [substantial] impact on the reduction goal."

As requested by the Mayor's Office, the Controller's Office has refreshed its original analysis with more recent data from the Public Defender (PDR) and District Attorney (DAT) pilot programs for this memo. The updated analysis has not changed the original conclusion quoted above.

This memo discusses why the Controller's Office has not changed its original conclusion based on approximately nine months of pilot program data (from each program's inception until the end of fiscal year 2018). It does not evaluate other potentially beneficial effects of the pilot programs (such as the speedy delivery of justice, reduced jail stays for some individuals, social justice and equal access to counsel, or desirable long-term outcomes for those reentering the community).

## **Public Defender, Pretrial Release Unit**

As shown in FIGURE 1, the Pretrial Release Unit (PRU) interviewed individuals associated with 2,415 bookings<sup>1</sup> in San Francisco jails from October 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018. This constitutes 19 percent of all bookings over the same period. Seven percent of bookings received one of the specific program services shown in FIGURE 2. PDR screened out defendants associated with 323 bookings who were potential conflicts of interest; these 323 bookings comprised three percent of all bookings during the period.

Fifty-four percent of the bookings served by the PRU received hold advocacy services. From October 2017 to June 2018 (34 weeks), an average of approximately 13 bookings per week received hold advocacy services, compared to ten in the initial evaluation. PDR additionally reported that the PRU now prioritizes people with parole holds over probationary holds when considering whether to provide hold advocacy services.

The PRU reported hold advocacy results shown in FIGURE 3; according to PDR, 81 percent of PRU clients had a hold lifted.

The PRU does not select its clients at random; as a result, there was no control group to which the Controller's Office could compare program results. It is for this reason that the Controller's Office has not drawn conclusions regarding the PRU's net impact on bed days.

## **District Attorney, Weekend Rebooking**

From November 11, 2017 to June 30, 2018, DAT's Intake Unit (IU) reviewed 359 cases associated with 347 individual suspects. FIGURE 4 shows the DAT's filing decisions for these individuals.

The rate of DAT case review has slowed since the Controller's initial report. As of June 30, 2018, DAT processed cases associated with approximately ten suspects per week, four suspects a week fewer than during the initial evaluation period from November through February. The estimated average jail bed days saved per suspect also decreased in comparison with the initial period, from 1.2 to 0.5 jail bed days saved; this totals to an estimated 1.4 jail bed days saved per week, or 46 bed days saved during the entire nine-month evaluation period.

DAT reported that the decline in the number and rate of cases reviewed is primarily due to the lack of delivery of criminal cases by SFPD on the weekend. As stated in the Controller's initial report, SFPD would need to shift some portion of investigator staff schedules to the weekends to enable a regular flow of case delivery. During this pilot period, weekend case delivery has been facilitated by overtime pay. If weekend rebooking continues, stakeholders should consider this dependency on SFPD and how staff schedules might be changed to allow for regular delivery of cases on weekends.

## Conclusion

The results reported in this memo are based on only approximately nine months of program data and neither pilot program is reaching as many people booked into San Francisco's jails as they could. However, even if the City were

to grant more time and resources to fully implement each program, the Controller's Office contends that the DAT and PDR programs are not likely to reduce the jail population substantially more than they do at present. This conclusion is based on the fact that both programs are designed to reduce the stays of people that are usually in jail for relatively short periods of time. The Controller's Office has demonstrated in prior analyses that, although most people in San Francisco's jails have short jail stays (i.e., 15 days or less), they occupy a dramatically smaller proportion of overall bed days (i.e., approximately three percent) in comparison with those that are in jail for much longer periods of time. Investing in programs that affect people with short jail stays could result in many positive benefits (such as the speedy delivery of justice, reduced jail stays for some individuals, social justice and equal access to counsel, or desirable long-term outcomes for those reentering the community); however, it is unlikely that such investments will on their own substantially contribute to the City's goal of reducing the jail population by 83,220 bed days a year.

### Response to California Policy Lab study on PRU's ability to reduce jail population

PDR commissioned a study by the California Policy Lab (a group linking researchers from UC Berkeley and UC Los Angeles with policymakers) to analyze the PRU's impact on release at arraignment and then calculate the resulting impact on jail bed days. The Controller's Office has reviewed the study and has expressed concerns to the California Policy Lab about the methodology employed. The California Policy Lab has assuaged several of these concerns, but the Controller's Office remains unconvinced that the PRU could reduce the jail population as much as the study claims.

Because the PRU does not select its clients at random, the study's comparison groups may differ in ways that skew the likelihood of PRU intervention making a difference in outcomes for the treatment group more than the control group. The Controller's Office is concerned that the California Policy Lab did not account sufficiently for this issue. As a result, the Controller's Office contends that the study likely overstates the PRU's ability to reduce the jail population.

#### U.S. Department of Justice Office of Violence Against Women Grant:

#### Bayview High Lethality Domestic Violence Response Team Pilot Project

Women are more likely than men to experience multiple forms of intimate partner violence, both across their life span and within individual violent relationships. Almost one in four women (23%) have experienced severe physical violence by an intimate partner in their lifetime, compared to one in seven men. The Domestic Violence Lethality Assessment Pilot Program in the Bayview, launched in June of 2017 in partnership with the District Attorney's Office, the Police Department, La Casa de las Madres, the Bayview YMCA, and Glide, has been successful in identifying victims at high risk of death or serious injury, connecting them to services, and following up with the most at-risk cases.



#### Legislation

The Department advocated on 13 bills at the state level, of which 9 passed into law, and on 4 local pieces of legislation that were enacted. Some of the state legislation expanded on local efforts spearheaded by the Department, such as SCR 78, which committed California to implement the principles of CEDAW at the state level, and AB 2243, legislation that created historic protections for sex workers who report witnessing or experiencing violence. This law was inspired by San Francisco's "Prioritizing Safety for Sex Worker" policies, which emerged from the Sex Work and Trafficking Policy Impact Committee of the Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking, which is staffed by the Department. Other key bills ranged from requiring training on the signs of and response to human trafficking for hotel workers (SB 970), transportation workers (AB 2034), and law enforcement (AB 2992), to the sexual assault victims DNA Bill of Rights (AB 3118 and SB 1449). Local legislation included ordinances on Representation of Women in Public Spaces/ Maya Angelou Statue, Harassment Prevention Training of City Employees, the formation of Sexual Harassment and Assault Response and Prevention (SHARP) Office, and the renewal of the Family Violence Council.

#### **Healthy Mothers Workplace Coalition**

The Department supports and participates in the Healthy Mothers Workplace Awards program. In October 2017, the Department held the annual Healthy Mothers Workplace Awards ceremony to recognize 64 San Francisco employers for their family-friendly workplace policies. This was an Increase of participating employers from 43 to 64, a remarkable 49% increase from 2016 to 2017. The event featured remarks by City Administrator Naomi Kelly, Senator Scott Wiener, and Supervisor Katy Tang. Director Dr. Emily Murase moderated a panel of employers and employees who shared how they have made changes to their workplace policies and culture to support working mothers and their families. Fifteen City departments participated this year, and the Department received a Silver award for our commitment to equity and maternal well-being in the workplace.

#### UN Commission on the Status of Women, 62nd Session, New York, March 2017



Commissioner Carrie Schwab-Pomerantz, Director Emily M. Murase, Friends of the Commission on the Status of Women President Linda Calhoun, Gender Equality Principles Fellow Mollie Read, and Anti-Human Trafficking Fellow Rachael Chambers attended the 62nd session of the United Nations Commission on Status Women (CSW62). The CSW is the largest Commission within the United Nations and meets for a total of two weeks each year in New York City. Lee for his support of women's rights and the CEDAW movement. The award was accepted by the late Mayor Lee's wife Anita Lee and his daughter Tanya Lee.

#### **Gender Equity Challenge Forum**

The Department held the 4th Gender Equity Challenge Forum in April 2018 at the Schwab Center, which was attended by 100 leaders from business, government, and academia. Commissioner Carrie Schwab-Pomerantz provided opening remarks and Vice President Breanna Zwart closed the event. We were also joined by California Insurance Commissioner Dave Jones, Supervisor Katy Tang, City Administrator Naomi Kelly, and Commissioner Julie Soo.

We recognized nine model practices to advance gender equity in the workplace. We also featured a panel on preventing sexual harassment moderated by President Debbie Mesloh with Adama Iwu, co-founder of We Said Enough; Cindy Owyoung, Vice President of Diversity and Inclusion at Charles Schwab; and Carolyn Rashby, Partner at Miller Law Group.

#### **Gender Inclusion Training**

At the request of the San Francisco Recreation and Parks Department, the Department on the Status of Women created a one-hour gender inclusion training for gardeners and supervisors. Director Emily Murase and Workplace Policy Director Elizabeth Newman facilitated 5 Gender Inclusion in the Workplace Trainings from May-June 2018 for 213 gardeners and supervisors in the Recreation and Parks Department. The gender inclusion training covered issues related to gender bias in the workplace and tips for making the workplace more inclusive.



#### **Racial Equity Initiative**



We participated in the city-wide initiative on racial equity organized by the Human Rights Commission and the Government Alliance for Racial Equity and developed plans to improve racial equity through Department work. The Government Alliance on Race and Equity (GARE) is a national network of

government working to achieve racial equity and advance opportunities for all.


#### **Gender Analysis of Commissions & Boards**

In December 2017, the Department published the biennial Gender Analysis of Commissions & Boards report that examined equity of representation from 57 policy bodies with a total of 540 members primarily appointed by the Mayor and Board of Supervisors. Since the first gender analysis of appointees to San Francisco policy bodies in 2007, there has been a steady increase of female appointees. There has also been a greater representation of women on Commissions as compared to Boards. This continued in 2017 with 54% female Commissioners. However, it is was found that the percentage of female Board members has dropped from 48% in 2015 to 41% in 2017. The policy bodies with larger budgets have a smaller representation of women at 35%, while Commissions and Boards with the smallest budgets are 58% female appointees. Minority representation exceeds the population on the policy bodies with both the smallest and largest budgets, but women of color are considerably underrepresented on the largest budgeted policy bodies at 18% compared to 31% of the population.

#### **Violence Against Women Prevention & Intervention Grants Program**


Our Violence Against Women Partner Agencies provided comprehensive violence prevention services to the community in the following categories: Crisis Line, Intervention & Advocacy, Legal Services, Prevention and Education, Emergency Shelter Services, and Transitional Housing. The Department distributed grants totaling \$6.7M to 39 programs operated by 27 partner agencies. The partner agencies served a total of 20,698 individuals and provided approximately 39,825 hours of supportive services. This year our partner agencies saw a 73% increase in emergency shelter bed-nights and a 15.5% increase in transitional housing bed-nights with a 32% reduction in individuals turned away from shelters.





#### **Family Violence Council Annual Report**

In January 2018, the Family Violence Council (FVC) held a press conference for the release of the 7th Comprehensive Report on Family Violence in San Francisco FY2016. The event was presented by the Department's Women's Policy Director Minouche Kandel and the FVC Tri-Chairs: Katie Albright, Safe and Sound; Beverly Upton, Domestic Violence Consortium; and Shawna Reeves, Institute on Aging, Elder Abuse Prevention. Sheriff Vicki Hennessy, Supervisor Jeff Sheehy, Commission President Debbie Mesloh, Deputy Director of Programs at Department of Aging and Adult



Services Jill Nielsen, Deputy Director of Family and Children's Services Sylvia Deporto, and Director Emily Murase spoke in support of the importance of this report for San Francisco. The new report includes information from 14 City public agencies and 27 community-based organizations.

Key findings on child abuse are: an increase in child abuse investigations by police and an increase in child abuse prosecutions; lower rates of child abuse reports by school reporters; black and Latinx children disproportionately victimized; and that there has been a continued decline in foster care entries.

Key findings on intimate partner violence are: an increase in domestic violence Calls to 911 involving a deadly weapon; an increase in stalking calls to 911; better screening for intimate partner violence at department of public health clinics; lesbian, gay and bisexual students more at risk for intimate partner violence; and black and Latinx people are disproportionately victimized.


Key findings on elder abuse are: an increase in number of elder abuse cases and services; self-neglect case increase; and black and Latinx people are disproportionately experiencing elder abuse.

#### 3rd Annual Human Trafficking Report in San Francisco



The San Francisco Mayor's Task Force on Anti-Human Trafficking published the *3rd Annual Human Trafficking Report in San Francisco*. The Task Force held a press conference at City Hall announcing the report publication. Member's of the Task Force joined Department staff and spoke at the conference on the scope of the report and its ground breaking significance. The report compiled data from 18 government and community-based agencies in San Francisco and provides a snapshot of identified human trafficking cases with 529 cases in 2016. The Report

also includes program information from the San Francisco Unified School District.



#### **Domestic Violence Liaisons Program with Human Resources**

We continued our collaboration with the Department of Human Resources to reach out to city employees experiencing domestic violence. This year, the Department recruited and trained another 35 City employees to participate in the Domestic Violence Liaison program which when combined with 24 of the current liaisons that are continuing brings the total number of liaisons to 59, an increase of almost 15% from last year.

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
#### Safer Schools Sexual Assault Task Force

The Safer Schools Sexual Assault Task Force was created by local ordinance, and was set up to meet for one year,

monthly, from November 2016-October 2017. The Task Force was composed of ten members, representing various educational institutions, government agencies, advocacy groups and survivor perspectives. The final report summarizes existing laws regarding campus sexual assault, and contains 47 recommendations for how campuses, city agencies and service providers can best prevent and respond to sexual assault. The two overarching recommendations in the report are to 1) create an on-going Sexual Assault Task Force to address all sexual assault in San Francisco; and 2) to fully implement state and federal laws to prevent sexual assault on campus and respond effectively, in an era of potential federal roll backs.



"As the national conversation on sexual harassment has exposed, we need to be sure that our systems that respond to all forms of sexual assault, including sexual assault on campus, treat victims with concern and respect and hold offenders accountable," said President Debbie Mesloh.

Supervisors of San Francisco, San Mateo, and Santa Clara Counties Caltrain Joint Powers Board - Board of Directors

Supervisors and Board Members:

With Governor Newsom's downsized California High Speed Rail (CA HSR) decision, Caltrain no longer needs to be compatible with the CA HSR. Caltrain should take this opportunity to change to hydrogen fuel cells.

Traditional catenary overhead contact system (OCS) trainsets have been the only practical choice. Now in 2019, fuel cell electric multiple units (EMUs) are spreading worldwide, to avoid the huge and unnecessary cost of the OCS infrastructure. Stadler, Alstom, Siemens / Ballard and Chinese companies are delivering or planning fuel cell EMUs for Austria, Britain, Canada, China, Denmark, and Norway.

Fuel cell EMUs would:

- \* save hundreds of millions in initial costs and millions in ongoing maintenance;
- \* include Gilroy and future Dumbarton electrification for no additional cost;
- \* avoid impacting 4000 trees;
- \* allow for future fuel cell technology improvements;
- \* and avoid the overhead visual clutter.

Caltrain should work with Stadler to integrate fuel cells to KISS EMUs. Caltrain should

arrange with other US and worldwide transit agencies to take delivery of the standard OCS components from the Balfour Beatty contract for their refurbishment and route extension projects. This would minimize the financial impact on Caltrain of changing from OCS to fuel cells.

If some version of HSR ever does reach San Jose, passengers would simply and quickly transfer between HSR and Caltrain, BART VTA, taxis, Uber, Lyft, and rental cars.

Worldwide, railways are moving to fuel cells rather than OCS systems. It would be unfortunate Caltrain were to spend taxpayers' \$2B to construct one of the LAST catenary systems ... rather than among the first fuel cell rail systems.

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My objections are as follows:

Public safety issues must be acknowledged. Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) results in the psychoactive effects of "getting high." Because of its ability to induce mind-altering effects on the user, THC has been classified as an illegal substance in most countries around the world, including the United States. Cannabidiol (CBD), derived from hemp or marijuana, commonly called "medical marijuana," does not induce psychoactive effects.

<u>Smoking is Smoking</u>. Allowing cannabis smoking in public, but not cigarette smoking, is hypocritical and is using a double standard. California has been trying for decades to ban cigarette smoking. Unfortunately, because of mass media promotion and special interest lobbying, medical marijuana (used as a pain killer) has now expanded into recreational marijuana

Smoking is smoking and is harmful to your health. Second-hand smoke, whether tobacco or cannabis, is harmful to the public – but cannabis smoke contains THC and the user will get high – as will bystanders, whether children or adults.

It is not a solution to say that the public can choose to attend an event or to stay home. What if I pay \$300 for a ticket to an Outside Lands concert, and everyone around me is smoking dope? My choices are: leave and forfeit my \$300, or stay and be forced to get involuntarily "high."

Why would the Board of Supervisors encourage people to use harmful substances, increase the need for medical care, and cost the public more for tax-payer supported medical treatment? **VOTE NO!** 

**Increase in Accidents**. It is documented that using marijuana impairs driving. Both Colorado and Washington State saw a doubling of marijuana-related car crashes since legalization of marijuana in those states. At this time, no valid testing mechanism or protocols exist to determine if a driver is under the influence of marijuana.

And it is not just drivers who are impaired. Pedestrians are impaired from using marijuana. San Francisco is still experiencing a high rate of pedestrian deaths from traffic accidents. Allowing and encouraging masses of people to use marijuana and "get high" is wrong. Why would the Board of Supervisors encourage people to "get high" and then leave a public event, either on foot or in a car, while "high"? This will only increase accidents and fatalities, and the City of San Francisco will have blood on its hands and should be held legally liable for any such accidents, injuries and deaths. **VOTE NO!** 

<u>Children can be inadvertently exposed to smoke and/or consumables</u>. Marijuana comes in many forms: smokeable, drinkable, and eatable, such as in gummy bears. It is too easy to mistakenly eat an item containing marijuana, such as brownies at a party, or gummy bears laced with marijuana. Children need to be shielded from inadvertent exposure.

Why would the Board of Supervisors pass legislation that could inadvertently expose children to smokeable, drinkable, and eatable marijuana products at public events? **VOTE NO!** 

<u>Marijuana / cannabis is still illegal under federal law</u>. The federal government regulates drugs through the Controlled Substances Act (CSA) (21 U.S.C. § 811), which does not recognize the difference between medical and recreational use of cannabis. Under the CSA, cannabis is classified as a Schedule I drug, which means that the federal government views cannabis as highly addictive and having no medical value. Doctors may not "prescribe" cannabis for medical use under federal law, though they can "recommend" its use under the First Amendment.

Conclusion: We do not want our standard of living and our quality of life reduced to the lowest common denominator while San Francisco tries to be "trendy" and "cutting edge." We do not want to expose our children and families to drugs of any kind. We do not want our communities trafficking in illegal drugs. And we do not want our government supporting and encouraging actions that harm public safety.

No responsible parent or citizen would vote yes on this legislation. It is the height of hypocrisy to make cigarette smokers pariahs, yet encourage marijuana smoking and cannabis consumption to turn the population into "stoned zombies," walking around in a daze and driving while impaired, causing a huge public risk. VOTE NO!

Please register my OPPOSITION to the proposed Event-Related Cannabis Permits. This legislation would establish procedures for the Office of Cannabis to issue permits authorizing cannabis sales or consumption, or both, in connection with temporary events, and providing a mechanism for the temporary waiver of City laws restricting smoking or cannabis consumption.

My objections are as follows:

Public safety issues must be acknowledged. Tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) results in the psychoactive effects of "getting high." Because of its ability to induce mind-altering effects on the user, THC has been classified as an illegal substance in most countries around the world, including the United States. Cannabidiol (CBD), derived from hemp or marijuana, commonly called "medical marijuana," does not induce psychoactive effects.

Smoking is smoking and is harmful to your health. Second-hand smoke, whether tobacco or cannabis, is harmful to the public – but cannabis smoke contains THC and the user will get high – as will bystanders, whether children or adults.

It is not a solution to say that the public can choose to attend an event or to stay home. What if I pay \$300 for a ticket to an Outside Lands concert, and everyone around me is smoking dope? My choices are: leave and forfeit my \$300, or stay and be forced to get involuntarily "high."

Why would the Board of Supervisors encourage people to use harmful substances, increase the need for medical care, and cost the public more for tax-payer supported medical treatment? **VOTE NO!** 

**Increase in Accidents.** It is documented that using marijuana impairs driving. Both Colorado and Washington State saw a doubling of marijuana-related car crashes since legalization of marijuana in those states. At this time, no valid testing mechanism or protocols exist to determine if a driver is under the influence of marijuana.

And it is not just drivers who are impaired. Pedestrians are impaired from using marijuana. San Francisco is still experiencing a high rate of pedestrian deaths from traffic accidents. Allowing and encouraging masses of people to use marijuana and "get high" is wrong. Why would the Board of Supervisors encourage people to "get high" and then leave a public event, either on foot or in a car, while "high"? This will only increase accidents and fatalities, and the City of San Francisco will have blood on its hands and should be held legally liable for any such accidents, injuries and deaths. **VOTE NO!** 

<u>Children can be inadvertently exposed to smoke and/or consumables</u>. Marijuana comes in many forms: smokeable, drinkable, and eatable, such as in gummy bears. It is too easy to mistakenly eat an item containing marijuana, such as brownies at a party, or gummy bears laced with marijuana. Children need to be shielded from inadvertent exposure.

Why would the Board of Supervisors pass legislation that could inadvertently expose children to smokeable, drinkable, and eatable marijuana products at public events? **VOTE NO!** 

Marijuana / cannabis is still illegal under federal law. The federal government regulates drugs through the Controlled Substances Act (CSA) (21 U.S.C. § 811), which does not recognize the difference between medical and recreational use of cannabis. Under the CSA, cannabis is classified as a Schedule I drug, which means that the federal government views cannabis as highly addictive and having no medical value. Doctors may not "prescribe" cannabis for medical use under federal law, though they can "recommend" its use under the First Amendment.

**Conclusion**: We do **not** want our standard of living and our quality of life reduced to the lowest common denominator while San Francisco tries to be "trendy" and "cutting edge." We do **not** want to expose our children and families to drugs of any kind. We do **not** want our communities trafficking in illegal drugs. And we do **not** want our government supporting and encouraging actions that harm public safety.

No responsible parent or citizen would vote yes on this legislation. It is the height of hypocrisy to make cigarette smokers pariahs, yet encourage marijuana smoking and cannabis consumption to turn the population into "stoned zombies," walking around in a daze and driving while impaired, causing a huge public risk. **VOTE NO!**
