11	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:		
12	Section 1. Findings. The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco		
13	hereby finds and declares as follows:		
14	(1) The Union Street Neighborhood Commercial District Zoning Controls applicable to		
15	full-service restaurants have not been substantially revised since their adoption in 1987.		
16	(2) Since that time, the demographic and economic character of the Marina District		
17	has continued to evolve, bringing with it needs for new commercial facilities along Union		
18	Street, some of which are prohibited under current zoning controls.		
19	(3) The underlying premise that led to the original prohibition of full-service restaurant		
20	uses along Union Street - that being to preserve existing convenience businesses and to		
21	minimize growth impacts on neighborhood residents – remains sound.		
22	(4) Demand to establish full-service restaurants in locations on Union Street continues		
23	to accumulate.		
24	(5) By allowing a limited number of new full-service restaurants to locate within the		
25	Union Street Neighborhood Commercial District during a specified time frame, the		

1	neighborhood will have additional land use planning options. This flexibility will accommodate			
2	the needs of neighborhood residents and maintain the vibrancy of the community, without			
3	risking more significant and undesirable land use shifts.			
4	(6) New full-service restaurants allowed pursuant to this ordinance may occupy vacant			
5	commercial spaces in the neighborhood.			
6	(7) New full-service restaurants will be limited by number and conditional use criteria to			
7	avoid displacing other neighborhood-serving uses.			
8	(8) Such new full-service restaurants will attract patrons who would support existing			
9	and future local businesses within the Union Street Neighborhood Commercial District.			
10	Section 2. Environmental Findings, General Plan Findings, and Other Required Findings.			
11	(a) The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this			
12	Ordinance are in compliance with the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public			
13	Resources Code sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the			
14	Board of Supervisors in File No and is incorporated herein by			
15	reference.			
16	(b) On, 2007, the Planning Commission, in Resolution No.			
17	approved and recommended for adoption by the Board this legislation and			
18	adopted findings that it is consistent, on balance, with the City's General Plan and eight			
19	priority policies of Planning Code Section 101.1 The Board adopts these findings as its own.			
20	A copy of said Resolution is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No.			
21	, and is incorporated by reference herein.			
22	(c) Pursuant to Planning Code Section 302, this Board of Supervisors finds that this			
23	legislation will serve the public necessity, convenience, and welfare for the reasons set forth in			
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1	Planning Commission Resolution No,	and incorporates such reasons by
2	reference herein.	

Section 3. The San Francisco Planning Code is hereby amended by amending Section 725.1 to read as follows:

## SEC. 725.1 UNION STREET NEIGHBORHOOD COMMERCIAL DISTRICT

The Union Street Commercial District is located in northern San Francisco between the Marina and Pacific Heights neighborhoods. The district lies along Union Street between Van Ness Avenue and Steiner, including an arm extending north on Fillmore Street to Lombard. The shopping area provides limited convenience goods for the residents of sections of the Cow Hollow, Golden Gate Valley, and Pacific Heights neighborhoods immediately surrounding the street. Important aspects of Union Street's business activity are eating and drinking establishments and specialty shops whose clientele comes from a wide trade area. There are also a significant number of professional, realty, and business offices. Many restaurants and bars are open into the evening hours, and on weekends the street's clothing, antique stores and galleries do a vigorous business.

The Union Street District controls are designed to provide sufficient growth opportunities for commercial development that is in keeping with the existing scale and character, promote continuous retail frontage, and protect adjacent residential livability. Small-scale buildings and neighborhood-serving uses are promoted, and rear yards above the ground story and at all residential levels are protected. Most commercial development is permitted at the first two stories of new buildings, while retail service uses are monitored at the third story and above. Controls are necessary to preserve the remaining convenience businesses and to reduce the cumulative impacts which the growth of certain uses have on neighborhood residents. Such controls prohibit additional *eating and*-drinking establishments

1	and limit additional eating establishments and entertainment and financial service uses. Most			
2	automobile and drive-up uses are prohibited in order to maintain continuous retail frontage			
3	and minimize further traffic congestion.			
4	Housing development in new buildings is encourage	d above the second story. Existing		
5	residential units are protected by limitations on demolitions	and upper-story conversions.		
6	Section 4. The San Francisco Planning Code is here	eby amended by amending Section		
7	725.42 of the Union Street Neighborhood Commercial Dist	rict Zoning Control Table to read		
8	as follows:
