[Recognizing San Jose State University for bringing awareness to the United States Food and

- singles out gay men.
- WHEREAS, In January of 2008, San Jose State University prohibited blood drives from taking place on campus, in order to bring awareness to the United States Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) discriminatory policy which singles out gay men for a ban on blood donations; and,
- WHEREAS, In the wake of San Jose State University's actions, other nearby community colleges followed suit, and several other Bay Area universities and colleges are considering how best to proceed with blood drives on their campuses; and,
- WHEREAS, The FDA has had a policy since 1983 that bans blood donations from men who have had sex with men, purportedly to reduce blood donations from people who are infected with HIV; and,
- WHEREAS, The FDA's policy unfairly singles out a single group men who have sex with men - regardless of their individual behaviors, which perpetuates the myth that HIV is a gay disease and discounts efforts to educate people about safe sex as a means to reduce transmission of HIV; and,
- WHEREAS, New HIV infections are occurring across a broad spectrum of people, and the FDA's policy irresponsibly sends the signal that only men who have sex with men are at risk; and, 24

1	WHEREAS, New HIV testing technologies make it possible to detect new HIV infection
2	in a much smaller time window than when the FDA originally put this ban in place 25 years
3	ago, and the FDA's policy is only helpful to the extent that available HIV tests would be unable
4	to detect HIV in a donor's blood, which would only occur in cases of new HIV infection; and,
5	WHEREAS, The number of new HIV infections attributed to men who have sex with
6	men, which was 65 percent in 1985, is now only 43 percent of all new HIV infections; now,
7	therefore, be it
8	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors of San Francisco recognizes San Jose
9	State University for bringing awareness to the United States Food and Drug Administration's
10	discriminatory policy banning blood donations from gay men; and, be it
11	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors calls on the FDA to rescind this
12	policy; and, be it
13	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors directs the Clerk of the Board
14	to submit a letter to the Director of the FDA on an annual basis calling on the FDA to rescind
15	this policy so long as it remains unchanged.
