4	Resolution recognizing freshwater as a human right and the importance of access to
5	safe drinking water for all.

7	WHEREAS, the 1992 United Nations Conference on Environment and Development
8	established March 22 as World Water Day to promote the international observance of
9	freshwater as a human right for all persons; and
10	WHEREAS, freshwater is fundamental for life, a finite natural resource, and belongs to
11	the earth and all species for all time; and
12	WHEREAS, available freshwater represents less than one-half of the world's total
13	water stock; and
14	WHEREAS, global consumption of water is doubling every 20 years, more than twice
15	the rate of human population growth; and
16	WHEREAS, more than one billion people already lack adequate access to safe
17	drinking water, 2.5 billion people have no access to proper sanitation and more than five
18	million people, mostly children, die each year from water related diseases; and
19	WHEREAS, unsustainable practices lead to the destruction of aquifers, falling water
20	tables, and ground and surface water pollution; and
21	WHEREAS, indigenous peoples have had waters on which they depend dangerously
22	polluted and exploited; and
23	WHEREAS, the Indian Ocean earthquake and tsunami in December 2004 aggravated
24	the already overwhelming water crisis and the World Health Organization projects that without
25	

mobilized and coordinated assistance, there could be as many fatalities from diseases, water
borne, as were seen from the actual disaster itself; and

- WHEREAS, current United Nations Millennium Development Goals now call for
 reducing by one-half the number of those without safe drinking water and sanitation by the
 year 2015; and
- WHEREAS, the United Nations committee on Economic, Social, and Cultural Rights
 has adopted the General Comment on the right to water, which states that the human right to
 drinking water is fundamental for life and health, and sufficient and safe drinking water is a
 precondition for the realization of all other human rights; now, therefore, be it

10 RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors recognizes freshwater as a 11 fundamental and human right for all, the importance of access to sanitation and safe drinking 12 water, and that water management priorities should reflect the goals of preservation and 13 sustainable development of water resources.
