13	WHEREAS, in 2001, the Metropolitan Transportation Commission, in adopting					
14 15	Resolution 3434, the Regional Transit Expansion Policy, identified \$600,000 for a study					
16	of BRT feasibility on Geary Boulevard; and					
17	WHEREAS, with the support of each project's Citizens Advisory Committee, the					
18	San Francisco County Transportation Authority (Authority) Board and the San Francisco					
19	Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) Board adopted the Van Ness Avenue BRT					
20	Feasibility Study and the Geary BRT Feasibility Study, in 2006 and 2007 respectively;

1	WHEREAS, the Authority appropriated \$1,950,000 in Proposition K to support
2	environmental studies and preliminary engineering of Van Ness Avenue BRT, in January
3	2007; and
4	WHEREAS, the Authority applied for, and the Federal Transit Administration
5	(FTA) granted entry into Project Development for the Van Ness Avenue BRT project in
6	December 2007; and
7	WHEREAS, the FTA rated Van Ness Avenue BRT "high" for cost-effectiveness
8	and "medium-high" overall as a Small Starts candidate project; making Van Ness BRT
9	the highest ranked BRT project in the country for Small Starts funding; and
11	WHEREAS, the Authority appropriated \$2,308,000 in Prop K to support
12	environmental studies and preliminary engineering of Geary Boulevard BRT in June
13	2008, and intends to seek entry into Project Development for the Geary BRT project in
14	August 2009; and
15	WHEREAS, the Authority and SFMTA have signed Memoranda Of Understanding
16	(MOU) in August 2008, and October 2008, establishing the Van Ness Avenue BRT and
