Benefits to the City

- + \$66m annual economic impact to city
- + 700 jobs
- + 41,448 hotel nights
- + Food & beverage sales and taxes
- + More than 2 million visitors since 2009

+ Outside Lands Works

(\$420k total for Music Therapy Program at UCSF Oakland; Richmond District Neighborhood Center; Women's Audio Mission; Youth Art Exchange; Bay Area Girls Rock Camp; and other community arts programs)

+ Environmental Benefits (92% waste diversion) + Cultural Benefits

(100+ musical acts; 83 local restaurants; selected as Billboard's Top Music Festival)

+ Neighborhood Initiatives (\$50k per year)

Benefits to the Department

- + Over \$3M annually to support department operations
- + \$115,000 to scholarships/SF Parks Alliance
- + One fully funded gardener to support GGP (\$107k per year)
- + Polo Fields maintenance (\$15k per year)
- + Reimbursement for staff overtime



Planning

- + Pre-event meetings with the community
- + OSL and RPD work with multiple City agencies
- + Establish Community Hotline
- + Mailers to residents within 4 blocks of the park
- + Advertisements (Richmond Review, Sunset Beacon, Sing Tao Daily)
- + Do Not Block Driveways signage
- + Outside Lands posts clear signage

Responding

+ Sound monitors respond to sound complaints and measure decibel levels and impact of bass

Reports sent back to sound board so that adjustments can be made

+ Parking control officers and tow trucks strategically placed around the park

Quick response to blocked driveways and other parking violations

+ Cleanup crews

Attend to debris in the surrounding neighborhoods and placing portable toilets in the neighborhoods to accommodate those leaving the festival

Improving

Modify and update plans each year to continuously improve

- + Park protection (2012-2014) Secure and protect trees; Ground protection
 + Cleanup crews in neighborhoods (2011)
- + Improve traffic
 - Parking Patrol officers in neighborhood (2011)
 - Shuttles Expanded (2011, 2012, 2018)
 - Bike Share Added (2018)
 - Bike Lanes Created (2017)
 - Uber and Lyft Changes (2016-18)
- + Early Notice to Neighborhoods (2015)
- + Sound Summit (2019)

Noise Impacts

2012 Amendment Imposed New Requirements

- + Use commercially reasonable best efforts to limit sound to the concert grounds
- + Must review sound system plans in advance of the Festival each year to:
 - To minimize sound impact in the surrounding neighborhood
 - To ensure sound system can be modified to respond to sound complaints

+ Delay Towers must be installed in Polo Fields to limit sound impact

+ Live response to sound complaints

- Sound monitors dispatched to areas of complaints
- Measure sound and bass
- Immediately relay back so that sound levels can be adjusted
- Sound carries differently depending on wind and fog

2018 Spike in Amplified Sound

- In all areas but particularly in the Sunset
- Speakers were adjusted and complaints went from 118 on Friday, to 63 on Saturday, to 31 on Sunday
- Outside Lands has hired a sound consultant to further study this year

2019 Amendment

- Mandate minimum numbers of sound monitors
- Requires reporting on adjustments to sound levels

Changing Nature of Concerns

- + Historically blocked driveways and congestion
 - Dedicated tow trucks and DPT
 - Special do not block driveways
- + 2015 Growing Numbers of TNC's (Uber and Lyft)
 - Double parking and circling neighborhoods
- + Beginning in 2016 Additional Steps Taken
 - Dedicated loading and unloading areas
 - Geofencing areas
 - Increased traffic and police enforcement

Proposed Amendment-Neighborhoods

+ Local Hire

• At least one fair in Richmond District

+ Community Outreach

- In addition to meeting prior to event, one meeting within 30 to 90 days after in Richmond
- Hotline hours expanded
- At least 3 sound monitors and adjusted annually based on responsiveness

+ Community Benefit Funds

 Increase from \$10,000 per year to \$50,000 to be split between Districts 1 and 4 (increasing to \$60,000 in 2026)

+ Annual meeting with community in July prior to event

+ Two special meetings

- Sunset District October 24
