

The SFMTA Exams Unit conducts hiring exams for the SFMTA's Transit Operators. From August 2018 to January 2019, the SFMTA's Exams Unit worked with the City Performance Lean Team to improve what had been a labor-intensive, time-consuming, and potentially error-prone examination process. The group used Lean principles to analyze their work process and implement improvements to mitigate challenges and issues. The Exams Unit was able to significantly reduce the time required for list adoption and eliminate duplicative document reviews from the exam administration process.

## Improving examination process for SFMTA Transit Operator candidates

March 2019

A partnership between the City Performance Lean Team and the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency

#### **PROBLEM**

The Exams Unit of the SFMTA Human Resources Division (HR) conducts exams for city positions, including the SFMTA's Transit Operators. The current Transit Operator Exam administration process is labor intensive, time-consuming, and potentially error-prone. The two SFMTA units that oversee Transit Operator hiring – Exams Unit and Employee Services – conduct duplicative work when screening the same candidates at different stages of the hiring process. Furthermore, the Exams Unit must conduct significant extra work following up with candidates who make mistakes in submitting required documents. Delays in exam administration result in longer hiring times, which can contribute to unfilled Transit Operator training classes. When training classes go unfilled, the SFMTA cannot meet their planned service hour targets, resulting in transit delays for residents.




Members of the SFMTA Human Resources – Exams Unit convened to address issues with the examination process for Transit Operators.

#### **RESULTS**

From August 2018 to January 2019, the SFMTA's Exams Unit implemented improvements to the exam administration process to mitigate these issues. The team chose to measure two key performance indicators to determine if their improvement efforts worked: time to hire and the number of complete H6 records (a California DMV document that shows the applicant's driving record) turned in at the exam site. The team measured time to hire from the first day of the exam administration to the date on which the Exams Unit adopted the eligible list, which provides an overall view of the time it takes for the Exams Unit to conduct the exam administration. The second metric, number of complete H6 records submitted at the exam site, speaks to the team's desire to eliminate mistakes in the process: during the March 2018 exam, approximately 125 out of 500 candidates (25%) submitted an H6 driving record that included mistakes or was not complete. The team must conduct significant follow-up work in the weeks post-exam to remedy driving record mistakes with candidates.

#### **SOLUTION #1: ELIMINATE DUPLICATIVE DRIVING RECORD REVIEW**

The Exams Unit identified the review of candidates' driving record as a major source of extra work. Candidates must have a clean driving record with no moving violations for the past three years, as indicated on the candidate's DMV "H6" driving record. Prior to the Exam Unit's Lean work, candidates were required to go to the DMV, get their H6 document, and bring it to their exam. The Exams Unit would review each candidate's H6 at the exam site while candidates were taking their exams, spending significant time following up with candidates who made mistakes on their H6 submissions. Once the eligible list was adopted, the Employee Services Unit conducted a second screening of the H6. If three months had lapsed between when the candidate got their H6 and when they were going to be hired, the SFMTA asked candidates to go to the DMV to get another copy of the H6 for screening.

Both the Exams Unit and Employee Services Unit noticed the duplication in their screening practices. In December 2018, the two divisions agreed to test a process to eliminate the Exam Unit's H6 review. Though this change may cause Employee Services to review H6 driving records for a small number of ineligible candidates (including those with a moving violation within the last 3 years), the teams still predict the elimination of H6 review during the exam will free up at least a week of time from the overall hiring process.



#### **SOLUTION #2: REVAMPED CANDIDATE COMMUNICATION MATERIALS**


The team also discovered that the exam notice did not clearly inform candidates the steps required in getting a complete H6. As a result, the team created a new exam notice for Transit Operators (pictured right). The Exams Unit used this new notice for the November 2018 exam, and it appeared to reduce the number of mistakes made by candidates: the team saw a 10% decrease in the number of instances a candidate brought an incomplete H6 driving record to the exam in November 2018. Employee Services also experienced errors in H6 submission, and will use these communication improvements as it takes on sole H6 review.




#### **FUTURE IMPROVEMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

In addition to improving the examination notice and eliminating the driving record review from the Exam Unit's task list, the team brainstormed several other large-scale improvement ideas:

- Eliminate the SFMTA driving exam: In addition to a video-based driving exam conducted by SFMTA, candidates must also pass an extensive driving exam administered by the DMV called a Class-B permit test. The Exams Unit sees the B-permit test as more exhaustive than the video exam. Eliminating the SFMTA driving exam would create a more efficient process for candidates and could eliminate hours of work to administer and score the internal driving exam.
- Continuous testing for Transit Operator candidates: The City is in constant need of new Transit Operators. Implementing continuous testing may help SFMTA maintain a robust eligible list, though impacts on the speed of the hiring process are unknown.





The Exams Unit developed a new document to assist candidates with understanding their own driving record.

I respectfully request that the Human Rights Commission grant a waiver of Chapter 12B requirements (Equal Benefits Ordinance) to use the Holiday Inn Golden Gateway to provide lodging and rating rooms for the Sheriff Department's Captain Examination raters. The Hotel Whitcomb, which is the only 12B compliant hotel, has a history of health and safety issues.

Examination ratings will be conducted over a 5-day period from June 3 - 7, 2019 at the Holiday Inn Golden Gateway. This hotel has been attempting to become 12B compliant, but has thus far been unable to do so because of its corporate affiliation.

In February 2018, the Board of Supervisors passed the 2018 Shelter Crisis Ordinance (File No. 180032). This ordinance allowed the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) and Public Works to waive certain components to the Administrative Code to help expedite the contracting process of opening "shelter crisis sites." In January 2019, Mayor Breed introduced a legislative package to extend and build upon this ordinance to continue the work of opening shelters and homeless services to address the crisis of homelessness in our community. This memo serves as the report to the Mayor and Board of Supervisors on the impact of the 2018 Shelter Crisis Ordinance.

The "shelter crisis sites" named in the 2018 ordinance included:

- Minna Lee Hotel (149 6<sup>th</sup> Street)
- Bayshore Navigation Center (125 Bayshore)
- Bryant St. Navigation Center (CalTrans property at 5<sup>th</sup> and Bryant)
- Division Circle Navigation Center (CalTrans property at 13<sup>th</sup> and South Van Ness)
- Jelani House (1601 Quesada)
- Existing Navigation Centers, except 1515 South Van Ness and 1950 Mission Street
- Existing shelters

During the one year that this ordinance was in effect, HSH and Public Works rapidly expanded temporary shelters and permanent supportive housing for our most vulnerable residents. Under this ordinance, the City opened three new Navigation Centers with 338 beds and one master leased supportive housing site with 50 units. This rapid deployment of resources was possible due to the provisions within the Shelter Crisis Ordinance.

The projects opened under this ordinance served over 1,300 people during the duration of the ordinance. The ordinance requires HSH to report to the Board of Supervisors on the number of people served during the duration of the ordinance in all of the named shelter crisis sites. HSH has provided this information in the table below.

In my experience, neighbors are welcoming and when their voices are heard and listened to., the result is far superior.

High-rises are already causing substantial problems in San Francisco. One need look no farther than the Millennium Tower which stands downtown, and is slowly sinking and leaning, and appears to be leading to non-stop legal hassles.

SB 50 punishes San Francisco, and fails to recognize the work of the planning department in having rules and guidelines and then adding points for various public benefits. The flexibility to do such exchanges would be gone.

One thing I think we should recognize is the total area of San Francisco is not very large., and that it is rather unsocial to leave buildable lots empty, awaiting further appreciation in value. At the present time, I have noticed that there are many vacant lots on lombard Street which are essentially meadows, that could be developed as housing under current guidelines. Perhaps the city itself should do something to prod the owners into doing something with their vacant land. What I suggest is a special tax on idle land so that it is put to some use. I think that what is happening is that owner developers are holding off on building because of their expectation that if they delay, some form of Sen Weiner's bill will eventually be adopted, and their profits will increase dramatically. I suspect a cabal.

Senator Wiener wants to turn SF into some overly developed and hideous generic urban plot.

# Please oppose SB-50 in its entirety. No amendments – just send it back to the vision vacuum that created it.

On Dec 3<sup>rd</sup> 2018 the misguided and deeply conflicted Senator Scott Wiener introduced <u>SB-50</u> in an attempt to bring back most of the zoning legislation contained in <u>SB-827</u>, which was defeated last year. This is a one-size-fits all bill for California that without doubt will negatively impact 96% of San Francisco. San Francisco is my home. I have also maintained my businesses and multiunit residential property here for 38 years.

My name is George Merijohn. I am writing to inform you that I stand in direct opposition to Senator Wiener's bill SB 50. I ask that you read SB 50 for yourself and strongly oppose it in its entirety.

There is no credible evidence to support the seriously flawed proposal that SB 50 will solve the California housing problem. Furthermore, it disproportionately hurts San Francisco. SB 50 rewards unchecked speculation, kills cherished neighborhoods and significantly worsens housing affordability. The Senator's overly simplistic, naïve and sophomoric "one size fits all" approach to California housing will destroy California's renowned community diversity. Apparently, Mr. Wiener feels that 1960's area Soviet style high density urban planning is the solution for California in 2019. He needs to get to work for California instead of trying to jam his political sideshow down California's throat.

The last thing California and especially my home town San Francisco needs is another bonus to the real estate speculators and that's exactly what SB 50 will do.

State Senator Scott Wiener's SB 50 legislation, after last year's defeated SB 827, claims to help solve California's housing crisis and create more "affordable housing," yet this bill will actually do more for

luxury builders than anyone else. Apparently, Senator Weiner thinks people will not read the large print: the primary backers include real estate developers and technology companies. Follow the money – that is what SB 50 is about.

SB 50 prescribes an overwrought, unnecessarily heavy-handed and unprecedented preemption of local zoning, all in a vain attempt to solve an affordable housing shortage.

SB 50's usurping of local control over zoning laws is keyed to a property's proximity to public transit, and in San Francisco, that affects 96% of the parcels.

SB 50 eliminates RH-1 and RH-2 designations; instead all properties will be zoned as RTO (Residential Transit Oriented). This means new projects will have no density controls or parking requirements, and there is an incentive to demolish, merge lots and rebuild with luxury condos with a few token tiny, affordable units.

As you know, if a project includes these affordable units, it allows the developers to increase the height beyond current zoning limits and "pick and choose exemptions for themselves from the otherwise applicable local building limits": height, density, setbacks, lot mergers, parking, massing, exposure, rear yards, floor-area ratio, demolition, design standards and impact fees. Imagine if you live in San Francisco and the house next door or across the street to you is now replaced by a seven (7) story high-rise, densely packed with units, with no light wells, covering the entire lot, and offering no parking -- all in a building with a 75-foot width.

SB 50 eviscerates local zoning rules by turning them over to Sacramento's legislated one size fits all preemptions.

Additionally, what little light, air, privacy, view, rear-yard open space and parking remains surrounding San Francisco homes and apartments will be lost if SB 50 passes.

As a tax paying citizen, California resident and businessman, I ask that you read SB 50 for yourself and strongly oppose it in its entirety. At the very least, please take a brief look at the addendum below for what lurks behind SB50.

#### A few more facts to consider:

Nearly all of San Francisco is near transit and can be upzoned under SB 50. How much density, height and congestion increases can one city bear before they destroy what made it so desirable in the first place?

96% of San Francisco eligible for upzoning. Residential development that is either within ½ mile of the Muni Metro, BART, Ferry or Cable Cars or ¼ mile from a frequently-serviced bus stop will be eligible -- SF Planning Department analysis of SB 50. The hidden consequence of this bill is the impact on our neighborhood from combining SB 50 and other existing housing bills (State Density Bonus and Housing Accountability Act). That would allow increased heights up to 70' in residential areas and up to 75' in our commercial districts

SB 50 puts developers in charge of their own planning. Cities will have NO planning power

and neighbors will have NO say. If developers include a certain percentage of affordable housing in the project, they can choose, in addition to increased height and density, three (3) exemptions from building codes. Here's a small sample of local development standards, design and planning tools they can choose from:

- Remove setbacks: No more areas for trees, green belts, and side yards.
- **Reduce floor area ratio**: Building size/density can grow 47% to 297%.
- **Eliminate environmental sustainability**: Any development standard adopted by a city that isn't state law can be ignored by developers.
- **Remove onsite open-space:** Courtyards and balconies can be omitted.
- **Allow demolition**: Developers can demolish all buildings not on the California Registry of Historic Places. Most city building are not eligible, and of those that are, most are not registered.
- Remove exposure requirements: Allow windows that inhumanely stare at a wall.
- **Encourage lot mergers**: Up to 150 linear feet of frontage and possibly no limit with the State Density Bonus.

**Eliminates single-family zoning.** SB 50 overturns single-family zoning in areas that are "above median income, jobs-rich with good public schools" and lack major transit. Local RH-1, RH-2, RH-3 and many other residential zoning codes will no longer apply.

Rewards construction of up to 75 foot towers next to single-family homes. SB 50 encourages 75-foot luxury towers in single-family areas that are either close to transit or close to jobs and good schools. The limit is NOT 45 and 55 feet, as Wiener falsely says in SB 50, due to its interface with other state legislation (State Density Bonus). Up to 7-story buildings will be in areas currently zoned 4-stories if multiple zoning laws are combined and applied.

Cities can't stop a luxury tower unless the project hurts public safety. SB 50 is weaponized by the Housing Accountability Act of 1982, quietly amended by local politicians Nancy Skinner and Scott Wiener in 2017. It bans cities from rejecting any "density bonus" project unless the development "puts public health and safety at risk, or on any property listed in the California Register of Historical Resources." Therefore the onus is on the neighbors to claim and prove the risk. Otherwise the project proceeds.

**Demolition.** Local anti-demolition laws are honored, BUT if the demolition of a home would result in even one more housing unit than what presently exists on the parcel, the demolition must be allowed. San Francisco's local demolition laws will be null and void.

**Zero parking requirement.** This bill encourages severe density increases with no associated

parking, on the assumption that everyone will ride public transit. There's been a decrease in public transportation ridership of 20%. In reality, the lack of parking will only clog the streets and highways with more Uber and Lyft cars.

**Turns developers into the fox guarding the rental hen-house.** SB 50 utterly fails to protect renters. While it purports to temporarily prevent developers from razing "rental housing," only cities who keep a register of their renters can stop developers from misstating who lives there.

**SB 50 does nothing to address the infrastructure plans and costs that will be needed to accommodate all these new developments.** How will California plan and pay for the increased needs of utilities such as sewer, water and power plus public transportation, schools, fire and police, parks, wear and tear on the the roads and all aspects of infrastructure from this dramatic increase in housing in the U.S.'s already most populated state? SB50 provides no funding whatsoever for all of this. Instead, it foists all those expenses on the cities and communities.

Our San Francisco elected representatives Scott Wiener, Phil Ting and David Chiu are claiming to help solve California's housing crisis with a statewide, one-size-fits-all solution. Meanwhile they are pushing through legislations that hurts the very city they were sent to Sacramento to protect.

There is a housing problem, but the issue is AFFORDABLE housing (low, moderate and middle income), and this bill does nothing to guarantee this type of housing will be built. In fact, on the contrary, it will encourage a proliferation of market rate, million-dollar condos that do nothing to address the problem, meanwhile seriously impacting the local character of our neighborhoods - the very reason many chose to live here and tourists love to visit.

In San Francisco we currently have over 58,000 parcels of property that have been purchased and fully entitled/approved for development, but nothing is happening due to the high cost of building. SB 50 does nothing to provide funding for or subsidizing of housing. And with the estimated thousands of new millionaires from the IPOs of Uber, Lyft, AirBnB, Pinterest, etc. who want to live in San Francisco, there's added motivation for developers to use SB 50 to focus on luxury properties at the expense of the purpose of the bill -- affordable housing. There is no reason to expose 96% of San Francisco to virtually unlimited development just because the real estate developers and tech companies, their funded organization (YIMBYs) and our elected representatives Scott Wiener, Phil Ting, and David Chiu say so.

#### ANOTHER WIENERVILLE!

This is affordable housing mandated by a central government miles and years away from when this town was a nice-looking village surrounded by fishing and farming areas. Private enterprise did not build these, the state did. The units don't have the latest appliances or even the latest modern conveniences. Each unit is the same boring, obsolete configuration. Consequently, a decade or two after these were produced to solve a housing crises, many are vacant and residents who can afford to leave, do so.

Making housing affordable doesn't have easy answers. The problem took time to create and it will take time to solve without creating unwanted consequences. In cities like San Francisco, where demand for good, affordable housing is strong, areas south of Market (SOMA) can continue to add needed housing and, more importantly, the needed stores and services to service the new population. Trying to add affordable, high-rise housing in every neighborhood is naive and becomes very expensive because of the smaller scale. Older neighborhoods don't have the needed infrastructure (sewer, water, transit, wider streets, parking and shopping services) to support the new housing regardless of how much state bureaucrats jump up and down. Established families and tenants will be driven out; traditional neighborhoods will become defaced with constant construction driving more potential homeowners and renters to other areas. In other words, what is thought to be the easy answer building state-mandated housing everywhere, as envisioned by California SB50, that overrides local zoning rules, will backfire destroying many attractive neighborhoods.

Good products take time to create. Local planning and building departments understand what housing will work and where – they are in the best position to approve it. The cost to build in many neighborhoods today is just unaffordable for even moderate and market rate housing. The experience in San Francisco, New York, Seattle and other cities in great demand attests to this. The square-foot cost-to-build today in much of California has doubled or tripled in the last two years, mainly because of the demand to rebuild created by the devastating fires of 2017 and 2018. What cost \$300/SF to build in 2016, now costs \$600-\$800 per square foot in many markets. Until these markets can increase the supply of more affordable housing, the wages paid workers that live there will have to increase to meet the higher cost to house these necessary employees. Higher pay provided by the market (not arbitrary minimum wage increases) will help to keep the needed workers close enough to serve the bulging populations of these growing cities. Large companies that have added the new tech jobs should help solve the imbalance that they have helped to create by including apartment housing in the new high-rise offices they build in the future.

A recent two hour trip to Berkeley and a one hour trip to South of Market brought home the fact how stretched the transportation infrastructure is in San Francisco and the Bay Area already. Besides its other flaws, the key assumption underlying the SB50--that the transportation/transit infrastructure is adequate to support significant additional density--is flat out wrong. Traffic and congestion have never been worse and people are loathe to take public transit if they can avoid it (hence the success of Uber and Lyft, which only further increase congestion and make MUNI buses even slower and less reliable). Adding dramatically more housing, particularly in the north and west of the city (where MUNI is really not a viable option for almost everyone), will make an already untenable traffic and transit situation even worse. Manhattantype densities only work if there's a viable and effective mass transit option (i.e., a subway), which San Francisco does not have. The unintended consequence of this "one size fits all" zoning approach will be more traffic, more pollution, less safe streets, uncontrolled development, loss of neighborhood character and an inability of city and regional government to effectively manage the process. I urge you to send a strong message to our state representatives to reject SB50.

We are elderly residents of D7, and your constituents. Our family has one simple reason to oppose the fast track ordinances are pushed to enable a poorly thought through plan for the mega navigation center: **our daughter's family with two grandchildren will be forced to move.** 

Here's Victoria's story and grave concern about the way Mayor Breed is steamrolling the Board and her constituents:

"I've been a resident of South Beach since 2004. My two kids have been born and raised here. Our family has always been deeply committed to the neighborhood - I organized a very first mom group, our international community of young families and children spending time every Friday at Crossroads. After our second child was born, we didn't move even though raising two kids in an area with no public schools, surrounded by Bay Bridge and games traffic wasn't a small feat. But we felt that benefits of urban environment and our love for the community of South Beach outweighed the difficulties.

Over the years, we watched our neighbors and friends move out, some after having one child, others after a second one was born or kids hit kindergarten age. The local press and even NYT portrayed San Francisco as a **the most child unfriendly city**. Our family stayed. Delayed construction projects in Downtown, in particular completely broken down pothole-riddled Brannan street on top of never ending MUNI tunnel on 4th, have taken a tremendous toll on us as we have to drive our kids to school outside of SOMA 5 days a week, and return to FIDi for work. Our commute just to the kids' school extended from 20 min to almost an hour; even worse for the commute back. This cut into the time kids could have been using for sports or other activities. Still, we have stayed.

But the area continued to deteriorate. Open illegal drug use is happening within a few blocks of our house. My children see piles of trash, feces, needles... And then they go to school to learn how to care about the environment. They see tents, they see mentally ill people and going off high drug users screaming on the streets or pacing around aimlessly. Al of those stopped being educational moments for us long time ago. At this point, my one all consuming worry is the safety of my children. And this is not unwarranted.

My teenage son and I were recently attacked on Embarcadero and Townsend on Sunday late afternoon. In the broad daylight, a large man with signs of mental disturbance started screaming obscenities and ran towards us. 911 was called, eventually SFPD got he attacker. This incident resulted in my son being scared of walking alone in South Beach. He was forced to quit YMCA swim team because he no longer felt safe walking 4 blocks to Embarcadero Y. This is not the only story of altercations my family had with the homeless addicted individuals, But this one shows you the impact lack of safety has on ANY and ALL parts of our day to day life.

You may want to dismiss this as a "first world problems". It is not. I am an immigrant and a refugee escaping discrimination; my husband is a war refugee escaping bombs that fell on his city. We know UNSAFE. We came here looking for safety for us, safety for our children, and safety for our elderly parents. We've been gradually losing the safety. And now, with the decision to put a 200+ bed Navigation Center, with no mandatory treatment program for

addicts, with a completely incompetent HSH vouching for running the mega center in a manner that "won't impact the community", and with Mayor's complete disregard to any real impact or proper process, we know you are forcing us out. My immigrant refugee family looking for a safer life for our kids is no longer welcome in San Francisco, we simply do not exist. A threat to safety will impact many many immigrants that made a home here, because safety is what we came here for.

It is evident that Mayor Breed making "take no prisoners" approach with the navigation center because somehow she is seeing it as a pillar for her re-election. I campaigned for Mayor Breed, and got my and my husband's family to vote for her. Over 10 FIRST TIME votes went to Breed because of me. And now her policies, specifically as it relates to having safe streets, are the only reason we have to move out of the city. She sees this project as an appearement to small vocal special interests group, and uses vulnerable segments such as immigrants, children, elderly as a sacrifice.

Putting 200 "hard to reach street dwellers" who are chronically homeless under one roof is going to create problems inside the center. HSH has a clear track record of inability to control those problems and they lack any experience handling the location of such scale. Once uncontrolled, the problems such as drug use, violent behavior and theft will quickly spill over into the neighborhood. SFPD seemed to promise to help. I have not seen anything from Southern station. And the homeless outreach team is always citing how overwhelmed they are handling Tenderloin. The promise brings me no comfort. In addition, this parking lot is cut off by heavy traffic on Embarcadero, Beale and Brannan. So just mere geography make this location a very challenging one to deal with in a timely banner when problems start arising. I am appalled that no one is looking at the impact based on real life scenarios. The center is open 24/7, and with most residents using drugs regularly but unable to use inside, where would they be? on the Waterfront. Where would they buy illegal drugs? On the Waterfront. Where will the dealers come to sell to users? To the Waterfront. There's no mandatory treatment, there's no consequence for openly using meth or heroin, and there are very little consequences of dealing. So WHAT WILL STOP THIS FROM HAPPENING?"

Please do what you can to prevent this project from happening without doing any adequate due diligence. Your ethics should stop you from supporting this.

Give our daughter's family a chance to continue living in San Francisco. Reject bullying fast-track ordinances 190045 and 190047.

While I fully recognize the enormity of the homelessness crisis in San Francisco and the greater Bay Area, I have some concerns about the proposed plan to locate a navigation center along the Embarcadero (SF Port seawall lot 330).

First, why is it being located there rather than where the highest concentration of homeless people are currently located? It would make more sense to me to locate a place to help the homeless where they can easily and readily access it.

What will the navigation center do to help people who are chronically homeless? I fully support helping people who are attempting to get back on their feet, but what is the plan to help people actually get out of the navigation center rather than simply providing a place that bandaids a larger issue. Housing has been regularly shown to be the first step to helping people overcome homelessness, is a navigation center housing? Or simply a place to sleep? How is a navigation center really helping fight the homelessness crisis?

What is the impact of a large navigation center going to be on the visitors to SF and especially the Giants games? A lot of people travel along the Embarcadero and I struggle to believe that placing a navigation center along the Embarcadero will not increase the impression of SF being a place to avoid. I love SF and it's painful to hear all the stories of people coming here and seeing how poorly we are dealing with the homelessness crisis.

Also, as a resident of the area, what is going to be done/what assurances does the city provide to ensure waste, needles, trash, tents, or other sidewalk obstacles will not proliferate by drawing in more people? The East Cut neighborhood association spends our local money taking care of the job the city abdicates: keeping the streets clean. How is the city going to ensure the East Cut or other neighborhood associations are not required to take up an extra burden of keeping the streets cleans and open for people with limited mobility.

I want SF to help those who need housing. I support the concept of providing services to homeless people to help them get back on their feet. I am not convinced that the current plan and this bypassing of so many regulations and public input processes is a proper approach. I urge you to reject the fast-track ordinances (190045 and 190047). Please instead fast track affordable housing (i.e., something people who make \$40,000 or less could afford) and affordable rentals (less than \$1200 a month for people who make \$40,000 or less). (FYI: these are guesses at affordable based on my experiences...I'm fine with making them lower, but not higher.)



In reference to the Board of Supervisors' meeting of Tuesday, 19 March 2019, items 23 and 24 of the agenda, files 190045 and 190047 respectively.

Dear Supervisors and Staff.

My wife and I have been residents of Brannan Street for ten years. We've seen the South Beach neighbourhood considerably change in this short span of time. Some things for the better, some for the worse, including the increase of homeless neighbours. All-in-all, we are extremely thankful for our privileged life, and wish all people the same or better quality of life. We applaud the City's commitments and efforts to help folk in need. However, a second Navigation Centre in our neighbourhood (in addition to one nearby in Dogpatch,) will bookend our home between approximately 600 homeless folk, and the known consequences that come with it. That's an unacceptable burden on us. South Beach and the east SOMA area are home to approximately 10,000 residents, from new borns to elderly, and numerous small businesses that cater a variety of services to us. Homeless folk don't, and really shouldn't, stay all day in the shelters. They wander during the day and interact with neighbours. They also wander at night when they cannot enter a shelter. Most of the interactions are pleasant, but some end in aggression, assault, theft, robbery, vandalism, break-ins, trespassing, loitering, unpleasant exchanges, public intoxication and use of drugs, relieving in public, control of public spaces, etc. Doubling the number of homeless in our neighbourhood will exacerbate the ongoing problem, not solve it. That's utterly unacceptable. I am a tall and large man with experience dealing with homeless folk, and I am accosted and harassed routinely while running local errands. And as I approach the mid-50s, I feel unsafe. The City is creating an unsafe environment for my wife and me. And promises of safety and cleanliness aren't sufficient. And there's nothing temporary about the proposed Navigation Centre. It will be there for a long time, far beyond the intended four years.

While my wife and I acknowledge the homeless situation, and we pitch-in with money and volunteering, and we believe homelessness ought to be solved with kindness and dignity, the proposed Navigation Centre, the largest in the City, is an unfair burden on us. We respectfully request the Supervisors to vote no on these ordinances on first reading, send this matter to committee, and to impose a formal period of public comments and hearings. Numerous neighbours are unaware of the proposed Navigation Centre, and during the two

public meetings of Tuesday 12 March, I (personally) couldn't find one supporter of the proposed Navigation Centre who lives or works in South Beach and the east SOMA area. The local inhabitants of the area, that is, those aware of the proposed Navigation Centre, are overwhelmingly opposed to it.

Regarding this specific passage in both ordinances, 'affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act', this is an unacceptable attempt at circumvent good environmental, sanitation, hygiene and health practices. Homeless shelters must adhere to CEQA (and NEPA) as a matter of principle.

Another point is that it seems the City is willing or considering paying fair market value to rent Seawall Lot 330. If my understanding is correct, that changes everything. There are dozens of properties in the San Francisco Bay Area that can be rented and that are more suitable for a Navigation Centre. Including, and echoing a neighbour who commented at the Port's Commission hearing, the lawn and space in front of the City Hall would easily host a couple of thousand homeless folk. And that immediate vicinity hardly has 10,000 residents like ours.

Finally, this 'crisis', as it has been labeled, draws parallels with the other infamous 'crisis' on the southern border, in which the latter is being extrapolated, exaggerated, dramatised to legitimise an unconstitutional use of power to implement an ill-conceived solution that locals don't support, don't want, and that won't solve the underscoring real problem. We must not allow this to happen in San Francisco, the bastion of progressiveness and liberalism. Otherwise we are no better than those that reject the legitimate will of the people. That's the real crisis.

We respectfully request the Supervisors to vote no on these ordinances on first reading, send this matter to committee, and to impose a formal period of public comments and hearings.

My name is Michael Lacina and I am chair of the Fillmore Heritage Residents' Voices Committee. Our homeowner's association found it necessary to form this committee to address ongoing issues concerning the commercial parcel located at 1330 Fillmore, formerly known as Yoshi's. As you know our homes are located at 1310 Fillmore and are attached at the hip to the commercial parcel.

The reason we are here is because there have been numerous meetings, both public and private, regarding the sale and use of the parcel, from which we have been either excluded, where our input has been minimalized. We are here to correct that and thereby attain a voice in the process.

The homeowners of the Fillmore Heritage Center are physically and financially, as well as emotionally, tied to the commercial parcel – physically in that we share corridors and adjoining walls, financially because we share the Common Areas Maintenance dues, and emotionally because what happens at this parcel has a significant impact on our wellbeing.

So I am sure the OCII commission members here today are not surprised that we are here to stand up and make our voices heard in the wake of the brutal killing that happened on March 23<sup>rd</sup> just steps from our front door. This shooting death, as well as the tragic, life-changing injuries to innocent bystanders, have made us question the City's concern for our safety and security and has galvanized us to wake up and speak up as community stakeholders.

As long-standing members of the Fillmore neighborhood, we are well aware of its history and respectful of the significance of that history. By no means are we opposed to a community benefit in the commercial parcel. Some of us invested in the original community benefit, by making monetary contributions such as purchasing lifetime memberships in the Jazz Heritage Museum and Gallery, the entrance of which now bears the scars of bullets. As true stakeholders, we chose to invest here, and we choose to continue to live here.

However, we do not feel invited or embraced - far from it. It is our belief that the process of the RFP to sell the commercial parcel has been less than transparent. This is evidenced by an ongoing lawsuit against that process on the part of a longtime community member, and as such justifies our belief. This lack of transparency seems to be the case again with the assignment of the recently expired lease of the commercial parcel, and proposed renewal of that lease.

Finally and most importantly, we The Fillmore Heritage Center homeowners, and you, the OCII as the successor agency for San Francisco Redevelopment, are legally bound as real estate entities by the Reciprocal Easement Agreement created by the California Department of Real Estate. In fact, the recent effort by our HOA board to increase our reserve fund was blocked per the language in the Reciprocal Easement Agreement, and such action affirms our bond with the City and OCII. Therefore it is only right

and just that we should have a co-equal voice in the disposition of the commercial parcel, and with that voice we insist on a financially viable operator, one who is in immediate possession of sufficient resources to uphold the Reciprocal Easement Agreement and maintain current payments on all required Common Areas Maintenance dues.

We, as community stakeholders of the Fillmore Heritage Center, as owners living in the Fillmore Heritage Center, require an equal voice in the decisions concerning the Fillmore Heritage Center, and request that the OCII and the City invite our representatives to all future meetings and discussions regarding the commercial parcel. As we are so bound together, we surely have a right to that voice.

#### Dear Board of Supervisors,

I write to ask that your vote for the Climate Emergency Resolution be conditioned upon the inclusion of aggressive urban forestation in the City's revised Climate Action Plan.

City trees are one of the cheapest, most effective tools in the battle against climate change. Trees sequester CO2, clean the air of dangerous particulate matter (for example, wildfire smoke and pollutants), draw down urban heat island effect in the city's most polluted and highway covered neighborhoods, provide habitat for our increasingly endangered ecosystem, and make our sidewalks and streets more safe and welcoming to pedestrians and bicyclists. In 2017, San Francisco's Planning Department stated that for every \$1 invested in city trees, San Francisco receives more than \$4 in benefits.

Despite all of these climate benefits, studies indicate that <u>San Francisco has the smallest urban canopy of any major city in the United States - and it's getting worse</u>. In 2014, the City rolled out an urban forest plan to add 50,000 trees to our streets in 20 years, or an average of 2,500 trees per year. Since that time, we've wildly failed to meet that goal. In 2018, San Francisco added a total of one single tree to its canopy. And while StreetTreeSF reverted control of street trees to Public Works, it only budgeted for pruning and removal - Public Works currently has no budget to plant or even replace the trees it removes.

Our city and our planet literally cannot afford this continued urban canopy mis-management. While San Francisco leads the country in green initiatives, we know that <u>at our current rate of growth, our carbon footprint will outpace every amazing effort currently in place</u>. San Francisco must look at every possible solution to reduce our carbon footprint.

<u>Trees are a solution that our city has ignored for too long</u>. And even if the City continues to invest in more costly, high impact efforts, trees are the only mechanism available that create the air we need to live and breathe.

Please vote for the Climate Emergency Resolution only on the condition that it include aggressive urban forestation efforts. Thank you, Josh Klipp

As I have told many San Francisco officials, departments, and agencies, many times, 988 Howard Street is utterly uninhabitable. Our apartment units overheat drastically, with no way to reduce the heat. Opening the window, running multiple fans, nothing works. We are suffering injuries from this dangerous "Permanent Supportive Housing" building, and there have been multiple deaths.

How many times do I need to email the Board of Supervisors and other City entities begging for my life? Can you imagine what this must be like for a human being who already struggles with PTSD? We are being neglected and abused every single day we remain inside of this "pretty" but definitely unsafe building.

What is the San Francisco Board of Supervisor's responsibility to victims of San Francisco's corrupt Department of Public Health, and Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing, and Department of Building Inspection, among many other departments now undeniably aware of the dangerous and deadly conditions at 988 Howard Street? No matter what could possibly be happening beyond my own awareness: I have so, so much evidence that myriad City entities know we are suffering and dying on San Francisco's watch, *and yet we remain housed in the building*.

Is anyone going to rescue the mass casualties of San Francisco's greed and corruption? Or will you continue to allow us to suffer injuries and deaths because that is somehow easier (for you)?

I mean no disrespect. But if you think my rage is unreasonable, why don't you all come take a tour of 988 Howard Street? Feel free to invite our former Mayor, now Governor, Gavin Newsom. He called this building "magical." How very, very terrifying.





I am happy to share that TISC and TIE have come to an agreement on the footprint and location of the marina at Clipper Cove. Following our meeting on Wednesday October 19th, where we submitted 2 plans to TIE for review, TIE committed to moving forward with the A25C footprint that we presented.

This week, TIE provided the attached plan ("OVERALL SITE PLAN - MARINA - Adjusted Slip Configuration dated 11-2-16" <a href="http://tisailing.org/images/02">http://tisailing.org/images/02</a> News <a href="Press/ti\_dock\_site\_plan-1.4.3-161102-color.pdf">Press/ti\_dock\_site\_plan-1.4.3-161102-color.pdf</a>) which respects the critical dimensions we had outlined; the wave attenuator location of 1144' east from the mean low water line at the causeway, at a length of 789' with a 236' dog leg angled at 45 degrees. While this footprint will reduce the range and depth of some our programs, it does provide the minimum space that we need to access the beach and continue all of our current programs in the cove. We are happy that we have reached an

agreement and appreciate the meaningful changes that TIE has made that will allow our programs to continue.

Although we understand this layout is not a final engineering drawing and that locations of gangways, docks and slips may change, we agreed that the eastern limits on the transient/attenuator dock and the southern limits on the transient dock extension are maximum dimensions. In return, TISC has agreed to publicly support this plan at upcoming meetings including meetings at the Division of Boating and Waterways, TIDA meetings, Board of Supervisor and BCDC.

I really want to thank you all for your support these last few months which enabled us to come to this compromise. Your involvement truly made the difference.

Sharing sailing with kids from all backgrounds, including all of the opportunities that come with it, has been a passion of mine for some time because I personally know how influential it can be in ones life. Thank you for making sure we will continue to help kids grow and thrive.
