Resolution supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 388, authored by Assembly Member Monique Limón and co-authored by California State Senator Hannah-Beth Jackson, to require the California State Department of Public Health to implement the Health Brain Initiative: State and Local Public Health Partnerships to Address Dementia, the 2018-2023 Road Map and establish a pilot program in up to eight counties to develop local initiatives to raise awareness on Alzheimer's Disease and other dementias.

[Supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 388 (Limón) - Alzheimer's Disease]

WHEREAS, Alzheimer's disease is the third leading cause of death impacting millions of lives throughout California; and

WHEREAS, Less than half of all Californians affected by Alzheimer's disease and other dementias have not been formerly diagnosed by a clinician; and

WHEREAS, Although the onset of Alzheimer's cannot yet be stopped or reversed, early detection and diagnosis can make it easier for patients and their families to manage the disease; and

WHEREAS, Under current California law, the California Department of Public Health administers grants to any postsecondary high education institutions with a medical center to establish diagnostic and treatment centers for Alzheimer's; and

WHEREAS, In 2018, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention published the "Health Brain Initiative: State and Local Public Health Partnerships to Address Dementia, The 2018-2023 Road Map," to establish a nationwide framework for addressing Alzheimer's disease and other dementias; and

WHEREAS, The Healthy Brain Initiative advances cognitive health as an integral component of public health by proposing 25 specific actions in four traditional domains of public health including epidemiology, environmental, interventions, community programs linked to clinical services; and

WHEREAS, The Healthy Brain Initiative provides a foundation for the public health community to anticipate and respond to the growing impact of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias in California where a 30 percent increase in the affected population is projected by 2025; and

WHEREAS, The California Department of Public Health shall expand California's public health infrastructure to ensure that brain health is integrated into chronic disease prevention by coordinating a statewide public awareness campaign focused on Alzheimer's disease and other dementias; and

WHEREAS, The California Department of Public Health will educate the public on the signs and symptoms of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias in order to promote early detection and timely diagnosis; and

WHEREAS, The California Department of Public Health will reach populations at risk of developing Alzheimer's disease and other dementias, including, but not limited to African Americans, Latinx, and women; and

WHEREAS, Upon appropriation by the State Legislature, the California Department of Public Health will operate a pilot program in up to eight counties to develop local initiatives consistent with the Healthy Brain Initiative; and

WHEREAS, The California Department of Public Health will provide on-time grant funding over three consecutive fiscal years to pilot counties to assist in the following: education and empowerment of the public with regard to brain health and cognitive aging; mobilizing public and private partnerships to engage local stakeholders in effective

community-based interventions; ensure a competent workforce by strengthening the knowledge, skills, and abilities of health care professionals and family caregivers who deliver care and services to people with Alzheimer's disease and other dementias; and monitor data and evaluate programs to contribute to evidence-based practices; and

WHEREAS, Counties applying for the pilot program must incorporate the following fundamental planning principles: eliminating health disparities; collaborating across multiple sectors; and leveraging public and private partnerships for sustained impact; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill No. 388 is designed to address the costs of treating Alzheimer's disease and other dementias which cost the nation \$2.3 trillion in Medicaid costs annually; and

WHEREAS, The lifetime cost of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias is over \$340,000 despite significant help from the Medi-Cal program, the bulk of costs are incurred by families paying out of pocket for long-term services and support; and

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill No. 388 will take active steps in improving patient outcomes and reducing costs associated with Alzheimer's disease and other dementias; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges the California Legislature and Governor Newsom to support and pass California State Assembly Bill No. 388; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco Board of Supervisors hereby directs the Clerk of the Board to send a copy of this resolution to the Governor of the State of California, the California State Assembly, the California State Senate, the California Assembly Budget Committee Chair Assembly Member Phil Ting, the California Assembly Health and Human Services Committee Acting Chair Assembly Member Eloise Gomez Reyes, the California Senate Budget and Fiscal Review Committee Chair Senator

An act to add Section 125284 to the Health and Safety Code, relating to Alzheimer's disease.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 388, as amended, Limón. Alzheimer's disease.

Existing law authorizes any postsecondary higher educational institution with a medical center to establish diagnostic and treatment centers for Alzheimer's disease, and requires the State Department of Public Health to administer grants to the postsecondary higher educational institutions that establish a center pursuant to these provisions.

This bill would require the department to implement the action agenda items in the Healthy Brain Initiative, as defined, and coordinate a statewide public awareness campaign to educate the public on the sign's signs and symptoms of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias and to reach consumers at risk of cognitive impairment, with targeted outreach to populations at greater risk of developing Alzheimer's disease

and other dementias. The bill would also, upon appropriation by the Legislature, require the department to establish a pilot program in up to 8 counties, as specified, and award participating counties one-time grant funding over 3 consecutive fiscal years, to develop local initiatives that are consistent with the Healthy Brain Initiative. The bill would require the department to conduct an evaluation of the pilot program and produce a report, to be submitted to the Legislature by January 1, 2023, describing best practices and making recommendations regarding which solutions and innovations are most feasible to replicate.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. The Legislature finds and declares all of the 2 following:
- (a) In 2018, the United States Centers for Disease Control and
 Prevention published the "Healthy Brain Initiative: State and Local
 Public Health Partnerships to Address Dementia, The 2018-2023
- 6 Road Map," which established a nationwide framework for addressing Alzheimer's disease and other dementias.
- 8 (b) The Healthy Brain Initiative advances cognitive health as 9 an integral component of public health, proposing 25 specific 10 actions in four traditional domains of public health.
- 11 (c) The action agenda included in the Healthy Brain Initiative 12 Road Map provides a foundation for the public health community 13 to anticipate and respond to the growing impact of Alzheimer's 14 disease and other dementias on the nation and California, where 15 a 30 percent increase in the affected population is projected by 16 2025.
- 17 SEC. 2. Section 125284 is added to the Health and Safety Code, 18 to read:
- 19 125284. (a) In order to plan and prepare for a historic increase 20 in the population affected by Alzheimer's disease and other 21 dementias, the department shall implement the action agenda items 22 identified in the Healthy Brain Initiative.
- 23 (b) The department shall expand California's public health 24 infrastructure to ensure that brain health is integrated into chronic 25 disease prevention and health promotion efforts by coordinating

a statewide public awareness campaign focused on both of the following:

- (1) Educating the public on the signs and symptoms of Alzheimer's disease and other dementias in order to promote early detection and timely diagnosis.
- (2) Reaching consumers at risk of cognitive impairment, with targeted outreach to populations at greater risk of developing Alzheimer's disease and other dementias, including, but not limited to, African Americans, Latinx, and women.

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- (c) (1) Upon appropriation by the Legislature, the department shall operate a pilot program in up to eight counties to develop local initiatives consistent with the Healthy Brain Initiative. Counties selected for the pilot program shall include up to two rural counties and at least one coastal county. The department shall provide one-time grant funding over three consecutive fiscal years to pilot counties to assist in local planning and preparation in one or more of the following areas:
- (A) Education and empowerment of the public with regard to brain health and cognitive aging.
- (B) Mobilizing public and private partnerships to engage local stakeholders in effective community-based interventions and best practices.
- (C) Ensuring a competent workforce by strengthening the knowledge, skills, and abilities of healthcare health care professionals who deliver care and services to people with Alzheimer's disease and other dementias and their family caregivers.
- 28 (D) Monitoring data and evaluating programs to contribute to evidence-based practice.
- 30 (2) The department shall establish a competitive request for 31 application process through which a county may apply to 32 participate in the pilot program operated pursuant to paragraph (1) 33 and receive grant funding. Counties that are selected to participate 34 in the pilot program shall, incorporate all of the following 35 fundamental planning principles:
 - (A) Eliminating health disparities.
- 37 (B) Collaborating across multiple sectors.
- 38 (C) Leveraging public and private resources for sustained 39 impact.

- 1 (3) (A) The department shall conduct an evaluation of the community-based solutions and innovations implemented by each pilot county and produce a consolidated report describing best practices and making recommendations regarding which solutions and innovations are most feasible to replicate. The department shall provide a copy of the report to the Legislature by January 1, 2023.
- 8 (B) A report to be submitted pursuant to subparagraph (A) shall 9 be submitted in compliance with Section 9795 of the Government 10 Code.
- (d) For the purposes of this section, "Healthy Brain Initiative" means the report "Healthy Brain Initiative: State and Local Public Health Partnerships to Address Dementia, The 2018-2023 Road Map," published by the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
