Ordinance amending Division I of the Transportation Code to waive all fees other than Municipal Transportation Agency fees for Sunday Streets events.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. Findings.

- (a) Sunday Streets is a recurring event that temporarily closes public streets in particular neighborhood on particular Sundays, to transform those streets into car-free community spaces for strolling, play, exercise, meeting, and exchange. The event is celebrating its eleventh year in San Francisco, having grown from two waterfront events in 2008 to ten annual events in neighborhoods all across the City. The events are organized and presented by Livable City, a San Francisco-based nonprofit organization, in partnership with various City agencies including the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency, Department of Public Health, Department of Public Works, Office of Economic and Workforce Development, and Recreation and Park Department.
- (b) Sunday Streets events promote happiness for local residents and visitors. They also promote general well-being, advancing health equity by focusing in Areas of Vulnerability identified by the Department of Public Health. Researchers at San Francisco State University have found that these events foster increased physical activity in the communities they serve,

including communities burdened with higher rates of chronic disease. Sunday Streets also	
partners with local merchants, community organizations, business associations, and the	
Office of Economic and Workforce Development to promote local economic vitality in the	
commercial corridors it serves, which include several of the City's Invest in Neighborhoods	
corridors. The events create durable partnerships with merchants and merchant groups,	
produce community guides, limit outside vending, and invest in local hiring and training and	
local vendors. Sunday Streets also promotes civic participation by engaging and training 2	00
to 300 volunteers each year.	

(c) Sunday Streets is partially funded by City budget allocations and grants, matched by grants, sponsorships, and exhibitor fees secured by Livable City.

Section 2. Article 6 of Division I of the Transportation Code is hereby amended by revising Section 6.6, to read as follows:

SEC. 6.6. TEMPORARY USE OF STREETS FOR STREET FAIRS.

* * * *

(f) **Fee**. No later than 60 days prior to the proposed date of the street fair and in consultation with other City departments, ISCOTT shall determine the fee to be charged for the permit according to the schedule below. No other fee for conducting a street fair shall be required or assessed. All fees paid by the sponsors for street fair permits shall be deposited in the City Treasury and allocated by the Controller to the appropriate City departments. The fee shall be based on the actual costs to the City of temporarily closing the street for the street fair, pursuant to the following fee schedule:

(1) Fire Department:

(A) Application fee \$330.00

1	(B) Inspection fee <u>for</u> vendors using propane, butane, charcoal briquettes
2	or open flame:
3	(i) First Day of Street Fair:
4	1 to 10 food vendors \$468.00
5	11 to 20 food vendors \$936 .00

The Police Department, working with the sponsor, shall provide an estimate of attendance for the event for purposes of determining the applicable cap.

(B) Street fairs where alcoholic beverages are not served:

— Police Department: 40 percent of the projected Police Department costs incurred by reason of the street fair; provided, that this fee shall not exceed \$2,793.49. ISCOTT shall waive all or part of this fee upon a showing that the sponsors of the event are unable to pay the full fee.

If the Director of Transportation grants the application for a permit, he or she shall transmit to the sponsor an invoice for the fee. The sponsor of the street fair shall make full payment of the fee no later than 10 days prior to the date of the event.

(o) Waiver of Fees. With the exception of the SFMTA fees listed in subsection (f)(3), all fees for the Sunday Streets events are hereby waived, notwithstanding any other provision of law, including without limitation subsections (f)(1), (f)(2), and (f)(4) of this Section 6.6, Article 12 of the Park Code, Chapter 90 of the Administrative Code, Article 15.1 of the Police Code, and Article 15 of the Public

Section 3. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the

Works Code.

4	Section 4. Scope of Ordinance. In enacting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors

6	numbers, punctuation marks, charts, diagrams, or any other constituent parts of the Municipal
7	Code that are explicitly shown in this ordinance as additions, deletions, Board amendment
8	additions, and Board amendment deletions in accordance with the "Note" that appears under
9	the official title of the ordinance.
