[Supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 1784 (Santiago, Chiu, and Gonzalez) - Secure the VOTE Act]

Resolution supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 1784, authored by Assembly Members Miguel Santiago, David Chiu, and Lorena Gonzalez, with principal co-author Senator Scott Wiener, the "Secure the VOTE Act," to authorize the Secretary of State to award up to \$16 million in matching funds, upon appropriation by the Legislature, to counties for the development of open-source paper ballot voting systems.

WHEREAS, In 2019 the U.S. Department of Homeland Security revealed that the Russian government likely targeted election infrastructure in all 50 states in the 2016 presidential election; and

WHEREAS, Proprietary voting systems lack transparency and have proven vulnerable to security threats, and the 2017 DEF CON Hacking Conference testing current proprietary voting systems concluded that such systems are a "national security threat", and that "every piece of equipment ... was effectively breached in some manner"; and

WHEREAS, Publicly owned open-source paper ballot voting systems would be openly licensed and therefore available for public inspection, allowing for a transparent examination of public code to find possible security flaws and other issues, and allowing claims about security and accuracy to be independently verified; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Defense uses open-source for security purposes, and its manual states that "Making source code available to the public significantly aids defenders and not just attackers. Continuous and broad peer-review, enabled by publicly available source code, improves software reliability and security through the identification and elimination of defects that might otherwise go unrecognized by the core development team."; and

Supervisor Mandelman BOARD OF SUPERVISORS WHEREAS, In 2014 the San Francisco Board of Supervisors unanimously voted in favor of a resolution declaring support for open-source voting systems; and

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco has already allocated an initial \$1.55 million to the Department of Technology, which is working with the Department of Elections, the Elections Commission, the Mayor's Office, and other stakeholders to start development of local open-source voting; and

WHEREAS, California State Assembly Bill No. 1784, the "Secure the Voter-verified Open-source paper ballot Transparent Elections (VOTE) Act", authored by Assembly Members Miguel Santiago, David Chiu, and Lorena Gonzalez, with principal co-author Senator Scott Wiener, would authorize the Secretary of State to award up to \$16 million total in matching funds to counties to speed the development, certification, governance, and distribution of open-source paper ballot voting systems that all counties would be able to freely use and modify based on their needs; and

WHEREAS, The "Secure the VOTE Act" would provide up to \$8 million in matching funds that San Francisco could use for any open-source voting systems it develops and uses at least on a pilot basis by the November 2024 election, if San Francisco meets all of the following requirements: 1) All of the system's software developed at least in part using state or county funds pursuant to Section 19504 of AB 1784 must be licensed exclusively under the GNU Affero General Public License 3.0 or later; 2) All of the system's software components must be open source during development, using a process that is open to public feedback. Development must be carried out in public repositories by January 1, 2021; and 3) All of the system's software components eligible for an award of matching funds pursuant to this subdivision must be certified or conditionally approved by the Secretary of State, or approved by the Secretary of State as part of a pilot program pursuant to Section 19209, for use during the November 5, 2024, general election; and

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WHEREAS, The San Francisco Elections Commission unanimously voted to request that San Francisco support the "Secure the VOTE Act"; and

WHEREAS, Expeditiously completing the open-source voting system will save San Francisco significant funds by allowing the City to be eligible to receive matching funds for its voting systems, and will give voters more confidence in the security and transparency of vote counting; and

WHEREAS, After San Francisco certifies its open-source voting system, every county in the state and nation will be able to use and build on it for free, significantly increasing the confidence in the security and transparency of vote-counting across the country; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco urges the California State Legislature, Secretary of State Alex Padilla, and Governor Gavin Newsom to support and pass California State Assembly Bill No. 1784, the "Secure the VOTE Act"; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco hereby directs the Clerk of the Board to transmit copies of this Resolution to the California State Legislature, to Secretary of State Alex Padilla, and to the Office of the Governor of California.

An act to add Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 19500) to Division 19 of the Elections Code, relating to elections.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1784, as amended, Santiago. Elections: open-source paper ballot voting systems.

Existing law prohibits the use of a voting system unless it has been certified or conditionally approved by the Secretary of State, or approved by the Secretary of State as part of a pilot program, prior to the election at which it is to be used.

This bill, the Secure the VOTE Act, would authorize the Secretary of State to award up to \$16,000,000 in matching funds, upon appropriation by the Legislature, to counties for the development of open-source paper ballot voting systems.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

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The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 19500) is added to Division 19 of the Elections Code, to read:

Chapter 6. Open-Source Paper Ballot Voting System Program

7 19500. This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the8 Secure the VOTE Act.

9 19500.

10 19501. The Secure the VOTE Act establishes a partnership 11 between the state and counties, with the goal of developing and 12 certifying—a publicly owned, open-source paper ballot voting 13 system. systems. The purposes of the program are reducing costs 14 associated with the replacement and maintenance of current paper 15 ballot voting systems and providing counties with a more 16 transparent, secure, and fair election process.

18 19502. An amount not to exceed sixteen million dollars 19 (\$16,000,000) shall be made available to the Secretary of State, 20 upon appropriation by the Legislature in the annual Budget Act 21 or another statute, for the program established pursuant to this 22 chapter. The Secretary of State shall establish an application 23 process and develop procedures for the distribution of funds 24 awarded pursuant to this chapter.

19503. (a) A county shall comply with all of the following to
be eligible for an award of funds:

(1) All of the system's software components developed at least *in part using state or county funds* must be licensed under an
open-source license approved by the Open Source Initiative and
all other counties must be able to access and modify the software
for free.

33 (2) All votes cast using the system must be recorded and34 tabulated using voter-verified permanent paper ballots.

(b) A county shall not be awarded more than eight million
dollars (\$8,000,000) pursuant to the program established by this
chapter.

(1) All of the system's software components paid for developed *at least in part* using state or county funds *pursuant to this section*must be licensed exclusively under the GNU *Affero* General Public

(2) All of the system's software components must be open
source during development, using a process that is open to public
feedback. Development must be carried out in public repositories
by January 1, 2021.

(3) All of the system's software components eligible for an
award of matching funds pursuant to this subdivision must be

15 (b) A county shall refund to the Secretary of State all funds 16 awarded pursuant to this chapter that have not been encumbered 17 by December 31, 2026.
