[Urging Urgent Homelessness Policy Changes]

Resolution urging the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to implement urgent policy changes to serve pregnant individuals, families living in single room occupancy units or doubled-up families; and urging the Department to pursue additional policy changes in coordination with the Board of Supervisors.

WHEREAS, The 2019 Point-in-Time Count of the homeless population in San Francisco revealed a 30% increase in homelessness from 2017 to 2019; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("DHSH") has responded with strategic investments in problem-solving and shelter, including for the growing population of individuals living in their vehicles; and

WHEREAS, The number of unsheltered families has remained relatively stable, unlike other subpopulations counted in the semi-annual Point-in-Time Count; and

WHEREAS, The homelessness crisis in San Francisco necessitates additional urgent action and policy changes at times to respond to changing conditions on the ground and within the population of individuals struggling with homelessness; and

WHEREAS, National data from 2017 suggests that 33% of all people experiencing homelessness are persons in families; and

WHEREAS, The 2019 Point-in-Time Count identified 612 persons in 201 families experiencing homelessness, similar to the 601 persons in 190 families identified in 2017; and

WHEREAS, The official Point-in-Time Count does not account for all homeless families due in large part to the fact that many families' condition of homelessness is not readily detectable or visible, and because the Point-in-Time Count excludes data on families living in SRO units or doubled-up households, meaning a household having one or more adults in

addition to the head of household and spouse or partner, such as an adult child living at home, two related or unrelated families residing together, or a parent living with an adult child; and

WHEREAS, The Point-in-Time Count uses the federal U.S. Housing and Urban Development or HUD definition of homelessness, which includes only those individuals and families residing in a shelter designated to provide a temporary living arrangement or those individuals and families with a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings; and

WHEREAS, Unlike HUD, San Francisco's definition of homelessness includes doubled-up families as well as families living in SROs or substandard or inadequate living situations including overcrowded spaces; and

WHEREAS, In 2014, the San Francisco Unified School District reported approximately 2,000 homeless students, of which 60% were living in doubled-up households; and

WHEREAS, A study found that 75% of the over 1.2 million homeless students in the United States live doubled-up, a percentage that has increased dramatically since the economic recession began in 2008; and

WHEREAS, As of May 2019, the number of homeless students reported by the San Francisco Unified School District has reached 2,293; and

WHEREAS, 699 households with minor children were residing in SROs according to the SRO census of 2015; and

WHEREAS, Children in families experiencing homelessness, including those in SROs and living in doubled-up conditions, face increased incidences of illness and are more likely to have emotional and behavioral problems than children with stable living accommodations; and

WHEREAS, Currently, families living in SROs or in doubled-up housing situations are excluded from accessing shelter, housing, or other services through the City's Family Coordinated Entry System; and

WHEREAS, There are over one thousand families in need of greater housing stability but currently ineligible for homeless family assistance; and

WHEREAS, By revising the intake forms and questionnaires at access points, the City could qualify these families for eligibility and equitably assess their needs and vulnerability; and

WHEREAS, These changes would also ensure that the aggregate needs of all members of a household are assessed and factored into the family's overall prioritization score, as opposed to just the needs of the head-of-household which currently determines an entire family's prioritization score; and

WHEREAS, Current policy states that pregnant individuals can only access the homeless family shelter and services system through the City's Family Coordinated Entry system upon arriving at the third trimester of pregnancy; and

WHEREAS, The third trimester is often too late to prevent long and short term fetal complications and preterm labor; and

WHEREAS, Mayor London N. Breed has expressed support for urgent action to expand eligibility for homeless pregnant individuals and families living in SROs and in doubled-up housing conditions; and

WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors recognizes that multiple other policies and practices being utilized to address the needs of individuals and families struggling with homelessness and unstable housing are necessary to effectively address continuing issues including, but not limited to, low-barrier programming for homeless youth, official identification

prerequisites to qualify for aid, the length of stay in Navigation Centers and other shelters; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to establish, publicize, and consistently apply a policy that guarantees that homeless pregnant individuals are eligible for family homeless services and housing at any point in their pregnancy by extending the definition of family homelessness to include homeless individuals with a confirmed pregnancy that do not have any other minor children; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to adhere to San Francisco's health data-driven established definition of homelessness established by Board of Supervisor Resolution No. 997-01 which includes SRO and doubled-up families; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to establish, publicize, and consistently apply a definition of homelessness that includes families living in Single Room Occupancy hotels and doubled-up housing situations as eligible households able to access shelter and other services through City's Family Coordinated Entry system; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to modify the calculation of a family's prioritization score under Family Coordinated Entry to ensure that the aggregate needs of all members of a household are assessed and factored into the family's overall prioritization score, as opposed to solely considering the needs of the head-of-household; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors affirms the independent authority of the Local Homelessness Coordinating Board to develop its own public meeting

agendas in order to meaningfully respond to these and other policy concerns related to the City's homelessness response system; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors strongly supports the Mayor's commitment to meet monthly with representative service providers with expertise and an established history of serving homeless individuals and families to address these and other policy concerns related to the homelessness response system; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to coordinate with the Mayor's office, homeless stakeholders, and the Board of Supervisors to address the homelessness crisis and ongoing policy concerns to improve access to, and efficacy of, the City and County of San Francisco's homelessness response system.
