1 [Condemning the Shooting of and Urging Repatriation for Brandon Lee - Urging a  
2 Congressional Investigation, Hearing, and the Suspension of United States Aid to the  
3 Philippine Military and Police]

4 **Resolution condemning the attempted assassination of San Francisco native and**  
5 **United States citizen Brandon Lee in the Philippines by suspected elements of the 54th**  
6 **Infantry Battalion of the Armed Forces of the Philippines; supporting the immediate**  
7 **evacuation of Lee from the Philippines and his repatriation to San Francisco to ensure**  
8 **his safety and access to adequate medical care; urging our San Francisco Federal**  
9 **representatives to initiate a Congressional investigation into the shooting of Lee; and**  
10 **urging our San Francisco Federal representatives to support a Congressional hearing**  
11 **on consequences of United States tax dollars going to the Philippine military and**  
12 **police, and to advocate for suspension of United States aid to the Duterte regime until**  
13 **Lee's case is resolved and the perpetrators are brought to justice.**

14  
15 WHEREAS, Brandon Lee, a U.S. citizen born and raised in San Francisco, was shot  
16 multiple times outside of his home on August 6, 2019, in the Ifugao province in the  
17 Philippines; and

18 WHEREAS, Brandon is a 37-year old indigenous and environmental rights advocate,  
19 journalist, and volunteer paralegal with the Cordillera Human Rights Alliance in the  
20 Philippines, who previously volunteered with the San Francisco Chinese Progressive  
21 Association, worked several years with the Stonestown YMCA, and was a student at San  
22 Francisco State University where he was also a member of the League of Filipino Students;  
23 and  
24  
25

1           WHEREAS, Brandon has chosen to commit his life to advancing indigenous and  
2 environmental rights and has been living in the Philippines since 2010 with his wife and  
3 daughter and among the indigenous communities in Ifugao; and

4           WHEREAS, Prior to the August 6th attack, since 2015 Brandon had been subjected to  
5 repeated threats and harassment by the Philippine military for his advocacy to protect the land  
6 and rights of indigenous people in Ifugao province and the surrounding Cordillera region of the  
7 Philippines; and

8           WHEREAS, Since August 6th, Brandon has been recovering at the Baguio General  
9 Hospital where his brother Aaron Lee and mother Louise Lee, who is a 40 year City & County  
10 of San Francisco employee under the Department of Public Health and currently at  
11 Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital, are providing 24/7 bedside care for him, and  
12 where Brandon remains in critical condition with multiple bullets still lodged in his face and  
13 back; and

14           WHEREAS, Brandon's experience fits the pattern of harassment, intimidation, and  
15 violence documented by human rights watchdogs Alliance for the Advancement of People's  
16 Rights ("Karapatan") and Amnesty International and credibly alleged to have been committed  
17 by elements of the Philippine military and police against human rights defenders and all  
18 people expressing opposition to government policies under the administration of President  
19 Rodrigo Duterte; and

20           WHEREAS, According to the Cordillera People's Alliance and the Cordillera Human  
21 Rights Alliance, the attack on Brandon was not isolated, but part of simultaneous attacks  
22 carried out the same day on both Brandon and seven of his colleagues in the Ifugao Peasant  
23 Movement by elements of the 54th Infantry Battalion of the Armed Forces of the Philippines;  
24 and  
25

1           WHEREAS, The attack on Brandon and his colleagues is a direct result of Philippine  
2 President Rodrigo Duterte's war against human rights advocates, critics of his administration,  
3 and alleged drug users, that has claimed nearly 30,000 lives since 2016, with few killings  
4 undergoing any investigation and only one resulting in the prosecution of a perpetrator; and

5           WHEREAS, The international NGO Global Witness has declared the Philippines to be  
6 the deadliest country in the world for defenders of human rights, the environment and natural  
7 resources, with 13 environmentalists, 54 indigenous people, and 207 farmers and peasants  
8 extrajudicially killed since Duterte took office in 2016; and

9           WHEREAS, The incidence of violence against environmental and human rights  
10 defenders like Brandon has dramatically increased since President Duterte's invocation of  
11 Executive Order 70 in 2018, which operationalizes the Philippine government's counter-  
12 insurgency program that includes arbitrarily and unilaterally targeting activists as "terrorists or  
13 supporters of terrorists" to silence legitimate and legal dissent, disallowing the existence of  
14 genuine democratic space in Philippine society; and

15           WHEREAS, The stated intent of the policies of President Duterte coupled with the  
16 circumstances of the harassment and intimidation which led up to the shooting of Brandon  
17 support the assertion that this attack on Brandon was an assassination attempt by the  
18 Philippine military or other state agents, the first such assassination attempt on a U.S. citizen  
19 under the Duterte regime; and

20           WHEREAS, Brandon's life continues to be severely threatened as he remains in critical  
21 condition in a hospital in the Philippines, where members of the Philippine police and military  
22 constantly conduct surveillance on him, unidentified and unauthorized people have made  
23 several attempts to enter his hospital room, and the facilities lack adequate technology,  
24 equipment and supplies to provide the critical care he needs in order to survive; and

1           WHEREAS, Brandon's family and Philippines-based doctors have determined that  
2 Brandon should be transported back to San Francisco where he can urgently receive the  
3 medical treatment that he needs in a safe facility where he will not be subject to further threats  
4 to his life; and

5           WHEREAS, On April 23, 2019, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors adopted a  
6 Resolution supporting United States House Resolution No. 233, authored by Congresswoman  
7 Jackie Speier, condemning the Government of the Philippines for its role in state-sanctioned  
8 extrajudicial killings by police, condemning the Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte's drug  
9 war that has taken the lives of over 29,000 Filipinos, and urging San Francisco's Federal  
10 representatives to support a congressional hearing on the consequences of U.S. tax dollars  
11 being used to fund these activities, and advocating for the U.S. to cut aid to the Duterte  
12 regime, on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 190423, which is hereby  
13 declared to be a part of this Resolution as if set forth fully herein; now, therefore, be it

14           RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors hereby condemns the brutal  
15 attempted assassination of Brandon Lee allegedly by elements of Philippine security forces;  
16 and, be it

17           FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors supports the  
18 immediate medical evacuation of Brandon Lee to San Francisco where he can be away from  
19 his assailants and receive quality medical care; and, be it

20           FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges the  
21 Department of Public Health and Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital to support  
22 Brandon Lee's family in bringing him back to San Francisco for the best trauma recovery care;  
23 and, be it

24           FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges our San  
25 Francisco representatives Speaker Nancy Pelosi, U.S. Senator Kamala Harris, U.S. Senator

1 Dianne Feinstein, and Congresswoman Jackie Speier to demand that the U.S. Embassy take  
2 immediate action to evacuate Brandon Lee from the Philippines and ensure his safe  
3 repatriation back to San Francisco and to a hospital that can provide the urgent medical care  
4 that he needs; and, be it

5 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges our San  
6 Francisco representatives Speaker Nancy Pelosi, U.S. Senator Kamala Harris, U.S. Senator  
7 Feinstein, and Congresswoman Jackie Speier to initiate a congressional investigation into the  
8 attempted assassination of Brandon Lee; and, be it

9 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges our San  
10 Francisco representatives Speaker Nancy Pelosi, U.S. Senator Kamala Harris, U.S. Senator  
11 Feinstein, and Congresswoman Jackie Speier to support a congressional hearing on  
12 consequences of U.S. tax dollars going to the Philippine military and police and to champion a  
13 moratorium on U.S. military aid to the Duterte regime; and, be it

14 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors directs the Clerk  
15 of the Board to send a copy of this Resolution to San Francisco representatives Speaker  
16 Nancy Pelosi, U.S. Senator Kamala Harris, U.S. Senator Feinstein, and Congresswoman  
17 Jackie Speier.

1 [Support for House Resolution No. 233 - Condemning Duterte's Drug War - Urging  
2 Congressional Hearing]

3 Resolution supporting United States House Resolution No. 233, authored by  
4 Congresswoman Jackie Speier, condemning the Government of the Philippines for its  
5 role in state-sanctioned extrajudicial killings by police and for its continued detention  
6 of Senator Leila de Lima, condemning the Philippine President Rodrigo Duterte's drug  
7 war that has taken the lives of over 29,000 Filipinos, and urging San Francisco's  
8 Federal representatives to support a congressional hearing on the consequences of  
9 U.S. tax dollars being used to fund these activities, and advocating for the U.S. to cut  
10 aid to the Duterte regime.

11  
12 WHEREAS, San Francisco is home and continues to be the port of entry to a  
13 significant immigrant Filipino community with a population of 36,479 individuals many of whom  
14 continue to support family and maintain close ties with the Philippines; and

15 WHEREAS, There is a long history of solidarity and intersectionality between the  
16 Filipino community and many San Francisco groups and constituencies including labor, faith-  
17 based, and school-based groups, and many San Franciscans are either directly impacted or  
18 deeply concerned about the plight of those in the Philippines who are victims of the  
19 government's drug war and martial law in Mindanao; and

20 WHEREAS, The Trump administration supports the strong-arm rule of Philippine  
21 President Duterte, whose brutal Drug War and other anti-people campaigns have taken the  
22 lives of over 29,000 urban poor, workers, indigenous and environmental activists, human  
23 rights defenders, religious leaders, and peace advocates; and

24 WHEREAS, Philippine government agencies themselves report 4,948 suspected drug  
25 users and dealers including 60 children died during police operations from July 1, 2016, to

1 September 30, 2018, and, according to the Human Rights watch, the Philippine National  
2 Police (PNP) have reported that a total of 22,983 deaths have been classified as "homicides  
3 under investigation," since the "war on drugs" began; and

4 WHEREAS, As of November 2018, the Alliance for Advancement of People's Rights  
5 also known as Karapatan has documented 216 extrajudicial political killings, 378 victims of  
6 frustrated political killings, 100 victims of torture, around 2,000 victims of illegal arrests, over  
7 70,000 victims of threats and harassments, and nearly half a million internal refugees under  
8 the Duterte administration; and

9 WHEREAS, More than 16 mayors and vice mayors have been killed since President  
10 Duterte took office; and Duterte has blatantly spoken in press conferences advocating for the  
11 killing of Catholic bishops during a period when three Catholic priests were assassinated; and

12 WHEREAS, Labor leaders and legislators have also been amongst those attacked by  
13 the administration, with 30 labor leaders killed, 3 labor leaders being held as political  
14 prisoners, and Senator Leila De Lima who has been a staunch critic of the drug war killings  
15 has been detained for over two years; and

16 WHEREAS, Maria Ressa, a U.S.-born Filipina journalist and one of Time magazine's  
17 persons of the year in 2018, has been continually harassed and arrested for her continued  
18 critical reporting on Duterte's drug war and the breakdown of democracy in the Philippines,  
19 and who recently met with Facebook and Twitter regarding the use of their platforms by the  
20 Duterte regime to spread misinformation and harass critics; and

21 WHEREAS, The language for Foreign Military Financing to the Armed Forces  
22 Philippines (AFP) in the House Appropriations Bill of 2019 states that "Extra-judicial killings in  
23 the Philippines, including those committed in the conduct of the anti-drug campaign, erode  
24 confidence in the Government of the Philippines' commitment to human rights, due process,  
25 and the rule of law"; and



1           WHEREAS, The U.S. government allocates money to the AFP and PNP through  
2 Appropriations for the Department of State, and Foreign Operations and Related Programs,  
3 and the current appropriations in the amount of \$184.5 million go to the Philippine military;  
4 and

5           WHEREAS, In 2007, Senator Barbara Boxer sponsored a congressional hearing which  
6 successfully pressured the Gloria Macapagal Arroyo administration to stop the killing of  
7 activists and organizers and laid the basis for successfully restricting U.S. aid to the  
8 Philippines until certain human rights conditions were met; and

9           WHEREAS, The San Francisco Committee for Human Rights in the Philippines  
10 (SFCHRP) along with the Malaya (Free) Movement are supporting the International Coalition  
11 for Human Rights in the Philippines' (ICHRP) pressure campaign for national divestment of  
12 U.S. military aid to the AFP and PNP; and

13           WHEREAS, Congresswoman Jackie Speier has sponsored House Resolution No. 233  
14 condemning the Government of the Philippines for its role in state-sanctioned extrajudicial  
15 killings by police and other armed individuals as part of the "War on Drugs" and for its  
16 continued detention of Senator Leila de Lima on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors  
17 in File No. 190423, and the Senate Resolution No. 142 sponsored by Senator Edward Markey  
18 also urges the Government of the Philippines to guarantee the right to the freedom of the  
19 press and to drop all the charges against Maria Ressa and Rappler on file with the Clerk of  
20 the Board of Supervisors in File No. 190423; and

21           WHEREAS, On April 6th-8th San Francisco faith and community leaders participated in  
22 the Malaya Summit for Human Rights in the Philippines held in Washington D.C. and was part  
23 of the effort to meet with over 100 congressional offices on this campaign; and  
24  
25

1       WHEREAS, On April 8, 2019, the San Francisco Labor Council unanimously adopted a  
2 Resolution to support this campaign on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File  
3 No. 190423; therefore, be it

4       RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors condemns President Duterte's drug war  
5 that has taken thousands of lives without due process; and, be it

6       FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors also adds their  
7 support to the SFCHRP- Malaya Movement campaign and in doing so calls on the United  
8 States Department of Defense to divest from the Duterte administration and the Philippine  
9 military and police; and, be it

10       FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors supports Congresswoman  
11 Jackie Speier's House Resolution No. 233 and Senate Resolution No. 142 sponsored by  
12 Senator Edward Markey; and, be it

13       FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Board of Supervisors urges our San  
14 Francisco representatives Speaker Nancy Pelosi, U.S. Senator Kamala Harris, U.S. Senator  
15 Feinstein, and Congress member Jackie Speier to support a congressional hearing on the  
16 consequences of U.S. tax dollars going to the Philippine military and police and to champion  
17 cutting U.S. military aid to the Duterte regime; and, be it

18       FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors direct the clerk of the Board to  
19 send a copy of this Resolution to the offices of San Francisco representatives Speaker Nancy  
20 Pelosi, U.S. Senator Kamala Harris, U.S. Senator Diane Feinstein, and Congresswoman  
21 Jackie Speier.

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE PHILIPPINES

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 70

**INSTITUTIONALIZING THE WHOLE-OF-NATION APPROACH IN  
ATTAINING INCLUSIVE AND SUSTAINABLE PEACE, CREATING  
A NATIONAL TASK FORCE TO END LOCAL COMMUNIST  
ARMED CONFLICT, AND DIRECTING THE ADOPTION OF A  
NATIONAL PEACE FRAMEWORK**

**WHEREAS**, Article II of the 1987 Constitution provides for the following State principles and policies:

- i. The Philippines renounces war as an instrument of national policy;
- ii. The maintenance of peace and order, the protection of life, liberty, and property, and the promotion of the general welfare are essential for the enjoyment by all the people of the blessings of democracy; and
- iii. The State shall promote a just and dynamic social order that will ensure the prosperity and independence of the nation and free the people from poverty through policies that provide adequate social services, promote full employment, a rising standard of living, and an improved quality of life for all;

**WHEREAS**, Executive Order No. 16 (s. 2017) adopted the National Security Policy 2017-2022, which calls for the end of all armed threats in the Philippines and recognizes that internal socio-political stability rests upon healing the rifts that divide the nation by promoting participatory governance, synergy of government development efforts, and enhancing the participation and responsibilities of local government units (LGUs);

**WHEREAS**, one of the objectives of the Philippine Development Plan 2017-2022 is to attain inclusive and sustainable peace through intensified development and other peace-building initiatives in conflict-affected and -vulnerable communities;

**WHEREAS**, the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN), through the Joint Communiqué of the 50<sup>th</sup> ASEAN Foreign Ministers meeting in Manila last 05 August 2017, reaffirmed the importance and effectiveness of the Whole-of-Nation approach as opposed to a purely military option in combating terrorism and violent extremism;

**WHEREAS**, there is a need to reframe and refocus the government policy for achieving inclusive and sustainable peace by recognizing that insurgencies, internal

disturbances and tensions, and other armed conflicts and threats are not only military and security concerns, but are symptomatic of broader social, economic and historical problems, such as poverty, historical injustice, social inequality, and lack of inclusivity, among others;

**WHEREAS**, the Whole-of-Nation approach addresses the root causes of insurgencies, internal disturbances and tensions, and other armed conflicts and threats by prioritizing and harmonizing the delivery of basic services and social development packages by the government, facilitating societal inclusivity, and ensuring active participation of all sectors of the society in the pursuit of the country's peace agenda;

**WHEREAS**, there is a need to create a national task force that will provide an efficient mechanism and structure for the implementation of the Whole-of-Nation approach to aid in the realization of the collective aspiration of the Filipino people to attain inclusive and sustainable peace;

**WHEREAS**, to ensure comprehensive orchestration of related peace efforts and initiatives of national government agencies, local government units and various sectors of civil society, there is a need to formulate a National Peace Framework anchored on the Whole-of-Nation approach, which shall include, among others, a mechanism for local peace engagements or negotiations and interventions that is consistent with constitutional integrity and national sovereignty, responsive to local needs, and sensitive to realities on the ground; and

**WHEREAS**, Section 17, Article VII of the 1987 Constitution vests in the President the power of control over all executive departments, bureaus and offices, as well as the mandate to ensure the faithful execution of laws;

**NOW, THEREFORE, I, RODRIGO ROA DUTERTE**, President of the Philippines, by virtue of the powers vested in me by the Constitution and existing laws, do hereby order:

**Section 1. Institutionalizing the Whole-of-Nation Approach.** The Whole-of-Nation approach is hereby institutionalized as a government policy for the attainment of inclusive and sustainable peace. Towards this end, the Government shall prioritize and harmonize the delivery of basic services and social development packages in conflict-affected areas and -vulnerable communities, facilitate societal inclusivity, and ensure active participation of all sectors of society in the pursuit of the country's peace agenda.

**Section 2. Creation of the National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict.** To ensure efficient and effective implementation of the Whole-of-Nation approach, a National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (Task Force) is hereby created under the Office of the President (OP).

**Section 3. Composition.** The Task Force shall be composed of the President of the Republic of the Philippines, as Chair; the National Security Adviser, as Vice-Chair; and the following as members:

- a. Secretary, Department of the Interior and Local Government;
- b. Secretary, Department of Justice;

- c. Secretary, Department of National Defense;
- d. Secretary, Department of Public Works and Highways;
- e. Secretary, Department of Budget and Management;
- f. Secretary, Department of Finance;
- g. Secretary, Department of Agrarian Reform;
- h. Secretary, Department of Social Welfare and Development;
- i. Secretary, Department of Education;
- j. Director General, National Economic and Development Authority;
- k. Director General, National Intelligence Coordinating Agency;
- l. Director General, Technical Education and Skills Development Authority;
- m. Presidential Adviser on the Peace Process;
- n. Presidential Adviser for Indigenous Peoples' Concerns;
- o. Chief of Staff, Armed Forces of the Philippines;
- p. Director General, Philippine National Police;
- q. Chairperson, National Commission on Indigenous Peoples;
- r. Secretary, Presidential Communications Operations Office; and
- s. Two (2) Representatives from the private sector.

Except for the private sector representatives, the members may designate an alternate, with a rank not lower than an Assistant Secretary, to represent their respective offices in the Task Force, provided that the alternate must be fully authorized to decide on behalf of the member. The names of the alternates shall be submitted to the National Secretariat.

The Private Sector Representatives, with a term of one (1) year each, shall be appointed by the President upon the recommendation of the Task Force.

**Section 4. Powers and Functions.** The Task Force shall have the following powers and functions:

- a. Within six (6) months from the issuance of this Order, formulate and start to implement in coordination with relevant national government agencies, LGUs, the civil society and other stakeholders, a Whole-of-Nation approach-driven National Peace Framework (Framework);
- b. Ensure inter-agency convergence in the implementation of the Framework in conflict-affected and -vulnerable communities;
- c. Enlist the assistance of any department, bureau, office, agency, or instrumentality of the government, including LGUs, government-owned or -controlled corporations (GOCCs), and state universities and colleges (SUCs), in accordance with their respective mandates, in the implementation of the Framework;
- d. Evaluate, define, modify or integrate policies, programs and activities contained in the Framework;

- e. Organize *ad hoc* inter-agency and multi-sectoral clusters, councils, committees and groups in national, regional and local levels, or modify existing ones, whenever necessary, to fulfill its mandates;
- f. Develop strategic communication, advocacy, and peace constituency plans in case of ceasefire, as well as capacity-building measures, to enable local chief executives and local peace bodies to engage and facilitate local peace engagements or negotiations and interventions;
- g. Review the mandates and functions of offices undertaking peace efforts to avoid duplication of functions and programs, and submit its recommendation/s to the President for approval;
- h. As may be necessary, issue supplemental guidelines, protocols or policies in furtherance of this Order;
- i. Recommend to the Office of the Presidential Adviser on the Peace Process projects and conflict-affected areas where the PAYapa at MASaganang PamayaNAn Program may be implemented, subject to the provisions of the General Appropriations Act; and
- j. Perform such other duties and functions as the President may direct.

**Section 5. The National Peace Framework.** The Framework shall contain principles, policies, plans and programs that will bring inclusive and sustainable peace, and address the root causes of insurgencies, internal disturbances and tensions as well as other armed conflicts and threats in identified areas. The Framework shall be responsive to local needs and sensitive to realities on the ground. To this end, the Framework shall include a mechanism for localized peace engagements or negotiations and interventions that is nationally orchestrated, directed and supervised, while being locally implemented.

**Section 6. Convergence.** All departments, bureaus, offices, agencies or instrumentalities of the government, including GOCCs and SUCs, are hereby directed to render the necessary support to the Task Force.

The private sector, non-government organizations and other stakeholders are encouraged to participate in all peace-building programs, plans and activities, in the implementation of the Framework.

**Section 7. National Secretariat.** The Task Force shall be assisted by a National Secretariat, headed by an Executive Director, who shall be appointed by the President with the rank of an Undersecretary. The Executive Director shall submit an organizational and staffing pattern of the Task Force National Secretariat to the DBM, within two (2) months from his/her appointment. Pending the approval of the organizational and staffing pattern, the Executive Director shall be assisted by personnel from the member-agencies of the Task Force under secondment, detail or other appropriate arrangement.

**Section 8. Functions of the National Secretariat.** The National Secretariat shall have the following functions:

- a. Provide technical and effective administrative support and assistance to the Task Force in the performance of its tasks, coordinate with relevant agencies

- on the status of its plans and programs, and provide updates to the Task Force on the implementation of the Framework;
- b. Ensure that all policies, directives, plans and programs formulated by the Task Force are faithfully carried out; and
- c. Perform such other functions as may be directed by the Task Force.

**Section 9. Funding.** The initial funding requirements for the implementation of this Order shall be charged against existing appropriations of member-agencies of the Task Force and such other appropriate funding sources as the DBM may identify, and when necessary, the Contingent Fund, subject to relevant laws, rules and regulations.

The succeeding year's appropriations for the operation of the National Secretariat shall be included in the budget proposal of the OP. The funding requirement for the implementation of the programs, plans and activities in the Framework shall be included in the respective annual budgets of the concerned agencies, subject to the usual budget preparation process.

**Section 10. Sunset Clause.** The Task Force shall be rendered *functus officio* upon the accomplishment of the purposes for which it was created or unless sooner dissolved by the President.

**Section 11. Separability.** In the event that any provision of this Order or any part hereof is declared invalid, illegal or unconstitutional, the provisions not thereby affected shall remain in force and effect.

**Section 12. Repeal.** All orders, rules and regulations, and other issuances or parts thereof that are inconsistent with the provisions of this Order, are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

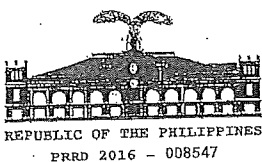
**Section 13. Effectivity.** This Order shall take effect upon its publication in the Official Gazette or a newspaper of general circulation.
