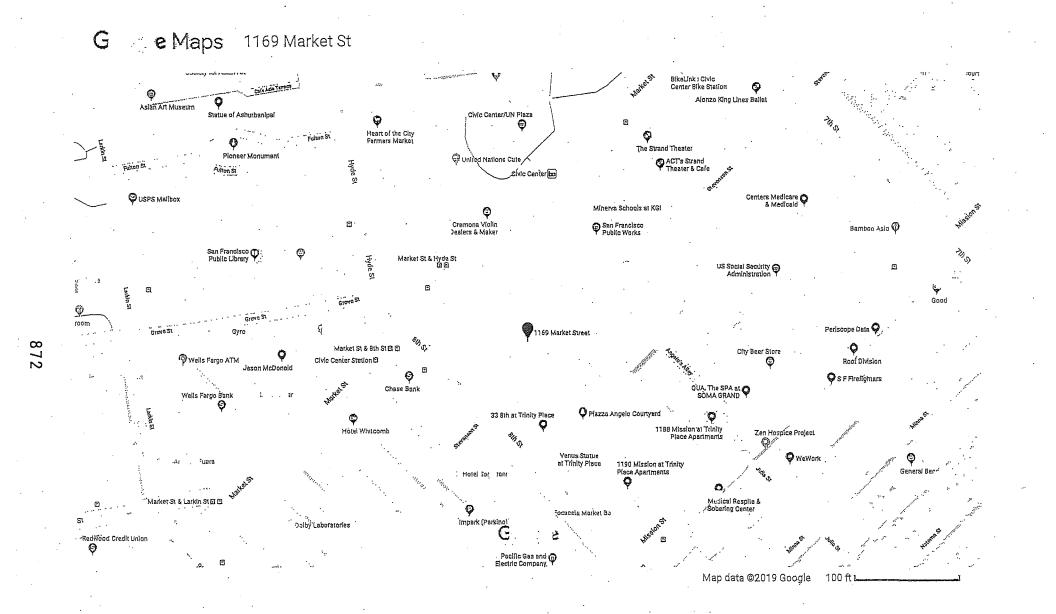

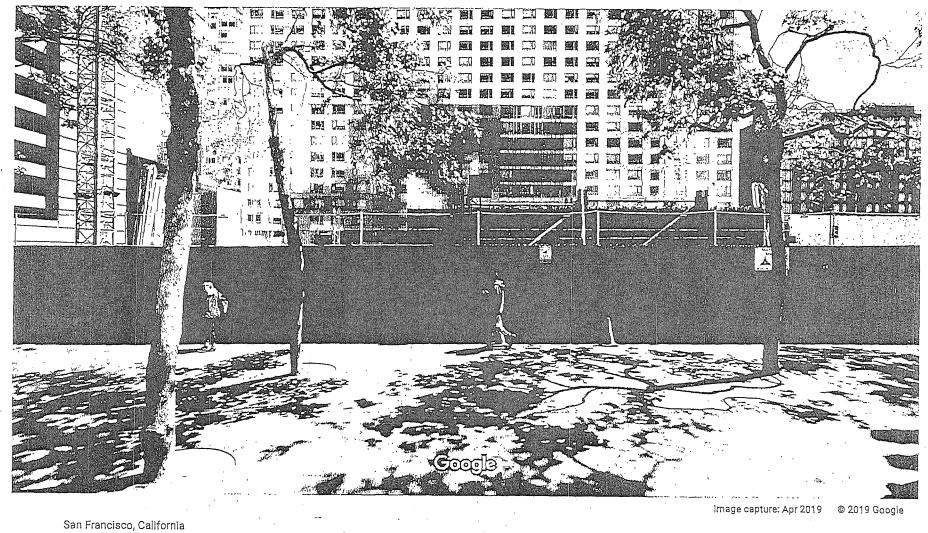

Employees of the establishment shall walk a 100 feet radius from the premises sometime between 30 minutes after closing time and 8AM the following morning and shall pick up and dispose of any discarded beverage containers and other trash left by patrons.

The establishment shall provide outside lighting in a manner sufficient to illuminate street and adjacent sidewalk areas and parking as appropriate to maintain security.

No alcoholic beverages shall be consumed on any outdoor property adjacent to the establishment.

No person under the age of 21 shall sell or package alcoholic beverages.

Employees of the establishment shall regularly police the area under the control of the establishment in an effort prevent the loitering of persons about the premises.

The establishment shall promptly remove any graffiti from the exterior of the premises.

Proper signage at all exists informing patrons of the San Francisco Park Code for UN Plaza, Civic Center Plaza and Civic Center Commons and other nearby open spaces.

Sales of Alcohol only permitted between the hours of 8AM to 10PM 7 days a week.

No fortified wines can be sold.

No malt liquor bottles or cans.

No airplane bottles of hard liquor can be sold.

Sell single containers of alcoholic beverage in clear plastic carry-out bags.

Beer & Wine must be sold in manufactured pre-packed multi-unit quantities only.

There needs to be a limited amount of square footage under 15 percent for alcohol sales.

All bottles off alcohol must have anti-theft caps placed on each bottle because Mid-Market has a reputation of theft. So anti-theft prevention measures needs to be established including security at all enterences, parking garage and patrolling the areas were alcohol is sold.

14) Further: We protest this license and we request the interdepartmental staff committee on traffic and transportation (ISCOTT), along with the departments of parking and traffic, public works, police, fire, municipal railway, BART, building inspection, and planning look into this applied for license before it is heard.

15) The applicant has misrepresented a material fact in obtaining a license, the community was not aware of Whole Foods plans to create a Superstore with a food court at this location their ABC request for Type 21, 41, and 86. One of the questions that was asked: "How many entities will be located at 1169 Market Street was not mentioned on the license application?" If so, proper notice has not occurred. (If multiple businesses are to be located in their food court this needs to be addressed because each business needs to tell the community about their possible need for alcohol).

16) The applicant had not held any outreach meetings with the neighborhood or local stakeholders to determine whether the applicant would be suitable to manage a business that is necessary and desirable in and compatible with the surrounding neighborhood at the time of Whole Food applying for a type 21, 41, 86 licenses.

17) There is much concern of a superstore opening and taking business away from the existing small family owned merchants who give much more to the community economically then a large grocery chain store that already has over 470 stores worldwide most are in the USA. Therefore all their profits are sent to their shareholders and not reinvested into the local community.

18) The current location is a hole in the ground so the community has no knowledge of what going on. (see attachment photo).

19) This location could possible have elevators to access the underground parking and the residential units above where added security needs to be.

20) There needs be discounts offered to Seniors and near Low-Income residents because this will be the nearest full service supermarket for the Tenderloin, Mid-Market, and South of Market residents.

21) The central city neighborhood will have the first healthy choices access 7 days a week when this store opens. Currently there is a Farmer's Market that is only open twice a week and does offer a complete variety. But the Farmer's Market co-op members do contribute their food to nearby non-profits to disburse. So we hope Whole Food's can become a good neighbor and give back to the community also.

Conditions to apply:

Issuance of the license to premises would add an undue concentration of licenses; licensing the premises aggravates an already existing police problems in a high-crime area; and the premises is within 500 feet of open space.

I do not know what the security plan for the new super store and food hall is nor do I know which exists and future enterences will be used by the public.

Because of the above concerns the following conditions must be applied.

congregate with their parents. The Main Library and Civic Center Plaza offers activities especially for young children and both locations draw large crowds of people. Adding off-sale liquor promotes an unhealthy environment.

8) This area is saturated with alcoholic beverage licenses. In the past Bristle Farms and nearby CVS stores never received alcohol licenses as the community has real concerns with type 21 licenses being established along Mid-Market Street locations both withdrew their liquor license applications. San Francisco has the highest density of off-sale liquor outlets in the state of California with over 800. The existence of this inordinate number of liquor establishments contributes directly to numerous peace, health, safety, and general welfare problems in the area, including loitering, littering, drug trafficking, prostitution, public drunkenness, defacement and damaging of structures, pedestrian obstruction, as well as traffic circulation, parking and noise problems on public streets and neighborhood lots. The criminal and anti-social activity associated with many of the establishments selling alcoholic beverages creates serious impacts on the public health, safety and welfare, including fear for the safety of children, elderly residents and visitors to the area, deterioration of the neighborhood, concomitant devaluation of property and destruction of community values and quality of life. Such adverse impacts also discourage more desirable and needed commercial uses in the area. As a citizens we have the right to live and work in a peaceful environment free from illegal or harmful activities.

9) The Federal Building on 7th Street, Civic Center BART and MUNI stations are additional open spaces at several of their current and past entrances where adding off-sale liquor nearby promotes an unhealthy environment.

10) Clearly, the applicant have failed to provide facts and findings showing that the proposed offsale license is necessary, desirable, and compatible with the surrounding neighborhood.

11) The applicant only lists Whole Foods Market California, it does not list the true onsite managers or operators of this business.

12) This is a high crime area that has a 20% or more. The Police Station that patrols 1169 Market Street is the Tenderloin Police Station. The Station is already short staffed and the residents require many calls for service including emergency calls adding another business that will require more police resources away from venerable residents who rely on these scarce services does not promote parity. When the community members asked Whole Foods Market to disclose their security plan they refuse.

13) The North of Market Residential Special Use District was created to stop additional off-sale liquor licenses in the Tenderloin in 1998 98.074E: North of Market Alcohol Beverage Moratorium was adopted. The community is concerned that Walgreen Co will saturate our community with new off-sale liquor licenses at is existing stores that surround the Tenderloin located at: 459 Powell Street, 500 Geary Street, 790 Van Ness Street, 1496 Market Street, 1301 Market Street, and 825 Market Street and other large retailers like Trader Joes, and CVS requesting future offsale liquor licenses undermining our established small businesses. Also the community has been involved with addressing the problems associated with chronic public inebriation threaten the welfare and livability of the Tenderloin community. And in 2006 a local law was passed called the Deemed Approved Users Ordinance designed to reduce alcohol related problems in San Francisco and promote the health, safety, and welfare of San Francisco residents. 1169 Market Whole Foods application for a Type 21, 41, and 86 license from ABC.

1) The premises are located within the immediate vicinity of school(s) which are the Art University which houses student as young as 18 years old and has numerous educational facilities nearby. Also the UC Hastings School of Law, Asian Inc., Alonzo King Lines Dance Center and San Francisco Flex Academy for grades 9-12 also maintains a nearby campus which enrolls fulltime students five days a week. Any off-sale liquor establishment that could stay open up to 2AM should not be located near University campus with housing for students as young as 18 years old. Other points of interest include Yerba Buena Lodge No. 15 – Odd Fellows, The Main Library, The Asian Art Museum and along with plazas, playgrounds, and open spaces.

2) The premises are located in a residential area and the normal operation of the licensed premises will interfere with the quiet enjoyment of their property by residents of the area. This is the most densely populated area in the city with RC-4 zoning, student housing, residential hotels and tourist hotels. The 8th & Market Street area has several late night entertainment establishments this license will interfere with their venues. This business will have problems controlling the large crowds they attract, the noise they create, the people on the sidewalk smoking, panhandlers, loiters, people yelling for cabs. People engaging in loud and drunken behavior inside a high density residential commercial area.

3) Licensing the premises would create a public nuisance with a the purposed super-store and possible multi-level site with multiple entrances. People entering and exiting the premises, smoking on the sidewalk, talking on their cell phones and loitering, increase panhandlers, drinking and drug use will be hard to control. Tons of empty alcohol containers, discarded cigarettes, litter, urination and defecation are picked up and cleaning is done at the expense of local San Francisco residents, property owners, merchants and taxpayers.

4) The parking and stopping restrictions on the around 8th and Market Street. Currently there is extremely limited on-street and off-street parking in this neighborhood and the issuance of the said permits would compound an already aggravated parking shortage for residents, merchants and nearby hotel visitors. Market Street has one lane of traffic with a bike lane in either direction so double parking is not allowed. If someone double parks it would stop the flow of traffic and not allow the traffic and street cars to run up or down Market Street. And makes it impossible for emergency responders to use Market or 8th Streets.

5) There are residential units at Trinity Plaza and other nearby locations and the applicant has not demonstrated that they will contain the noise and other nuisance issues so not to interfere with the neighbors' quiet enjoyment of property.

6) The following parking facilities are located near applicant has failed to establish that the operation of the licensed premises would not interfere with the quiet enjoyment of their property. Civic Center Parking Garage, University of California Hastings College Parking Garage, 1468 Market Parking Garage, 1446 Market Perking Garage, Hotel Whitcomb Parking Lot, Impact Parking Lot, 799 Stevenson Street Parking, St. Anthony's Foundation Parking Lot, 8th and Mission Parking Lot, many parking lots on Minna Street, Liberty Park Management, ABC Parking.

7) Civic Center Plaza, United Nations Plaza, Civic Center Commons, Helen Diller Playgrounds, Ninth Street Courthouse, Federal Building, Angelo's Alley and other open spaces where children Dear Planning Commissioners:

around the corner from its current one, at 98 Post Street. It will be slightly smaller than the first one, and it's opening this winter, the company says. Meanwhile, in Chicago, Amazon is opening its third Go store at the Illinois Center in 2019. That will bring is total number of stores up to eight, with at least one location planned for New York City some time in the next year. Ultimately, Amazon hopes as cashier-less model proves convenient enough, and its food and product selection appealing enough, to draw people away from the tried-and-true chains we've become accustomed to. The company is not necessarily trying to replace the 7-Elevens and Walgreens of the world, at least not yet. And a Go store is a far cry from a fast casual restaurant or a traditional restaurant with counter service. Rather, right now it seems like Go stores are an avenue for Amazon to establish a stronger foothold in offline retail, just like its <u>physical bookstores in Seattle and New York City</u> and <u>its</u> acquired Whole Foods locations give it a strategic footprint in groceries and paper books.

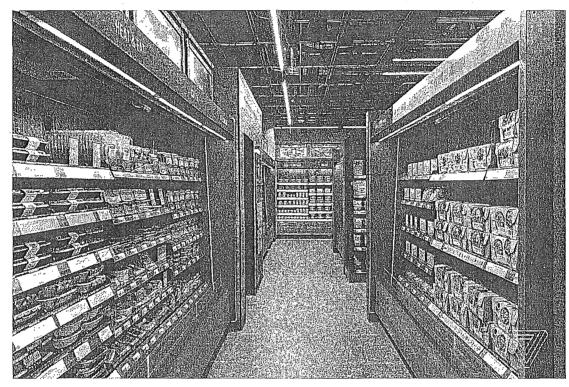

Of course, down the line, Amazon could use its Go model as a way to aggressively expand its brick-and-mortar operation if the stores prove especially successful and capable of handling high volumes of shoppers. *Bloomberg* reported in September that the company plans to open thousands of locations over the next three years in what would be a remarkable escalation of Amazon's offline retail rivalry with Walmart, grocery chains, and even the traditional restaurant and fast food industries.

We're not quite there yet. But Amazon is starting to move faster, and in the process its transforming from an e-commerce giant to a true, do-everything retail operation. The company has already planned its second San Francisco location at a site basically

The store's motto is "Good Food Fast," and the app even tracks how long you spent during each visit as a kind of brag about the efficiency of the cashier-less model. Dilip Kumar, Amazon's vice president of technology for Amazon Go, told me that the core focus of the Go model is to save people time. "How crowded [the store] is becomes no longer a function of how long it's going to take," Kumar told me. With Go stores, the company wants to eliminate the concept of a morning or lunch rush, as well as the notion that you have to restrict what you buy and where you eat based on how much time you have to wait in line, place an order, and wait for it to be prepared. The store's hours are 7AM to 9PM local time, and it will be open Monday through Friday.

It's clear from the layout of the store and its upscale presentation that, at least in San Francisco, Amazon is aggressively targeting delis, cafes, casual lunch spots, and drug stores with its Go model. Stocked at the California Street location is pretty much everything you'd find at a 7-Eleven, with a small and seemingly hand-picked selection of goods you might more readily find at, say, a Walgreens. For instance, you can head to the Go store to purchase a can of Pringles, or maybe some chapstick, and choose from a pretty basic selection of cold medicine. You can also buy bread, milk, and cheese.

But the focus is more on the fresh food. The quality and selection of the ready-to-eat food is designed to be wide-ranging and competitive with the lunch selection in a downtown urban center. Amazon has a staff of workers and a full offsite kitchen, and each day it makes fresh items that you might be willing to pay made-to-order prices for. That includes sushi, breakfast burritos, salads, and an assortment of sandwiches, among other snacks, candy, and desserts.

The company has stocked the store with more expensive <u>ready-to-cook kits from its Blue</u> <u>Apron-style meal service</u>, which were restricted to online ordering until the launch of the first Go store in late 2016. Amazon has also partnered with local third-party restaurants, including bakery La Boulangerie and South Indian restaurant chain Dosa, to flesh out its inventory with pastries, yogurts, hummus, and other options. It even partnered with a local chocolate maker to make a San Francisco-centric brand of Amazon Go chocolate.

offline retail expansion. The store, located at the corners of California and Battery in the city's financial district, is modeled much like the five existing locations. It largely serves prepared food, snacks, and drinks, with a focus on Amazon's own line of sandwiches, salads, and meal kits. But the big innovation is its complete removal of the checkout process.

Instead of standing in line and paying a cashier, cameras and sensors track your movements through the store after you've scanned your Amazon account at the front. The system, which also uses computer vision and other artificial intelligence-assisted techniques, monitors when you take items off shelves. When you go to leave, you simply walk out, and you're then charged for what you've taken and given a digital receipt through Amazon's standalone Go app. I took a tour of the 2,300-square-foot location late last week, when its windows were covered and its existence largely a secret until the *San Francisco Chronicle* revealed the address on Thursday using property records.

The interior is that of a very nice convenience store, with some seating and microwaves up front for warming up frozen pre-made food and eating in if you so choose. As for checkout, everything worked as advertised. I used the Amazon Go app to walk through a set of automated doors near the front, and from there I picked up an Amazon-made chicken bánh mì sandwich and walked right back out without any hassle.

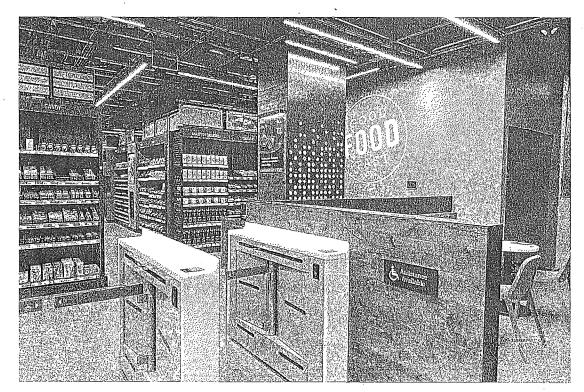

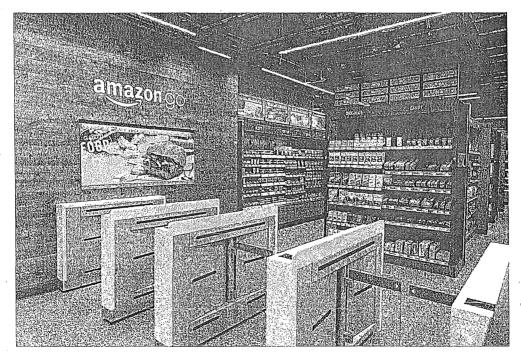

Amazon's latest experimental Go convenience store is opening today in San Francisco, adding the Bay Area city as the third after Chicago and Seattle in the company's ongoing 883

PERSON

The HRSF program operates in several food-insecure neighborhoods, with a focus on the city's 45 square block Tenderloin neighborhood, 32% of whose 28 000 residents live in poverty,<u>2</u> The Tenderloin has no supermarket, but does have 57 corner stores, approximately 80% of which are run by immigrant families. <u>1</u> Founded in 2012, the Coalition played a key role in helping craft and pass the ordinance creating HRSF in 2013 and in implementing the program beginning in 2014. A pilot corner store was redesigned in the Tenderloin in 2014, followed by nine more from 2015 to 2018, five in the Tenderloin.

PURPOSE

HRSF seeks to improve healthy food access while decreasing availability and advertising of tobacco and other unhealthy products in food-insecure neighborhoods. In addition, it aims to increase the financial viability of local corner stores that become healthy retailers, and to help transform food-insecure neighborhoods through community engagement and development.

IMPLEMENTATION

Cross-sector partnerships and community engagement, led by local collaboratives like the Coalition, are key to HRSF's implementation (Figure 1). HRSF is housed in City Hall's Office of Economic and Workforce Development, and partners with the Small Business Development Center and an architectural firm, Sutti Associates. The Coalition and DPH, in partnership with participating stores and Sutti architects, install equipment and signage (see before-and -after pictures in Figure 2).

Finally, the Coalition plays a critical role that city entities cannot: advocating for policies to promote healthy food access and affordable housing.

EVALUATION

Monthly POS data on sales in HRSF stores of produce, tobacco, alcohol, and three other product categories are collected at or before each store's healthy retailer launch and monthly thereafter. Analyses of sales data on product categories beyond tobacco and produce are not yet available. However the first four Tenderloin HRSF stores with full data from baseline through the first 12 months of follow-up showed a 35% increase in produce units sold.2Tobacco units sold decreased by an average of 35% in three of these stores, with the fourth seeing no change in the percentage of sales from tobacco but an increase in absolute units sold.

Also encouraging was the FJLs' observational store assessments conducted in the majority of Tenderloin corner stores in 2013 to 2015 and 2017. Although the number of corner stores declined from 71 in 2013 to 57 in 2017, the assessment participation rate remained at 67% or greater, reaching a high of 91% in 2017.2 Each store's rating of one to four stars, based on aggregate scores of availability and promotion of healthy and unhealthy products, revealed a dramatic increase in the number of stores achieving three to four stars (best).2 The percentage of stores with only one to two stars decreased from 77% to 49% from 2013 to 2017. FJLs disseminate these results through shopping guides containing store ratings, highlights and pictures.2 The dramatic improvement in the Tenderloin stores' assessment ratings coupled with data from merchant interviews,1 suggested support for a "ripple effect," through which stores not participating in HRSF also moved toward a healthier retail mode

ABSTRACT

In low-income neighborhoods without supermarkets, lack of healthy food access often is exacerbated by the saturation of small corner stores with tobacco and unhealthy foods and beverages. We describe a municipal healthy retail program in San Francisco, California, focusing on the role of a local coalition in program implementation and outcomes in the city's low income Tenderloin neighborhood. By incentivizing selected corner stores to become healthy retailers, and through community engagement and cross-sector partnerships, the program is seeing promising outcomes, including a "ripple effect" of improvement across nonparticipating neighborhood stores.

We describe a municipal healthy retail program in San Francisco, California, focusing on the role of a local coalition in program implementation and outcomes in the city's low income Tenderloin neighborhood.

INTERVENTION

Through San Francisco's Healthy Retail SF (HRSF) program, selected corner stores in food insecure neighborhoods are provided store redesigns and incentives if they increase selling space for fresh produce to at least 35%, limit space for tobacco and alcohol combined to 20% or less, and meet other requirements (<u>www.Healthyretailsf.org</u>). The incentives, worth approximately \$24 000 per store, promote stores' financial viability and offset start-up costs of selling produce and potential loses in tobacco and alcohol sales. Store incentives are part of the "three-legged stool" model undergirding HRSF (<u>Figure 1</u>). The "Redesign & Physical Environment" leg includes incentives like store redesign, façade improvements, free or discounted appliances, and art to replace tobacco, alcohol, and soda ads.

The "Business Operations" leg, guided by the Office of Economic and Workforce Development, includes technical assistance in areas such as developing a business model, sourcing healthy products, implementing point-of-sale (POS) systems, and partnering with demand-side projects (e.g., healthy food vouchers; <u>www.EatSF.org</u>).1 The "Community Engagement" leg, led in the Tenderloin by the Tenderloin Healthy Corner Store Coalition (the Coalition) with assistance from the San Francisco Department of Public Health (DPH) includes benefits like marketing research, promotional events, and assistance with store redesigns.

Participating corner stores in the Tenderloin were selected following a formal application process. Factors such as store location, size, and level of commitment were key considerations in the selection process, which was led by the Coalition with input from customers and residents living near prospective HRSF stores.

PLACE AND TIME

Many Tenderloin residents and corner stores are directly or indirectly affected by HRSF, though healthier food access and improved store profits. But interested residents also play a key role in the program through the Coalition, which is comprised of residents, community organizations, DPH, and university partners. Operated under the nonprofit Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corporation, the Coalition employs eight food justice leaders (FJLs)—local residents who are paid a living wage and trained in research, organizing, and advocacy. FJLs conduct outreach and education and collect both store-level observational data (through a modified "Retail Standards for Health and Sustainability" tool),<u>3</u> and individual-level data through surveys with hundreds of residents regarding their shopping-related concerns, preferences, and practices.

Dear Board of Supervisors,

On behalf of Whole Foods Market California Inc. ("Whole Foods"), I am respectfully requesting that the San Francisco Board of Supervisors issue a Public Convenience or Necessity Determination, otherwise referred to by the City as "Caldera findings," for the sale of a full line of alcoholic beverages for off-site consumption (Type-21 ABC License) and an instructional tasting license (Type-86 ABC License).

Just recently in December 2018, Whole Foods obtained a Conditional Use Authorization for Formula Refail (Case Number: 2018-012420CUA) permitting us to open a full-service grocery store and restaurant with Types 21, 41 or 47, and 86 ABC Licenses. This CUA was passed by a unanimous vote by the Planning Commission. Because of the crime statistics in our police reporting district and the number of off-sale licenses in our census tract, we have been advised that a finding of public convenience or necessity is required per Business and Professions Code §23958.4, and therefore we are seeking such a determination from the Board of Supervisors.

The ABC application for license types 21, 41, and 86 was filed on May 8, 2019 at the San Francisco ABC district office. The Public Noticing sign was posted at the proposed project site beginning on May 13, 2019 and remaining up until June 18, 2019, which is longer than the 30 days required by law. Additionally, the required mailers were sent on May 15, 2019.

The Type-21 license for the Trinity site will be transferred from Whole Food's location at 1150 Ocean Avenue. The Type-41 and Type-86 licenses will be new issuances. Once construction is closer to being complete, Whole Foods may also apply to transfer to this location a Type-47 license, or may attempt to obtain a new issuance of a Type-47 for this location.

With respect to this project, we have made great community outreach efforts as reflected in the numerous lefters of support submitted with this letter. Additionally, prior to filing this PCN application, we have had several conversations with Supervisor Matt Haney and his staff, and neither he nor his staff have expressed any concerns with the project or application. On behalf of

Whole Foods, we respectfully request that the Board of Supervisors determine that issuance of these licenses will serve public convenience or necessity.

Project Description

The Whole Foods Market will be located inside the Trinity Plaza located at 1169 Market Street on the corner of Market Street and 8th Street (the "Subject Property"). The Project is within the larger Trinity Plaza and includes a subterranean full-service grocery store and a restaurant on the street level with 275 seats. The Whole Foods Market staff will consist of approximately 30-45 employees per shift. Whole Foods Market will provide a high-end, full-service specialty grocery store which will benefit both the residents of the 1,900-unit apartment complex and the surrounding community by providing goods and services that are advantageous to the neighborhood. The overall product offering, which includes alcohol sales for on and off-site consumption (Type 41 or 47, Type 86, Type 21) in conjunction with the grocery store and the ancillary restaurant, will provide a range of goods and services to the local community. The addition of a Whole Foods Market will provide convenience to the surrounding community by offering a unique and necessary "one-stop" shopping experience in which nearby residents, neighbors and tourists can purchase grocery items, medicine, household products, beverages (both non-alcoholic and alcoholic), and/or other necessary retail items.

The proposed Whole Foods Market is a desirable addition to The Trinity Plaza project and will enhance the built environment in the surrounding neighborhood by utilizing an attractive, unique building design. Moreover, the design of the Whole Foods Market within the larger Trinity Plaza will create a clean and welcoming atmosphere for all to enjoy. The retail grocery store and restaurant will operate extended hours to meet the needs of the community and ensure that local customers have convenient access to their neighborhood grocery store as needed, and such hours are expected to be between 6 a.m. and 12 a.m. (midnight), daily, but are subject to change.

Furthermore, the addition of a Whole Foods Market will provide an economically viable return for the City. The operation of a specialty grocery store in this area will bring a wide range of employment positions, from entry level to managerial, which fulfills all three stated goals from the City of San Francisco's Economic Strategy plan from both the 2007 Report and the updated 2014 Report. Whole Foods expects to employ up to 200 people to staff the numerous departments and provide customer service to patrons. This will add viable employment opportunities to the community and work with the City to realize its stated economic goals for the future. However, in order for this Whole Foods to be an economically viable project that satisfies the grocery needs of the community, it will need to be able to sell a small amount of alcohol for off-site consumption.

Neighborhood Outreach

Prior to seeking the CUA and ABC license, Whole Foods conducted a substantial amount of community outreach and has obtained the support of the community for the store and restaurant. Specifically, Whole Foods reached out to local businesses, residents, and community organizations, and has attached the summary of our outreach efforts that was submitted in conjunction with the CUA application. Whole Foods has continued those outreach efforts and is now providing an additional 28 letters of support for a total of 146 signatures and 33 letters of

support submitted with this PCN application including letters from United Playaz, La Cocina, Asian, Inc., 4505 Meats, Humphry Slocombe, and West Bay Pilipino Multi Service Center.

We have also met with Supervisor Matt Haney and his staff, and neither Supervisor Haney nor his staff have expressed any concerns with the project or application.

Through our outreach efforts, we have found that many in the community look forward to our arrival in the neighborhood because Whole Foods is committed to local hiring, offers educational workshops to help inform how to shop on a budget and make nutritious food choices, and continues to partner with local organizations to help support community service programming.

The Public Convenience or Necessity Will be Served by the Issuance of a Type 21 and Type 86 ABC Licenses

The business model of Whole Foods Market is designed to offer a full line of groceries, health foods and products, including the incidental sale of off-site alcoholic beverages. The on-site sales will also be incidental to the operations of the restaurant, allowing customers to enjoy beverages while they dine, and also provided will be on-site instructional tastings of a full line of alcohol to allow vendors to promote their products while customers shop. The success of the proposed specialty grocery store depends on its ability to provide a wide range of goods and services that customers have come to expect from grocery retailers, including everyday household food and supplies along with an incidental amount of alcoholic beverages. The request for the sale and distribution of off-site alcoholic beverages for the grocery store represent a relatively small, albeit very important, portion of the overall store sales, and is crucial to the overall product-offering to ensure returning customers, the viability of the grocery store, and providing the convenience and necessaries to the community.

The subject site is located in the South of Market Neighborhood, has a Downtown General land use designation and is zoned C-3G within The Trinity Plaza Special Use District. The Whole Foods grocery store with alcohol is appropriate and compatible with such existing uses and will not have an adverse impact on these uses or nearby residential uses. The proposed use is, therefore, not an unusual offering in this urban, commercial retail area. Further, the Project is beneficial with respect to the general welfare because it will increase the economic viability of the community in which it is located. The addition of a high-end specialty grocery store with alcohol, and an on-site restaurant, and will improve the surrounding commercial retail uses and attract local residents.

More importantly, as a specialty grocery store, Whole Foods Market will help meet public convenience and necessity demand for specialized foods and products, including a full line of interesting and desired line of alcoholic beverages that are unavailable at other stores. The popularity and demand of gluten-free, dairy-free, and other restrictive foods and supplements has increased tremendously over the past decade but is carried only by limited suppliers. The Whole Foods Market, which is synonymous in American culture with healthy and specialized foods, provides consumers, especially those with allergens, an appropriate and necessary option. Moreover, the design and landscaping of the proposed Project is intended to foster better community relations and create a social opportunity for local residents. The close proximity to existing commercial and retail uses, residential neighborhoods, and close public transportation. Public-pedestrian access is available through the site, both east-west along the line of Stevenson Street and north-south between Market and Mission Streets. The driveway to the underground parking structure serves to provide access to the commercial uses, as well as to the residential units. The proposed project will include various design elements that would promote pedestrian circulation and connectivity to the surrounding area, including the street entrances to the Whole Foods Market located along Market Street and 8th Street, consistent with the design elements addressed in the Development Agreement.

This is located in a high crime area. The subject property is located within SFPD Crime Reporting District ("RP") No. 208. These crimes were categorized as either Part I or Part II crimes (Part II being closely associated with alcohol related crimes). Whole Foods currently has 7 locations operating in San Francisco and has been operating in San Francisco for over twenty years. Whole Foods Markets operate across the City of San Francisco without adverse impacts to the surrounding community as a result of Whole Foods Markets' adherence to its corporate policies regarding responsible retailing of alcohol. The proposed grocery store is a neighborhood-serving use and will provide customers additional amenities as compared to a standard grocery store with its variety of organic produce and health foods. The store and subject sales will serve to strengthen the economic vitality of the area.

For example, the addition of Whole Foods at 690 Stanyan Street was extremely beneficial to the Haight-Ashbury neighborhood. What was once a 'dead activity zone' on Stanyan Street due to a vacant building is now a prosperous grocery store that offers residents and visitors in the neighborhood a convenient location to shop for their groceries and sundry goods. Additionally, the addition of the Whole Foods on Stanyan street has mitigated some environmental impacts as a result of residents not having to drive or travel to other areas of the City to fulfill their grocery shopping needs. The addition of Whole Foods at 1169 Market Street will contribute similar benefits to the South of Market neighborhood like the location on Stanyan Street provided to its community. Also, the proposed Whole Foods at 1169 Market Street will be a subterranean establishment and the street will not be immediately accessible from the entrance, thus it will be easier for Whole Foods to maintain the security of its store and its products because of the difficulty in exiting the establishment hastily. Overall, the proposed project will offer a safe and convenient shopping experience to its patrons.

While this Census Tract has more alcohol licenses than otherwise allocated to this CT, it is because this is a highly developed commercial area. Since the State allocates the number of Licenses in a CT on the basis of the number of residents in the CT this allocated number is almost always exceeded in a commercial area like this one. CT 176.01 is no different. The Caldera bill, Business & Professions Code Sections 23958 and 23958.4 thus provide the ability to local municipalities, like the City of San Francisco, to make a determination that such an additional License is warranted in this CT because it serves this community's Public Convenience or Necessity. In the instant case that is exactly the situation, and the reason for the request for the determination of Public Convenience or Necessity here.

As stated above, the Subject Property is located in Census Tract 176.01. According to the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control, the Department authorizes for this Census Tract six (6) off-sale licenses. As of July 17, 2019, there are currently fourteen (14) off-sale licensees within the Census Tract. Thus, while the Census Tract appears to have more off-sale licenses that the amount allotted without the need for approval, such concentration is not undue concentration in an urban, developed commercial area such as the site of this proposed Whole Foods Market, and approval should be given for this additional off-sale license. This project site

is surrounded by both commercial and residential zones, which only strengthens the need for a full-service community-based grocery store. The sale of a full line of alcoholic beverages is incidental to the products and services offered by the Whole Foods Market but is a vital aspect of this specialty grocery store, which will serve the public convenience and necessity through its offering of shopping, restaurant, and specialized goods.

Conclusion

Based on the foregoing reasons, it is respectfully requested that the San Francisco Board of Supervisors make a finding with respect to the California Business and Professions Code sections 23958 and 23958.4; and the Caldera bill, that the issuance of Type 21 and Type-86 licenses for the sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages will serve the Public Convenience or Necessity of this community. The community has very clearly indicated it is looking forward to this Whole Foods.

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Dear Board of Supervisors,

On behalf of Whole Foods Market California Inc. ("Whole Foods"), I am respectfully requesting that the San Francisco Board of Supervisors issue a Public Convenience or Necessity Determination, otherwise referred to by the City as "Caldera findings," for the sale of a full line of alcoholic beverages for off-site consumption (Type-21 ABC License) and an instructional tasting license (Type-86 ABC License).

Just recently in December 2018, Whole Foods obtained a Conditional Use Authorization for Formula Retail (Case Number: 2018-012420CUA) permitting us to open a full-service grocery store and restaurant with Types 21, 41 or 47, and 86 ABC Licenses. This CUA was passed by a unanimous vote by the Planning Commission. Because of the crime statistics in our police reporting district and the number of off-sale licenses in our census tract, we have been advised that a finding of public convenience or necessity is required per Business and Professions Code §23958.4, and therefore we are seeking such a determination from the Board of Supervisors.

The ABC application for license types 21, 41, and 86 was filed on May 8, 2019 at the San Francisco ABC district office. The Public Noticing sign was posted at the proposed project site beginning on May 13, 2019 and remaining up until June 18, 2019, which is longer than the 30 days required by law. Additionally, the required mailers were sent on May 15, 2019.

The Type-21 license for the Trinity site will be transferred from Whole Food's location at 1150 Ocean Avenue. The Type-41 and Type-86 licenses will be new issuances. Once construction is closer to being complete, Whole Foods may also apply to transfer to this location a Type-47 license, or may attempt to obtain a new issuance of a Type-47 for this location.

With respect to this project, we have made great community outreach efforts as reflected in the numerous letters of support submitted with this letter. Additionally, prior to filing this PCN application, we have had several conversations with Supervisor Matt Haney and his staff, and neither he nor his staff have expressed any concerns with the project or application. On behalf of

Whole Foods, we respectfully request that the Board of Supervisors determine that issuance of these licenses will serve public convenience or necessity.

Project Description

The Whole Foods Market will be located inside the Trinity Plaza located at 1169 Market Street on the corner of Market Street and 8th Street (the "Subject Property"). The Project is within the larger Trinity Plaza and includes a subterranean full-service grocery store and a restaurant on the street level with 275 seats. The Whole Foods Market staff will consist of approximately 30-45 employees per shift. Whole Foods Market will provide a high-end, full-service specialty grocery store which will benefit both the residents of the 1,900-unit apartment complex and the surrounding community by providing goods and services that are advantageous to the neighborhood. The overall product offering, which includes alcohol sales for on and off-site consumption (Type 41 or 47, Type 86, Type 21) in conjunction with the grocery store and the ancillary restaurant, will provide a range of goods and services to the local community. The addition of a Whole Foods Market will provide convenience to the surrounding community by offering a unique and necessary "one-stop" shopping experience in which nearby residents, neighbors and tourists can purchase grocery items, medicine, household products, beverages (both non-alcoholic and alcoholic), and/or other necessary retail items.

The proposed Whole Foods Market is a desirable addition to The Trinity Plaza project and will enhance the built environment in the surrounding neighborhood by utilizing an attractive, unique building design. Moreover, the design of the Whole Foods Market within the larger Trinity Plaza will create a clean and welcoming atmosphere for all to enjoy. The retail grocery store and restaurant will operate extended hours to meet the needs of the community and ensure that local customers have convenient access to their neighborhood grocery store as needed, and such hours are expected to be between 6 a.m. and 12 a.m. (midnight), daily, but are subject to change.

Furthermore, the addition of a Whole Foods Market will provide an economically viable return for the City. The operation of a specialty grocery store in this area will bring a wide range of employment positions, from entry level to managerial, which fulfills all three stated goals from the City of San Francisco's Economic Strategy plan from both the 2007 Report and the updated 2014 Report. Whole Foods expects to employ up to 200 people to staff the numerous departments and provide customer service to patrons. This will add viable employment opportunities to the community and work with the City to realize its stated economic goals for the future. However, in order for this Whole Foods to be an economically viable project that satisfies the grocery needs of the community, it will need to be able to sell a small amount of alcohol for off-site consumption.

Neighborhood Outreach

Prior to seeking the CUA and ABC license, Whole Foods conducted a substantial amount of community outreach and has obtained the support of the community for the store and restaurant. Specifically, Whole Foods reached out to local businesses, residents, and community organizations, and has attached the summary of our outreach efforts that was submitted in conjunction with the CUA application. Whole Foods has continued those outreach efforts and is now providing an additional 28 letters of support for a total of 146 signatures and 33 letters of

support submitted with this PCN application including letters from United Playaz, La Cocina, Asian, Inc., 4505 Meats, Humphry Slocombe, and West Bay Pilipino Multi Service Center.

We have also met with Supervisor Matt Haney and his staff, and neither Supervisor Haney nor his staff have expressed any concerns with the project or application.

Through our outreach efforts, we have found that many in the community look forward to our arrival in the neighborhood because Whole Foods is committed to local hiring, offers educational workshops to help inform how to shop on a budget and make nutritious food choices, and continues to partner with local organizations to help support community service programming.

The Public Convenience or Necessity Will be Served by the Issuance of a Type 21 and Type 86 ABC Licenses

The business model of Whole Foods Market is designed to offer a full line of groceries, health foods and products, including the incidental sale of off-site alcoholic beverages. The on-site sales will also be incidental to the operations of the restaurant, allowing customers to enjoy beverages while they dine, and also provided will be on-site instructional tastings of a full line of alcohol to allow vendors to promote their products while customers shop. The success of the proposed specialty grocery store depends on its ability to provide a wide range of goods and services that customers have come to expect from grocery retailers, including everyday household food and supplies along with an incidental amount of alcoholic beverages. The request for the sale and distribution of off-site alcoholic beverages for the grocery store represent a relatively small, albeit very important, portion of the overall store sales, and is crucial to the overall product-offering to ensure returning customers, the viability of the grocery store, and providing the convenience and necessaries to the community.

The subject site is located in the South of Market Neighborhood, has a Downtown General land use designation and is zoned C-3G within The Trinity Plaza Special Use District. The Whole Foods grocery store with alcohol is appropriate and compatible with such existing uses and will not have an adverse impact on these uses or nearby residential uses. The proposed use is, therefore, not an unusual offering in this urban, commercial retail area. Further, the Project is beneficial with respect to the general welfare because it will increase the economic viability of the community in which it is located. The addition of a high-end specialty grocery store with alcohol, and an on-site restaurant, and will improve the surrounding commercial retail uses and attract local residents.

More importantly, as a specialty grocery store, Whole Foods Market will help meet public convenience and necessity demand for specialized foods and products, including a full line of interesting and desired line of alcoholic beverages that are unavailable at other stores. The popularity and demand of gluten-free, dairy-free, and other restrictive foods and supplements has increased tremendously over the past decade but is carried only by limited suppliers. The Whole Foods Market, which is synonymous in American culture with healthy and specialized foods, provides consumers, especially those with allergens, an appropriate and necessary option. Moreover, the design and landscaping of the proposed Project is intended to foster better community relations and create a social opportunity for local residents. The close proximity to existing commercial and retail uses, residential neighborhoods, and close public transportation. Public-pedestrian access is available through the site, both east-west along the line of Stevenson Street and north-south between Market and Mission Streets. The driveway to the underground parking structure serves to provide access to the commercial uses, as well as to the residential units. The proposed project will include various design elements that would promote pedestrian circulation and connectivity to the surrounding area, including the street entrances to the Whole Foods Market located along Market Street and 8th Street, consistent with the design elements addressed in the Development Agreement.

This is located in a high crime area. The subject property is located within SFPD Crime Reporting District ("RP") No. 208. These crimes were categorized as either Part I or Part II crimes (Part II being closely associated with alcohol related crimes). Whole Foods currently has 7 locations operating in San Francisco and has been operating in San Francisco for over twenty years. Whole Foods Markets operate across the City of San Francisco without adverse impacts to the surrounding community as a result of Whole Foods Markets' adherence to its corporate policies regarding responsible retailing of alcohol. The proposed grocery store is a neighborhood-serving use and will provide customers additional amenities as compared to a standard grocery store with its variety of organic produce and health foods. The store and subject sales will serve to strengthen the economic vitality of the area.

For example, the addition of Whole Foods at 690 Stanyan Street was extremely beneficial to the Haight-Ashbury neighborhood. What was once a 'dead activity zone' on Stanyan Street due to a vacant building is now a prosperous grocery store that offers residents and visitors in the neighborhood a convenient location to shop for their groceries and sundry goods. Additionally, the addition of the Whole Foods on Stanyan street has mitigated some environmental impacts as a result of residents not having to drive or travel to other areas of the City to fulfill their grocery shopping needs. The addition of Whole Foods at 1169 Market Street will contribute similar benefits to the South of Market neighborhood like the location on Stanyan Street provided to its community. Also, the proposed Whole Foods at 1169 Market Street will be a subterranean establishment and the street will not be immediately accessible from the entrance, thus it will be easier for Whole Foods to maintain the security of its store and its products because of the difficulty in exiting the establishment hastily. Overall, the proposed project will offer a safe and convenient shopping experience to its patrons.

While this Census Tract has more alcohol licenses than otherwise allocated to this CT, it is because this is a highly developed commercial area. Since the State allocates the number of Licenses in a CT on the basis of the number of residents in the CT this allocated number is almost always exceeded in a commercial area like this one. CT 176.01 is no different. The Caldera bill, Business & Professions Code Sections 23958 and 23958.4 thus provide the ability to local municipalities, like the City of San Francisco, to make a determination that such an additional License is warranted in this CT because it serves this community's Public Convenience or Necessity. In the instant case that is exactly the situation, and the reason for the request for the determination of Public Convenience or Necessity here.

As stated above, the Subject Property is located in Census Tract 176.01. According to the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control, the Department authorizes for this Census Tract six (6) off-sale licenses. As of July 17, 2019, there are currently fourteen (14) off-sale licensees within the Census Tract. Thus, while the Census Tract appears to have more off-sale licenses that the amount allotted without the need for approval, such concentration is not undue concentration in an urban, developed commercial area such as the site of this proposed Whole Foods Market, and approval should be given for this additional off-sale license.

is surrounded by both commercial and residential zones, which only strengthens the need for a full-service community-based grocery store. The sale of a full line of alcoholic beverages is incidental to the products and services offered by the Whole Foods Market but is a vital aspect of this specialty grocery store, which will serve the public convenience and necessity through its offering of shopping, restaurant, and specialized goods.

Conclusion

Based on the foregoing reasons, it is respectfully requested that the San Francisco Board of Supervisors make a finding with respect to the California Business and Professions Code sections 23958 and 23958.4, and the Caldera bill, that the issuance of Type 21 and Type-86 licenses for the sale and distribution of alcoholic beverages will serve the Public Convenience or Necessity of this community. The community has very clearly indicated it is looking forward to this Whole Foods.

Whole Foods Market – Trinity Plaza Project Outreach Report

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1.0 INTRODUCTION

The following contains a detailed report of the outreach conducted in support of the application for conditional use approval for formula retail by Whole Foods Market at Trinity Plaza. To assist in the outreach efforts, Whole Foods enlisted the help of S2 Partners and Contigo Communications, who already had existing relationships with many of the stakeholders, and were therefore able to understand quickly the needs and concerns of the stakeholders.

To date, we have received and submitted over 150 letters of support including letters from United Playaz, La Cocina, and West Bay Pilipino Multi Service Center.

2.0 LOCAL BUSINESSES

Beginning in or about September 2018 and continuing thereafter, door-to-door outreach was conducted to local businesses to impart information about upcoming public meetings and the proposed project to locate a Whole Foods Market store and restaurant inside the Trinity Plaza. The week prior to the first public meeting on September 5, 2018, outreach was conducted door-to-door on 7th Street between Folsom and Mission, and on Mission Street between 10th and 6th Streets. The week prior to the second public meeting on November 15, 2018, outreach was conducted door-to-door on 6th Street between Market and Mission Streets, Stevenson Street between 6th and 7th, Market Street between 10th and 6th Streets, and Jones, McAllister, Turk and Hyde Streets between 6th and 8th Streets. The businesses encountered and informed about the project to-date through in-person outreach are listed below.

We provided interested business owners and employees a copy of the public meeting notice and invited them to attend the community meetings planned for September 5, 2018 at Trinity Plaza and November 15, 2018 at the Arnett Watson Apartments located at 650 Eddy Street. Additional businesses received the public meeting notice via mail for the September 5, 2018 meeting because they are located within the mailing radius of the project.

Overall, local businesses have been very supportive of the project and have had minimal questions or concerns. When appropriate, we have followed up with business owners/employees. The Local Business Outreach Summary below provides more detail on individual interactions with these businesses and property management offices in the area.

As noted above many local businesses support the project and submitted letters in support. Others encountered were indifferent or verbally supportive, but did not provide a formal letter of support. Also many of the employees of the local businesses that we encountered also provided verbal support for Whole Foods Markets' plans to locate a store and restaurant at Trinity Plaza.

3.0 LOCAL RESIDENTS/PROPERTY OWNERS

Our outreach to-date has been focused in the South of Market Area (SOMA) and Tenderloin neighborhoods primarily on streets adjacent to the project between Mission and Market Streets, and on Jones, McAllister, Turk and Hyde Streets. The list above in section 2.0 includes the residential properties, property management companies and residents that we have contacted and encountered during in-person door-to-door outreach. We provided each individual or organization a copy of the public meeting notice for the September 5, 2018 public meeting and invited them to attend community meetings. Some of these property owners, managers and residents also received meeting notices via mail because they are within the project's mailing radius. Some of the individual encountered attended the community meetings.

Overall, residents and property managers have appreciated the information and expressed support for the proposed Whole Foods Market store and restaurant. An overwhelming majority of people encountered noted the need for a full-service market in the area, as well as the need to improve the safety and walkability of the area, which they believe the presence of a Whole Foods store will accomplish. The majority of questions received were related to entrance and exit locations, parking, and general public safety in the area. To date, the project team has answered these questions to the community's satisfaction.

4.0 COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS

We have been in contact with community organizations with offices located near the proposed project that provide community services in the neighborhood. Below is a summary of communications and meetings conducted with local community serving organizations. We provided staff with public meeting notices and/or a short verbal or written description of the project. These organizations have been invited to attend community meetings, as appropriate. We have also indicated those who expressed further interest in

Overall, organizations have appreciated the information on the project and only asked high-level questions that the project team has addressed. More details about specific meetings with key organizations are provided below. To date, we have received letters of support from United Playaz and West Bay Pilipino Society.

United Playaz Meeting – August 23, 2018

United Playaz (UP) is a violence prevention and youth development organization dedicated to providing a safe and positive environment in which youth can grow, with the goal of maintaining a consistent "home" that most of the kids served lack in other facets of their daily lives. That home – the UP Clubhouse – has been located in the SOMA District for the past 20 years at 1038 Howard Street, San Francisco. Members of the project team met with the Executive Director, Rudy Corpuz, and staff. The team provided an overview of the proposed project at the Trinity Plaza and learned more about the UP organization. UP appreciated the information and recommended that the project team consider creative ways of providing nutrition education to the same population served to help reinforce the importance of a healthy lifestyle for overall well-being. Mr. Corpuz also recommended the team provide a briefing to SOMA Pilipinas. As part of our commitment to being a good neighbor while working in the SOMA District, the project team agreed to stay in touch with UP and brainstorm how best to re-engage to deliver nutrition education to UP staff and youth. This meeting was attended by project team members Adam Smith, Ontario Smith, Ramneek Saini and Susana Razo.

United Playaz provided a formal letter of support for the project.

West Bay Pilipino Center - September 17, 2018

The project team met with the West Bay Pilipino Center (West Bay) Executive Director, Carla Laurel. The purpose of the meeting was to brief her on the proposed project at Trinity Plaza, answer any questions she may have, and learn about the community services provided by West Bay. Overall the meeting went very well. We addressed her questions about the project timeline and employment opportunities associated with the store opening. The team also shared information about the Whole Foods Market Local Forager Program and Local Producer Loan Program. The Local Forager Program finds local products to sell at the store, and the Local Producer Loan Program provides loan interest loans to small local businesses.

She shared that many of the families served by West Bay would welcome new employment opportunities in the neighborhood that can provide a stable income and employment longevity. She stated it would be great to have Whole Foods Market offer culturally-sensitive foods at the store, and cooking demonstrations, if possible, to educate local community members about healthy cooking. She shared that West Bay convenes meetings with mothers, who are in need of access to healthy foods and fresh produce, which are not widely available in the neighborhood due to the scarcity of food markets. The information about the Local Forager and Producer Loan Programs was shared in response to the feedback relating to the availability of culturally-sensitive foods. These programs could support local vendors from the Filipino Community to expand operations and possibly offer their products at Whole Foods Market. It was shared that all foods and products sold at Whole Foods Market must meet the Whole Foods Market quality standards.

We learned that West Bay is the oldest Filipino organization in the SOMA neighborhood dating back to 1968. Their programs focus on serving school age children with an afterschool program, providing college prep services for youth, and support services for parents and the elderly, as well as case management and referrals to other social services.

West Bay Pilipino Center provided a formal letter of support for the project.

La Cocina

Members of the Whole Foods Market project team contacted La Cocina, a community nonprofit, to inform them of the project. La Cocina provides community resources and an array of food industry-specific services to ensure small businesses can succeed. La Cocina follows this model by providing commercial kitchen space and technical assistance focusing on low-income women and immigrant entrepreneurs who are launching, growing and formalizing food businesses. Whole Foods and La Cocina have an existing relationship that aims to support and scale local producers so they can be successful Whole Foods Market suppliers.

La Cocina provided a formal letter of support for project.

Oasis for Girls – September 17, 2018

Adam Smith, Ramneek Saini and Susana Razo met with Moumita Chakraborty, Development Director, at Oasis for Girls. Oasis for Girls is a local nonprofit that partners with young women of color aged 14-18 from under-resourced communities in San Francisco. The programs at Oasis for Girls empower girls to pave paths to successful academic and career goals; understand social justice issues and advocate for change in their communities; and develop confidence, advocacy, and self-care tools for healthy growth through high school, college, the workplace, and beyond.

We learned about the RISE Life Skills program, which teaches girls to shop on a budget and prepare healthy meals. This program is offered in conjunction with The Cooking Project. We also learned about the Youth Advisory Board, which hosts panel discussions on local issues and a Career Night (Susana Razo participated in Career Night on November 7, 2018). These all present opportunities for WFM engagement, so that it can better understand the needs of local youth in the SOMA area.

WFM also received input about the tension created by the growing Tech community in SOMA, and perceptions about pricing at Whole Foods, which makes shopping there feel like an "indulgence purchase." She spoke about the lack of healthy food options in the neighborhood and how it's a food justice issue for low-income community members. Adam shared information about the WFM 15 for 4 workshop, where shoppers are taught how to shop for a household of 4 on \$15 budget. This workshop is offered by local store managers and workers interested in dispelling the myth that you cannot shop at WFM on a budget. Adam also shared that WFM is price competitive with other grocery stores.

Adam also shared that by hiring locally, which WFM plans to do, local community members will see their community reflected in store staff. The diversity in San Francisco stores is usually better than the diversity found in the stores' neighborhoods. This also helps to dispel the myth that the store is not serving the local community.

Moumita also asked if WFM's community giving priorities changed since being bought by Amazon. Adam shared that decisions related to local giving continue to be made locally and that such priorities have not changed since being purchased by Amaazon.

SOMA Pilipinas Meeting, including SOMCAN and the Filipino-American Development Foundation – October 12, 2018

We met with SOMA Pilipinas on October 12th. This meeting included representatives of the Bayanihan Community Center, SOMCAN, West Bay Filipino Center and the Filipino-American Development Foundation. SOMA Pilipinas is an organization under the Filipino American Development Foundation and encompasses a variety of buildings, parks, businesses and community service groups within the Filipino Cultural Heritage District. Additionally, they are composed of 20 organizations including SOMCAN who largely focuses on land-use work. This meeting was attended by Rob Twyman, Adam Smith, Ryan Kroll, Ramneek Saini and Susana Razo. SOMA Pilipinas shared the following information:

- 1. SOMA organizations are challenged by space needs, overstretched staff and the need to diversify funding
- The next Undiscovered event, showcasing the existing Pilipino marketplace of businesses, is on 10/20 at the Chronicle Building parking lot; they recommend attending
- 3. There is a need for business skills training with entrepreneurs; they currently partner with Renaissance (a nonprofit that services small businesses)
- 4. Small and emerging businesses needs long-term leases
- 5. They are forming a new merchant association and invited WFM to join in the future
- 6. They received \$35k from the City in S.E.E.D. Accelerator funds to invest in 6 new businesses
- 7. Want to know produce will be affordable
- 8. Food donations for events is always needed
- 9. SOMA Pilipinas has an engagement with the National Endowment for the Arts to assist with streetscape and public art

The following questions were asked and responded to at the meeting:

- Question/Concern #1: They would like to understand how lessons learned at Ocean Avenue store will be reflected in this project.
 - Response: Rob shared he was two months into his position as Regional President when the Ocean
 - Avenue store opened and the store opening may have suffered due to the lack of a Regional President prior to that. Rob took responsibility for any missteps in the opening of that store.
- Question/Concern # 2: Is the restaurant a food hall concept?
 Response: No, but WFM partners with local chefs in development of the hot food menu and promotes them.
- Question/Concern #3: Will they have cultural products?
 Response: Yes. WFM currently partners with La Cocina to offer cultural products at other stores.
- Question/Concern # 4: Can they have a Filipino section in the Asian aisle?
 Response: WFM does have and can offer Filipino items, but they may not have an aisle section.
 They are incorporating the products into the general store for better merchandizing.
- Question/Concern # 5: How many fulltime opportunities will you have?
 Response: On average WFM hires 70/80% FT employees and 20/30% PT. We can start early to outreach 6 to 12 months prior to begin screening process.

- Question/Concern # 6: Do you have a first source hiring agreement for this project?
 Response: We expect to.
- Question/Concern # 7: What type of planning approval are you requesting?
 Response: A formula retail approval a type of CU.
- Question/Concern # 8: We may be able to explore a certification process with OEWD/CityBuild that helps us identify local workers. We would like to have a meeting with Josh. I spoke to him about it.
 Response: Yes, we can meet with OEWD. We also have 5% days when 5% of net proceeds go to an organization. We also offer certifications such as a Bakery Apprenticeship Program and certified cheese professional and meat cutters.
- Question/Concern # 9: How many positions will you hire for?
 Response: Two-hundred total, with 100-120 new hire positions. Eighty or so transfers will come from other SF stores, and we will need to also backfill those positions.
- Question/Concern # 10: What other stores do you plan to open in SF.
 Response: Stonestown.
- Question/Concern # 11: WestBay is having their 50th anniversary celebration and fundraiser later this month. It would be great to have you attend and meet some of our partners. Details will be emailed.

The meeting was concluded with an agreement to meet again in coordination with the Office of Workforce Development to discuss and formalize plans for local hiring efforts.

Joint Office of Economic and Workforce Development and SOMA Pilipinas Meeting, including SOMCAN, Filipino-American Development Foundation and Mission Hiring Hall – November 2, 2018

We met with SOMA Pilipinas on November 2, 2018. This meeting included several representatives of the Office of Economic and Workforce Development, including Director of Workforce Josh Arce, the Bayanihan Community Center, SOMCAN, Filipino-American Development Foundation and Mission Hiring Hall. This meeting was attended by Adam Smith, Ryan Kroll, Charles "Chuck" Abramo, Ramneek Saini and Susana Razo.

Whole Foods shared the attached presentation describing its commitment to quality foods, local hiring, diversity (as reflected by its current workforce diversity at its seven San Francisco stores) and support of local producers as reflected by it Local Producers Loan Program and Local Forager Program.

The meeting was dedicated to exchanging ideas about how to help ensure that local and disadvantaged community members can be successfully engaged so that they can secure employment at the store when it opens in 2021. Whole Foods Market representatives stated that work to identify local workers can start earlier to help fill open positions at its existing seven San Francisco stores.

Whole Foods Market has signed a Memorandum of Understanding delivered to OEWD committing to:

- using its best efforts to recruit 30% of its new hire workforce for the store from the San Francisco area, prioritizing zip codes immediately adjacent to the store,
- working with local organization to identify candidates,
- holding job fairs in the community, and
- reporting data to document its local hiring success.

Mission Hiring Hall – November 9, 2018

The project team met with Mission Hiring Hall (MHH) on November 9th. This meeting included Executive Director, Don Marcos, and General Manager, Michelle Leonard-Bell. Mission Hiring Hall is a nonprofit organization serving moderate and low income job seekers in San Francisco. They offer counseling, training, and placement services. All services are free of charge. MHH provides vocational training in construction trades, construction project administration, security services, and hospitality job readiness training. They also help individuals who are currently experiencing homelessness find work through homeless employment programs. Mission Hiring Hall works directly with San Francisco businesses to recruit and fill positions, including those businesses seeking compliance with development agreements and local ordinances, such as San Francisco's First Source Hiring Program. This meeting was attended by Adam Smith, Charles "Chuck" Abramo, Ramneek Saini and Susana Razo.

We learned that MHH understand OEWD reporting requirements and can as part of its employee recruitment efforts capture that data for Whole Foods Market. The shared their protocols for screening and recruiting candidates. The Whole Foods effort would fall into their hospitality sector. They also suggested working with Whole Foods to conduct hiring events at the MHH office. These events generally attract 25-75 applicants. They shared OEWD would also post available positions in Business Services to inform local workers of the opportunities.

MHH currently recruits workers for Target, Macys, Virgin Hotel, UPS, security companies and other employers. Most of the workers recruited are "ready to work" because they have participated in MHH job readiness programs.

MHH and Whole Foods Market agreed to maintain a line of communication. Whole Foods Market plans on working with MHH to identify local workers.

Swords to Plowshares - November 19, 2018

The project team met with Swords to Plowshares on November 19th. This meeting took place with Akta Patel, Workforce Specialist. Swords to Plowshares is a nonprofit dedicated to serving military veterans and addressing the obstacles they face — including homelessness, unemployment and disability— which are seen as interrelated and requiring an integrated network of support. They offer comprehensive employment and training services that allow veterans to stabilize their lives and become job ready. Veterans work one-on-one with their staff to overcome barriers to employment, access job training and connect with local employers. This meeting was attended by Adam Smith, Charles "Chuck" Abramo, Ramneek Saini and Susana Razo.

Whole Foods provided a project overview and overview of their typical employee recruitment efforts associated with new store openings. They shared information about their fulltime and part-time distribution, which averages 75-80% fulltime and 20-25% part-time. Fulltime employees receive benefits including a 401k retirement plan, and part-time employees received a lower level of benefits.

We learned that Swords to Plowshares services about 300 veterans. They provide a range of supportive services and job readiness and placement assistance, such as assistance preparing resumes, cover letters and preparing for interviews. They currently work with 160 employer partners, such as Nordstrom, security and staffing agencies, manufacturing and biotech organizations.

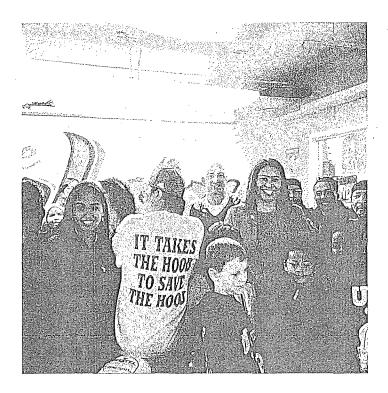
We also learned they prefer at least a 4-6 weeks of lead time to identify candidates for available jobs. They also ask that employer partners rill out a form they can share grantors they are successfully placing clients.

They have an existing relationship with the Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD). A subsequent meeting was scheduled for December 3rd to learn more about their practices and continue exploring how Whole Foods Market can work with them to recruit workers. On December 3rd Akta will be joined by her colleague Tyng Liu.

United Playaz, West Bay Filipino Center and Community Housing Partnership, Thanksgiving Day Turkey Giveaway – November 20, 2018

Whole Foods Market, along with community partners United Playaz, West Bay Pilipino Multi-Services Center and Community Housing Partnership proudly distributed 400 free turkeys on Tuesday, November 20, 2018 to low-income families and individuals in the South of Market and Tenderloin neighborhoods. The event focused on ensuring that families on all rungs of the economic ladder have the means to provide a holiday meal to their loved ones.

Mayor London N. Breed joined the event, as Whole Foods Market participated as a community partner in the 12th annual Mayor's Turkey Giveaway. Attached is a copy of the Mayor's Press Release regarding this event.



5.0 PUBLIC MEETINGS

Prior to the September 5th public meeting, the project team mailed notification letters detailing the proposed project and scheduled public meeting date in accordance with City of San Francisco regulations. A summary of the meeting is included below. The project team continues to follow-up as appropriate.

Community Meeting #1 – September 5, 2018

Twenty-nine community members attended the first meeting held at the Trinity Plaza Community Room in San Francisco. This first meeting was an opportunity to introduce the project to community members, answer questions, and receive comments on the initially proposed development. Below is a list of relevant questions/comments and responses that occurred during the meeting.

- Question/Concern #1: Who does Whole Foods hire?
 Response: Whole Foods intends to hire from the local community, and anticipates hiring more than 100 new employees. Whole Foods has begun and will continue to connect with local nonprofits and organizations to inform them of employment opportunities. Whole Foods welcomes any suggestions on potential groups to meet with, and asked for these suggestions at the Pre-Application meeting.
- Question/Concern #2: What is the timeline for opening the store?

Response: Construction has begun, and Whole Foods expects the location to open toward the end of summer in 2021.

- Question/Concern #3: Will Whole Foods have more community meetings?
 Response: Whole Foods has begun and will continue to meet with local organizations. Whole Foods has already met with groups such as United Playaz and the Central Market Community Benefit District, and is in the process of scheduling meetings with SOMA Pilipinas and other groups in the coming weeks. Whole Foods welcomes any suggestions on potential groups to meet with, and asked for these suggestions at the Pre-Application meeting.
- Question/Concern #4: How is Whole Foods planning to address bike safety?
 Response: Because of its long history in the San Francisco community, Whole Foods has existing relationships with the San Francisco MTA and the San Francisco Bicycle Coalition, which it will utilize to ensure this location is as "bike-friendly" as possible. Whole Foods is considering in its plans how to ensure sufficient bicycle parking is provided for the various types of bicycles utilized, and to minimize the interaction with bicycles with the underground parking. Additionally, all deliveries will be at the already existing receiving area that is accessed off 7th Street and through Angelo's Alley. This will minimize delivery traffic on Market St. and 8th St., which are frequented by heavy bicycle traffic. Whole Foods welcomes any suggestions on other potential strategies to promote bicycle safety, and asked for these suggestions at the Pre-Application meeting.

• **Question/Concern #5:** Does Whole Foods have plans to minimize automobile traffic to this location?

Response: As mentioned above, Whole Foods is committed to promoting bicycle access to its store by ensuring sufficient and diverse bicycle parking. Additionally, Whole Foods intends to create Uber and Lyft drop-off/pick-up points to make access more accessible for such programs, which will minimize the need for residents to drive their own vehicles and utilize parking. Also, while the parking spots assigned to the store were designated prior to Whole Foods entering into a lease and are not a consideration point in this Formula Retail application process, Whole Foods remains committed to listening to the community on how best to stay at the forefront of the trend towards a lessening dependence upon automobiles, and asked for these suggestions at the Pre-Application meeting.

• Question/Concern #6: Concern over potential negative impact on the local farmers' market. Response: Whole Foods has a long tradition of working hand-in-hand with local farmers' market to ensure mutual success. Whole Foods' vision is to provide access for everyone to healthy foods, which time and again has led to strong partnerships with local farmers' markets. In fact, it was noted that frequently one will see a farmers' market next to a Whole Foods and that farmers' market is thriving for several reasons: 1) Whole Foods acts as an anchor that attracts customers

interested in healthy foods, 2) farmers' markets are seasonal and therefore offer products that Whole Foods does not carry, and 3) farmers' markets provide a different experience for a shopper than Whole Foods. Additionally, Whole Foods often will purchase its products from these same farmers and does not have an interest in competing with them, but instead in promoting them. This is reflected in Whole Foods' practice of advertising in its store that certain products come from a farmer that is at the local farmers' market as a way of driving business to that farmer.

• Question/Concern # 7: How does Whole Foods plan to partner with the community and ensure that the food is affordable for all?

Response: Over the last few years, Whole Foods has taken additional measures to ensure that access to its products is available to all. These steps include the creation and promotion of the 365 Everyday Value product line, which are products that meet the same high standards of all other products at Whole Foods, but are offered at price points even or lower than competitors. Additionally, in order to further engrain itself in the community, Whole Foods has begun and will continue to meet with local organizations. Whole Foods has already met with groups such as United Playaz and the Central Market Community Benefit District, and is in the process of scheduling meetings with SOMA Pilipinas and other groups in the coming weeks. Moreover, Whole Foods routinely partners with local non-profits that share similar goals as Whole Foods. Whole Foods welcomes any suggestions on potential groups to meet with or non-profits to partner with, and asked for these suggestions at the Pre-Application meeting.

- Question/Concern #8: Concern over Whole Foods' impact on local business.
 Response: Whole Foods anticipates acting as an anchor for this neighborhood and will serve to bring new activity to the area. This influx of patrons will help local businesses thrive as many of these same customers will patronize other local businesses. For instance, Whole Foods tends to attract "foodies," who are then inspired to eat at local restaurants they have not previously tried. Over its many years of experience in operating in San Francisco, Whole Foods has seen these positive impacts on its neighboring businesses. Additionally, Whole Foods is committed to meeting with local business committees such as the Central Market CBD, which it has already met with and will continue to do so. - Question/Concern #9: Concern over Whole Foods' quality diminishing after the Amazon purchase.
 Response: Whole Foods continues to adhere to the same high standards and devotion to building community that it has had since its inception. In fact, it is these high standards and devotion to

community that attracted Amazon to Whole Foods versus other grocery stores, and there is no desire to change this formula. While there may have been a period of slight adjustment earlier this year, which is only to be expected, Whole Foods is committed to operating as it has for decades and to maintaining its corporate culture that has made it a welcome member in every community it has joined.

Community Meeting #2 - November 15, 2018

Three community members attended the second community meeting held at the Arnett Watson Apartments Community Room in the Tenderloin neighborhood of San Francisco. Representatives of the Tenderloin Housing Clinic and Central City SRO collaborative were in attendance. The lower level of attendance was attributed to poor air quality conditions on this date. The meeting was an opportunity to introduce the project to community members, answer questions, and receive comments on the initially proposed development. Below is a list of relevant questions/comments and responses that occurred during the meeting.

• Question/Concern #1: What type of employment opportunities will you have?

Response: Whole Foods Market (WFM) expects to create about 200 jobs for the Trinity site. Of this, WFM expects to fill over 100 positions with new hires. The remaining positions will be transfers from other WF stores to ensure the Whole Foods culture is present in this new location, and this will create new positions at the other WF Stores that will need to be filled. On average WFM hires 70/80% FT employees and 20/30% PT, and expects the Trinity site to fall within this range. Whole Foods has begun and will continue to connect with local nonprofits and organizations to inform them of employment opportunities. Whole Foods welcomes any suggestions on potential groups to meet with, and asked for these suggestions at the Pre-Application meeting.

• **Question/Concern # 2:** How does Whole Foods plan to partner with the community and ensure that the food is affordable for all?

Response: Over the last few years, Whole Foods has taken additional measures to ensure that access to its products is available to all. These steps include the creation and promotion of the 365 Everyday Value product line, which are products that meet the same high standards of all other products at Whole Foods, but are offered at price points even or lower than competitors. Additionally, in order to further engrain itself in the community, Whole Foods has begun and will continue to meet with local organizations. 6.0 SUMMARY

Community outreach is on-going, but to-date the key findings are that community members are supportive of the store, particularly if WFM is committed to local hiring, educational workshops to help inform potential low-income shoppers how to shop on a budget and make nutritious food choices, and partnering with local organizations to help support community service programming. People have appreciated the grassroots outreach to local community-serving organizations, businesses and residents.
