SUBJECT: Declaration of Emergency Update: Repair Southeast Treatment Plant Final Effluent Force Main

On October 18, 2018, the SFPUC Wastewater Enterprise discovered a potential failure of the pipe that conveys the treated final effluent from the Southeast Treatment Plant to the deep-water outfall located near Pier 80. In an October 22, 2018 memorandum to the then-President of the Commission, I declared an emergency due to the failure of, and need to repair, the Southeast Treatment Plant Final Effluent Force Main, with an estimated repair cost of not to exceed \$2 million. The Commission President provided his written concurrence and approval.

On December 26, 2018, I issued an updated declaration of an emergency to reflect two changes based on initial detailed engineering field evaluation and updated construction estimates for the work: (1) authorization of the declaration under both Administrative Code Section 6.60 and Section 21.15, and (2) an increase in the anticipated not to exceed cost from \$2 million to \$5 million. On February 5, 2019, the Board of Supervisors approved the declaration of an emergency through Resolution No. 59-19, which stated that the estimated cost of the emergency repair work was anticipated not to exceed \$4.912 million.

A bypass pipeline is currently under construction to eliminate one of the existing pair of force mains that crosses under Islais Creek parallel to Third Street. While initial engineering design expected traditional construction methodology, a contractor later confirmed that the only way to construct the bypass pipeline is to build water-tight cofferdams due to poor soil conditions and site constraints. Cofferdam construction requires a specialized crane and barge configuration which necessitated building a temporary seawall. Staff is working closely with consultant and contractor teams to build the bypass pipe in a marine site that is substantially more complex with poor soil conditions, limited waterside access, thick sediment layer, active marine wildlife, dilapidated existing pipe conditions, larger than expected void under the initial pipeline alignment design, and a target construction completion before the upcoming wet weather season.

Based on information learned during active construction, staff now estimates the work will exceed the \$4.912 million not-to-exceed estimate stated in Board of Supervisors Resolution No. 59-19. With actual design and construction costs, the total emergency repair cost is now estimated at \$6.25 million.

I am therefore updating the December 26, 2018 declaration of an emergency for an increase in the anticipated not to exceed cost from \$5 million to \$6.25 million. In light of the increase in estimated costs, we will return to the Board of Supervisors for approval of this updated declaration of an emergency. I trust that this meets with your concurrence and approval.

SUBJECT: Community Living Fund (CLF), Program for Case Management and Purchase of Resources and Services, Six-Month Report (January-June 2019)

OVERVIEW

The San Francisco Administrative Code, Section 10.100-12, created the Community Living Fund (CLF) to support aging in place and community placement alternatives for individuals who may otherwise require care within an institution. This report fulfills the Administrative Code requirement that the Department of Aging and Adult Services (DAAS) report to the Board of Supervisors every six months detailing the level of services provided and costs incurred in connection with the duties and services associated with this fund.

The CLF Program provides for home- and community-based services, or a combination of equipment and services, that will help individuals who are currently or at risk of being institutionalized, to continue living independently in their homes or to return to community living. This program, using a two-pronged approach of coordinated case management and purchased services, provides the needed resources not available through any other mechanism, to vulnerable older adults and adults with disabilities.

The CLF Six-Month Report provides an overview of trends. The attached data tables and charts show key program trends for each six month period, along with project-to-date figures where appropriate.

KEY FINDINGS

Referrals & Service Levels

- ❖ The CLF Program received 158 total new referrals, an increase from the prior period to return to previous levels; this volume of new referrals is generally consistent with trends over the program. Most (74%) of those referred were eligible and most of these have been served.
- ❖ 343 clients were served. Most (256) were served by the intensive case management program provided by the Institute on Aging (IOA). This is consistent with IOA enrollment trends over the life of the program. Of the total served, 100 clients also

received services from Brilliant Corners through the Scattered Site Housing and Rental Subsidy program.¹

Demographics

Trends in CLF referrals are relatively consistent with slight shifts over time:

- ❖ Consistent with overall program trends to date, over two-thirds of referred clients were seniors aged 60 and up. In 2011 and 2012, referred clients were more equally split between seniors and younger adults with disabilities (aged 18-59), but seniors typically represent the majority of referrals.
- ❖ Trends in the ethnic profile of new referrals remain generally consistent with prior periods with some slight changes. Referrals for White clients remain the largest group (41%). Referrals made on behalf of African-Americans decreased to align with historic program trends (21%). Referrals for Latino clients rose to one in five referrals (20%). Referrals for Asian/Pacific Islander clients have also increased slightly (16%) compared to prior periods.
- ❖ Referrals for English-speaking clients remain the most common, making up 72% of referrals in the current reporting period. The second most common primary language remains Spanish (10%). Approximately 12% speak Asian/Pacific Islander languages, most commonly Cantonese (9%), an increase that mirrors the ethnicity trends described above.
- ❖ Males represented approximately half (50%) of referrals, a slight dip from previous periods. One percent of referred clients identified as transgender.
- ❖ Referred clients most commonly identify as heterosexual (68% of all referrals; 86% of referrals with a documented response to the sexual orientation question). Eight percent of all referrals were for persons identifying as gay/lesbian/same-sex loving and one percent were for persons identifying as bisexual. Approximately 22% of referrals were missing sexual orientation data in their application for CLF services.
- ❖ The most frequent zip code for referred clients remained 94102 (14% of referrals). This area includes the Tenderloin and Hayes Valley areas. Other common areas are 94116 (Parkside, Laguna Honda) with 14% of all referrals, 94110 (Inner Mission/Bernal Heights) with 9%, and 94109 (Nob Hill, Polk Gulch) with 6%.
- ❖ Referrals from Laguna Honda Hospital represent 21% of all referrals. This is consistent with the prior period and remains lower than trends over the entire program history. Between 2010 and 2016, 35% of referrals on average came from

Laguna Honda Hospital. This likely reflects broader trends in the Laguna Honda Hospital client population and availability of appropriate housing to support safe discharge and stability in the community. Many Laguna Honda Hospital residents need supportive housing, such as Direct Access to Housing (DAH), but there is a waitlist for this type of housing.

Service Requests

- ❖ Self-reported service needs remain consistent with prior periods. The most commonly-requested services at intake include: case management (67%), in-home support (57%), housing-related services (44%), and assistive devices (44%).

Program Costs

The six-month period ending in June 2019 shows a net increase of \$608,241 in CLF Program costs over the prior six-month period. This is primarily due to increased expenditures from the contracts with IOA and Brilliant Corners.

- ❖ Total monthly program costs per client² averaged \$2,012 per month in the latest six-month period, an increase of \$421 per month over the prior six-month period. The increase in average cost per client was largely due to increased spending, particularly in home care, assisted living, and general housing assistance. Excluding costs for home care and rental subsidies, average monthly purchase of service costs for CLF clients who received any purchased services was \$341 per month in the latest reporting period, an increase of \$182 per client from the previous six-month period.

Performance Measures

DAAS is committed to measuring the impact of its investments in community services. The CLF program has consistently met and exceeded its goals to support successful community living for those discharged from institution or at imminent risk of institutionalization. Given this demonstrated success, DAAS shifted focus to the below two new performance measures beginning in FY 15/16:

- ❖ Percent of clients with one or fewer unplanned (“acute”) hospital admissions within a six month period (excludes “banked” clients). *Goal: 80%.*
With **91%** of clients having one or fewer unplanned admissions, the CLF program exceeded the performance measure target. DAAS will continue to monitor this measure and evaluate the goal threshold.
- ❖ Percent of care plan problems resolved, on average, after one year of enrollment in the CLF Program (excludes “banked” clients). *Goal: 80%*

Due to changes in the CLF Program database (including improvements to the Care Plan module), this metric is not available for the current reporting period. It will be available in the next six-month report.

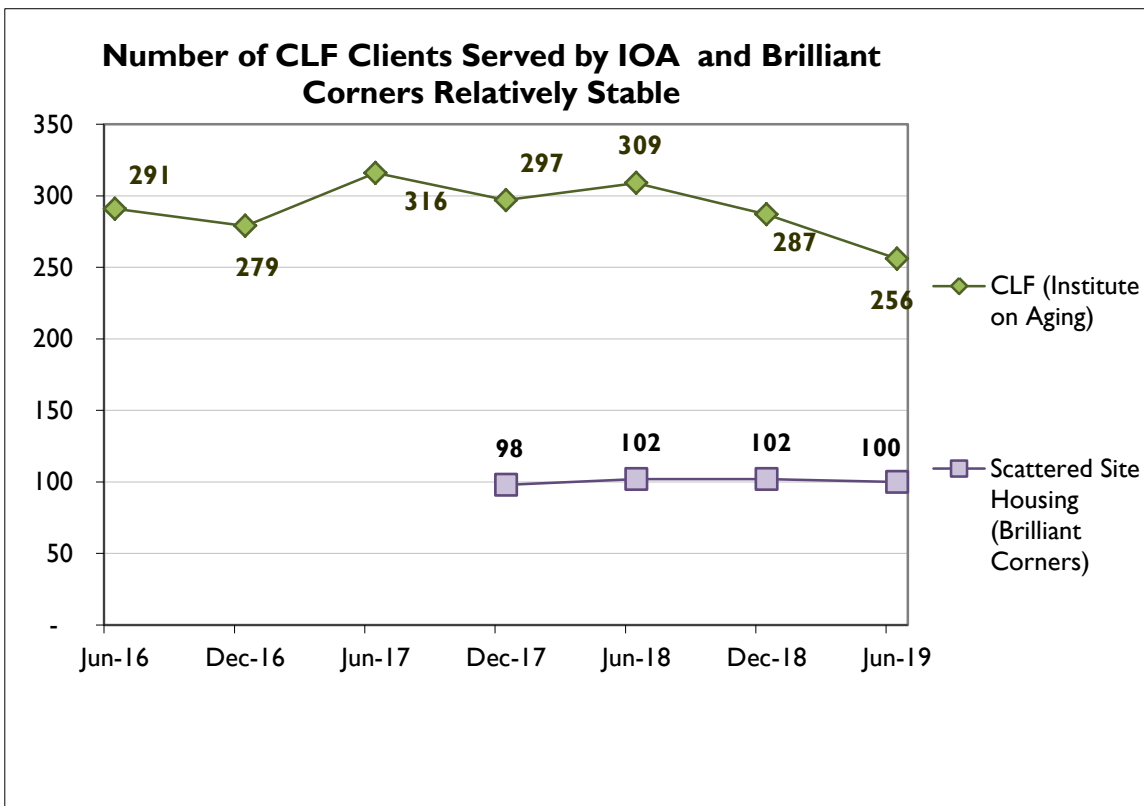
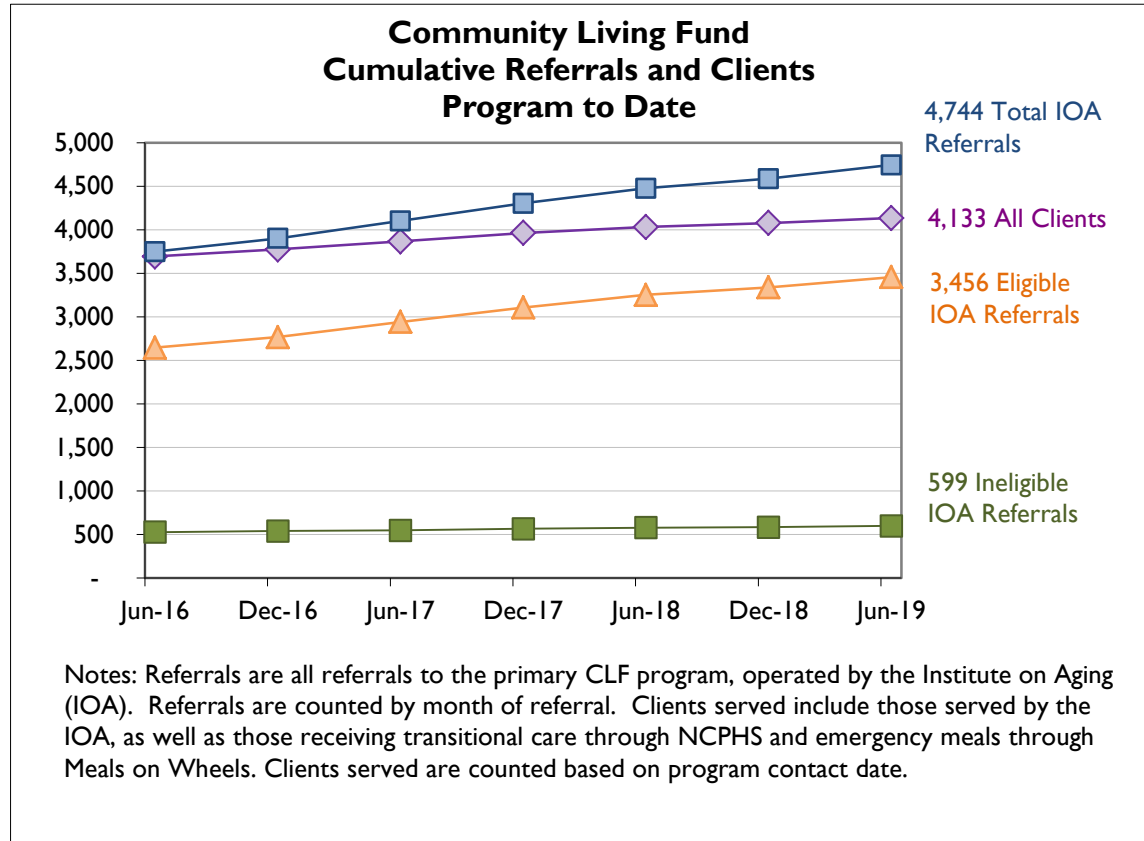
Systemic changes / Trends affecting CLF

- ❖ As of August 2019, there are 31 referrals awaiting assignment. On average, these clients have been waiting for 39 days. About half are waiting for intensive case management and the others have been referred for a purchase of service (and have separate community case management). While this waitlist is similar in length to the last six-month report, the number of days waiting has decreased considerably.
- ❖ During this reporting period, the CLF Program transitioned three (3) participants into Scattered Site Housing units managed by Brilliant Corners. All three were discharged from Laguna Honda Hospital. The CLF Program facilitates monthly Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) meetings hosted at IOA to review the prospective referrals from Laguna Honda Hospital for clinical appropriateness of independent community living. CLF-eligible individuals living in institutional care who have no appropriate housing alternatives and meet Scattered Site Housing criteria are considered for these units.
- ❖ IOA worked with RTZ Associates to update the CLF Care Plan module with a revised service plan library and layout including intervention language and goals identification. These updates, along with the use of S.M.A.R.T. goals are intended to improve the accuracy of reporting performance metrics and indicators for client improvements. The revised module was launched January 2019 and CLF worked to streamline process and identify needed improvements. There have been several updates and changes to the module to maximize its effectiveness and efficiency.
- ❖ The CLF program continued serving individuals under the Human Services Agency's (HSA) Housing and Disability Income Advocacy Program (HDAP). Overseen by the California Department of Social Services (CDSS), HDAP is a county-administered program that assists individuals with disabilities who are experiencing homelessness apply for disability benefit programs and provides housing assistance during the application period. CLF continues to assist in the transition of HDAP clients into supportive housing, by providing intensive case management and purchase of services when appropriate. Approximately 13 individuals were served in the prior six-month period with an additional 3 individuals during this six-month period. CLF case management has supported these clients through the transition period with care coordination and stabilization efforts. CLF has met each of the following goals: help individuals access HSA's robust Social Security Income (SSI) Advocacy Program; link clients to supportive housing through a subsidy; provide case management and housing stabilization services; and plan for a successful transition from the program when SSI is awarded.
- ❖ CLF continued to implement improvements in outreach to increase the API population. In addition to the partnership contract with Self Help for the Elderly (SHE), CLF maximized the utilization of a dedicated caseload for its bilingual staff

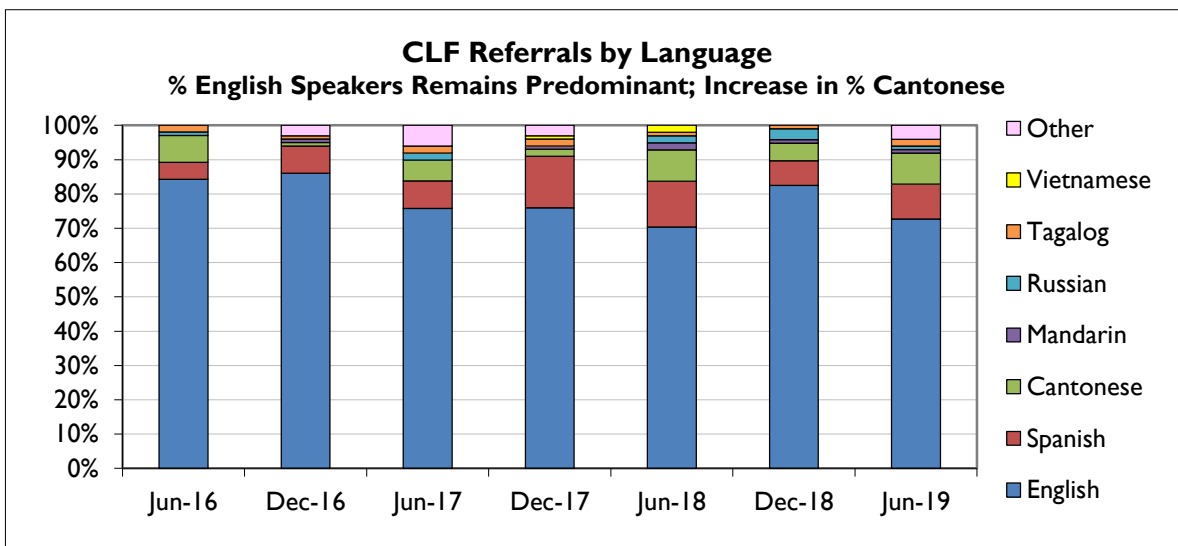
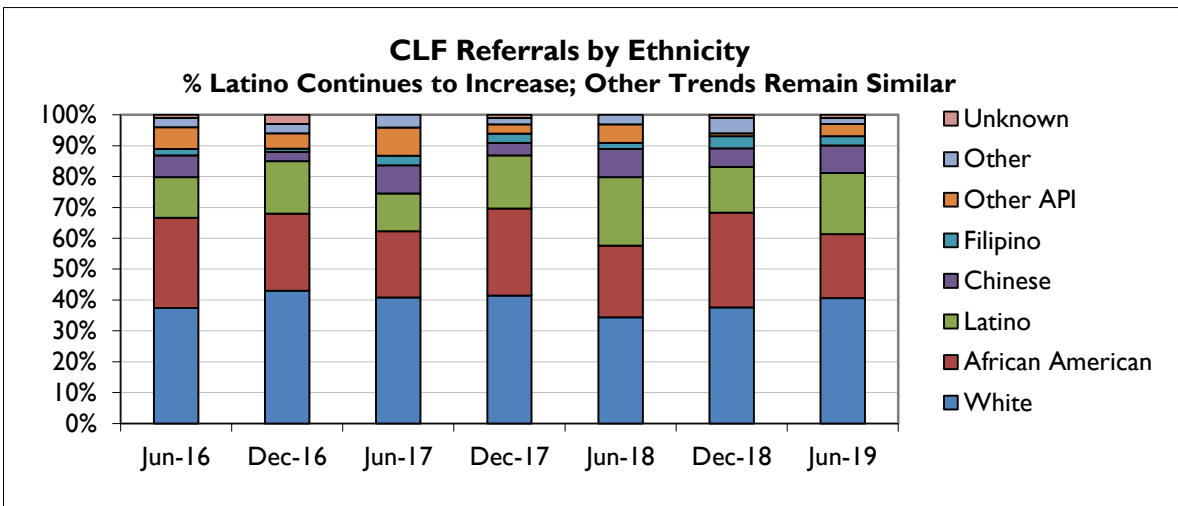
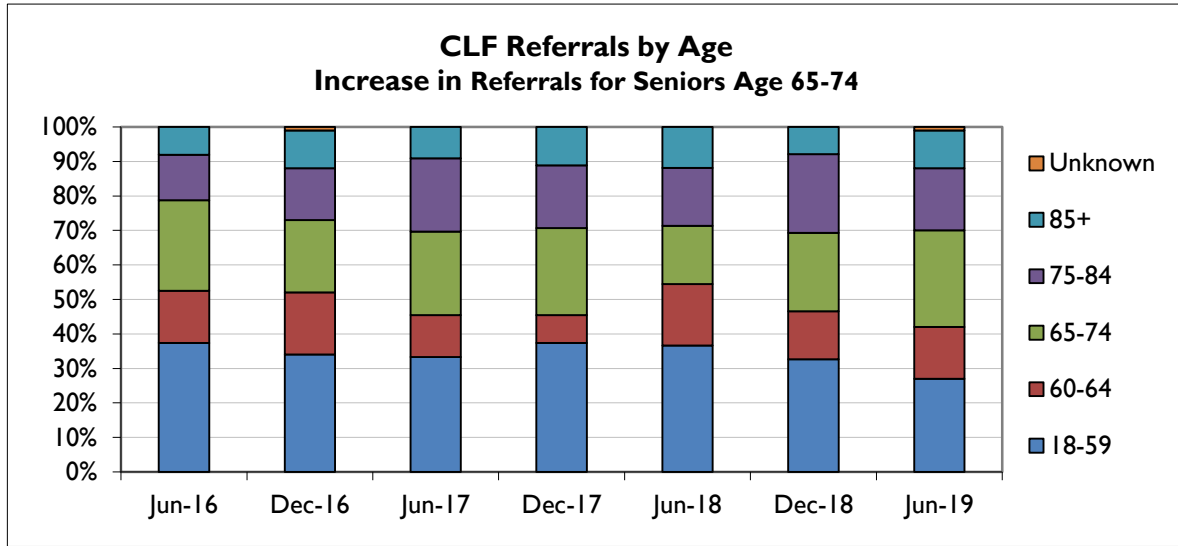
who work with the API population, resulting in successfully serving all API referrals on the waitlist. For temporary vacancies, IOA recruitment continues to source new care managers with language capabilities to bolster CLF capacity to serve API clients. Outreach efforts conducted by the CLF Bilingual Care Manager during this reporting period continued with in-services at SHE and Chinatown Community Development Center. Future outreach visits are planned over the next six months with Kimochi, Richmond Area Multi-Services, Chinese Community Health Resource Center, and Chinese Progressive Association.

- ❖ The California Housing Finance Agency (CalHFA) in cooperation with the California Department of Health Care Services (DHCS), the California Department of Developmental Services (DDS), the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) and the California Tax Credit Allocation Committee (TCAC) announced the availability of the 811 NOFA project-based rental assistance funds targeted to Medi-Cal eligible persons with disabilities. In partnership with Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corporation (TNDC), CLF participated in securing two of these project-based rental assistance vouchers in May 2019 for units through TNDC. CLF completed an affirmative marketing analysis to identify appropriate eligible CLF clients to participate in this project. As a California Community Transitions (CCT) provider, the CLF program utilized the established infrastructure to begin referring current CCT clients for this project.
- ❖ The CLF program has worked extensively to create a staffing plan for caseload maximization and overall increase in clients served including hiring three staff to replace vacancies created from internal promotions. CLF became fully staffed in May 2019 with CLF partner agency, Conard House, also filling the CLF Money Manager position that was vacant since January 2019.
- ❖ In FY 18/19, San Francisco's Adult Protective Services (APS) program was awarded \$743,000 by the California Department of Social Services (CDSS) to implement the Home Safe pilot program over two years, to promote increased collaboration between homelessness and protective services systems. Home Safe will provide a flexible, short-term intervention to its clients at imminent risk of homelessness and is modeled in part after the CLF case management and purchase of service structure. Spearheaded by APS, the program is a collaboration with the San Francisco Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing (HSH) and IOA. Clients will be served by APS or IOA depending on their specific situation and needs. Home Safe does not require institutional level of care needs, so this will be a distinct population from the traditional CLF caseload, and IOA's work will be funded with CDSS funding only. IOA has worked closely with APS to organize and prepare for the program launch in July 2019.
- ❖ The CLF contract with the Institute on Aging (IOA) for the provision of intensive case management and purchase of services expired on June 30, 2019. A Request for Proposals for the Community Living Fund services was released in October 2018, and IOA successfully bid for the contract and was awarded to provide CLF services through June 30, 2021.

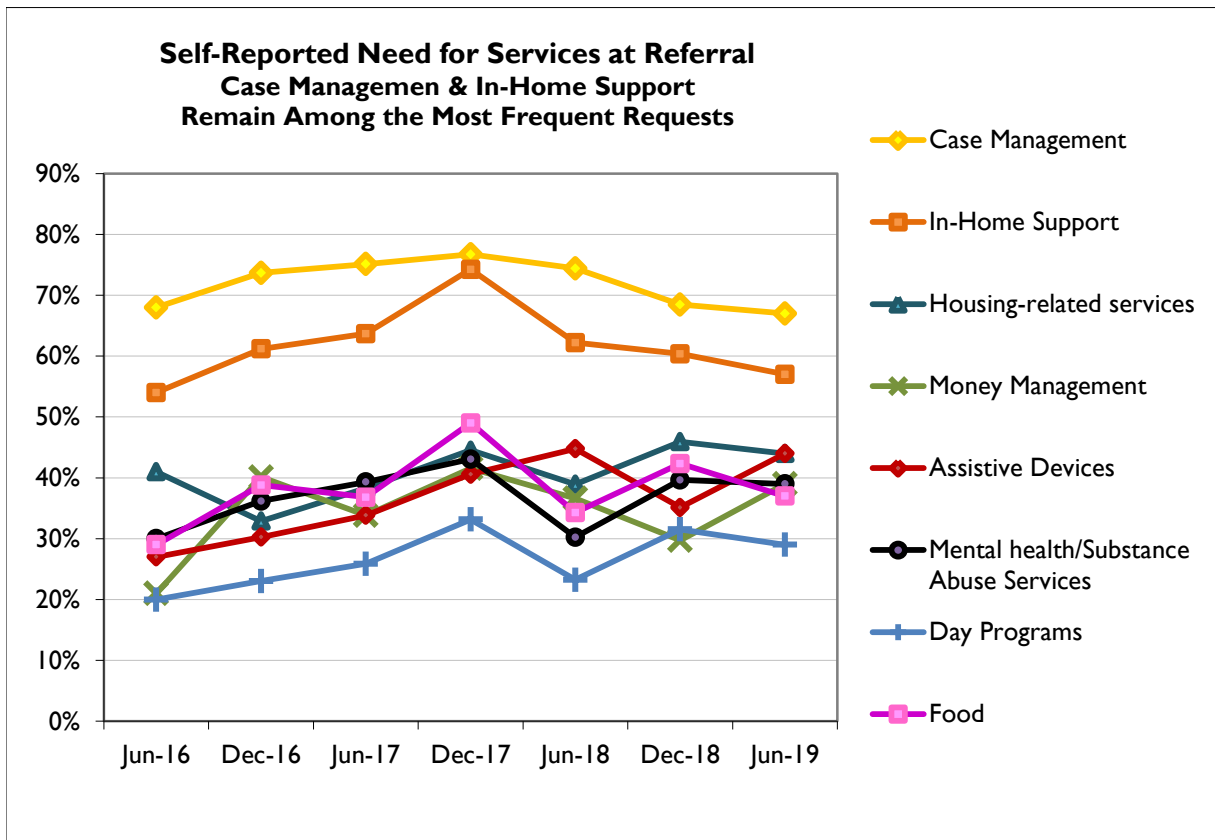
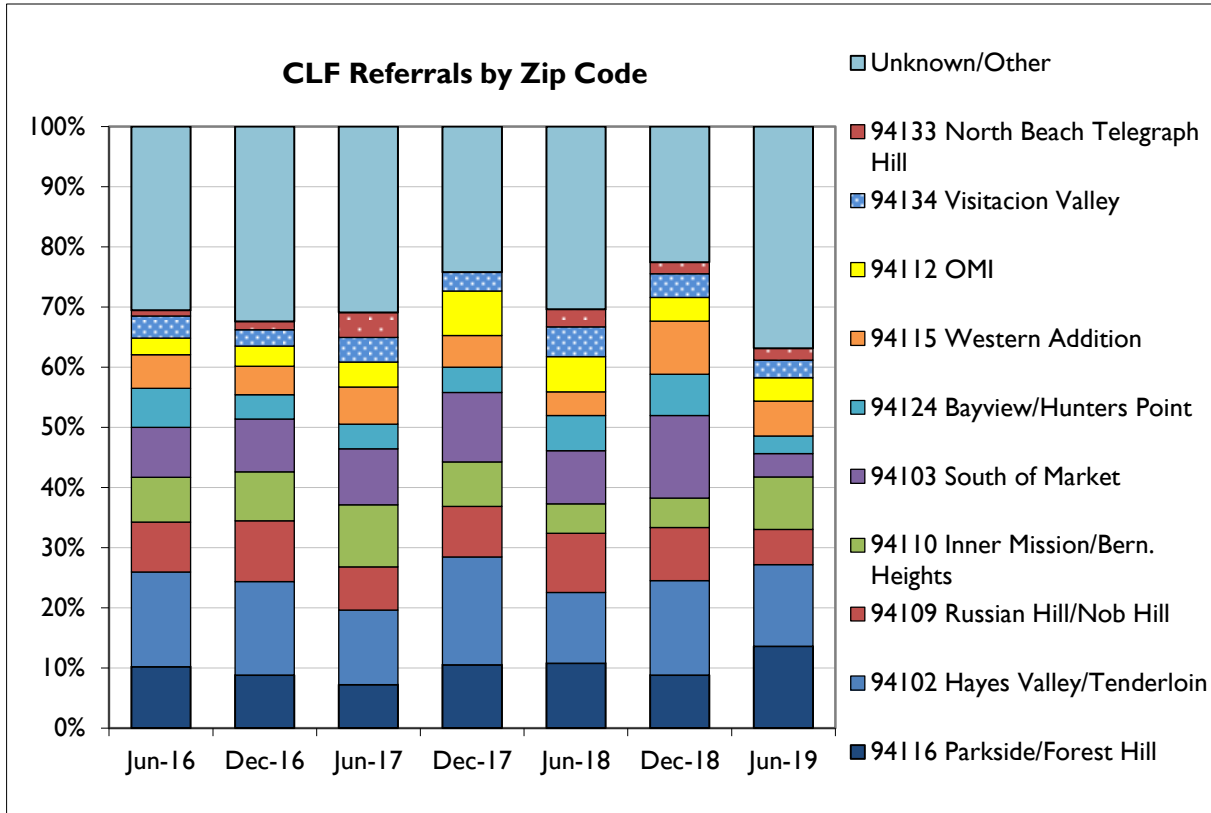

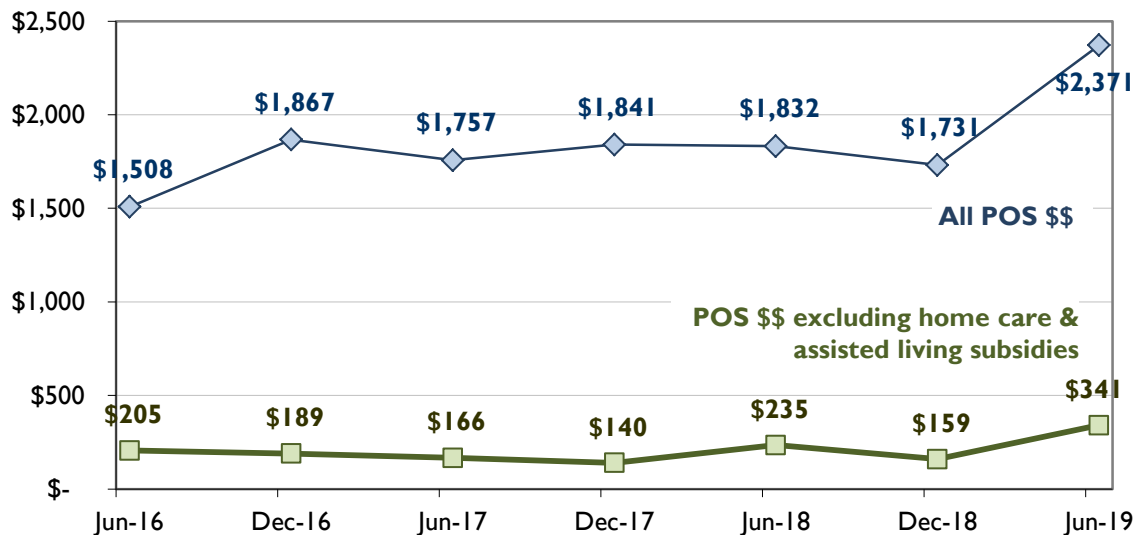

Expenditures at CLF increase, primarily due to growth in Home Care and Assisted Living costs

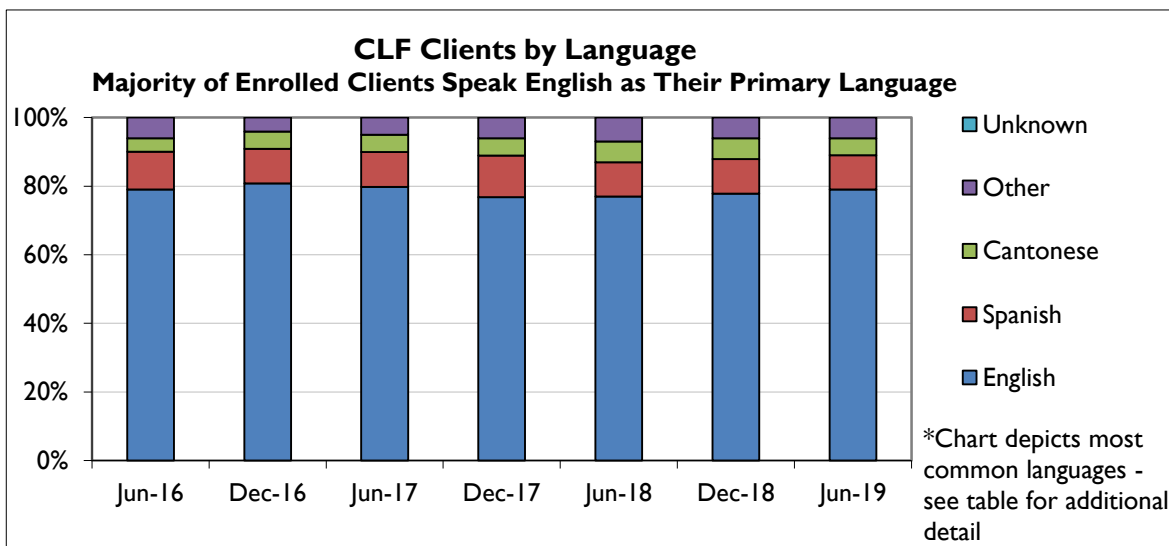
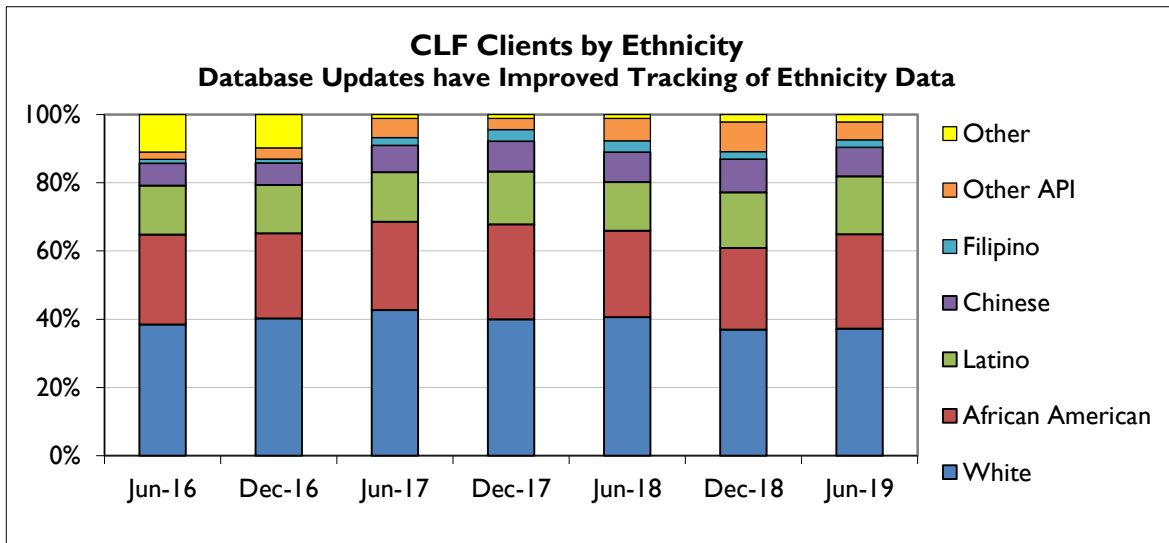
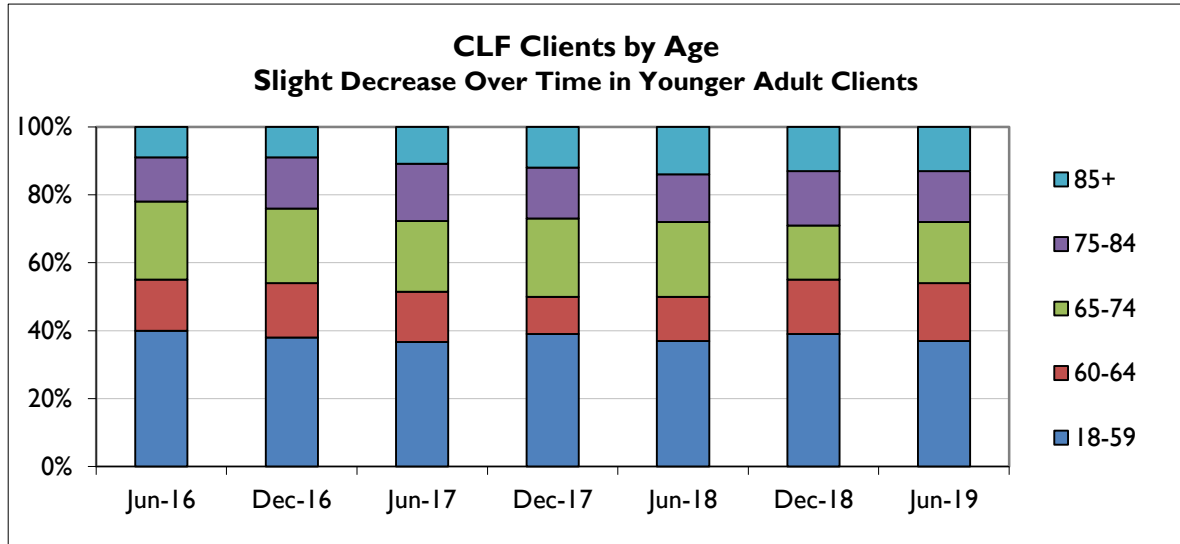


Average Monthly Purchase of Service (POS) Cost Per Client for CLF Clients with Any Purchases:
Rates higher than prior years due to increase in Home Care and Assisted Living, as well as a handful of higher cost home modifications and assistive devices

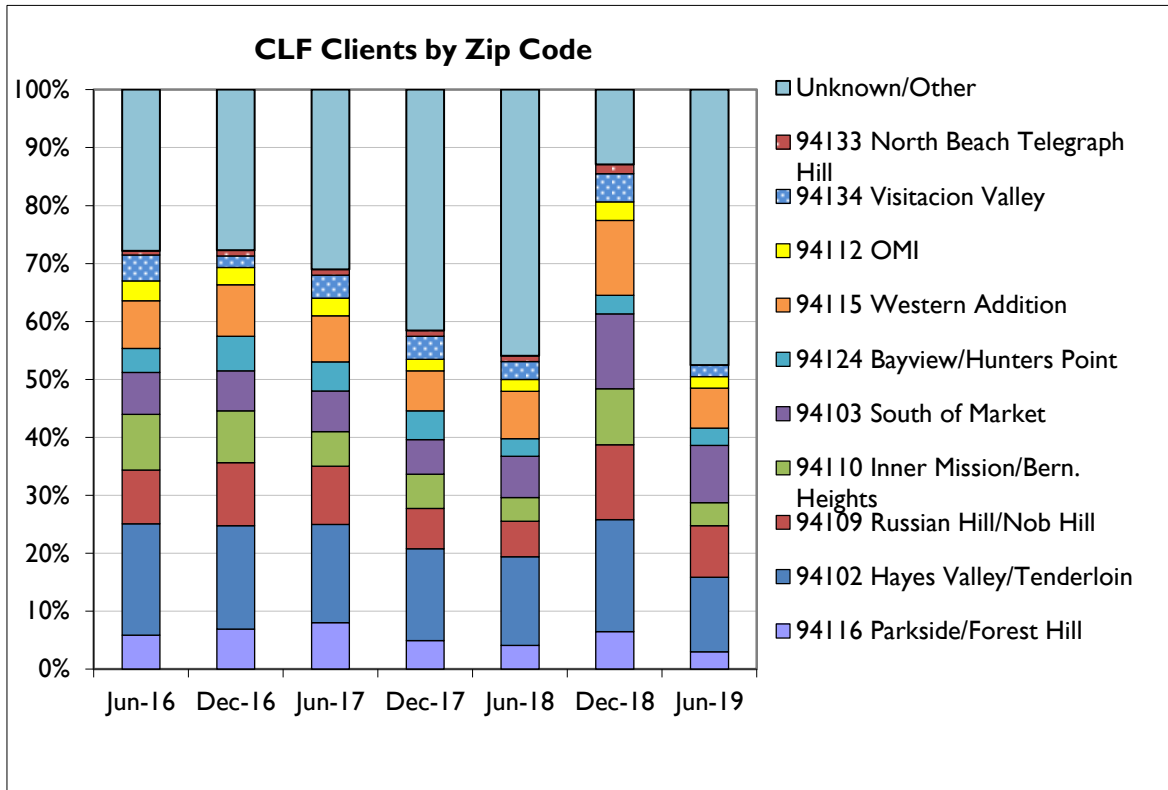

**Re: Response to False and Misleading Claims in BAAQMD letter of September 19, 2019
regarding Greenaction and the India Basin Mixed Use Project**

Dear Mayor Breed and Board of Supervisors,

On September 19th, the Bay Area Air Quality Management District wrote to you to attempt to counter statements made by Greenaction for Health and Environmental Justice that BAAQMD claimed “could be misleading” or were allegedly inaccurate about the India Basin Mixed Use Project, and BAAQMD’s position on that project.

However, it is BAAQMD that is making misleading and inaccurate claims – adding to the ongoing attempt by government agencies to whitewash the India Basin Mixed Use Project despite the EIR’s conclusion that the project poses a significant air pollution threat to the health and environment of Bayview Hunters Point residents that cannot be mitigated to less than significant.

1. BAAQMD’s September 19th letter alleges Greenaction inaccurately said in a press release that BAAQMD “opposes” the India Basin project - despite us never saying that. We did accurately state that BAAQMD on August 28th wrote to the Board of Supervisors raising serious concerns about the project’s air emissions, which did constitute a reversal of their earlier statements.

2. BAAQMD claimed in their September 19th letter that they never supported the project, despite writing to the Board of Supervisors on October 10, 2018 with an explicit statement of support:

“Air District supports mixed-use and infill projects

*The Air District has long recognized the importance of mixed-use and infill projects, **such as this***

Project, to help the Bay Area reach its air quality goals.” (italics and bold added for emphasis)

The above statement clearly shows the BAAQMD itself used the word “support” on October 10, 2018 to describe their view of this project.

3. On August 28, 2019, after being challenged by Greenaction to do a more thorough review of the EIR document, BAAQMD wrote to you about the India Basin Mixed Use Project, stating the following:

“...any increase in air pollution of the current disproportionate burden in eastern San Francisco is unacceptable. The Air District is concerned about the potential impact of the construction and operation of the Project.” (bold and italics added for emphasis)

BAAQMD’s August 28th letter of concern about the potential impact on air quality from the construction and operation of the project – and describing any increase in air pollution in eastern San Francisco (which the EIR concluded would result) as “unacceptable” - was proper, accurate, and long overdue. Therefore, we believe it is accurate to state that this was a reversal of BAAQMD self-described support for the project.

The August 28th letter from BAAQMD also clearly contradicts their prior incorrect claims that the proposed India Basin project would help the Bay Area achieve its air quality goals.

4. The September 19th BAAQMD letter also addresses possible transportation mitigation measures to reduce project impacts, but fails to mention that the EIR concluded that the air quality impacts would be significant, harmful, ongoing during construction and operations, and could not be mitigated to less than significant **even with mitigation**.

The fact that the air quality impacts of the project as currently proposed cannot be mitigated to less than significant is precisely why the City had to adopt a Statement of Overriding Considerations pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act.

5. BAAQMD’s September 19th letter makes the following additional false and misleading claim:
The Greenaction press release states that the project “could result in exceedances and violations of air quality standards.” We do not believe this is demonstrated in the EIR.

Contrary to BAAQMD’s assertion, this information is directly from the EIR.

Apparently, BAAQMD still has not read the Final EIR document (Responses to Comments on Draft EIR <http://sfmea.sfplanning.org/India%20Basin%20Final%20RTC.pdf>) which states in relevant part on pages 2-20 to 2-21:

*“The Draft EIR concluded that the proposed project would generate emissions of criteria pollutants and precursors during construction, operations, and overlapping construction and operational activities that **could violate an air quality standard, contribute substantially to an existing or projected air quality violation**, or result in a cumulatively considerable net increase in criteria pollutants....Area-source emissions with the revised proposed project would...also continue to **exceed the thresholds of significance**. Therefore, the impact of the revised proposed project would be significant and unavoidable with mitigation, the same impact conclusion as reported in the Draft EIR for the proposed project.”* (bold and italics added for emphasis)

6. As the EIR’s conclusion made clear, the project would cause harm to the overburdened and at risk residents of Bayview Hunters Point – even with mitigation. While we support mitigation to reduce impacts of harmful projects such as the India Basin Mixed Use Project, transportation mitigation alone will not be adequate to protect public health from the air pollution this proposed project would generate. The only way this project’s negative impact on air quality and health can be reduced to less than significant would be to substantially reduce the size of the project, along with adoption and implementation of transportation mitigation measures.

7. We again remind City/County officials that the Planning Department, Planning Commission and Board of Supervisors improperly approved this project despite refusing to provide language access to the many non-English speaking residents of the affected community. Failing to translate public notices and key documents denied non-English speaking residents their right to participate in decisions affecting their lives – a violation of their civil rights and human rights.

8. We want to be clear that we support the cleanup of the India Basin Shoreline Park, although we are concerned about the air pollution that would impact the area if the Mixed Use Project proceeds as planned. We look forward to working with the City, neighbors and regulatory agencies to ensure the cleanup is done thoroughly and as safely as possible.

9. Will the City of San Francisco – and BAAQMD – act to protect public health of its most vulnerable and overburdened residents, or will it protect the profits of BUILD LLC?

Dear Ms. Calvillo:

Bay Area Air Quality Management District (Air District) staff has met with San Francisco Planning staff regarding the India Basin Mixed Use Project (Project) and air quality and health issues in Eastern San Francisco. These discussions focused on the Project's potential air quality impacts and effective measures to minimize exposure to fine particulate matter (PM_{2.5}) from the Project's construction and operation activities. We are writing to offer to work with the City of San Francisco on minimizing impact from the Project as well as on a comprehensive, community-scale, air quality plan for vulnerable neighborhoods in eastern San Francisco.

PM_{2.5} is by far the most harmful air pollutant in the Air District's jurisdiction in terms of public health. Scientific evidence indicates that both long-term and short-term exposure to PM_{2.5} can cause a wide range of health effects, such as aggravating asthma, bronchitis, respiratory and cardio-vascular symptoms, and contributing to heart attacks and death.

Bayview-Hunters Point and other parts of eastern San Francisco experience higher PM_{2.5} levels than much of the region. The combination of higher pollution levels and poor health conditions led the Air District to highlight eastern San Francisco as an impacted community through our Community Air Risk Evaluation (CARE) program and, more recently, through our Assembly Bill (AB) 617 Community Health Protection Program. The Air District has identified eastern San Francisco as a high priority community for the development of a community-developed, community-specific air quality plan under AB 617. This plan would be a good mechanism for considering and identifying strategies to reduce sources of PM_{2.5} impacting these communities, including the India Basin Mixed Use Project.

Because the Project is located in a health-vulnerable zip code, the City of San Francisco used a more stringent benchmark for analyzing PM_{2.5} impacts than State or Federal PM_{2.5} health standards.¹ Air District staff's review of the City's analysis identified that the combination of this stringent benchmark, in combination with conservative modeling assumptions, indicated that Project operations could result in

high PM_{2.5} emissions affecting the community. While the conservative analysis may overestimate the likelihood of the impact, we believe it was an appropriate approach because any increase in air pollution above the current disproportionate burden in eastern San Francisco is unacceptable.

The Air District is concerned about the potential impact of the construction and operation of the Project. The Air District understands that the environmental impact report included a comprehensive set of measures to reduce the Project's air pollutant emissions including requiring the cleanest construction equipment, a robust transportation demand management program, and transit improvements, among other mitigation measures. It is of critical importance that emissions are minimized to the maximum extent possible to keep the actual burden as low as possible, especially from operations. The development needs to be well served by transit to minimize the use of light duty vehicles, and any air pollution sources must be considered cumulatively to ensure protection of public health.

The Air District is happy to continue working with the City to provide technical assistance and support on measures to reduce a project's air pollution burden, and invite the City to partner with the Air District, California Air Resources Board (CARB), and key local stakeholders in the Community Health Protection Program (AB 617) to ensure we together successfully addresses air quality and public health burdens in eastern San Francisco.

In addition, as you know, SB 1000 requires cities like San Francisco to include environmental justice (EJ) policies within their General Plan for which air quality will be a significant consideration. We understand the City is initiating the development of EJ policies and would like to offer our support and assistance. The Air District has deep experience developing proactive health equity policies, plan guidance such as our guidance document *Planning Healthy Places* and working with local community partners. Our staff is ready and able to assist the City and look forward to partnering with you on efforts to continue improving air quality and health outcomes in San Francisco. Dear Ms. Cohen and Ms. Calvillo

Bay Area Air Quality Management District (Air District) staff made public comments at the October 2, 2018 Board Hearing regarding the India Basin EIR Appeal. These comments were regarding the Project's air quality mitigation measures to minimize exposure to fine particulate matter (PM_{2.5}) from the Project's construction and operation activities. PM_{2.5} is by far the most harmful air pollutant in the Air District's jurisdiction in terms of public health. Scientific evidence indicates that both long-term and short-term exposure to PM_{2.5} can cause a wide range of health effects, such as aggravating asthma, bronchitis, respiratory and cardio-vascular symptoms, and contributing to heart attacks and death.

Bayview-Hunters Point and other parts of eastern San Francisco experience higher PM_{2.5} levels than much of the region. The combination of higher pollution levels and a community particularly vulnerable to air pollution led the Air District to highlight eastern San Francisco as an impacted community through our Community Air Risk Evaluation (CARE) program and, more recently, through our Community Health Protection Program we are developing in response to AB 617.

In the spirit of protecting public health and in response to the October 10th memo from Lisa Gibson to Angela Calvillo regarding Appeal of the Certification of the Project EIR, we would like to elaborate and clarify on the October 2, 2018 comments as follows:

The Project's analysis and mitigation measures are sufficient

Since the October 2, 2018 Board Hearing, Air District staff has reviewed City staff's responses intended to identify feasible mitigation measures in response to Air District comments at the Board Hearing. Air District staff greatly appreciates City staff's responsiveness to our concerns. Air District staff agrees that the Project's analysis of and mitigation measures for PM_{2.5} concentrations are sufficient. The Project's PM_{2.5} analysis adheres to recommended Air District methods. Where the Project's analysis diverges from Air District methods, the methods are more stringent and, thus, more health protective. These more stringent methods rely on the City's Community Risk Reduction Plan and Project-specific emissions analysis. In sum, the result is a rigorous and highly health-protective analysis of both background and Project-specific emissions.

Air District supports mixed-use and infill projects

The Air District has long recognized the importance of mixed-use and infill projects, such as this Project, to help the Bay Area reach its air quality goals. Mixed-use and infill projects that provide jobs and housing in urban areas with excellent access to transit and short distances between residential, employment, retail, and recreational uses help to reduce transportation emissions. Transportation emissions include criteria air pollutants (including PM_{2.5}), greenhouse gas emissions, and diesel particulate matter and other toxic air contaminants. The Air District and City staff have an excellent partnership

As stated at the October 2, 2018 Board Hearing, the City has been a great partner to the Air District. In addition to adopting a Greenhouse Gas Reduction Strategy, the City is the only jurisdiction within the Air District to implement rigorous health protective policies within the rubric of a citywide Community Risk Reduction Plan to reduce the health impacts of air pollution citywide (and particularly for vulnerable populations). The City's risk reduction efforts to require new residential construction projects located in the City's Air Pollution Exposure Zones to install enhanced ventilation to protect residents from air pollution, the City has also adopted a Construction Dust Control Ordinance and the Clean Construction Ordinance. Air District staff greatly appreciates San Francisco's commitment to reducing air pollution emissions and exposure. City staff's response to Air District's concerns the week of October 1, 2018 about the Project is just another example of staff's responsiveness and flexibility.

Air District staff approaches this collaboration as technical experts on air pollution and climate issues. We do not make land use decisions; that is the appropriate role for City staff and decision makers. We are committed to continue to work with you to assure that air quality, health, and climate impacts are analyzed correctly and minimized to the greatest extent possible.

In sum, Air District staff greatly appreciates the opportunity to work with the City to address air quality impacts on this Project and others. We look forward to a meeting with City staff soon to discuss ways the Air District and City can work to improve our air quality consultation process. NOTICE OF PACIFIC GAS AND ELECTRIC COMPANY'S REQUEST TO INCREASE RATES FOR THE CATASTROPHIC EVENT MEMORANDUM ACCOUNT (CEMA) (A.19-09-012)

Summary

On September 13, 2019, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) filed its 2019 Catastrophic Event Memorandum Account (CEMA) application with the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC).

The application seeks recovery of \$159.3 million for costs related to PG&E's 2017 and 2018 fire and storm emergency response.

The scope of this application is thirteen catastrophic events, including multiple wildfires and a storm spanning from mid-2017 through 2018. This application does not include the 2015 Butte Fire, 2017 North Bay Fires or the 2018 Camp Fire. If the CPUC approves this application, PG&E will begin to recover costs in electric and gas rates beginning January 1, 2021. PG&E is proposing the recovery of costs and any rate increase to mostly occur over one-year starting in 2021, with smaller amounts recovered in 2022.

Background

CEMA is used to record unexpected costs incurred as a result of significant events declared to be disasters by the state of California or federal authorities. Costs are related to the following:

- Safely restoring utility services to customers during declared natural disasters
- Repairing, replacing or restoring damaged utility facilities
- Complying with governmental agency orders

Climate change is affecting weather patterns and field conditions in California, including extreme weather, drought, heat waves, and changes in precipitation levels and timing. This is leading to more frequent declared emergencies and larger-scale response events.

How will the application affect electric rates?

Most customers receive bundled electric service from PG&E, meaning they receive electric generation, transmission and distribution services.

Based on rates currently in effect, the bill for a typical residential Non-CARE customer using 500 kWh per month would increase from \$118.05 to \$119.41 or 1.1%. Actual impacts will vary depending on energy usage.

Direct Access and Community Choice Aggregation customers only receive electric transmission and distribution services from PG&E. On average, these customers would see an increase of 1.5%.

Another category of nonbundled customers is Departing Load. These customers do not receive electric generation, transmission or distribution services from PG&E. However, these customers are required to pay certain charges by law or CPUC decision. The impact of PG&E's application on these customers is an average increase of 0.5%.

Detailed rate information was provided in a bill insert sent directly to customers.

How will the application affect gas rates?

Bundled gas customers receive transmission, distribution, and procurement services from PG&E. Based on rates currently in effect, the gas bill for a typical residential non-CARE customer averaging 34 therms per month would increase from \$53.56 to \$53.59, or 0.05%.

Commissioners,

1. The name "Reduced Risk Pesticide List" is misleading - giving the public a false impression that chemicals on the list are safe for people and the environment.
It must be changed, unless you or the Department of the Environment can explain how and from what the "risk" has been reduced.

2. Such explanation is clearly impossible for high toxicity herbicides: the plants against which such herbicides are used are not linked to health and environmental problems, while the herbicides themselves are. Numerous scientific studies associate exposure to herbicides of all kinds with cancer, developmental and learning disabilities, nerve and immune system damage, liver or kidney damage, multiple sclerosis, Parkinson's disease, diabetes, infertility, birth defects, disruption of gut microbiomes, and of the endocrine system.

3. As you should know, three California juries found Monsanto guilty in causing plaintiffs' non-Hodgkin lymphomas and lying to the public about safety of glyphosate products, with the last verdict of \$2 billion in punitive damages. There are now more than 18,000 plaintiffs making similar claims. The lawsuits allege that Monsanto was aware of scientific research showing an association between its herbicides and cancer but rather than warn consumers the company worked to suppress the research and manipulate scientific literature.

4. At the last Commission on the Environment's Policy Committee Meeting Dr Geiger explained that \$2 billion verdict was delivered not because Roundup is dangerous, but because Monsanto concealed the fact that Roundup is dangerous.

I want to emphasize that ROUNDUP IS DANGEROUS. People who are now suing the company wouldn't have used it at all, or wouldn't have used so much of it, if they were not misled.

San Francisco Commission on the Environment knows, or should know by now, that Roundup is dangerous.

So are other high toxicity herbicides on "Reduced Risk" list.

Please remove them from the list.

To the Residents of Sonoma County and other 2017 Wildfire Survivors:

On May 28, I issued a request to residential property insurance companies to consider the unique situation and the emotional and financial distress of their policyholders who suffered a total loss in the devastating 2017 wildfires by voluntarily agreeing to extend their additional living expenses coverage period to no less than 36 months for those policyholders.

So far, I am aware of only two major insurance companies representing many survivors — CSAA and Farmers — who responded affirmatively. No other companies have informed the Department that they intend to honor this request.

With benefits due to expire for many survivors, I renew my call to insurance companies to agree to my request and ask them to respond to the Department by October 8, the two-year anniversary of the deadly fires.

In the aftermath of the 2017 wildfires, the Department of Insurance and the California State Legislature recognized that, in these large scale natural disasters, 24 months does not provide sufficient time to remove debris, obtain all necessary building permits, locate and hire a contractor and multiple subcontractors, and completely rebuild these destroyed homes.

As a result, the passage of Senate Bill 894 (Dodd and McGuire, Chapter 618, Statutes of 2018), Assembly Bill 1772 (Aguiar-Curry and Wood, Chapter 627, Statutes of 2018), and Assembly Bill 1800 (Levine, Chapter 628, Statutes of 2018) increased the 24 month mandatory ALE coverage period to a minimum of 36 months if a policyholder acting in good faith and with reasonable diligence encounters delays in the reconstruction process of their home.

However, the amendments to existing law became effective on September 21, 2018, applying only to claims that arose on and after that date. Accordingly, these changes to the law do not apply to the 2017 wildfires.

This month my department affirmed the legality of those laws for survivors of the terrible 2018 wildfires, which some insurance companies had questioned.


I have also instructed my Department to investigate whether ALE contractors sent misleading notices to Sonoma County survivors informing them that “move-out” letters would be sent to their landlords within days. Insurance companies employ ALE contractors to assist survivors with obtaining temporary housing. I am concerned these notices may have caused survivors more

distress and confusion and request that all insurers review their current claims practices on this issue. I urge people who received these notices to contact my Department at 800-927-4357.

Today, many survivors are on the path to rebuilding their homes and lives. Local leaders and community groups have rallied around survivors to clear away obstacles. To date, my Department has assisted 1,000 survivors of the 2017 wildfires with their insurance issues and was able to recover more than \$100 million for them. But the extraordinary circumstances of the 2017 fires still persist.

In light of these facts I renew my call to insurance companies to extend ALE coverage and work with their policyholders who remain in limbo due to circumstances beyond their control. I also urge survivors to continue to contact the Department of Insurance at 800-927-4357 so we can assist you with claims and other questions.

In one children's playground we visited, there were wrappers that once held drugs and caps of syringes.

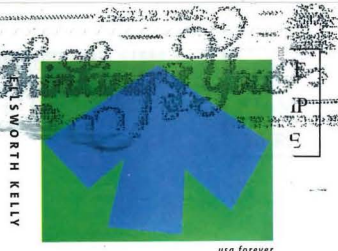
