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My name is Vicente Padilla and I would like to be considered for the advisory work group committee.

I currently teach social studies and career education at Woodside Learning Center, at the Juvenile Justice Center scheduled to close in 2021. I have been teaching youth within the San Francisco Court School system for 25 years. I spent 12 years at the Real Alternatives Program and 13 years at Woodside Learning Center. My life has been dedicated to helping at risk youth learn the importance of education and realize there are better paths and opportunities in life than the streets. I fell into this work because I too grew up in the Mission District and struggled in my youth, the same as the kids I serve. I experienced first-hand the power of community programs, which helped me turn my life around and I saw we could all make a difference in young people's lives and decided to follow that path in education.

I am applying to be on this advisory work group committee because I really care about what type of program services will be offered to our youth. I most likely will teach at one of these locations and would love to be involved with creating a successful, effective program. I have spent the last 30 years working with at risk youth and teaching within a variety of educational designs and models. I taught at the Real Alternatives Program (RAP) from 1993 to 2006 and RAP was an alternative to incarceration for youth. RAP's youth case managers would come up to YGC to represent youth and present RAP as an alternative plan to being locked up. We provided wrap around services for the "identified" needs of the youth and it was evident how community programs, working together, could turn around many young people's lives. Many of our RAP youths went on to become community organizers, founded HOMEYS and became successful working adults. This was 25 years ago and RAP was leading the way in its design and model across the country. I learned many things from being at RAP. However, in 2006 with protest and objections from myself, many of the staff, youth and families, our school was shut down. The idea was to send these students to one location (Civic Center) and we knew our students would not go. As a result, many youths ended up in the streets. I was then transferred to Woodside Learning Center where I saw many of these same youths come there, which was very sad and frustrating. The experience with RAP helped me realize how important it is to have a collaboration of programs servicing the needs of the youth with their input. This was the best way to create an effective program.

My experience at Woodside and Juvenile Justice Center has been a very positive one. The school staff and counselors have worked well over the years and have done an amazing job in helping our youth, with many success stories to speak of. In spite of this success, it is my belief that incarceration is not the best action. The most effective structure for at risk youth, is to remain in a community strongly supported by effectively run community programs. I have seen this work better.

Therefore, I am very supportive of the move to bring the schools back to the communities. I support this move and feel our youth will have a better chance for effective change. I would love to have the opportunity to be directly involved with this process. I have vast years of experience working with this student population, collaborating with community programs and I've seen many types of programs work and fall. For example, I've learned a school program designed for at-risk youth, must have most services on site. Years of experience has shown me that expecting our youth to travel from one place to another, for services, may not work best. Also, it is important to consider that many youths will not go into certain neighborhoods because of turf issues. In my years I've learned, that youth should "check in first" to a mental health service or activity in order to get ready for an academic class, as opposed to walking into 4 straight academic courses, upset from a traumatic event the night before. I know that state education codes for court schools offer creative ways in achieving credits for graduating high school, something I feel many folks aren't aware of. We also have to create services for the student's families too! Some student's parents need help and without it, some youth will not be able to move forward. Last, the youth themselves should be a part of the whole planning process because they know best what types of art, job, mental health programs will engage them the most and we need that input. For all these reasons and more, I feel I would be a great fit and an asset to this committee. I hope you will consider adding me to your team. Thank you for your consideration.

I have had the pleasure of studying, supporting and providing technical and organizational support to these organization allowing me to see the possibilities of creative community initiated opportunities to keep youth away from detention and serve youth as alternatives to the detention.

In addition to this, I have served as an advocate for families in San Francisco that were impacted by homelessness and poverty in San Francisco as the Policy and Advocacy specialist the Homeless Prenatal Program.

I have been developing relationships with and serving our vulnerable youth since 1992. While I do not personally represent a diverse demographic, my undersatnding and love of neighborhoods within the city does provide me with a unique perspetive. We intentionally located our agency outside of the traditionally under resourced neighborhoods so that we would be able to be neutral and develop relationships with youth from all neighborhoods. Most of our youth come from neighborhoods in the Fillmore, Bayview Hunter's Point and the Sunnydale area, and I know and have been accepted by many families therein. I spend a considerable amount of time in the homes of youth who live in different (often battling) areas of SF. I have spent a considerable Eamduocunatiofnti:me in Juvenile Court and Juvenile Hall, and I understand the connected nature of this conversation to equity, SFUSD, SFPD, and other systems and areas that affect the lives of these youth. One of my most important qualifications is my training in Philosophy. This has taught me to ask the right questions and see different perspectives. It is a central part of true coalition building.

Business and/or professional experience:

I co-founded Sunset Youth Services in 1992, and have been working closely with both the Juvenile Justice System and the adult. During the past 26 years, I have become intimately familiar with all of the sysems that affect the lives of our most vulnerable youth and their families. I have also developed a respectful relationship with most of the Probation Oficers within JPD, as well as defense attorneys, Judges, District Attorneys and other people involved in this system. I currently also work closely with Young Adult Court, and am interseted in incorporating some of the ideas we utilize in there to the juvenile system. I have been a member of the JJPA since 2004, and was chair for several years. I piloted a program at Log Cabin Ranch that combined music produiction and workforce development with the youth there (most with whom I still have a relationship). I also negotiated this same program (as well as other programs) to work insinde Juvenile Hall.

Civic Activities:

I sat on the JDAI committee to desdign the JDAI program at JPD. I sat on the committe (with police commissioners) to redisgn SFPD DGO 7.0.1 (police prodedures surrounding interrogating juveniles). I currently am on the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council. I also sat on the SFPD Chief's juvenile advisory council and forum under two different chiefs. I sat on the state-mandated committee for the evaluation of Juvenile Hall. I was placed on the committee to redesign Log Cabin Ranch before that process was dissolved. I have a long history of working collaboratively with most CBOs in San Francisco that also work with young poeple in the system, and am intimately familiar with most other agencies who work in this area. I co-wrote a paper entitled "Smart Compassion: Why We Must Invest in Attachment Communities". Based on best personal experience, as well as research, I do believe that this concept of healing attachments and connectivity has more of offer youth than any punitive system we could develop.

I am a native San Franciscan, raised in the Haight/Ashbury, where we lived for over 50 years. I grew up in a home where domestic violence was a normal state of being, my Mother was an alcoholic and my Father was a workaholic. We had a big family, there were five of us. My oldest sister died from a heroin overdose when she was 21, she had a son, who is developmentally delayed, that I take care of. When my parents passed away, I was no longer able to sustain the home and gentrification moved us out of the neighborhood. I attended Gratten Elementary, Herbert Hoover Middle, and St. Marys Cathedral High School. As an African American female growing up here, I've learned some of my most valuable lessons on these streets. I've been addicted to drugs (crack), homeless, sexually abused and exploited, a domestic violence survivor, and crossed paths with the criminal justice system. After several years in Delancey Street, I regained my sense of self and was able to turn my life around. I went back to school, earned a graduate degree, MSW, so I could continue my life's work of championing, advocating and supporting the youth and families of this great city. For the past 20 years I have been inspired by the youth, families, and colleagues who continue to fight for equity, diversity and inclusion. My experiences, both professionally and personally, have equipped me to be the ideal candidate for this work group.

After losing my father at an early age, my single-mom worked extremely hard to make ends meet after migrating with my brother and I from India to fulfill my father's dream for us to live the American life. Having a unique name, being bilingual in Gujarati, and having a prominent British accent when first migrating, my experiences attending San Francisco's public schools made me vulnerable to ridicule and confusion, but particularly memorable were the adults that ridiculed me as I thought they should have known better than to mock a young person. As a victim of violence, profiling, sexism, and racism while living in San Francisco, I can still recognize this city as one of the best places for a diverse family to flourish in California. I reside in the Richmond District and work in the Mission, and have worked at my current community-based non-profit agency, the Center on Juvenile and Criminal Justice (CJCJ), for over 15 years. CJCJ serves justice-involved youth, adults, and families and as the Deputy Director I supervise and support direct service programs throughout our San Francisco community.

Business and/or professional experience:

As CJCJ's Deputy Director and Director of our Children's Walting Rooms and Juvenile Collaborative Reentry Unit programs, I oversee all aspects of the agency's programs, Including operational, fiscal, and contractual processes. I am proficient in analyzing budgets and associated funding streams, and identifying solutions for varying financial challenges given my experiences in non-profit management. I am the co-chair of the San Francisco Juvenile Justice Providers Association (JJPA) and an active member of Mayor London Breed's Juvenile Justice Reform Blue Ribbon Panel. I am also a member of the Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council (JJCC) and a member of the San Francisco Children of Incarcerated Parents Partnership (SFCIPP).

In 2011, I co-authored Renewing Juvenile Justice, which formed the foundation for the statewide Positive Youth Justice Initiative, offering model designs for juvenile justice reform. Prior to the initiative, with the support of the Sierra Health Foundation, I organized and facilitated visits to model programs and juvenile halts to identify healthy components of various existing systems. I was CJCJ's lead technical assistance contact and provided support to counties regarding strategies to build a local sustainable delivery of wraperound services for justice-involved youth through partnerships and by maximizing available funding streams. I co-presented a poster session in Washington, DC at the national Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP) conference.

Civic Activities:

Being a naturalized citizen and having earned the right to vote, I take my civic duty seriously and have never missed the opportunity to vote in a San Francisco election. After graduating with my Master's degree in Public Administration and Bachelor's degrees in Criminal Justice and Child and Adolescent Development from San Francisco State University and having worked in the field and building my reputation as a hard-working community-member, I was invited to be a member of the San Francisco State University MPA Advisory Board. I am regularly advocating for the well-being and safety of children and families involved in the justice system and for our local community and provide public comment at Juvenile Probation Commission meetings and while attending varying Board of Supervisors hearings. Currently I volunteer at my niece and nephew's elementary school and am a volunteer with the San Francisco Friends of the Public Library. I have previously spent over a decade volunteering in my community in and out of the field to include my time with the AIDS Emergency Fund, Edgewood - Center for Children and Families, Prisoner Legal Services in the San Francisco County Jail, the San Francisco Police Department, the Animal Resource Center in the education department in the San Francisco Zoological Gardens, and the Police Activities League Law Enforcement Cadet Program. I have previously received training from the San Francisco Fire Department 's Neighborhood Emergency Response Team and am passionate about community safety and well-being.

It is my pleasure to recommend Kandy Kalani Iofopo (KI) to be appointed to Vacant Seat 5 of the Close Juvenile Hall Working Group. I have known KI for three years as their mentor and co-worker, and have witnessed KI do quite remarkable work as an educator, advocate, and counselor with young women (and men) who have been involved with the juvenile justice system.

KI brings multiple assets to the task: an understanding of juvenile justice from the inside out- not only the experience of incarceration- but a contextual understanding of the correctional system, the root causes of juvenile offenses, and the psychological and cultural impact incarceration can have on young people. This has made KI a solid contributor to the city's recent discourses and debates.

KI's cultural origins also compliment a sensibility and sensitivity about issues involving social behavior and responsibility. The Samoan heritage may be a key factor in KI's own personal rehabilitation and success as a community leader and scholar. It is imbued with a powerful demand for accountability while at the same time believing deeply in forgiveness and redemption. It is also inherently collective, requiring that the village take care of all children.

If selected, KI will bring a maturity, critical awareness, logic, and affability to this working group. I have worked with KI as both a student and co-facilitator and delight in KI's deep commitment and knowledge.

I had a neighborhood "auntie" in the Fillmore District who worked at the Youth Guidance Center many years ago, long before sensible and forward-looking alternatives to incarceration were being considered. She often lamented that so many children of color seemed to be trapped in a "cycle-" she was intimating what some now call the 'school-to-prison' pipeline. I personally escaped the minefields of poverty and structural oppression, but lost many friends to those realities. To know KI is to know that thoughtful, critical programs such as the Young Women's Freedom Center (KI's organization) are indeed essential to our development of new, progressive policies and projects that respond not only to the need to reform juvenile justice, but the root causes of the distress that traumatizes young people, distress that is particularly devastating to young working class women of color.

KI can be a major asset to this group. I'm happy to see another native San Franciscan step up to represent the best spirit of this City.

Dear Ms. Nichols:

Andy intrinsically understood the mission to replace a control-custody model with care-rehabilitation approach and how much resistance there would be re; this change. Yet, he was able to bring people to the table and to influence not just the physical environment, but the program to empower kids to learn how to be normal.

As leader of the design team, Andy was constantly pushing the envelope as much as he could to make the New Beginnings Youth Development Center embody the department's mission. His vision was reflected in both the building and the program. Walls of windows and natural light connect kids to the outdoors. At New Beginnings, kids sleep in rooms that resemble dorm rooms that they can even exit at night to use the restroom. They can open windows and move (wooden, not metal) furniture. Staff and kids wear their own clothes, not uniforms. Andy helped everyone understand that if you want your charges to be regular kids, you have to treat them like regular kids; you don't do that by treating them like criminals and robbing them of diguity.

As the director of the DYRS at the time, I found working with Andy absolutely energizing. He advocated for improvements that have allowed New Beginnings to live up to its name, in facilities and in improved operations. Before, there was a separate administration building, people in procurement and bookkeeping didn't have any contact with the kids. Andy suggested adding an administration wing to the facility, so if you are in procurement, you see the torn soles on kids playing outside. This sped up procurement. Putting staff closer to the kids paid off in many ways. We got a bill passed that allowed staff to cat with the kids in the cafeteria. This fostered mentoring. The staff started calling kids by name. They also started coming up with their own ideas, like helping kids stage plays and musical performances. The staff created internship positions, so teenagers about to be released could do office work and gain job experience:

Andy led the design part of the effort that allowed these things to happen. He was always challenging us to do more and better. People doubted you could manage kids in an environment as rehabilitative as this one, but New Beginnings proved you can. New Beginnings experienced a 19 percent drop in recidivism 2 years after opening.

Andy's passion to rehabilitate people and thought leadership in how to accomplish this make him a most deserving Fellow, and I wholeheartedly recommend his elevation to the AIA College of Fellows:

Being the English teacher at the SF Juvenile Justice Center for the past 13 years has been the greatest honor of my life. I am aware that for students to become successful, productive, contributing adults, society must ensure a successful transition from the inside to the outside. Without support, my students often stop attending school, turn back to the streets, and find themselves in juvenile hall for violating probation or catching a new charge. As a teacher, I know that post-traumatic stress reactions predispose my students to reoffend and are responsible for much of the recidivism we see at the Juvenile Justice Center. Their stories scream with the societal inequities responsible for our children turning to the streets in lieu of a realistic solution to their problems. My students are part of a rich cultural environment that values artistic self-expression, but all too often they are not acknowledged, respected or treasured. We ask ourselves, "What should we do to change the shameful inequities that damage our society?" Yet rarely do we ask those imprisoned in the system what they think. Because I spend every day teaching incarcerated youth, I always ask them what they think, and with time, trust, and a trauma-informed and culturally responsive curriculum, my students share many aspects of their lives with me via writing and classroom discussions. The insight I have gained from knowing and listening to my students, gives me unique knowledge regarding their needs and experiences with regard to education, group homes, street life, and probation. I am enthusiastic to contribute some of what I have learned, so it may be of value as we reimagine the possibilities for our brilliant and resilient youth.

While working in custody at County Jail 5, I taught Restorative Justice, with a focus on Juvenile Justice and the pervasiveness of the School-to-Prison Pipeline. I have also facilitated Restorative workshops at San Quentin State Prison. I hold a strong belief in the vital role RJ will play as we move away from incarcerating our youth. For the past 1.5 years, I have also been teaching youth in the community, many of whom have prior or current involvement with the Juvenile Justice System. Prior to teaching, I did four years of research as a doctoral student-a skill that will certainly be of value in the planning and implementation of new, innovative policy. I am aware of the many structural impediments Justice System-involved individuals encounter, and the support these individuals need to succeed. Additionally, as a member of the LGBTQ community, I have an understanding of the unique needs of queer youth both in and out of carceral environments.

SEC. 5.40-1. CLOSE JUVENILE HALL WORKING GROUP.

The City hereby establishes the Close Juvenile Hall Working Group. (Added by Ord. 117-19, File No. 190392, App. 6/28/2019, Eff. 7/29/2019) SEC. 5.40-2. DEFINITIONS.

"CARC" means the Huckleberry Community Assessment and Resource Center.

"City" means the City and County of San Francisco.

"Court" means the San Francisco Superior Court Juvenile Division.

"Director" means the Director of the Human Rights Commission.

"DCYF" means the Department of Children Youth and Families.

"Juvenile Hall" means the locked detention facility at 375 Woodside Avenue in the City.

"Working Group" means the Close Juvenile Hall Working Group.

(Added by Ord. 117-19, File No. 190392, App. 6/28/2019, Eff. 7/29/2019)

SEC. 5.40-3. PURPOSE AND PRINCIPLES.

- (a) The purpose of the Working Group is to create a plan to:
 - (1) close Juvenile Hall by no later than December 31, 2021;
 - (2) strengthen and expand community-based alternatives to detention;
- (3) provide a rehabilitative, non-institutional place or places of detention, in a location approved by the Court, which is available for all wards of the Court and persons alleged to come within the jurisdiction of the Court;
- (4) reinvest any monies saved by the closure of Juvenile Hall in high-quality, effective, community-based alternatives to detention; an alternative, rehabilitative, non-institutional center for youth who are detained; and mental health and educational support for detained youth; and
- (5) preserve, protect and aim to expand the role of the public sector in the direct provision of juvenile rehabilitation services, both in community-based alternatives to detention and in any rehabilitative, non-institutional place or places of detention.
- (b) In carrying out this purpose, the Working Group shall be guided by the following principles:
- (1) A juvenile justice system should balance public safety, positive youth development, family and community health, and victim restoration.
- (2) Detention has a devastating impact on youth, their families, and their neighborhoods, and undermines the safety and health of both detained youth and their communities.

- (3) The rehabilitative goals of the juvenile justice system can best be accomplished in family-based settings in the communities where youth live.
- (4) The vast majority of young people in detention should be diverted from that system and given access to developmentally appropriate, trauma-informed programs and services that address racial and ethnic disparities.
- (5) Youth in the juvenile justice system and their families should have a role in identifying what kind of support would be most helpful to them.
- (6) Resources invested in Juvenile Hall should instead be invested in youth, their families, and community-based programs, including mental health and educational support.
- (7) Community-based programs that serve juvenile justice-involved young people should be supported, strengthened, and where appropriate, expanded.
- (8) Youth in the juvenile justice system should be referred to programs and court-ordered placements in the City whenever possible.
- (9) Juvenile Hall staff should be given the opportunity, consistent with civil service rules, to transfer to other jobs with the City or the San Francisco Unified School District once Juvenile Hall is closed.

(Added by Ord. <u>117-19</u>, File No. 190392, App. 6/28/2019, Eff. 7/29/2019) SEC. 5.40-4. MEMBERSHIP.

- (a) **Members.** The Working Group shall consist of 15 members as set forth below.
- (1) Seats 1 and 2 shall be held by representatives of community-based non-profits that serve juvenile justice-involved youth and are members of the Juvenile Justice Providers Association.
- (2) Seats 3 and 4 shall be held by persons under the age of 29 who were previously detained or incarcerated.
- (3) Seat 5 shall be held by a parent or guardian of a person who is or was detained as a youth in the juvenile justice system.
- (4) Seat 6 shall be held by an expert in the design of small, rehabilitative, and education-focused centers that meet the needs of young people who, following their arrest or detention, cannot return to their home or community.
- (5) Seat 7 shall be held by an expert in youth mental illness, with experience serving the juvenile justice population, and expertise in best practices for serving youth with mental illness.
- (6) Seat 8 shall be held by an expert in juvenile justice reform with experience in data analysis and the development of alternatives to detention.
 - (7) Seat 9 shall be held by a member of the labor community.
 - (8) Seats 10 and 11 shall be held by non-management employees working in Juvenile Hall.
- (9) Seat 12 shall be held by the Chief Juvenile Probation Officer or the Chief Juvenile Probation Officer's designee.
 - (10) Seat 13 shall be held by the Public Defender or the Public Defender's designee.
 - (11) Seat 14 shall be held by the District Attorney or the District Attorney's designee.
- (12) Seat 15 shall be held by a representative of the Court if the Court so chooses. While the Court is not required to provide a representative to hold this seat, it shall be invited to do so.
- (b) Seats 1-11 shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors. The Board shall strive to appoint members to the Working Group from communities disproportionately represented in the juvenile justice system and from the City's most marginalized communities. (Added by Ord. 117-19, File No. 190392, App. 6/28/2019, Eff. 7/29/2019)

 \square SEC. 5.40-5. ORGANIZATION AND TERMS OF OFFICE.

- (a) Members of the Working Group in Seats 1-11 shall serve at the pleasure of the Board of Supervisors and may be removed by the Board at any time. Each member in Seats 1-11 may remain in the Working Group until the termination of the Working Group under Section <u>5.40-7</u>, unless removed by the Board. Any vacancy in Seats 1-11 shall be filled by the Board.
- (b) Service in the Working Group shall be voluntary. Members appointed to Seats 1 through 9 may receive a stipend in an amount determined by the Board. Members appointed to seats 10 and 11 may receive their regular salaries for time spent on the Working Group because they are serving in an official capacity as representatives of their departments.
- (c) The Working Group shall strive to schedule meetings to accommodate the Working Group members so that all members may attend regularly. Any member in Seats 1-11 who, within a sixmonth period, misses three regular meetings of the Working Group without the express approval of the Working Group at or before the missed meeting shall be deemed to have resigned from the Working Group ten days after the third unapproved absence. The Working Group shall inform the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of any such resignation.
- (d) Subject to the fiscal and budgetary provisions of the Charter, the Director shall designate staff to provide administrative support to the Working Group.
- (e) Subject to the fiscal, budgetary, and civil service provisions of the Charter, the Director shall hire and make available to the Working Group an outside consultant with expertise in juvenile justice reform, program evaluation, data analysis, youth development, development of alternatives to detention, and juvenile justice systemic change. The outside consultant shall advise the Working Group, and, to the extent desired by the Working Group, may facilitate its meetings and compile required reports on behalf of the Working Group.
 - (f) Quorum. Eight members of the Working Group shall constitute a quorum.
- (g) Officers. The Working Group shall elect a Chairperson from its members. The Chairperson shall designate a member to serve in the Chairperson's absence.
- (h) **Subcommittees.** The Working Group may establish subcommittees to be convened as directed by the Working Group. The Working Group shall establish a Needs Assessment subcommittee. The Working Group's Chairperson or the Chairperson's designee shall appoint members to the subcommittees, and shall appoint members to the Needs Assessment subcommittee consistent with subsection <u>5.40-6(a)</u> of this Article. Subcommittees shall report findings and make recommendations to the full Working Group for its consideration.
- (i) Meeting Frequency. The Working Group shall meet at least every two months until Juvenile Hall is closed and a substitute place or places of detention are available for youth placement.
- (j) Roles of Members. In adopting this ordinance, the Board of Supervisors recognizes that each member in Seats 12-15 retains their authority and duties under State law and that where conflicts may arise out of members' dual roles, State powers and duties shall supersede the duties that this <u>Article XL</u> imposes on members.

(Added by Ord. <u>117-19</u>, File No. 190392, App. 6/28/2019, Eff. 7/29/2019) SEC. 5.40-6. POWERS AND DUTIES.

(a) The Working Group shall have the following powers and duties in the work focus areas described below:

WORK FOCUS AREA # 1: Based on data review, conduct a needs assessment for youth detained in Juvenile Hall. To conduct this assessment, the Working Group shall:

(1) Establish a "Needs Assessment subcommittee" to conduct a confidential review of juvenile delinquency case files to the extent that review is authorized by the Court. The Needs

Assessment subcommittee shall consist of the following four Working Group members: the Public Defender or the Public Defender's designee (Working Group Seat 13); a representative of a community-based non-profit that serves juvenile justice-involved youth and that is a member of the Juvenile Justice Providers Association (Working Group Seat 1 or 2); an expert in youth mental illness (Working Group Seat 7); and an expert in juvenile justice reform (Working Group Seat 8): 1

- (2) Request that the City Attorney petition the Court and request that the Court authorize the Juvenile Probation Department to allow Needs Assessment subcommittee members to access to 1 data contained in juvenile delinquency files and related juvenile records in the possession of the Juvenile Probation Department for the purpose of conducting the needs assessment.
- (3) Submit formal requests for aggregate, de-identified statistical data regarding the children detained in Juvenile Hall from the following departments and agencies: the Juvenile Probation Department, the Department of Public Health, the San Francisco Unified School District, and the Human Services Agency. The data requested shall include, but not be limited to: race, gender, age, charged offense and level, sustained offenses and level, disposition, length of stay in custody, number of prior delinquency contacts, number of probation violations or bench warrants, child welfare system involvement, disability status, prior school records that identify educational disbilities, mental health status, and prior referrals to community-based programs and services. The Juvenile Probation Department, Department of Public Health, and the Human Services Agency shall respond to data requests within two weeks of receiving the request.
 - (4) Identify gaps in existing community-based programs and services.
- (5) Evaluate the use of risk assessment tools, both quantitatively and qualitatively, to ensure that all young people who are eligible and safe to be released are in fact being released.
- (6) Create plans to transition youth leaving Juvenile Hall to appropriate, local non-institutional settings.

WORK FOCUS AREA # 2: Plan and design a small, rehabilitative and education-focused center for the placement of detained youth ("Center"). In developing the plan and design, the Working Group shall:

- (1) Analyze best practices for the administration and management of small rehabilitative non-institutional settings for youth, which may include consultation with designers, architects, experts in alternative models, and mental health and youth development experts. The analysis also may include examination of existing programs in other counties, states, or countries that have demonstrated rehabilitative success.
- (2) Collaborate with the Real Estate Division, the Capital Planning Committee, and local community-based organizations to identify local land or existing buildings that may be used for this Center.
 - (3) Create an implementation plan for this Center.

WORK FOCUS AREA #3: Determine the community-based residential or day-programs that need to be created, expanded, or reinstated to effectively serve wards of the Court and persons alleged to come within the jurisdiction of the Court who are not ordered detained by the Court. To make this determination, the Working Group shall:

- (1) Promptly identify a housing option in the City for youth who, following arrest or release from detention, cannot return to their homes, to replace the Catholic Charities San Francisco Girls Home Shelter closed in 2018 and the Boys Home Shelter closed in 2019.
- (2) Identify existing community-based day programs and housing options that may be expanded.

- (3) Identify new services or programs, including day services and housing options, which are needed to serve vulnerable youth populations.
- (4) In consultation with DCYF, the Department of Public Health, the Juvenile Probation Department, and the Human Rights Commission, create funding plans to ensure both the expansion of existing programs with a demonstrated record of success and the creation of new programs. The programs should include mental health services, educational services, employment opportunities, and mentoring opportunities, which are culturally-relevant, trauma-informed, strengths-based, and rooted in the local community. Where possible, these services should be available to youths' family members.

WORK FOCUS AREA # 4: The Working Group shall develop a plan to transition Juvenile Hall staff to jobs in other City departments or jobs with the San Francisco Unified School District or the alternative Center.

WORK FOCUS AREA # 5: Develop trauma-informed, culturally relevant transition plans, specialized services, and housing options for vulnerable youth exiting detention, including young women, gender non-conforming and LGBT youth, African American youth, immigrant, youth, foster youth, homeless youth, and mentally ill youth.

WORK FOCUS AREA # 6: Develop a reinvestment plan that redirects funds historically allocated for Juvenile Hall to community-based alternatives to detention, the Center, and additional mental health and academic support programs for juvenile justice-involved youth.

WORK FOCUS AREA #7: Develop policy recommendations for the Police Department, the Juvenile Probation Department, and CARC, which divert youth who have been arrested from the juvenile justice system to alternative, community-based programs and support systems.

WORK FOCUS AREA #8: Develop policy recommendations for the Juvenile Probation Department that transform the department supervision model into a strengths-based framework so that young people are not sent to detention for probation violations, including technical violations or violations for low-level offenses.

- (b) In carrying out its duties, the Working Group shall: 1) collaborate with the Mayor's Juvenile Justice Reform Blue Ribbon Panel; and 2) consult with the Capital Planning Committee, Real Estate Division, Child Welfare Division of the Human Services Agency, Child Crisis Division of the Department of Public Health, the Department of Children, Youth and Their Families, Youth Commission, the Police Department, and the San Francisco Unified School District. The Working Group shall invite a representative of each entity identified in this subsection (b) to all Working Group meetings.
- (c) Subject to the fiscal, budgetary, and civil service provisions of the Charter, and to the extent consistent with open government laws, the Working Group shall investigate juvenile justice best practices by visiting other jurisdictions and request that the Director retain subject matter experts, as needed.
- (d) Reports. The Working Group shall prepare and submit a report every six months that describes the Working Group's progress in fulfilling the duties set forth in this Section <u>5.40-6</u>. The first report shall be due six months after the effective date of the ordinance in Board File No. 190392, creating this <u>Article XL</u>. The Working Group shall submit each report to the Board of Supervisors, along with a proposed resolution to accept the report. The Working Group shall also submit each report to the Mayor, any City department or office responsible for a program identified in the report, and the Director. The Working Group shall submit the final plan to the Board no later than June 1, 2021, detailing the final steps needed to close Juvenile Hall by December 31, 2021. The plan shall be accompanied by a proposed resolution accepting the plan,

and the Board may act by resolution to accept, reject, or modify the plan. Each report shall be available to the public, and the Director. 1 shall post each report on the Human Rights Commission's website.

(e) In carrying out its duties, the Working Group shall receive prompt and full cooperation and assistance from all City departments, offices, officers, and employees. All components of City government shall promptly produce all records and information requested by the Working Group, unless prohibited from doing so by state or federal law.

This <u>Article XL</u> shall expire by operation of law, and the Working Group shall terminate, when the Chief Juvenile Probation Officer certifies in writing that Juvenile Hall is closed and there is a substitute place or places of detention, approved by the Court, that is available for wards of the Court and persons alleged to come within the jurisdiction of the Court. In that event, after the sunset date, the City Attorney shall cause this <u>Article XL</u> to be removed from the Administrative Code.
