Ordinance amending the Health Code to require the Department of Public Health to maintain and operate at full capacity an 55-bed adult residential facility with no fewer than 41 beds.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:

Section 1. The Health Code is hereby amended by adding Article 45, consisting of Sections 4501, 4502, and 4503, to read as follows:

ARTICLE 45: CITY-OPERATED ADULT RESIDENTIAL FACILITY

SEC. 4501. BACKGROUND AND FINDINGS.

(a) Adult residential facilities ("ARFs") are group care facilities that provide 24-hour nonmedical care to individuals aged 18-59 who need personal services, supervision, or assistance to support their activities of daily living. ARFs provide rooms, meals, housekeeping, supervision, storage and distribution of medications, and personal care assistance with basic activities like hygiene, dressing, eating, and bathing. ARFs are licensed by the Community Care Licensing Division of the State Department of Social Services ("CCL").

- (b) ARFs play an important role in a locality's continuum of care by providing people with mental illness an opportunity to live in community-based housing, rather than in institutional care.
- (c) A 2018 report by the California Behavioral Health Planning Council observed that due to ARF closures and a lack of new ARFs, many individuals with mental illness are not able to find sustainable community housing options with the appropriate level of care following stays in acute inpatient treatment programs, hospitals, or correctional institutions. The report concludes that the absence of community-based housing options can result in a "revolving door scenario" where people are discharged or released from an institution only to be unable to find appropriate residential care or housing. When another mental health crisis ensues, the absence of community-based housing opportunities can result in a return to high-level crisis programs, facilities, hospitals, jails/prisons, or homelessness.
- (d) Since 2005, the San Francisco Department of Public Health ("DPH") has operated an ARF at 887 Potrero Avenue. This ARF has been licensed by CCL to include 55 beds.
- (e) In recent years, DPH has failed to maintain staffing at a level that was sufficient to operate the ARF at 887 Potrero Avenue at full capacity. In 2018-2019, DPH asked CCL for permission to temporarily suspend from licensure a total of 41 ARF beds at 887 Potrero Avenue so that they could be used instead as emergency shelter beds for people experiencing homelessness. CCL granted DPH's request, thereby temporarily reducing the total number of beds at this ARF from 55 to 1114. CCL's approval extends through June 30, 20240, although DPH may seek CCL approval to restore the beds for use as ARF beds prior to that date subject to CCL's finding that DPH can meet the licensing standards required to operate the ARF at full capacity.
- (f) In October 2018, CCL concluded that on a number of occasions between 2015 and 2018, DPH had failed to comply with applicable laws and regulations in its administration of the ARF at 887 Potrero Avenue. To bring the facility into compliance, CCL required that DPH prepare a corrective action plan, which DPH prepared and submitted to CCL on October 15, 2018 ("Corrective")

- (ed) Staff from the Department of Human Resources ("DHR") shall assist DPH to immediately, and with urgency, hire qualified City staff.
- (e) DPH shall provide trauma-informed care training to all DPH staff who work at DPH's Behavioral Health Center located at 887 Potrero Ave on the following topics: trauma-informed care, patient safety, evidence-based de-escalation techniques, medication management, risk management, first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), and detention for evaluation and treatment under Section 5150 of the California Welfare and Institutions Code. Thisese trainings shall be provided by subject matter experts who do not work at the Behavioral Health Center.
- (f) DPH shall create a forum in which management and staff of the ARF located at 887 Potrero Avenue can discuss issues relating to resident care and workplace conditions.

 and shall conduct an objective analysis and review of the Behavioral Health Center.

SEC. 4503. REPORTING.

Within three months of the effective date of this Article 45By no later than March 31, 2020, DPH and DHR shall jointly submit to the Board of Supervisors a report summarizing the actions it has taken in compliance with this Article 45, and its objective analysis and review of the Behavioral Health Center report that describes:

- (a) The number of ARF beds that have been filled and the number that remain vacant;
 - (b) The number of personnel hired to work at the ARF; and
- (c) The steps that DPH has taken to ensure compliance with the Corrective Action

Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

Section 3. Undertaking for the General Welfare. In enacting and implementing this ordinance, the City is assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach proximately caused injury.

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LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Health Code - City-Operated Adult Residential Facility]

Ordinance amending the Health Code to require the Department of Public Health to maintain and operate at full capacity an adult residential facility with no fewer than 41 beds.

Existing Law

Adult residential facilities ("ARFs") are group care facilities that provide 24-hour nonmedical care to individuals aged 18-59 who need personal services, supervision, or assistance to support their activities of daily living. Currently, there is no legal requirement that the City and County of San Francisco operate an ARF.

Amendments to Current Law

The proposed ordinance would require the Department of Public Health ("DPH") to maintain and operate at full capacity a licensed ARF with no fewer than 41 beds, as of April 1, 2020. Until that date, the ordinance would allow DPH to operate 28 beds at the ARF facility located at 887 Potrero Avenue as emergency shelter beds for people experiencing homelessness.

To ensure that DPH meets the April 2020 deadline, the ordinance would require DPH to take all steps necessary to ensure licensure of a 41-bed ARF and hire a sufficient number of City staff to operate the 41 ARF beds, which hiring would be performed with the assistance of the Department of Human Resources to assist DPH with hiring. DPH would also be required to identify clinically appropriate alternative placements for five ARF residents, who would be given the opportunity to discuss their options with the ombudsman program before being transferred.

The ordinance would also require DPH to provide trauma-informed care training to all staff at the Behavioral Health Center ("BHC") located at 887 Potrero Avenue, establish a forum in which management and staff of the ARF can discuss issues relating to resident care and workplace conditions, and conduct an analysis and review of the BHC. By no later than March 31, 2020, DPH would be required to submit a report to the Board of Supervisors describing its actions taken in compliance with the ordinance, and its analysis and review.

Background Information

This legislative digest reflects amendments made in the General Audit and Oversight Committee on October 17, 2019.

ARFs provide rooms, meals, housekeeping, supervision, storage and distribution of medications, and personal care assistance with basic activities like hygiene, dressing, eating, and bathing. ARFs are licensed by the Community Care Licensing Division of the State Department of Social Services ("CCL").

CCL's approval extends through June 30, 2021, although DPH may seek CCL approval to restore the beds for use as ARF beds prior to that date subject to CCL's finding that DPH can meet the licensing standards required to operate the ARF at full capacity.

In October 2018, CCL concluded that on a number of occasions between 2015 and 2018, DPH had failed to comply with applicable laws and regulations in its administration of the ARF at 887 Potrero Avenue. To bring the facility into compliance, CCL required that DPH prepare a corrective action plan, which DPH prepared and submitted to CCL on October 15, 2018. This plan lays out the steps DPH has taken and will continue to take, including training and monitoring, to ensure that the ARF operates in full compliance with all applicable standards.
