14	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
15	
16	Section 1. The Health Code is hereby amended by adding Article 45, consisting of
17	Sections 4501, 4502, and 4503, to read as follows:
18	
19	ARTICLE 45: CITY-OPERATED ADULT RESIDENTIAL FACILITY
20	
21	SEC. 4501. BACKGROUND AND FINDINGS.
22	(a) Adult residential facilities ("ARFs") are group care facilities that provide 24-hour
23	nonmedical care to individuals aged 18-59 who need personal services, supervision, or assistance to
24	support their activities of daily living. ARFs provide rooms, meals, housekeeping, supervision, storage
25	and distribution of medications, and personal care assistance with basic activities like hygiene,
·	

dressing, eating, and bathing. ARFs are licensed by the Community Care Licensing Division of the State Department of Social Services ("CCL").

- (b) ARFs play an important role in a locality's continuum of care by providing people with mental illness an opportunity to live in community-based housing, rather than in institutional care.
- (c) A 2018 report by the California Behavioral Health Planning Council observed that due to ARF closures and a lack of new ARFs, many individuals with mental illness are not able to find sustainable community housing options with the appropriate level of care following stays in acute inpatient treatment programs, hospitals, or correctional institutions. The report concludes that the absence of community-based housing options can result in a "revolving door scenario" where people are discharged or released from an institution only to be unable to find appropriate residential care or housing. When another mental health crisis ensues, the absence of community-based housing opportunities can result in a return to high-level crisis programs, facilities, hospitals, jails/prisons, or homelessness.
- (d) Since 2005, the San Francisco Department of Public Health ("DPH") has operated an ARF at 887 Potrero Avenue. This ARF has been licensed by CCL to include 55 beds.
- (e) In recent years, DPH has failed to maintain staffing at a level that was sufficient to operate the ARF at 887 Potrero Avenue at full capacity. In 2018-2019, DPH asked CCL for permission to temporarily suspend from licensure a total of 41 ARF beds at 887 Potrero Avenue so that they could be used instead as emergency shelter beds for people experiencing homelessness. CCL granted DPH's request, thereby temporarily reducing the total number of beds at this ARF from 55 to 4414. CCL's approval extends through June 30, 20240, although DPH may seek CCL approval to restore the beds for use as ARF beds prior to that date subject to CCL's finding that DPH can meet the licensing standards required to operate the ARF at full capacity.
- (f) In October 2018, CCL concluded that on a number of occasions between 2015 and 2018, DPH had failed to comply with applicable laws and regulations in its administration of the ARF

at 887 Potrero Avenue. To bring the facility into compliance, CCL required that DPH prepare a corrective action plan, which DPH prepared and submitted to CCL on October 15, 2018 ("Corrective Action Plan"). This plan lays out the steps DPH has taken and will continue to take, including training and monitoring, to ensure that the ARF operates in full compliance with all applicable standards.

SEC. 4502. MAINTENANCE AND OPERATION OF ADULT RESIDENTIAL FACILITY.

- (a) As of the effective date of this Article 45, and until March 31, 2020, DPH shall operate 28 of the beds at the ARF located at 887 Potrero Avenue as emergency shelter beds for people experiencing homelessness.
- (ab) As of the effective date of this Article 45By no later than April 1, 2020, and from that date forward, DPH shall maintain and operate at full capacity a licensed 55 bed adult residential facility with no fewer than 41 beds, and shall take all steps necessary to ensure that all 55ARF beds at that facility are occupied by persons who meet the eligibility criteria for residence in an adult residential facility set forth in State law and in the facility's license.
- (bc) To ensure compliance with the deadlines established in subsections (a) and (b), DPH shall take immediate action to:
- (1) Notify CCL of its intent to operate 5141 ARF beds, and take all steps necessary to ensure licensure of all 5541 ARF beds;
- (2) Identify clinically appropriate alternative placements for five ARF residents, and work with those residents to facilitate their voluntary relocation.

 Patients Residents who are offered clinically appropriate alternative placements shall be given the opportunity to discuss their options with the ombudsman program before being transferred;
- (23) Hire a sufficient number of qualified City staff to operate the 5541 ARF beds; and

- (3<u>4</u>) <u>Identify residents who qualify for placement in any available ARF beds on or after April 1, 2020.</u>
- (ed) Staff from the Department of Human Resources ("DHR") shall assist DPH to immediately, and with urgency, hire qualified City staff.
- (e) DPH shall provide trauma-informed care training to all DPH staff who work at DPH's Behavioral Health Center located at 887 Potrero Ave on the following topics: trauma-informed care, patient safety, evidence-based de-escalation techniques, medication management, risk management, and first aid and cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR), and detention for evaluation and treatment under Section 5150 of the California Welfare and Institutions Code. Thisese trainings shall be provided by subject matter experts who do not work at the Behavioral Health Center.
- (f) DPH shall create a forum in which management and staff of the ARF located at 887 Potrero Avenue can discuss issues relating to resident care and workplace conditions, and shall conduct an objective analysis and review of the Behavioral Health Center.

SEC. 4503. REPORTING.

Within three months of the effective date of this Article 45By no later than March 31, 2020, DPH and DHR shall jointly submit to the Board of Supervisors a report summarizing the actions it has taken in compliance with this Article 45, and its objective analysis and review of the Behavioral Health Center, as referenced in subsection (f) of Section 4502 report that describes:

- (a) The number of ARF-beds that have been filled and the number that remain vacant;
 - (b) The number of personnel hired to work at the ARF; and

1	(c) The steps that DPH has taken to ensure compliance with the Corrective Action

4	Section 2. Chapter 5 of the Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Article
5	XLII, consisting of Sections 5.42-1 through 5.42-5, to read as follows:

9	SEC. 5.42-1. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE ADULT RESIDENTIAL FACILITY

11	The Department of Public Health ("DPH") shall convene the Adult Residential Facility
12	Working Group ("Working Group") to advise the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor on
13	issues relating to resident care, training, workplace conditions, and staffing at the Adult
14	Residential Facility ("ARF") of the Behavioral Health Center ("BHC") located at 887 Potrero
15	Avenue.

17	SEC. 5.42-2. MEMBERSHIP.
18	(a) The Working Group shall consist of 12 members, as follows:
19	(1) Seats 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 shall be held by management-level employees
20	of DPH, at least two of whom shall work at the BHC, appointed by the Director of Health;
21	(2) Seats 7, 8, 9, and 10 shall be held by ARF or BHC staff representatives

- (3) Seats 11 and 12 shall be held by BHC staff representatives from the International Federation of Professional and Technical Engineers, Local 21, AFL-CIO ("Local 21"), appointed by Local 21.
- (b) Appointing authorities shall make appointments to the Working Group within one month of the effective date of this Article XLII. Members of the Working Group shall serve at the pleasure of their respective appointing authorities and may be removed by the member's appointing authority at any time.
- (c) Members may receive their regular salaries for time spent on the Working Group during regularly scheduled work hours. Appointees of SEIU 1021 and Local 21 shall serve on released time subject to the applicable Memorandum of Understanding provisions.
- (d) Meetings of the Working Group shall be open to the public and subject to the provisions of the Ralph M. Brown Act (Government Code Sections 54950, et seq.) and the Sunshine Ordinance (Chapter 67 of the Administrative Code).
- (e) Any member who misses three regular meetings of the Working Group within a six-month period without the express approval of the Working Group at or before each missed meeting shall be deemed to have resigned from the Working Group 10 days after the third unapproved absence.

SEC. 5.42-3. MEETINGS.

The Working Group shall hold its inaugural meeting not more than 30 days after at least seven members have been appointed. Following the inaugural meeting, the Working Group shall meet at least monthly.

SEC. 5.42-4. REPORTING.

The Working Group shall prepare a report every six months on matters within the scope of Section 5.42-1, and shall submit each report to the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors. The first report shall be submitted no later than March 1, 2020, and the final report shall be submitted no later than December 31, 2021.

SEC. 5.42-5. EXPIRATION.

This Article XLII, and hence the Working Group, shall expire by operation of law on December 31, 2021. After that date, the City Attorney shall cause this Article XLII to be removed from the Administrative Code.

Section 23. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

Section 34. Undertaking for the General Welfare. In enacting and implementing this ordinance, the City is assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it

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is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach proximately caused injury.

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REVISED LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

(Amended in Board, 12/10/2019)

[Health, Administrative Codes - City-Operated Adult Residential Facility]

Ordinance amending the Health Code to require the Department of Public Health to maintain and operate at full capacity an adult residential facility ("ARF") with no fewer than 41 beds; and amending the Administrative Code to establish the Adult Residential Facility Working Group to advise the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor regarding resident care, training, workplace conditions, and staffing at the ARF located at 887 Potrero Avenue.

Existing Law

Adult residential facilities ("ARFs") are group care facilities that provide 24-hour nonmedical care to individuals aged 18-59 who need personal services, supervision, or assistance to support their activities of daily living. Currently, there is no legal requirement that the City and County of San Francisco operate an ARF.

Amendments to Current Law

The proposed ordinance would require the Department of Public Health ("DPH") to maintain and operate at full capacity a licensed ARF with no fewer than 41 beds, as of April 1, 2020. Until that date, the ordinance would allow DPH to operate 28 beds at the ARF facility located at 887 Potrero Avenue as emergency shelter beds for people experiencing homelessness.

To ensure that DPH meets the April 2020 deadline, the ordinance would require DPH to take all steps necessary to ensure licensure of a 41-bed ARF and hire a sufficient number of City staff to operate the 41 ARF beds, which hiring would be performed with the assistance of the Department of Human Resources. DPH would also be required to identify clinically appropriate alternative placements for five ARF residents, who would be given the opportunity to discuss their options with the ombudsman program before being transferred.

The ordinance would also require DPH to provide training to all staff at the Behavioral Health Center ("BHC") located at 887 Potrero Avenue and submit a report to the Board of Supervisors describing its actions taken in compliance with the ordinance, and its objective analysis and review of the Behavioral Health Center.

The ordinance would also establish the Adult Residential Facility Working Group ("Working Group") to advise the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor on issues relating to resident care, training, workplace conditions, and staffing at the ARF. The Working Group would be comprised of 12 members, including both management level employees and staff

representatives of the ARF and the BHC. The Working Group would meet monthly until it expires by operation of law on December 31, 2021, and would prepare and submit to the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors four reports.

Background Information

This legislative digest reflects amendments made in the General Audit and Oversight Committee on October 17 and on November 13, 2019, and at a meeting of the full Board of Supervisors on October 29, 2019.

No. Suggest adding the following language "Members of the Working Group shall serve at the pleasure of their respective appointing authorities and may be removed by the member's appointing authority at any time."

Language establishing attendance requirements

No. Suggest adding the following language "Any voting member who misses three regular meetings of the Working Group within a six-month period without the express approval of the Working Group by majority vote at or before each missed meeting shall be deemed to have resigned from the Committee 10 days after the third unapproved absence."

Number of seats and qualifications

There are a total of 11 seats:

- Seats 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 shall be held by management-level employees of DPH, at least two of whom shall work at the BHC, appointed by the Director of Health.
- Seats 7, 8, 9, and 10 shall be held by ARF staff representatives from the Service Employees International Union 1021 ("SEIU 1021"), appointed by SEIU 1021
- Seats 11 and 12 shall be held by BHC staff representatives from the International Federation of Professional and Technical Engineers, Local 21, AFL-CIO ("Local 21"), appointed by Local 21.
- Term limits (i.e., commencement date? staggered terms?)

No. The Working Group will sunset upon completion of their report and it is assumed that the appointed members will serve for the duration of the Working Group.

Administering department

The Department of Public Health shall provide administrative support to the Working Group.

Reporting requirements

The Working Group shall prepare a report every six months on matters within the scope of Section 5.42-1, and shall submit each report to the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors. The first report shall be submitted no later than March 1, 2020, and the final report shall be submitted no later than December 31, 2021.



Sunset date

The Ordinance does not specify a sunset date. However, it does state that the Working Group shall submit its final report no later than December 31, 2021.
