16	Section 1. Environmental and Lar	nd Use Findings.		
17	The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this			
18	ordinance comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public Resources			
19	Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the Board of			
20	Supervisors in File No. 200372 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board affirms			
21	this determination.			
22				
23	Section 2. General Background a	nd Findings.		
24	(a) The City and County of San F	rancisco ("City") has four jails: County Jail 1 (the		
25	Intake and Release Center), located at 4	25 7th Street in San Francisco; County Jail 2, located		

at 425 7th Street in San Francisco; County Jail 3 located at 850 Bryant Street in San 1 2 Francisco, County Jail 4, located on the 7th floor of the Hall of Justice at 850 Bryant Street in San Francisco; and County Jail 5, located at 1 Moreland Drive in San Bruno. 3

(b) County Jail 4 is a dilapidated and inhumane facility that requires a closure plan. Opened in 1961, it is seismically unsafe. Its plumbing, sewage, kitchen, and laundry facilities 5 are all in disrepair. In October 2019, Mayor London Breed noted the urgent need to close 6 County Jail 4, and that same week Supervisors Haney, Yee, Ronen, Fewer, and Walton held 7 a hearing on the closure of the jail. 8

The Department of Public Works, Division of Real Estate, and The Crosby Group 9 (independent seismic engineers), all have determined that the building at 850 Bryant Street 10 housing County Jail 4 needs to be decommissioned. In January 2017, City Administrator 11 Naomi Kelly stated that the building should be closed due to seismic and other safety 12 concerns. The Mayor, District Attorney, Public Defender, and Sheriff have all agreed that the 13 Hall of Justice must be closed, and the City Administrator has set a deadline of July 2021 for 14 the exit of all administrative functions housed at the facility. 15

(c) In 2015, the Board of Supervisors ("Board") denied the Sheriff's request for Board 16 approval of an application for State matching funds to be used to build a new jail. Instead, in 17 2016, the Board passed Resolution No. 002-16, urging the creation of a work group to plan for 18 19 the permanent closure of County Jails 3 and 4 by the Department of Public Health and the Sheriff. In response to this resolution, the Work Group to Re-envision the Jail Replacement 20 Project ("Re-envision Work Group") was established, which proposed 72 policy change 21 recommendations, capital investments, and program investments to reduce the jail population 22 and close the building located at 850 Bryant Street, without construction of a new jail. The 23 recommendations include programs such as cooperative supportive housing, increased 24 treatment beds, co-located neighborhood-based services, and outpatient substance-use 25

treatment. The Re-envision Work Group identified key findings that informed their 1 2 recommendations: (1) the majority of jail inmates incarcerated individuals are not eligible for release due to a range of reasons, including that many may be in the midst of the booking 3 process or awaiting transfers, and that many are ineligible due to sentencing terms, their 4 federal detainee status, parole or probation violations, or bail terms; (2) closing County Jail 3 5 and County Jail 4 permanently would require a jail population reduction goal of 83,220 bed 6 days per year to accommodate an average daily population of between 1,064 and 1,126 in the 7 remaining facilities; (3) a small proportion of inmates incarcerated individuals have long stays 8 9 in jail, but account for the vast majority of all bed days; (4) inmates those occupying the most bed days are disproportionately young and African American; and 5) in 2015, African 10 American inmates individuals accounted for approximately 53% of all bed days in 2015, but 11 made up only 6% of San Francisco residents. 12

(d) The Re-envision Work Group found that data limitations complicate the City's 13 ability to identify, collect, and analyze data and the City's ability to use that data to predict the 14 impact of most jail population recommendations. The Re-envision Work Group recommended 15 expanding the role of the Justice Information Tracking System ("JUSTIS") to support use of 16 criminal justice data to inform system improvements and coordinate data sharing efforts 17 across multiple jurisdictions. JUSTIS is uniquely positioned to play a central role in enhancing 18 19 the transparency and accountability of San Francisco's criminal justice system. JUSTIS provides a coherent and consistent approach to mechanisms that will enable partners to 20 efficiently provide data and analysis with the highest reliability. 21

(e) Violent crime rates have decreased in San Francisco over the past decade and
 homicides are at a historic low. Accordingly, as compared to the past, a smaller percentage
 of inmates incarcerated individuals in City jails are persons charged with or convicted of

violent offenses. Over 80% of inmates incarcerated individuals in City jails are pre-trial
 detainees.

3 (f) Most of the inmates incarcerated individuals in City jails have special needs beyond
4 those of the general population, which, if not attended to, impact others as well as
5 themselves.

6 (1) The majority of inmates in City jails have suffered abuse, neglect, trauma,
7 mental health problems, and family crisis at some point in their lives. People in the criminal
8 justice system suffer from serious mental health problems at a rate far greater than the
9 general population.

(2) San Francisco Health Commission Resolution No. 19-5, entitled
"Incarceration is a Public Health Issue" ("Health Commission Resolution"), states that
incarceration is a public health issue impacting the health and well-being of individuals
incarcerated, and the families and communities of those incarcerated, with a disproportionate
impact on low-income communities and people of color, specifically African American men.
The Health Commission Resolution states that approximately 40% of those incarcerated in
San Francisco county jails are homeless or marginally housed.

(3) According to a 2016 report of the San Francisco District Attorney's Office
entitled, "Justice That Heals: Promoting Behavioral Health, Safeguarding the Public, and
Ending Our Overreliance on Jails," 35-40% of individuals detained in San Francisco jails
receive care from Jail Behavioral Health Services.

(4) According to a 2019 report of the Board's Budget and Legislative Analyst
 entitled, "Transitional Aged Youth in San Francisco County Jails," between 2015 and 2017, an
 average of 11,356 individuals were booked into San Francisco jails, of which 21.5% were
 transitional aged youth (between the ages of 18-24).

(g) For these high-need populations there is an urgent need for the rapid availability of 1 2 bridge housing and behavioral health treatment beds to ensure individuals are released into stable environments with supports to help them be successful and avoid a return to jail. While 3 people should be held accountable for harm done to others, jails, by themselves, do not repair 4 that harm nor help individuals make different choices upon release; rather we have a number 5 of people cycling in and out of our jail system, whereas an expansion of other kinds of 6 supports and resources could prevent recidivism and invest in healthy individuals and 7 communities. 8

(h) The San Francisco Community Corrections Partnership, Police Commission, 9 Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council, Reentry Council, and Sentencing Commission have 10 endorsed a statement prioritizing racial equity in the criminal justice system to allow all people 11 to thrive. San Francisco's criminal justice policy bodies collectively acknowledge that 12 communities of color have borne the burdens of inequitable social, environmental, economic, 13 and criminal justice policies, practices, and investments. The legacy of these government 14 actions is deep racial disparities throughout San Francisco's juvenile justice and criminal 15 justice system. Racial equity is realized when race can no longer be used to predict life 16 outcomes. This ordinance is part of the City's commitment to the elimination of racial 17 disparities in the criminal justice system. 18

(i) Jailing adds trauma to the lives of already traumatized individuals. While
 imprisoned, people become more isolated and disconnected from their families and their
 support networks, and are at risk of losing housing, employment, or child custody and, when
 detained while awaiting trial, fare far worse at every stage of their case.

(j) A 2016 Zellerbach Family Foundation report entitled, "Children, Parents and
 Incarceration: Descriptive Overview of Data from Alameda and San Francisco County Jails,"
 found that 46% of inmates who were San Francisco parents and caregivers reported that at

least one of their own parents had been incarcerated, and that 57% of those San Franciscans 1 studied, whose first incarceration occurred before the age of 18, reported that at least one 2 parent had been incarcerated. Both statistics indicate a high likelihood of a cycle of 3 incarceration if left uninterrupted. Further, the impact of incarceration on children is incredibly 4 disruptive. The same report stated that the children of 26% of San Francisco parents and 5 caregivers who were incarcerated had to change residences; the children of 16% had to 6 change school because their parent went to jail; and of those 16%, 11% had to change 7 schools six or more times. In addition, 57% of parents and caregivers in San Francisco jails 8 9 reported a loss of income because they went to jail, and economic considerations also were a barrier to contact with children while incarcerated; for 33% the cost of phone calls was a 10 barrier to contact with children, and for 31% the cost of visiting was a barrier to contacts with 11 children. 12

(k) In March 2019, the Controller's Office released a report entitled, "Update to 13 Evaluation of Pilot Programs Funded to Reduce the Jail Population." The purpose of the 14 report was to evaluate the effectiveness of the five pilot programs, supported by the Mayor's 15 Office in fiscal year 2018, to reduce San Francisco's jail population, but it focused only on the 16 two programs implemented in time for the evaluation – the Public Defender's Pretrial Release 17 Unit and the District Attorney's Weekend Rebooking. The report concluded: "It is unlikely that 18 19 either program will on its own substantially contribute to the City's goal of reducing the jail population by 83,220 bed days a year. Each program is designed to serve a segment of the 20 jail population that is in jail for a short period of time and occupies few jail bed days a year. 21 Even at a full level of implementation, the populations served do not account for enough bed 22 days each year to make a [substantial] impact on the reduction goal." 23

(I) A settlement in the case of *Buffin v. City and County of San Francisco et al.*, Case
 No. C15-04959 YGR, followed a U.S. District Court ruling that the use of a cash bail schedule

as required by state law unconstitutionally discriminates against people who are unable to
pay. Under the terms of the settlement, the Sheriff's Department will provide the San
Francisco Superior Court with a public safety assessment for eligible pre-arraignment
detainees within eight hours of the person's identity being confirmed in the jail, and will not
enforce the San Francisco Superior Court's bail schedule.

(m) In 2018, the City was awarded \$2 million from the MacArthur Foundation's Safety 6 and Justice Challenge to engage local justice agencies in joint planning and the 7 implementation of strategies that address the main drivers of the local jail population, 8 9 including practices that take a particularly heavy toll on people of color, low-income communities, and people with mental health and substance abuse issues. To continue safely 10 reducing the jail population, the San Francisco Safety and Justice Challenge Working Group 11 plans to implement five key strategies aimed at addressing system inefficiencies and 12 disparities, meeting the needs of those with behavioral health and substance abuse issues, 13 and non-jail options for lower-risk offenders individuals while prioritizing public safety and 14 victim protection. These strategies include pre-arrest and pretrial diversion strategies, 15 criminal sentencing and correctional strategies that emphasize rehabilitation and reduce 16 recidivism, improvements to case processing efficiency, enhanced services for people with 17 mental illness or substance abuse issues involved with the justice system, and rooting out 18 disparity and racial bias in the system. The purpose of this ordinance is to create a formally 19 recognized subcommittee of the Sentencing Commission to continue the work of the Safety 20 and Justice Challenge Working Group. 21

(n) In the 2019-20 time period, the City jail population has consistently declined,
reaching a low of <u>722 on April 17, 20201,093 on March 16, 2020</u>. With the closure of County
Jail 4, the two remaining jails in the system (County Jails 2 and 5) have a combined capacity
of 1,160, not including C-Pod medical and behavioral health units, incarcerated people held at

Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital, or those held in booking at County Jail 1. At 90%
 capacity, County Jails 2 and 5 would accommodate a maximum capacity of 1,044; at 85%
 capacity, County Jails 2 and 5 would accommodate a maximum capacity of 986.

(o) In 2020, San Francisco, like the nation and the world, is facing a public health crisis 4 caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, which presents serious risks for facilities with communal 5 living, such as the jail system. These public health risks could impact incarcerated people, 6 their communities if they are released without knowledge of possible infection, and City 7 employees like deputy sheriffs and jail health workers who staff the system. The Public 8 9 Defender, District Attorney, and Sheriff have all publicly announced steps they are taking to address the COVID-19 public health risks, including expediting the release of incarcerated 10 people who were scheduled to be released within the next 60 days, as well as those with 11 compromised immune systems. These measures align not only with public health priorities 12 like social distancing, but are consistent with public safety as a whole. 13

(p) It is the intent of the Board of Supervisors to avoid layoffs or job loss of any
 employees currently stationed at County Jail 4 as a result of the closure of the jail; this
 process will also be guided by Civil Service Rules, memoranda of understanding, and the
 obligation to meet and confer.

Section 3. The Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Chapter 122,
 consisting of Section 122.1, to read as follows:

## CHAPTER 122: CLOSURE OF COUNTY JAIL 4

- 24 <u>SEC. 122.1. CLOSURE OF COUNTY JAIL 4.</u>
- 25

1	(a) By no later than November 1, 2020, but as soon as possible, the City shall close County Jail
2	4, located on the 7th floor of the Hall of Justice at 850 Bryant Street in San Francisco.
3	(b) Prior to the closure of County Jail 4 under this Section 122.1:
4	(1) The Department of Human Resources ("DHR") shall provide notice to unions
5	representing affected employees and, by October 1, 2020, conduct and conclude any necessary meet
6	and confer under state and local law; and
7	(2) The City, acting through the Division of Real Estate ("DRE"), shall comply with the
8	requirements of California Government Code Sections 70341 et seq. and the terms of the Joint
9	Occupancy Agreement and Transfer Agreement between the City and the Judicial Council of
10	California, Administrative Office of the Courts, pertaining to the building at 850 Bryant Street.
11	(c) Notwithstanding the deadline for closure of County Jail 4 stated in subsection (a), the City
12	may close County Jail 4 only after:
13	(1) DHR has submitted a written certification to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors
14	and the Mayor that the City has satisfied applicable meet-and-confer obligations; and
15	(2) DRE has submitted a written certification to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors
16	and the Mayor that the City has satisfied its obligations under California Government Code Sections
17	70341 et seq., the Joint Occupancy Agreement, and the Transfer Agreement; and
18	(3) The sooner of either (A) the Board of Supervisors receives the final report from the
19	Safety and Justice Challenge Subcommittee of the Sentencing Commission (required by Administrative
20	Code Section 5.25-4), or (B) the total San Francisco jail population has remained below 1044 for 60
21	consecutive days and both the Sheriff and the Safety and Justice Challenge Subcommittee notify the
22	Board that the City may safely close County Jail 4.
23	(d) Notwithstanding the deadline for closure of County Jail 4 stated in subsection (a).
24	the Sheriff may use the 7th Floor of the Hall of Justice for administrative, kitchen, and laundry
25	purposes, so long as the Hall of Justice Building remains open.

## **REVISED LEGISLATIVE DIGEST**

(5/5/2020, Amended in Board)

[Administrative Code - County Jail 4 Closure]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to require the City to close County Jail 4, located on the seventh floor of the Hall of Justice, by November 1, 2020; to require the Sentencing Commission to establish a Safety and Justice Challenge Subcommittee to plan for the reduction of the City's daily jail population and closure of County Jail 4; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

#### Existing Law

Under the Charter, the Sheriff keeps the County Jail and is required to receive all prisoners committed to jail by competent authorities.

Chapter 5 of the Administrative Code establishes the San Francisco Sentencing Commission The purpose of the Commission is to encourage the development of criminal sentencing strategies that reduce recidivism, prioritize public safety and victim protection, emphasize fairness, employ evidence-based best practices, and efficiently utilize San Francisco's criminal justice resources.

## Amendments to Current Law

This ordinance requires that the City close County Jail 4, located on the 7th floor of the Hall of Justice ("HOJ"), by no later than November 1, 2020, provided that three conditions have been met: (1) The Department of Human Resources has concluded any necessary meet and confer; (2) The Division of Real Estate has certified that the City has satisfied its obligations under State law, the HOJ Joint Occupancy Agreement, and HOJ Transfer Agreement; and (3) the sooner of either (A) or (B) has occurred: (A) the Board of Supervisors has receive the final report from the Safety and Justice Challenge Subcommittee of the Sentencing Commission (required by Administrative Code Section 5.25-4), or (B) the total San Francisco jail population has remained below 1044 for 60 consecutive days and both the Sheriff and the Subcommittee have notified the Board that the City may safely close County Jail 4. The ordinance clarifies that it is the intent of the Board of Supervisors to avoid layoffs or job loss of any employees currently stationed at County Jail 4 as a result of the closure of the jail; and to proceed consistent with Civil Service Rules, memoranda of understanding, and the obligation to meet and confer.

This ordinance also requires that the Sentencing Commission establish a Safety and Justice Challenge Subcommittee to facilitate the closure of County Jail 4, to formalize and continue the work of the Safety and Justice Challenge Working Group. This ordinance further requires that the Subcommittee, by October 1, 2020, develop measures and strategies to accomplish the goal of reducing and sustaining an average daily total jail population of no more than 1,044 incarcerated people combined in County Jails 2 and 5. The ordinance further requires that those measures and strategies address system inefficiencies and systemic racial and income disparities in the jail population, meet the needs of incarcerated persons with behavioral health and substance abuse issues, and include non-jail options for lower-risk offenders that prioritize public safety. This ordinance further requires that the measures and strategies include a plan to prepare for an increase in the average daily population above 1,044 (90% capacity at County Jails 2 and 5), after the closure of County Jail 4, and measures to protect against the spread of infectious disease, including testing and alternative housing as needed.

This ordinance requires that the following Sentencing Commission members serve on the Subcommittee: the District Attorney, Sheriff, Public Defender, Adult Probation, the Department of Public Health, Reentry Council, the member of a nonprofit organization that works with victims, chosen by the Family Violence Council (Article XIX of this Chapter 5), the member of a nonprofit organization that works with ex-offenders, chosen by the Reentry Council (Article I of this Chapter 5), and the Superior Court if it elects to participate on the Commission and the Subcommittee.

#### MANDATE STATEMENT

City Charter Section 2.105 states that all legislative acts shall be by ordinance, approved by a majority of the members of the Board of Supervisors.

City Administrative Code Section 2.6-3 states that legislation resulting in a substantial reduction of expenditures of City money by reducing, transferring, or eliminating any existing services or functions of any City department has fiscal impact and must be considered by a fiscal committee of the Board of Supervisors.

#### BACKGROUND

The San Francisco Sheriff's Department maintains four County jails, able to house 1,545 inmates. County Jail #1, located at 425 7<sup>th</sup> Street, is for intake and release. County Jail #2, also located at 425 7<sup>th</sup> Street, has 392 beds designated for women. County Jail #4, located in the Hall of Justice, has 385 beds designated by the Sheriff's Department for maximum security. County Jail #5, located in San Bruno, has 768 beds, and is the main jail providing programs.

According to the City Performance Scorecard, the average daily jail population in March 2020 was 1,006, or approximately 65 percent of jail capacity.

#### DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed ordinance amends the Administrative Code to require the City to close County Jail #4 by November 1, 2020. The proposed ordinance further requires the Sentencing Commission to establish a Safety and Justice Challenge Subcommittee to plan for the reduction of the City's daily jail population and closure of County Jail #4.

#### **Closure of County Jail #4**

The proposed ordinance requires certain conditions to be met prior to closing County Jail #4:

- The Department of Human Resources must notify the unions whose members are impacted by the jail closure, and by October 1, 2020 meet and confer with the respective unions over the jail closure.
- The Department of Real Estate will comply with the terms of the Joint Occupancy Agreement and Transfer Agreement between the City and the Judicial Council of California, Administrative Office of the Courts.
- The Sentencing Commission reports on the impact of the jail closure<sup>1</sup>, or the jail population has remained below 1,044 for 60 consecutive days.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Administrative Code Section 5.25 established the Sentencing Commission to develop "criminal sentencing strategies that reduce recidivism, prioritize public safety and victim protection, emphasize fairness, employ evidence-based best practices, and efficiently utilize San Francisco's criminal justice resource".

#### Sentencing Commission

The proposed ordinance adds a new Administrative Code Section 5.25-4 to establish the Sentencing Commission's Safety and Justice Challenge Subcommittee, made up of representatives from the District Attorney, Sheriff, Public Defender, Adult Probation, Department of Public Health, Re-entry Council, and community based organizations working with victims of crime and with ex-offenders. The Subcommittee would be required to report on measures to reduce the jail population to no more than 1,044. These measures would include expansion of pretrial diversion, community courts referrals, electronic monitoring, and other alternatives to incarceration. The proposed ordinance requires a progress report from the Subcommittee by August 1, 2020 and a final report by October 1, 2020.

#### **California Environmental Quality Act**

According to the Planning Department, the closing of County Jail #4 is not a project under CEQA.

## FISCAL IMPACT

#### **Existing Operational Costs for County Jail #4**

FY 2019-20 costs to operate County Jail #4 are \$24.7 million, as shown in Table 1 below.

## **Cost Impact of County Jail #4 Closure**

#### Cost Reductions

Of the \$24.7 million budgeted for County Jail #4 operations, we estimate cost reductions of approximately \$1.4 million for equipment and maintenance, and between \$14.4 million and \$17. 4 million for salaries and fringe benefits due to the reduction in budgeted positions for County Jail #4.<sup>2</sup>

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>2</sup> This estimate includes \$1.25 million in Sheriff's Department maintenance and equipment costs and an estimated \$0.15 million in Real Estate Division maintenance and utility costs. Because the Real Estate Division incurs maintenance, utility, and other operating costs for the Hall of Justice as a whole, some of which would be ongoing after the closure of County Jail #4, only a portion of the costs attributable to County Jail #4 would be reduced. Estimated Sheriff's Department salary reductions ranging from \$14.4 million to \$17.4 million are based on 70 to 85 uniform positions being eliminated in the Sheriff's Department's budget.

#### Reallocation of Public Health Positions

According to discussions with Department of Public Health staff, the Department would continue to incur costs for health practitioners, psychiatry, medical supplies, and pharmaceuticals for inmates relocated within the jail system or released to community programs with the closing of County Jail #4. The Department does not anticipate cost reductions at this time.

#### Potential New Costs

Closing of County Jail #4 would result in added costs for electronic monitoring, pretrial diversion, and other community alternatives. The Sheriff's Department could also have added costs from transporting inmates from County Jail #5 in San Bruno to the Hall of Justice for court dates.

#### POLICY CONSIDERATION

#### Reassignment of Sheriff's Department Positions

The Sheriff's Department has 85 positions allocated to County Jail #4 in FY 2019-20. How many of these position could be reassigned to other functions in the Sheriff's Department would depend on the number of currently-filled positions that will become vacant prior to November 2020.<sup>3</sup>

#### RECOMMENDATION

Approval of the proposed ordinance is a policy decision for the Board of Supervisors.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>3</sup> Based on payroll data from the end of March 2020, we estimate that 806 of 820 budgeted uniform positions are currently filled, with 14 current vacancies.



In order to fulfill these requirements, the following is provided:

## File No. 200372 Administrative Code – County Jail No. 4 Closure

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to require the City to close County Jail No. 4, located on the seventh floor of the Hall of Justice, by November 1, 2020; to require the Sentencing Commission to establish a Safety and Justice Challenge Subcommittee (Subcommittee) to plan for the reduction of the City's daily jail population and closure of County Jail No. 4; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

Does a current body address the same or similar subject matter?

No, there is no other body charged with addressing the specific subject of closing County Jail No. 4; although, the Subcommittee would be a part of the San Francisco Sentencing Commission, which is charged with the overall development of criminal sentencing strategies.



Does the ordinance require the body to meet at least once every four months?

No, the Subcommittee is proposed to sunset when County Jail No. 4 is closed, which is being required by November 1, 2020. The expected length of the Subcommittee's existence will not warrant the need to include verbiage to meet this requirement. If the Subcommittee remains active longer than expected, as members of the Sentencing Commission they are required to meet at least three times a year by Administrative Code, Section 5.25-2(e).

 Does the ordinance include language indicating members serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority?

Yes, members of the Subcommittee are primary members of the Sentencing Commission and the authority of their appointed service and seat is held through Administrative Code, Section 5.25-2(f), which already indicates the public members serve at the pleasure of their appointing authority.


Does the ordinance include language establishing attendance requirements?

Yes, members of the Subcommittee are primary members of the Sentencing Commission and the authority of their required attendance is held through Administrative Code, Section 5.25-2(f), which already indicates the public members may be removed if they fail to attend meetings without express approval.

• Number of seats and qualifications:

*There are a total of 9 seats consisting of the following members:* 

- District Attorney, or their designee;
- Sheriff, or their designee;
- Public Defender, or their designee;
- Representative for Adult Probation;
- *Representative from the Department of Public Health;*
- *Representative from the Reentry Council;*
- Member of a non-profit organization that works with ex-offenders, chosen by the Family Violence Council;
- *Member of a non-profit organization that works with ex-offenders, chosen by the Reentry Council; and*
- Representative from the Superior Court, at their discretion



Does the ordinance specify term limits (i.e., commencement date? staggered terms?)?

No, the members are expected to serve for the life of the Subcommittee, which is proposed to sunset when County Jail No. 4 is closed (required by November 1, 2020). The expected length of the Subcommittee's existence will not warrant the need to include verbiage to specify term limits.

Does the ordinance specify an administering department?

The ordinance does not list a department to provide administrative and clerical support.

*Suggest that the ordinance be amended to assign a department to provide support to the subcommittee.* 

Does the ordinance include any reporting requirements?

Yes. The Subcommittee shall, by October 1, 2020, develop measures and strategies to accomplish the goal of reducing and sustaining an average daily total jail population of no more than 1,044 incarcerated people combined in County Jail Nos. 2 and 5.

*The Subcommittee shall prepare and submit to the Board of Supervisors two reports that describe the Subcommittee's progress in fulfilling the duties set forth in the ordinance by August 1, 2020 and October 1, 2020.* 

Does the ordinance specify a sunset date?

*Yes, the Subcommittee will sunset when the Sheriff certifies in writing that County Jail No. 4 is closed, which is the proposed ordinance is requiring by November 1, 2020.*

My name is Alexi Jones, and I work as a policy analyst at the Prison Policy Initiative. As a policy analyst, I've written reports that challenge jail expansion and illustrate that jails are overwhelmingly used to respond to social, economic, and public health problems. Most recently I wrote a report <u>Reforms without Results: Why states should stop excluding violent</u> <u>offenses from criminal justice reforms</u>. This report reviews the existing research on violence, and argues that people convicted of violent offenses should not be categorically excluded from justice reforms.

I wanted to first start by challenging some of the fear mongering and tough on crime messaging we have seen from people who want to keep this jail open. There are a lot of misconceptions being thrown around that fundamentally contradict what research tells us about violence and incarceration. And our policies should be based on evidence, not fear.

First and foremost, the research is clear that incarceration <u>does little to deter future crime</u>. And although harsh penalties such as incarceration are often done in the name of victims' rights, <u>research by the Alliance for Safety and Justice</u> shows that most victims of violent crime want investments crime prevention, social services, and options beyond incarceration, not investments in prisons and jails.

Additionally, research shows that people convicted of violent offenses and other serious crimes have the <u>lowest recidivism rates</u>, meaning many can <u>be released into the community</u> without negatively impacting public safety. Providing in re-entry services and social and economic support can further lowest recidivism rates. And finally, <u>research shows</u> that alternatives to incarceration, such as drug and mental health courts, can be just as effective for people convicted of violent offenses with much lower social and fiscal costs than incarceration.

Instead of putting in cages, we should be addressing <u>the underlying social, economic, and</u> <u>health problems</u> that lead to incarceration in the first place, such as poverty, systemic racism, homelessness, and mental health and substance use disorders. Research has demonstrated that <u>increasing access to substance use treatment</u>, <u>investing in neighborhood infrastructure</u>, and <u>funding community non-profits</u> can all significantly decrease violence.

Action is especially critical now, as COVID-19 is spreading rapidly through jails and prisons across the country. Social distancing is simply not possible in jail, and the COVID-19 crisis will only be made worse by locking people in a decrepit, unsanitary, and unsafe jail like County Jail 4. Closing County Jail 4 and further reducing jail populations is urgently needed, especially because the jail population uniquely <u>susceptible to COVID-19</u>, as they have much higher rates of underlying health conditions like asthma, cigarette smoking, heart problems, and HIV.

Experts agree that keeping jail populations low is the best way to prevent a public health catastrophe in jails and prison. And the research shows this can be done safely. With high rates of jail turnover, and staff entering and leaving the jail every day, reducing incarceration is crucial for the health of incarcerated people and the community at large. Closing County Jail 4 must be a top priority.

Hi my name is Chelsea, I am the outreach coordinator with the Coalition on Homelessness. I think it is ridiculous 850 Bryant is still open and it must be immediately closed. Not only has 850 been structurally unsafe for decades, but now with the threat of covid 19 mixed with the constant unsanitary condition of 850 it has become a constitutional violation, subjecting those imprisoned to cruel and unusual punishment. 850 hurts our community and our most vulnerable residents. When I see that 40% of those incarcerated are homeless upon imprisonment and that 20 million is annually spent on policing quality of life resulting in unsheltered people being subjected to harassment and the destruction and confiscation of their tents and personal belongings it is difficult to not feel San Francisco criminalizes homelessness and poverty. We need to close 850 and stop the revolving door that perpetuates criminalization, homelessness, and poverty. I grew up in poverty witnessing this revolving door in not only my community but in my family especially my mothers whose biggest crime was being chronically homeless, mentally ill, and an addict. My name is Mary Ellen Porzig, and I am a resident and worker in District 5. I am writing to *Thank you for your courage and doing what is right for all San Franciscans*: boldly supporting Supervisor Sandra Lee Fewer's ordinance amending the Administrative Code to require the City to close County Jail #4 (CJ4), located on the seventh floor of the Hall of Justice, by November 1, 2020. It is essential to the health and well-being of all of San Francisco for 850 Bryant to close without out-of-county transfers or expansions of jailing through electronic monitoring and jail-bed construction. In addition to yourselves, the legislation is sponsored by a total of eight Supervisors, including Shamann Walton, Hillary Ronen, Dean Preston, and Ahsha Safaí. *We need your continued support now to pass this ordinance with its restrictions on jail expansion as it is now written*.

As you already know, the closure of CJ4 is long overdue; the Hall of Justice is seismically unsafe and has posed a physical threat to people's safety for far too long. Imprisoned people should not be in such a dilapidated facility, nor should deputy sheriffs, jail health employees or any SF workers be working there. **Even earthquake-safe jails are unsafe and dangerous**.

Additionally, the spread of COVID-19 has made the need for the closure of CJ4 and the limitations on jail expansion written in Fewer's ordinance all the more urgent. Despite what some pro-criminalization voices may claim, keeping 850 open is not going to help mitigate the spread of COVID-19. It is important to remember that bars, restaurants, stores and social institutions were shut down as a public health precaution, before sweeping numbers of COVID cases were found there, and I commend city leaders like yourselves in taking such initiative to protect SF residents. We already know several jail staff and at least one prisoner have tested positive. Public health experts have noted that jails are petri-dishes for this disease, because it is impossible to socially distance in jails. Keeping 850 open will not stop the guards – who are the most likely vectors for spreading the disease inside - from coming into contact with imprisoned people and outside communities. Allowing an institution like CJ4 to remain open during the time of COVID-19 places everyone inside at risk of contracting the virus, and worsens the probability of a spike in contraction across all of the Bay Area's communities—including jail staff, who return home to

their families. It is impossible for jails to protect people, treat people, keep people alive and prevent people from acquiring the virus or other health problems. The same precaution carried out in every other institution across the city must be applied to 850 now. Lives inside and outside the jail are at stake.

Additionally, any consideration of transferring prisoners out-of-county, specifically the suggestion to transfer those in the city jails to Santa Rita in Alameda County, or constructing more jail beds to cage people in, is morally reprehensible and should not be considered in the slightest. Santa Rita has been the source of numerous lawsuits because of imprisoned people dying, people giving birth with no support, people not having access to basic healthcare, and people suffering from atrocious mental health conditions. There is a reason that Santa Rita Jail has earned the name, "the most dangerous place in Alameda County." Moreover, It would also go against San Francisco's very values to send people to Santa Rita. As is well documented, and to the dismay of your colleagues on the Alameda County Board of Supervisors, Sheriff Greg Ahern has an ongoing practice of collaborating with ICE.

Closing CJ4, stopping out-of-country transfers to Santa Rita Jail and ending any jail expansion are essential steps in caring for and protecting all San Francisco residents, especially the poor, people experiencing homelessness, the LGBTQI community, immigrants, and people of color who have been targeted by policing and criminalization. **The closure of CJ4 will save San Francisco an estimated \$25 million per year,** which is money better spent on community resources, including: housing, healthcare, meaningful employment, access to healthy food, and mental health and substance use treatment.

This pivotal moment teaches us that healing happens in community, not cages. In order for people to be held accountable for the harm they may have caused, they need to be held close, not thrown away. Reconciliation, accountability and healing happen when facilitated within a community, with everyone impacted and involved in the harm present, and when everyone's basic needs for survival, quality living and dignity are met. Many of our city's organizations have already developed approaches to addressing harm and accountability. But our programs need more funding and support from the city. Every dollar spent and measure taken insisting people who have harmed belong in jail distracts us from creating the community solutions that actually work to interrupt harm and violence, and drains our capacity to grow and strengthen these strategies.

# Please continue your support of Supervisor Fewer's ordinance to close CJ4 with its limitation on jail expansion as written and refer this item to the full Board for consideration.

On behalf of HRCSF, we urge you to support Supervisor Fewer's ordinance to **close 850 Bryant.** 

Concerning the fight for **dignified housing for all:** 850 Bryant has been condemned for over 20 years due to being seismically unfit. Despite a 1996 demolition order, and despite all of City Hall agreeing that CJ4 should be closed, the jail has remained open. For years, people imprisoned at CJ4 have reported noxious fumes, flooding, and overflowing sewage covering cells, along with the inherently dehumanizing conditions of being imprisoned.

Closing 850 Bryant and stopping out-of-country transfers to Santa Rita are essential steps in caring for and protecting all SF residents, especially the poor, the houseless, LGBTQI people, immigrants, and people of color, and especially in this grave time of the COVID crisis. **The closure will also save our city an estimated \$25 million per year, which is better spent on community resources we are in dire need of: housing, healthcare, meaningful employment, access to healthy food, mental health and substance use treatment. With the jail population currently below 800, the City is already more than 200 people below the target number of 1,044 required by this legislation.**

I am writing now because I urge you to please **oppose** Supervisor Fewer's proposal to speed up the closing of County Jail No. 4 without providing the ability to add beds in the remaining jails, allowing capital improvements to existing jails and expanding ankle-monitoring programs when reducing the jail population.
