Dear Labor Colleagues,

On May 19, 2020 Supervisor Matt Haney introduced a proposed Charter Amendment to create a Public Works Commission with oversight over the Department of Public Works; and, the creation of a Sanitation and Streets Department with oversight by a new Sanitation and Streets Commission to be placed on the November 3, 2020 ballot. Copies of the proposed Charter Amendment and its accompanying digest are enclosed, and more information can be found at the link below:

The amendment would create a new Public Works Commission which would have oversight over the Department of Public Works. At the same time, the responsibilities for cleaning and maintaining the public right of way, and certain other responsibilities such as the maintenance of street trees in the public right of way would be transferred to a newly created Department of Sanitation and Streets. The new Department would also be responsible for maintaining City buildings. The amendment would also create a Sanitation and Streets Commission which would have oversight responsibilities over the new Department of Sanitation and Streets. The new Department and Commission would have a focus on street cleaning, including measurement of the City's performance using objective metrics.

The City is providing this notice and an opportunity to meet and confer on the proposed Charter Amendment. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and public health orders, including the shelter-in-place orders, the City offers to meet remotely, by videoconference. The City is available on **June 10, 2020 from 3:30-5:00pm** to initiate this process. The Employee Relations Division will send an invitation for the meeting.

13	SEC. 4.116. PUBLIC WORKS COMMISSION.
14	(a) <b>Purpose.</b> There is hereby established a Public Works Commission. The
15	Commission shall set policy directives and provide oversight for the Department of Public
16	Works.
17	(b) Membership and Terms of Office.
18	(1) The Commission shall consist of five members, appointed as follows:
19	Seats 1 and 5 shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors. Seat 1 shall be held
20	by a licensed engineer or associated registered engineer, with a background in mechanical or
21	environmental engineering and program management, and Seat 5 shall be an at-large position.
22	Seats 2 and 4 shall be appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the
23	Board of Supervisors. Each nomination shall be the subject of a public hearing and vote within
24	60 days. If the Board of Supervisors fails to act on a nomination within 60 days of the date the
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1	nomination is transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the nominee shall be deemed	
2	confirmed. Seat 2 shall be held by a licensed architect, and Seat 4 shall be an at-large position.	
3	Seat 3 shall be held by a person with a background in finance with at least 5	
4	years in auditing experience, appointed by the Controller subject to confirmation by the Board of

6	the Board of Supervisors fails to act on a nomination within 60 days of the date the nomination is	
7	transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the nominee shall be deemed confirmed.	
8	(2) Members of the Commission shall serve four-year terms; provided,	
9	however, the term of the initial appointees in Seats 1, 3, and 5 shall be two years.	
10	(3) Commissioners may be removed from office at will by their respective	
11	appointing authority.	
12	(c) Powers and Duties.	
13	(1) With regard to the Department of Public Works, beginning on September

7	Commission have assumed office, whichever is later. The terms of all five members shall

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22	SEC. 4.138. SANITATION AND STREETS COMMISSION.
23	(a) <b>Purpose.</b> There is hereby established a Sanitation and Streets Commission. The
24	Commission shall set policy directives and provide oversight for the Department of Sanitations
25	and Streets.

Membership and Terms of Office. 1 (b)2 (1)*The Commission shall consist of five members, appointed as follows: Seats 1 and 2 shall be appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the* 3 4 Board of Supervisors. Each nomination shall be the subject of a public hearing and vote within 60 days. If the Board of Supervisors fails to act on a nomination within 60 days of the date the 5 6 nomination is transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the nominee shall be deemed 7 confirmed. Seat 1 shall be held by a person who is a small business owner. Seat 2 shall be held 8 by a person with experience in project management. 9 Seat 3 shall be appointed by the Controller subject to confirmation by the Board 10 of Supervisors. The nomination shall be the subject of a public hearing and vote within 60 days. If the Board of Supervisors fails to act on a nomination within 60 days of the date the nomination 11 is transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the nominee shall be deemed confirmed. 12

- 13 Seat 3 shall be held by a person who has a background in finance and audits.
- 14 Seats 4 and 5 shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors. Seat 4 shall be held
- 15 by a person who has a background in either public health or urban design. Seat 5 shall be held
- 16 *by a person with significant experience in cleaning and maintaining public spaces.*
- 17 (2) Members of the Commission shall serve four-year terms; provided,
- 18 *however, the term of the initial appointees in Seats 1 and 4 shall be two years.*
- 19 (3) Members may be removed at will by their respective appointing officer.
  20 (c) Duties. With regard to the Department of Sanitation and Streets, beginning on
- 21 September 1, 2021, the Commission shall exercise all the powers and duties of boards and
- 22 commissions set forth in Sections 4.102, 4.103, and 4.104, and may take other actions as
- 23 prescribed by ordinance. In addition, the Commission shall:
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1	(1) review and evaluate data regarding street and sidewalk conditions,
2	including but not limited to data collected by the Department, and annual reports generated by
3	the Controller;
4	(2) establish minimum standards of cleanliness for the public right of way,
5	and set baselines for services to be administered by the Department;
6	(3) approve all contracts proposed to be entered into by the Department,
7	provided that the Commission may delegate this responsibility to the Director of the Department,
8	or the Director's designee;
9	(4) perform an annual review on the designation and filling of Department
10	positions, as exempt, temporary, provisional, part-time, seasonal or permanent status, the
11	number of positions that are vacant, and at the Commission's discretion, other data regarding
12	the Department's workforce. This function shall not in any way limit the roles of the Civil
13	Service Commission or the Department of Human Resources under the Charter.
14	(d) Transition provisions.
15	(1) The Mayor, Board of Supervisors, and Controller shall make initial
16	appointments to the Commission by no later than noon on June 1, 2021. The Commission shall
17	come into existence on either June 1, 2021 at noon, or noon of the date that three members of the
18	Commission have assumed office, whichever is later. The terms of all five members shall

3	SEC. 4.139. DEPARTMENT OF SANITATION AND STREETS.
4	(a) <b>Establishment.</b> There shall be a Department of Sanitation and Streets, which
5	shall come into existence on September 1, 2021. The Department shall be headed by the
6	Director of Sanitation and Streets, who shall be qualified by either technical training or
7	administrative experience in program development, management, and implementation; and shall
8	have a demonstrated knowledge of best practices regarding cleaning and maintenance of high-
9	traffic or publicly accessible areas. The Department shall assume all responsibilities previously
10	under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Works that pertain to the duties specified in
11	subsection (b).
12	(b) <b>Duties.</b> In addition to any other duties assigned by ordinance, or pursuant to
13	Section 4.132, the Department shall have the following duties:
14	(1) efficient and systematic street sweeping, sidewalk cleaning, maintenance
15	and cleaning of public restrooms in the public right of way, and litter abatement;
16	(2) provision and maintenance of city trash receptacles;
17	(3) removal of illegal dumping and graffiti in the public right of way;
18	(4) maintenance of public medians, and of street trees in the public right of
19	way pursuant to section 16.129;
20	(5) maintenance of City streets and sidewalks; and
21	(6) construction, repair, remodeling, and management services for City-
22	owned buildings and facilities.
23	(c) Transition. No later than March 1, 2021, the City Administrator shall submit to the
24	Board of Supervisors a proposed ordinance amending the Municipal Code, including but not
25	limited to the Public Works Code, to conform to Sections 3.104, 4.116, 4.130, , 4.138, 16.129,

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## SEC. 16.129. STREET TREE MAINTENANCE.

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(a) Definitions. For purposes of this Section 16.129:

\* \* \* \*

7 "Maintenance" (and its root "Maintain") shall mean those actions necessary to 8 promote the life, growth, health, or beauty of a Tree. Maintenance includes both routine 9 maintenance and major maintenance. Routine maintenance includes adequate watering to ensure 10 the Tree's growth and sustainability; weed control; removal of Tree-well trash; staking; fertilizing; routine adjustment and timely removal of stakes, ties, Tree guards, and Tree grates; 11 bracing; and Sidewalk repairs related to the Tree's growth or root system. Major maintenance 12 includes structural pruning as necessary to maintain public safety and to sustain the health, 13 14 safety, and natural growth habit of the Tree; pest and disease-management procedures as needed and in a manner consistent with public health and ecological diversity; and replacement of dead 15 16 or damaged Trees. Pruning practices shall be in compliance with International Society of 17 Arboriculture Best Management Practices and ANSI Pruning Standards, whichever is more 18 protective of Tree preservation, or any equivalent standard or standards selected by the Director 19 of the Department of Sanitation and Streets Public Works.

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21 "Street Tree" shall mean any Tree growing within the public right-of-way, including
22 unimproved public streets and Sidewalks, and any Tree growing on land under the jurisdiction of
23 the Department of Public Works *or the Department of Sanitation and Streets*. "Street Tree" does
24 not include any other forms of landscaping.

1	(g) Beginning in fiscal year 2018-2019, the City may suspend growth in the City's \$19
2	million contribution to the Fund under subsection (f) of this Section 16.129 if the City's
3	projected budget deficit for the upcoming fiscal year at the time of the Joint Report or Update to
4	the five-year financial plan as prepared jointly by the Controller, the Mayor's Budget Director,
5	and the Board of Supervisors' Budget Analyst exceeds \$200 million adjusted annually by
6	changes in aggregate discretionary revenues as defined in subsection (f) of this Section 16.129.

19	containing the amount of monies collected in and expended from the Fund during the prior fiscal
20	year, and such other information as the Director of the Department of Sanitation and
21	StreetsPublic Works, in the Director's sole discretion, shall deem relevant to the operation of this
22	Section 16.129.

24	F1.102. STREET, SIDEWALK, AND PARK CLEANING AND MAINTENANCE.
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1	(a) The Services Audit Unit shall conduct annually a performance audit of the City's
2	street, sidewalk, and public park maintenance and cleaning operations. The annual audit shall:
3	(1) Include quantifiable, measurable, objective standards for street, sidewalk, and
4	park maintenance, to be developed in cooperation and consultation with the <i>Department of</i>

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# LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Charter Amendment - Public Works Commission, Sanitation and Streets Commission, and Sanitation and Streets Department]

Describing and setting forth a proposal to the voters at an election to be held on November 3, 2020, to amend the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco to create a Public Works Commission to oversee the Department of Public Works; to create the Sanitation and Streets Department to succeed to specific duties currently performed by the Department of Public Works; to create a Sanitation and Streets Commission to oversee the Sanitation and Streets Department; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

## Existing Law

Under the Charter, the Department of Public Works' responsibilities are determined by the City Administrator and include the responsibility for maintaining and cleaning the public right of way.

Charter section 4.102 provides that a commission of the executive branch has the responsibility to formulate, evaluate and approve goals, set policies, develop Annual Statements of Purpose for the departments under its jurisdiction, and approve departmental budgets.

Charter section F1.102 provides that the City Auditor shall develop quantifiable, measurable, objective standards for street, sidewalk, and park maintenance in consultation with the Department of Public Works.

## Amendments to Current Law

This Charter amendment would remove the Department of Public Works from the purview of the City Administrator. The amendment would create a new Public Works Commission which would have oversight over the Department of Public Works. At the same time, the responsibilities for cleaning and maintaining the public right of way, and certain other responsibilities such as the maintenance of street trees in the public right of way would be transferred to a newly created Department of Sanitation and Streets. The new Department would also be responsible for maintaining City buildings. The amendment would also create a Sanitation and Streets Commission which would have oversight responsibilities over the new Department of Sanitation and Streets. The new Department and Commission would have a focus on street cleaning, including measurement of the City's performance using objective metrics. Street cleaning would include the deep cleaning of sidewalks using methods such as power washing.

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
