NINETEENTH SUPPLEMENT TO MAYORAL PROCLAMATION DECLARING THE EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY DATED FEBRUARY 25, 2020

WHEREAS, California Government Code Sections 8550 et seq., San Francisco Charter Section 3.100(14) and Chapter 7 of the San Francisco Administrative Code empower the Mayor to proclaim the existence of a local emergency, subject to concurrence by the Board of Supervisors as provided in the Charter, in the case of an emergency threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County or its citizens; and

WHEREAS, On February 25, 2020, the Mayor issued a Proclamation (the "Proclamation") declaring a local emergency to exist in connection with the imminent spread within the City of a novel (new) coronavirus ("COVID-19"); and

WHEREAS, On March 3, 2020, the Board of Supervisors concurred in the Proclamation and in the actions taken by the Mayor to meet the emergency; and

WHEREAS, On March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom proclaimed a state of emergency to exist within the State due to the threat posed by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, On March 6, 2020, the Health Officer declared a local health emergency under Section 101080 of the California Health and Safety Code, and the Board of Supervisors concurred in that declaration on March 10, 2020; and

WHEREAS, On March 16, 2020, the City's Health Officer issued a stay safe at home order, Health Officer Order No. C19-07 (the "Stay Safe At Home Order"), requiring most people to remain in their homes subject to certain exceptions including obtaining essential goods such as food and necessary supplies, and requiring the closure of non-essential businesses; the Health Officer has amended the Stay Safe At Home Order to modify the ongoing restrictions; and

WHEREAS, There have been 2,877 confirmed cases of COVID-19 within the City and 44 COVID-19-related deaths in the City; there have been more than 147,000 confirmed cases in California and more than 4,900 COVID-19-related deaths in California; and

WHEREAS, This order and the previous orders issued during this emergency have all been issued because of the propensity of the virus to spread person to person and also



because the virus physically is causing property loss or damage due to its proclivity to attach to surfaces for prolonged periods of time; and

WHEREAS, To reduce the spread of the virus and protect the public health, the Stay Safe At Home Order prohibits restaurants in the City from offering dine-in service, limiting restaurants to delivery and takeout, and as of June 12, 2020, the Stay Safe At Home Order allows restaurants to offer outdoor dining subject to physical distancing and other safety requirements. Many restaurants in the City are unable to offer outdoor dining due to locational and physical space limitations; and

WHEREAS, In the Ninth Supplement to the Proclamation of Local Emergency, dated April 10, 2020, the Mayor issued an order capping the fees that third-party applications and websites can charge restaurants per order. The Board of Supervisors concurred in that order on April 21, 2020. That order terminates when the Stay Safe At Home Order is amended or modified to allow dine-in service. For the avoidance of doubt, the Mayor now issues the order below to clarify that the order terminates when the Stay Safe At Home Order is amended or modified to allow indoor dining; and

WHEREAS, For all the reasons stated in the Ninth Supplement, it is in the public interest for the order capping fees that third party applications and websites can charge restaurants per order to remain in place until all restaurants are allowed to offer dine-in service; and

NOW, THEREFORE,

I, London N. Breed, Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco, proclaim that there continues to exist an emergency within the City and County threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County and its citizens;

In addition to the measures outlined in the Proclamation and in the Supplements to the Proclamation dated March 11, March 13, March 17, March 18, March 23, March 27, March 31, April 1, April 10, April 14, April 23, April 30, May 11, May 13, May 18, May 29, June 2, and June 9, 2020, it is further ordered that:

Section 1 of the Ninth Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation, dated April 10, 2020, is revised and replaced as follows, solely to modify subsection (c) for clarity:



It shall be unlawful for a third-party food delivery service to charge a covered establishment a fee per online order for the use of its services that totals more than 15% of the purchase price of such online order.

(a) For purposes of this Order, the following definitions apply:

"Covered establishment" means a restaurant that offers, in a single commercial transaction over the internet, whether directly or through a third-party food delivery service, the sale and same-day delivery of food to customers from one or more retail locations within the City. Covered establishment shall not include any restaurant that meets the definition of a formula retail use under Section 303.1 of the Planning Code.

"Online order" means an order placed by a customer through a platform provided by a third-party food delivery service for delivery or pickup within the City.

"Purchase price" means the menu price of an online order. Such term therefore excludes taxes, gratuities and any other fees that may make up the total cost to the customer of an online order.

"Restaurant" shall have the meaning provided in Section 451 of the Health Code.

"Third-party food delivery service" means any website, mobile application or other internet service that offers or arranges for the sale of food and beverages prepared by, and the same-day delivery or same-day pickup of food and beverages from, no fewer than 20 separately owned and operated food service establishments.

(b) The Director of the Office of Economic and Workforce Development, or the Director's designee, is authorized to implement this Order and issue any necessary guidance or rules consistent with this Order.

(c) This Order shall take effect on April 13, 2020, and shall terminate at such time as the Health Officer amends or terminates the order prohibiting restaurants from offering indoor dining service or that prohibition otherwise expires, so that indoor dining service is then allowed.

(d) A third-party food delivery service shall not be found in violation of this Order if between April 13, 2020 and April 20, 2020, it imposes a fee per online order for the use

of its services that totals more than 15% of the purchase price of such online order, provided it refunds the portion of the fee that exceeds 15% of the purchase price to the covered establishment prior to April 27, 2020.

(e) If a third-party food delivery service charges a covered establishment fees that violate this Order, the covered establishment shall provide written notice to the third-party food delivery service requesting a refund within seven days. If the third-party food delivery service does not provide the refund requested after seven days or the third-party food delivery service continues to charge fees in violation of this Order after the initial notice and seven-day cure period, a covered establishment may enforce this Order by means of a civil action seeking damages and injunctive relief. The prevailing party in any such action shall be entitled to an award of reasonable attorney fees.

Attached please find an updated shelter-in-place order and Directive No. 2020-16 re outdoor dining.

Regarding the Order:

- This June 11, 2020 update to the Order adds to the list of Additional Business that may resume operations, adding: outdoor dining, in-store retail sales, professional sports team games and tournaments without spectators (with an approved plan), streaming or broadcasting of entertainment events (with an approved plan, as necessary), outdoor fitness classes, indoor household services (like house cleaners and cooks), and nonessential offices where telecommuting is not feasible, all subject to further limitations and requirements in Appendix C-1 and any associated directives.
- This June 11, 2020 update to the Order also adds small outdoor special gatherings to the list of Additional Activities that may resume, subject to further limitations and requirements in Appendix C-2 and any associated directives. Generally, gatherings are 12 or fewer people and include not

only religious or ceremonial gatherings but also other social gatherings.

4. Appendixes C-1 and C-2 note that many of the new activities either don't begin until the morning of Monday, June 15, or require submission of a plan to the Health Officer before the activity can move forward (such as sports team games or large venue events for broadcast).

Regarding the Directive:

- 1. This directive allows outdoor dining to begin tomorrow, Friday, June 12, subject to requirements regarding distancing and other considerations.
- 2. Face Coverings are required when entering or leaving the restaurant and when going to the restroom.
- 3. The public generally is not allowed inside a restaurant except to reach outdoor spaces for dining or to use the restroom.
- 4. The directive restricts party size (6 people unless all are from the same household).
- 5. The directive also includes cleaning and disinfection requirements.
- 6. Restaurants and bars must have a permit to serve outside, bona fide meals must be served (and no alcohol without such meals), and the meals may be provided by another person or business by agreement with the establishment.
- 7. The directive is in the new format, which is the directive, the best practices, the 1-2 page health and safety plan checklist, and interim guidance from DPH Info. and Guidance.

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. 2020-16

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO REGARDING REQUIRED BEST PRACTICES FOR OUTDOOR DINING

(PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTIVE) DATE OF DIRECTIVE: June 11, 2020

By this Directive, the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco (the "Health Officer") issues industry-specific direction that outdoor dining establishments, as described below, must follow as part of the local response to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") pandemic. This Directive constitutes industry-specific guidance as provided under Sections 6 and 15 of Health Officer Order No. C19-07e issued on May 22, 2020 and updated on June 11, 2020 (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order") and, unless otherwise defined below, initially capitalized terms used in this Directive have the same meaning given them in that order. This Directive goes into effect on June 12, 2020, and remains in effect until suspended, superseded, or amended by the Health Officer, as further provided below. This Directive has support in the bases and justifications set forth in the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, and any amendments to that order. As further provided below, this Directive automatically incorporates any revisions to the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order or other future orders issued by the Health Officer that supersede that order or reference this Directive. This Directive is intended to promote best practices as to Social Distancing Requirements and sanitation measures, helping prevent the transmission of COVID-19 and safeguard the health of workers, customers, and the community.

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER DIRECTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. This Directive applies to restaurants and bars that provide real meal service in a bona fide manner, and have received the necessary permits to serve food outdoors (each an "Outdoor Dining Establishment"). Outdoor Dining Establishments are not permitted to provide alcoholic beverage service without also providing bona fide meals. Bona fide meals must be prepared and served by the Outdoor Dining Establishment or another person or business operating under an agreement with the Outdoor Dining Establishment.
- 2. Attached as Exhibit A to this Order are a list of best practices (the "Best Practices") that apply to all Outdoor Dining Establishments. Each Outdoor Dining Establishment must comply with all of the relevant requirements listed in the Best Practices.
- 3. Before engaging in any activity under this Directive, each Outdoor Dining Establishment must create, adopt, and implement a written health and safety plan (a "Health and Safety Plan"). The Health and Safety Plan must be substantially in the form attached to this Directive as Exhibit B.

- 4. Guidance from the Department of Public Health related to Outdoor Dining is attached to this Directive as Exhibit C, and available at http://www.sfdph.org/directives.
- 5. All Outdoor Dining Establishments must also comply with Health Officer Directive 2020-05, which applies to all Food Preparation or Delivery Essential Businesses. If an aspect, service, or operation of an Outdoor Dining Establishment is also covered by another Health Officer directive (all of which are available at http://www.sfdph.org/directives), then the Outdoor Dining Establishment must comply with all applicable directives, and it must complete all relevant Health and Safety Plan forms.
- 6. Each Outdoor Dining Establishment must (a) make the Health and Safety Plan available to a member of the public on request, (b) provide a summary of the plan to all Personnel working on site or otherwise in the City in relation to its operations, and (c) post the plan in any storefront or at the entrance to any other physical location that such Outdoor Dining Establishment operates within the City. Also, each Outdoor Dining Establishment must provide a copy of the Health and Safety Plan and evidence of its implementation to any authority enforcing this Order upon demand.
- 7. Each Outdoor Dining Establishment subject to this Directive must provide items such as Face Coverings (as provided in Health Order No. C19-12b issued on May 28, 2020, and any future amendment to that order), hand sanitizer or handwashing stations, or both, and disinfectant and related supplies to Personnel and to the public, all as required by the Best Practices. If any such Outdoor Dining Establishment is unable to provide these required items or otherwise fails to comply with required Best Practices or fails to abide by its Health and Safety Plan, then it must cease operating until it can fully comply and demonstrate its strict compliance. Further, as to any non-compliant operation, any such Outdoor Dining Establishment is subject to immediate closure and the fines and other legal remedies described below, as a violation of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order.
- 8. For purposes of this Directive, "Personnel" includes all of the following people who provide goods or services associated with the Outdoor Dining Establishment in the City: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who sell goods or perform services onsite or who deliver goods for the business); independent contractors; vendors who are permitted to sell goods onsite (such as farmers or others who sell at stalls in farmers' markets); volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services onsite at the request of the Additional Business. Personnel includes "gig workers" who perform work via the business's app or other online interface, if any.
- 9. This Directive and the attached Best Practices may be revised by the Health Officer, through revision of this Directive or another future directive or order, as conditions relating to COVID-19 require, in the discretion of the Health Officer. Each Outdoor Dining Establishment must stay updated regarding any changes to the Stay-Safe-At-

Home Order and this Directive by checking the Department of Public Health website (<u>www.sfdph.org/healthorders</u>) regularly.

10. Implementation of this Directive augments—but does not limit—the obligations of each Outdoor Dining Establishment under the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order including, but not limited to, the obligation to prepare, post, and implement a Social Distancing Protocol under Section 6 and subsection 16.h of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. The covered Outdoor Dining Establishment must follow these industryspecific Best Practices and update them as necessary for the duration of this Directive, including, without limitation, as this Directive is amended or extended in writing by the Health Officer and consistent with any extension of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, any other order that supersedes that order, and any Health Officer order that references this Directive.

This Directive is issued in furtherance of the purposes of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. Where a conflict exists between this Directive and any state, local, or federal public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, including, without limitation, the Social Distancing Protocol, the most restrictive provision controls. Failure to carry out this Directive is a violation of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.

In addition to preparing, posting, and implementing the Social Distancing Protocol required by Section 6 and subsection 15.h of Health Officer Order No. C19-07e (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order"), each Facility must, as provided in Section 6 of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order and Health Directive No. 2020-16 (the "Outdoor Dining Directive"), create, adopt, and implement a Health and Safety Plan that addresses each item below. You may use the 2 page checklist attached to the Directive as Exhibit B to document your compliance.

These best practices are in addition to the best practice attached to Health Directive 2020-05 for Food Preparation or Delivery Essential Businesses.

Requirements for Outdoor Dining:

1. <u>Section 1 – Service Requirements</u>

- **1.1.** Outdoor dining, placement of outdoor seating arrangements, and food service must comply with state and local laws, regulations, and permitting requirements (e.g. ADA access, relevant permits for chairs and tables, compliance with applicable zoning, and California Department of Alcohol Beverage Control requirements).
- **1.2.** Ensure customers and Personnel comply with the Social Distancing and Health Protocol. At a minimum, each Outdoor Dining Establishments must:
 - **1.2.1.** Require all Personnel to use Face Coverings as required by the Face Covering Order, wash hands frequently, and maintain physical distance of at least 6-feet to the extent possible.
 - **1.2.2.** Establish designated areas/lines with markings on the ground to indicate six-foot distancing for patrons. This includes check-stands and restrooms, and patrons in various service settings, if applicable (e.g. ordering food, take out, and waiting to be seated).
 - **1.2.3.** Create directional paths of travel where feasible (e.g. separate entrance and exit for patrons, lines for restrooms).
 - **1.2.4.** Advise customers that they must wear face coverings until seated and any time they leave the table, such as to use a restroom.
- **1.3.** Ensure that service tables are at least six feet apart. If service tables cannot be spaced at least six feet apart, then the Outdoor Dining Establishment must install an impermeable physical barrier between service tables to protect customers and Personnel. Outdoor Dining Establishments must use signage or other techniques (e.g. removing chairs or using rope) to indicate which tables that are not available for use.
- **1.4.** Umbrellas, canopies, and other shade structures are only allowed if they do not have sides and allow for the free flow of air through the space.
- **1.5.** Encourage reservations to prevent crowds from gathering. Timing of Reservations must allow sufficient time to disinfect customer seating areas.
- **1.6.** Advise customers that they must remain outside the Outdoor Dining Establishment, and may enter the establishment only (1) to access a bathroom, (2) to access an outdoor space that is

only accessible by traveling through the restaurant, or (3) to order or pickup food at an indoor counter. This does not apply to customers patronizing other aspects of the Outdoor Dining Establishment (e.g. take-out, or retail) subject to the Social Distancing and Health Protocol, and applicable industry-specific directives.

- **1.7.** Tables should be limited to no more than six customers, unless all are members of the same household. People in the same party seated at the same table do not have to be six feet apart. It is strongly encouraged that only individuals in the same household sit together at a single table.
- **1.8.** Limit cross-contamination and touching of common items. At a minimum, Outdoor Dining Establishments must:
 - **1.8.1.** Encourage customers to view menus using their own mobile devices. Where menus are requested, provide disposable, single use menus, or use laminated menus that can be sanitized after each use.
 - **1.8.2.** Discontinue the practice of leaving card stands, flyers, napkin holders, or other items (e.g. candle holders, or flower vases) on tables.
 - **1.8.3.** Discontinue pre-setting tables with glassware and utensils. Glassware and utensils must be put on the table after customers are seated by Personnel who have washed their hands.
 - **1.8.4.** Utensils must be pre-wrapped in a cloth or paper napkin by Personnel who have washed their hands just before pre-rolling the utensils or napkins. The pre-rolled utensils or napkins must then be stored in a clean container.
 - **1.8.5.** Use disposable napkins and tablecloths or ones made of cloth. Napkins and tablecloths (including unused napkins and tablecloths) must be disposed of or laundered after each customer. Soiled napkins and tablecloths must be kept in a closed container.
 - *1.8.6.* Cleaned flatware, stemware, dishware, etc., must be properly stowed away from customers and Personnel until ready to use.
 - **1.8.7.** Discontinue the use of shared food items such as condiment bottles, salt and pepper shakers, etc. and provide these items, on request, in single serve containers or portions. Where this is not possible, shared items must be supplied as needed to customers and disinfected after each use.
 - **1.8.8.** Encourage customers to use touchless payment options. When touchless payment is not used, avoid direct contact between customers and Personnel. Sanitize any pens, counters, trays, or point of sale systems between each use by a customer. Create sufficient space to enable the customer to stand at least six feet away from the cashier while items are being paid for, or provide a physical barrier (e.g., Plexiglas of sufficient height and width to prevent transmission of respiratory droplets) between the customer and the cashier.
 - *1.8.9.* Provide leftover containers only upon request. Personnel should not fill the leftover container. Each party should fill its own leftover containers.
 - **1.8.10.** Servers who both serve food and clear dishes must wash their hands in between these two tasks.

- **1.8.11.** Discontinue use of shared entertainment items, such as board games, pool tables, and arcade games.
- **1.9.** Close areas where customers may congregate, serve themselves, or touch food or other items that other guests may use. Provide these items to guests individually. Discard such items after use or clean and disinfect them after each use, as appropriate. These requirements include but are not limited to:
 - *1.9.1.* Self-service areas with condiment caddies, utensil caddies, napkins, lids, straws, water pitchers, to-go containers, etc.
 - 1.9.2. Self-service machines including ice, soda, frozen yogurt dispensers, etc.
 - 1.9.3. Self-service food areas such as buffets, salsa bars, salad bars, etc.
 - 1.9.4. After-meal mints, candies, snacks, or toothpicks for customers.
- **1.10.** Discontinue tableside food preparation and presentation, such as food item selection carts and conveyor belts, condiment or food preparation, etc.
- **1.11.** Limit the number of Personnel serving individual parties, subject to wage and hour regulations. To the extent possible, have only one person serving a group of customers for the duration of the meal.
- **1.12.** Live entertainment that increases the risk of aerosol transmission of COVID-19 is not permitted (e.g. singing, or playing wind or brass instruments). Live entertainment that does not increase the risk of aerosol transmission of COVID-19 is permitted (e.g. instrumental guitar or piano).

2. <u>Section 2 - Cleaning and Disinfecting Requirements</u>

- **2.1.** Thoroughly disinfect each customer dining location before opening each day and after every use, including tables, chairs, booster seats, highchairs, booths, and the sides of such surfaces. Disinfection must allow adequate time to follow product instructions. Many EPA approved disinfectants require a minimum contact time against the human coronavirus, and the disinfectant must be left on the surface for this amount of time before being wiped off.
- **2.2.** Disinfect highly touched surfaces (e.g. doors, handles, faucets, tables, etc.), and high traffic areas (e.g. waiting areas, hallways, bathrooms) at least once per hour.
- **2.3.** Frequently disinfect bathrooms, at least every four hours. Create and use a daily checklist to document each time disinfection of bathrooms occurs. Conspicuously post the checklist inside each bathroom clearly detailing the dates and times the room was last cleaned, disinfected, or restocked.
- **2.4.** Maintain sanitizer effective against COVID-19 at point of sales area, and at guest and Personnel entrances, including, but not limited to, areas where individuals must touch a door handle to enter.
- **2.5.** Servers, bussers, and other Personnel moving items used by customers, dirty linens, or handling trash bags must wash hands after handling those items, or use disposable gloves (and wash hands before putting them on and after removing them) and change aprons frequently.
- **2.6.** Provide dishwashers with equipment to protect the eyes, nose, and mouth from contaminant splash using a combination of face coverings, protective glasses, and/or face shields.



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Dishwashers must be provided impermeable aprons and change frequently. Reusable protective equipment such as shields and glasses must be properly disinfected between uses. Cleaned/sanitized utensils must be handled with clean gloves.

2.7. Reusable customer items including utensils, food ware, breadbaskets, etc., must be properly washed, rinsed, and sanitized. Use disposable items if proper cleaning of reusable items is infeasible.

3. <u>Section 3 - Operational Requirements</u>

- **3.1.** Major changes to food service operations, such as the addition of cleaning stations, food preparation areas, or food storage areas, may require advance approval by the Department of Public Health.
- **3.2.** Increase fresh air circulation for Personnel by opening windows or doors, if possible to do so. Consider installing portable high-efficiency air cleaners, upgrading the building's air filters to the highest efficiency possible, and making other modifications to increase the quantity of outside air and ventilation in all working areas.

- □ Customers are advised they must wear face coverings until seated and any time they leave the table, such as to use a restroom.
- □ Service tables are at least six feet apart or separated by an impermeable physical barrier.

- Encourage customers to use touchless payment options and sanitize any pens or other equipment after each use.
- □ Leftover containers provided only upon request. Customers fill their own containers.
- □ No shared entertainment items such as board games, pool tables, or arcade games.
- □ Umbrellas, canopies, etc. have no sides and allow for the free flow of air.
- $\hfill\square$ Areas where customers congregate, serve themselves, or touch food or other items are closed.
- □ No tableside preparation or presentation of food tableside.
- □ No entertainment involving singing, playing wind or brass instruments, etc. that increases the risk of aerosol transmission of COVID-19.

Cleaning and Disinfecting Requirements

- Disinfecting each customer dining location before opening each day and after every use, including tables, chairs, booster seats, highchairs, booths, etc.
- □ Disinfecting highly touched surfaces (e.g. doors, handles, faucets, tables, etc.), and high traffic areas (e.g. waiting areas, hallways, bathrooms) at least once per hour
- □ Frequently disinfect bathrooms, at least every 4 hours. Cleaning log conspicuously posted in bathroom.
- □ Sanitizer available at point of sales area.
- □ Dishwashers have impermeable aprons and equipment to protect the eyes, nose, and mouth from contaminant splash.
- □ Reusable customer items (e.g., utensils, food ware, breadbaskets, etc., are properly washed, rinsed, and sanitized) after each use.

Operational Requirements

Interim Guidance: In-Person Outdoor Dining

UPDATED June 11, 2020

The following guidance was developed by the San Francisco Department of Public Health for use by local facilities and will be posted at <u>www.sfcdcp.org/outdoor-dining.</u> This interim guidance may change as knowledge, community transmission, and availability of PPE and testing change.

AUDIENCE: Food facilities who are offering In-Person Outdoor Dining. Food facilities include restaurants, bars, distilleries, brewpubs, and wineries that provide bona fide meal service.

BACKGROUND: On June 11, 2020, the Health Officer issued <u>Directive No. 2020-16</u> authorizing and providing guidance for Outdoor Dining.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: This document highlights the main points of the Directive, outlines steps you should take and gives you resources and more information to help you comply with the mandatory requirements that are fully detailed in the Directive.

To qualify as an Outdoor Dining Establishment, a business must serve food, and is not permitted to provide alcoholic beverage service without also providing real meal service in a bona fide manner.

Prepare

Create a Health and Safety Plan

The Social Distancing and Health Plan is in a checklist format and serves as a reminder of all the best practices that your business needs to follow including universal requirements such as requiring face coverings, <u>signage</u>, and enforcing six foot distances between people.

Educate and Train Personnel

Personnel must be trained to implement the Social Distancing and Health Protocol and may need training on cleaning and disinfection and how to monitor the number of customers in the store or in line. Customers should maintain a distance of 6 feet if they are not in the same household while waiting in line for pick up or waiting to be seated. Consider training personnel on de-escalation with customers who do not comply with policies and provide resources to employees to address anxiety, stress, and mental health. Recognize the fear in returning to work, communicate transparently, listen, and survey regularly.

Provide information on employer or government-sponsored sick leave and other benefits the employee may be entitled to receive that would make it financially easier to stay at home (see Paid sick leave in San Francisco). Remember that employees cannot be fired due to COVID-19 results or needed time off for recovery.



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Check your space after the long period of low usage

Check for pest infestation or harborage, and make sure all pest control measures are functioning. Perform routine maintenance on ventilation systems including air ducts and vents. consider flushing out the stagnant water from the plumbing lines by running water through fixtures. Detailed guidance may be found at: <u>https://www.sfwater.org/flushingguidance</u>.

Create a Safer Space

You may need to change the physical layout of your business to help social distancing for customers and personnel. Modifications to consider include creating separate entrances and exits and marking spaces with tape or other decals to indicate six-foot distances.

Serving Bona Fide Meals in Your Outdoor Dining Establishment

To qualify as an Outdoor Dining Establishment, a business must serve food, and is not permitted to provide alcoholic beverage service without also providing real meal service in a bona fide manner.

Bona fide meals means prepared and served by the outdoor dining establishment or another person or business operating under an agreement with the outdoor dining establishment. The service of prepackaged food like sandwiches or salads, or simply heating frozen or prepared meals, shall not be deemed as compliant with this requirement.

To serve bona fide meals under this Directive, the Outdoor Dining Establishment must have a valid permit-to-operate as a food establishment and any other relevant permits required to normally operate.

Follow all of the Best Practices in the Social Distancing and Health Protocol. To help compliance, you may need to ask your Personnel to make changes and customers to change the way they interact with you. Changes may include the following.

Changes For Personnel:

- As always, employees should wash hands before serving food and in between tasks.
- Employees who wear an apron should change it frequently.
- Dishwashers should be provided with equipment to protect the eyes, nose, and mouth. Dishwashers must be provided impermeable aprons that are changed frequently.
- Employees should each have their own pen/pencil.
- Employees must wear a face covering at all times.
- Limit the number of staff serving each party.

Changes to the dining table:

- Patrons at a single table are limited to 6 customers. We strongly encourage that only individuals in the same household should sit together in an outdoor dining setting. People in the same party seated at the same table do not have to be six feet apart.
- Patrons must wear face coverings until seated and any time they leave the table, such as to use a restroom.
- Limit the number of passable objects on table and provide condiments such as ketchup,

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mustard, hot sauce in single servings upon request.

- Encourage patrons to view the menu on their mobile device or provide laminated menus that are disinfected after each use.
- Discontinue presetting tables with utensils and glassware, provide utensils in a prewrapped cloth or paper napkin and use disposable napkins or tablecloths where possible.
- Tablecloths must be changed after each use.
- Patrons are **not allowed to eat or drink indoors** in the dining establishment. Patrons may enter inside to use the restroom or to pick-up/order food. Paths to restroom or pick-up/take out counter should be clearly marked.
- Provide leftover containers only upon request. Staff should not fill the leftover container. Each party should fill its own leftover containers.

Other business changes for preventing and managing COVID-19 transmission

- Disinfect dining location after every use. This includes tables, chairs, and highchairs/boosters. Follow instructions on disinfectants, inform your guests to allow time to be disinfected.
- Disinfect high touch surfaces such as door handles, counter tops, faucets, etc., at least once per hour.
- Ask customers to voluntarily provide a contact name and phone number for their group for possible contact tracing. Customers are not required to provide contact information.
- Make sure you know who worked each shift in order to facilitate contact tracing..

Traffic, bike and sidewalk safety is very important:

- Parties waiting in line outside your business must remain at least 6 feet apart from each other and from customers who may be waiting in line for other businesses nearby.
- People must be able to freely move on the sidewalk. Avoid blocking anyone's ability to pass safely, including avoiding blocking ADA-compliant sidewalk access.
- You should address any other traffic, bike lane or mobility safety issues specific to your location.

Monitoring and Adjusting

At least on a weekly basis, think about how your business and personnel are doing, how well you are complying with your Social Distancing and Health Plan, and what changes are needed to improve your response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Look for new guidance from the <u>SFDPH Communicable Disease</u> <u>Control and Prevention</u> or the frequently updated page on sf.gov with <u>comprehensive resources for</u> <u>businesses during the COVID-19 pandemic</u>.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q. How often should restrooms be disinfected.

A. Restrooms should be disinfected at the beginning of the workday (or done at closing) and should be disinfected every 3-4 hours.

ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. C19-07e

ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO DIRECTING ALL INDIVIDUALS IN THE COUNTY TO CONTINUE SHELTERING AT THEIR PLACE OF RESIDENCE EXCEPT FOR IDENTIFIED NEEDS AND ACTIVITIES, IN COMPLIANCE WITH SPECIFIED REQUIREMENTS; CONTINUING TO EXEMPT HOMELESS INDIVIDUALS FROM THE ORDER BUT URGING GOVERNMENT AGENCIES TO PROVIDE THEM SHELTER; REQUIRING ALL BUSINESSES AND RECREATION FACILITIES THAT ARE ALLOWED TO OPERATE TO IMPLEMENT SOCIAL DISTANCING, FACE COVERING, AND CLEANING PROTOCOLS; AND DIRECTING ALL BUSINESSES, FACILITY OPERATORS, AND GOVERNMENTAL AGENCIES TO CONTINUE THE TEMPORARY CLOSURE OF ALL OTHER OPERATIONS NOT ALLOWED UNDER THIS ORDER

(SHELTER IN PLACE) DATE OF ORDER: May 22, 2020 (updated June 11, 2020)

Please read this Order carefully. Violation of or failure to comply with this Order is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code § 120295, *et seq.*; California Penal Code §§ 69, 148(a)(1); and San Francisco Administrative Code § 7.17(b))

<u>Summary</u>: The City and County of San Francisco (the "County") and five other Bay Area counties and the City of Berkeley have been under shelter-in-place orders since March 16, 2020, in a collective effort to reduce the impact of the virus that causes coronavirus disease 2019 ("COVID-19"). That virus is easily transmitted, especially in group settings, and the disease can be extremely serious. It can require long hospital stays, and in some instances cause long-term health consequences or death. It can impact not only those known to be at high risk but also other people, regardless of age. This spread of disease is a global pandemic causing untold societal, social, and economic harm. To mitigate the harm from the pandemic, these jurisdictions issued parallel health officer orders on March 16, 2020 imposing shelter in place limitations across the Bay Area, requiring everyone to stay safe at home except for certain essential needs. Other jurisdictions in the Bay Area and ultimately the State have since joined in adopting stay-safe-at-home orders.



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Our collective effort has had a positive impact on limiting the spread of the virus. As of the date of this Order, our hospitals have capacity and hospitalization rates have been relatively low and remained flat or slowly decreasing for over six weeks. San Francisco continues to work on building up its testing, case finding, case investigation, and contact tracing capacity, and its means to protect vulnerable populations and address outbreaks. In light of significant progress made, the prior May 17, 2020 order added two new categories of activities allowed to resume: "Additional Businesses" (described in Appendix C-1) and "Additional Activities" (described in Appendix C-2).

Still, the danger the virus poses to the health and welfare of all continues. A major risk remains the spread of COVID-19 through asymptomatic carriers. Also, while the search continues, there is not yet an effective treatment or cure for the disease. The vast majority of the population remains susceptible to infection. Therefore, this incremental resumption of certain business and other activities is designed to gradually increase the volume of person-to-person contact to help contain the risk of a surge in COVID-19 cases in the County and neighboring counties. Accordingly, the May 17 order explained that the Health Officer will assess the activities allowed by this Order on an ongoing basis and may need to restrict or otherwise modify them if the risk associated with COVID-19 increases in the future. But if San Francisco continues to make progress on ways to contain virus transmission and health-based risk considerations support doing so, the Health Officer will allow additional business and other activity under a phased, incremental process, to provide for a safer economic recovery.

Generally, under this Order gatherings of individuals with anyone outside of their household or living unit remain prohibited, with limited exceptions for essential activities, outdoor activities, additional activities, or essential travel, or to perform work for essential businesses, outdoor businesses, additional businesses, and government agencies. Also, under this Order, many businesses must remain closed. But:

- The May 17 order added curbside or outside pickup of goods from non-essential retail stores, as well as related manufacturing, and warehousing and logistical support to the list of Additional Businesses, subject to specified conditions. The May 17 order also added attendance at outdoor museums, outdoor historical sites, and public gardens to the list of allowed Additional Activities.
- The May 22, 2020 amendment to the Order added childcare programs and summer camps for all children to the list of Additional Business that may resume operations, subject to further requirements in Appendix C-1 and any associated directives.
- The June 1, 2020 update to the Order added curbside/outdoor low contact retail services (like dog grooming and shoe repair), businesses that rent equipment for outdoor activities, and professional sports team practices (with an approved plan), to the list of Additional Business that may resume operations, subject to further requirements in Appendix C-1 and any associated directives.



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- The June 1, 2020 update to the Order also added tennis, golf, and dog parks to the list of Additional Activities that may resume, subject to further requirements in Appendix C-2 and any associated directives.
- This June 11, 2020 update to the Order adds to the list of Additional Business that may resume operations outdoor dining, in-store retail sales, professional sports team games and tournaments without spectators (with an approved plan), streaming or broadcasting of entertainment events (with an approved plan, as necessary), outdoor fitness classes, indoor household services (like house cleaners and cooks), and non-essential offices where telecommuting is not feasible, all subject to further limitations and requirements in Appendix C-1 and any associated directives.
- This June 11, 2020 update to the Order also adds small outdoor special gatherings to the list of Additional Activities that may resume, subject to further limitations and requirements in Appendix C-2 and any associated directives.

The earlier June 1, 2020 revision to the Order updated Appendix A to include new requirements in the Social Distancing Protocol, which continue under this revision to the Order. Any businesses with an existing Social Distancing Protocol must update its Social Distancing Protocol by June 15, 2020. All businesses implementing a Social Distancing Protocol for the first time on or after June 1, 2020 must prepare and implement the updated protocol before resuming operations.

This new Order updates, revises, and replaces the prior extension of the shelter in place order. Since 12:00 p.m. on May 22, 2020, all people and businesses in San Francisco have been required to strictly comply with this updated Order. This Order remains in effect, without a specific expiration date, until it is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Health Officer. But, as mentioned above, the Health Officer will continue to carefully monitor the evolving situation and will periodically revise this Order to loosen – or if need be tighten – restrictions as conditions warrant, to help further the safer economic recovery. Facilities must stay updated by checking the Department of Public Health website (www.sfdph.org/healthorders) regularly.

In addition to extending and replacing Health Officer Order Number C19-07d (shelter in place), this Order also extends Order Nos. C19-01b (prohibiting visitors at Laguna Honda Hospital and Rehabilitation Center and Unit 4A at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital), C19-03 (prohibiting visitors to specific residential facilities), C19-04 (imposing cleaning standards for residential hotels), C19-09 (prohibiting visitors to residential care facilities for the elderly, adult residential facilities, and residential facilities for the chronically ill), and C19-11 (placing Laguna Honda Hospital and Rehabilitation Center under protective quarantine) through for as long as this Order is in effect, with the requirements of those listed orders otherwise remaining unchanged. Order Nos. C19-06b (restricting visitors to general acute care hospitals and acute psychiatric hospitals), C19-08b (limiting most routine appointments and elective surgeries and encouraging delivery of prescriptions and cannabis products), C19-10





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(requiring reporting by labs of COVID-19 testing information), C19-12b (face coverings), and C19-13 (regarding testing, reporting, and cooperation at skilled nursing facilities) remain in effect indefinitely, and this Order makes clear that face coverings are required for operators and customers of additional businesses, with certain limitations. The provisions of this Order are subject to any provisions of the state shelter-in-place order that are more restrictive. This summary is for convenience only and may not be used to interpret this Order; in the event of any inconsistency between the summary and the text of this Order below, the text will control.

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO ("HEALTH OFFICER") ORDERS:

- 1. This Order supersedes the May 17, 2020 Order of the Health Officer directing all individuals to shelter in place (the "Prior Order," Order No. C19-07d). This Order amends, clarifies, and continues certain terms of the Prior Order to ensure continued social distancing and limit person-to-person contact to reduce the rate of transmission of Novel Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19"). This Order continues to restrict most activity, travel, and governmental and business functions to essential needs and to the Outdoor Activities and Outdoor Businesses that the prior Order allowed to resume. But in light of progress achieved in slowing the spread of COVID-19 in the County and neighboring counties, the Order allows a limited number of Additional Businesses and Additional Activities (as defined in Section 15 below and described in Appendixes C-1 and C-2) to resume operating, subject to specified conditions and safety precautions to reduce associated risk of COVID-19 transmission. This gradual and measured resumption of activity is designed to manage the overall volume, duration, and intensity of person-to-person contact to prevent a surge in COVID-19 cases in the County and neighboring counties. As further provided in Section 11 below, the Health Officer will continue to monitor the risks of the activities and businesses allowed under this Order based on the COVID-19 Indicators (as defined in Section 11) and other data, and may, if conditions support doing so, incrementally add to the list of Additional Businesses and Additional Activities. The activities allowed by this Order will be assessed on an ongoing basis, and these activities and others allowed by the Order may need to be modified (including, without limitation, temporarily restricted or prohibited) if the risk associated with COVID-19 increases in the future. As of the effective date and time of this Order set forth in Section 18 below, all individuals, businesses, and government agencies in the County are required to follow the provisions of this Order.
- 2. The primary intent of this Order is to ensure that County residents continue to shelter in their places of residence to slow the spread of COVID-19 and mitigate the impact on delivery of critical healthcare services. This Order allows a limited number of Additional Businesses and Additional Activities to resume while the





ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. C19-07e

Health Officer continues to assess the transmissibility and clinical severity of COVID-19 and monitors indicators described in Section 11. All provisions of this Order must be interpreted to effectuate this intent. Failure to comply with any of the provisions of this Order constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.

- 3. All individuals currently living within the County are ordered to shelter at their place of residence. They may leave their residence only for Essential Activities as defined in Section 15.a, Outdoor Activities as defined in Section 15.m, and Additional Activities as defined in Section 15.o; Essential Governmental Functions as defined in Section 15.d; Essential Travel as defined in Section 15.i; to work for Essential Businesses as defined in Section 15.f, Outdoor Businesses as defined in Section 15.l, and Additional Businesses as defined in Section 15.n; or to perform Minimum Basic Operations for other businesses that must remain temporarily closed, as provided in Section 15.g. For clarity, individuals who do not currently reside in the County must comply with all applicable requirements of the Order when in the County. Individuals experiencing homelessness are exempt from this Section, but are strongly urged to obtain shelter, and governmental and other entities are strongly urged to, as soon as possible, make such shelter available and provide handwashing or hand sanitation facilities to persons who continue experiencing homelessness.
- 4. When people need to leave their place of residence for the limited purposes allowed in this Order, they must strictly comply with Social Distancing Requirements as defined in Section 15.k, except as expressly provided in this Order, and must wear Face Coverings as provided in, and subject to the limited exceptions in, Health Officer Order No. C19-12b issued May 28, 2020 (the "Face Covering Order"), including any amendments to that order.
- 5. All businesses with a facility in the County, except Essential Businesses, Outdoor Businesses, and Additional Businesses, as defined in Section 15, are required to cease all activities at facilities located within the County except Minimum Basic Operations, as defined in Section 15. For clarity, all businesses may continue operations consisting exclusively of owners, personnel, volunteers, or contractors performing activities at their own residences (i.e., working from home). All Essential Businesses are strongly encouraged to remain open. But all businesses are directed to maximize the number of personnel who work from home. Essential Businesses, Outdoor Businesses, and Additional Businesses may only assign those personnel who cannot perform their job duties from home to work outside the home. Outdoor Businesses must conduct all business and transactions involving members of the public outdoors.
- 6. As a condition of operating under this Order, the operators of all businesses must prepare or update, post, implement, and distribute to their personnel a Social





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Distancing Protocol for each of their facilities in the County frequented by personnel or members of the public, as specified in Section 15.h. In addition to the Social Distancing Protocol, all businesses allowed to operate under this Order must follow any industry-specific guidance issued by the Health Officer related to COVID-19 and any conditions on operation specified in this Order, including those specified in Appendix C-1. Except as otherwise provided in Appendix C-1, businesses that include an Essential Business or Outdoor Business component at their facilities alongside other components must, to the extent feasible, scale down their operations to the Essential Business and Outdoor Business components only; provided, however, mixed retail businesses that are otherwise allowed to operate under this Order may continue to stock and sell non-essential products.

- 7. All public and private gatherings of any number of people occurring outside a single household or living unit are prohibited, except for the limited purposes expressly permitted in this Order. Nothing in this Order prohibits members of a single household or living unit from engaging in Essential Travel, Essential Activities, Outdoor Activities, or Additional Activities together.
- 8. All travel, including, but not limited to, travel on foot, bicycle, scooter, motorcycle, automobile, or public transit, except Essential Travel, as defined below in Section 15.i, is prohibited. People may use public transit only for purposes of performing Essential Activities, Outdoor Activities, or Additional Activities, or to travel to and from Essential Businesses, Outdoor Businesses, or Additional Businesses, to maintain Essential Governmental Functions, or to perform Minimum Basic Operations at businesses that are not allowed to resume operations. Transit agencies and people riding on public transit must comply with Social Distancing Requirements, as defined in Section 15.k, to the greatest extent feasible, and personnel and passengers must wear Face Coverings as required by the Face Covering Order. This Order allows travel into or out of the County only to perform Essential Activities, Outdoor Activities, or Additional Activities; to operate, perform Work for, or access a business allowed to operate under this Order; to perform Minimum Basic Operations at other businesses; or to maintain Essential Governmental Functions.
- 9. This Order is issued based on evidence of continued significant community transmission of COVID-19 within the County and throughout the Bay Area; continued uncertainty regarding the degree of undetected asymptomatic transmission; scientific evidence and best practices regarding the most effective approaches to slow the transmission of communicable diseases generally and COVID-19 specifically; evidence that the age, condition, and health of a significant portion of the population of the County places it at risk for serious health complications, including death, from COVID-19; and further evidence that others, including younger and otherwise healthy people, are also at risk for serious outcomes. Due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 disease in the general public, which is now a pandemic according to the World Health Organization, there is a



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public health emergency throughout the County. Making the problem worse, some individuals who contract the virus causing the COVID-19 disease have no symptoms or have mild symptoms, which means they may not be aware they carry the virus and are transmitting it to others. Further, evidence shows that the virus can survive for hours to days on surfaces and be indirectly transmitted between individuals. Because even people without symptoms can transmit the infection, and because evidence shows the infection is easily spread, gatherings and other direct or indirect interpersonal interactions can result in preventable transmission of the virus.

- 10. The collective efforts taken to date regarding this public health emergency have slowed the virus' trajectory, but the emergency and the attendant risk to public health remain significant. As of June 10, 2020, there are 2,840 confirmed cases of COVID-19 in the County (up from 37 on March 16, 2020, just before the first shelter-in-place order) as well as at least 44 deaths (up from 1 death on March 17, 2020). The cumulative number of confirmed cases continues to increase, though the rate of increase has slowed in the weeks leading up to this Order. Evidence suggests that the restrictions on mobility and social distancing requirements imposed by the Prior Order (and the orders that preceded it) are slowing the rate of increase in community transmission and confirmed cases by limiting interactions among people, consistent with scientific evidence of the efficacy of similar measures in other parts of the country and world.
- 11. The local health officers who jointly issued the Prior Order are monitoring several key indicators ("COVID-19 Indicators"), which are among the many factors informing their decisions whether to modify existing shelter-in-place restrictions. Progress on some of these COVID-19 Indicators—specifically related to hospital utilization and capacity—makes it appropriate, at this time, to allow certain Additional Businesses to resume operations and Additional Activities to take place under specified conditions, as set forth in Sections 15.n and 15.o. But the continued prevalence of the virus that causes COVID-19 requires most activities and business functions to remain restricted, and those activities that are allowed to occur must do so subject to social distancing and other infection control practices identified by the Health Officer. Evaluation of the COVID-19 Indicators will be critical to determinations by the local health officers regarding whether the restrictions imposed by this Order will be further modified to ease or tighten the restrictions imposed by this Order and augment, limit, or prohibit the Additional Businesses and Additional Activities allowed to resume. The Health Officer will continually review whether modifications to the Order are warranted based on (1) progress on the COVID-19 Indicators; (2) developments in epidemiological and diagnostic methods for tracing, diagnosing, treating, or testing for COVID-19; and (3) scientific understanding of the transmission dynamics and clinical impact of COVID-19. The COVID-19 Indicators include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - a. The capacity of hospitals and the health system in the County and region, including acute care beds and Intensive Care Unit beds, to provide care for



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COVID-19 patients and other patients, including during a surge in COVID-19 cases.

- b. The supply of personal protective equipment (PPE) available for hospital staff and other healthcare providers and personnel who need PPE to safely respond to and treat COVID-19 patients.
- c. The ability and capacity to quickly and accurately test persons to determine whether they are COVID-19 positive, especially those in vulnerable populations or high-risk settings or occupations.
- d. The ability to conduct case investigation and contact tracing for the volume of cases and associated contacts that will continue to occur, isolating confirmed cases and quarantining persons who have had contact with confirmed cases.
- 12. The scientific evidence shows that at this stage of the emergency, it remains essential to continue to slow virus transmission to help (a) protect the most vulnerable; (b) prevent the health care system from being overwhelmed; (c) prevent long-term chronic health conditions, such as cardiovascular, kidney, and respiratory damage and loss of limbs from blood clotting; and (d) prevent deaths. Continuation of the Prior Order is necessary to slow the spread of the COVID-19 disease, preserving critical and limited healthcare capacity in the County and advancing toward a point in the public health emergency where transmission can be controlled. At the same time, since the Prior Order was issued the County has continued to make progress in expanding health system capacity and healthcare resources and in slowing community transmission of COVID-19. In light of progress on these indicators, and subject to continued monitoring and potential public health-based responses, in addition to those already allowed to operate under the Prior Order as Essential Businesses and Outdoor Businesses, it is appropriate at this time to begin allowing operation of specified Additional Businesses. These businesses are identified based on health-related considerations and transmission risk factors including, but not limited to, the intensity and quantity of contacts and the ability to substantially mitigate transmission risks associated with the operations.
- 13. This Order is issued in accordance with, and incorporates by reference, the March 4, 2020 Proclamation of a State of Emergency issued by Governor Gavin Newsom, the March 12, 2020 Executive Order (Executive Order N-25-20) issued by Governor Gavin Newsom, the February 25, 2020 Proclamation by the Mayor Declaring the Existence of a Local Emergency issued by Mayor London Breed, as supplemented on March 11, 2020, the March 6, 2020 Declaration of Local Health Emergency Regarding Novel Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) issued by the Health Officer, and guidance issued by the California Department of Public Health, as each of them have been and may be supplemented.



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14. This Order is also issued in light of the March 19, 2020 Order of the State Public Health Officer (the "State Shelter Order"), which set baseline statewide restrictions on non-residential business activities, effective until further notice, and the Governor's March 19, 2020 Executive Order N-33-20 directing California residents to follow the State Shelter Order. The May 4, 2020 Executive Order issued by Governor Newsom and May 7, 2020 Order of the State Public Health Officer permit certain businesses to reopen if a local health officer believes the conditions in that jurisdictions warrant it, but expressly acknowledge the authority of local health officers to establish and implement public health measures within their respective jurisdictions that are more restrictive than those implemented by the State Public Health Officer. This Order adopts in certain respects more stringent restrictions addressing the particular facts and circumstances in this County, which are necessary to control the public health emergency as it is evolving within the County and the Bay Area. Without this tailored set of restrictions that further reduces the number of interactions between persons, scientific evidence indicates that the public health crisis in the County will worsen to the point at which it may overtake available health care resources within the County and increase the death rate. Also, this Order enumerates additional restrictions on non-work-related travel not covered by the State Shelter Order; sets forth mandatory Social Distancing Requirements for all individuals in the County when engaged in activities outside their residences; and adds a mechanism to ensure that all businesses with facilities that are allowed to operate under the Order comply with the Social Distancing Requirements. Where a conflict exists between this Order and any state public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the most restrictive provision controls. Consistent with California Health and Safety Code section 131080 and the Health Officer Practice Guide for Communicable Disease Control in California, except where the State Health Officer may issue an order expressly directed at this Order and based on a finding that a provision of this Order constitutes a menace to public health, any more restrictive measures in this Order continue to apply and control in this County. In addition, to the extent any federal guidelines allow activities that are not allowed by this Order, this Order controls and those activities are not allowed.

15. Definitions and Exemptions.

- a. For the purposes of this Order, individuals may leave their residence only to perform the following "Essential Activities." But people at high risk of severe illness from COVID-19 (*see www.sfcdcp.org/vulnerable*) are strongly urged to stay in their residence to the extent possible, except as necessary to seek or provide medical care or Essential Governmental Functions. Essential Activities are:
 - i. To engage in activities or perform tasks important to their health and safety, or to the health and safety of their family or household members (including pets), such as, by way of example only and



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without limitation, obtaining medical supplies or medication, or visiting a health care professional.

- ii. To obtain necessary services or supplies for themselves and their family or household members, or to deliver those services or supplies to others, such as, by way of example only and without limitation, canned food, dry goods, fresh fruits and vegetables, pet supply, fresh meats, fish, and poultry, and any other household consumer products, or products necessary to maintain the habitability, sanitation, and operation of residences.
- iii. To engage in outdoor recreation activity, including, by way of example and without limitation, walking, hiking, bicycling, and running, in compliance with Social Distancing Requirements and with the following limitations:
 - 1. Outdoor recreation activity at parks, beaches, and other open spaces must comply with any restrictions on access and use established by the Health Officer, government, or other entity that manages such area to reduce crowding and risk of transmission of COVID-19. Such restrictions may include, but are not limited to, restricting the number of entrants, closing the area to vehicular access and parking, or closure to all public access;
 - 2. Except as otherwise provided in Appendix C-2, use of outdoor recreational areas and facilities with high-touch equipment or that encourage gathering, including, but not limited to, playgrounds, gym equipment, climbing walls, picnic areas, dog parks, pools, spas, and barbecue areas, is prohibited outside of residences, and all such areas shall be closed to public access including by signage and, as appropriate, by physical barriers;
 - 3. Except as otherwise provided in Appendix C-2, sports or activities that include the use of shared equipment or physical contact between participants may only be engaged in by members of the same household or living unit; and
 - 4. Use of shared outdoor facilities for recreational activities that may occur outside of residences consistent with the restrictions set forth in subsections 1, 2, and 3, above, including, but not limited to, golf courses, skate parks, and athletic fields, must, before they may begin, comply with social distancing and health/safety protocols posted at the site and any other restrictions, including prohibitions, on access and use



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established by the Health Officer, government, or other entity that manages such area to reduce crowding and risk of transmission of COVID-19.

- iv. To perform work for or access an Essential Business, Outdoor Business, or Additional Business; or to otherwise carry out activities specifically permitted in this Order, including Minimum Basic Operations, as defined in this Section.
- v. To provide necessary care for a family member or pet in another household who has no other source of care.
- vi. To attend a funeral with no more than 12 individuals present.
- vii. To move residences. When moving into or out of the Bay Area region, individuals are strongly urged to quarantine for 14 days. To quarantine, individuals should follow the guidance of the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
- viii. To engage in Additional Activities, as specified in Appendix C-2.
- b. For the purposes of this Order, individuals may leave their residence to work for, volunteer at, or obtain services at "Healthcare Operations," including, without limitation, hospitals, clinics, COVID-19 testing locations, dentists, pharmacies, blood banks and blood drives, pharmaceutical and biotechnology companies, other healthcare facilities, healthcare suppliers, home healthcare services providers, mental health providers, or any related and/or ancillary healthcare services. "Healthcare Operations" also includes veterinary care and all healthcare services provided to animals. This exemption for Healthcare Operations shall be construed broadly to avoid any interference with the delivery of healthcare, broadly defined. "Healthcare Operations" excludes fitness and exercise gyms and similar facilities.
- c. For the purposes of this Order, individuals may leave their residence to provide any services or perform any work necessary to the operation and maintenance of "Essential Infrastructure," including airports, utilities (including water, sewer, gas, and electrical), oil refining, roads and highways, public transportation, solid waste facilities (including collection, removal, disposal, recycling, and processing facilities), cemeteries, mortuaries, crematoriums, and telecommunications systems (including the provision of essential global, national, and local infrastructure for internet, computing services, business infrastructure, communications, and web-based services).
- d. For the purposes of this Order, all first responders, emergency management personnel, emergency dispatchers, court personnel, and law enforcement



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personnel, and others who need to perform essential services are categorically exempt from this Order to the extent they are performing those essential services. Further, nothing in this Order shall prohibit any individual from performing or accessing "Essential Governmental Functions," as determined by the governmental entity performing those functions in the County. Each governmental entity shall identify and designate appropriate personnel, volunteers, or contractors to continue providing and carrying out any Essential Governmental Functions, including the hiring or retention of new personnel or contractors to perform such functions. Each governmental entity and its contractors must employ all necessary emergency protective measures to prevent, mitigate, respond to, and recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, and all Essential Governmental Functions shall be performed in compliance with Social Distancing Requirements to the greatest extent feasible.

- e. For the purposes of this Order, a "business" includes any for-profit, nonprofit, or educational entity, whether a corporate entity, organization, partnership or sole proprietorship, and regardless of the nature of the service, the function it performs, or its corporate or entity structure.
- f. For the purposes of this Order, "Essential Businesses" are:
 - i. Healthcare Operations and businesses that operate, maintain, or repair Essential Infrastructure;
 - ii. Grocery stores, certified farmers' markets, farm and produce stands, supermarkets, food banks, convenience stores, and other establishments engaged in the retail sale of unprepared food, canned food, dry goods, non-alcoholic beverages, fresh fruits and vegetables, pet supply, fresh meats, fish, and poultry, as well as hygienic products and household consumer products necessary for personal hygiene or the habitability, sanitation, or operation of residences. The businesses included in this subsection (ii) include establishments that sell multiple categories of products provided that they sell a significant amount of essential products identified in this subsection, such as liquor stores that also sell a significant amount of food;
 - iii. Food cultivation, including farming, livestock, and fishing;
 - iv. Businesses that provide food, shelter, and social services, and other necessities of life for economically disadvantaged or otherwise needy individuals;
 - v. Construction, but only as permitted under the State Shelter Order and only pursuant to the Construction Safety Protocols listed in



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Appendix B and incorporated into this Order by this reference. City public works projects shall also be subject to Appendix B, except if other protocols are specified by the Health Officer;

- vi. Newspapers, television, radio, and other media services;
- vii. Gas stations and auto-supply, auto-repair (including, but not limited to, for cars, trucks, motorcycles and motorized scooters), and automotive dealerships, but only for the purpose of providing autosupply and auto-repair services. This subsection (vii) does not restrict the on-line purchase of automobiles if they are delivered to a residence or Essential Business;
- viii. Bicycle repair and supply shops;
- ix. Banks and related financial institutions;
- x. Service providers that enable real estate transactions (including rentals, leases, and home sales), including, but not limited to, real estate agents, escrow agents, notaries, and title companies, provided that appointments and other residential real estate viewings must only occur virtually or, if a virtual viewing is not feasible, by appointment with no more than two visitors at a time residing within the same household or living unit and one individual showing the unit (except that in person visits are not allowed when the occupant is present in the residence);
- xi. Hardware stores;
- xii. Plumbers, electricians, exterminators, and other service providers who provide services that are necessary to maintaining the habitability, sanitation, or operation of residences and Essential Businesses;
- xiii. Businesses providing mailing and shipping services, including post office boxes;
- xiv. Educational institutions—including public and private K-12 schools, colleges, and universities—for purposes of facilitating distance learning or performing essential functions, or as allowed under subsection (xxvi), provided that social distancing of six feet per person is maintained to the greatest extent possible;
- xv. Laundromats, drycleaners, and laundry service providers;





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- xvi. Restaurants and other facilities that prepare and serve food, but only for delivery or carry out. Schools and other entities that typically provide free food services to students or members of the public may continue to do so under this Order on the condition that the food is provided to students or members of the public on a pick-up and takeaway basis only. Schools and other entities that provide food services under this exemption shall not permit the food to be eaten at the site where it is provided, or at any other gathering site;
- xvii. Funeral home providers, mortuaries, cemeteries, and crematoriums, to the extent necessary for the transport, preparation, or processing of bodies or remains;
- xviii. Businesses that supply other Essential Businesses and Outdoor Businesses with the support or supplies necessary to operate, but only to the extent that they support or supply these businesses. This exemption shall not be used as a basis for engaging in sales to the general public from retail storefronts;
 - xix. Businesses that have the primary function of shipping or delivering groceries, food, or other goods directly to residences or businesses. This exemption shall not be used to allow for manufacturing or assembly of non-essential products or for other functions besides those necessary to the delivery operation;
 - xx. Airlines, taxis, rental car companies, rideshare services (including shared bicycles and scooters), and other private transportation providers providing transportation services necessary for Essential Activities and other purposes expressly authorized in this Order;
 - xxi. Home-based care for seniors, adults, children, and pets;
- xxii. Residential facilities and shelters for seniors, adults, and children;
- xxiii. Professional services, such as legal, notary, or accounting services, when necessary to assist in compliance with non-elective, legally required activities or in relation to death or incapacity;
- xxiv. Services to assist individuals in finding employment with Essential Businesses;
- xxv. Moving services that facilitate residential or commercial moves that are allowed under this Order; and



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- xxvi. Childcare establishments and other educational or recreational institutions or programs providing care or supervision for children of all ages (with the exception of summer camps, which are addressed separately in Appendix C-1) that enable owners, employees, volunteers, and contractors for Essential Businesses, Essential Governmental Functions, Outdoor Businesses, Additional Businesses, or Minimum Basic Operations to work as allowed under this Order. To the extent possible, these operations must comply with the following conditions:
 - 1. They must be carried out in stable groups of 12 or fewer children ("stable" means that the same 12 or fewer children are in the same group each day).
 - 2. Children shall not change from one group to another.
 - 3. If more than one group of children is at one facility, each group shall be in a separate room. Groups shall not mix with each other.
 - 4. Providers or educators shall remain solely with one group of children.
- g. For the purposes of this Order, "Minimum Basic Operations" means the following activities for businesses, provided that owners, personnel, and contractors comply with Social Distancing Requirements as defined this Section, to the extent possible, while carrying out such operations:
 - i. The minimum necessary activities to maintain and protect the value of the business's inventory and facilities; ensure security, safety, and sanitation; process payroll and employee benefits; provide for the delivery of existing inventory directly to residences or businesses; and related functions. For clarity, this section does not permit businesses to provide curbside pickup to customers.
 - ii. The minimum necessary activities to facilitate owners, personnel, and contractors of the business being able to continue to work remotely from their residences, and to ensure that the business can deliver its service remotely.
- h. For the purposes of this Order, all businesses that are operating at facilities in the County visited or used by the public or personnel must, as a condition of such operation, prepare and post a "Social Distancing Protocol" for each of these facilities; provided, however, that construction activities shall instead comply with the Construction Project Safety Protocols set forth in Appendix



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B and not the Social Distancing Protocol. The Social Distancing Protocol must be substantially in the form attached to this Order as Appendix A, and it must be updated from prior versions to address new requirements listed in this Order or in related guidance or directives from the Health Officer. The Social Distancing Protocol must be posted at or near the entrance of the relevant facility, and shall be easily viewable by the public and personnel. A copy of the Social Distancing Protocol must also be provided to each person performing work at the facility. All businesses subject to this paragraph shall implement the Social Distancing Protocol and provide evidence of its implementation to any authority enforcing this Order upon demand. The Social Distancing Protocol must explain how the business is achieving the following, as applicable:

- i. Limiting the number of people who can enter into the facility at any one time to ensure that people in the facility can easily maintain a minimum six-foot distance from one another at all times, except as required to complete Essential Business activity;
- ii. Requiring face coverings to be worn by all persons entering the facility, other than those exempted from face covering requirements (*e.g.*, young children);
- iii. Where lines may form at a facility, marking six-foot increments at a minimum, establishing where individuals should stand to maintain adequate social distancing;
- iv. Providing hand sanitizer, soap and water, or effective disinfectant at or near the entrance of the facility and in other appropriate areas for use by the public and personnel, and in locations where there is highfrequency employee interaction with members of the public (*e.g.*, cashiers);
- v. Providing for contactless payment systems or, if not feasible to do so, the providing for disinfecting all payment portals, pens, and styluses after each use;
- vi. Regularly disinfecting other high-touch surfaces;
- vii. Posting a sign at the entrance of the facility informing all personnel and customers that they should: avoid entering the facility if they have any COVID-19 symptoms; maintain a minimum six-foot distance from one another; sneeze and cough into their own elbow; and not shake hands or engage in any unnecessary physical contact; and



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- viii. Any additional social distancing measures being implemented (see the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's guidance at: <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/community/guidancebusiness-response.html</u>).
- i. For the purposes of this Order, "Essential Travel" means travel for any of the following purposes:
 - i. Travel related to the provision of or access to Essential Activities, Essential Governmental Functions, Essential Businesses, Minimum Basic Operations, Outdoor Activities, Outdoor Businesses, Additional Activities, and Additional Businesses.
 - ii. Travel to care for any elderly, minors, dependents, or persons with disabilities.
 - iii. Travel to or from educational institutions for purposes of receiving materials for distance learning, for receiving meals, and any other related services.
 - iv. Travel to return to a place of residence from outside the County.
 - v. Travel required by law enforcement or court order.
 - vi. Travel required for non-residents to return to their place of residence outside the County. Individuals are strongly encouraged to verify that their transportation out of the County remains available and functional prior to commencing such travel.
 - vii. Travel to manage after-death arrangements and burial.
 - viii. Travel to arrange for shelter or avoid homelessness.
 - ix. Travel to avoid domestic violence or child abuse.
 - x. Travel for parental custody arrangements.
 - xi. Travel to a place to temporarily reside in a residence or other facility to avoid potentially exposing others to COVID-19, such as a hotel or other facility provided by a governmental authority for such purposes.
- j. For purposes of this Order, "residences" include hotels, motels, shared rental units, and similar facilities. Residences also include living structures and outdoor spaces associated with those living structures, such as patios,



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porches, backyards, and front yards that are only accessible to a single family or household unit.

- k. For purposes of this Order, "Social Distancing Requirements" means:
 - i. Maintaining at least six-foot social distancing from individuals who are not part of the same household or living unit;
 - ii. Frequently washing hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or using hand sanitizer that is recognized by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention as effective in combatting COVID-19;
 - iii. Covering coughs and sneezes with a tissue or fabric or, if not possible, into the sleeve or elbow (but not into hands);
 - iv. Wearing a face covering when out in public, consistent with the orders or guidance of the Health Officer; and
 - v. Avoiding all social interaction outside the household when sick with a fever, cough, or other COVID-19 symptoms.

All individuals must strictly comply with Social Distancing Requirements, except to the limited extent necessary to provide care (including childcare, adult or senior care, care to individuals with special needs, and patient care); as necessary to carry out the work of Essential Businesses, Essential Governmental Functions, or provide for Minimum Basic Operations; or as otherwise expressly provided in this Order. Outdoor Activities, Outdoor Businesses, Additional Activities, and Additional Businesses must strictly adhere to these Social Distancing Requirements.

- *l.* For purposes of this Order, "Outdoor Businesses" means:
 - i. The following businesses that normally operated primarily outdoors prior to March 16, 2020 and where there is the ability to fully maintain social distancing of at least six feet between all persons:
 - 1. Businesses primarily operated outdoors, such as wholesale and retail plant nurseries, agricultural operations, and garden centers.
 - 2. Service providers that primarily provide outdoor services, such as landscaping and gardening services, and environmental site remediation services.



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For clarity, "Outdoor Businesses" do not include outdoor restaurants, cafes, or bars. Except as otherwise provided in Appendix C, they also do not include businesses that promote large, coordinated, and prolonged gatherings, such as outdoor concert venues and amusement parks.

- m. For purposes of this Order, "Outdoor Activities" means:
 - i. To obtain goods, services, or supplies from, or perform work for, an Outdoor Business.
 - ii. To engage in outdoor recreation as permitted in Section 15.a.
- n. For purposes of this Order, "Additional Business" means any business, entity, or other organization identified as an Additional Business in Appendix C-1, which will be updated as warranted based on the Health Officer's ongoing evaluation of the COVID-19 Indicators and other data. In addition to the other requirements in this Order, operation of those Additional Businesses is subject to any conditions and health and safety requirements set forth in Appendix C-1 and in any industry-specific guidance issued by the Health Officer.
- o. For purposes of this Order, "Additional Activities" means:
 - i. To obtain goods, services, or supplies from, or perform work for, Additional Businesses identified in Appendix C-1, subject to requirements in this Order, and any conditions and health and safety requirements set forth in this Order or in any industry-specific guidance issued by the Health Officer.
 - ii. To engage in outdoor recreation activities or other activities set forth in Appendix C-2, subject to any conditions and health and safety requirements set forth there.
- 16. Government agencies and other entities operating shelters and other facilities that house or provide meals or other necessities of life for individuals experiencing homelessness must take appropriate steps to help ensure compliance with Social Distancing Requirements, including adequate provision of hand sanitizer. Also, individuals experiencing homelessness who are unsheltered and living in encampments should, to the maximum extent feasible, abide by 12 foot by 12 foot distancing for the placement of tents, and government agencies should provide restroom and hand washing facilities for individuals in such encampments as set forth in Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Interim Guidance Responding to Coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) Among People Experiencing Unsheltered Homelessness (https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/need-extra-





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precautions/unsheltered-homelessness.html).

- 17. Pursuant to Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029, the Health Officer requests that the Sheriff and the Chief of Police in the County ensure compliance with and enforce this Order. The violation of any provision of this Order constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.
- 18. This Order became effective at 12:00 p.m. on May 22, 2020 and will continue, as updated, to be in effect until it is rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Health Officer.
- 19. Effective as of 12:00 p.m. on May 22, 2020, this Order revises and replaces Order Number C19-07d, issued May 17, 2020. This Order also extends Order Nos. C19-01b (prohibiting visitors at Laguna Honda Hospital and Rehabilitation Center and Unit 4A at Zuckerberg San Francisco General Hospital), C19-03 (prohibiting visitors to specific residential facilities), C19-04 (imposing cleaning standards for residential hotels), C19-06 (prohibiting visitors to general acute care hospitals and acute psychiatric hospitals), C19-09 (prohibiting visitors to residential care facilities for the elderly, adult residential facilities, and residential facilities for the chronically ill), and C19-11 (placing Laguna Honda Hospital and Rehabilitation Center under protective quarantine) without any further need to amend those orders, with those listed orders otherwise remaining in effect until the specific listed order or this Order is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Health Officer. This Order does not prohibit amendment of those orders separately. This Order also does not affect Order Nos. C19-08b (limiting routine appointments and elective surgeries and encouraging delivery of prescriptions and cannabis products), C19-10 (requiring reporting by labs of COVID-19 testing information), C19-12b (requiring face coverings), and C19-13 (regarding testing, reporting, and cooperation at skilled nursing facilities), which continue indefinitely as provided in those respective orders until each of them is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Health Officer.
- 20. The County must promptly provide copies of this Order as follows: (1) by posting on the Department of Public Health website (<u>www.sfdph.org/healthorders</u>); (2) by posting at City Hall, located at 1 Dr. Carlton B. Goodlett Pl., San Francisco, CA 94102; and (3) by providing to any member of the public requesting a copy. In addition, the owner, manager, or operator of any facility that is likely to be impacted by this Order is strongly encouraged to post a copy of this Order onsite and to provide a copy to any member of the public asking for a copy.
- 21. If any provision of this Order or its application to any person or circumstance is held to be invalid, the remainder of the Order, including the application of such part or provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected and shall



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continue in full force and effect. To this end, the provisions of this Order are severable.

Social Distancing and Health Protocol Requirements

[You are not required to post these Instructions and Requirements]

Instructions:

The two-page Social Distancing Protocol above must reflect the business's completion of each requirement listed below unless an item is not applicable. Use the two-page checklist above to show compliance with these requirements. The business does <u>not</u> need to post these Instructions and Requirements, only the two-page checklist above.

Any business that has an existing Social Distancing Protocol must update its Social Distance Protocol to meet the requirements in this new version no later than June 15, 2020. Any other business that is implementing a Social Distancing Protocol for the first time on or after June 1, 2020 must comply with the new protocol before resuming operations.

Depending on the nature of the business covered by the Social Distancing Protocol, there are certain people associated with the business who are subject to this protocol. Collectively those people are referred to by this protocol, and any associated Health Officer directive, as "Personnel", and those people include all of the following who provide goods or services associated with the business in the City: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who sell goods or perform services onsite or who deliver goods for the business); independent contractors (such as "gig workers" who perform work via the business's app or other online interface, if any); vendors who are permitted to sell goods onsite (such as farmers or others who sell at stalls in farmers' markets); volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services onsite at the request of the business.

Requirements:

In addition to the items below, this protocol requires the business to ensure that Personnel who perform work associated with the business are addressed by the Social Distancing Protocol and comply with those requirements. Each business is required to take certain steps in the protocol related to its Personnel, including the actions listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 below if Personnel are sick. Each business is prohibited from taking any adverse action against any Personnel for staying home in the circumstances listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 below. Personnel of each business are prohibited from coming to work if they are sick and must comply with the protocol, including the rules for returning to work listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 below.

1. Section 1 – Signage and Education:

- 1.1. Post signage at each public entrance of the facility or location (if any) to inform all Personnel and customers that they must: avoid waiting in line or entering the facility or location if they have a cough or fever, maintain a minimum six-foot distance from one another while in line or in the facility or location, wear a face covering or barrier mask (a "Face Covering") at all times, and not shake hands or engage in any unnecessary physical contact. Criteria for Face Coverings and the requirements related to their use are set forth in Health Officer Order No. C19-12, issued on April 17, 2020 (the "Face Covering Order"). Sample signs are available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19.
- **1.2.** Post a copy of the Social Distancing Protocol at each public entrance to the facility or location.
- **1.3.** Distribute to all Personnel copies of the Social Distancing Protocol.
- **1.4.** Educate all Personnel on the requirements of the Social Distancing Protocol and any other Health Officer directive that applies.

Requirements

2. <u>Section 2 – Personnel and Customer Protection and Sanitation Requirements</u>:

- **2.1.** Instruct all Personnel orally and in writing not to come to work or the facility if they are sick.
- **2.2.** Provide a copy of the attachment to this Exhibit, titled "Information for Personnel (Employees, Contractors, Volunteers) of Additional Business and Other Businesses Permitted To Operate During the Health Emergency" (the "Attachment"), to all Personnel who regularly work at the facility or location in hardcopy format or electronically. PDF and translated versions of the Attachment can be found online at <u>www.sfcdcp.org/covid19</u> (open the "Businesses and Employers" area of the "Information and Guidance for the Public" section). If the Attachment is updated, provide an updated copy to all Personnel.
- **2.3.** Review the criteria listed in Part 1 of the Attachment on a daily basis with all Personnel in the City who regularly work at the facility or location before each person enters work spaces or begins a shift. If such a review is not feasible because the business does not directly interact with some Personnel onsite daily, then that business must for those Personnel (1) instruct such Personnel to review the criteria before each shift in the City and (2) have such Personnel report to the business that they are okay to begin the shift such as through an app, website, or phone call.

Instruct any Personnel who answered yes to any question in Part 1 of the Attachment to return home or not come to work and follow the directions on the Attachment.

- **2.4.** Instruct Personnel who stayed home or who went home based on the criteria listed on the Attachment that they must follow the criteria as well as any applicable requirements from the quarantine and isolation directives (available online at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp</u>) before returning to work. If they are required to self-quarantine or self-isolate, they may only return to work after they have completed self-quarantine or self-isolation. If they test negative for the virus (no virus found), they may only return to work after waiting for the amount of time listed on the Attachment after their symptoms have resolved. Personnel are not required to provide a medical clearance letter to return to work as long as they have met the requirements outlined on the Attachment.
- 2.5. In the coming weeks the Department of Public Health may issue guidelines requiring businesses to comply with COVID-19 testing requirements for employers and businesses. Periodically, check the following website for any testing requirements for employers and businesses: www.sfcdcp.org/covid19. If requirements are added, ensure that the business and all Personnel comply with testing requirements.
- **2.6.** If an aspect of the business is allowed to operate and is covered by a Health Officer directive, then the business must comply with all applicable directives as well as this Social Distancing Protocol. Copies of other directives are available online at <u>www.sfdph.org/directives</u>. For each directive that applies, review the Health and Safety Plan (HSP) requirements and post an additional two-page checklist for each one that applies. In the event that any directive changes the requirements of the Social Distancing Protocol, the more specific language of the directive controls, even if it is less restrictive.
- **2.7.** Instruct all Personnel and customers to maintain at least six-feet distance from others, including when in line and when shopping or collecting goods on behalf of customers, except when momentarily necessary to facilitate or accept payment and hand off items or deliver goods. Note that if the business cannot ensure maintenance of a six-foot distance within the business or facility between Personnel or other people onsite, such as by moving work

stations or spreading Personnel out, it must reduce the number of Personnel permitted in the business or facility accordingly.

- **2.8.** Provide Face Coverings for all Personnel, with instructions that they must wear Face Coverings at all times when at work, as further set forth in the Face Covering Order. A sample sign is available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19. Allow Personnel to bring their own Face Covering if they bring one that has been cleaned before the shift. In general, people should have multiple Face Coverings (whether reusable or disposable) to ensure they use a clean one each day. The Face Covering Order permits certain exceptions, and the business should be aware of those exceptions (for example, children 12 years old or younger or based on a written medical excuse). When Personnel do not wear a Face Covering because of an exception, take steps to otherwise increase safety for all.
- **2.9.** If customers wait in line outside or inside any business or location operated by the business, require customers to wear a Face Covering while waiting in line outside or inside the business or location. This includes taking steps to notify customers they will not be served if they are in line without a Face Covering and refusing to serve a customer without a Face Covering, as further provided in the Face Covering Order. The business may provide a clean Face Covering to customers while in line. For clarity, the transaction must be aborted if the customer is not wearing a Face Covering. But the business must permit a customer to obtain service who is excused by the Face Covering Order from wearing a Face Covering, including by taking steps that can otherwise increase safety for all.
- **2.10.** Provide a sink with soap, water, and paper towels for handwashing, for all Personnel working onsite at the facility or location and for customers if sinks and restrooms are open to customers. Require that all Personnel wash hands at least at the start and end of each shift, after sneezing, coughing, eating, drinking, smoking (to the extent smoking is allowed by law and the business), or using the restroom, when changing tasks, and, when possible, frequently during each shift. Personnel who work off-site, such as driving or delivering goods, must be required to use hand sanitizer throughout their shift.
- 2.11. Provide hand sanitizer effective against COVID-19 at appropriate locations for customers and elsewhere at the business or facility for Personnel. Sanitizer must also be provided to Personnel who shop, deliver, or drive for use when they are shopping, delivering, or driving. If sanitizer cannot be obtained, a handwashing station with soap, water, and paper towels will suffice for Personnel who are on-site at the business. But for Personnel who shop, deliver, or drive in relation to their work, the business must provide hand sanitizer effective against COVID-19 at all times; for any period during which the business does not provide sanitizer to such shopping, delivery, or driving Personnel, the business is not allowed for that aspect of its service to operate in the City. Information on hand sanitizer, including sanitizer effective against COVID-19 and how to obtain sanitizer, is available online from the Food and Drug Administration here: https://www.fda.gov/drugs/information-drug-class/qa-consumers-hand-sanitizers-and-covid-19.
- **2.12.** Provide disinfectant and related supplies to Personnel and require Personnel to sanitize all high-touch surfaces under their control, including but not limited to: shopping carts and baskets used by Personnel and customers; countertops, food/item display cases, refrigerator and freezer case doors, drawers with tools or hardware, and check-out areas; cash registers, payment equipment, and self-check-out kiosks; door handles; tools and equipment used by Personnel during a shift; and any inventory-tracking or delivery-tracking equipment or devices which require handling throughout a work shift. These items should be routinely disinfected during the course of the day, including as required below. A list of products listed by the

- **2.13.**Ensure that all shared devices or equipment are cleaned and/or sanitized by Personnel on frequent schedules, not less than at the beginning and end of each Personnel member's work shift and during the shift.
- **2.14.**Direct all Personnel to avoid touching unsanitized surfaces that may be frequently touched, such as door handles, tools, or credit cards, unless protective equipment such as gloves (provided by the business) are used and discarded after each use or hand sanitizer is used after each interaction.
- **2.15.** Frequently disinfect any break rooms, bathrooms, and other common areas. Create and use a daily checklist to document each time disinfection of these rooms or areas occurs. Conspicuously post the checklist inside each respective break room, bathroom, or other common area clearly detailing the dates and times the room was last cleaned, disinfected, or restocked.
- **2.16.**For any facility or location that has carts, baskets, or other equipment for use by Personnel, assign Personnel to disinfect carts, baskets, or other equipment after each use and take steps to prevent anyone from grabbing used carts, baskets, or other equipment before disinfection.
- 2.17.Establish adequate time in the work day to allow for proper cleaning and decontamination throughout the facility or location by Personnel including, but not limited to, before closing for the day and opening in the morning.
- **2.18.**Suspend use of any microwaves, water coolers, drinking fountains, and other similar group equipment for breaks until further notice. Microwaves may be used if disinfected between each use and hand sanitizer is available nearby.
- **2.19.**When possible, provide a barrier between the customer and the cashier such as a plexi-glass temporary barrier. When not possible, create sufficient space to enable the customer to stand more than six feet away from the cashier while items are being scanned/tallied and bagged.
- **2.20.** Provide for contactless payment systems or, if not feasible, sanitize payment systems, including touch screens, payment portals, pens, and styluses, after each customer use. Customers may pay with cash but to further limit person-to-person contact, Personnel should encourage customers to use credit, debit, or gift cards for payment.
- **2.21.**For any larger facility or location, appoint a designated sanitation worker at all times to continuously clean and sanitize commonly touched surfaces and meet the environmental cleaning guidelines set by the Center for Disease Control and Prevention.
- **2.22.** If an employee or other Personnel tests positive for COVID-19, follow the guidance on "Business guidance if a staff member tests positive for COVID-19," available online at <u>https://sf.gov/business-guidance-if-staff-member-tests-positive-covid-19</u>.
- **2.23.**Post signs to advise customers of the maximum line capacity to ensure that the maximum number of customers in line is not exceeded. Once the maximum number of customers is reached, customers should be advised to return later to prevent buildup of congestion in the line.



[You are not required to post these Instructions and Requirements]

- Requirements
 - **2.24.** Place tape or other markings on the sidewalk or floor at least six feet apart in customer line areas with signs directing customers to use the markings to maintain distance.
 - **2.25.**When stocking shelves, if any, ensure that Personnel wash or sanitize hands before placing items on shelves, making sure to again wash or sanitize hands if they become contaminated by touching face or hair or being exposed to other soiled surfaces.
 - **2.26.**Ensure that all Personnel who select items on behalf of customers wear a Face Covering when selecting, packing, and/or delivering items.
 - 2.27. Require Personnel to wash hands frequently, including:
 - When entering any kitchen or food preparation area
 - Before starting food preparation or handling
 - After touching their face, hair, or other areas of the body
 - After using the restroom
 - After coughing, sneezing, using a tissue, smoking, eating, or drinking
 - Before putting on gloves
 - After engaging in other activities that may contaminate the hands
 - **2.28.**Assign Personnel to keep soap and paper towels stocked at sinks and handwashing stations at least every hour and to replenish other sanitizing products.

<u>City and County of San Francisco Health Officer Order Appendix A - Attachment</u> Handout for Personnel (Employees, Contractors, Volunteers) of Essential Business and Other Businesses Permitted to Operate During the Health Emergency (May 18, 2020)

Any business or entity that is subject to a Health Officer Directive to which this handout is attached (each "Business") must give a copy of this handout to Personnel who work in the City outside their household during this emergency. Go to www.sfcdcp.org/covid19 for more info or a copy of this form.

<u>All Personnel</u>: If you work outside your household in the City during this local health emergency, you may qualify for a <u>free</u> test for the virus that causes COVID-19, <u>even if you have no symptoms</u>. Contact your healthcare provider or go to **CityTestSF** at <u>https://sf.gov/get-tested-covid-19-citytestsf</u> to sign up for a free test.

<u>Part 1</u> – You must answer the following questions before starting your work <u>every day that you work</u>. You may be required to provide the answers in person or via phone or other electronic means to the Business before the start of each shift. If any answers change while you are at work, notify the Business by phone and leave the workplace.

- 1. Within the last 10 days have you been diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming you have the virus?
- 2. Do you live in the same household with, or have you had close contact* with someone who in the past 14 days has been in isolation for COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the virus?

If the answer to either question is "yes", do not go to work and follow the steps listed in Part 2 below.

- 3. Have you had any one or more of these symptoms today or within the past 24 hours, which is new or not explained by another reason?
 - Fever, Chills, or Repeated Shaking/Shivering
 - Cough
 - Sore Throat
 - Shortness of Breath, Difficulty Breathing
 - Feeling Unusually Weak or Fatigued

- Loss of Taste or Smell
- Muscle pain
- Headache
- Runny or congested nose
- Diarrhea

If the answer to Question 3 is "yes", do not go to work and follow the steps listed in Part 3 below.

<u> Part 2</u> –

- If you answered yes to Question 1: you are subject to the Health Officer Isolation Directive. <u>Do not go to work</u>.

- If you answered yes to Question 2: you are subject to the Health Officer Quarantine Directive. <u>Do not go to work</u>.

- Do <u>not</u> return to work until the Isolation or Quarantine Steps tell you it is safe to return!

Part 3 – If you answered yes to Question 3:

You may have COVID-19 and **must be tested for the virus** before returning to work. Without a test, the Business must treat you as being positive for COVID-19 and require you to stay out of work for at least **10** calendar days. In order to return to work sooner and to protect those around you, you must get tested for the virus. Follow these steps:

- Contact your usual healthcare provider about getting tested for the virus, or sign up for free testing at CityTestSF <u>https://sf.gov/get-tested-covid-19-citytestsf</u>. If you live outside the City, you can check with the county where you live, get tested by your usual healthcare provider, or use CityTestSF.
- 2. Wait for your test results at home while minimizing exposure to those you live with. A good resource is https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/if-you-are-sick/steps-when-sick.html
- If your result is positive (confirms that you have the virus) go to *Part 2* above and follow **Isolation Steps**.
- If your result is negative, do not return to work until you have had at least 3 days in a row without fever and with improvement in your other symptoms. Consult with your healthcare provider to decide.

Small Construction Project Safety Protocol (revised May 22, 2020)

- 1. Any construction project meeting any of the following specifications is subject to this Small Construction Project Safety Protocol ("SCP Protocol"), including public works projects unless otherwise specified by the Health Officer:
 - a. For residential projects, any single-family, multi-family, senior, student, or other residential construction, renovation, or remodel project consisting of 10 units or fewer. This SCP Protocol does not apply to construction projects where a person is performing construction on their current residence either alone or solely with members of their own household.
 - b. For commercial projects, any construction, renovation, or tenant improvement project consisting of 20,000 square feet of floor area or less.
 - c. For mixed-use projects, any project that meets both of the specifications in subsections 1.a and 1.b.
 - d. All other construction projects not subject to the Large Construction Project Safety Protocol set forth in Appendix B-2.
- 2. The following restrictions and requirements must be in place at all construction job sites subject to this SCP Protocol:
 - a. Comply with all applicable and current laws and regulations including but not limited to OSHA and Cal-OSHA. If there is any conflict, difference, or discrepancy between or among applicable laws and regulations and/or this SCP Protocol, the stricter standard shall apply.
 - b. Designate a site-specific COVID-19 supervisor or supervisors to enforce this guidance. A designated COVID-19 supervisor must be present on the construction site at all times during construction activities. A COVID-19 supervisor may be an on-site worker who is designated to serve in this role.
 - c. The COVID-19 supervisor must review this SCP Protocol with all workers and visitors to the construction site.
 - d. Establish a daily screening protocol for arriving staff to ensure that potentially infected staff do not enter the construction site. If workers leave the jobsite and return the same day, establish a cleaning and decontamination protocol prior to entry and exit of the jobsite. Post the daily screening protocol at all entrances and exits to the jobsite. More information on screening can be found online at: <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/community/index.html</u>.
 - e. Practice social distancing by maintaining a minimum six-foot distance between workers at all times, except as strictly necessary to carry out a task associated with the construction project.

- f. In the event of a confirmed case of COVID-19 at any jobsite, the following must take place:
 - i. Immediately remove the infected individual from the jobsite with directions to seek medical care.
 - ii. Decontaminate and sanitize all surfaces at each location at which the infected worker was present. Provide those performing the decontamination and sanitization work with medical-grade PPE, ensure the workers are trained in proper use of the PPE, require the workers to use the provided PPE, and prohibit any sharing of the PPE. Prohibit anyone from entering the possibly contaminated area, except those performing decontamination and sanitization work. Cease all work in these locations until decontamination and sanitization is complete.
 - iii. Notify the County Public Health Department Communicable Disease Control (CD Control) immediately at 415-554-2830. Follow all directives and complete any additional requirements by County health officials, including full compliance with any tracing efforts by the County.
- g. Where construction work occurs within an occupied residential unit, separate work areas must be sealed off from the remainder of the unit with physical barriers such as plastic sheeting or closed doors sealed with tape to the extent feasible. If possible, workers must access the work area from an alternative entry/exit door to the entry/exit door used by residents. Available windows and exhaust fans must be used to ventilate the work area. If residents have access to the work area between workdays, the work area must be cleaned and sanitized at the beginning and at the end of workdays. Every effort must be taken to minimize contact between workers and residents, including maintaining a minimum of six feet of social distancing at all times.
- h. Where construction work occurs within common areas of an occupied residential or commercial building or a mixed-use building in use by on-site employees or residents, separate work areas must be sealed off from the rest of the common areas with physical barriers such as plastic sheeting or closed doors sealed with tape to the extent feasible. If possible, workers must access the work area from an alternative building entry/exit door to the building entry/exit door used by residents or other users of the building. Every effort must be taken to minimize contact between worker and building residents and users, including maintaining a minimum of six feet of social distancing at all times.
- i. Prohibit gatherings of any size on the jobsite, including gatherings for breaks or eating, except for meetings regarding compliance with this protocol or as strictly necessary to carry out a task associated with the construction project.
- j. Cal-OSHA requires employers to provide water, which should be provided in single-serve containers. Sharing of any of any food or beverage is strictly prohibited and if sharing is observed, the worker must be sent home for the day.
- k. Provide personal protective equipment (PPE) specifically for use in construction, including gloves, goggles, face shields, and face coverings as appropriate for the activity being performed. At no time may a contractor secure or use medical-grade PPE unless required

due to the medical nature of a jobsite. Face coverings must be worn in compliance with Section 5 of the Health Officer's Order No. C19-12, dated April 17, 2020, or any subsequently issued or amended order.

- *l.* Prohibit use of microwaves, water coolers, and other similar shared equipment.
- m. Strictly control "choke points" and "high-risk areas" where workers are unable to maintain six-foot social distancing and prohibit or limit use to ensure that six-foot distance can easily be maintained between individuals.
- n. Minimize interactions and maintain social distancing with all site visitors, including delivery workers, design professional and other project consultants, government agency representatives, including building and fire inspectors, and residents at residential construction sites.
- o. Stagger trades as necessary to reduce density and allow for easy maintenance of minimum six-foot separation.
- p. Discourage workers from using others' desks, work tools, and equipment. If more than one worker uses these items, the items must be cleaned and disinfected with disinfectants that are effective against COVID-19 in between use by each new worker. Prohibit sharing of PPE.
- q. If hand washing facilities are not available at the jobsite, place portable wash stations or hand sanitizers that are effective against COVID-19 at entrances to the jobsite and in multiple locations dispersed throughout the jobsite as warranted.
- Clean and sanitize any hand washing facilities, portable wash stations, jobsite restroom areas, or other enclosed spaces daily with disinfectants that are effective against COVID-19.
 Frequently clean and disinfect all high touch areas, including entry and exit areas, high traffic areas, rest rooms, hand washing areas, high touch surfaces, tools, and equipment
- s. Maintain a daily attendance log of all workers and visitors that includes contact information, including name, phone number, address, and email.
- t. Post a notice in an area visible to all workers and visitors instructing workers and visitors to do the following:
 - i. Do not touch your face with unwashed hands or with gloves.
 - ii. Frequently wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.
 - iii. Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces such as work stations, keyboards, telephones, handrails, machines, shared tools, elevator control buttons, and doorknobs.
 - iv. Cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing, or cough or sneeze into the crook of your arm at your elbow/sleeve.

- v. Do not enter the jobsite if you have a fever, cough, or other COVID-19 symptoms. If you feel sick, or have been exposed to anyone who is sick, stay at home.
- vi. Constantly observe your work distances in relation to other staff. Maintain the recommended minimum six feet at all times when not wearing the necessary PPE for working in close proximity to another person.
- vii. Do not carpool to and from the jobsite with anyone except members of your own household unit, or as necessary for workers who have no alternative means of transportation.
- viii. Do not share phones or PPE.
- u. The notice in Section 2.t must be translated as necessary to ensure that all non-English speaking workers are able to understand the notice.

Large Construction Project Safety Protocol (revised May 22, 2020)

- 1. Any construction project meeting any of the following specifications is subject to this Large Construction Project Safety Protocol ("LCP Protocol"), including public works projects unless otherwise specified by the Health Officer:
 - a. For residential construction projects, any single-family, multi-family, senior, student, or other residential construction, renovation, or remodel project consisting of more than 10 units.
 - b. For commercial construction projects, any construction, renovation, or tenant improvement project consisting of more than 20,000 square feet of floor area.
 - c. For construction of Essential Infrastructure, as defined in Section 16.c of the Order, any project that requires twenty or more workers at the jobsite at any one time.
- 2. The following restrictions and requirements must be in place at all construction job sites subject to this LCP Protocol:
 - a. Comply with all applicable and current laws and regulations including but not limited to OSHA and Cal-OSHA. If there is any conflict, difference or discrepancy between or among applicable laws and regulations and/or this LCP Protocol, the stricter standard will apply.
 - b. Prepare a new or updated Site-Specific Health and Safety Plan to address COVID-19-related issues, post the Plan on-site at all entrances and exits, and produce a copy of the Plan to County governmental authorities upon request. The Plan must be translated as necessary to ensure that all non-English speaking workers are able to understand the Plan.
 - c. Provide personal protective equipment (PPE) specifically for use in construction, including gloves, goggles, face shields, and face coverings as appropriate for the activity being performed. At no time may a contractor secure or use medical-grade PPE, unless required due to the medical nature of a job site. Face Coverings must be worn in compliance with Section 5 of the Health Officer's Order, dated April 17, 2020, or any subsequently issued or amended order.
 - d. Ensure that employees are trained in the use of PPE. Maintain and make available a log of all PPE training provided to employees and monitor all employees to ensure proper use of the PPE.
 - e. Prohibit sharing of PPE.
 - f. Implement social distancing requirements including, at minimum:

- i. Stagger stop- and start-times for shift schedules to reduce the quantity of workers at the jobsite at any one time to the extent feasible.
- ii. Stagger trade-specific work to minimize the quantity of workers at the jobsite at any one time.
- iii. Require social distancing by maintaining a minimum six-foot distance between workers at all times, except as strictly necessary to carry out a task associated with the project.
- iv. Prohibit gatherings of any size on the jobsite, except for safety meetings or as strictly necessary to carry out a task associated with the project.
- v. Strictly control "choke points" and "high-risk areas" where workers are unable to maintain minimum six-foot social distancing and prohibit or limit use to ensure that minimum six-foot distancing can easily be maintained between workers.
- vi. Minimize interactions and maintain social distancing with all site visitors, including delivery workers, design professional and other project consultants, government agency representatives, including building and fire inspectors, and residents at residential construction sites.
- vii. Prohibit workers from using others' phones or desks. Any work tools or equipment that must be used by more than one worker must be cleaned with disinfectants that are effective against COVID-19 before use by a new worker.
- viii. Place wash stations or hand sanitizers that are effective against COVID-19 at entrances to the jobsite and in multiple locations dispersed throughout the jobsite as warranted.
- ix. Maintain a daily attendance log of all workers and visitors that includes contact information, including name, address, phone number, and email.
- x. Post a notice in an area visible to all workers and visitors instructing workers and visitors to do the following:
 - 1. Do not touch your face with unwashed hands or with gloves.
 - 2. Frequently wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds or use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.
 - 3. Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces such as workstations, keyboards, telephones, handrails, machines, shared tools, elevator control buttons, and doorknobs.
 - 4. Cover your mouth and nose when coughing or sneezing or cough or sneeze into the crook of your arm at your elbow/sleeve.
 - 5. Do not enter the jobsite if you have a fever, cough, or other COVID-19 symptoms. If you feel sick, or have been exposed to anyone who is sick, stay at home.
 - 6. Constantly observe your work distances in relation to other staff. Maintain the recommended minimum six-feet distancing at all times when not wearing the necessary PPE for working in close proximity to another person.
 - 7. Do not share phones or PPE.

- xi. The notice in section 2.f.x must be translated as necessary to ensure that all non-English speaking workers are able to understand the notice.
- g. Implement cleaning and sanitization practices in accordance with the following:
 - i. Frequently clean and sanitize, in accordance with CDC guidelines, all high-traffic and high-touch areas including, at a minimum: meeting areas, jobsite lunch and break areas, entrances and exits to the jobsite, jobsite trailers, hand-washing areas, tools, equipment, jobsite restroom areas, stairs, elevators, and lifts.
 - ii. Establish a cleaning and decontamination protocol prior to entry and exit of the jobsite and post the protocol at entrances and exits of jobsite.
 - iii. Supply all personnel performing cleaning and sanitization with proper PPE to prevent them from contracting COVID-19. Employees must not share PPE.
 - iv. Establish adequate time in the workday to allow for proper cleaning and decontamination including prior to starting at or leaving the jobsite for the day.
- h. Implement a COVID-19 community spread reduction plan as part of the Site-Specific Health and Safety Plan that includes, at minimum, the following restrictions and requirements:
 - i. Prohibit all carpooling to and from the jobsite except by workers living within the same household unit, or as necessary for workers who have no alternative means of transportation.
 - ii. Cal-OSHA requires employers to provide water, which should be provided in singleserve containers. Prohibit any sharing of any food or beverage and if sharing is observed, the worker must be sent home for the day.
 - iii. Prohibit use of microwaves, water coolers, and other similar shared equipment.
- i. Assign a COVID-19 Safety Compliance Officer (SCO) to the jobsite and ensure the SCO's name is posted on the Site-Specific Health and Safety Plan. The SCO must:
 - i. Ensure implementation of all recommended safety and sanitation requirements regarding the COVID-19 virus at the jobsite.
 - ii. Compile daily written verification that each jobsite is compliant with the components of this LCP Protocol. Each written verification form must be copied, stored, and made immediately available upon request by any County official.
 - Establish a daily screening protocol for arriving staff, to ensure that potentially infected staff do not enter the construction site. If workers leave the jobsite and return the same day, establish a cleaning and decontamination protocol prior to entry and exit of the jobsite. Post the daily screening protocol at all entrances and exit to the jobsite. More information on screening can be found online

at: https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/community/index.html.

- iv. Conduct daily briefings in person or by teleconference that must cover the following topics:
 - 1. New jobsite rules and pre-job site travel restrictions for the prevention of COVID-19 community spread.
 - 2. Review of sanitation and hygiene procedures.
 - 3. Solicitation of worker feedback on improving safety and sanitation.
 - 4. Coordination of construction site daily cleaning/sanitation requirements.

- 5. Conveying updated information regarding COVID-19.
- 6. Emergency protocols in the event of an exposure or suspected exposure to COVID-19.
- v. Develop and ensure implementation of a remediation plan to address any noncompliance with this LCP Protocol and post remediation plan at entrance and exit of jobsite during remediation period. The remediation plan must be translated as necessary to ensure that all non-English speaking workers are able to understand the document.
- vi. The SCO must not permit any construction activity to continue without bringing such activity into compliance with these requirements.
- vii. Report repeated non-compliance with this LCP Protocol to the appropriate jobsite supervisors and a designated County official.
- j. Assign a COVID-19 Third-Party Jobsite Safety Accountability Supervisor (JSAS) for the jobsite, who at a minimum holds an OSHA-30 certificate and first-aid training within the past two years, who must be trained in the protocols herein and verify compliance, including by visual inspection and random interviews with workers, with this LCP Protocol.
 - i. Within seven calendar days of each jobsite visit, the JSAS must complete a written assessment identifying any failure to comply with this LCP Protocol. The written assessment must be copied, stored, and, upon request by the County, sent to a designated County official.
 - ii. If the JSAS discovers that a jobsite is not in compliance with this LCP Protocol, the JSAS must work with the SCO to develop and implement a remediation plan.
 - iii. The JSAS must coordinate with the SCO to prohibit continuation of any work activity not in compliance with rules stated herein until addressed and the continuing work is compliant.
 - iv. The remediation plan must be sent to a designated County official within five calendar days of the JSAS's discovery of the failure to comply.
- k. In the event of a confirmed case of COVID-19 at any jobsite, the following must take place:
 - i. Immediately remove the infected individual from the jobsite with directions to seek medical care.
 - Decontaminate and sanitize all surfaces at each location at which the infected worker was present. Provide those performing the decontamination and sanitization work with medical-grade PPE, ensure the workers are trained in proper use of the PPE, require the workers to use the provided PPE, and prohibit any sharing of the PPE. Prohibit anyone from entering the possibly contaminated area, except those performing decontamination and sanitization work. Cease all work in these locations until decontamination and sanitization is complete.
 - iii. Notify the County Public Health Department Communicable Disease Control (CD Control) immediately at 415-554-2830. Follow all directives and complete any

additional requirements by County health officials, including full compliance with any tracing efforts by the County.

- I. Where construction work occurs within an occupied residential unit, any separate work area must be sealed off from the remainder of the unit with physical barriers such as plastic sheeting or closed doors sealed with tape to the extent feasible. If possible, workers must access the work area from an alternative entry/exit door to the entry/exit door used by residents. Available windows and exhaust fans must be used to ventilate the work area. If residents have access to the work area between workdays, the work area must be cleaned and sanitized at the beginning and at the end of workdays. Every effort must be taken to minimize contact between workers and residents, including maintaining a minimum of six feet of social distancing at all times.
- m. Where construction work occurs within common areas of an occupied residential or commercial building or a mixed-use building in use by on-site employees or residents, any separate work area must be sealed off from the rest of the common areas with physical barriers such as plastic sheeting or closed doors sealed with tape to the extent feasible. If possible, workers must access the work area from an alternative building entry/exit door to the building entry/exit door used by residents or other users of the building. Every effort must be taken to minimize contact between worker and building residents and users, including maintaining a minimum of six feet of social distancing at all times.

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A. General Requirements

The "Additional Businesses" listed below may begin operating, subject to the requirements set forth in the Order and to any additional requirements set forth below or in separate industry-specific guidance by the Health Officer. These businesses were selected based on current health-related information and the availability and efficacy of measures that can substantially mitigate the risk of COVID-19 transmission associated with these business operations and related factors, such as the following:

- Increase in mobility and volume of activity—the overall impact that allowing these businesses to begin resuming operation will have on the number of people leaving their homes;
- **Contact intensity**—the type (close or distant) and duration (brief or prolonged) of the person-to-person contact involved in the business;
- **Number of contacts**—the approximate number of people likely to be in the setting at the same time; and
- **Modification potential**—the degree to which mitigation measures are likely to decrease the risk of transmission.

To mitigate the risk of transmission to the greatest extent possible, before resuming operations, each Additional Business must:

- a. Comply with Social Distancing Requirements, including preparation, posting, implementation, and distribution to their Personnel a Social Distancing Protocol as specified in Section 6 and subsection 15.h of the Order for each of their facilities in the County where personnel or members of the public will be onsite; and
- b. Prepare, post, implement, and distribute to their Personnel a written health and safety plan that addresses all applicable best practices set forth in relevant Health Officer directives; and
- c. Comply with any relevant state guidance and local directives. If a conflict exists between state guidance and local public heath directives related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the most restrictive provision shall be followed.

The health-related basis for selection of Additional Businesses and the specific requirements for risk mitigation are detailed below.

As used in this Appendix C-1, "Personnel" means the following people who provide goods or services associated with the Additional Business in the County: employees; contractors and subcontractors (such as those who sell goods or perform services onsite or who deliver goods for the business); independent contractors; vendors who are permitted to sell goods onsite; volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services onsite at the request of the Additional Business. "Personnel" includes "gig workers" who perform work via the Additional Business's app or other online interface, if any.

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B. <u>List of Additional Businesses</u>

(1) <u>Retail Stores for Goods</u>

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Retail sale of goods typically involves a moderate level of contact for a short duration and can proceed with safety limitations to ensure adequate social distancing and decrease the risk of virus transmission.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions to Operate</u>.
 - 1. <u>Curbside/Outdoor Pickup:</u> Retail stores may operate for curbside/outside pickup of goods, subject to the following limitations:
 - i. The store must limit the number of Personnel in the facility so that Personnel can comply with Social Distancing Requirements;
 - ii. The store must create, post and implement a Social Distancing Protocol (Appendix A) and must comply with Health Officer Directive No. 2020-10b, as that directive may be amended from time to time, regarding required best practices for retail businesses with curbside pickup—including the requirement to create a Health and Safety Plan;
 - iii. If a store chooses to display merchandise for sale on tables or otherwise outside the store, it must comply with the following specific requirements:
 - The store must obtain any necessary permits from the City;
 - Customers must either use hand sanitizer before touching items or ask the vendor to hand items to them;

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- Only the number of customers that can maintain social distancing may approach the table at a time;
- Chalk demarcations must be placed on the ground to indicate where shoppers should stand behind others, while waiting to purchase items; and
- The store must take measures to help ensure against congestion and blocking passage by pedestrians, including people with disabilities.

Stores may apply for a free temporary permit to use the sidewalk or parking lane for retail operations at <u>https://sf.gov/use-sidewalk-or-parking-lane-your-business</u>.

- The store must have direct access to an immediately adjacent sidewalk, street, alley, or parking area for pickup by customers using any mode of travel, without blocking pedestrian access or causing pedestrian or vehicle congestion; and
- v. Retail stores that are in an enclosed Indoor Shopping Center (defined as a large building or group of buildings where customer access to stores is possible only through indoor passage ways or indoor common areas, such as Stonestown Galleria, Westfield San Francisco Centre and the Ferry Building Marketplace) and that do not have direct access to adjacent sidewalk, street, parking lot or alley area, may only reopen for curbside/outdoor pickup at this time if the Indoor Shopping Center operator submits to the Health Officer a proposed plan for reopening and that plan is approved as provided below. The proposed plan must include:
 - a. the number of stores and businesses that would be resuming operation;
 - b. the number of Personnel associated with each store or business;
 - c. the number of customers expected daily; and
 - d. the specific social distancing/sanitation measures the shopping center would employ to prevent congestion at the doorways and streets, and protect customers and Personnel.

Plans should be submitted to HealthPlan@sfcityatty.org. Subject to the written approval of the Health Officer or the Health Officer's designee, retailers in the Indoor Shopping Center may then operate for curbside pickup consistent with the approved plan.

- 2. <u>In-Store Retail:</u> Beginning at 6:00 a.m. on June 15, 2020, retail stores may begin to operate for indoor shopping, subject to the following limitations and conditions:
 - i. The store must reduce maximum occupancy to limit the number of people (including both customers and Personnel) to the <u>lesser</u> of: (1) 50% the store's normal maximum occupancy or (2) the number of people who can maintain at least six feet of physical distance from each other in the store at all times;
 - ii. Before opening for in-store shopping, the store must create, post and implement a Social Distancing Protocol (Appendix A) and must comply with

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Health Officer Directive No. 2020-17, as that directive may be amended from time to time, regarding required best practices for retail businesses offering instore shopping or services—including the requirement to create a Health and Safety Plan;

- iii. If a store chooses to display merchandise for sale on tables or otherwise outside the store, it must comply with the following specific requirements:
 - The store must obtain any necessary permits from the City;
 - Customers must either use hand sanitizer before touching items or ask the vendor to hand items to them;
 - Only the number of customers that can maintain social distancing may approach the table at a time;
 - Chalk demarcations must be placed on the ground to indicate where shoppers should stand behind others, while waiting to purchase items; and
 - The store must take measures to help ensure against congestion and blocking passage by pedestrians, including people with disabilities.

Stores may apply for a free temporary permit to use the sidewalk or parking lane for retail operations at <u>https://sf.gov/use-sidewalk-or-parking-lane-your-business</u>.

- iv. Retail stores that are in an enclosed Indoor Shopping Center (as defined in subsection (1)b.1.v. above) and that do not have direct access to adjacent sidewalk, street, parking lot or alley area, may only reopen for in-store retail at this time if the Indoor Shopping Center submits to the Health Officer a proposed plan for reopening and that plan is approved as provided below. The proposed plan must include:
 - a. the number of stores and businesses that would be resuming operation;
 - b. the number of Personnel associated with each store or business;
 - c. the number of customers expected daily;
 - d. how they will regulate the number of people in the common areas of the shopping center;
 - e. how they will address HVAC/circulated air, use of elevators, use and cleaning of bathrooms;
 - f. any special considerations for indoor parking garages and access points; and
 - g. whether the shopping center will permit curbside pickup.

Plans should be submitted to HealthPlan@sfcityatty.org. Subject to the written approval of the Health Officer or the Health Officer's designee, the shopping center may then operate for in-store retail consistent with the approved plan.

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For clarity, operation of retail stores under category (1) and (2), above, applies only to the sale of goods and not to the provision of services or the rental of equipment, which are covered separately in Sections (4) and (5), below.

(Added May 17, 2020; Revised June 1, 2020, June 11, 2020)

(2) Manufacturing, Warehousing and Logistical Support

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Risks of virus transmission associated with this activity can be mitigated through measures that ensure adequate social distancing among Personnel and other safety protocols.
- b. Description and Conditions to Operate.
 - 1. <u>Manufacturing</u>: Manufacturing businesses—including non-essential manufacturing businesses —may operate, subject to the following limitations and conditions:
 - i. The business must limit the number of Personnel in the facility so that Personnel can comply with Social Distancing Requirements; and
 - ii. The business must create, post and implement a Social Distancing Protocol (Appendix A) and must comply with Health Officer Directive No. 2020-11, as that directive may be amended from time to time, regarding required best practices for manufacturing businesses—including the requirement to create a Health and Safety Plan.
 - 2. <u>Warehousing and Logistical Support:</u> Businesses that provide warehousing and logistical support—including non-essential businesses —may operate, subject to the following limitations and conditions:
 - i. The business must limit the number of Personnel in the facility so that Personnel can comply with Social Distancing Requirements; and
 - ii. The business must create, post and implement a Social Distancing Protocol (Appendix A) and must comply with Health Officer Directive No. 2020-12, as that directive may be amended from time to time, regarding required best practices for warehouse and logistical support businesses—including the requirement to create a Health and Safety Plan.

(Added May 17, 2020; Revised June 1, 2020, June 11, 2020)

(3) Childcare Programs and Summer Camps for All Children

a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Childcare is critical to early education and developmental equity, family social and economic wellbeing, and economic recovery from the pandemic. More

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specifically, childcare is an important element for a child's social and emotional development, as well as for a child's physical health and wellness. Also, childcare is often necessary to allow parents or guardians to work, making the availability of childcare important for individual families as well as the local economy. Although attendance at a childcare program involves a high number of close contacts that may be of lengthy duration. The risks of virus transmission can be reduced by mitigation measures, as generally described below. But children's inability to consistently follow social distancing and sanitation recommendations means that even with the mitigation measures the risk of transmission is higher than in interactions exclusively among adults. And while based on available evidence, children do not appear to be at higher risk for COVID-19 than adults, medical knowledge about the possible health effects of COVID-19 on children is evolving. Accordingly, the decision about whether to enroll a child in a childcare program is an individualized inquiry that should be made by parents/guardians with an understanding of the risks that such enrollment entails. Parents/guardians may discuss these risks and their concerns with their pediatrician. The Health Officer will continue to monitor the changing situation and may amend this section as necessary to protect the public health.

b. Description and Conditions to Operate.

- 1. <u>Childcare Programs:</u> Educational or recreational institutions or programs that provide care or supervision for children of any age (with the exception of summer camps, which are addressed separately in (b)(2) below) ("Childcare Programs") may open for all children, subject to the following limitations and conditions:
 - i. State-licensed Childcare Programs for children ages 0-5 years must limit group size to 10 children per room or space under state licensing requirements; if the state increases the permitted group size, State-licensed Childcare Programs may increase the size of their groups accordingly, not to exceed 12 children;
 - ii. All other Childcare Programs (not State-licensed) must limit group size to 12 children per room or space;
 - iii. Childcare Program sessions must be at least three weeks long, and childcare programs without set sessions may not enroll children for fewer than three weeks;
 - iv. Childcare Programs must create, post and implement a Social Distancing Protocol and comply with all of the requirements set forth in relevant industry-specific Health Officer directives (*see* Health Officer Directive 2020-14), including the requirements to have the parent(s) or guardian(s) of any child attending the program sign an acknowledgement of health risks, and to prepare and implement a written health and safety plan to mitigate the risk of virus transmission to the greatest extent feasible.
- 2. <u>Summer Camps:</u> Beginning at 7:00 a.m. on June 15, 2020, summer camps and summer learning programs that operate exclusively outside of the academic school year ("Summer Camps") may open for all children over the age of six and school-

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aged children currently in grades transitional kindergarten (TK) and above who are under age six, subject to the following limitations and conditions:

- i. Summer Camps must limit group size to 12 children (a "pod") per room or space;
- ii. Summer Camp sessions must last at least three weeks;
- iii. Children must remain in the same pod for at least three weeks, and preferably for the entire time throughout the summer.
- iv. Summer Camps may not begin to operate for any children before June 15, 2020, and until they have created, posted and implemented a Social Distancing Protocol and complied with all of the requirements set forth in relevant industry-specific Health Officer directives (*see* Health Officer Directive 2020-13) including the requirements to complete an online form with general information about the program and required certifications, to have the parent(s) or guardian(s) of any child attending the program sign an acknowledgement of health risks, and to prepare and implement a written health and safety plan to mitigate the risk of virus transmission to the greatest extent feasible.

For clarity, Childcare Programs that were already operating after May 22, 2020 in accordance with previous Health Orders or Directives for the children of parent(s) or guardian(s) who are owners, employees, volunteers, and contractors of Essential Businesses, Essential Governmental Functions, Outdoor Businesses, or Additional Businesses, may continue to operate as long as they comply with the above conditions and the relevant industry-specific directive. On June 1, 2020, Childcare Programs may begin to operate for all children. Summer Camps may not begin to operate for any children before June 15, 2020, and must comply with all of the requirements of the relevant industry-specific directive before beginning to operate Childcare Programs and Summer Camps may operate for all or part of the day.

(Added May 22, 2020; Revised June 1, 2020; Non-substantive revisions June 11, 2020)

(4) Outdoor Curbside Pickup and Drop-Off for Low Contact Retail Services

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Low contact retail services involve low contact intensity and a moderate number of contacts. Accordingly, the risk of virus transmission is relatively low and mitigation measures can further decrease this risk. Also resumption of these services is expected to result in only a small increase in the number of people reentering the workforce and the overall volume of commercial activity.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions to Operate</u>. Services that do not generally require close customer contact (e.g., dog grooming and shoe or electronics repair) may operate, subject to the following limitations and conditions:
 - i. To the extent feasible, all interactions and transactions between Personnel and customers should occur outdoors;

- ii. The store must limit the number of Personnel in the facility so that Personnel can comply with Social Distancing Requirements;
- iii. The businesses must create, post and implement a Social Distancing Protocol and comply with Health Officer Directive No. 2020-10b, as that directive may be amended from time to time, regarding required best practices for retail businesses with curbside pickup and drop-off;
- iv. The stores must have direct access to an immediately adjacent sidewalk, street, alley, or parking area for pickup by customers using any mode of travel, without blocking pedestrian access or causing pedestrian or vehicle congestion; and
- v. Stores in an enclosed indoor shopping center that do not have direct access to adjacent sidewalk, street, parking lot or alley area may not reopen at this time unless they are located in an approved Indoor Shopping Center as described in (1)b above.

For clarity, this provision does not apply to personal service businesses, such as hair salons, barbershops, nail salons, or piercing or tattoo parlors. As discussed in Section (1)b above regarding retail stores and Indoor Shopping Centers, stores within enclosed shopping centers may operate only upon written approval by the Health Officer or the Health Officer's designee of a plan submitted by the Indoor Shopping Center operator. Plans should be submitted to HealthPlan@sfcityatty.org.

(Added June 1, 2020; Revised June 11, 2020)

(5) Outdoor Activity Equipment Rental Businesses

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Picking up rental equipment for permissible outdoor activities involves only low contact intensity and a moderate number of contacts. Accordingly, the risk of transmission is relatively low and mitigation measures can further decrease this risk. Also the risk of multiple individuals using shared equipment can be mitigated through sanitation measures. Finally, resumption of these businesses is expected to result in only a small increase in the number of people reentering the workforce and the overall volume of commercial activity.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions to Operate</u>. Businesses that rent equipment for permissible outdoor recreational activities (e.g., bicycles, kayaks, paddleboards, boats, horseback riding or fishing equipment) may operate, subject to the following limitations and conditions:
 - i. To the extent feasible, all interactions and transactions between Personnel and customers should occur outdoors;
 - ii. The store must limit the number of Personnel in the facility so that Personnel can comply with Social Distancing Requirements;

- The business must have created, posted and implemented a Social Distancing Protocol and must comply with Health Officer Directive No. 2020-10b, as that directive may be amended from time to time, regarding required best practices for retail businesses with curbside pickup and drop-off;
- iv. The business must have direct access to an immediately adjacent sidewalk, street, alley, or parking area for pickup by customers using any mode of travel, without blocking pedestrian access or causing pedestrian or vehicle congestion;
- v. Businesses in an enclosed indoor shopping center that do not have direct access to adjacent sidewalk, street, parking lot or alley area may not reopen at this time unless they are in an approved Shopping Center as described in (1)b above; and
- vi. All equipment must be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected between each use with procedures effective against the Novel Coronavirus SARS-CoV-2 in accordance with the following guidelines, which may be modified by the Health Officer as new information becomes available:
 - For hard non-porous surfaces, clean with detergent or soap and water if the surfaces are visibly dirty, before applying disinfectant. For these purposes, appropriate disinfectants include:
 - Products listed on the Environmental Protection Agency's list of Disinfectants for Use Against SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19), which can be found online at <u>https://www.epa.gov/pesticide-registration/list-ndisinfectants-use-against-sars-cov-2-covid-19</u>. Follow the manufacturer's instructions for concentration, application method, and contact time for all cleaning and disinfection products.
 - Diluted household bleach solutions prepared according to the manufacturer's label for disinfection, if appropriate for the surface. Follow manufacturer's instructions for application and proper ventilation. Check to ensure the product is not past its expiration date. Never mix household bleach with ammonia or any other cleanser.
 - Alcohol solutions with at least 70% alcohol.
 - For soft or porous surfaces, remove any visible contamination, if present, and clean with appropriate cleaners indicated for use on these surfaces. After cleaning, use products that are EPA-approved as effective against SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19) (see link above) and that are suitable for porous surfaces.
 - For frequently touched electronic surfaces, remove visible dirt, then disinfect following the manufacturer's instructions for all cleaning and disinfection products. If no manufacturer guidance is available, then consider the using alcohol-based wipes or sprays containing at least 70% alcohol to disinfect.
 - Gloves and any other disposable PPE used for cleaning and disinfecting the vehicle must be removed and disposed of after cleaning; wash hands immediately after removing gloves and PPE with soap and water for at least

20 seconds, or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available. If a disposable gown was not worn, work uniforms/clothes worn during cleaning and disinfecting should be laundered afterwards using the warmest appropriate water setting and dry items completely. Wash hands after handling laundry.

As discussed in Section (1)b above regarding retail stores and Indoor Shopping Centers, stores within Indoor Shopping Centers may operate only upon written approval by the Health Officer or the Health Officer's designee of a plan submitted by the Indoor Shopping Center operator. Proposed plans should be submitted to HealthPlan@sfcityatty.org.

(Added June 1, 2020; Revised June 11, 2020)

(6) <u>Professional Sports Teams: Practices, Games, and Tournaments without In-Person</u> <u>Spectators with an Approved Plan</u>

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Although contact sports may present a significant risk of virus transmission, those risks can be mitigated by stringent social distancing, sanitation, and testing measures. Resuming such events—without a live audience and subject to strict health controls and mitigation measures—represents a first step toward the resumption of professional sports exhibitions that can be broadcast for the entertainment of the public and viewed by the public remotely in a safe manner.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions to Operate</u>. Professional sports teams that wish to resume practices, games, or tournaments and broadcasting of those events in San Francisco, without in-person spectators, may submit to the Health Officer a proposed plan detailing the sanitation, social distancing, health screening, and other procedures that will be implemented to minimize the risk of transmission among players, staff, media, broadcast crew, and any others who will be in the facility. The plan must include a proposal for interval testing (without using City resources) of all players and coaching staff who will be present in the facility. Plans should be submitted to HealthPlan@sfcityatty.org. Subject to the written approval of the Health Officer or the Health Officer's designee, the team may then resume activities consistent with the approved plan, including any conditions to approval of the Health Officer or the Health Officer's designee. Crew, athletes, coaching staff and other workers should also abide by protocols agreed to by labor and management, to the extent they are at least as protective of health as the approved plan.

(Added June 1, 2020; Revised June 11, 2020)

(7) <u>Entertainment Venues: Live Streaming or Broadcasting Events without In-Person</u> <u>Audiences with an Approved Plan</u>

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Although some types of live entertainment and cultural events, such as music, dance and comedy performances, may present a risk of virus transmission, those risks can be mitigated by stringent social distancing, sanitation, and testing measures. Resuming such events—without a live audience and subject to strict health controls and mitigation measures—represents a first step toward the resumption of these entertainment and cultural activities that can be broadcast and watched by the public remotely in a safe manner.
- b. Description and Conditions to Operate.
 - 1. Operators of entertainment venues may film, stream, or otherwise broadcast small scale events so long as:
 - i. the venue remains closed to the public;
 - ii. the live stream is limited to the fewest number of personnel needed (up to a maximum of 12 people in the facility, including, without limitation, media personnel needed for the broadcast);
 - iii. doors and windows are left open to the extent possible, or mechanical ventilation systems are run, to increase ventilation;
 - iv. the venue complies with the Social Distancing Requirements set forth in Section 15.k of this Order; and
 - v. Because singing and playing wind or brass instruments can transmit particles farther in the air than breathing or speaking quietly, people must be in an isolation booth or in a separate room from others in the facility while singing or playing wind or brass instruments.
 - 2. Operators of entertainment venues that wish to film, stream, or otherwise broadcast events that require more than 12 people to be on site at the facility at any one time may submit to the Health Officer a proposed plan detailing the sanitation, social distancing, health screening, and other procedures that will be implemented to minimize the risk of transmission among participants. If the event involves singing, playing wind or brass instruments, or physical contact, the plan must include a proposal for interval testing (without using City resources) of those individuals. Proposed plans should be submitted to HealthPlan@sfcityatty.org. Subject to the written approval of the Health Officer or the Health Officer's designee, the venue may then begin operating consistent with the approved plan, including any conditions to approval of the Health Officer or the Health Officer's designee. Cast, crew, and other workers should also abide by protocols agreed to by labor and management, to the extent they are at least as protective of health as the approved plan.

(Added June 11, 2020)

(8) <u>Outdoor Dining</u>

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Outdoor dining with small groups of people involves moderate contact intensity and a moderate number of contacts. Accordingly, and because face coverings must be removed to eat and drink, the risk of virus transmission is slightly higher than in other allowable interactions. But businesses that involve outdoor interactions carry a lower risk of transmission than most indoor businesses, and mitigation measures in outdoor dining establishments can significantly decrease the transmission risk. Finally, because many restaurants are already open for pickup and delivery, resumption of outdoor dining is expected to result in only a small increase in the number of people reentering the workforce and the overall volume of commercial activity.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions to Operate</u>. Beginning at 6:00 a.m. on June 12, 2020, restaurants and bars that serve food ("outdoor dining establishments") may begin to operate for outdoor dining only subject to the following limitations and conditions:
 - i. Patrons must remain outside the outdoor dining establishment and may enter the establishment only (1) to access a bathroom, (2) to access an outdoor space that is only accessible by traveling through the restaurant, or (3) to order or pickup food at an indoor counter;
 - ii. Tables used to seat patrons outdoors must be spaced at least six feet apart or separated by an impermeable physical barrier between;
 - iii. No more than six patrons may be seated at a single table, unless all are members of the same household—it is strongly encouraged that only individuals in the same household sit together at a single table;
 - An outdoor dining establishment shall not be permitted to provide alcoholic beverage service without also providing real meal service in a bona fide manner. Bona fide meals must be prepared and served by the outdoor dining establishment or another person or business operating under an agreement with the outdoor dining establishment. The service of prepackaged food like sandwiches or salads, or simply heating frozen or prepared meals, shall not be deemed as compliant with this requirement;
 - v. No patrons are allowed to eat or drink indoors in the dining establishment; and
 - vi. The business must have created, posted and implemented a Social Distancing Protocol and must comply with Health Officer Directive No. 2020-16, as that directive may be amended from time to time, regarding required best practices for outdoor dining.

Outdoor dining establishments may apply for a free temporary permit to use the sidewalk or parking lane for business operations at <u>https://sf.gov/use-sidewalk-or-parking-lane-your-business</u>.

(Added June 11, 2020)

(9) Outdoor Fitness Classes

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Outdoor fitness classes of small, socially distanced groups involve moderate contact intensity (prolonged duration but relatively long distance) and a moderate number of contacts. Accordingly, and because exercise causes people to more forcefully expel airborne particles, the risk of virus transmission is higher than in other allowable interactions. But businesses that involve outdoor interactions carry a lower risk of transmission than most indoor businesses, and mitigation measures in outdoor fitness classes can significantly decrease the transmission risk.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions to Operate</u>. Beginning at 6:00 a.m. on June 15, 2020, outdoor fitness classes (e.g., outdoor boot camp, non-contact dance classes, tai chi, pilates, and yoga classes) may begin to operate subject to the following limitations and conditions:
 - i. No more than 12 people, including the instructor(s), may participate in an outdoor fitness class;
 - ii. The business/instructor should ask participants to voluntarily provide their name and phone number for potential contact tracing purposes—the business/instructor should keep this information on file for at least three weeks;
 - iii. The business/instructor must ask each participant whether they have had any of the following symptoms within the prior 24 hours that are new and not explained by another reason:
 - Fever or chills
 - Cough
 - Sore throat
 - Shortness of breath or trouble breathing
 - Feeling unusually weak or fatigued

- New loss of taste or smell
- Muscle pain
- Headache
- Runny or congested nose
- diarrhea

or fatigued Any participants who report having any of these symptoms should not be

permitted to come to or participate in the fitness class.

In addition, the business/instructor must ask each participant (1) if within the last 10 days they have been diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus; and (2) if they live with or have had close contact with someone who in the past 14 days was diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus in that same period. Any participants who answer yes to either of these questions should not be permitted to come to or participate in the fitness class.

- iv. All participants must maintain a physical distance of at least six feet from each other, from the instructor(s), and from members of the public at all times;
- v. The business/instructor must have permission of the property owner to use the space;

- vi. All participants and instructors must wear a face covering at all times, unless they are specifically exempted from the face covering requirements in Health Officer Order No. C19-12b, issued on May 28, 2020, as that order may be amended from time to time; and
- vii. Equipment (e.g., medicine balls, resistance bands, mats, weights, or yoga blocks) may not be shared by members of the class and must be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected between each use with procedures effective against the Novel Coronavirus SARS-CoV-2 in accordance with the following guidelines, which may be modified by the Health Officer as new information becomes available:
 - For hard non-porous surfaces, clean with detergent or soap and water if the surfaces are visibly dirty, before applying disinfectant. For these purposes, appropriate disinfectants include:
 - Products listed on the Environmental Protection Agency's list of Disinfectants for Use Against SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19), which can be found online at <u>https://www.epa.gov/pesticide-registration/list-ndisinfectants-use-against-sars-cov-2-covid-19</u>. Follow the manufacturer's instructions for concentration, application method, and contact time for all cleaning and disinfection products.
 - Diluted household bleach solutions prepared according to the manufacturer's label for disinfection, if appropriate for the surface. Follow manufacturer's instructions for application and proper ventilation. Check to ensure the product is not past its expiration date. Never mix household bleach with ammonia or any other cleanser.
 - Alcohol solutions with at least 70% alcohol.
 - For soft or porous surfaces, remove any visible contamination, if present, and clean with appropriate cleaners indicated for use on these surfaces. After cleaning, use products that are EPA-approved as effective against SARS-CoV-2 (COVID-19) (see link above) and that are suitable for porous surfaces.
 - Gloves and any other disposable PPE used for cleaning and disinfecting the equipment must be removed and disposed of after cleaning; wash hands immediately after removing gloves and PPE with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, or use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available. If a disposable gown was not worn, work uniforms/clothes worn during cleaning and disinfecting should be laundered afterwards using the warmest appropriate water setting and dry items completely. Wash hands after handling laundry.

For clarity, this section does not allow contact sports (e.g., basketball or football) or fitness classes that involve physical contact (e.g., jiu jitsu or boxing with sparring) to resume. Also, this section does not cover childcare or summer camp programs for children or youth, which are governed by section (3) above and Heath Officer Directive Nos. 2020-13 and 2020-14.

(10) Indoor Household Services

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. When mitigation measures are used, indoor household services involve low contact intensity and a low number of contacts. Accordingly, the risk of transmission is low as long as adequate precautions are taken.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions to Operate</u>. Beginning at 6:00 a.m. on June 15, 2020, indoor household services that can be provided while maintaining social distancing (e.g., house cleaners and cooks) may begin to operate, subject to the following limitations and conditions:
 - i. Residents may not have any household service provider come into their home if they have experienced any of the following symptoms within the prior 24 hours that are new and not explained by another reason:
 - Fever or chills
 - Cough
 - Sore throat
 - Shortness of breath or trouble breathing
 - Feeling unusually weak or fatigued

- New loss of taste or smell
- Muscle pain
- Headache
- Runny or congested nose
- diarrhea
- ii. Household service providers may not enter a residence to provide services if they have experienced any of the above symptoms within the prior 24 hours that are new and not explained by another reason;
- iii. In addition, household service providers may not enter a residence to provide services if either the household service provider or anyone in the residence answers yes to either of the following questions: (1) within the last 10 days has the person been diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus; and (2) does the person live with or have they had close contact with someone who in the past 14 days was diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus in that same period.
- iv. When feasible, residents should leave the premises when household services providers are in their home—if leaving the premises is not feasible, residents should try to be in a different room than the household service provider to the greatest extent possible;
- v. When feasible, leave windows and doors open to increase ventilation or run mechanical ventilation systems;

- vi. High touch surfaces and any shared implements or tools should be cleaned at the beginning and end of any service visit;
- vii. Both residents and household service providers must wear a face covering at all times, unless they are specifically exempted from the face covering requirements in Health Officer Order No. C19-12b, issued on May 28, 2020.

For clarity, this section does not allow personal service providers, such as hair dressers or personal trainers, to provide in-home services. Also, this section does not apply to in-home childcare, which is independently permissible under Section 15.f.xxi of the Order.

(11) <u>Offices for Non-Essential Businesses: Individuals Necessary for Operations Where</u> <u>Telecommuting is not Feasible</u>

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. As long as adequate physical distance is maintained, office work involves moderate contact intensity and a moderate number of contacts. Accordingly, the risk of transmission is relatively low, as long as adequate sanitation and social distancing measures are employed.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions to Operate</u>. Beginning at 6:00 a.m. on June 15, 2020, office workplaces that are not otherwise permitted to operate under this Order may open for individuals necessary for operations who cannot work remotely, subject to the following conditions:
 - i. All workers who are able to telecommute must continue to do so, only individuals necessary for operations who cannot work remotely may come into the office;
 - ii. Office Facilities must adjust their maximum occupancy rules based on the size of the facility to limit the number of people (including Personnel and members of the public), as follows:
 - Office Facilities with fewer than 20 Personnel must reduce their maximum occupancy to the number of people who can maintain at least six feet of physical distance from each other in the facility at all times,
 - Office Facilities with 20 or more Personnel must reduce their maximum occupancy to the <u>lesser</u> of: (1) 20% the facility's normal maximum occupancy or (2) the number of people who can maintain at least six feet of physical distance from each other in the facility at all times; and
 - iii. The business must have created, posted and implemented a Social Distancing Protocol and must comply with Health Officer Directive No. 2020-18, as that directive may be amended from time to time, regarding required best practices for businesses operating office facilities.

Order No. C19-07e – Appendix C-2: Allowed Additional Activities

[June 11, 2020]

General Requirements

The "Additional Activities" listed below may resume, subject to the requirements set forth in the Order and to any additional requirements set forth below or in separate guidance by the Health Officer. These activities were selected based on current health-related information, the availability and efficacy of measures that can substantially mitigate transmission risks associated with these activities, and related factors, such as the following:

- Increase in mobility and volume of activity—the overall impact that allowing resumption of the activity will have on the number of people leaving their homes and interacting with others in the community;
- **Contact intensity**—the type (close or distant) and duration (brief or prolonged) of the person-to-person contact involved in the activity;
- **Number of contacts**—the approximate number of people that will be in the setting at the same time; and
- **Modification potential**—the degree to which mitigation measures can decrease the risk of transmission.

List of Additional Activities

For purposes of the Order, Additional Activities include the following based on the summarized health risk related rationale:

(1) Outdoor Museums, Outdoor Historical Sites, and Public Gardens	1
(2) Outdoor Recreation: Golf and Tennis	3
(3) Outdoor Recreation: Dog Parks	4
(4) Small Outdoor Special Gatherings	5

(1) Outdoor Museums, Outdoor Historical Sites, and Public Gardens

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Visiting outdoor museums, outdoor historical sites, and public gardens involves low contact intensity and a low number of contacts. Also, interactions and activities that occur outdoors carry a lower risk of transmission than most indoor interactions and activities. And because outdoor recreation is already allowed under the Order, resumption of this activity is expected to result in only a relatively modest increase in mobility and may decrease congestion in other outdoor locations like public parks and beaches.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions</u>. Outdoor museums, outdoor historical sites, and public gardens (for example, the Botanical Gardens and Japanese Tea Garden) may reopen to the public—and individuals may leave their residence and travel to visit these locations—subject to the following conditions:

Order No. C19-07e – Appendix C-2: Allowed Additional Activities

[June 11, 2020]

- 1. Face coverings must be worn by all staff and visitors, subject to the limited exceptions in Health Officer Order No. C19-12b (e.g., for young children), including as that order is amended in the future;
- 2. Social distancing of at least 6-feet must be maintained at all times other than between members of the same household;
- 3. Common high-touch equipment and fixtures such as picnic benches or tables must be off-limits, with signage and with physical barriers as appropriate;
- 4. Public restrooms, if any, must
 - a. be routinely disinfected frequently throughout the day,
 - b. have open doors to prevent touching of door handles or knobs,
 - c. have soap and paper towels, and
 - d. have signs promoting handwashing;
- 5. The museum, outdoor historical site, or public garden must provide for contactless payment systems or, if not feasible, sanitize any payment systems, including touch screens, payment portals, pens, and styluses, after each customer use. Under the city's Legal Tender Law, customers must be allowed to pay with cash but to further limit person-to-person contact, Personnel should encourage customers to use credit, debit, or gift cards for payment;
- 6. Signage must be posted at each public entrance to inform all personnel and customers that they must: avoid entering the facility or location if they have a cough or fever, maintain a minimum six-foot distance from one another while in the facility or location, wear a face covering at all times, and not shake hands or engage in any unnecessary physical contact (sample signs are available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19);
- Any on-site retail stores (e.g., gift shops) may operate for curbside/outdoor pickup only, and must do so in compliance with Appendix C-1 of this Order and Health Officer Directive 2020-10 (available at <u>https://www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirushealthorders.asp</u>);
- 8. Before resuming operations, outdoor museums, outdoor historical sites, and public gardens must prepare, post, implement, and distribute to their Personnel a Social Distancing Protocol as required by the Order and a written health and safety plan that addresses all best practices listed in Section (1)b of this Appendix.

(Added May 17, 2020; revised June 1, 2020)

(2) Outdoor Recreation: Golf and Tennis

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Non-contact outdoor sports like tennis and golf involve low contact intensity and a low number of contacts, as long as the groups engaged in play together are small and maintain social distance to the greatest extent possible. The risk of transmission can be further mitigated by sanitation and hygiene practices. Also, interactions and activities that occur outdoors carry a lower risk of transmission than most indoor interactions and activities. And because outdoor recreation is already allowed under the Order, resumption of this activity is expected to result in only a relatively modest increase in mobility and may decrease congestion in other outdoor locations like public parks and beaches.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions</u>. Beginning at 8:00 a.m. on June 1, 2020, individuals may play tennis and golf outdoors, and outdoor tennis and golf facilities/clubs may open, subject to the following conditions:
 - 1. Face coverings must be worn by all golf and tennis facility/club Personnel, subject to the limited exceptions in Health Officer Order No. C19-12b (e.g., for young children), including as that order is amended in the future;
 - 2. All golf and tennis players must wear a face covering while in facility/club parking lots, when entering and exiting facilities/clubs, and while waiting to play—face coverings may be removed during play if social distancing requirements are met;
 - 3. For golf, groups must be limited to a maximum of four players per group, unless all players within the group are part of a single household or living unit. Groups of players from different households or living units must comply with the State of California under its Stay-Safer-At Home Order;
 - 4. Tennis may only be played between members of the same household or living unit or between a maximum two single individuals outside of the same household or living unit; and
 - 5. Before resuming operations, each golf or tennis facility/club must create, post and implement a Social Distancing Protocol and comply with Health Officer Directive No. 2020-15 regarding required best practices for tennis and golf.

"Personnel" includes all of the following people who provide goods or services associated with the tennis or golf facility/club in the City: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who sell goods or perform services onsite or who deliver goods for the business); independent contractors (such as "gig workers" who perform work via the business's app or other online interface, if any); vendors who are permitted to sell goods onsite (such as farmers or others who sell at stalls in farmers' markets); volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services onsite at the request of the business.

Order No. C19-07e – Appendix C-2: Allowed Additional Activities

[June 11, 2020]

(3) Outdoor Recreation: Dog Parks

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Taking a dog to a dog park involves low contact intensity and a low number of contacts, as long as people maintain at least six feet of physical distance from individuals who are not in their household. Also, interactions and activities that occur outdoors carry a lower risk of transmission than most indoor interactions and activities.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions</u>. Beginning at 8:00 a.m. on June 1, 2020, individuals may take their dogs to dog parks (both enclosed and unenclosed), and all dog parks may open, subject to the following conditions:
 - 1. Face coverings must be worn by all people in the dog park, subject to the limited exceptions in Health Officer Order No. C19-12b (e.g., for young children), including as that order is amended in the future;
 - 2. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) has advised that "[u]ntil we learn more about how this virus affects animals," owners should "treat pets as you would other human family members to protect them from a possible infection." Specifically, the CDC recommends that pet owners: "Do not let pets interact with people or other animals outside the household," "Walk dogs on a leash, maintaining at least 6 feet (2 meters) from other people and animals," and "Avoid dog parks or public places where a large number of people and dogs gather." Accordingly, pet owners are urged to use on-leash dog parks or keep their dogs on a leash, particularly if the dog is not under voice control—pet owners who choose to let their dogs be off leash in an off-leash dog park should prevent their dog from interacting with other people or animals to the greatest extent feasible;
 - 3. People in the dog park should maintain at least six feet of physical distance from people or animals other than those in their same household;
 - 4. People must bring their own water for themselves and their pets, and must not use common touch water facilities in the park;
 - 5. People must use their sleeve or a disposable cloth to touch high-touch surfaces like gates;
 - 6. People should bring their own bags for picking up and disposing of pet waste;
 - 7. Signage must be posted at each dog park to inform people that they must: avoid entering the location if they have a cough or fever, maintain a minimum six-foot distance from one another, wear a face covering at all times, and not shake hands or engage in any unnecessary physical contact (sample signs are available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19); and
 - 8. People must follow any other rules and regulations adopted by the operator of the dog park.

(Added June 1, 2020)

Order No. C19-07e – Appendix C-2: Allowed Additional Activities

[June 11, 2020]

(4) Small Outdoor Special Gatherings

- a. <u>Basis for Addition</u>. Small outdoor gatherings involve only moderate contact intensity and a moderate number of contacts, as long as people maintain at least six feet of physical distance from individuals who are not in their household. Also, interactions and activities that occur outdoors carry a lower risk of transmission than most indoor interactions and activities.
- b. <u>Description and Conditions</u>. All people are strongly encouraged to continue staying safe at home and minimizing unnecessary interactions with others to the maximum extent possible. But beginning at 8:00 a.m. on June 15, 2020, individuals may participate in small outdoor gatherings—including ceremonies, religious services, and other special gatherings—subject to the following conditions:
 - 1. No more than six people may participate in a gathering that involves eating or drinking within six feet of each other, unless all are members of the same household or living unit;
 - 2. No more than 12 people may participate in any other outdoor gathering under this section, unless all are members of the same household or living unit.
 - 3. Unless eating or drinking in a group of six people or fewer, participants outside of the same household or living unit must remain at least six feet apart from each other. Participants must otherwise follow all Social Distancing Requirements, and wear Face Coverings unless eating, drinking, or exempted from wearing a Face Covering under Sections 3.g. or 3.h. of Health Officer Order No. C19-12b (the Face Covering Order); and
 - 4. Participants and hosts of small outdoor gatherings must comply with forthcoming Health Officer Directive No. 2020-19 regarding required best practices for small outdoor gatherings.

For clarity, this section does not allow contact sports (e.g., basketball, football, boxing) or games with shared equipment (e.g. Frisbee, baseball, playing catch) to resume among members of different households. This section also does not apply to organized outdoor fitness classes, which are covered by Section (9) of Appendix C-1.

Good morning Angela and Eileen,

Please see attached final directives regarding in-store retail, office facilities, and small outdoor gatherings. These go into effect on Monday, June 15, 2020. Summary notes below:

- 1. The in-store retail directive permits in-store shopping subject to limits on the number of customers and personnel allowed in-store and includes controls regarding social distancing, returning goods, self-sampling of products, and, for clothing stores, trying on clothing and cleaning changing rooms.
- 2. The office facilities directive permits businesses with office to have staff return to work, subject to controls regarding office layout to ensure physical distancing, facility ventilation, use of stairs/elevators, wearing of face coverings, shared equipment, in-

office gyms (which are prohibited until otherwise allowed), and, for non-essential businesses, the number of personnel permitted in-office (for businesses with 20 or more personnel, the lesser of 20% of the normal capacity or the number that can safely social distance).

3. The outdoor gathering directive permits social gatherings to occur outside, subject to controls regarding requiring a host, the number of people who may participate (6 from different households for small outdoor meal gatherings, and 12 from different households for other outdoor gatherings where face coverings can be worn), recommendations against moving between gatherings, duration (2 hour limit), the type of activities permitted (no contact sports, sports with shared equipment, and a discouragement against singing, chanting, or shouting), with some additional requirements for different types of gatherings.

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. 2020-17

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO REGARDING REQUIRED BEST PRACTICES FOR CERTAIN RETAIL BUSINESSES OFFERING IN-STORE SHOPPING OR SERVICES

(PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTIVE) DATE OF DIRECTIVE: June 13, 2020

By this Directive, the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco (the "Health Officer") issues industry-specific direction that certain Additional Businesses providing goods and services described below must follow as part of the local response to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") pandemic. This Directive constitutes industryspecific guidance as provided under Section 6 of Health Officer Order No. C19-07e issued on May 22, 2020, and updated on June 11, 2020 (the "Stav-Safe-At-Home Order") and, unless otherwise defined below, initially capitalized terms used in this Directive have the same meaning given them in that order. This Directive goes into effect on June 15, 2020, and remains in effect until suspended, superseded, or amended by the Health Officer. This Directive has support in the bases and justifications set forth in the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. As further provided below, this Directive automatically incorporates any revisions to the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order or other future orders issued by the Health Officer that supersede that order or reference this Directive. This Directive is intended to promote best practices as to Social Distancing Requirements and sanitation measures, helping prevent the transmission of COVID-19 and safeguard the health of workers, customers, and the community.

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER DIRECTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. This Directive applies to all owners, operators, managers, and supervisors of any Additional Businesses that the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order permits to be open to the public in the City and County of San Francisco (the "City") and that provide:
 - a) retail goods as described in subsection B(1) of Appendix C-1 of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order ("Retail Good Providers"), <u>or</u>
 - b) services involving the pickup of goods or pets for care and generally do not require close contact with customers, as described in subsection B(4) of Appendix C-1 of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order ("Retail Service Providers"), <u>or</u>
 - c) outdoor activity equipment rental for permissible outdoor recreational activities, as described in subsection B(5) of Appendix C-1 of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order ("Retail Equipment Rental Providers") (together with Retail Good Providers and Retail Service Providers, "Retail Businesses").
- 2. Attached as Exhibit A to this Directive is a list of best practices that apply to Retail Businesses (the "Best Practices"). Each Retail Business must comply with all of the relevant requirements listed in the Best Practices.
- 3. Each Retail Business must, before it begins to offer its customers in-store shopping and pickup of goods or services, create, adopt, and implement a written health and



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safety plan (a "Health and Safety Plan"). The Health and Safety Plan must be substantially in the form attached to this Directive as Exhibit B.

- 4. Guidance from the Department of Public Health related to Retail Businesses offering in-store shopping is attached to this Directive as Exhibit C, and available at http://www.sfdph.org/directives.
- 5. If an aspect, service, or operation of the Retail Business is also covered by another Health Officer directive (all of which are available at http://www.sfdph.org/directives), then the Retail Business must comply with all applicable directives, and it must complete all relevant Health and Safety Plan forms.
- 6. Each Retail Business must (a) make the Health and Safety Plan available to a member of the public and Personnel on request, (b) provide a summary of the plan to all Personnel working on site or otherwise in the City in relation to its operations, and (c) post the plan at any storefront and at the entrance to any other physical location that the Retail Business operates within the City. Also, each Retail Business must provide a copy of the Health and Safety Plan and evidence of its implementation to any authority enforcing this Order upon demand.
- 7. Each Retail Business subject to this Directive must provide items such as Face Coverings (as provided in Health Order No. C19-12b issued on May 28, 2020, and any future amendment to that order), hand sanitizer or handwashing stations, or both, and disinfectant and related supplies to Personnel and to the public, all as required by the Best Practices. If any such Retail Business is unable to provide these required items or otherwise fails to comply with required Best Practices or fails to abide by its Health and Safety Plan, then it must cease operating until it can fully comply and demonstrate its strict compliance. Further, as to any noncompliant operation, any such Retail Business is subject to immediate closure and the fines and other legal remedies described below, as a violation of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order.
- 8. For purposes of this Directive, "Personnel" includes all of the following people who provide goods or services associated with the Retail Business: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who sell goods or perform services onsite or who deliver goods for the business); independent contractors; vendors who are permitted to sell goods onsite (such as farmers or others who sell at stalls in farmers' markets); volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services onsite at the request of the Retail Business. "Personnel" includes "gig workers" who perform work via the business's app or other online interface, if any.
- 9. This Directive and the attached Best Practices may be revised by the Health Officer, through revision of this Directive or another future directive or order, as conditions relating to COVID-19 require, in the discretion of the Health Officer. Each Retail Business must stay updated regarding any changes to the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order and this Directive by checking the Department of Public Health website (https://www.sfdph.org/directives) regularly.
- 10. Implementation of this Directive augments—but does not limit—the obligations of each Retail Business under the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order including, but not limited



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to, the obligation to prepare, post, and implement a Social Distancing Protocol under Section 6 and subsection 15.h of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. The Retail Business must follow these industry-specific Best Practices and update them as necessary for the duration of this Directive, including, without limitation, as this Directive is amended or extended in writing by the Health Officer and consistent with any extension of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, any other order that supersedes that order, and any Health Officer order that references this Directive.

This Directive is issued in furtherance of the purposes of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. Where a conflict exists between this Directive and any state, local, or federal public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, including, without limitation, the Social Distancing Protocol, the most restrictive provision controls. Failure to carry out this Directive is a violation of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.

Best Practices for Retail Businesses Offering In-Store Shopping or Services

In addition to preparing, posting, and implementing the Social Distancing Protocol required by Section 6 and subsection 15.h of Health Officer Order No. C19-07e (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order"), each Retail Business that operates in the City must comply with each requirement listed below and prepare a Health and Safety Plan substantially in the format of Exhibit B, below.

Requirements:

- 1. Section 1 Requirements For Retail Businesses Offering In-Store Goods or Services:
 - **1.1.** To minimize the number of customers entering the facility, Retail Businesses that open for in-store operations are strongly encouraged to continue offering alternatives to instore shopping. For example, Retail Businesses should consider offering or enhancing policies permitting outdoor curbside pickup and drop-off of goods, scheduling of appointments, delivery, and e-commerce. Retail businesses offering curbside pickup or drop-off must continue following the Best Practices for curbside retail contained in Directive 2020-10b (and any future amendment to that directive) for those operations.
 - **1.2.** Make any necessary adjustments to the layout of the Retail Business to allow for proper social distancing. Such changes may include using separate doors as entrances and exits for the facility; creating one-way aisles; adding markers to the floor space to assist with social distancing; spacing racks or shelves six feet or more apart; staggering point of sale terminals; or widening high-traffic areas.
 - **1.3.** Adjust maximum occupancy rules based on the size of the facility to limit the number of people (including customers and Personnel) to the <u>lesser</u> of: (1) 50% the facility's normal maximum occupancy or (2) the number of people who can maintain at least six feet of physical distance from each other in the facility at all times.
 - **1.4.** Establish a protocol and train Personnel to routinely and safely clean the facility in a manner that complies with the requirements contained in the Social Distancing Protocol (contained in Health Officer No. C19-07e, issued on June 1, 2020 and any future amendment to that order) (the "Social Distancing Protocol"). Retail Businesses are strongly encouraged to adjust their business hours to provide extra time for cleaning.
 - **1.5.** Ensure customers and Personnel comply with the Social Distancing Protocol. At a minimum, each Retail Business must:
 - **1.5.1.** Require all Personnel to comply with the Face Covering (as provided in Health Order No. C19-12b issued on May 28, 2020, and any future amendment to that order) (the "Face Covering Order"), wash hands frequently before handling merchandise, and maintain physical distance of at least 6-feet to the extent possible.
 - **1.5.2.** Establish designated areas/lines with markings on the ground to indicate 6-foot distancing for patrons.
 - **1.5.3.** Create directional paths of travel where feasible (e.g. separate entrance and exit for patrons, lines for restrooms).
 - 1.5.4. Advise customers that they must comply with the Face Covering Order.



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- **1.6.** Establish procedures for safe handling and sanitization of returned merchandise that can be safely cleaned, such as goods with hard, non-porous surfaces. Such items must be sanitized in a manner that complies with the requirements contained in the Social Distancing Protocol. Consider encouraging customers to send returns or exchanges by a delivery service to reduce unnecessary contact. If feasible, Retail Businesses should isolate returned merchandise that cannot be sanitized for twenty-four hours before returning it to the sales floor.
- **1.7.** Limit the number of customers waiting in line to enter the Retail Business at any one time to a number that allows for customers and Personnel to easily maintain at least six feet of distance from one another and allows sufficient sidewalk space to allow safe pedestrian right-of-way at all times.
- **1.8.** Provide customers with access to hand sanitizer, such as near entrances and exits and at the register or other point-of-sale locations. Provide signage in the store encouraging customers to use hand sanitizer before touching merchandise. The signage must also strongly encourage customers refrain from touching merchandise unnecessarily and to only touch items they are interested in purchasing. Personnel must routinely sanitize merchandise and other high-touch surfaces that can be safely cleaned in a manner that complies with the requirements contained in the Social Distancing Protocol.
- **1.9.** Prohibit customers from self-sampling products in-store, such as perfumes, makeup, or skincare and haircare products. Retail Businesses may permit Personnel to offer samples of non-edible products, but only if the samples can be provided while maintaining at least six-feet of distance between the Personnel and customers and using single-use, disposable materials, such as plastic applicators or containers. Retail Businesses may not offer samples of edible products.
- **1.10.** Consider closing restrooms in the facility to customers. If the restroom will remain open to customers, the Retail Business must comply with the sanitation requirements of the Social Distancing Protocol. Retail Businesses are also highly encouraged to monitor use of restrooms by either requiring a key to access or stationing a bathroom attendant nearby.
- **1.11.** Retail Businesses must establish a training procedure for Personnel to educate them about cleaning and social distancing requirements. Retail Businesses are highly encouraged to provide Personnel with training on de-escalation techniques for addressing customers to refuse to comply with the Social Distancing Protocol or Face Covering Order.

2. <u>Section 2: Requirements Specific to Retail Businesses Selling Clothing or Other Items that</u> <u>Come Into Contact with the Body</u>

- **2.1.** Consider closing fitting rooms to customers. If fitting rooms remain open, the Retail Business must take the following precautions:
 - **2.1.1.** Provide customers with hand sanitizer in or near the fitting room and require that they use it before and after trying on clothing.
 - **2.1.2.** Ensure fitting rooms are routinely sanitized, including cleaning all non-porous surfaces in a manner that complies with the sanitation guidance contained in the Social Distancing Protocol.





- **2.1.3.** If the fitting room has a curtain that cannot be routinely sanitized, consider replacing it with a different type of covering that can be sanitized.
- 2.1.4. Assign and train Personnel to attend fitting rooms to ensure proper sanitization.
- 2.2. Require customers to wear Face Coverings while they are trying on merchandise.
- **2.3.** After a customer tries on merchandise, if the item is not purchased by the customer, the item should be returned to Personnel for cleaning or sanitizing if feasible. For example, Retail Businesses are strongly encouraged to steam-clean clothing before returning it to the sale floor.

Tips and Frequency Asked Questions for Retail Businesses Offering In-Store Shopping or Services During COVID-19

June 13, 2020

AUDIENCE: Businesses that offer in-store retail, services, and outdoor equipment rental during the COVID-19 pandemic.

BACKGROUND: As of June 15, 2020, the Health Officer Directive 2020-17 authorizes and provides guidance for In-Store Retail.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: This document highlights the main points of the Directive, and steps you should take to safely reopen your business in compliance with the Directive.

Prepare: Before Your Business Re-Opens

Create a Health and Safety Plan and a Social Distancing Protocol

A template <u>Health and Safety Plan</u> can be found at Exhibit B of Directive 2020-17, posted at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp</u>. This must be available for all personnel, and posted at the entrance to the office site. If other Directives apply to your business, you may need to complete more than one Health and Safety Plan.

A template <u>Social Distancing Protocol</u> can be found at <u>Appendix A of the Shelter in Place Health Order</u>, posted at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp</u>.

These documents must be available for all personnel, and posted at the entrance to the business site. They serve as reminders of all the best practices that your business needs to follow including universal requirements such as requiring face coverings, <u>signage</u>, enforcing six foot distances between people, and more specific things such as establishing policies for safe handling of merchandise.

Educate and Train Personnel

Personnel must be trained to implement the Social Distancing and Health Protocol and may need training on cleaning and disinfection, <u>screening customers for symptoms</u>, and how to monitor the number of customers in the store or in line. Consider training personnel on de-escalation with customers who do not comply with policies and provide resources to employees to address anxiety, stress, and mental health. Recognize the fear in returning to work, communicate transparently, listen, and survey regularly.

Provide information on employer or government-sponsored sick leave and other benefits the employee may be entitled to receive that would make it financially easier to stay at home (see <u>Paid sick leave in</u> <u>San Francisco</u>). Remember that employees cannot be fired due to COVID-19 results or needed time off for recovery.

Check Your Space after the Long Period of Low Usage

Check for pest infestation or harborage, and make sure all pest control measures are functioning. Perform routine maintenance on ventilation systems including air ducts and vents. If your business was closed for a long period of time, flush out the stagnant water from the plumbing lines by running water



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through fixtures. Detailed guidance may be found at: <u>https://www.sfwater.org/flushingguidance</u>.

Create a Safer Space

You may need to change the physical layout of your business to help social distancing for customers and personnel. Modifications to consider include designating separate entrances and exits, making aisles one-way, increasing spacing between racks or shelves, and marking spaces with tape or other decals to indicate six-foot distances.

Getting Back to Business

Follow all of the Best Practices in Exhibit A of Directive 2020-17, posted at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp</u>. To help compliance, you may need to ask customers to change the way they interact with your business and your products. Changes may include:

- Strongly encourage customers to refrain from touching merchandise unnecessarily and to use hand sanitizer before touching merchandise or upon entry to your business.
- Establish procedures for safe handling and cleaning of returned merchandise.
- Prohibit self-sampling of items such as cosmetics and perfume.
- Consider closing fitting rooms to customers if you can't implement best practices such as cleaning clothing before returning to sale and frequent cleaning of fitting rooms.
- If customers bring their own bags from home:
 - Ensure that bags are not placed directly on conveyor belts, outside of shopping carts, or any other surface where customers are served.
 - o Ensure that reusable bags make no contact with employees.
 - o Ensure that customers bag their own merchandise.
 - Ensure that customers do not bag merchandise in the checkout area if they cannot maintain physical distancing.
 - Increase the frequency of disinfection in bagging areas and customer service areas frequented by customers.

Bathrooms for Customers

Consider closing the restroom if you are not able to comply with the sanitation requirements of the Social Distancing and Health Protocol. Businesses are encouraged to monitor use of restrooms by either requiring a key to access or stationing a bathroom attendant nearby.

Retail Stores in an Enclosed Indoor Shopping Center

Retail stores in an enclosed Indoor Shopping Center that do not have direct access to adjacent sidewalk, street, parking lot, or alley area, may only reopen after the Indoor Shopping Center obtains approval from the Health Officer.

Monitoring and Adjusting

At least on a weekly basis, think about how your business and personnel are doing, how well you are



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complying with your Social Distancing and Health Plan, and what changes are needed to improve your response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Look for new guidance from the <u>SFDPH Communicable Disease</u> <u>Control and Prevention</u> or the frequently updated page on sf.gov with <u>comprehensive resources for</u> <u>businesses during the COVID-19 pandemic.</u>

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: What businesses are permitted to reopen?

All retail establishments other than those inside enclosed Shopping Centers are permitted to open. Such businesses include:

- Bookstores
- Jewelry stores
- Toy stores
- Clothing and shoe stores
- Home and furnishing stores
- Sporting goods stores
- Florists
- Second hand stores
- Other retailers selling goods

Q: What businesses are not yet permitted to reopen?

Retail stores inside Shopping Centers that have not obtained approval from the Health Officer may not open. Personal services are not permitted to reopen at this time; stay up to date for industry-specific guidance for reopening services. Personal services include:

- Beauty salons
- Nail salons
- Massage parlors
- Tattoo parlors

Q: Should my staff wear gloves?

Routine glove use is not recommended. The CDC explains that in general, gloves are appropriate when cleaning or caring for someone who is sick (see link: <u>When to wear gloves</u>). In most other situations, wearing gloves is not necessary and may still lead to the spread of germs. The best way to protect yourself is to regularly wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds, or use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. 2020-18

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO REGARDING REQUIRED BEST PRACTICES FOR BUSINESSES OPERATING OFFICE FACILITIES

(PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTIVE) DATE OF DIRECTIVE: June 13, 2020

By this Directive, the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco (the "Health Officer") issues industry-specific direction that businesses operating Office Facilities, as described below, must follow as part of the local response to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") pandemic. This Directive constitutes industry-specific guidance as provided under Section 6 of Health Officer Order No. C19-07e issued on May 22, 2020, and updated on June 11, 2020 (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order") and, unless otherwise defined below, initially capitalized terms used in this Directive have the same meaning given them in that order. This Directive goes into effect immediately upon issuance and remains in effect until suspended, superseded, or amended by the Health Officer. This Directive has support in the bases and justifications set forth in the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. As further provided below, this Directive automatically incorporates any revisions to the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order or reference this Directive. This Directive is intended to promote best practices as to Social Distancing Requirements and sanitation measures, helping prevent the transmission of COVID-19 and safeguard the health of workers, customers, and the community.

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER DIRECTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. This Directive applies to all owners, operators, managers, and supervisors of any business operating in an indoor office facility and that are otherwise authorized to operate under the terms of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, including Essential Businesses, Outdoor Businesses, and Additional Businesses that operate, at least in part, within any office space ("Office Facilities").
- 2. Attached as Exhibit A to this Directive is a list of best practices that apply to Office Facilities (the "Best Practices"). Each Office Facility must comply with all of the relevant requirements listed in the Best Practices.
- 3. Each Office Facility, before it begins to permit Personnel or members of the public onsite, must create, adopt, and implement a written health and safety plan (a "Health and Safety Plan"). The Health and Safety Plan must be substantially in the form attached to this Directive as Exhibit B.
- 4. Guidance from the Department of Public Health related to Office Facilities is attached to this Directive as Exhibit C and at http://www.sfdph.org/directives.
- 5. If an aspect, service, or operation of the Office Facility is also covered by another Health Officer directive (all of which are available at http://www.sfdph.org/directives), then the Office Facility must comply with all applicable directives, and it must complete all relevant Health and Safety Plan forms.





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- 6. Each Office Facility must (a) make the Health and Safety Plan available to a member of the public and Personnel on request, (b) provide a summary of the Health and Safety Plan to all Personnel working on site or otherwise in the City in relation to its operations, and (c) post the Health and Safety Plan at each entrance to any Office Facility within the City. If any such Office Facility is unable to provide these required items or otherwise fails to comply with required Best Practices or fails to abide by its Health and Safety Plan, then it must cease operating until it can fully comply and demonstrate its strict compliance. Such adjustments may include some or all of the following, where feasible s: adding markers to the floor space to signal appropriate social distancing; spacing racks or shelves six feet or more apart; widening high-traffic areas; or adding Plexiglas screens to areas where receptionists or security guards are stationed.
 - 1.2. If all or part of an Office Facility has been vacant or dormant for any significant period during the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, the Office Facility must ensure plumbing is functioning and that pipes are flushed before use. The San Francisco PUC provides guidance for flushing and preparing water systems at: https://sfwater.org/index.aspx?page=1327.
 - 1.3. Make any necessary improvements to the ventilation of the Office Facility, including:
 - **1.3.1.** Ensure HVAC system and air exchangers are serviced and functioning properly.
 - **1.3.2.** If feasible, the Office Facility must increase the percentage of outdoor air through the HVAC system, disable demand-control ventilation controls that reduce air supply based on temperature or occupancy, and increase natural ventilation by opening windows when environmental conditions and building requirements allow.
 - **1.3.3.** Consider running the building ventilation system even when unoccupied to maximize ventilation.
 - **1.3.4.** If the Office Facility uses pedestal fans or hard mounted fans, adjust the location of fans to minimize air from fans blowing from one Personnel's space to another's space.
 - **1.3.5.** The Office Facility must require Personnel remove any personal cooling fans from their workspaces to reduce the potential spread of any airborne or aerosolized viruses.
 - **1.4.** Develop a plan to ensure Personnel comply with social distancing requirements and to limit the number of people in the Office Facility at a given time, consistent with the requirements in the Stay-Safe-at-Home Order. Such plans must address: (i) requiring Personnel to notify management before coming into the Office Facility; (ii) staggering Personnel shifts to avoid exceeding capacity limits and provide for sanitation; (iii) requiring all Personnel who can perform their work remotely to telecommute;



(iv) converting in-person meetings to online meetings; and (v) encouraging members of the public, vendors, and contractors to make appointments before coming to the Office Facility.

- **1.5.** Modify policies for using elevators and stairs serving as access to, from and within the Office Facility.
 - **1.5.1.** Where feasible, make stairways accessible to Personnel and visitors entering the Office Facility. Encourage Personnel who are physically able to use the stairs.
 - **1.5.2.** Limit capacity in elevators to the <u>lesser</u> of: (1) four people, or (2) the number of people who can fit in the elevator while maintaining at least six feet of distance from each other. During peak building entry and exit times, this number may be adjusted to up to four individuals at a time for any elevator that does not allow for six feet of physical distance between riders.
 - **1.5.3.** Add signage to elevators and on all floors requiring anyone who rides the elevator to wear Face Coverings as provided in Health Order No. C19-12b issued on May 28, 2020, and any future amendment to that order (the "Face Covering Order") and discouraging people from talking in the elevators.
 - **1.5.4.** Provide hand sanitizer outside the elevators on the ground floor.
- **1.6.** Require Personnel and members of the public who enter the Office Facility to wear Face Coverings as provided in the Face Covering Order.
- **1.7.** Develop a plan and implement daily COVID-19 symptom self-verifications for all Personnel as required by the Social Distancing Protocol (contained in Health Officer No. C19-07e, issued on June 1, 2020 and any future amendment to that order) (the "Social Distancing Protocol").
- 1.8. Develop a plan and implement sanitization requirements, including:
 - **1.8.1.** Instruct all Personnel to wash their hands frequently with soap and water for at least 20 seconds and to wash hands or use hand sanitizer (provided by the Office Facility) before and after touching high-touch surfaces, such as copy machines or shared office tools, equipment or materials.
 - **1.8.2.** Ensure Personnel have access to cleaning supplies so that they can clean surfaces as needed on their own when custodial staff is not available.
 - **1.8.3.** Clean and disinfect high touch surfaces in common areas routinely throughout the day and otherwise in accordance with the Social Distancing Protocol. Common areas include, but are not limited to the following common-use area: lobbies, lounge or seating areas, meeting rooms, entry ways, hallways, bathrooms, elevators, and stairwells. Clean and disinfect all high touch surfaces and devices found in common areas such as door handles, railings, faucets, toilets, elevator buttons, furniture, computers, telephones and other devices that are touched by many people in a single day. Clean and disinfect the Office Space at the end of a lease and prior to occupancy by a new lessee of the Office Space.





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- **1.8.4.** Wait until all people leave their office or personal workspace for the day before cleaning that area. Where feasible, wait at least one hour after the space is vacated before cleaning the area. If possible, Personnel should also wait an hour after the space has been cleaned before returning to the workspace.
- **1.9.** Where feasible, prohibit Personnel from sharing equipment, such as phones, tables, file cabinets, copy machines, or desks. Any work furniture, tools or equipment that must be used by more than one individual must be sanitized in a manner that complies with the requirements contained in the Social Distancing Protocol. If Personnel must share a workspace, such as on alternating shifts, then the location must be sanitized in a manner that complies with the requirements contained in the Social Distancing Protocol. If Personnel must share a workspace, such as on alternating shifts, then the location must be sanitized in a manner that complies with the requirements contained in the Social Distancing Protocol after each use.
- **1.10.** Minimize non-essential travel for Personnel between worksites and for business travel outside of San Francisco.
- **1.11.** Office Facilities with gyms or other exercise equipment must not allow any use of the gym or equipment until gym facilities are otherwise permitted under the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order or other Health Officer order. Once gym facilities are allowed to open, Office Facilities must comply with any industry-specific guidance for operating gyms or using fitness equipment.
- **1.12.** If Personnel or a member of the public refuses to comply with the Face Covering Order or other provision of this Directive, then the Office Facility must refuse entry to the facility or request that the individual leave the facility. Nothing in this Directive is intended to alter the obligations an Office Facility may otherwise have under applicable law to provide reasonable accommodations to Personnel or members of the public.
- **1.13.** Office Facilities that also maintain privately owned public open spaces must comply with the Social Distancing Protocol for such spaces. Office Facilities must also place high-touch equipment and furniture in their open spaces, such as tables, benches, and chairs, off-limits by either removing the items or by using signage and physical barriers, as appropriate.

2. <u>Section 2: Requirements Specific to Office Facilities that are Not Classified as an "Essential Business"</u>

- **2.1.** Office Facilities that are not Essential Businesses may expand operations beyond the Minimum Basic Operations, as set forth in the Stay-At-Home-Order, but only to the extent the Office Facility permits Personnel to telecommute to the maximum extent possible and only as necessary to ensure business operations.
- **2.2.** Office Facilities that are not Essential Businesses must adjust their maximum occupancy rules based on the size of the Office Facility to limit the number of people (including Personnel and members of the public), as follows:
 - **2.2.1.** Businesses with fewer than 20 Personnel must reduce their maximum occupancy to the number of people who can maintain at least six feet of physical distance from each other in the Office Facility at all times.
 - **2.2.2.** Businesses with 20 or more Personnel must reduce their maximum occupancy to the lesser of: (1) 20% the Office Facility's normal maximum occupancy, or (2) the number



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of people who can maintain at least six feet of physical distance from each other in the Office Facility at all times.

Tips and Frequently Asked Questions for Opening Office Facilities During COVID-19

June 13, 2020

The following tips developed by the San Francisco Department of Public Health for use by local facilities and will be posted at <u>www.sfcdcp.org/businesses</u>. This interim guidance may change as knowledge, community transmission, and availability of PPE and testing change.

AUDIENCE: Businesses who bring Personnel back to office facilities during the COVID-19 pandemic.

BACKGROUND: On June 13, 2020, the Health Officer issued Directive No. 2020-18 setting forth requirements for businesses operating in offices and permitting non-essential offices to reopen with limitations. "Business" includes many types of organizations, such as nonprofit organizations, employers, building owners, building managers, community-based organizations and others. "Personnel" includes employees, contract workers, gig-workers, volunteers and others.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: This document highlights the main points of the Directive, and outlines steps you should take to safely reopen your Office Facility in compliance with the Directive.

Prepare: Before Your Business Re-Opens

Create a Health and Safety Plan and a Social Distancing Protocol

A template <u>Health and Safety Plan</u> can be found at Exhibit B of Directive 2020-18, posted at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp</u>. This must be available for all personnel, and posted at the entrance to the office site. If other Directives apply to your business, you may need to complete more than one Health and Safety Plan.

A template <u>Social Distancing Protocol</u> can be found at <u>Appendix A of the Shelter in Place Health Order</u>, posted at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp</u>.

These documents must be available for all personnel, and posted at the entrance to the office site. They serve as reminders of all the best practices that your business needs to follow including universal requirements such as requiring face coverings, <u>signage</u>, enforcing six foot distances between people, and more specific things such as requirements for cleaning office facilities.

Check your space after the long period of low usage

Check for pest infestation or harborage, and make sure all pest control measures are functioning. Perform routine maintenance on ventilation systems including air ducts and vents. If your business was closed for a long period of time, flush out the stagnant water from the plumbing lines by running water through fixtures. Detailed guidance may be found at: <u>https://www.sfwater.org/flushingguidance</u>.

Create a Safer Space

You may need to change the **physical layout** of your office to help social distancing. Modifications to consider include marking spaces with tape or other decals to indicate six-foot distances, creating a buffer for areas where people interact such as a Plexiglas screen for receptionist and security, or a surface where items can be put for a later pickup, to prevent a hand-off between two people.



Improve **ventilation** to the building by increasing the percentage of outdoor air through the HVAC system, disabling demand-control ventilation controls that reduce air supply based on temperature or occupancy and increase natural ventilation by opening windows when environmental conditions and building requirements allow. Consider running the building ventilation system even when unoccupied to maximize dilution ventilation.

Reduce capacity of shared spaces such as break rooms and conference rooms. Make this clear through signage.

Getting Back to Business

In order to reopen offices, you must follow Directive 2020-18, including Best Practices in Exhibit A, posted at www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp. Below is a summary of the tasks.

- Develop and implement your Health and Safety Plan(s) and Social Distancing Protocol.
- Adjust your office to allow personnel to follow the social distancing protocol, including:
 - Limit the number of people, including staggering shifts, start times and break times and by utilizing telework options as feasible to reduce the density of Personnel in common areas such as screening areas, lobbies and break rooms.
 - Reduce the number of people allowed into the office by limiting deliveries and moving meetings online whenever possible.
 - Limit capacity in elevators to no more than 4 people (or fewer during non-peak periods if 6 feet of distance cannot be maintained). Post signs requiring people to wear face coverings and discouraging talking in elevators.
 - Businesses that are not considered by the Directive to be "essential" must limit Personnel to the number of people who can be present while maintaining 6-foot social distancing. If the business has more than 20 people, this number can be no more than 20% of maximum capacity.
- Adjust your office to reduce transmission of respiratory viruses, including:
 - o Review your ventilation system to maximize outside air ventilation.
 - Prohibit handshaking, hugs and fist bumps.
 - Put out supplies for handwashing, disinfecting, and face covering.
 - Remove objects that are passed between people. You should also prevent shared touching of objects such as phones, keyboards and other work supplies.
 - Support cleanliness by limiting the number of items Personnel may keep on their desks to allow for regular cleaning and sanitization by custodial staff.
 - Set up self-serve cleaning stations that ensure Personnel have access to cleaning supplies so that they can clean surfaces as needed on their own when custodial staff is not available.
 - o Use no-touch waste receptacles when possible.
 - o Gym equipment and facilities in offices must remain closed at this time.



Educate, Screen and Assist Personnel

Personnel must be trained to implement the Health and Safety Plan and the Social Distancing Protocol, and may need training on cleaning and disinfection.

Please share with Personnel and include in your Health and Safety Plan the following information for:

- What to do if <u>Personnel answer Yes to any of the daily screening questions</u>, posted at <u>http://www.sfcdcp.org/businesses</u>, including a plan for safe transport of Personnel who become sick while at work to home or a healthcare provider.
- What to do if <u>Personnel have a positive COVID-19 test</u>
- When Personnel can return to work after COVID-19 symptoms, testing, or close contact.

If Personnel appear to have symptoms upon arrival at work or become sick during the day, they should immediately be separated from other employees, customers, and visitors, and sent home.

Provide information on employer or government-sponsored sick leave and other benefits Personnel may be entitled to receive that would make it financially easier to stay at home (see <u>Paid sick leave in San</u> <u>Francisco</u>). Remember that Personnel cannot be fired due to COVID-19 results or needed time off for recovery.

Monitoring and Adjusting

At least on a weekly basis, think about how your Business and Personnel are doing, how well you are complying with your Social Distancing and Health Plan, and what changes are needed to improve your response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Look for new guidance from the <u>SFDPH Communicable Disease</u> <u>Control and Prevention</u> or the frequently updated page on sf.gov with <u>comprehensive resources for</u> <u>businesses during the COVID-19 pandemic.</u>

Frequently Asked Questions

Is my employee required to wear a Face Covering while in their private office alone, or while sitting at their desk around which I have installed Plexiglas dividers?

You do not need to wear a Face Covering if you are alone in a private office that is not shared with others and is not likely to be visited by others without prior warning, such as an office with a closed door. If another person enters the area, both of you must immediately put on a Face Covering during the interaction.

If my employee tests positive for COVID-19 will SFDPH tell me? If they test positive in a county outside of SF will I be notified?

SFDPH may contact employers to trace contacts, but the identity of the person who has tested positive for COVID-19 is protected health information, and typically cannot be shared except in select circumstances.

What should I be prepared to tell SFDPH to assist with contact tracing if my employee tests positive for COVID-19?

You should determine the last day that the person who was diagnosed with COVID-19 was present at the workplace. Be prepared to identify any close contacts the person had at the workplace. In an office setting, close contacts are defined as someone who as within 6 feet of the person diagnosed with



COVID-19 for more than 10 minutes while the person with COVID-19 was not wearing a facemask.

May all of my staff return to the office on June 15th if I can keep them socially distanced?

The current directive requires that all staff who can work from home continue to do so, but allows for those staff that are necessary for operations to return to the workplace under the guidelines outlined in <u>Directive 2020-18</u>, posted at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp</u>. Non-essential businesses are required to limit the number of people in the office (including Personnel and members of the public) as set forth in the directive.

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DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. 2020-19

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO REGARDING REQUIRED BEST PRACTICES FOR SMALL OUTDOOR GATHERINGS, INCLUDING FOR CEREMONIAL, RELIGIOUS AND OTHER PURPOSES

(PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTIVE) DATE OF DIRECTIVE: June 13, 2020

By this Directive, the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco (the "Health Officer") issues specific direction that Participants and Hosts, as described below, must follow as part of the local response to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") pandemic. This Directive constitutes guidance as provided under Appendix C-2 of Health Officer Order No. C19-07e issued on May 22, 2020, and updated on June 11, 2020 (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order") and, unless otherwise defined below, initially capitalized terms used in this Directive have the same meaning given them in that order. This Directive goes into effect on June 15, 2020, and remains in effect until suspended, superseded, or amended by the Health Officer. This Directive has support in the bases and justifications set forth in the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. As further provided below, this Directive automatically incorporates any revisions to the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order or other future orders issued by the Health Officer that supersede that order or reference this Directive. This Directive is intended to promote best practices as to Social Distancing Requirements and sanitation measures, helping prevent the transmission of COVID-19 and safeguard the health of workers, customers, and the community.

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER DIRECTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. This Directive applies to all individuals who participate ("Participants") and individuals and operators of facilities that organize and host ("Hosts") the following outdoor small gatherings in the City and County of San Francisco (the "City") as permitted under subsection 5 of Appendix C-2 of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order:
 - a) outdoor gatherings of no more than six people total involving eating or drinking among people from more than one household or living unit occurring somewhere other than at an outdoor dining establishment ("Small Outdoor Meal Gatherings"), or
 - b) other outdoor gatherings among people from more than one household or living unit for ceremonial, religious or other purposes and involving no more than 12 people total ("Small Outdoor Special Gatherings").

(Together, Small Outdoor Meal Gatherings and Small Outdoor Special Gatherings are sometimes referred to below as "Small Outdoor Gatherings"). For clarity, Small Outdoor Special Gatherings do not include outdoor fitness classes, which are subject to other requirements as specified in Appendix C-1 of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. Also, the size number limits to do not apply to such gatherings of people solely from a single household or living unit.

2. Attached as Exhibit A to this Directive is a list of best practices that apply to Participants and Hosts engaged in Small Gatherings (the "Best Practices"). All



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Participants and Hosts must comply with all applicable requirements listed in the Best Practices.

- 3. Hosts that operate a facility and regularly organize or hold Small Outdoor Gatherings at that facility must, before they begin to host or otherwise facilitate Small Outdoor Gatherings, create, adopt, and implement a written health and safety plan (a "Health and Safety Plan"). The Health and Safety Plan must be substantially in the form attached to this Directive as Exhibit B.
- 4. Guidance from the Department of Public Health related to Small Outdoor Gatherings is attached to this Directive as Exhibit C and is available at <u>http://www.sfdph.org/directives</u>.
- 5. If an aspect, service, or operation of the Host covered under section 3 above is also covered by another Health Officer directive (all of which are available at <u>http://www.sfdph.org/directives</u>), then such Host must comply with all applicable directives, and it must complete all relevant Health and Safety Plan forms.
- 6. Each Host covered under section 3 above must (a) make the Health and Safety Plan available to anyone interested in participating in the Small Outdoor Gathering and to any involved Personnel on request, (b) provide a summary of the plan to all Personnel working on site or otherwise in the City in relation to its operations, and (c) post the plan at the entrance to any other physical location that such Host operates within the City. Also, each such Host must provide a copy of the Health and Safety Plan and evidence of its implementation to any authority enforcing this Order upon demand.
- 7. Each Host subject to this Directive must provide items such as Face Coverings (as provided in Health Order No. C19-12b issued on May 28, 2020, and any future amendment to that order), hand sanitizer or handwashing stations, or both, and disinfectant and related supplies to any of that Host's Personnel, all as required by the Best Practices. Where feasible, each Host is also encouraged to provide such items to Participants of Small Outdoor Special Gatherings or to make sure that Participants bring their own to the gathering. If any Host is unable to provide these required items to Personnel or otherwise fails to comply with required Best Practices or, if applicable under subsections 3, 4 or 5 above, fails to abide by its Health and Safety Plan, then it must cease operating until it can fully comply and demonstrate its strict compliance. Further, any Small Outdoor Gathering organized by such Host where the Host has failed to comply is subject to immediate closure and the fines and other legal remedies described below, as a violation of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order.
- 8. For purposes of this Directive, "Personnel" includes all of the following people who provide goods or services associated with the Host in the City: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who sell goods or perform services onsite or who deliver goods for the business); vendors who are permitted to sell goods onsite (such as farmers or others who sell at stalls in farmers' markets); volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services onsite at the request of the Host. "Personnel" includes "gig workers" who perform work via the business's app or other online interface, if any.





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- 9. This Directive and the attached Best Practices may be revised by the Health Officer, through revision of this Directive or another future directive or order, as conditions relating to COVID-19 require, in the discretion of the Health Officer. All Participants and Hosts must stay updated regarding any changes to the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order and this Directive by checking the Department of Public Health website (www.sfdph.org/healthorders; www.sfdph.org/directives) regularly.
- 10. Hosts covered by section 3 above must prepare, post, and implement a Social Distancing Protocol substantially in the form of Appendix A to the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order and as provided under applicable provisions of Section 6 and subsection 15.h of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. The Host must follow these Best Practices and update them as necessary for the duration of this Directive, including, without limitation, as this Directive is amended or extended in writing by the Health Officer and consistent with any extension of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, any other order that supersedes that order, and any Health Officer order that references this Directive.

This Directive is issued in furtherance of the purposes of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. Where a conflict exists between this Directive and any state, local, or federal public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, including, without limitation, the Social Distancing Protocol, the most restrictive provision controls. Failure to carry out this Directive is a violation of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.

Exhibit A to Health Officer Directive No. 2020-19 (issued 6/13/20)

Best Practices for Participants and Hosts Involved in Small Outdoor Gatherings

In addition to preparing, posting, and implementing the Social Distancing Protocol as required by this Directive, each Host covered by Section 3 of this Directive that operates in the City must comply with each requirement listed below and prepare a Health and Safety Plan substantially in the format of Exhibit B, below. Participants and Hosts must also comply with each of the applicable requirements listed below.

Requirements:

- 1. <u>Section 1 General Requirements For all Small Outdoor Gatherings, including Small</u> <u>Outdoor Meal Gatherings and Small Outdoor Special Gatherings</u>:
 - **1.1.** All people are strongly encouraged to continue staying safe at home and minimizing unnecessary interactions with others to the maximum extent possible. If a person feels it is necessary to participate in a Small Outdoor Gathering, they should consider the risks to themselves and others before doing so and should take all possible steps to mitigate those risks. Participants and Hosts should read and make themselves familiar with the Tip Sheet for Safer Interactions During COVID-19 Pandemic and the Tip Sheet for Small Outdoor Gatherings, which may be found at <u>www.sfcdcp.org/outdoor-gatherings</u>.
 - **1.1.1.** Members of vulnerable populations (those over age 60 or with chronic medical conditions) are encouraged to carefully consider the risks before determining whether to participate in Small Outdoor Gatherings.
 - **1.1.2.** Participants and Hosts must not attend any Small Outdoor Gatherings if they feel ill or are experiencing any one of the following symptoms: fever, chills, repeated shaking/shivering, cough, sore throat, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, feeling unusually weak or fatigued, new loss of taste or smell, muscle pain, headache, runny or congested nose, or diarrhea.
 - **1.2.** All Small Outdoor Gatherings must be scheduled to conclude in no more than two hours. The duration of all gatherings should be limited to the maximum extent possible.
 - **1.3.** Participants must not move among simultaneously occurring Small Outdoor Gatherings or switch places with Participants in other simultaneously occurring Small Outdoor Gatherings. Participants are strongly discouraged from attending more than one Small Outdoor Gathering per day, and should not attend more than two Small Outdoor Gatherings per week. The more contacts a person has with others, including during Small Outdoor Gatherings, the more they are placing themselves and others at risk of transmitting the virus.
 - **1.4.** Unless otherwise specifically provided in this Directive, all Social Distancing Requirements of Health Officer Order C19-07e (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order") and the Face Covering requirements of Health Officer Order C19-12b (the "Face Covering Order") as they may be amended apply.
 - **1.5.** Face Coverings are not required while eating or drinking at a Small Outdoor Gathering. Face Coverings must otherwise be worn at all times during Small Gatherings or Small





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Outdoor Meal Gatherings unless a participant is exempt from wearing a Face Covering under Section 3.g. or h. of the Face Covering Order.

- 1.6. Small Outdoor Gatherings must not include contact sports (e.g., basketball, football, boxing) or sports with shared equipment (e.g. Frisbee, baseball, playing catch) among members of different households. This section also does not apply to organized outdoor fitness classes, which are covered by Appendix C-1 to Health Officer Order C19-07e. If Participants in a Small Outdoor Gathering engage in physical activity as permitted under the Stay-at-Home Order, such as dancing or running, they must maintain at least six feet distance from and refrain from physical contact with individuals outside of their household or living unit.
- **1.7.** To prevent virus transmission and assist with effective contact tracing, Participants are strongly encouraged to minimize the number of Participants in a Small Outdoor Gathering and keep Participants consistent from one gathering to another. To assist in potential contact tracing efforts, Participants are encouraged to remember who they gather with.
- **1.8.** Participants and Hosts may not share food or drink, or objects like sports equipment, utensils, reading materials, or religious or spiritual objects with Participants outside of their household or living unit. If an object is of critical importance and must be shared during a Small Outdoor Gathering, Participants and Hosts must take every precaution after each instance of sharing to clean and sanitize the object and/or the hands of the Participants and Hosts who share the object.
- **1.9.** Participants and Hosts are strongly discouraged from engaging in singing, chanting, or shouting during Small Outdoor Gatherings whether or not wearing a Face Covering due to the substantially increased risk of spreading the virus during such activities.

2. <u>Section 2 – Additional Requirements for Small Outdoor Meal Gatherings:</u>

- **2.1.** A group consisting of people (including Participants and Hosts) from more than one household or living unit and totaling six or fewer people may participate in a Small Outdoor Meal Gathering. This Directive applies only to Small Outdoor Meal Gatherings occurring outside of outdoor dining establishments and to groups containing members from more than one household or living unit.
- **2.2.** Small Outdoor Meal Gatherings must occur completely outdoors and may occur at places such as public parks, open spaces and other spaces where such gatherings are allowed, and subject to any rules prohibiting use of picnic tables, barbeques or other common equipment. If necessary, Participants may enter a building to access an outdoor area or use indoor bathroom facilities.
- **2.3.** Participants from different households may sit or stand closer than six feet apart during the meal, but must sit or stand as far apart as practicable during the meal and are strongly encouraged to maintain at least six feet of social distance whenever possible.
- **2.4.** Food, drinks, utensils or other objects must not be shared by people outside of the same household or living unit.





3. <u>Section 3 – Additional Requirements for Small Outdoor Special Gatherings</u>:

- **3.1.** A group consisting of people (including Participants and Hosts) from more than one household or living unit and totaling 12 or fewer people may congregate in Small Outdoor Special Gatherings. Participants outside of the same household or living unit must follow all Social Distancing Requirements. The size of a group must be reduced according to the size of the outdoor space and Participants' ability to follow Social Distancing Requirements at all times. For example, if the size of an outdoor space allows no more than 10 people to follow Social Distancing at all times during a gathering, then the maximum total size for that Small Outdoor Special Gathering is 10 Participants.
- **3.2.** Participants or Hosts at Small Outdoor Special Gatherings are encouraged (but not required) to maintain a list of Participants who are willing to voluntarily provide their name to assist in potential future contact tracing efforts. Any lists should be discarded after three weeks.
- **3.3.** Small Outdoor Special Gatherings must occur completely outdoors. If necessary, Participants may enter a building to access an outdoor area or use indoor bathroom facilities.
- **3.4.** Sunshades, awnings, or similar outdoor structures may be used, but must be completely open on all sides to provide maximum ventilation.
- **3.5.** Participants outside of the same household or living unit must remain at least six feet apart, follow all Social Distancing Requirements, and wear Face Coverings unless eating, drinking, or exempted from wearing a Face Covering under Section 3.g. or h. of the Face Covering Order.

4. Section 4 – Additional Requirements Specific to Hosts of Small Outdoor Gatherings

- **4.1.** Hosts may organize and host Small Outdoor Special Gatherings up to 12 people provided they have sufficient outdoor space to allow participants to comply with Social Distancing Requirements.
- **4.2.** In compliance with the Social Distancing Protocol, Hosts covered by Section 3 of the Directive must develop and implement a plan for cleaning and disinfecting high touch surfaces such as seating, doors, and other common high-touch surfaces before each gathering.
- **4.3.** Before hosting a Small Outdoor Gathering, a Host covered by Section 3 of the Directive must prepare the outdoor space to accommodate attendees and comply with the Social Distancing Protocol. For example, a Host may be required to prepare a plan for safe ingress and egress from the space and add physical markings to demonstrate a six-foot distance in areas participants may be congregating.
- **4.4.** Hosts covered by Section 3 of the Directive must prohibit Participants from congregating at the end of any Small Outdoor Gatherings.
- **4.5.** Only one Small Outdoor Gathering may be held at a Host at a time unless the Host can ensure the Small Outdoor Gatherings will remain separate, such as by placing physical barriers between the gatherings. If multiple Small Outdoor Gatherings are occurring at



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the same time at the Host, the Host must prohibit mingling among Participants from different Small Outdoor Gatherings. Host Personnel must not move between or participate in simultaneously occurring Small Outdoor Gatherings.

- **4.6.** As to Hosts covered by Section 3 of the Directive, Hosts may permit Personnel to participate in sequential Small Outdoor Gatherings during a single day but are reminded of the increased potential to transmit the virus from one Small Outdoor Gathering to another. Hosts organizing or participating in sequential Small Outdoor Special Gatherings must, in addition to the requirements of this Directive:
 - **4.6.1.** Provide a minimum of 20 minutes between gatherings during which Participants may safely egress and clear the area and Host Personnel may adequately clean and sanitize all high touch surfaces and otherwise prepare the space for the next gathering;
 - **4.6.2.** Ensure that before participating in a sequential gathering, Host Personnel thoroughly wash hands and clean, sanitize, or replace any items or clothing that have come in contact with Participants or different Host Personnel during earlier gatherings; and
 - **4.6.3.** Ensure that Host Personnel not move between simultaneously occurring Small Outdoor Gatherings.

- □ Business is familiar with and complies with all requirements set forth in Health Officer Directive No. 2020-19, available at <u>http://www.sfdph.com/directives</u>.
- Make sure no one including employees attends a gathering who is experiencing any one of the following symptoms: fever, chills, repeated shaking/shivering, cough, sore through, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, feeling unusually weak or fatigued, new loss of taste or smell, muscle pain, headache, runny or congested nose, or diarrhea.
- □ Gatherings are limited to 12 people or less, scheduled to last 2 hours or less, and kept as short as possible. Participants do not move among gatherings happening at the same time or switch places with Participants in other gatherings
- □ Everyone wears a Face Covering unless eating or drinking or otherwise exempt.
- □ All Social Distancing Requirements are followed at all times except when people are engaged in a Small Outdoor Meal Gathering of six or fewer people.
- □ No sharing of food or drink or items like sports equipment, utensils, reading materials, or religious or spiritual objects with Participants. If an object is of critical importance and must be shared, take every precaution after each instance of sharing to clean and sanitize the object and/or the hands of the Participants and Hosts who share the object.
- □ Avoid singing, chanting, or shouting whether or not wearing a Face Covering.
- Develop and implement a plan for cleaning and disinfecting high touch surfaces such as seating, doors, and other common high-touch surfaces before each gathering.
- □ Prepare the outdoor space to accommodate Participants and comply with the Social Distancing Protocol. For example, make a plan for Participants to get in and out of the outdoor space safely while maintaining social distancing and add physical markings to demonstrate a 6-foot distance in areas participants may be congregating.
- Only hosting one Small Outdoor Gathering at a time unless there is enough outdoor space to keep simultaneous gatherings separate and socially distanced.
- □ If Host Personnel are taking part in sequential gatherings, there is sufficient time between gatherings to engage in proper sanitation and disinfection procedures.

Tip Sheet and Frequently Asked Questions: Small Outdoor Gatherings

June 13, 2020

AUDIENCE: Hosts and Participants in outdoor gatherings involving people from more than one household. This includes Small Outdoor Meal Gatherings and Small Outdoor Special Gatherings (e.g. celebrations or ceremonies), involving people not all from the same household. Outdoor restaurant dining and outdoor fitness are addressed elsewhere.

BACKGROUND: As of June 15, 2020, Health Officer Directive No. 2020-19 authorizes and provides guidance for Small Outdoor Gatherings. This document summarizes the main action items.

How Many People Can Gather?

- People from different households may come together in a group **totaling** no more than 6 people for a Meal Gathering. Maintaining 6 feet apart from those not in your household is not required during a Meal Gathering, but is strongly recommended.
- People from different households may come together in a group **totaling** no more than 12 people for a Special Gathering. The outdoor space used must allow everyone attending to remain at least 6 feet apart from those not in their household at all times.

Preventing Transmission of Viruses

- People participating in Gatherings must always wear a Face Covering, except:
 - Remove face covering when eating or drinking;
 - People who have a written exemption from face covering provided by a healthcare provider and children under 12 years of age are not required to wear face covering;
 - Children 2 years or younger should not wear a face covering.
- No contact sports (e.g., basketball, football, boxing) or sports with shared equipment (e.g. Frisbee, baseball, playing catch) are permitted among members of different households.
- Do not share objects like sports equipment, utensils, food, reading materials, or religious or spiritual items with persons outside of your household. If an object is of critical importance and must be shared during a Gathering, then after each instance of sharing, clean and sanitize the object and/or the hands of all persons who touch the object.
- Singing, chanting, or shouting are strongly discouraged whether or not wearing a Face Covering due to increased risk of spreading the virus during such activities.

Preparing for Gatherings

- Review the <u>Tip Sheet for Safer Interactions During COVID-19 Pandemic</u>, posted at: <u>www.sfcdcp.org/communicable-disease/diseases-a-z/covid19whatsnew/</u>.
- Members of vulnerable populations (those over age 60 or with chronic medical conditions) should carefully consider the risks before determining whether to participate.
- Personnel or participants should not attend if feeling ill or experiencing any one of the following symptoms: fever, chills, repeated shaking/shivering, cough, sore through, shortness of breath, difficulty breathing, feeling unusually weak or fatigued, new loss of taste or smell, muscle pain, headache, runny or congested nose, or diarrhea.



Structuring a Gathering

- Gatherings must be scheduled to last no longer than 2 hours.
- Gatherings must occur completely outdoors, except to use bathrooms. This may include parks or other spaces where such gatherings are allowed.
- Sunshades, awnings, or similar outdoor structures may be used, but must be completely open on all sides to provide maximum ventilation.
- You may not move between simultaneous Gatherings.
- Minimize the number of Gatherings you attend to not more than 2 per week.

Hosting a Gathering

- Hosts include clubs, faith-based organizations, or other entities. Persons informally organizing a gathering of friends at home or in a park are not required to follow additional rules of Hosts.
- Hosts must develop, implement, and maintain:
 - A <u>Health and Safety Plan</u>. This must be available for participants, provided to Host Personnel, and posted at the physical entrance of where the Host operates. Please see Exhibit B of the Health Order 2020-19 on Small Outdoor Gatherings, posted at www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp.
 - A <u>Social Distancing Protocol</u> that includes, among other requirements, a plan to clean and disinfect high touch surfaces such as seating, doors, and other surfaces before each Gathering. See <u>Appendix A of the Stay Safe at Home Health Order</u>, posted at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp</u>.
- Hosts should consider maintaining for 3 weeks a list of Personnel and Participants willing to voluntarily provide their names to assist in contact tracing efforts if an attendee develops COVID-19.
- Hosts must provide face coverings, hand sanitizers or handwashing stations, and cleaning supplies to Host Personnel.
- Before hosting a Gathering, the Host must prepare the outdoor space to accommodate attendees and comply with the Social Distancing Protocol. For example, a Host may be required to prepare a plan for safely entering and leaving the space and add physical markings to demonstrate a 6-foot distance in areas participants may be congregating.
- Hosts must prohibit Participants from congregating at the end of any Gatherings.
- Hosts can only hold 1 Small Outdoor Gathering at a time unless the Host can ensure the Gatherings will remain separate, such as by placing physical barriers between the Gatherings. If more than one Gathering is occurring, the Host must prohibit mingling among Participants from different Gatherings. Host personnel may not move back and forth between Gatherings.
- Hosts may allow Personnel to participate in sequential Gatherings in the same day. If Hosting sequential Gatherings, the Host must also:
 - Ensure at least 20 minutes between gatherings for Participants to leave and Personnel to clean and sanitize all high-touch areas.
 - Ensure Personnel thoroughly wash hands and clean, sanitize, or replace any items or clothing that have come in contact with Participants or different Host Personnel during earlier gatherings.



Frequently Asked Questions

Should We Greet One Another as Usual? Shaking Hands, Kissing Cheeks, etc.?

• Identify how your community may greet one another in ways that reduce any spread of viruses, including COVID-19. For example, provide direction to replace hugs with elbow touches or hand signals like a peace sign or the American Sign Language sign for "I Love You." Greeters at all gatherings should refrain from offering handshakes and "model hospitality with words."

How Can We Care for the Elderly, Those with Special Health Considerations, Their Caregivers, and Other High-Risk Populations at outdoor Gatherings?

- Before the event provide special consideration in communicating risk to vulnerable populations in your community, including older adults and others with access and/or functional needs.
- Assign, or encourage those who attend, to seek out a "buddy" who will check in on and help if they have special needs such as water, seating, shade, or other assistance.

How can my children play with other children?

- It is important that an adult supervise children's activity at gatherings
- Children not from the same family unit must maintain social distancing (6 feet), and not share toys or athletic equipment.
- Plan ahead for activities that can entertain children and bring enough toys, books, arts and crafts, that children can use within a family unit without sharing with others.

How do I know how far 6 feet is to ensure "social distancing"?

- Bring a tape measure, if possible to measure distance between chairs, or other seating assignments, ahead of time.
- If no tape measure is available, 6 feet is approximately the distance of 2 long strides. Most chairs are approximately one and a half feet wide and long. The distance between chairs to the sides, in back and in front of chairs should fit 4 other chairs.

I am having a gathering of just family. Do we need to follow these rules?

- If you all live together, you must still wear face covering in public, and follow this guidance if you will interact with anyone outside of your household.
- Interactions among members of the same household are not otherwise subject to rules regarding the social distancing, or sharing and touching of objects or each other.

I'm a Host. How do I make sure Personnel are not sick when they work?

What if someone at my Gathering tests positive for COVID-19?

- People may be able to transmit the virus 48 hours before they develop symptoms of COVID-19.

- A list of Personnel and Participants from the Host will help SFDPH with contact tracing.

Good evening, Attached please find the signed amendment to the dental care directive, Directive No. 2020-09c.

The primary changes associated with this amendment are:

- 1. In consultation with the SF Dental Society, the mandate for testing when performing aerosol generating procedures (AGPs) was changed to a strong recommendation.
- 2. The directive was generally revised to make clear that some requirements from the prior version are now part of the Social Distancing Protocol, Exhibit A to the shelter in place order (Order No. C19-07e), and dental care providers must comply with those requirements, which still include daily screening of personnel and basic distance and disinfection protocols.
- 3. The Health and Safety Plan has been converted to a 2-page checklist to make it easier for dental care providers to complete and post the Health and Safety Plan. This is

consistent with how other directives are handling the Health and Safety Plan requirement.

- 4. The directive clarifies that any support persons brought by a patient must also be screened and are subject to face covering and other safety precautions.
- 5. The directive adds language similar to what is in the ambulatory care directive around the reason for various protections, requirements regarding cleaning based on CDC and other guidelines, and discontinuing use of magazines or other shared items in waiting rooms. It also adds language regarding the higher risk for dental care (where face coverings cannot be worn).
- 6. The directive also encourages minimization of AGPs and use of certain engineering controls to minimize risks and requires personnel to don new PPE when PPE is visibly contaminated.

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. 2020-09c

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO REGARDING REQUIRED BEST PRACTICES FOR DENTAL HEALTH CARE

(PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTIVE) DATE OF DIRECTIVE: June 15, 2020

By this Directive, the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco (the "Health Officer") issues mandatory, context-specific direction permitting the provision of certain kinds of health-related care as part of the local response to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") pandemic. This Directive constitutes context-specific guidance as provided under Sections 1 and 3 of Health Officer Order No. C19-08c issued on June 12, 2020 (the "Medical Care Order", available online at www.sfdph.org/healthorders) and, unless otherwise defined below, capitalized terms used in this Directive have the same meaning given them in that order. This Directive goes into effect at 11:59 p.m. on June 15, 2020, and no care may be provided of the type covered by this Directive except as permitted by and subject to the restrictions of either the Medical Care Order or this Directive. As soon as the mandatory criteria for provision of care listed in this Directive are met, then a provider, facility, or office may provide the care covered by this Directive, and such care may continue to be provided by the provider, facility, or office only so long as the mandatory criteria are met. This Directive remains in effect until suspended, superseded, or amended by the Health Officer, as further provided below. This Directive has support in the bases and justifications set forth in the Medical Care Order as well as in Health Officer Order No. C19-07e issued on June 12, 2020 (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order") and any updates or amendments to that order. As further provided below, this Directive also automatically incorporates any revisions to the Medical Care Order, the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, or other future orders issued by the Health Officer that supersede those orders or that reference this Directive. This Directive is intended to promote best practices as to Social Distancing Requirements listed in Section 15.k of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, infection control measures, and other best practices, helping reduce the transmission of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, in the health care and healing arts setting and helping safeguard the health of workers, patients and clients, and the community. This Directive No. 2020-09c revises and replaces Directive No. 2020-09b, issued May 17, 2020, and updated on May 18, 2020.

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER DIRECTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. For any Healthcare Operation that Section 15.b of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order permits to provide care in the City and County of San Francisco (the "City") during this pandemic, this Directive applies only to the aspects of that Healthcare Operation that meet all of the following criteria:
 - a. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation provides or supports the provision of the following types of care: Dental Health Care, as that term is defined in Section 3 below; <u>and</u>
 - b. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation has appropriate supplies (Personal Protective Equipment ("PPE"), and all other necessary medical and cleaning

supplies) and staffing to safely function in a manner that meets both regulatory requirements for staffing and operation and the community standard for the safe provision of care; <u>and</u>

- c. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation meets all applicable requirements listed in this Directive, including Exhibit A to this Directive, at all times and has completed and posted the two-page Health and Safety Plan checklist attached to this Directive as Exhibit B; and
- d. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation has reviewed and meets all applicable requirements listed in Appendix A of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, as revised on June 1, 2020, and has completed and posted the twopage Social Distancing Protocol checklist included in that Appendix A.

Each such aspect of a Healthcare Operation that meets all criteria listed above is referred to by this Directive as a "Dental Care Service."

- 2. This Directive permits the provision of Dental Health Care by the Dental Care Service of any Healthcare Operation so long as the owner, operator, manager, supervisor, Chief Executive Officer or Administrator, Chief Medical Officer or Chief of Service or Chief of Staff, or other medical supervisor of a Dental Care Service ensures that all mandatory best practices listed in Exhibit A to this Directive (the "Best Practices"), which is incorporated by this reference, are followed.
- 3. For purposes of this Directive, the term "Dental Health Care" means any care provided by a professional who is licensed and providing care under Chapter 4 of Division 2 of the California Business and Professions Code or by someone who is supervised by such a licensed professional. For purposes of this Directive, Dental Health Care includes but is not limited to any preventative, restorative, maintenance, cosmetic, hygiene, corrective, orthodontic, routine, diagnostic, urgent, or emergency care. Dental Health Care expressly includes any care that is "Essential" as defined by the Medical Care Order or any emergency or urgent care. But this Directive does not apply to care that is provided on an emergency basis at any general acute care hospital or urgent care center, with such care already being authorized and provided under the hospital's or urgent care center's standard procedures, which should include airborne precautions (N95 or higher) similar to those listed in this Directive for aerosol generating procedures. Note that care provided at an urgent care center is considered ambulatory care and is subject to Directive No. 2020-20, which is to be issued on or around June 15, 2020.
- 4. This Directive and the attached Best Practices may be revised by the Health Officer, through revision of this Directive or another future directive or order, as conditions relating to COVID-19 require, in the discretion of the Health Officer. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service under this Directive must stay updated regarding any changes to the Medical Care Order, the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, and this Directive by checking the Department of Public Health website (www.sfdph.org/directives) frequently.
- 5. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service under this Directive must, before allowing Dental Health Care and related care to occur as outlined by this Directive, review and implement all applicable requirements of the Best



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Practices, consider action based on recommendations listed in the Best Practices, and complete and post the two-page checklist attached to this Directive as Appendix B (a "Health and Safety Plan").

- 6. There are certain people associated with the Dental Care Service who are subject to this Directive. Specifically, people who provide or support the provision of care by the Dental Care Service are collectively referred to by this Directive and the Best Practices as "Personnel", and those people include all of the following who provide services associated with the Dental Care Services in the City: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who perform services onsite or who deliver goods to the business); independent contractors; students who are participating in educational programs associated with their professional degree or licensure; volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services at the requires the Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service to ensure that Personnel who perform work associated with the Dental Care Service comply with the requirements of this Directive.
- 7. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service subject to this Directive must provide items such as Face Coverings (as provided in Health Order No. C19-12b issued on May 28, 2020), hand sanitizer, sinks for handwashing, PPE, and disinfectant and related supplies to Personnel and to the patients or clients, as required by the Best Practices. If any such Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service is unable to provide these required items or otherwise fails to comply with required Best Practices or this Directive, then it must cease operating the Dental Care Service under this Directive until it can fully comply and demonstrate its strict compliance.
- 8. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service is required to take certain steps in the Health and Safety Plan related to its Personnel, including certain actions listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 of the Best Practices if Personnel are sick. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service is prohibited from taking any adverse action against any Personnel for staying home in the circumstances listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 of the Best Practices. Personnel of each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service are prohibited from coming to work if they are sick and must comply with the Directive, including the rules for returning to work listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 of the Best Practices.
- 9. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service must: (a) make the Health and Safety Plan and Social Distancing Protocol checklists available to any patient or client, Personnel, or other member of the public on request, (b) provide a summary of the key aspects of its compliance plan regarding this Directive to all Personnel working onsite in relation to the Dental Care Service (except for people only temporarily on-site), and (c) post a copy of the Health and Safety Plan and Social Distancing Protocol checklists in any reception area of the Dental Care Service and at any key Personnel gathering or break areas related to the Dental Care Service.
- 10. Implementation of this Directive augments—but does not limit—the obligations of each Healthcare Operation under the Medical Care Order (Order No. C19-08b) and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order (Order No. C19-07e). The Healthcare Operation



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must follow these context-specific Best Practices in relation to each Dental Care Service and update its compliance as necessary for the duration of this Directive, including, without limitation, as this Directive is amended or extended in writing by the Health Officer and consistent with any extension of the Medical Care Order and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, any other order that supersedes those orders, and any Health Officer order that references this Directive.

11. This Directive becomes effective at 11:59 p.m. on June 15, 2020, and will continue to be in effect until it is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Health Officer. Effective as of 11:59 p.m. on June 15, 2020, this Directive revises and replaces Directive Number 2020-09b, issued May 17, 2020, and updated May 18, 2020.

This Directive is issued in furtherance of the purposes of the Medical Care Order and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. Where a conflict exists between this Directive and any state, local, or federal public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the most restrictive or health-protective provision controls. Failure to carry out this Directive is a violation of the Medical Care Order and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.

Best Practices for Dental Health Care

The owner, operator, manager, supervisor, Chief Executive Officer or Administrator, Chief Medical Officer or Chief of Service or Chief of Staff, or other medical supervisor of a Dental Care Service must, as provided in Health Officer Directive No. 2020-09c, ensure that the Dental Care Service addresses each item below before the Dental Care Service is permitted to provide any patient or client care including Routine and Essential Medical Appointments or emergency or urgent health care (except for care that is provided on an emergency or urgent basis at any general acute care hospital or urgent care center). The Dental Care Service must also complete and post the Health and Safety Plan checklist attached to this Directive as Exhibit B as required by the Directive. And at all times the Dental Care Service must comply with the requirements listed below when operating under this Directive.

<u>Directions</u>: Any Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service under this Directive must implement and comply with each requirement listed below If the office or facility has written policies applicable to the Dental Care Service that satisfy a listed requirement or are more restrictive than a specific requirement of this Directive, then the office or facility may rely on its written policy to comply with the Directive's specific requirement.

Requirements:

1. Signage and Education

- 1.1. Post signage at each public entrance of the Dental Care Service to inform all Personnel and patients or clients that they must: avoid entering the facility or location if they have any symptoms consistent with COVID-19 or SARS-CoV-2 (unless they have notified the Dental Care Service in advance and precautions have been taken to protect Personnel and other patients or clients); maintain a minimum six-foot distance from others while at the facility to the extent possible; wear a face covering or barrier mask (a "Face Covering") at all times except as authorized by a healthcare provider; and not shake hands or engage in any unnecessary physical contact. Criteria for Face Coverings and the requirements related to their use are set forth in Health Officer Order No. C19-12b, issued on May 28, 2020 (the "Face Covering Order"), including as that order is revised or replaced. Sample signs are available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19.
- 1.2. Post a copy of the Social Distancing Protocol and Health and Safety Plan checklists at each public entrance to the Dental Care Service.
- 1.3. Distribute to all Dental Care Service Personnel a summary of the key aspects of its compliance plan regarding this Directive and any educational materials required by the Health and Safety Plan.
- 1.4. Educate all Dental Care Service Personnel of the requirements of the Social Distancing Requirements of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order and this Directive that apply to them.

2. General Screening of Personnel and Patients or Clients

2.1. Instruct all Dental Care Service Personnel orally and in writing not to come to work or the facility if they are sick, ensure that all Personnel are screened daily pursuant to the Social Distancing Protocol (which includes a one-page screening checklist), and follow the Social

Distancing Protocol requirements regarding any Personnel who answer yes to any screening question.

2.2. Patients or clients, as well as anyone accompanying them to an appointment, must be screened for symptoms in advance of <u>and</u> at the time of their in-person visit, including on the calendar day of the visit. Attached to this Directive as Exhibit C is a one-page screening form that may be used for this process. <u>At a minimum, such screening must occur **before** the patient or <u>client</u>, as well as anyone accompanying them, enters the Dental Care Service facility, office, <u>or suite on the day of the visit to protect Personnel and other patients or clients</u>. This screening is in addition to examining any patient or client vital signs as part of the health care being provided. For any patient or client, as well as anyone accompanying them, so has a current confirmed COVID-19 diagnosis, or has a current confirmed SARS-CoV-2 infection, in-person health care may only be provided subject to infection control practices appropriate to ensure that that care can be provided safely for the patient or client and all Personnel.</u>

Such screening must address all of the following:

- 2.2.1. Within the preceding 10 days has the person been diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus? (If so, they are generally required to self-isolate as outlined at <u>https://www.sfcdcp.org/Isolation-Quarantine-Packet</u>.)
- 2.2.2. Does the person live in the same household with or have they had close contact with someone who in the preceding 14 days was diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus? (If so, they are generally required to self-quarantine as outlined at https://www.sfcdcp.org/Isolation-Quarantine-Packet.)
- 2.2.3. Has the person had any one or more of the following symptoms which is new or not explained by a pre-existing condition that day or within the preceding 24 hours? The symptoms include: fever, chills, or repeated shaking/shivering; cough; sore throat; shortness of breath or difficulty breathing; feeling unusually weak or fatigued; loss of taste or smell; muscle pain; headache; runny or congested nose; or diarrhea. If any listed symptom is present, the person might be positive for SARS-CoV-2 and should be referred for testing, and appropriate precautions should be taken or the care delayed.

3. <u>Face Covering and Related PPE</u>

3.1. Face Coverings are required of all patients or clients, as well as anyone accompanying them to an appointment, seeking care form a Dental Care Service as outlined in Section 6.e of the Face Covering Order. The Dental Care Service must ensure that each patient or client and any support person wears a Face Covering at all times when onsite at the facility except where the provision of care requires removal of the Face Covering or except to the extent the Face Covering Order does not require one (such as for children 12 and younger and for people with a written excuse from a physician). The Dental Care Service must provide a Face Covering for any patient or client who does not have one. When a Face Covering is not worn by the patient or client, the Dental Care Service must take other steps to minimize risk of transmission of SARS-CoV-2.

- 3.2. The Dental Care Service may adopt a policy that some children (such as those age three and older) must wear a Face Covering in most situations, but such a policy must include appropriate supervision of children between 3 and 12 years old to ensure they are safely wearing a Face Covering and must include appropriate exceptions similar to those in the Face Covering Order. It is important that children 12 years old and younger are supervised when wearing a Face Covering.
- 3.3. If Dental Care Service written policies or any local, state, or federal law, regulation, or rule require the use of medical-grade masks or other masks that are more protective than a Face Covering, the more protective item must be used and its use must comply with the policy or law, regulation, or rule. For clarity, this Directive's requirements regarding Face Coverings are meant to ensure that Personnel, patients, clients, and support persons are wearing a Face Covering or mask that is more protective against the transmission of SARS-CoV-2 except where the medical procedure does not permit use of the Face Covering or mask. Appropriate masks must be utilized as directed by the clinical context and type of surgery or procedure being performed.

4. Physical Distancing

- 4.1. Physical distancing of at least 6 feet/2 meters must be maintained by Dental Care Service and patients, clients, and support persons whenever possible. This includes at a minimum the following requirements:
 - 4.1.1. In any waiting area or other area with seating, chairs should be removed or taken out of use to ensure proper distancing in other remaining chairs or seats. If a patient or client is in a waiting area with a support person, those two may sit next to each other in a designated chair or area.
 - 4.1.2. For check-in and other areas with lines, floor markings of some kind should be used, to the extent possible, to create visual reminders of minimum distancing.
 - 4.1.3. If space is available, any patient or client who has an active SARS-CoV-2 infection or who has symptoms should be isolated away from other patients or clients and Personnel. If isolation is not possible, other steps should be taken to prevent transmission. Support persons with an active SARS-CoV-2 infection are not allowed.
 - 4.1.4. The physical distancing requirements include screening of the patient or client, and any support person, on the calendar day of a visit or procedure must be done <u>before</u> arrival in the Dental Care Service facility, office, or suite (such as via a call the morning of the visit or a call from outside the building or in the lobby or hallway just before entry).
 - 4.1.5. When a patient or client, as well as any support person, is in an exam or treatment room, physical distancing must be observed whenever possible.
- 4.2. The requirements for physical distancing may be tailored based on the context of a specific patient or client's clinical situation.
- 4.3. Appointments and procedures should be staggered during the day as much as possible to avoid crowding during the day.

4.4. Patients and clients should be encouraged to conduct visits via telephone or other remote technology like video chat when doing so does not compromise the care being provided.

5. <u>Hand Hygiene</u>

- 5.1. The Dental Care Service (or the building where the office is located) should have bathrooms with sinks, soap, water, and disposable paper towels available for hand washing by Personnel, patients, clients, and support persons. The Dental Care Service must also provide hand sanitizer effective against SARS-CoV-2 at entrances and elsewhere at the facility or location for Personnel and patients or clients and support persons. Sanitizer must also be provided to patients or clients, as well as support persons, in waiting areas. Information on hand sanitizer, including sanitizer effective against SARS-CoV-2 and how to obtain sanitizer, is available online from the Food and Drug Administration here: https://www.fda.gov/drugs/information-drug-class/qa-consumers-hand-sanitizers-and-covid-19.
- 5.2. Encourage patients or clients to wash or sanitize their hands before they touch any Dental Care Service Personnel, and require Dental Care Service Personnel to follow appropriate infection control precautions when they must touch any patients or clients.

6. <u>Risk Categorization, Protective Actions, and Patient or Client Testing for SARS-CoV-2</u>

- 6.1. To evaluate the transmission risk or SARS-CoV-2 in health care settings, including dentistry, providers must consider the per-patient risk and the cumulative risk. More than half of persons with SARS-CoV-2 infections in the community have no symptoms but are contagious. If the risk of exposure from an asymptomatic or pre-symptomatic patient in the community is between 0.5% to 1% (0.005 to 0.01), then after seeing 60 patients from the community, the cumulative risk of exposure to a contagious patient in the clinical setting is from 26% to 45%. This may constitute the risk faced by a particular clinic or office in the course of a week, or even in the course of a day or two depending on patient volume. Because of the high cumulative risk of a contagious asymptomatic or pre-symptomatic patient in the care setting, the requirements of this Directive must be followed.
- 6.2. In-person care has different kinds of risks associated with the nature of the care being provided. It is not possible to list each type of Dental Health Care by risk type. But given the realities of Dental Health Care, where the patient usually sits for more than brief periods within six feet of Personnel (sometimes for an hour or longer), where the patient is usually unable to wear any Face Covering or other protective barrier mask during the procedure, and where procedures almost always involve bodily fluids such as saliva and a risk of exposure to blood or the generation of aerosols, Dental Health Care is inherently higher risk than other kinds of ambulatory care. Accordingly, this Directive includes requirements and recommendations for implementation of various Engineering Controls, Administrative Controls, Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), and testing.
- 6.3. Given the nature of Dental Health Care, the requirements of this Directive listed above for Face Coverings, hand hygiene, and physical distancing are not sufficient to adequately reduce the risk of exposure in most cases. Accordingly, these additional requirements must be followed by the Dental Care Service:
 - 6.3.1. The service should minimize aerosol generating procedures (AGP) whenever possible.



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- 6.3.2. For patients or clients undergoing any routine (non-urgent, non-emergency) AGP, it is strongly recommended that the patient or client be tested via reverse transcription polymerase chain reaction (RT-PCR) testing for a current SARS-CoV-2 infection between 0-7 days before the scheduled AGP, with the results being reported to or shared with the Dental Care Service before the procedure if the test is not a rapid test performed in-house by the Dental Care Service. In the future, when and if a rapid test becomes available to the Dental Care Service, the test must be performed during this window. The test should be performed as close to the day of the AGP as possible. This test is in addition to the screening requirements on the day of the scheduled procedure. A test is not required for other pre- or post-procedure care that does not include an AGP. A test is not required for any emergency or urgent care so long as other precautions are taken to protect against the risk of transmission (such as patient screening and use of appropriate PPE), but a rapid test is strongly recommended, if possible, for any AGP.
- 6.3.3. For follow up visits involving the same treatment plan that includes an AGP, repeat RT-PCR testing is at the discretion of the Dental Care Service. The Dental Care Service must provide educational materials to the patient instructing them how to avoid infection between visits.
- 6.3.4. The Dental Care Service must follow PPE and infection prevention guidelines from United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the California Department of Public Health, the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (known as Cal/OSHA), and the United States Department of Labor Occupational Safety and Health Administration (known as OSHA). When guidelines differ, the more health protective applies (*e.g.*, the one with the higher level of PPE, more protective work practices, and/or stronger Engineering and Administrative Controls).
- 6.3.5. The Dental Care Service is strongly recommended to use a rubber dam for restorative procedures, High Volume Evacuators (HVE) and four handed dentistry for AGPs, and other Engineering and Administrative Controls to reduce aerosol generation and other risks whenever possible.
- 6.3.6. Personnel are required to don new PPE between patients whenever PPE is observed to be visibly contaminated with blood or body fluids. PPE such as face shields or goggles must be disinfected using an approved method and/or disinfectants effective against SARS-CoV-2.
- 6.4. Nothing in this Directive prohibits a Dental Care Service from requiring additional diagnostic or serology testing of a patient or client.

7. <u>Reporting and Cooperation Requirements Regarding SARS-CoV-2</u>

- 7.1. Each Healthcare Operation must promptly report any COVID-19 case and any patient, client, or Personnel SARS-CoV-2 infection as required by local, state, and federal laws, regulations, and rules.
- 7.2. In addition, each Dental Care Service must promptly (within 24 hours, and preferably during daytime hours) report to DPH Communicable Disease Control (CD Control) at 415-554-2830 each of the following except as excused by Section 7.3:



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- 7.2.1. Any instance where a patient, client, or support person is confirmed to have had an active SARS-CoV-2 infection at the time of any Dental Health Care or related in-person care and the Dental Care Service did not know about the infection at the time of the Dental Health Care or other in-person care;
- 7.2.2. Any instance where any member of the Dental Health Service Personnel is confirmed to have had an active SARS-CoV-2 infection at the time of an in-person interaction onsite with any patient, client, or support person and the Dental Health Service did not know in advance of the in-person interaction about the infection; and
- 7.2.3. Any instance where there has been likely or confirmed transmission of SARS-CoV-2 onsite between Personnel, patients, clients, or support persons, including among Personnel or among patients, clients, or support persons associated with in-person care provided onsite by the Dental Health Service.
- 7.3. A hospital with quality management and/or infection prevention and control programs that are overseen by the hospital's Medical Staff does not need to report occurrences listed in subsections 7.2.1 and 7.2.2 above to DPH so long as the incident is reported and reviewed by its quality control or infection control program.
- 7.4. The Healthcare Operation is required to provide all information associated with this Directive requested by DPH, the Health Officer, or the Health Officer's designee. Such disclosure includes protected health information or other health information of patients or clients and information, including confidential employment and health information, about Personnel where the disclosure is limited to the minimum amount necessary for public health purposes and where any such information that is confidential must be protected by DPH and the Health Officer as required by law.
- 7.5. Each Healthcare Operation must cooperate with DPH, the Health Officer, or the Health Officer's designee in relation to action required by DPH, the Health Officer, or the Health Officer's designee that relates to any information reported under this Directive.

8. <u>Cleaning</u>

8.1. The Dental Care Service must implement routine cleaning and disinfection procedures, including using cleaners and water to pre-clean surfaces prior to applying an Environmental Protection Agency-registered hospital-grade disinfectant to frequently touched surfaces or objects for the appropriate contact times for SARS-CoV-2 in healthcare settings, including those patient-care areas in which aerosol generating procedures are performed. This includes use of disinfecting liquid, wipe, or spray products that are effective against SARS-CoV-2 when disinfecting high touch surfaces. A list of products approved by the United States Environmental Protection Agency as meeting criteria for use against SARS-CoV-2 can be found online at https://www.epa.gov/pesticide-registration/list-n-disinfectants-use-against-sars-cov-2. Products must be used in strict accordance with the product label and manufacturer's instructions, including but not limited to the manufacturer's specified dwell (wet contact time) for SARS-CoV-2, which can be obtained from the product manufacturer or found on the EPA list linked above.



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8.2. Providers must stay up to date with practice-related recommendations issued by the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the California Department of Public Health, other governmental or regulatory agencies, and professional organizations. The cleaning and disinfection procedures of the Dental Care Service must include appropriate cleaning and environmental controls as outlined by these sources. One resource for cleaning information is the CDC page "Guidance for Dental Settings," available online at https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/hcp/dental-settings.html, including the sections on "Environmental Infection Control" and "Sterilization and Disinfection of Patient-Care Items."

Such controls should include implementing wait times after procedures to both allow particles to settle and/or be captured or removed by ventilation systems before cleaning; see the CDC recommendations available online at https://www.cdc.gov/infectioncontrol/guidelines/environmental/appendix/air.html#tableb1. Technologies or techniques including but not limited to HEPA filtration, ultraviolet (light) germicidal irradiation (UVGI) systems, photocatalytic oxidation (PCO) purifiers, and extra-oral suction units may be used to supplement general ventilation. If an activity-, equipment-, and facility-specific risk assessment is performed, wait times may be modified.

8.3. All areas where patient or client care takes place must, at a minimum, undergo standard cleaning between each patient or client use. This includes any toys or other materials used by children in clinical or waiting areas. This also includes any tools that are used by Personnel when providing care.

9. Other Requirements

- 9.1. Discontinue the use of magazines and other shared items in waiting areas. Toys may be provided for use by children so long as they are appropriately cleaned as required by Section 8.3 above.
- 9.2. The Health and Safety Plan must ensure that all patients and clients are provided care in a manner that protects the safety and health of patients, clients, and Personnel. If the California Department of Public Health ("CDPH") issues any pandemic-related guidelines or requirements regarding Dental Health Care in the future, each Dental Care Service must review such guidelines or requirements and update its provision of care under this Directive accordingly. If CDPH requires pandemic-related processes or protections that are more health-protective than those listed in this Directive, the most health-protective apply and must be followed.
- 9.3. If the Dental Care Service performs procedures or offers care of a type that are the subject of recommendations or guidance of a professional association in the field (such as the American Dental Association (ADA), American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, American Academy of Periodontology, or other similar professional bodies) or a government agency including but not limited to the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (known as Cal/OSHA), and the United States Department of Labor Occupational Safety and Health Administration (known as OSHA), the Dental Care Service should review and consider implementing appropriate recommendations related to the pandemic and should update its compliance with this Directive over time based on such recommendations with the focus of protecting patients, clients, and Personnel.



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9.4. The Health Officer may revise this Directive and add additional requirements in the future to ensure that Dental Health Care is provided in the safest possible manner during this pandemic.

- Provider is screening each patient and any support person before and at the time of each appointment <u>before</u> the patient and any support person enters the building or waiting room area, and Provider is taking all required and appropriate precautions to protect patients, support persons, and Personnel. This includes appropriately isolating any patient with an active SARS-CoV-2 infection from other patients and Personnel or postponing care. Support persons with active SARS-CoV-2 infections are not allowed.
- Provider is familiar with and complies with all Face Covering requirements for patients, support persons, and Personnel set forth in Health Officer Order No. C19-12b, available at <u>www.sfdph.org/healthorders</u>, including any amendments to that order, as well as any additional requirements for Personal Protective Equipment discussed in this Directive.
- □ Provider is ensuring that the six foot physical distancing requirements are followed where feasible, including by reducing the number of chairs available in waiting rooms.
- □ Provider is following all required cleaning and disinfection/sanitizing requirements in compliance with this Directive and state and federal laws and regulations.



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- □ Provider will report any positive SARS-CoV-2 infection as required in Section 7:
 - □ To the state and DPH as required by federal, state, and local laws and regulations; and
 - □ To DPH Communicable Disease Control at 415-554-2830 when a patient, support person, or Personnel either (1) is exposed to SARS-CoV-2 at the Provider's location without knowing in advance that the person had an active infection; or (2) is believed to have contracted SARS-CoV-2 at the Provider's location in relation to the provision of services by the Provider. (Subject to the exception in Section 7.3)
- Provider is complying with all applicable pandemic-related requirements of state, federal, and local governments and regulatory entities and is reviewing other guidance from those governments and entities.
- □ Provider is reviewing applicable pandemic-related guidance from other professional associations related to the care provided.
- Provider is regularly checking for updates to Health Officer orders and directives in order to stay current with pandemic-related requirements. Orders are available at <u>www.sfdph.org/healthorders</u> and directives are available at <u>www.sfdph.org/directives</u>.
- Given the nature of Dental Health Care, the Dental Care Service is:
 - □ Minimizing aerosol generating procedures (AGP) whenever possible;
 - For patients undergoing any routine (non-urgent, non-emergency) AGP, aware of the strong recommendation that the patient be tested for a current SARS-CoV-2 infection between 0-7 days before the scheduled AGP;
 - □ For follow up visits involving the same treatment plan that includes an AGP, considering repeat testing and providing educational materials to the patient instructing them how to avoid infection between visits;
 - □ Following PPE and infection prevention guidelines from CDC, CDPH, Cal/OSHA, and OSHA;
 - Strongly considering using a rubber dam for restorative procedures, High Volume Evacuators (HVE) and four handed dentistry for AGPs, and other Engineering and Administrative Controls to reduce aerosol generation and other risks whenever possible; and
 - Requiring Personnel to don new PPE between patients whenever PPE is observed to be visibly contaminated with blood or body fluids and requiring disinfection of PPE such as face shields or goggles using an approved method and/or disinfectants effective against SARS-CoV-2.

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. 2020-09bc

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO REGARDING REQUIRED BEST PRACTICES FOR DENTAL HEALTH CARE

(PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTIVE) DATE OF DIRECTIVE: <u>May 17June 15</u>, 2020 (updated May 18, 2020)

By this Directive, the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco (the "Health Officer") issues mandatory, context-specific direction permitting the provision of certain kinds of health-related care as part of the local response to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") pandemic. This Directive constitutes context-specific guidance as provided under Sections 1 and 3 of Health Officer Order No. C19-08bc issued on May 15June 12, 2020 (the "Medical Care Order")", available online at www.sfdph.org/healthorders) and, unless otherwise defined below, capitalized terms used in this Directive have the same meaning given them in that order. This Directive goes into effect at 11:59 p.m. on May **<u>17June 15</u>**, 2020, and no care may be provided of the type covered by this Directive except as permitted by and subject to the restrictions of either the Medical Care Order or this Directive. As soon as the mandatory criteria for provision of care listed in this Directive are met, then a provider, facility, or office may provide the care covered by this Directive, and such care may continue to be provided by the provider, facility, or office only so long as the mandatory criteria are met. This Directive remains in effect until suspended, superseded, or amended by the Health Officer, as further provided below. This Directive has support in the bases and justifications set forth in the Medical Care Order as well as in Health Officer Order No. C19-07de issued on May 17June 12, 2020 (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order") and any updates or amendments to that order. As further provided below, this Directive also automatically incorporates any revisions to the Medical Care Order, the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, or other future orders issued by the Health Officer that supersede those orders or that reference this Directive. This Directive is intended to promote best practices as to Social Distancing Requirements listed in Section 15.k of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, infection control measures, and other best practices, helping reduce the transmission of <u>SARS-CoV-2</u>, the virus that causes COVID-19, in the health care and healing arts setting and helping safeguard the health of workers, patients and clients, and the community. This Directive No. 2020-09bc revises and replaces Directive No. 2020-09b, issued May 1517, 2020, and updated on May 18, 2020.

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER DIRECTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. For any Healthcare Operation that Section 15.b of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order permits to provide care in the City and County of San Francisco (the "City") during this pandemic, this Directive applies only to the aspects of that Healthcare Operation that meet all of the following criteria:
 - a. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation provides or supports the provision of the following types of care: Dental Health Care, as that term is defined in Section 3 below; <u>and</u>
 - b. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation has appropriate supplies (Personal Protective Equipment ("PPE"), and all other necessary medical and cleaning



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supplies) and staffing to safely function in a manner that meets both regulatory requirements for staffing and operation and the community standard for the safe provision of care; <u>and</u>

- c. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation meets all applicable requirements listed in this Directive, including Exhibit A to this Directive, at all times, and has completed and posted the two-page Health and Safety Plan checklist attached to this Directive as Exhibit B; and
- e.d. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation has reviewed and meets all applicable requirements listed in Appendix A of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, as revised on June 1, 2020, and has completed and posted the twopage Social Distancing Protocol checklist included in that Appendix A.

Each such aspect of a Healthcare Operation that meets all criteria listed above is referred to by this Directive as a "Dental Care Service."

- 2. This Directive permits the provision of care related to Dental Health Care by the Dental Care Service of any Healthcare Operation so long as the owner, operator, manager, supervisor, Chief Executive Officer or Administrator, Chief Medical Officer or Chief of Service or Chief of Staff, or other medical supervisor of a Dental Care Service ensures that all mandatory best practices listed in Exhibit A to this Directive (the "Best Practices"), which is incorporated by this reference, are followed.
- 3. For purposes of this Directive, the term "Dental Health Care" means any care provided by a professional who is licensed and providing care under Chapter 4 of Division 2 of the California Business and Professions Code or by someone who is supervised by such a licensed professional. For purposes of this Directive, Dental Health Care includes but is not limited to any preventative, restorative, maintenance, cosmetic, hygiene, corrective, orthodontic, <u>routine, diagnostic,</u> urgent, or emergency care. Dental Health Care expressly includes any care that is "Essential" as defined by the Medical Care Order or any emergency <u>or urgent</u> care. But this Directive does not apply to care that is provided on an emergency basis at any general acute care hospital or urgent care center, with such care already being authorized and provided under the hospital's or urgent care center's standard procedures, which should include airborne precautions (N95 or higher) similar to those listed in this Directive for aerosol generating procedures. <u>Note that care provided at an urgent care center is considered ambulatory care and is subject to Directive No. 2020-20, which is to be issued on or around June 15, 2020.</u>
- 4. This Directive and the attached Best Practices may be revised by the Health Officer, through revision of this Directive or another future directive or order, as conditions relating to COVID-19 require, in the discretion of the Health Officer. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service under this Directive must stay updated regarding any changes to the Medical Care Order, the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, and this Directive by checking the City Administrator's website (www.sfgsa.org) or the Department of Public Health website (https://www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp) at least weekly.Department of Public Health website (www.sfdph.org/directives) frequently.



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- Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service under this Directive 5. must, before allowing Dental Health Care and related care to occur as outlined by this Directive, create, adopt, and implement a written health and safety plan (a "Health and Safety Plan") addressing all applicable Best Practices attached to this Directive as Exhibit A. The Health and Safety Plan must address each requirement listed in the Best Practices by describing the plan for implementing the requirement or listing the applicable policy or policies of the Healthcare Operation that addresses the listed requirement. The Best Practices attachment is not itself intended to serve as the Health and Safety Plan, such as by having the Healthcare Operation simply check off items that have been or will be done. Rather, the contents of the Best Practices must be adapted into a separate Health and Safety Plan that describes compliance with the requirements.review and implement all applicable requirements of the Best Practices, consider action based on recommendations listed in the Best Practices, and complete and post the two-page checklist attached to this Directive as Appendix B (a "Health and Safety Plan").
- 6. There are certain people associated with the Dental Care Service who are subject to this Directive. Specifically, people who provide or support the provision of care by the Dental Care Service are collectively referred to by this Directive and the Best Practices as "Personnel", and those people include all of the following who provide services associated with the Dental Care Services in the City: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who perform services onsite or who deliver goods to the business); independent contractors; students who are participating in educational programs associated with their professional degree or licensure; volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services at the request of the Dental Care Service related to Dental Health Care. This Directive requires the Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service to ensure that Personnel who perform work associated with the Dental Care Service are addressed by the Health and Safety Plan and comply with those requirements of this Directive.
- 7. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service subject to this Directive must provide items such as Face Coverings (as provided in Health Order No. C19-12<u>b</u> issued on <u>April 17May 28</u>, 2020), hand sanitizer, sinks for handwashing, PPE, and disinfectant and related supplies to Personnel and to the patients or clients, as required by the Best Practices. If any such Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service is unable to provide these required items or otherwise fails to comply with required Best Practices or <u>fails to abide by</u> its Health and Safety Planthis Directive, then it must cease operating the Dental Care Service for Dental Health Care under this Directive until it can fully comply and demonstrate its strict compliance.
- 8. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service is required to take certain steps in the Health and Safety Plan related to its Personnel, including certain actions listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 of the Best Practices if Personnel are sick. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service is prohibited from taking any adverse action against any Personnel for staying home in the circumstances listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 of the Best Practices. Personnel of each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service are prohibited from coming to work if they are sick and must comply with the Directive, including the



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rules for returning to work listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 of the Best Practices.

- 9. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service must: (a) make the Health and Safety Plan <u>and Social Distancing Protocol checklists</u> available to any patient or client, Personnel, or other member of the public on request, (b) provide a summary of the <u>plankey aspects of its compliance plan regarding this Directive</u> to all Personnel working onsite in relation to the Dental Care Service (except for people only temporarily on-site), and (c) post a copy of the <u>planHealth and Safety</u> <u>Plan and Social Distancing Protocol checklists</u> in any reception area of the Dental Care Service and at any key Personnel gathering or break areas related to the Dental Care Service.
- 10. Implementation of this Directive augments—but does not limit—the obligations of each Healthcare Operation under the Medical Care Order (Order No. C19-08b) and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. (Order No. C19-07e). The Healthcare Operation must follow these context-specific Best Practices in relation to each Dental Care Service and update the Health and Safety Planits compliance as necessary for the duration of this Directive, including, without limitation, as this Directive is amended or extended in writing by the Health Officer and consistent with any extension of the Medical Care Order and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, any other order that supersedes those orders, and any Health Officer order that references this Directive.
- 11. This Directive becomes effective at 11:59 p.m. on <u>May 17June 15</u>, 2020, and will continue to be in effect until it is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Health Officer. Effective as of 11:59 p.m. on <u>May 17June 15</u>, 2020, this Directive revises and replaces Directive Number 2020-09<u>b</u>, issued May <u>1517</u>, <u>2020</u>, and updated May 18, 2020.

This Directive is issued in furtherance of the purposes of the Medical Care Order and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. Where a conflict exists between this Directive and any state, local, or federal public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the most restrictive or health-protective provision controls. Failure to carry out this Directive is a violation of the Medical Care Order and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.

Exhibit A to Health Officer Directive No. 2020-09c (issued 6/15/20)

Best Practices for Dental Health Care

The owner, operator, manager, supervisor, Chief Executive Officer or Administrator, Chief Medical Officer or Chief of Service or Chief of Staff, or other medical supervisor of a Dental Care Service must, as provided in Health Officer Directive No. 2020-09b, create, adopt, and implement a Health and Safety Plan for 09c, ensure that the Dental Care Service that addresses each item below before the Dental Care Service is permitted to provide any patient or client care including Routine and Essential Medical Appointments or emergency or urgent health care (except for care that is provided on an emergency or urgent basis at any general acute care hospital or urgent care center). The Dental Care Service must also complete and post the Health and Safety Plan checklist attached to this Directive as Exhibit B as required by the Directive. And at all times the Dental Care Service must comply with the requirements listed below when operating under this Directive.

<u>Directions</u>: Any Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service under this Directive must create a Health and Safety Plan for the Dental Care Service. The Health and Safety Plan must address each requirement listed below by describing how each requirement is being addressed. The list below is not intended to be used as the Health and Safety Plan by simply checking off items as having been done. Rather, the Health and Safety Plan must be a separate document and must describe ongoing compliance with these requirements.

implement and comply with each requirement listed below If the office or facility has written policies applicable to the Dental Care Service that satisfy a listed requirement or are more restrictive than a specific requirement of this Directive, then the office or facility may rely on its written policy to comply with the Directive's specific requirement. In that situation, the office or facility's Health and Safety Plan may refer to the applicable written policy to satisfy the specific requirement or must otherwise describe the written policy.

Requirements:

1. Signage and Education +

- 1.1. Post signage at each public entrance of the Dental Care Service to inform all Personnel and patients or clients that they must: avoid entering the facility or location if they have any symptoms consistent with COVID-19 or SARS-CoV-2 (unless they have notified the Dental Care Service in advance and precautions have been taken to protect Personnel and other patients or clients); maintain a minimum six-foot distance from others while at the facility to the extent possible; wear a face covering or barrier mask (a "Face Covering") at all times except as authorized by a healthcare provider; and not shake hands or engage in any unnecessary physical contact. Criteria for Face Coverings and the requirements related to their use are set forth in Health Officer Order No. C19-12b, issued on April 17May 28, 2020 (the "Face Covering Order"), including as that order is revised or replaced. Sample signs are available online at https://sf.gov/outreach-toolkit-coronavirus-covid-19.
- 1.2. Post a copy or summary of the <u>Social Distancing Protocol and</u> Health and Safety Plan <u>checklists</u> at each public entrance to the Dental Care Service.
- 1.3. Distribute to all Dental Care Service Personnel a summary of the Health and Safety Plan (with information on how copies may be obtained)key aspects of its compliance plan regarding this Directive and any educational materials required by the Health and Safety Plan.



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1.4. Educate all Dental Care Service Personnel of the requirements of the Social Distancing Requirements of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order and the Health and Safety Planthis Directive that apply to them.

2. General Screening of Personnel and Patients or Clients:

- 2.1. Instruct all Dental Care Service Personnel orally and in writing not to come to work or the facility if they are sick, ensure that all Personnel are screened daily pursuant to the Social Distancing Protocol (which includes a one-page screening checklist), and follow the Social Distancing Protocol requirements regarding any Personnel who answer yes to any screening question.
- 2.2. Provide a copy of the attachment to this Exhibit, titled "Information for Personnel (Employees, Contractors, Volunteers) of Essential Business and Other Businesses Permitted To Operate During the Health Emergency" (the "Attachment"), to all Dental Care Service Personnel who perform work at the Dental Care Service on a regular basis (meaning they are regularly on site) in hardcopy format or electronically. PDF and translated versions of the Attachment can be found online at <u>www.sfcdcp.org/covid19</u> (open the "Businesses and Employers" area of the "Information and Guidance for the Public" section). If the Attachment is updated, provide an updated copy to all Personnel.
- 2.3. Review, whether in person or by phone or email or other technology or method, the criteria listed in Part 1 of the Attachment on a daily basis with all Dental Care Service Personnel who are regularly on site before each person enters work spaces or begins a shift. Instruct any Dental Care Service Personnel who answered yes to any question in Part 1 of the Attachment to return home or not come to work and follow the directions on the Attachment.
- 2.4. Instruct Dental Care Service Personnel who stayed home or who went home based on the criteria listed on the Attachment that they must follow the criteria as well as any applicable requirements from the quarantine and isolation directives (available online at <u>www.sfdph.org/dph/alerts/coronavirus-healthorders.asp</u>) before returning to work. If they are required to self quarantine or self isolate, they may only return to work after they have completed self quarantine or self isolation. If they test negative for the virus (no virus found), they may only return to work after waiting for the amount of time listed on the Attachment after their symptoms have resolved. Dental Care Service Personnel are not required to provide a medical clearance letter to return to work as long as they have met the requirements outlined on the Attachment, but the Dental Care Service may, at its option and based on the context and the safety needs of patients or clients, require proof of a negative test result in order for Personnel to return to work as outlined in the Attachment.
- **2.5.** In the coming weeks the Department of Public Health may issue guidelines requiring Essential Businesses and other businesses to comply with SARS CoV-2 testing requirements for employers and businesses. Periodically, check the following website for any testing requirements for employers and businesses: <u>www.sfcdcp.org/covid19</u>. If requirements are added, ensure that the Health and Safety Plan is updated and that the Dental Care Service and all Dental Care Service Personnel comply with testing requirements.
- 2.6.2.2. Patients or clients, as well as anyone accompanying them to an appointment, must be screened for symptoms in advance of <u>and</u> at the time of their in-person visit, including on the



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calendar day of the visit. <u>Attached to this Directive as Exhibit C is a one-page screening form</u> that may be used for this process. At a minimum, such screening must occur **before** the patient or client, as well as anyone accompanying them, enters the Dental Care Service facility, office, or suite on the day of the visit to protect Personnel and other patients or clients. This screening is in addition to examining any patient or client vital signs as part of the health care being provided. For any patient or client, as well as anyone accompanying them, who has symptoms, has a current confirmed COVID-19 diagnosis, or has a current confirmed SARS-CoV-2 infection, in-person health care may only be provided subject to infection control practices appropriate to ensure that that care can be provided safely for the patient or client and all Personnel.

Such screening must address all of the following:

- 2.6.1.2.2.1. Within the preceding 10 days has the patient or clientperson been diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus? (If so, they are generally required to self-isolate as outlined at <u>https://www.sfcdcp.org/Isolation-Quarantine-Packet</u>.)
- 2.6.2.2.2. Does the patient or clientperson live in the same household with or have they had close contact with someone who in the preceding 14 days was diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus? (If so, they are generally required to self-quarantine as outlined at https://www.sfcdcp.org/Isolation-Quarantine-Packet.)
- 2.6.3.2.2.3. Has the patient or clientperson had any one or more of the following symptoms which is new or not explained by a pre-existing condition that day or within the preceding 24 hours? The symptoms include: fever, chills, or repeated shaking/shivering; cough; sore throat; shortness of breath or difficulty breathing; feeling unusually weak or fatigued; loss of taste or smell; muscle pain; headache; runny or congested nose; or diarrhea. If any listed symptom is present, the patient or clientperson might be positive for SARS-CoV-2 and should be referred for testing, and appropriate precautions should be taken or the care delayed.

3. Face Covering and Related PPE:

- 3.1. Face Coverings are required of all patients or clients, as well as anyone accompanying them to an appointment, seeking care form a Dental Care Service as outlined in Section 3.46.e of the Face Covering Order. The Dental Care Service must ensure that each patient or client and any support person wears a Face Covering at all times when onsite at the facility except where the provision of care requires removal of the Face Covering or except to the extent the Face Covering Order does not require one (such as for children 12 and younger and for people with a written excuse from a physician). The Dental Care Service must provide a Face Covering for any patient or client who does not have one. When a Face Covering is not worn by the patient or client, the Dental Care Service must take other steps to minimize risk of transmission of SARS-CoV-2.
- 3.2. This Directive extends the requirements for Face Coverings to all Dental Care Service Personnel at all times when at the facility. The Dental Care Service must ensure that all Dental Care Service Personnel wear a Face Covering at all times when onsite at the facility



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except where the provision of care requires removal of the Face Covering or except to the extent the Face Covering Order does not require once (such as people with a written excuse from a physician). The Dental Care Service must provide a Face Covering for all Dental Care Service Personnel. When a Face Covering is not worn by the patient or client, the Dental Care Service must take other steps to minimize risk of transmission of SARS CoV 2. The Face Covering may be removed when the provision of care to the patient or client requires its removal. The Dental Care Service may adopt a policy that some children (such as those age three and older) must wear a Face Covering in most situations, but such a policy must include appropriate supervision of children between 3 and 12 years old to ensure they are safely wearing a Face Covering and must include appropriate exceptions similar to those in the Face Covering Order. It is important that children 12 years old and younger are supervised when wearing a Face Covering.

3.3. If Dental Care Service written policies or any local, state, or federal law, regulation, or rule require the use of medical-grade masks or other <u>PPEmasks</u> that <u>isare</u> more protective than a Face Covering, the more protective item must be used and its use must comply with the policy or law, regulation, or rule. For clarity, this Directive's requirements regarding Face Coverings are meant to ensure that Personnel-and, patients-or, clients, and support persons are wearing a Face Covering or <u>PPEmask</u> that is more protective against the transmission of SARS-CoV-2 except where the medical procedure does not permit use of the Face Covering or <u>PPEmask</u>. Appropriate <u>PPEmasks</u> must be utilized as directed by the clinical context and type of surgery or procedure being performed.

4. <u>Physical Distancing</u>:

- 4.1. Physical distancing of at least 6 feet/2 meters must be maintained by Dental Care Service and patients-or, clients, and support persons whenever possible. This includes at a minimum the following requirements:
 - 4.1.1. In any waiting area or other area with seating, chairs should be removed or taken out of use to ensure proper distancing in other remaining chairs or seats. If a patient or client is in a waiting area with a support person-from the same household, those two may sit next to each other in a designated chair or area.
 - 4.1.2. For check-in and other areas with lines, floor markings of some kind should be used-to ensure, to the extent possible, to create visual reminders of minimum distancing.
 - 4.1.3. If space is available, any patient or client who has an active SARS-CoV-2 infection or who has symptoms should be isolated away from other patients or clients and Personnel. If isolation is not possible, other steps should be taken to prevent transmission. <u>Support</u> persons with an active SARS-CoV-2 infection are not allowed.
 - 4.1.4. The <u>physical distancing requirements include screening of the</u> patient or client-<u>screening</u> required, and any support person, on the calendar day of a visit or procedure must be done <u>before</u> arrival in the Dental Care Service facility, office, or suite (such as via a call the morning of the visit or a call from outside the building or in the lobby or hallway just before entry).



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- 4.1.5. When a patient or client, as well as any support person, is in an exam or treatment room, physical distancing must be observed whenever possible.
- 4.2. The requirements for physical distancing may be tailored based on the context of a specific patient or client's clinical situation.
- 4.3. Appointments and procedures should be staggered during the day as much as possible to avoid crowding during the day.
- 4.4. Patients and clients should be encouraged to conduct visits via telephone or other remote technology like video chat when doing so does not compromise the care being provided.

5. <u>Hand Hygiene</u>:

- 5.1. Provide The Dental Care Service (or the building where the office is located) should have bathrooms with sinks, soap, water, and disposable paper towels available for hand washing by Personnel, patients, clients, and support persons. The Dental Care Service must also provide hand sanitizer effective against COVID 19SARS-CoV-2 at entrances and elsewhere at the facility or location for Personnel and patients or clients- and support persons. Sanitizer must also be provided to patients or clients, as well as support persons, in waiting areas. Information on hand sanitizer, including sanitizer effective against COVID 19SARS-CoV-2 and how to obtain sanitizer, is available online from the Food and Drug Administration here: https://www.fda.gov/drugs/information-drug-class/qa-consumers-hand-sanitizers-and-covid-19.
- 5.2. Encourage patients or clients to wash or sanitize their hands before they touch any Dental Care Service Personnel, and require Dental Care Service Personnel to follow appropriate infection control precautions when they must touch any patients or clients.

6. <u>Risk Categorization, Protective Actions, and Patient or Client Testing for SARS-CoV-2</u>:

- 6.1. To evaluate the transmission risk or SARS-CoV-2 in health care settings, including dentistry, providers must consider the per-patient risk and the cumulative risk. More than half of persons with SARS-CoV-2 infections in the community have no symptoms but are contagious. If the risk of exposure from an asymptomatic or pre-symptomatic patient in the community is between 0.5% to 1% (0.005 to 0.01), then after seeing 60 patients from the community, the cumulative risk of exposure to a contagious patient in the clinical setting is from 26% to 45%. This may constitute the risk faced by a particular clinic or office in the course of a week, or even in the course of a day or two depending on patient volume. Because of the high cumulative risk of a contagious asymptomatic or pre-symptomatic patient in the care setting, the requirements of this Directive must be followed.
- 6.2. In-person care has different kinds of risks associated with the nature of the care being provided. It is not possible to list each type of Dental Health Care by risk type. But given the realities of Dental Health Care, where the patient usually sits for more than brief periods within six feet of Personnel (sometimes for an hour or longer), where the patient is usually unable to wear any Face Covering or other protective barrier mask during the procedure, and where procedures almost always involve bodily fluids such as saliva and a risk of exposure to blood or the generation of aerosols, Dental Health Care is inherently higher risk than other



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kinds of ambulatory care. Accordingly, this Directive includes requirements and recommendations for implementation of various Engineering Controls, Administrative Controls, Personal Protective Equipment (PPE), and testing.

6.3. Given the nature of Dental Health Care, the requirements of this Directive listed above for Face Coverings, hand hygiene, and physical distancing are not sufficient to adequately reduce the risk of exposure in most cases. Accordingly, these additional requirements must be followed by the Dental Care Service:

6.3.1. The service should minimize aerosol generating procedures (AGP) whenever possible.

- 6.1.1.6.3.2. For patients or clients undergoing any aerosol generating procedure, routine (non-urgent, non-emergency) AGP, it is strongly recommended that the patient or client must be tested be tested via reverse transcription polymerase chain reaction (RT-PCR) testing for a current SARS-CoV-2 infection between 0-7 days before the scheduled aerosol generating procedure (which can be a rapid test, if available, the day of the procedure), AGP, with the results being reported to or shared with the Dental Care Service before the procedure if the test is not a rapid test performed in-house by the Dental Care Service. In the future, when and if a rapid test becomes available to the Dental Care Service, the test must be performed during this window. The test should be performed as close to the day of the procedure AGP as possible. This test is in addition to the screening requirements on the day of the scheduled procedure. A test is not required for other pre- or post-procedure care that does not include an aerosol generating procedure.AGP. A test is not required for any emergency or urgent care so long as other precautions are taken to protect against the risk of transmission (such as patient screening and use of appropriate PPE).), but a rapid test is strongly recommended, if possible, for any AGP.
- 6.3.3. For follow up visits involving the same treatment plan that includes an AGP, repeat RT-PCR testing is at the discretion of the Dental Care Service. The Dental Care Service must provide educational materials to the patient instructing them how to avoid infection between visits.
- 6.3.4. The Dental Care Service must follow PPE and infection prevention guidelines from United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the California Department of Public Health, the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (known as Cal/OSHA), and the United States Department of Labor Occupational Safety and Health Administration (known as OSHA). When guidelines differ, the more health protective applies (*e.g.*, the one with the higher level of PPE, more protective work practices, and/or stronger Engineering and Administrative Controls).
- 6.3.5. The Dental Care Service is strongly recommended to use a rubber dam for restorative procedures, High Volume Evacuators (HVE) and four handed dentistry for AGPs, and other Engineering and Administrative Controls to reduce aerosol generation and other risks whenever possible.
- 6.3.6. Personnel are required to don new PPE between patients whenever PPE is observed to be visibly contaminated with blood or body fluids. PPE such as face shields or goggles



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must be disinfected using an approved method and/or disinfectants effective against <u>SARS-CoV-2</u>.

6.2.6.4. Nothing in this Directive prohibits a Dental Care Service from requiring additional diagnostic or serology testing of a patient or client.

7. <u>Reporting and Cooperation Requirements Regarding SARS-CoV-2</u>:

- 7.1. Each Healthcare Operation must promptly report any confirmed COVID-19 case and any confirmed patient, client, or Personnel SARS-CoV-2 infection as required by local, state, and federal laws, regulations, and rules.
- 7.2. In addition, each Dental Care Service must promptly (within 24 hours, and preferably during daytime hours) report to DPH Communicable Disease Control (CD Control) at 415-554-2830 alleach of the following except as excused by Section 7.3:
 - 7.2.1. Any instance where a patient-or, client, or support person is confirmed to have had an active SARS-CoV-2 infection at the time of any Dental Health Care or related in-person care and the Dental Care Service did not know about the infection at the time of the Dental Health Care or other in-person care;
 - 7.2.2. Any instance where <u>aany</u> member of the Dental Health Service Personnel is confirmed to have had an active SARS-CoV-2 infection at the time of an in-person interaction onsite with any patient-<u>or</u>, client, <u>or support person</u> and the Dental Health Service did not know in advance of the in-person interaction about the infection; and
 - 7.2.3. Any instance where there has been likely or confirmed transmission of SARS-CoV-2 onsite between <u>Personnel</u>, patients, clients, or <u>Personnelsupport persons</u>, including among Personnel or among patients-or, clients, <u>or support persons</u> associated with inperson care provided onsite by the Dental Health Service.
- 7.3. A hospital with quality management and/or infection prevention and control programs that are overseen by the hospital's Medical Staff does not need to report occurrences listed in subsections 7.2.1 and 7.2.2 above to DPH so long as the incident is reported and reviewed by its quality control or infection control program.
- 7.3.7.4. The Healthcare Operation is required to provide all information associated with this Directive requested by DPH, the Health Officer, or the Health Officer's designee. Such disclosure includes protected health information or other health information of patients or clients and information, including confidential employment and health information, about Personnel where the disclosure is limited to the minimum amount necessary for public health purposes and where any such information that is confidential must be protected by DPH and the Health Officer as required by law.
- 7.4.7.5. Each Healthcare Operation must cooperate with DPH, the Health Officer, or the Health Officer's designee in relation to action required by DPH, the Health Officer's designee that relates to any information reported under this Directive.
- 8. Other Requirements:



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- 8. On May 7, 2020, the California Department of Public Health ("CDPH") issued a document outlining relevant considerations for returning to offering non-emergency care. The document, titled "Guidance for Resuming Deferred and Preventative Dental Health Care", is available online at https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/Guidance-for-Resuming-Deferred-and-Preventive Dental-Care _.aspx. A copy of that document is attached to the Directive as Exhibit B and is incorporated into the Directive by this reference. The Healthcare Operation must review this document, including as it is amended or supplemented by the California Department of Public Health in the future, and must address each of its considerations and requirements in the Health and Safety Plan. <u>Cleaning</u>
 - 8.1. The Dental Care Service must implement routine cleaning and disinfection procedures, including using cleaners and water to pre-clean surfaces prior to applying an Environmental Protection Agency-registered hospital-grade disinfectant to frequently touched surfaces or objects for the appropriate contact times for SARS-CoV-2 in healthcare settings, including those patient-care areas in which aerosol generating procedures are performed. This includes use of disinfecting liquid, wipe, or spray products that are effective against SARS-CoV-2 when disinfecting high touch surfaces. A list of products approved by the United States Environmental Protection Agency as meeting criteria for use against SARS-CoV-2 can be found online at https://www.epa.gov/pesticide-registration/list-n-disinfectants-use-againstsars-cov-2. Products must be used in strict accordance with the product label and manufacturer's instructions, including but not limited to the manufacturer's specified dwell (wet contact time) for SARS-CoV-2, which can be obtained from the product manufacturer or found on the EPA list linked above.
 - 8.2. Providers must stay up to date with practice-related recommendations issued by the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the California Department of Public Health, other governmental or regulatory agencies, and professional organizations. The cleaning and disinfection procedures of the Dental Care Service must include appropriate cleaning and environmental controls as outlined by these sources. One resource for cleaning information is the CDC page "Guidance for Dental Settings," available online at https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/hcp/dental-settings.html, including the sections on "Environmental Infection Control" and "Sterilization and Disinfection of Patient-Care Items."

Such controls should include implementing wait times after procedures to both allow particles to settle and/or be captured or removed by ventilation systems before cleaning; see the CDC recommendations available online at

https://www.cdc.gov/infectioncontrol/guidelines/environmental/appendix/air.html#tableb1. Technologies or techniques including but not limited to HEPA filtration, ultraviolet (light) germicidal irradiation (UVGI) systems, photocatalytic oxidation (PCO) purifiers, and extra-oral suction units may be used to supplement general ventilation. If an activity-, equipment-, and facility-specific risk assessment is performed, wait times may be modified.

- 8.3. All areas where patient or client care takes place must, at a minimum, undergo standard cleaning between each patient or client use. This includes any toys or other materials used by children in clinical or waiting areas. This also includes any tools that are used by Personnel when providing care.
- 9. Other Requirements



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- 9.1. Discontinue the use of magazines and other shared items in waiting areas. Toys may be provided for use by children so long as they are appropriately cleaned as required by Section 8.3 above.
- 8.1.9.2. The Health and Safety Plan must ensure that all patients and clients are provided care in a manner that protects the safety and health of patients, clients, and Personnel. If <u>the</u> California Department of Public Health ("CDPH") issues any <u>pandemic-related</u> guidelines or requirements related toregarding Dental Health Care in the future, each Dental Care Service must review such guidelines or requirements and update its <u>Health and Safety Planprovision</u> of care under this Directive accordingly. If CDPH requires <u>pandemic-related</u> processes or protections that are more health-protective than those listed in this Directive, the most health-protective apply and must be followed.
- 8.2. For sake of clarity, each Dental Care Service that performs any aerosol generating procedure, and such procedures are common in Dental Health Care, must implement adequate airborne precautions for each such procedure, which include but are not limited to the use of N95 or higher grade PPE and all other protections appropriate for the procedure. The Health and Safety Plan must detail these protections.
- 8.3.9.3. If the Dental Care Service performs procedures <u>or offers care</u> of a type that are the subject of recommendations or guidance of a professional association in the field (such as the American Dental Association (ADA), American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons, American Academy of Periodontology, or other similar professional bodies) or a government agency including but not limited to the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (known as Cal/OSHA), and the United States Department of Labor Occupational Safety and Health Administration (known as OSHA), the Dental Care Service should review and consider implementing appropriate recommendations related to the pandemic and should update its Health and Safety Plancompliance with this Directive over time based on such recommendations with the focus of protecting patients, clients, and Personnel.
- <u>9.4.</u> The Health Office<u>r</u> may revise this Directive and add additional requirements in the future to ensure that Dental Health Care is provided in the safest possible manner during this pandemic.

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER No. 2020-20

DIRECTIVE OF THE HEALTH OFFICER OF THE CITY AND COUNTY OF SAN FRANCISCO REGARDING REQUIRED BEST PRACTICES FOR AMBULATORY CARE SERVICES, INCLUDING COUNSELING AND OTHER HEALING ARTS

(PUBLIC HEALTH DIRECTIVE) DATE OF DIRECTIVE: June 16, 2020

By this Directive, the Health Officer of the City and County of San Francisco (the "Health Officer") issues mandatory, context-specific direction permitting the provision of certain kinds of health-related care as part of the local response to the Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") pandemic. This Directive constitutes context-specific guidance as provided under Sections 1 and 3 of Health Officer Order No. C19-08b issued on May 15, 2020 (the "Medical Care Order", available online at www.sfdph.org/healthorders) and, unless otherwise defined below, capitalized terms used in this Directive have the same meaning given them in that order. This Directive goes into effect immediately upon issuance, and no care may be provided of the type covered by this Directive except as permitted by and subject to the restrictions of either the Medical Care Order or this Directive. As soon as the mandatory criteria for provision of care listed in this Directive are met, then a provider, facility, or office may provide the care covered by this Directive, and such care may continue to be provided by the provider, facility, or office only so long as the mandatory criteria are met. This Directive remains in effect until suspended, superseded, or amended by the Health Officer, as further provided below. This Directive has support in the bases and justifications set forth in the Medical Care Order as well as in Health Officer Order No. C19-07e updated on June 11, 2020 (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order") and any updates or amendments to those orders. As further provided below, this Directive also automatically incorporates any revisions to the Medical Care Order, the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, or other future orders issued by the Health Officer that supersede those orders or that reference this Directive. This Directive is intended to promote best practices as to Social Distancing Requirements listed in Section 15.k of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, infection control measures, and other best practices, helping reduce the transmission of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, in the health care and healing arts setting and helping safeguard the health of workers, patients and clients, and the community.

UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE SECTIONS 101040, 101085, AND 120175, THE HEALTH OFFICER DIRECTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. For any Healthcare Operation that Section 15.b of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order permits to provide care in the City and County of San Francisco (the "City") during this pandemic, this Directive applies only to the aspects of that Healthcare Operation that meet all of the following criteria:
 - a. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation provides or supports the provision of the following types of care: Ambulatory Care, as that term is defined in Section 3 below; Counseling, as that term is defined in Section 4 below; or Healing Arts Services, as that term is defined in Section 5 below; <u>and</u>



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- b. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation has appropriate supplies (Personal Protective Equipment ("PPE"), and all other necessary medical and cleaning supplies) and staffing to safely function in a manner that meets both regulatory requirements for staffing and operation and the community standard for the safe provision of care; <u>and</u>
- c. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation meets all applicable requirements listed in this Directive, including Appendix A to this Directive, at all times; <u>and</u>
- d. The aspect of the Healthcare Operation has reviewed and meets all applicable requirements listed in Appendix A of the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, as revised on June 1, 2020, and has completed and posted the twopage Social Distancing Protocol checklist included in that Appendix A.

Each such aspect of a Healthcare Operation that meets all criteria listed above is referred to by this Directive as an "Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts."

- 2. This Directive permits the provision of care by the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, of any Healthcare Operation so long as the owner, operator, manager, supervisor, Chief Executive Officer or Administrator, Chief Medical Officer or Chief of Service or Chief of Staff, or other medical or managerial supervisor of the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, ensures that all mandatory best practices listed in Appendix A to this Directive (the "Best Practices"), which is incorporated by this reference, are followed and a Health and Safety Plan checklist is completed, followed, and posted in the form attached to this Directive as Appendix B.
- 3. For purposes of this Directive, the term "Ambulatory Care" means any health care provided by a person who is both (i) providing care or care-related services on an outpatient basis <u>and</u> (ii) either licensed under any Chapter of Division 2 of the California Business and Professions Code (except for the Chapters listed below in this Section 3) or is supervised by such a licensed professional. For purposes of this Directive, Ambulatory Care includes but is not limited to any preventative, routine, diagnostic, cosmetic, hygiene, corrective, urgent, or emergency care.

By way of example, Ambulatory Care includes but is not limited to: routine or diagnostic visits in a clinic, doctor's office, or practice group office; outpatient dialysis or infusion; or physical therapy, and Ambulatory Care frequently includes but is not limited to care provided by the following types of professionals: physician or surgeon; doctor of osteopathy; nurse practitioner; nurse midwife; physician's assistant; registered nurse; optometrist; optician; and nutritionist.

For purposes of this Section 3, Ambulatory Care does not include care provided by anyone licensed under the following Chapters of Division 2 of the California Business and Professions Code: Chapter 4 (Dentistry); Chapters 6.6 (Psychologists), 13 (Licensed Marriage and Family Therapists), 13.5 (Licensed Educational Psychologists), 13.7 (Board of Behavioral Sciences), 14 (Social Workers), or 16 (Licensed Professional Clinical Counselors); Chapters 2 (Chiropractors),



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10.5 (Massage Therapy), 10.7 (Music Therapy), or 12 (Acupuncture); or Chapter 11 (Veterinary Medicine).

- 4. For purposes of this Directive, the term "Counseling" means any care provided by a person who is both (i) providing care or care-related services on an outpatient basis <u>and</u> (ii) either licensed under Chapters 6.6 (Psychologists), 13 (Licensed Marriage and Family Therapists), 13.5 (Licensed Educational Psychologists), 13.7 (Board of Behavioral Sciences), 14 (Social Workers), or 16 (Licensed Professional Clinical Counselors) of Division 2 of the California Business and Professions Code or is supervised by such a licensed professional. For purposes of this Directive, Counseling includes but is not limited to talking therapy, cognitive behavioral therapy, family therapy, group therapy, and other therapy modalities provided on a routine, urgent, or emergency basis.
- 5. For purposes of this Directive, the term "Healing Arts Services" means any care provided by a person who is both (i) providing care or care-related services on an outpatient basis and (ii) either licensed under Chapters 2 (Chiropractors), 10.5 (Massage Therapy), 10.7 (Music Therapy), or 12 (Acupuncture) of Division 2 of the California Business and Professions Code or is supervised by such a licensed professional. The term "Healing Arts Services" also includes anyone practicing other complementary or non-traditional modalities not licensed under Chapter 8.2 of Division 2 of the California Business and Professions Code, including but not limited to Ayurveda, homeopathy, naturopathy, or Chinese or Eastern medicine and herbalists. For purposes of this Directive, Healing Arts Services include but are not limited to massage, Reiki, Rolfing, cupping, other types of body work, and herbalist services provided on a routine, urgent, or emergency basis.
- 6. If any procedure or type of encounter is not allowed by the State of California, it is not allowed under this Directive. If the State of California imposes restrictions or requirements on any procedure, care, or type of encounter covered by this Directive, then the provider must comply with this Directive's requirements <u>and</u> also any restrictions or requirements imposed by the State of California. Also, there are certain types of care that are still prohibited given the risks.

Until this Directive is updated or amended to modify this Section 6, the following types of care are <u>not</u> allowed to operate in the City:

- a. Massage therapy (as licensed by Chapter 2 of Division 2 of the California Business and Professions Code);
- b. Other body-work such as Reiki, Rolfing, cupping, and structural integration (but licensed physical therapy, acupuncture, and chiropractor services are allowed);
- c. Any care that involves in-person singing, yelling (such as primal scream therapy), or playing wind or brass instruments, all of which increase the number, speed, and size of exhaled particles and therefore pose an increased risk; and
- d. Any in-person group therapy (but small groups, up to a maximum of 12 people including the therapist(s), are allowed so long as: all persons comply



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with the Face Covering Order; all persons are seated or participate no closer than six feet from the nearest person; the provider of the therapy complies with the attached Best Practices, including determining if ventilation can be increased, leaving the space empty for an appropriate period between groups, and cleaning and disinfecting between groups).

- 7. The term Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, does not include any care that is provided on an emergency, urgent, or inpatient basis at any general acute care hospital, adult psychiatric hospital, skilled nursing facility, or other residential care or treatment facility, with such care already being authorized and provided pursuant to such facility's standard procedures and any applicable licensing and regulatory requirements. Such care is referred to in this Directive as "Inpatient, Residential, or Emergency Care." But the term Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, does apply to any clinic this is co-located at or affiliated with any Inpatient, Residential, or Emergency Care facility.
- 8. The term Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, includes care received from any urgent care center (except for an emergency room or hospital-based emergency department).
- 9. This Directive does not apply to dental care provided pursuant to Health Officer Directive Nos. 2020-09c (dental care) or 2020-08 (elective surgery), including as those directives are updated or amended in the future.
- 10. This Directive and the attached Best Practices may be revised by the Health Officer, through revision of this Directive or another future directive or order, as conditions relating to COVID-19 require, in the discretion of the Health Officer. Each Healthcare Operation that operates a Dental Care Service under this Directive must stay updated regarding any changes to the Medical Care Order, the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, and this Directive by checking the Department of Public Health website (www.sfdph.org/directives) frequently.
- 11. Each Healthcare Operation that operates an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, under this Directive must, before allowing such care to occur as outlined by this Directive, review and implement all applicable requirements of the Best Practices, consider action based on recommendations listed in the Best Practices, and complete and post the two-page checklist attached to this Directive as Appendix B (a "Health and Safety Plan").
- 12. There are certain people associated with the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, who are subject to this Directive. Specifically, people who provide or support the provision of care by the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, are collectively referred to by this Directive and the Best Practices as "Personnel", and those people include all of the following who provide services associated with the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, in the City: employees; contractors and sub-contractors (such as those who perform services onsite or who deliver goods to the business); independent contractors; students who are participating in educational programs associated with their professional degree or licensure; volunteers; and other individuals who regularly provide services at the request of



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the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, related to care being provided. This Directive requires the Healthcare Operation that operates an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, to ensure that Personnel who perform work associated with the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, comply with the requirements of this Directive.

- 13. Each Healthcare Operation that operates an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, subject to this Directive must provide items such as Face Coverings (as provided in Health Order No. C19-12b issued on May 28, 2020), hand sanitizer, sinks for handwashing, PPE, and disinfectant and related supplies to Personnel and to the patients or clients, as required by the Best Practices. If any such Healthcare Operation that operates an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, is unable to provide these required items or otherwise fails to comply with required Best Practices or this Directive, then it must cease operating the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling Arts, under this Directive until it can fully comply and demonstrate its strict compliance.
- 14. Each Healthcare Operation that operates an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, is required to take certain steps in the Health and Safety Plan related to its Personnel, including certain actions listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 of the Best Practices if Personnel are sick. Each Healthcare Operation that operates an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, is prohibited from taking any adverse action against any Personnel for staying home in the circumstances listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 of the Best Practices. Personnel of each Healthcare Operation that operates an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, are prohibited from coming to work if they are sick and must comply with the Directive, including the rules for returning to work listed in Sections 2.1 through 2.4 of the Best Practices.
- 15. Each Healthcare Operation that operates an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must: (a) make the Health and Safety Plan and Social Distancing Protocol checklists available to any patient or client, Personnel, or other member of the public on request, (b) provide a summary of the key aspects of its compliance plan regarding this Directive to all Personnel working onsite in relation to the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts (except for people only temporarily on-site), and (c) post a copy of the Health and Safety Plan and Social Distancing Protocol checklists in any reception area of the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, and at any key Personnel gathering or break areas related to the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts.
- 16. Implementation of this Directive augments—but does not limit—the obligations of each Healthcare Operation under the Medical Care Order (Order No. C19-08b) and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order (Order No. C19-07e). The Healthcare Operation must follow these context-specific Best Practices in relation to each Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, and update its compliance as necessary for the duration of this Directive, including, without limitation, as this Directive is amended or extended in writing by the Health Officer and consistent with any extension of the Medical Care Order and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order,



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any other order that supersedes those orders, and any Health Officer order that references this Directive.

17. This Directive becomes effective immediately on issuance and will continue to be in effect until it is extended, rescinded, superseded, or amended in writing by the Health Officer.

This Directive is issued in furtherance of the purposes of the Medical Care Order and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order. Where a conflict exists between this Directive and any state, local, or federal public health order related to the COVID-19 pandemic, the most restrictive or health-protective provision controls. Failure to carry out this Directive is a violation of the Medical Care Order and the Stay-Safe-At-Home Order, constitutes an imminent threat and menace to public health, constitutes a public nuisance, and is a misdemeanor punishable by fine, imprisonment, or both.

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Each Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, that operates in the City must comply with each requirement listed below and prepare and post a Health and Safety Plan checklist substantially in the format of Appendix B, below.

Requirements:

1. General Requirements

- 1.1. Complete, post, and comply with the Social Distancing Protocol and checklist attached as Appendix A to Health Officer Order No. C19-07e, updated on June 11, 2020 (the "Stay-Safe-At-Home Order"), including as that order is updated or amended in the future. The Stay-Safe-At-Home Order and checklist are available online at <u>www.sfdph.org/healthorders</u>. When completing the Social Distancing Protocol checklist, keep in mind that the terms "business" or "entity" refer to the provider of care and the term "patron" refers to patients and clients and any support persons.
- 1.2. Require Personnel, patients, and clients, as well as support persons, to, at a minimum, wear Face Coverings as provided in Health Order No. C19-12b, issued on May 28, 2020 (the "Face Covering Order"), including as that order is amended in the future, at all times while in the facility or waiting to enter the facility unless this Directive requires or permits other conduct on the same topic. The Face Covering Order is available online at <u>www.sfdph.org/healthorders</u>. Note that under this Directive, an isolation mask or more protective Personal Protective Equipment is typically required (in healthcare settings) or is recommended (in Counseling and certain other settings).
- 1.3. All in-person care must comply with the requirements listed in this Directive, regardless of whether the care is emergent, urgent, or routine. But some requirements do not apply to some types of care, as outlined below.
- 1.4. Providers of Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must continue to offer remote services via telephone, email, secure apps, or video conference to the extent possible in order to minimize in-person care and must do so in a manner that protects the confidentiality of patient or client information as required by law.
- 1.5. To the extent that any provider of Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, provides services that are covered by another Health Officer directive, the other directive also applies to those services. That includes any dental health care (which is subject to Health Officer Directive No. 2020-09c) and any procedure involving general anesthesia or conscious sedation (which are subject to Health Officer Directive No. 2020-08). Other directives are available online at www.sfdph.org/directives.
- 1.6. If any procedure or type of encounter is not allowed by the State of California, it is not allowed under this Directive. If the State of California imposes restrictions or requirements on any procedure, care, or type of encounter, then the provider must comply with this Directive's requirements and also any restrictions or requirements imposed by the State of California. If any type of care is only allowed under a variance granted by the



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State of California (such as for massage as a Healing Art), then that type of care is only allowed under this Directive after a variance has been granted <u>and</u> the Health Officer indicates through an update to Section 6 of this Directive (the main body of the Directive, not this Appendix A) that such care is allowed in the City. Section 6 of the Directive also lists other types of care that are limited or prohibited.

Note: Compliance with these Best Practices and the Directive does not substitute for or supersede an employer's obligations under the Aerosol Transmissible Disease Standard of the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (known as Cal/OSHA), codified at 8 CCR §5199. This Standard can be reviewed online at <u>https://www.dir.ca.gov/title8/5199.html</u>.

2. Prioritization of Care

- 2.1. Providers of Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, may not be able to return to offering services at full capacity for some time given social distancing constraints, availability of Personal Protective Equipment, challenges faced by Personnel, and other factors. Such providers have also been limited in the number of patients or clients they have been allowed to see for in-person care since March 2020. For all these reasons, there will be a backlog of patients and clients seeking care moving forward. Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must create a methodology for prioritizing the scheduling of services (a "Priority Strategy") moving forward with a goal of minimizing patient or client negative outcomes. The Priority Strategy can be formal or informal and does not need to be written, but it should be made accounting for the considerations listed in this Section 2.
- 2.2. Providers of Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must implement the Priority Strategy in a nondiscriminatory manner (subject to the other prioritization recommendations of this Directive) in regards to race, color, national origin, disability, age, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender expression, religion, ancestry, medical condition, genetic information, marital status, citizenship, primary language, or immigration status.
- 2.3. Providers of Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, should prioritize emergency and urgent care, to the extent they provide such care, above routine care.
- 2.4. Ambulatory Care providers that provide medical care must prioritize in the Priority Strategy the following critical services to the extent they are applicable to the Ambulatory Care provider (and Counseling or Healing Arts providers may consider these factors):
 - 2.4.1. CDC-recommended immunizations for all age groups, but particularly for infants, toddlers, and school-age children. A list of such immunizations is available online at <u>https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/schedules/</u>.
 - 2.4.2. Time-sensitive exams, testing, or procedures related to pregnancy or contraceptive use or that may result in harm if deferred.



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- 2.4.3. Mental health and substance use disorder medication administration, distribution, and monitoring services (*i.e.*, long acting injectables, observed medication distribution/dosing, methadone).
- 2.4.4. Preventive services testing or procedures that follow the United States Preventive Services Task Force A and B recommendations, which are available online at <u>https://www.uspreventiveservicestaskforce.org/uspstf/recommendation-topics/uspstf-and-b-recommendations</u>.
- 2.5. Providers of Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, should also take into account the following groups and considerations, to the extent applicable, when creating the Priority Strategy in order to prioritize care for those who would benefit the most, subject to the provider's discretion regarding its own context:
 - 2.5.1. Patients seeking care related to contraception or pregnancy;
 - 2.5.2. Newborns, infants, and toddlers;
 - 2.5.3. People experiencing homelessness;
 - 2.5.4. Recently hospitalized patients requiring follow-up;
 - 2.5.5. Persons with hearing impairment or other communication challenges, including limited English proficiency in settings where telephone interpretation is not available;
 - 2.5.6. Adults and children with complex medical or behavioral health needs who would benefit from in-person communication or care;
 - 2.5.7. Exams or tests required for school or employment;
 - 2.5.8. Patients with communicable diseases of public health importance, including HIV, tuberculosis, and sexually transmitted infections (STIs);
 - 2.5.9. Elderly patients, and those with serious conditions, chronic or otherwise, that have had to defer routine visits during this pandemic;
 - 2.5.10. Persons seeking non-emergency care related to domestic violence and sexual assault; and
 - 2.5.11. Any other considerations that are relevant to the care provided by the individual provider of Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, making the Priority Strategy.



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3. <u>Risk Categorization</u>

- 3.1. In-person care has different kinds of risks associated with the nature of the care being provided. It is not possible to list each type of Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, by risk type. For that reason, this Section 3 lists the basic relevant considerations and includes a table categorizing risks and required protections associated with each risk level.
- 3.2. Providers of Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and Healing Arts, must assess the risk level of every service they provide and implement the level of protection required for each by using the protocol listed in this Section 3. In some instances the required protections vary depending on whether the care is emergent (emergency), urgent, or routine/diagnostic.
- 3.3. <u>**Risk Factors**</u>. The Risk Factors relevant to determining the risk associated with in-person care include the following, and each provider of Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must assess these factors for each service they perform to determine the Risk Category. The factors are:
 - 3.3.1. <u>Aerosol generating procedures</u> (each an "AGP"). If the procedure involves an AGP, then there is elevated risk due to the possibility of virus transmission via the generated aerosol. Some procedures that increase patient exertion, such as cardiac stress testing or certain rehabilitation services procedures (physical therapy, occupational therapy, and speech-language therapy), may also increase production of respiratory aerosols. Note that some procedures, including but not limited to moderate sedation, can lead to intubation and thus have a risk of eventually involving an AGP—in those situations, the provider should consider using AGP precautions. Also, while the CDC does not consider collection of samples via oropharyngeal or nasopharyngeal swab to be AGPs, the provider should consider whether to apply the AGP standards of this Directive to those procedures since there is likely some heightened risk associated with such swab procedures.
 - 3.3.2. <u>Face Covering or masking</u>. Personnel, patients, clients, and support persons are required by the Face Covering Order to wear a Face Covering or more protective mask at all times during in-person care except to the extent required for the provision of care, such as during an oral exam. The longer the duration the patient or client does not wear a Face Covering or more protective mask, the higher the risk.
 - 3.3.3. <u>Duration</u>. Even when Face Coverings are worn and there is no physical contact, long duration in-person encounters are higher risk than shorter ones.
 - 3.3.4. <u>Physical proximity, including contact.</u> The risk of the encounter is increased when the physical distance between the provider and the patient or client is reduced, when there is physical contact, and when the counter occurs in an enclosed space.



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- 3.3.5. <u>Ventilation</u>. Purpose-built healthcare facilities have ventilation systems which typically provide greater ventilation rates (air exchange) than other types of commercial buildings and do not recirculate (recycle) part of their air. Buildings which do not provide healthcare facility-type ventilation may increase the risk of transmission of the SARS-CoV-2 virus during AGPs and require more time before rooms can be entered by unprotected staff or clients.
- 3.3.6. <u>Other considerations</u>. Based on the context, the care provider can treat a procedure as involving more risk if other factors warrant. For example, new a patient with a new psychiatric diagnosis that makes uncertain their compliance with the Protective Actions listed below should be considered higher risk.
- 3.4. <u>Protective Actions</u>. The types of Protective Actions that must be taken or are recommended depending on the Risk Category include the following:
 - 3.4.1. <u>Engineering Controls</u>, which are generally physical modifications to a process, changes to existing equipment, or the installation of further equipment with the goal of preventing the risks in the care setting. Examples include:

Barriers to separate staff from clients;

Specialized tools equipped with "extractors" which provide suction during an AGP to capture particles close to the point of emission;

Local exhaust ventilation to capture droplets and aerosols before they can spread through a room or the facility; and

General ventilation with healthcare-level ventilation rates and increased fresh air.

- 3.4.2. <u>Administrative Controls</u>, which are training, procedure, policy, or shift designs that lessen the risks in the care setting. Administrative Controls generally focus on changing the behavior of people rather than removing a hazard. Some of the requirements in this Directive that require implementation regarding screening of patients, clients, and support persons before they arrive are examples of Administrative Controls. Another example is the idea of letting a room remain empty for a specific amount of time after a patient, client, or support person is in the room in order to allow particles to settle or be captured or removed by the building's ventilation before appropriate Cleaning (as defined below).
- 3.4.3. <u>Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)</u>, which is protective clothing, goggles, or other garments or equipment designed to protect the wearer from infectious disease agents. In the current context, PPE includes but is not limited to: isolation masks, N95 respirators, gloves, isolation gowns, and eye and face protection such as goggles or face shields. For purposes of this Directive, respirators with exhalation valves/one-way valves are <u>not</u> allowed unless they are equipped with some type of filtration or cover approved by a professional familiar with respirator function. This restriction on exhalation valves/one-way valves is due to the fact that such valves, if



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used without filtration or a cover, only protect the wearer and put others at higher risk by creating a focused jet of exhaled air and particles.

3.4.4. <u>Testing</u>, which for the purpose of this Directive refers to testing for current infection with SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19. Unless otherwise indicated, any requirement or recommendation for Testing in this Directive refers to diagnostic testing using a viral test for current infection that is approved for that purpose by the United States Food & Drug Administration. The term "Advance Testing" refers to the use of diagnostic Testing any time starting seven days before an appointment to the time of the appointment to determine if a person has an active SARS-CoV-2 infection. If Testing is required or recommended by this Directive, the Testing must occur before the visit.

When the care being provided extends over the course of multiple appointments such as rehabilitation services procedures (physical therapy, occupational therapy, and speech-language therapy), a procedure that requires a patient to return after a week for follow-up care, or regular weekly appointments—and includes a procedure that requires or has recommended Testing, Testing does not need to occur for each such visit. Rather, the Testing should occur before the first visit that has the heightened risk, and the provider may then counsel the patient or client on ways to avoid infection by SARS-CoV-2 between future appointments. So long as the subsequent appointments include screening and discussion of risks, repeat Testing may be postponed for a reasonable period.

Nothing in this Directive prohibits an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, from requiring testing of a patient or client beyond what is outlined by this Directive.

- 3.4.5. <u>Cleaning</u>, which refers to the use of appropriate products to clean surfaces and then disinfect or sanitize them using methods that are effective against SARS-CoV-2. See Section 9 below for additional information about Cleaning.
- 3.5. Other considerations. When other factors make the encounter or procedure riskier because certain standard precautions cannot be taken, the provider should treat the encounter under a higher Risk Category.
- 3.6. Change in circumstances. During an encounter or appointment, the context may change such that the Risk Category of the encounter may increase. For example, a routine physical exam may reveal information that requires more extensive visualization of the mouth cavity. When this happens, providers must take steps in line with the increased Risk Category for the procedure.
- 3.7. When considering Engineering and Administrative Controls, providers should take steps they feel appropriate even if they go beyond the requirements of this Directive. For example, long in-person encounters may benefit from opening a window that opens to the outside in order to increase airflow, but that may not be appropriate for all contexts depending on the nature of the procedure.



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3.8. Risk Categories. The following table lists the three Risk Categories associated with the Risk Factors listed above. Each provider of Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must comply with the listed Minimum Protective Actions and other requirements associated with the Risk Category of a procedure or service when offering care under this Directive. Providers are free to take additional Protective Actions beyond the minimum listed actions, per their judgment.

<u>Table</u>: Risk Categories for Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts

*<u>Note</u>: The third column lists the minimum protective actions. A provider of care should use their best judgment and may use additional protections. For N95 respirators to be most effective, they require fit testing and training.

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4. General Screening of Personnel and Patients or Clients

- 4.1. Ensure that all Personnel are screened daily pursuant to the Social Distancing Protocol, which includes a one-page screening checklist, and follow the Social Distancing Protocol requirements regarding any Personnel who answer yes to any screening question.
- 4.2. Patients or clients, as well as anyone accompanying them to an appointment, must be screened for symptoms in advance of <u>and</u> at the time of their in-person visit, including on the calendar day of the visit. Attached to this Directive as Appendix C is a one-page screening form that may be used for this process. <u>At a minimum, such screening must occur **before** the patient or client, as well as anyone accompanying them, enters the facility, office, or suite on the day of the visit to protect Personnel and other patients or clients. This screening is in addition to examining any patient or client vital signs as part of the care being provided. For any patient or client, as well as anyone accompanying them, who has symptoms, has a current confirmed COVID-19 diagnosis, or has a current confirmed SARS-CoV-2 infection, in-person care may only be provided subject to infection control practices appropriate to ensure that that care can be provided safely for the patient or client and all Personnel.</u>

Such screening must address all of the following:

- 4.2.1. Within the preceding 10 days has the person been diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus? (If so, they are generally required to self-isolate as outlined at <u>https://www.sfcdcp.org/Isolation-Quarantine-Packet</u>.)
- 4.2.2. Does the person live in the same household with or have they had close contact with someone who in the preceding 14 days was diagnosed with COVID-19 or had a test confirming they have the SARS-CoV-2 virus? (If so, they are generally required to self-quarantine as outlined at https://www.sfcdcp.org/Isolation-Quarantine-Packet.)
- 4.2.3. Has the person had any one or more of the following symptoms which is new or not explained by a pre-existing condition that day or within the preceding 24 hours? The symptoms include: fever, chills, or repeated shaking/shivering; cough; sore throat; shortness of breath or difficulty breathing; feeling unusually weak or fatigued; loss of taste or smell; muscle pain; headache; runny or congested nose; or diarrhea. If any listed symptom is present, the person might be positive for SARS-CoV-2 and should be referred for testing, and appropriate precautions should be taken or non-urgent care delayed.

5. <u>Face Covering and Related PPE</u>

5.1. Face Coverings, or more protective PPE, are required of all patients or clients, as well as anyone accompanying them to an appointment, seeking care from an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, as outlined in Section 6.e of the Face Covering Order. The Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must ensure that each patient or client and any support person wears a Face Covering or more protective mask at all times when onsite at the facility except where the provision of care requires removal of the Face Covering/mask or except to the extent the Face Covering Order does not



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require one (such as for children 12 and younger and for people with a written excuse from a physician). The Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must provide a Face Covering or more protective mask for any patient, client, and support person who does not have one. When a Face Covering or other mask is not worn by the patient or client, the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must take other steps to minimize risk of transmission of SARS-CoV-2. This Directive requires or recommends a mask that is more protective than a Face Covering in certain situations outlined above.

- 5.2. Providers who have a license to provide medical care (such as a physician, nurse, therapist, etc.) may have a policy that some children (such as those age three and older) must wear a Face Covering in most situations, but such a policy must include appropriate supervision of children between 3 and 12 years old to ensure they are safely wearing a Face Covering and must include appropriate exceptions similar to those in the Face Covering Order. It is important that children 12 years old and younger are supervised when wearing a Face Covering.
- 5.3. If any written policies of an Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, or any local, state, or federal law, regulation, or rule require the use of medical-grade masks or other masks that are more protective than a Face Covering, the more protective item must be used and its use must comply with the policy or law, regulation, or rule. For clarity, this Directive's requirements regarding Face Coverings are meant to ensure that Personnel, patients, clients, and support persons are wearing a Face Covering or mask that is more protective against the transmission of SARS-CoV-2 except where the care does not permit use of the Face Covering or mask. Appropriate masks must be utilized as directed by the clinical context and type of procedure being performed.

6. <u>Physical Distancing</u>

- 6.1. Physical distancing of at least 6 feet/2 meters must be maintained by Ambulatory Care Services, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, Personnel, patients, clients, and support persons whenever possible. This includes at a minimum the following requirements:
 - 6.1.1. In any waiting area or other area with seating, chairs should be removed or taken out of use to ensure proper distancing in other remaining chairs or seats. If a patient or client is in a waiting area with a support person, those two may sit next to each other in a designated chair or area.
 - 6.1.2. For check-in and other areas with lines, floor markings of some kind should be used, to the extent possible, to create visual reminders of minimum distancing.
 - 6.1.3. If space is available, any patient or client who has an active SARS-CoV-2 infection or who has symptoms should be isolated away from other patients or clients and Personnel. If isolation is not possible, other steps should be taken to prevent transmission. Support persons with an active SARS-CoV-2 infection are not allowed.
 - 6.1.4. The physical distancing requirements include screening of the patient or client, and any support person, on the calendar day of a visit or procedure must be done **<u>before</u>** arrival

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in the facility, office, or suite (such as via a call the morning of the visit or a call from outside the building or in the lobby or hallway just before entry).

- 6.1.5. When a patient or client, as well as any support person, is in an exam or treatment room, physical distancing must be observed whenever possible.
- 6.2. The requirements for physical distancing may be tailored based on the context of a specific patient or client's clinical situation.
- 6.3. Appointments and procedures should be staggered during the day as much as possible to avoid crowding during the day.
- 6.4. Patients and clients should be encouraged to conduct visits via telephone or other remote technology like video chat when doing so does not compromise the care being provided.

7. <u>Hand Hygiene</u>

- 7.1. Providers (or the building where the office is located) should have bathrooms with sinks, soap, water, and disposable paper towels available for hand washing by Personnel, patients, clients, and support persons. Providers must also provide hand sanitizer effective against SARS-CoV-2 at entrances and elsewhere at the facility or location for Personnel and patients or clients and support persons. Sanitizer must also be provided to patients or clients, as well as support persons, in waiting areas. Information on hand sanitizer, including sanitizer effective against SARS-CoV-2 and how to obtain sanitizer, is available online from the Food and Drug Administration here: https://www.fda.gov/drugs/information-drug-class/qa-consumers-hand-sanitizers-and-covid-19.
- 7.2. Encourage patients or clients to wash or sanitize their hands before they touch any Personnel and require Personnel to follow appropriate infection control precautions when they must touch any patients or clients.

8. <u>Reporting and Cooperation Requirements Regarding SARS-CoV-2</u>

- 8.1. Each Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must promptly report any COVID-19 case and any patient, client, or Personnel SARS-CoV-2 infection as required by local, state, and federal laws, regulations, and rules.
- 8.2. In addition, each Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must promptly (within 24 hours, and preferably during daytime hours) report to DPH Communicable Disease Control (CD Control) at 415-554-2830 each of the following except as excused by Section 8.3:
 - 8.2.1. Any instance where a patient, client, or support person is confirmed to have had an active SARS-CoV-2 infection at the time of any Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, or related in-person care and the care provider did not know about the infection at the time of the in-person care;

- 8.2.2. Any instance where any member of the Personnel of the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, is confirmed to have had an active SARS-CoV-2 infection at the time of an in-person interaction onsite with any patient, client, or support person and the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, did not know in advance of the in-person interaction about the infection; and
- 8.2.3. Any instance where there has been likely or confirmed transmission of SARS-CoV-2 onsite between Personnel, patients, clients, or support persons, including among Personnel or among patients, clients, or support persons associated with in-person care provided onsite by the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts,
- 8.3. A hospital with quality management and/or infection prevention and control programs that are overseen by the hospital's Medical Staff does not need to report occurrences listed in subsections 8.2.1 and 8.2.2 above to DPH so long as the incident is reported to and reviewed by its quality control or infection control program.
- 8.4. The Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, is required to provide all information associated with this Directive requested by DPH, the Health Officer, or the Health Officer's designee. Such disclosure includes protected health information or other health information of patients or clients and information, including confidential employment and health information, about Personnel where the disclosure is limited to the minimum amount necessary for public health purposes and where any such information that is confidential must be protected by DPH and the Health Officer as required by law.
- 8.5. Each Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must cooperate with DPH, the Health Officer, or the Health Officer's designee in relation to action required by DPH, the Health Officer, or the Health Officer's designee that relates to any information reported under this Directive.

9. <u>Cleaning</u>

9.1. The Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must implement routine cleaning and disinfection procedures, including using cleaners and water to pre-clean surfaces prior to applying an Environmental Protection Agency-registered hospital-grade disinfectant to frequently touched surfaces or objects for the appropriate contact times for SARS-CoV-2 in healthcare settings, including those patient-care areas in which aerosol generating procedures are performed. This includes use of disinfecting liquid, wipe, or spray products that are effective against SARS-CoV-2 when disinfecting high touch surfaces. A list of products approved by the United States Environmental Protection Agency as meeting criteria for use against SARS-CoV-2 can be found online at https://www.epa.gov/pesticide-registration/list-n-disinfectants-use-against-sars-cov-2. Products must be used in strict accordance with the product label and manufacturer's instructions, including but not limited to the manufacturer's specified dwell (wet contact time) for SARS-CoV-2, which can be obtained from the product manufacturer or found on the EPA list linked above.

9.2. Providers must stay up to date with practice-related recommendations that relate to the kind of care they provide, such as those issued by the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the California Department of Public Health, other governmental or regulatory agencies, and professional organizations. The cleaning and disinfection procedures of the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must include appropriate cleaning and environmental controls as outlined by these sources.

Such controls should include implementing wait times after procedures to both allow particles to settle and/or be captured or removed by ventilation systems before cleaning; see the CDC recommendations available online at https://www.cdc.gov/infectioncontrol/guidelines/environmental/appendix/air.html#tableb1.

Technologies or techniques including but not limited to HEPA filtration, ultraviolet (light) germicidal irradiation (UVGI) systems, and photocatalytic oxidation (PCO) purifiers may be used to supplement general ventilation where the context warrants use of such equipment. If an activity-, equipment-, and facility-specific risk assessment is performed, wait times may be modified.

- 9.3. All areas where patient or client care takes place must, at a minimum, undergo standard cleaning between each patient or client use. This includes any toys or other materials used by children in clinical or waiting areas. This also includes any tools that are used by Personnel when providing care.
- 9.4. For enclosed rooms used for patient or client care, providers and other Personnel such as porters or custodians must wait after the patient or client leaves the room to allow droplets in the air to settle before cleaning and, as necessary, disinfecting the room. The appropriate waiting times for cleaning in different settings are listed below:
 - 9.4.1. <u>Cleaning following AGPs or treatment of any person with an active SARS-CoV-2</u> <u>infection</u>: The 99.9% contaminant removal column (or the calculated equivalent) of the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Airborne Contaminant Removal Table, found online at <u>https://www.cdc.gov/infectioncontrol/guidelines/environmental/appendix/air.html#table</u> <u>b1</u>, should be used to calculate wait times.

In the absence of the information needed to look up or calculate the required wait time, a wait period of no less than 60 minutes should be used.

9.4.2. For cleaning following other care, facilities should determine the appropriate wait time based on the context of the activities. In the absence of a facility-specific risk assessment, a wait period of not be less than 15 minutes should be used. The 15 minute wait period is often used in settings where large droplets are released, such as with a patient or client who is coughing, sneezing, or has other productive respiratory symptoms. A review of the risks can result in a lesser wait time when appropriate.

10. <u>Other Requirements</u>

- 10.1. Discontinue the use of magazines and other shared items in waiting areas. Toys may be provided for use by children so long as they are appropriately cleaned as required by Section 9.3 above.
- 10.2. Discontinue the use of any self-serve blood pressure or other diagnostic equipment.
- 10.3. If the California Department of Public Health, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health (known as Cal/OSHA), and the United States Department of Labor Occupational Safety and Health Administration (known as OSHA), or any other California or United States regulatory entity issues guidance or requirements regarding the pandemic and the type of care provided by the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, must review such guidance and comply with any such requirements in addition to complying with this Directive.
- 10.4. If the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, performs procedures or offers care of a type that are the subject of recommendations or guidance of a professional association in the field, the Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, should review and consider implementing appropriate recommendations related to the pandemic and should update its Health and Safety Plan practices over time based on such recommendations with the focus of protecting patients, clients, and Personnel.
- 10.5. The Health Officer may revise this Directive and add additional requirements in the future to ensure that Ambulatory Care Service, including Counseling and the Healing Arts, are provided in the safest possible manner during this pandemic.

- Provider has reviewed the Risk Factors and Protective Actions listed in Section 3 of Appendix A and has placed each offered service and procedure in the appropriate Risk Category on the Table listed in Section 3, including based on the context of each patient, client, or support person.
- Provider is complying with the required Protective Actions listed on the Risk Category Table in Section 3 of Appendix A and has considered other recommended actions in relation to the Risk Category of each offered service or procedure.
- Provider is ensuring that all Personnel are screened daily as required by the Social Distancing Protocol and instructing those who respond "yes" to any question to stay home for the appropriate amount of time and to get tested for the SARS-CoV-2 virus.
- Provider is screening each patient, client, and support person before and at the time of each appointment <u>before</u> the patient, client, or support person enters the building or waiting room area, and Provider is taking all required and appropriate precautions to protect patients, clients, support persons, and Personnel. This includes appropriately isolating any patient or client with an active SARS-CoV-2 infection from other patients, clients, and Personnel or postponing care. Support persons with active SARS-CoV-2 infections are not allowed.

(Subject to the exception in Section 8.3 for hospital-associated clinics and programs)
- Provider is following all required cleaning and distinction/sanitizing requirements listed in Section 9 of Appendix A as well as in compliance with state and federal laws and regulations.
- Provider is complying with all applicable pandemic-related requirements of state, federal, and local governments and regulatory entities and is reviewing other guidance from those governments and entities.
- □ Provider is reviewing applicable pandemic-related guidance from other professional associations related to the care provided.







EXECUTIVE ORDER EXTENDING COMMERCIAL EVICTION MORATORIUM

On February 25, 2020, under California Government Code Sections 8550 et seq., San Francisco Charter Section 3.100(14) and Chapter 7 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, I issued a Proclamation (the "Proclamation") declaring a local emergency to exist in connection with the imminent spread within the City of a novel (new) coronavirus ("COVID-19"). I issued the Fourth Supplement to the Proclamation on March 18, 2020, imposing a temporary moratorium on eviction for non-payment of rent by commercial tenants directly impacted by the COVID-19 crisis. The Board of Supervisors concurred in this action on March 31, 2020. On April 1, 2020, I issued the Eighth Supplement to the Proclamation, which contained an order clarifying the scope of the temporary moratorium. The Board of Supervisors concurred in this action on April 14, 2020.

The Fourth Supplement provides that the order imposing a commercial eviction moratorium will last for an initial period of 30 days, expiring on April 17, 2020, and further provides that "Mayor may extend this Order by an additional period of 30 days if emergency conditions at that time warrant extension. The Mayor shall provide notice of the extension through an Executive Order posted on the Mayor's website and delivered to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors." The Eighth Supplement provides that its terms are incorporated into the Fourth Supplement and that renewal of the Fourth Supplement shall also cause the Eighth Supplement to be renewed. On April 15, 2020, I issued an executive order extending the commercial eviction moratorium 30 days through May 17, 2020, and on May 14, 2020, I issued an executive order extending the commercial eviction moratorium an additional 30 days through June 16, 2020.

I find that emergency conditions continue to exist due to the ongoing public health crisis arising from COVID-19 and the economic impacts it has caused, warranting extension of the moratorium. Therefore, I hereby extend the commercial eviction moratorium in the Fourth Supplement and Eighth Supplement for an additional 30 days through July 16, 2020.

Because of these, we strongly oppose Supervisor Preston's Ordinance #200375 "COVID-19 Tenant Protections" on a number of legal and ethical grounds.

First, #200375 is unconstitutional. It forces courts to interfere with existing private contracts in violation of both the California and U.S. Constitutions. Not even a pandemic should undermine these basic fundamentals that govern our state and country.

Across the board rent forgiveness/permanent eviction moratorium due to COVID-19 could cause many property owners, particularly small "mom-and-pops," to go bankrupt, causing a significant reduction in the amount of available housing inventory in San Francisco and worsening an already bad housing crisis. Many have spent their entire lives working and saving for their property and could now find themselves in financial ruin by not being able to collect rental income for most of 2020. This loss during their golden years will cause many to be unable to sustain basic needs such as food, medical expenses and, ironically, a roof over their heads.

#200375 encourages tenants without financial distress to decide to stop paying rent just to take advantage of the situation. With multiple government orders in place to stop evictions, nothing can happen to them, even if an unlawful detainer is filed. The devastating combination of reduced rental income combined with steady but most likely increased ownership expenses down the road will cause foreclosures and property owner bankruptcies to skyrocket.

I am writing in support of the **2020 San Francisco Health and Recovery Bond** that is being considered for the November 2020 ballot. The COVID-19 global pandemic has changed California's and San Francisco's economic and financial situation. We cannot weather this storm alone; the 2020 Bond will allow San Francisco to come together and begin an economic recovery that will create opportunities for all.

The **2020 San Francisco Health and Recovery Bond** will prioritize shovel-ready projects delivering essential government services, support economic recovery through job creation for San Franciscans, provide funding for behavioral health and health access, while prioritizing basic infrastructure investments in our parks and recreation facilities and right-of-way infrastructure so people can get back to work quickly and help San Francisco recover.

The simple act of touching dirt has often been therapeutic and grounding. Community gardens provide food, foster a connection to nature and support a sense of community. Since community gardens are relatively small and typically include only areas for gardening, pathways and seating, small investments may go a long way in improving a garden's usability and appeal. 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



My name is Brenna Alexander and I live and work in San Francisco. I am writing to express my strong support of AB 362 and the creation of safe consumption programs.

AB 362 has tremendous potential to save lives by preventing overdose deaths, which tragically symbolize our failure to care for people struggling with addiction. In declaring her support for this bill, Mayor Breed aptly conveyed that amongst the 100 overdose prevention programs worldwide, "no site has experienced an overdose death and many have transitioned clients into detox services" (Garcia, 2017). Insite, one safe injection **Site** in Vancouver, Canada, proudly reports that no fatalities have occurred in their 14 years of operation, even as roughly 220,000 injections take place under their supervision each year (Eggman, 2019; Irwin, 2019). In 2017 alone, Insite served 7,301 different individuals, providing over 2,500 overdose interventions as well as 3,708 "clinical treatment interventions," ranging from medical attention and wound care to referrals for detox centers and residential programs (Babcock, 2019).

Safe consumption site staff would fill critical roles in encouraging and supporting people to consider additional treatment options, ranging from abstinence-based programs to methadone and buprenorphine replacement therapies. In addition to reducing overdose deaths, services have been proven to reduce transmission rates of HIV and Hepatitis C by promoting safe injection practices and providing sterile supplies (Irwin, 2017). For this reason alone, SIS could have tremendous effects in San Francisco and across the nation, as people who inject drugs "comprise less than 1% of the U.S. population" but "experience roughly 56% of new Hepatitis C Virus (HCV) infections and 11% of new HIV infections" (Irwin, 2016).

For these reasons, I ask the board to please VOTE IN SUPPORT of AB 362, and to do everything it can to get the state Senate to pass the legislation this year.

I support item 24, the resolution Oppose SB1085.

SB1085 is not only too weak on affordable housing requirements, it represents more of the same failed approach to address our housing crisis.

In SF and in many other urban communities, it is time to address the cost of housing by renovating and expanding rent control law as well as the enactment of strict regulations on housing demand. Although statewide rent control has failed in recent years, I believe more targeted rent control for urban areas could gain support. On the demand side of the issue, Individuals and entities holding multiple properties along with Investment companies (both domestic and international) need to be taken out of the urban family home market and confined to the multi-unit (apartment buildings/ condo) market. Working and struggling middle income people need more help to afford a home close to where they work.

At the same time, speculatorly practices need to be more effectively discouraged both for residential and commercial properties. Heavily capitalized entities are wreaking havoc on our city - renters, potential first home buyers, and small businesses. We're all getting priced out.

SB1085 and the building centric approach ignores the real problem and potential solution - and instead - allows the band to "play on."

Experts on housing told us years ago that we would not be able to build our way out of the housing crunch. Even by major deregulation of zoning law and expediting permitting - we cannot build housing volume quick enough to lower prices and avoid mass displacement. They were, of course, right. Why do our leaders continue to give us denial talk? I'd say let's leave that game to the Trump administration.

Addressing the housing crisis on the demand side is long over-due and is a glaring necessity given the results on the ground.







My name is Angela Hernandez, and I am a resident of San Francisco, CA. I am writing to you today to demand that you immediately redirect funding from the San Francisco Police Department towards BIPOC communities.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders — for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
 Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.

4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.

6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.



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

My name is [insert your name], and I am a resident of [insert your city/state]. I am writing to you today to demand that you immediately redirect funding from the San Francisco Police Department towards BIPOC communities.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders — for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
 Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.

4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.

6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.

Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.

4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.

6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These include: San Francisco Human Services Agency, Adult Protective Services, SF Dept of Emergency Preparedness and Assistance, Medi-Cal, CalWORKS, County Adult Assistance Programs, JobsNOW!, Families Rising, Family and Children's Services, and SF Dept of Homelessness and Supportive Housing, to name a few.

As you are reviewing Mayor London Breed's proposed city budget for the next two years, I know SF's financial outlook has changed drastically as a result of COVID-19 and many social services are up for budget cuts. I also know that the SFPD has a history of fatal police shootings (the murders of Alex Nieto, Amilcar Perez-Lopez, Mario Woods, Luis Gongora Pat, Jessica Williams, the list goes on), and countless reports of officer misconduct and brutality that continue to persist despite efforts by the District Attorney and public defenders to press charges, and despite implementation of additional bias trainings and other reforms from both a local and federal level. These harmful issues persist and something needs to change.

(With funds that are directed to the police department I ask that additional efforts towards ending police violence be made, outlined in Campaign Zero (<u>https://www.joincampaignzero.org/solutions#solutionsoverview</u>).)

I am demanding that you remove funds from this institution that violently responds to community concerns and move these vital funds to services that work to de-escalate crime before it has the chance to emerge. These services, initiatives such as affordable housing, youth programs, social worker support, mental health support, and crisis intervention and hotlines, are better equipped to protect our communities both now and long-term than police departments that have a consistent and inexcusable history of violence and excessive force, specifically against communities of color, as we are seeing at a local and national level from police departments around the country. Social services also play a vital role in providing support and resources for marginalized communities during a global pandemic. This divestation is crucial and urgent to ensure the flourishing of all communities and an end to systemic racism and oppression.



My name is Marcos Castro, and I am a resident of San Francisco California born & raised. I am writing to you today to demand that you immediately redirect funding from the San Francisco Police Department towards BIPOC communities.

The senseless killings of Mario Woods, Oscar Grant, George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders — for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
 Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.

4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.

6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. 

Dear Mayor Breed, Chief Scott, City Manager Kelly, and San Francisco City Council Members,

My name is Zane Stokesberry, and I am a resident of San Francisco. I am writing to you today to demand that you immediately redirect funding from the San Francisco Police Department towards BIPOC communities.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders — for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
 Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.

4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.

6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.

Good evening Budget & Appropriations Committee,

I'm a San Francisco resident living in the Haight, and I'm writing with regard to the Proposed Interim Budget and Appropriation Ordinance for Departments - FYs 2020-2021 and 2021-2022, on your docket for next Wednesday's committee meeting. I am unfortunately unable to make the public comment period, so I ask that this email be entered into the record in lieu.

I am deeply concerned that Mayor London Breed's proposed budget for the next two years hand over an additional \$57 million increase (FY'20-FY'21) and \$144 million (FY'20-FY'22) to the SFPD and Sheriff.

Especially in light of the global pandemic, our funds should be going to better address the needs of our most vulnerable—not to an increased police state. I implore you to not only decline to approve these increases, but to reverse them and decrease the police's budget. That money can be better used for mental health services, housing, and outreach to the homeless. While our Black friends and neighbors are calling out for changes to a system born out of slave patrols, we can show them that we hear their cries for justice, and allocate funds not to increased policing, but to community courts and restorative justice programs.

Tell me—how can we justify cutting the Community Health organizational group budget by \$1.7 million next year when we're in the midst of a community health crisis? How can we cut the Homelessness Services department by \$74.8 million when the city's most vulnerable are more vulnerable than ever? While we're scrimping and saving and no doubt laying people off to cover \$617.3 million in cuts from the total budget this year, why do the police and sheriff's departments get an additional \$57 million?

None of this should be the case, and you are in power to do something about it. San Francisco wants to think of itself as a trendsetter on social justice—let's lead on this.

I'm Claire Teresko, a resident of District 4 of San Francisco, and I'm emailing to ask you to make substantial cuts to the San Francisco Police Department. I understand that the mayor is implementing some reforms to the police, that the city is planning on directing noncriminal calls to another agency, and Supervisor Walton has worked with the Mayor to plan to redirect some funding from the SFPD towards agencies that support the black community in San Francisco. I think these are great first steps. I'm emailing mostly to ask how much funding you are planning on redistributing, and to ask that it be a substantial, and not superficial cut.

My name is Belle Huang, and I am a resident of San Francisco. I am writing to you today to demand that you immediately redirect funding from the San Francisco Police Department towards BIPOC communities.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders — for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
 Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.

4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.

6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders — for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
 Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.

4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.

6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.





My name is Courtney, and I am a resident of California. I am writing to you today to demand that you immediately redirect funding from the San Francisco Police Department towards BIPOC communities.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders — for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
 Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.

4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.

6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.

I would like to way in on how the budget is reorganized. As Vanita Gupta was recently quoted as saying in the New York Times, "Budgets are moral documents, reflecting priorities and values."

SFPD is a waste of precious resources. Last year, the SFPD budget was \$611,701,869, which I understand comes primarily from the San Francisco general fund. Pouring funds into the SFPD has not led to improvements to safety, homelessness, mental health, or affordability in our city.

I call on you to slash the SFPD budget by 20% in 2021 and instead use those extraordinary resources towards solving homelessness and drug abuse, which is felt disproportionately by our Black neighbors and veterans. We implore you to give every member of our community experiencing homelessness a place to call home and the treatment they need. In 2001, in the middle of their opioid epidemic, Portugal became the first country in the world to completely decriminalize drug use. I have linked to an article that outlines their success and the steps they've taken to curb both drug abuse and overdoses. The entirely of their example isn't possible without a coordinated national response, but there is much to be done on the local level. I am optimistic that Portuguese policy might a jumping off point for San Francisco and then the rest of the country.

I am of course invested in my city, but more so, I am invested in helping addicts. Two years

ago, my father, a white man of great privilege, died of cirrhosis of the liver due to alcoholism. In one instance, when he was found with a bruised face, collapsed and locked outside of the home I grew up in, it was the police who found him outside during an East Coast winter put him in their car and drove him to the hospital. They only came by the house because they had found my runaway dog and read her collar. This should never have been the police's responsibility in the first place, but no addict should be arrested (or if I am correct in suspecting that Rayshard Brooks is an example of a man struggling with substance abuse) or murdered. I am thrilled that neither situation is commonplace in San Francisco; however, we can and should be doing more for the addicts I pass every day on our streets. Addiction is a biological-social-psychological phenomenon, and these three broad, intersecting factors endlessly complicate the search for a solution, part of which also needs to be in our education, housing and public health (especially mental health) systems, all of which we know costs a great deal of money. The police are ill-equipped and will always be ill-equipped to handle homelessness and drug abuse. It's time to reimagine how our city will address two of its most visible problems.



My name is Will Dao and I am a resident of San Francisco. As you are planning the City's budget, I am writing to ask that you reduce and reallocate the SFPD budget -- which was \$611,710,869.00 in 2019 -- to programs that serve the youth and disadvantaged communities.

SFPD has been a waste of our resources. While we've been spending extraordinary amounts on policing, we have not seen improvements to safety, homelessness, mental health, or affordability in our city. Instead, we see wasteful and harmful actions of our police.

My one and only encounter with the police in 2019 went like this: A friend who was visiting had his car broken into right across the street from my residence in the Duboce Triangle neighborhood. According to NBC Bay Area, there were 23,309 reported thefts from vehicles in the first 11 months of 2019 and this was one of them. When he called the police, instead of coming to the site of the incident to take notes or gather evidence, they made him drive his car -- smashed window and all -- to the police station located in Golden Gate Park to file his report. My friend was already dazed and upset and to have to drive to the police station only added to the trauma. When he got there, he filed a formal complaint. He was told there would be no followup because there was "nothing they could do." I accompanied him to the police station and asked one of the police officers why there were so many break-ins and why there was nothing they could do. He called out Mayor Breed's policies as an excuse as to why the SF Police could not do anything about it. He cited that police are not allowed to chase after or arrest suspects even if they see them breaking into cars and that there hands were tied. He said that these crimes were organized by rings in the East Bay so it was out of their jurisdiction. I could not believe how many excuses were coming out of this officer's mouth.

While I am not familiar with any of the policies the officer spoke of that day (or if he was even telling the truth), I do know that with a \$611,710,869.00 budget, you should not have 23,309 car break-ins if you were doing your job. You should also not give the people you serve an excuse that there is "nothing you can do."

But let's give the officer I spoke with the benefit of the doubt. Instead, let's strategize on how we can prevent crime from occuring in the first place. What if we reinvest a portion of that \$600M into other avenues that are more beneficial and fruitful to our communities in SF: Help curb the homelessness that has risen in our neighborhoods; Bolster after-school programs for children; Give financial support to Black-owned businesses; Fund programs that protect folks from being driven from their homes due to gentrification; Invest in the Arts, especially the small theaters which make SF so special but are now closing because rent is too high. Why are these important services neglected and a police force who will bluntly tell you that they "can't do anything" is reaping in money? Defund the police now.

We can be a beacon for other cities to follow if only we have the courage to change. Thank you for your time and consideration.

To Mayor Breed, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, and San Francisco Elected Officers,

My name is Julia Turner, and I am a resident of San Francisco.

Yesterday afternoon, amid all of the unfolding exposure of harm to our Black citizens at the hands of police, I watched a beloved Black neighbor and artist share an account of a terrifying encounter with SF police on Saturday night, one which should not have involved a gun and which has left him badly traumatized.

Yesterday evening, like every evening, I biked home through the Mission. I saw tent after tent, people going through garbage cans for food, and one couple who was struggling to get a wheelchair laden with bags of aluminum cans up onto a curb toward the next trash bin. Last week I came across a man who was sitting on the curb crying. I stopped to listen to him and he said "I've been here for 23 years, I worked so hard, I have nothing at all now". The shelter in place order exposed in high relief how many people here have no shelter, nowhere to go. Putting people in a hotel during a health crisis is a temporary help but isn't the answer we need.

This weekend a block from my house, 3 police cars and multiple officers were dispatched to deal with a disoriented homeless woman, who was unarmed and absolutely no threat. When I think about the resources used to send that many uniformed officers to give someone a ride to a shelter (not to mention the unnecessary trauma to the woman at having to interact with that many police) I'm furious. We pay police officers more than teachers, more than social workers, more than countless people who are better trained than they are to do the jobs they are sent to do, often resulting in unnecessary added trauma and harm.

My last workplace in SF was robbed at knifepoint by a drunken white woman during the holidays. When the police showed up, my coworkers were laughed at and the situation was not taken seriously. They had waited until she was seen lunging a child to finally arrest her and even then we never heard of any action being taken. I fully believe they would have taken them seriously if the person in question was anyone other than white.

\$700 million for someone to laugh at my coworkers. \$700 million to almost let a child be attacked and harmed because they thought the situation was funny.

I have had cops take up seating as my last place of work to make fun of the place of business without supporting it.

\$700 million for cops to sit around and laugh at me and my coworkers working minimum wage.

SFPD has come to take a look at the population of people experiencing homelessness near my workplace and when asked if they would call or reach out to other departments or services to help them, we were told nothing is available at the moment. I'm being told homeless resources aren't available, but don't worry, there's \$700 million lying around so that a fully outfitted police officer with a nice car could tell that to my face.

We want a direct response to defunding and with that we want to see numbers. Cut police spending by 50%. There are so many empty spaces and empty houses in San Francisco. Instead of spending money to build more homes that look completely out of place in SF for "affordable" housing, look into renovating some of these tech or business buildings that are probably going to be empty soon. Look into buying multi-family SF houses that already exist. Look into what it would cost to buy and upkeep housing for marginalized people to live rent free for at least a year or 2 so they can work and build up some sort of savings for themselves

or their families. After they have, then funnel them into affordable housing so the next families can come in. I imagine \$300+ million a year would go a long way.

And honestly, learn the history of the violence used by SFPD.

In the 1930s SFPD would pocket budget money for illegal payoffs. In 1975, during the SFPD police strike, only African-American officers went to work while other officers striked, picketed, and while doing so would continue to arrest residents. They drank while on strike, shot out streetlights, and bombed the Mayor's home. Through total lack of control and abuse of violence SFPD was able to get the Mayor to grant them their strike wishes within the same month. In the 1990s drugs were stolen by cops and planted multiple times. In the early 2000s and onward cops have been known to cover-up beatings, assaults, etc. Police are being paid over \$100,000 a year to steal, beat, sexually assault, kill, plant drugs, be racist, homophobic, transphobic, sexist, etc. Last year I made \$16k. It was the highest I have ever made. To know \$80k is the starting salary for police, while most police are paid at minimum \$130k without overtime is so disgusting and disrespectful. Defund SFPD at least by half. SFPD is the crime we are worried about. And honestly, it means nothing to the residents that the Mayor lived through this. We know she has constantly asked for more police presence and funding, it's not like it's a secret. Stop with the excuses already.

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

I appreciate the steps you are taking to make SFPD more accountable, and the minor steps taken to defund the police.

Last night a fellow artist of color was held up by police as he was leaving his studio on 18th St. With guns aimed at him for a burglary that happened nearby he had to make a split second decision to jump back into the locked studio building he was exiting and run and hide out of fear that any wrong move he made could cost him his life. He hid in a corner of his studio under a table for 4 hours in fear as he listened to footsteps through the building.

This is how police act in our own community—there are deep flaws in the whole structure of policing. EVEN IF this artist matched a profile for someone they were looking for when he stepped out of his own building, why could they not just talk to him rather than point guns and demand he put his hands up?—sending him into panicked fear as he had to decide whether dropping the container in his hand full of small tools would spark a shooting, or risk bending over to set it down would do the same. Running is a fear response, and all to often cops take this as an admission of guilt and shoot to kill.

At first I was calling for redistribution of police funds BUT NOW I am calling for a major overhaul of the whole police department. I'm happy that you are looking at the Cahoots program in Oregon for taking police off of calls for homelessness and mental health calls, but the mere \$50 million divestment from the SFPD overall budget seems hardly enough to support this AND invest in neighborhood programs to get youth off the streets and job training for the under served. MORE MUST BE DONE!

POLICE UNIONS should be stripped of their power to reinstate police with misconduct records. The culture of protecting terroristic acts on the police force HAS to be brought out into the public and made transparent for all to see! The people, all of us, will stand behind you. ENOUGH IS ENOUGH.

I am white, this is not a privilege to stand idly by while my fellow friends, co-workers, citizens must fear for their lives every time they encounter the police alone, in their cars and even in their homes—it's a disease that is killing and deforming all of us!

PLEASE do something radical to change the concept that Police are her to enforce first, and protect last.



Dear Mayor Breed, Chief Scott, City Manager Kelly, and San Francisco City Council Members,

My name is [insert your name], and I am a resident of [insert your city/state]. I am writing to you today to demand that you immediately redirect funding from the San Francisco Police Department towards BIPOC communities.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders — for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
 Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.

3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.

4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.

6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.

What are the risks and negative impacts from 5G? These fit into the following broad categories: 1) adverse health impacts, 2) privacy impacts, 3) national security risks and 4) budgetary impacts.

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BUDGETARY IMPACTS rise from lawsuits against municipal authorities for failure to comply with current statutory protections such as those provided in the ADA and FHA and tort liability for personal injuries caused by exposure from wireless infrastructure on public right-of-way.

Individually, these risks would merit further action. Collectively, they should justify treating the matter as an urgent, immediate priority.

To be clear, to date there are no independent safety studies demonstrating the safety of prolonged exposure to the microwave and millimeter-wave frequencies; or phased array beamforming intended to be used for 5G in the future.

Thus, with thousands of studies indicating harmful bio-effect(s) from wireless radiation, and

since the wireless industry tells us that 5G requires installation of transmitters emitting wireless radiation 24 hours a day in front of every 3-10 homes, causing or facilitating the deployment of 5G and then exposing individuals against their will violates their right to bodily integrity and is a battery tort. The emissions crossing private land are a nuisance.

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Countries and cities around the world, including Switzerland, Brussels, Italy, Greece, UK, Slovenia, Nigeria, New Guinea, have completely halted or postponed the roll out of 5G until its safety has been firmly established.

Leading tech and industry professionals including Frank Clegg, the former President of Microsoft Canada, have made pragmatic appeals to policy makers regarding the risks of 5G technologies (see: youtu.be/xSP2exnmJXg). Mr. Clegg has requested that his industry, the telecommunications industry, be required by policy makers to do full safety testing on 5G and pursue technological options such as fiber optics which mitigate health, privacy and security risks.

What actions can be taken? Contrary to what you may be told by federal authorities, state authorities or even your own legal counsel, there are significant actions you can take right now to join other communities in the protection of the rights of the citizens within your community.

THESE ACTIONS INCLUDE:

1) pursuing ordinances that require the telecom provider to comply with the ADA/FHA;

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Furthermore, please note that at least 23 municipalities from around the US are currently suing in the federal 9th District Court for the rights to regulate and control the rollout of 5G infrastructure in their local communities.

On may 28, 2020, the Department of Public Health issued a revised directive on the wearing of face mask in public space. We are now, more than ever, concerned about the tent dwellers who are camping on our streets right at our doorsteps. By my reading of the Health Directive, excerpted below, the tent dwellers I see every day are not obeying this directive. These individuals pose a real threat to our health and well being. Our lives are on the line.

Recently, in our neighborhood, a Safe Sleeping Village was established at the Everett Middle School. We insist that the street tents that are not following the directive be either moved to the Safe Sleeping site or made to leave our neighborhood.

Presently, the police are under extreme pressure with conflicting issues. We ask that the General Order of the department be modified to be strictly enforce this new directive. It is vital for our community and needs priority.

This is the mapping of the 30 screenings HP Biomonitoring has completed to date. There are outstanding tests. Each urine toxicology screening detects 35 toxic and nutrient elements. For this mapping we focused on four. They are Arsenic, Gadolinium, Manganese and Vanadium. All four are chemicals and radionuclides of concern at HPNS.

The mapping does not fully capture the Arsenic/Gadolinium/Manganese/Vanadium cluster because only one pin is assigned for each screening. I had to pin the element present in the highest concentrations. In nine screenings three out of the four elements arsenic/gadolinium/manganese and vanadium are present. In one screening all four are present in elevated concentrations.

You can clearly appreciate the clustering of arsenic and gadolinium around the shipyard. I believe the South Basin region is most affected. We clearly need more data points. Both arsenic and gadolinium are potentially waterborne. Nuclear submarines were docked at HPNS and Gadolinium is used for neutron shielding of nuclear propulsion systems.


I was instructed by ATSDR to inform the California Department of Public Health about the arsenic cluster and will do so today. I do not expect San Francisco city government and the San Francisco Department of Public Health to ignore an arsenic cluster. It would be highly unethical to do so.

The Hunters Point Community Biomonitoring Program has been awarded the CBS Jefferson Award to be announced in July 2020.

BOS File No. 200592 [Resolution Urging the Civil Service Commission to Establish Disqualifying Standards for Applicants for Position of Police Officer and Sheriff Deputy Applicants Based on Misconduct]

The Youth Commissioners also voted to include the following comments, recommendations, and question:

- expand the criteria of misconduct [officer shootings, sexual misconduct, domestic violence, perjury, and drunken driving]
- define the use of "significant misconduct" as this is often subjective and is tied to what do we deem as normal/and goes into what behavior we excuse
- define the use of "excessive force" as this is often case by case, subjective terms
- include a clause pushing for a more stringent review of criminal convictions who have been law enforcement officers in California or applied to be one
- name how many roadblocks there are for communities of color to get justice for their loved ones from uncooperative government workers to missing case files to sloppy record-keeping
- clearly define and expand this resolution to other law enforcement agencies such as the Juvenile Probation Department and Adult Probation Department.
- Question does this legislation disqualify any applicant from uniform ranks or admin roles as well?

3	Resolution urging the City to take various actions to support vulnerable youth during	
4	the COVID-19 Pandemic, to increase at-distance programming for youth in San	
5	Francisco and to not cut funding for youth-oriented services and programs,	
6	recommending certain cuts to departments' budgets, and requesting Youth	
7	Commission representation on bodies created to respond to the economic and social	
8	effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

10	WHEREAS, On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization described COVID-19,	
11	an infectious disease caused by the most recently discovered coronavirus, a term designating	
12	a family of viruses known to cause respiratory infections ranging from the common cold to	
13	more severe diseases, as a pandemic; and	
14	WHEREAS, Since March 16, 2020, the City and County of San Francisco ("the City")	
15	has implemented various iterations of a Shelter in Place order, requiring individuals and	
16	families to practice social distancing and stay at home as much as possible to limit the spread	
17	of the virus; and	
18	WHEREAS, The State of California followed suit on March 19, 2020, and both the City	
19	and State are currently undergoing a phased reopening, which however is not anticipated to	
20	result in an end to Shelter in Place restrictions for a significant period of time; and	
21	WHEREAS, The successive orders have resulted in the closing of all schools, many	
22	daycare programs, and many after-school and community based programs serving youth in	
23	San Francisco; and	
24	WHEREAS, According to the United States Census Bureau, 13.4 percent of the	
25	population of San Francisco are persons under 18 years of age; and	

WHEREAS, The youth population of San Francisco includes all of these persons as
 well as Transitional Age Youth, aged 18 through 25, who are not counted as a separate
 category in population surveys; and

WHEREAS, While the federal government of the United States ("US") has passed
legislation to send stimulus checks of up to \$1,200 to most US taxpayers, most
undocumented immigrants will not receive this economic support; and

WHEREAS, Undocumented youth, and the children of undocumented parents, will
therefore not receive the same level of economic support from the federal government as
other youth and their families; and

WHEREAS, The effects of the pandemic, both in terms of public health and in terms of
 economic impact, have been felt hardest in historically and currently underserved
 communities, specifically Black, Indigenous and Latinx communities, with the highest
 concentrations of cases in the Japantown, Tenderloin, South of Market, Mission, Potrero Hill,
 Bayview Hunter's Points, Excelsior and Outer Mission neighborhoods as of June 12, 2020;

15 and

16 WHEREAS, Furthermore, youth who are currently unsheltered, unhoused, and/or 17 incarcerated are especially vulnerable to the COVID-19 virus due to those circumstances; and 18 WHEREAS, According to data from Larkin Street Youth Services ("Larkin"), one of the 19 City's main service providers for youth experiencing homelessness, as of June 12, 2020, 20 COVID-19 and the Shelter in Place Order have had significant impacts on the provision of 21 services for youth experiencing homelessness; and 22 WHEREAS, Notably, Larkin has seen an increase in incident reports related to mental 23 health, suicide ideation, and challenging behaviors related to substance use and mental 24 health symptoms among clients, and a 66% increase in monthly referrals to their behavioral

25 health team; and

WHEREAS, Larkin reports that while the number of drop-ins has remained consistent
 through the progression of the pandemic and implementation of the Shelter in Place Order,
 the corresponding needs are heightened, including but not limited to showers and services for
 stress and anxiety; and

5 WHEREAS, Larkin reports that about 40% of their housed clients have either lost a job 6 (1/3 of those impacted) or lost hours (2/3 of those impacted), that having limited staff due to 7 the current situation hinders their capacity to provide in person one-on-one employment 8 services to clients, and that clients having inconsistent contact information due to difficulties in 9 compliance with the Shelter in Place Order makes it difficult to contact Office of Economic and 10 Workforce Development/Workforce Investment and Opportunity Act clients for follow up and 11 employment status; and

WHEREAS, Shelter capacity is reduced due to the necessity of social distancing, with Larkin's Diamond Youth Shelter at 50% capacity and Lark-Inn at 25% occupancy, along with a dramatic increase in the number of clients housed through emergency housing vouchers; and WHEREAS, Additionally, the incarcerated population is currently at greater risk of contracting COVID-19, as City, State and Federal leaders have not made or been slow to make significant adjustments, including closing jails and prisons, to allow for social distancing; and

WHEREAS, The youth population is now cut off both from in-person interaction with
 support systems such as friends and colleagues, and from in-person educational and
 recreational resources that are usually available to youth; and

22 WHEREAS, Not all schools were able to promptly switch to at-distance learning,

23 meaning that youth were not interacting on a regular basis with their teachers and peers, even

24 in virtual spaces; and

25

WHEREAS, Many students are disadvantaged by the Shelter in Place Order, such as
 those who may not be able to graduate school on time, those struggling with online school as
 a learning medium, and those do not have access to virtual devices; and

WHEREAS, Additionally, some youth, especially LGBTQ+ youth and victims of
domestic violence, may not be in a safe environment when confined to their homes; and
WHEREAS, Various hotlines for victims of domestic abuse and violence in San
Francisco, such as the Asian Women's Shelter and WOMAN., Inc, have seen an increase in
calls since the implementation of the Shelter in Place Order, following a nationwide trend

9 showing that as of April 6, 2020, the National Domestic Violence Hotline has received well

10 over 2,000 calls in which COVID-19 was cited as a condition of abuse; and

11 WHEREAS, The Department of Children Youth and their Families ("DCYF"), which 12 contracts outside organizations as service providers for educational and recreational services 13 and programs for youth and families in San Francisco, currently funds approximately 446 14 programs; and

WHEREAS, As of April 1, 2020, 11 of those programs remained open and 125
programs were operating remotely, for a total of only 136, that is 30 percent, of programs
continuing to serve youth; and

WHEREAS, According to a Service Providers Working Group survey of 28 programs
from 27 unique agencies providing a broad range of services funded by DCYF published on
April 15, 2020, 67.9% of the 28 programs had reduced direct service programming, while
21.4% had somewhat reduced direct service programming; and

WHEREAS, According to the same survey, 51.9% of 27 agencies reported incurring
 increased, unexpected costs due to COVID-19, related to the costs of working from home,
 additional cleaning, acquiring personal protective equipment, or providing emergency support

25 for clients; and

1 WHEREAS, While DCYF is providing trainings for their service providers on how to 2 implement at-distance learning, it is clear that the department and its service providers are so 3 far unable to maintain the same level of service provision during this time of uncertainty for 4 youth, workers, and the City; and

5 WHEREAS, On March 31, 2020, the City Controller, Mayor's Budget Director, and 6 Board of Supervisors Budget and Legislative Analyst released a Joint Budget Outlook Update 7 Report estimating a combined budget shortfall of between \$1.1 billion and \$1.7 billion over the 8 next two fiscal years (FY 2020-2021 and FY 2021-2022), including losses compared to 9 estimated revenue during the remaining span of the current fiscal year (FY 2019-2020); and 10 WHEREAS, The Mayor has requested that departments cut their budgets by 10% in 11 FY 2020-2021 with an additional 5% contingency cut in FY 2021-2022 to offset revenue loss

12 and balance the budget as required by law; and

WHEREAS, However, it is just as clear that the need for at-distance programs that
engage youth on an educational as well as recreational basis has never been higher; and
WHEREAS, A survey of United Kingdom ("UK") youth, who have been under
comparable restrictions as San Francisco youth, by the UK youth mental health charity Young
Minds showed that 83 percent of respondents agreed that the coronavirus pandemic had
made their mental health worse, with 32 percent saying it had made their mental health "much
worse"; and

20 WHEREAS, The same survey, which was conducted between March 20, 2020, the day 21 on which UK schools closed to most students, and March 25, 2020, when further restrictive 22 measures had been put in place in the UK, also showed that 66 percent of respondents 23 agreed that watching or reading the news was unhelpful for their mental health; and 24 WHEREAS, Anecdotal evidence Youth Commissioners have heard from friends, 25 contacts, and constituents paints a similar picture among San Francisco youth; and WHEREAS, While continuing to aggressively respond to the ongoing public health
 crisis, the City still has an obligation to serve the unmet needs of San Francisco youth,
 especially given the direct negative impact on the social, mental, and economic wellbeing of
 San Francisco youth this crisis has caused; and

5 WHEREAS, The City should not leave youth to solve these issues on their own, but 6 should systematically treat the preservation their social, mental, and economic wellbeing as a 7 key part of its response to the state of emergency it is currently in; and

8 WHEREAS, On the other hand, there are many programs currently in the City's budget, 9 enumerated below, which either fail to serve a meaningful purpose, or even directly harm the 10 wellbeing of San Francisco youth; and

WHEREAS, While the Youth Commission recognizes that balancing the budget in this
time of crisis and increased need will be a difficult task, it will also be a measure of the City's
values in the choices made to preserve or eliminate youth services and programs; and

WHEREAS, The Mayor and President of the Board of Supervisors have convened a
 COVID-19 Economic Recovery Task Force to elaborate solutions to the socioeconomic crisis
 caused by the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, It is also a measure of the City's values the extent to which City leaders
solicit and listen to the input of young people in shaping how the City responds to this
economic crisis; and

WHEREAS, The City should not let San Francisco's youth pay for this crisis, either in their health, both physical and mental, or in their economic futures, or in their ability to make themselves heard when they are at their most vulnerable; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission declares and affirms its full support for the
 local and statewide Shelter in Place and Stay at Home Orders as necessary to save lives,

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especially of vulnerable populations such as seniors and those with underlying conditions;
 and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the Mayor and Board of
 Supervisors to direct departments serving youth to increase at-distance programming for
 youth—educational and recreational—for the duration of the Shelter in Place Order, with the
 object of making such programming accessible to all youth in San Francisco; and, be it
 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the Board of Education of
 the San Francisco Unified School District ("SFUSD") and the Board of Trustees of City
 College of San Francisco ("CCSF") to provide educational assistance for students who are at

placed at a disadvantage by the Shelter in Place Order, such as those who may not graduate
on time, those struggling with online school as a learning medium, and those do not have
access to virtual devices; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the Mayor and Board of
 Supervisors to not cut funding for youth-oriented services and programs in response to the
 current budget shortfall; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the City, SFUSD, and CCSF to center the needs of Black communities, in particular those of Black youth, to not cut programs and funding that serve those communities, and to increase funding for ethnic studies programs and restorative practice programs in schools, especially for communities experiencing disproportionate rates of violence and/or trauma; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission recommends that the Mayor and Board of Supervisors instead enact immediate cost-saving measures by permanently closing the Youth Guidance Center and County Jail Number 4, freezing planned increases in the number of sworn peace officers employed by City departments, halting the purchase of additional law enforcement equipment, eliminating law enforcement personnel and equipment from SFMTA fare enforcement and homelessness response protocols, and otherwise
 reconsidering the portion of the City's budget devoted to policing; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission requests that one or more representative(s) of the Commission, to be designated by an internal process, be appointed to all committees, advisory bodies, and taskforces created to make recommendations and take action directing the City's response to the economic and social effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, and that such representative(s) have all the same powers and duties of other members of such committees, advisory bodies, and taskforces; and, be it

9 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges SFUSD and CCSF to 10 prioritize youth leadership in co-designing and co-shaping fall school reopening plans, and to 11 ensure that schools do not reopen until all communities are safe, and schools are equipped 12 with health and hygiene measures, masks, sanitization, and proper social distancing 13 protocols; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the City to provide logistical
 and financial aid to outside non-profit organizations providing assistance to undocumented
 workers who do not qualify for federal assistance and their families; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the City to immediately
 house all youth experiencing homelessness in a dignified manner and release all remaining
 incarcerated youth into their communities, making sure that all released youth receive full
 reentry support and services; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the City to work with community based organizations that work with unhoused youth and youth experiencing homelessness, especially service providers, to meet the increased needs both of those youth and of service providers, particularly with respect to mental health services and shelter; and, be it

1 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the City to provide 2 increased resources for youth who may not be safe at home, especially victims of domestic 3 abuse and violence, in the form of remote counseling, guidance, and support to move into a 4 safe environment if necessary; and, be it 5 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the City to increase 6 resources for pandemic response in marginalized communities, that have been and are most 7 impacted by COVID-19, notably Black and Indigenous communities; and, be it 8 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the City to maintain 9 consistency across all services and programs made available to youth for the duration of the 10 Shelter in Place Order as well as when the City is able to transition back to normal operating 11 conditions.

2	WHEREAS, In the same survey, 50% of trans and gender nonconforming people
3	reported feeling uncomfortable interacting with the police; and
4	WHEREAS, As found in a poll conducted by NPR, the Robert Wood Johnson
5	Foundation and the Harvard T.H. Chan School Of Public Health, LGBTQIA+ people of color
6	are more than twice as likely as their white counterparts to say they've been discriminated
7	against because they are LGBTQIA+ while interacting with police; and
8	WHEREAS, The same poll shows that 24% of LGBTQIA+ people of color feel
9	discomfort and/or have faced discrimination when interacting with police, compared to 11% of
10	white LGBTQIA+ people; and
11	WHEREAS, The Youth Commission, as the city's only chartered youth advisory body,
12	are committed to advocating for the rights, needs, and voices of all San Francisco youth; and
13	WHEREAS, The San Francisco Unified School District ('SFUSD") serves different
14	communities all over San Francisco; and
15	WHEREAS, SFUSD defines its core values as to "put students' needs first" and "stand
16	with those most vulnerable in [their] community;" and
17	WHEREAS, All students in SFUSD should feel socially, emotionally, and physically
18	comfortable at school, and should not feel targeted based on their racial identity, religion,
19	sexual orientation, or any other core-identifier; and
20	WHEREAS, The current relationship between SFUSD and SFPD does not align with
21	the values SFUSD's commitment to racial equity; and
22	WHEREAS, Black men received 39% of all instances of San Francisco Police
23	Department's ("SFPD") reported use of force and Black youth comprised 63% of all juvenile
24	arrests, despite the fact that African-American's only compromise of $3 - 4\%$ of San
25	Francisco's population; and

1	WHEREAS, According to a study by the Harvard University School of Sociology,
2	students of color are more likely to be stopped and/or harassed by officers, whether at their
3	school or in their communities; and
4	WHEREAS, The 2018 – 2019 SFUSD data showed that the count of students arrested,
5	cited or detained has been on the decline in recent years, with 28 incidents reported in the
6	2018 – 2019 school year compared to 79 in 2016 – 17; and
7	WHEREAS, The SFUSD's data showed that Black and Brown students continue to
8	have the highest rates of police interactions; and
9	WHEREAS, It also referenced two incidents in 2019 in which elementary students were
10	placed in police custody; and
11	WHEREAS, Having officers present on school campuses and SFUSD having an
12	affiliation with SFPD can make students who come from overpoliced communities feel unsafe
13	or uncomfortable in institutions that are meant to help them learn; and
14	WHEREAS, The system of policing upheld by the SFPD unjustly targets communities
15	of color and low-income communities; and
16	WHEREAS, According to a study done by the University of California, Los Angeles,
17	students who feel unsafe at school because of an increased police presence have lower rates
18	of academic success; and
19	WHEREAS, According to SFUSD, African-American and Latinx students in SFUSD
20	have the lowest rates of graduation, and only 13% of African-American students and 22% of
21	Latinx students are considered proficient or above by grade level in mathematics, while 51%

STATEMENT OF CONFIDENTIALITY

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June 16, 2020

Dear Supervisors:

We have just learned that you put forward a resolution that concerns San Francisco Federal Credit Union (SFFedCU) that will be decided at today's meeting. We understand that you elected not to submit it to committee, which avoids any public discussion or fact finding. Given the lack of notice to the party which will be affected by the resolution, it does not sound like you want to find the underlying facts or have a conversation about a real solution. If this was not your intent, we would welcome such a discussion with anybody who would like to have one.

The past two months of medallion loan deferrals have resulted in over \$1.0 million in deferred payments. One significant problem with continuing to defer payments is that due to the massive decline in taxi business, these borrowers will continue not being able to make their loan payments any time soon, let alone pay back the amounts deferred. It is also against the National Credit Union Association (NCUA) regulations and Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) to accrue income that, in all likelihood, will never be recovered. This means that another three more months of loan deferrals being requested will likely trigger an additional loss of \$1.5 million to the Credit Union. The SFMTA's continued inaction in admitting the medallion market has failed and caused an extreme hardship to the Credit Union and its members. In addition, we are hearing continuing demands from remaining medallion owners that the City should keep its original promise to repurchase their medallions. As a Low to Moderate Income (LMI) designated Credit Union, meaning over 50% of our members reside in zip codes that are designated LMI, your proposed action will hurt the very people the Mayor's office had campaigned to support. A much more comprehensive approach is needed to address the problems facing the taxi industry as a whole, including the medallion loans.

We look forward to continuing to partner with the City in the youth program, expanded ATM access for low to moderate income areas, the Accessory' Dwelling Unit program and the Bank on Program. However, with respect to taxi drivers and medallion loans, further partnering necessitates a much more collaborative approach than that being exhibited by the SFMTA at this time.

Dear Mayor Breed and Director Tumlin:

I am writing to ask you to restore full Muni Service in San Francisco. I am concerned about the health risk created as a result of the reduced frequency and routes since April 2020 because riders are not able to stay 6 feet apart from each other.

I am an essential worker and since early April I have been taking the bus to my office in downtown San Francisco. During the weekday, I board the L Bus at Forest Hill and take it to 3rd and Kearny.

Up until mid-May, ridership was lower and could mostly be accommodated by the extremely limited core service. But now, this is no longer the case.

During the last month, ridership has increased substantially.

It is no longer possible to stay three feet apart -never mind six feet apart-from other passengers on the L Bus and other lines.

Please see attached: photographs that I took on June 11 and 12 on the L Bus.

You can see that the bus is crowded and it is not possible to maintain 6 feet apart at all times.

I witnessed one elderly woman sit down next to another person because she could not stand on the bus. I could go on with example upon example of dangerous situations resulting from the current Muni policy. I can also take pictures like these every day to document that the buses are too crowded.

After sheltering for 3 months, the residents of San Francisco are out. Public transportation serves an important function in our city and can no longer operate on such a limited basis.

Additionally, I have observed that only approximately 10% of riders pay. Therefore SFMTA does not have accurate ridership data to measure the level of service that is warranted.

All the hard work that you did in keeping San Franciscans safe will be undone as we reopen unless Muni Service is fully restored.

Jackson Street Safeway - Early Hour Deliveries before 7AM - Continual Noise Disturbance etc.

The Safeway loading dock is deep inside the Golden Gateway residential complex. It is a difficult place to get in and out of. Trucks arrive anywhere from before 4AM and disturb the residential neighbors up. Why can't they be restricted to the 7AM - 10 PM hours. When Safeway started operation on Jackson Street their hours were 8AM to 8PM.Now their hours are 5AM to 11 PM. This is an overreach for such a densely packed residential neighborhood that has catalyzed the need for noisy deliveries especially during nocturnal hours. It is also very inconsiderate and unhealthy.

The Golden Gateway Center used to limit entry to this cul d' sac ((south side of Jackson opposite Front) between 10 PM and 7 AM. They had a chain across the entrance. This chain is no longer used and apparently an open range policy is allowed.

Today before 6 AM the red Coca Cola truck backed in with its loud beepers that disturbed the neighborhood. Trucks do position on Front Street facing north on the west side of the street facing the wrong way for northbound traffic on Front. Probably waiting for the early morning workers to summon them to the Safeway loading dock.

Please have Safeway deliveries limited to 10 PM to 7AM. If they cannot conform and stop disturbing residential neighbors it may be time to seriously discuss cutting back their operating hours to what they had that takes into consideration the need for peace and quiet between 10PM and 7AM.

The and safety and quality of our overall neighborhood would benefit by Safeway having shorter hours. There must be non-residential (or less densely populated) areas in San Francisco where Safeway can provide longer hours. Not here given their current lack of respect for their neighbors rights to the quiet enjoyment of their dwellings.

Yes - I have complained to management and Safeway. Nothing seems to change. PLEASE! Someone help.

Dear DPH Primary Care Leadership,

Call Center health workers (Nurses and Eligibility Workers) at located at Laguna Honda Hospital are very concerned about the recent positive case of COVID 19 identified last weekend. We are concerned about the possibility of a serious outbreak as the center lacks the most basic systems to prevent infection. We have not been able to social distance by the required 6 feet by design of the office. Many of us share cubicles and computers. We are screened before entering the building, but this is not enough to prevent the spread if someone was able to come to work while positive. Having an extra temperature check during the day will not be a safeguard.

The Communications Workers Union (<u>https://cwa-union.org/coronavirus-recommendations-</u> <u>call-center-workers</u>) identifies on their website aspects of infection control that provide a safe, healthy working environment. Our call center fails on many areas as outlined in the following:

Employers should modify working spaces to ensure a safe distance (at least six feet) between employees.

Due to the design of the call center we are not able to maintain a safe 6 feet distance from our co-workers.

Employers should provide sufficient equipment to prevent equipment sharing of any kind – telephones, headsets, desk chairs, pens, computers, etc. Ensure you have access to your own supplies and space.

We frequently share computers, phones, chairs, cubicles. The call center is crowded, and different shifts share the same computers, desks, etc.

Employers should stagger shifts and breaks to avoid crowded work areas and break rooms.

We do not have a space to safely distance for lunch or breaks. Due to the large number of staff, we are not able to "stagger" breaks and lunch, so we avoid sharing the same space.

Employers should provide regular disinfection of doors, surfaces, products and any other "high touch" areas that could facilitate the transmission of the virus. Attempt to minimize touching of shared surfaces. The employer should ensure the work area, including common spaces and restrooms, are cleaned and disinfected throughout the day and between tours/shifts.

We have had to repeatedly request that our shared bathrooms and office space be cleaned and disinfected. The space is not cleaned well or sufficiently on a regular basis.

One of our goals has been to pursue working at home. The design of the office, the lack of space, and other issues that are identified in the above list make it impossible to create a safe working environment. Our jobs are done almost completely on the phone. We are we required to go into the office when it is possible to do our job remotely? We have been told we can't work at home for various reasons such there is "connection problem" or the county does not want to pay for licenses. Providers and other staff can work remotely so why are we prevented from doing so? Working remotely could be the difference between a full-blown outbreak and us

staying healthy and not spreading the virus to our families. It sounds dramatic, but because of the lack of distancing, lack of infection control, lack of transparency or proactive actions on behalf of management, the call center may not have enough healthy people to keep running. We waited two months to be tested and the first staff person has tested positive. Our office lacks the most basic setup to prevent disease transmission, we are all considered exposed. We ask that we be allowed to work remotely to save our health and possibly our lives.

We hope that after reading this letter, that you will take our request into consideration.

To Mayor London Breed, City Department Heads Funding LGBTQ Organizations, Budget Office and the Board of Supervisors:

We are writing to call on key City Departments to fully fund trans and LGBQ community services. Mayor Breed's budget guidance calls on Departments to follow equity principles and prioritize services for our most vulnerable residents. We call on Departments to follow this guidance by keeping trans and LGBTQ programs funded so they can continue providing services to some of those most impacted by the pandemic.

- Housing our community We need to retain and increase capacity and funding for Our Trans Home SF. Currently it is supporting housing subsidies for over 75 low income, housing insecure trans community members and trans people experiencing homelessness. To reduce any funding for this program would mean putting people back on the streets. That is the last thing that we want to do as the City is grappling with the COVID-19 pandemic, and as many more community members are becoming housing insecure due to the financial crisis.
- Economic development, re-entry, and violence prevention programs transgender and gender nonconforming (TGNC) communities have seen an enormous reduction in income as TGNC people are disproportionately represented in the underground economy, service industry and other industries that have been greatly affected. We recommend an increase in economic development, employment, re-entry and violence prevention programs for TGNC communities.
- Trans wellness programs There are currently no mental health or substance use recovery programs dedicated to TGNC communities. This has risen to the top as one of our most pressing needs. Now more than ever, our communities need comprehensive health and wellness services.

We understand that all Departments are instructed to make a 15% reduction to their budget and that some tough decisions have to be made. However, we would like to emphasize that any cuts to currently funded trans and LGBQ programs would damage any progress the City has made in serving our most marginalized community members. Furthermore, such cuts will impact organizations' ability to respond to essential community needs that are not being addressed elsewhere, thus damaging essential safety nets and negatively impacting the City's broader COVID-19 relief efforts.

During the Our Trans Home SF campaign, we learned that TGNC San Franciscans are 18 times more likely to experience homelessness than other residents are. That makes TGNC people some of the most marginalized community members in the city. However, through public comments at last year's hearings we also learned that our TGNC community members commonly experience discrimination or harassment when seeking housing services. This is consistent with the National Trans Survey's findings that 70% of TGNC respondents who stayed in a shelter in that year reported some form of mistreatment.

From Departments' annual reports on SOGI (Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity) data collection, we know that prior to the COVID-19 pandemic many Departments were already struggling to meet the essential needs of trans and LGBQ residents. We were only just beginning to address these inequities by investing in community-specific solutions since general population services are not accessible to LGBTQ individuals. That is why we are emphasizing that Departments must, at minimum, maintain current funding for trans and LGBTQ specific programs, especially when it comes to housing, wellness, and economic development. It is especially important that funding for Black-led and people of color led trans organizations is protected and increased. This is a time when we must invest in wellness for Black trans people, and trans communities of color.

In fact, as the COVD-19 pandemic has taken hold of our communities, we need increased investment in our services now more than ever. Our trans and LGBTQ nonprofits have taken on the role of supporting our community members through this crisis. The SF Bay Area LGBTQ+ COVID Relief Coalition formed so that we could collectively better coordinate the overwhelming needs that our communities are facing. Given this crisis, we have an increased need for wellness, housing, and mental health funding in order to ensure that our communities stay safe and housed.

During this Pride season and beyond we hope you will honor San Francisco's values and continue to support our most vulnerable communities.

During the Our Trans Home SF campaign, we learned that TGNC San Franciscans are 18 times more likely to experience homelessness than other residents are. That makes TGNC people some of the most marginalized community members in the city. However, through public comments at last year's hearings we also learned that our TGNC community members commonly experience discrimination or harassment when seeking housing services. This is consistent with the National Trans Survey's findings that 70% of TGNC respondents who stayed in a shelter in that year reported some form of mistreatment.

From Departments' annual reports on SOGI (Sexual Orientation and Gender Identity) data collection, we know that prior to the COVID-19 pandemic many Departments were already struggling to meet the essential needs of trans and LGBQ residents. We were only just beginning to address these inequities by investing in community-specific solutions since general population services are not accessible to LGBTQ individuals. That is why we are emphasizing that Departments must, at minimum, maintain current funding for trans and LGBTQ specific programs, especially when it comes to housing, wellness, and economic development. It is especially important that funding for Black-led and people of color led trans organizations is protected and increased. This is a time when we must invest in wellness for Black trans people, and trans communities of color.

In fact, as the COVD-19 pandemic has taken hold of our communities, we need increased investment in our services now more than ever. Our trans and LGBTQ nonprofits have taken on the role of supporting our community members through this crisis. The SF Bay Area LGBTQ+ COVID Relief Coalition formed so that we could collectively better coordinate the overwhelming needs that our communities are facing. Given this crisis, we have an increased need for wellness, housing, and mental health funding in order to ensure that our communities stay safe and housed.

During this Pride season and beyond we hope you will honor San Francisco's values and continue to support our most vulnerable communities.

To Mayor Breed, the San Francisco Board of Supervisors, and San Francisco Elected Officers

My name is Charles Nelson, and I am a resident of San Francisco. This past week, our nation has been gripped by protests calling for rapid and meaningful change with regard to police behavior, an end to racism and anti-Blackness, and immediate reform in how Black people are treated in America. Our city has been at the forefront of much of this action. Accordingly, it has come to my attention that the budget for 2021 is being decided as these protests continue.

SFPD has been a waste of our resources. Last year, the SFPD budget was \$611,701,869, the majority of which comes from the San Francisco general fund. While we've been spending extraordinary amounts on policing, we have not seen improvements to safety, homelessness, mental health, or affordability in our city. Instead, we see wasteful and harmful actions of our police.

I've seen first-hand the ineffectiveness of Tenderloin police to accomplish real change. A containment zone for crime is not a solution, and it's better that the people be treated like human beings and receive food, shelter, and medical treatment. The police are uniquely unqualified to perform any of these duties and our tax dollars are better spent funding EMTs, Firefighters, and Community Support programs. The tenderloin would be better off if all the beat cops were replaced with trained EMTs, advocates for the unhoused, and public defenders. We don't need a hired gang

to protect us, we can do that ourselves.

From living on the corner of Golden Gate and Hyde, I've come in contact with a number of the horde of criminal drug dealers, and even knowing some of them are armed with firearms and oversized illegal knives, I know that they are more level-headed than the SFPD. I literally feel safer with the drug dealers than the SFPD, and I'm rich and white.

If the SFPD doesn't want to do their job, let's pare their workload down to just chasing murderers around. And when we realize they're bad at that too, we can fire them completely.

I call on you to slash the SFPD budget and instead use those extraordinary resources towards solving homelessness, which is felt most by our Black neighbors and veterans. We implore you to give every member of our community experiencing homelessness a place to call home and the treatment they need.

We can be a beacon for other cities to follow if only we have the courage to change.

Table 1 has two sections:

- **Uses** (equivalent to 'Expenditures' plus 'Profit' of a standard profit/loss statement),
- Sources (equivalent to 'Revenue' of a standard P/L statement

Table 1 is not in a standard profit/loss statement format.

Here, for clarity and transparency, I present Table 1 in a standard profit/loss statement format. The "Affordable Housing Program" (Exhibit D of the Development Agreement, on p. 1580 of 2256-page Planning Commission packet) specifies the City's Affordable Funding Share to be \$239K per unit. Thus for 187 City-subsidized units, RCP will receive \$44.693 Million (187 units X \$239K).

It is unclear if "Uses" in Table 1 includes the costs for the 187 "additional affordable" City-subsidized units.

Neither does Table 1 include the \$44.7 Million that Reservoir Community Partners is expecting to receive from the "City's Affordable Funding Share."

Despite the unclarity in Table 1, the "Affordable Housing Program" of the Development Agreement states:

Developer will cause at least 50% of the total number of dwelling units constructed on the Project Site to be Affordable Units. Developer will be responsible for the pre-development, planning, permitting, construction, and management of all Affordable Units. The Parties agree that the Project's ability to achieve an overall affordability level of 50% is predicated on Developer's receipt of City's Affordable Funding Share.

THE MYTH/DECEPTION OF MARKET-RATE HOUSING SUBSIDIZING AFFORDABLE UNITS

The Reservoir Project has been promoted as 550 units subsidzing 550 affordable units. With the recent release of the Development Agreement, this can be shown to be a myth and to be deceptive advertising.

The EPS Feasibility Memo and Development Agreement provides evidence for fact that the affordable units will be subsidized by public monies. State and City funding is expected to total \$124.2 Million:

- \$79.5 M from State grants
 - \$39.5M from Statewide Park Program (SPP) and Infill Infrastructure Grant

(IIG) Program,

- \$40.0M from Multifamily Housing Program (MHP) and Affordable Housing & Sustainable Communities Program (AHSC);
- \$44.7 M from "City's Affordable Funding Share."

PROPORTION OF PUBLIC FUNDING FOR PROJECT: 55-69% Because of the unclarity of whether Table 1 covers the 187 City-subsidized units or notm here are two calculations: 1) for Table 1 "Uses" figures that would cover all 550 units; 2) for Table 1 "Uses" figures that would cover only the Developer's 363 affordable units:

In both cases, public sources of funds total \$124.2 Million (\$39.5M + \$40M + \$44.7M)

The proportion of public monies for the Project depends on whether or not the Table 1 figures cover the 187 City-subsidized units:

1. If 187 City-subsidized units are covered: \$124.2M / \$180.6M cost = 69%

2. If 187 City units are not covered: 124.2M / (180.6M + 44.7M) = 55%So in either case, well over half (55- 69%) of the funding of affordable units will be paid for with public monies ,while Avalon Bay will get **at least half** of the total number of units.

From this, it should be evident that, in reality, the public will be subsidizing the private developer by:

- Privatization of public land, which will be given up in perpetuity for a scandalous 98%-discounted price of \$11.2 Million;
- Instead of the marketing sweet-talk of affordability "in perpetuity", affordability will only be assured for 57 years.

I urge all Supervisors to resist the temptations that the private developers dangle in front of you. Don't be a party to corruption and privatization of public lands at a giveaway price.

Great Plates Delivered SF Program Provides Free Home-Delivered Meals for Seniors

<u>Great Plates Delivered SF</u> is temporary state emergency food assistance program for older adults sheltering in place due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This City-run program delivers three free meals a day to eligible seniors, who are at a higher risk from COVID-19. The City has partnered with restaurants and food vendors to prepare and deliver meals to our community's older adults.

Seniors participating in Great Plates Delivered receive breakfast, lunch, and dinner delivered to their home. The program accommodates specific dietary needs, such as low-sodium or pork-free diets. All deliveries are contactless for safety, and all individuals delivering meals are subject to background checks. In the first month of the program, more than 1,400 people have participated and over 80,000 meals have been delivered.

Great Plates Delivered SF runs through July 10, 2020 and serves eligible seniors over 65, as well as those aged 60 - 64 with certain underlying health conditions, or those who have been exposed to COVID-19. Eligible seniors must not be able to obtain or prepare meals on their own, live alone or with another eligible senior and earn less than \$74,940 for a single-person household or \$101,460 for a two-person household. Unfortunately, under the state's program rules, older adults who currently receive state or federal food assistance such as CalFresh or home-delivered meals are not eligible for Great Plates.

We write to follow up on our March 24, 2020 notice that Sheraton Operating Corporation doing business as W San Francisco (the "Hotel"), located at 181 3rd Street, San Francisco, CA 94103, would be implementing temporary furloughs, temporary layoffs, and/or temporary schedule reductions (collectively, temporary actions"). Re: WARN/Cal-WARN Notice

Dear WARN Act Coordinator:

We write to follow up on our March 27, 2020 notice that St. Francis Hotel Corporation, doing business as The Westin St. Francis San Francisco On Union Square (the "location"), located at 335 Powell Street, San Francisco CA 94102, would be implementing temporary furloughs, temporary layoffs, and/or temporary schedule reductions (collectively, temporary actions"). Although the temporary actions were initially expected to last less than six months, it is now reasonably foreseeable that these temporary actions may extend beyond six months. The temporary actions impact 940 of the location's 1036 employees.

As you know, these temporary actions began at the location on March 7, 2020, and were expected to last less than six months. The temporary actions were necessary due to the sudden and unprecedented economic effects of coronavirus/COVID-19 crisis ("COVID-19"), a natural disaster and physical calamity, including the World Health Organization's pandemic declaration, the President's declaration of a national emergency, the state and local shelter-in-place orders, and other related governmental announcements and actions, and their impact on business operations. Based on public health guidance and business forecasts available at the time, it was initially expected that these temporary actions would last significantly less than six months and that the location would return to normal business levels.

These government COVID-19 directives, however, have repeatedly been expanded and extended and have forced people to remain in place, restricting business, large gatherings, and travel in general. These expanded and extended government directives have caused a sudden, severe and worsening downturn in the hospitality industry that now makes it reasonably foreseeable that these temporary actions may extend beyond six months.

This notice is provided at the earliest possible time based on the information available. If business conditions change, which will impact these temporary actions, employees will be promptly notified of any change.

To the Members of the Board of Supervisors:

I urge you to support the \$25 million allocation for the Japantown Peace Plaza currently included in the proposed Health and Recovery Bond Measure. The Japantown community has waited nearly 20 years for the space to be properly repaired and to create an open space that appropriately reflects the priorities of our residents, community organizations, businesses and visitors.

As you are aware, the Peace Plaza is the only open space in Japantown and is deeply symbolic of the plight and struggles of San Francisco's Japanese American community. This project is particularly meaningful for the Japantown community because the Peace Plaza area was once occupied by Japanese American residents and businesses. After being forcibly removed and incarcerated by the military during World War II, the Japanese American community was forced out a second time by the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency. The eviction of our community resulted in the loss of a staggering amount of wealth for the families and businesses who had no choice but to accept whatever sale price was offered for their property.

While our community does not dwell on the fact that the city forcibly acquired ownership of the area where the Peace Plaza was built, we do feel that San Francisco has a responsibility to take care of the space. We understand that San Francisco has many urgent priorities, but our community is adamant that we have been more than patient and it is time for this city to address this matter. The residential base of our community may never return to this area and having the means to bring people back is critical to the economy of this neighborhood. Having an open space which addresses the needs and represents the character of Japantown is vital to the long-term sustainability of this community.

l urge you to support the full \$25 million current allocated for Peace Plaza in the Health and Recovery bond.
