TWENTIETH SUPPLEMENT TO MAYORAL PROCLAMATION DECLARING THE EXISTENCE OF A LOCAL EMERGENCY DATED FEBRUARY 25, 2020

WHEREAS, California Government Code Sections 8550 et seq., San Francisco Charter Section 3.100(14) and Chapter 7 of the San Francisco Administrative Code empower the Mayor to proclaim the existence of a local emergency, subject to concurrence by the Board of Supervisors as provided in the Charter, in the case of an emergency threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County or its citizens; and

WHEREAS, On February 25, 2020, the Mayor issued a Proclamation (the "Proclamation") declaring a local emergency to exist in connection with the imminent spread within the City of a novel (new) coronavirus ("COVID-19"); and

WHEREAS, On March 3, 2020, the Board of Supervisors concurred in the Proclamation and in the actions taken by the Mayor to meet the emergency; and

WHEREAS, On March 4, 2020, Governor Gavin Newsom proclaimed a state of emergency to exist within the State due to the threat posed by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, On March 6, 2020, the Health Officer declared a local health emergency under Section 101080 of the California Health and Safety Code, and the Board of Supervisors concurred in that declaration on March 10, 2020; and

WHEREAS, On March 16, 2020, the City's Health Officer issued a stay safe at home order, Health Officer Order No. C19-07 (the "Stay Safe At Home Order"), requiring most people to remain in their homes subject to certain exceptions including obtaining essential goods such as food and necessary supplies, and requiring the closure of non-essential businesses; the Health Officer has amended the Stay Safe At Home Order to modify the ongoing restrictions; and

WHEREAS, There have been 3,057 confirmed cases of COVID-19 within the City and 47 COVID-19-related deaths in the City; there have been more than 177,000 confirmed cases in California and more than 5,300 COVID-19-related deaths in California; and

WHEREAS, This order and the previous orders issued during this emergency have all been issued because of the propensity of the virus to spread person to person and also

because the virus physically is causing property loss or damage due to its proclivity to attach to surfaces for prolonged periods of time; and

WHEREAS, In the Sixteenth Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation dated May 29, 2020, the Mayor issued an order placing restrictions on meetings of City policy bodies, including a requirement that all meetings be conducted by telephonic or electronic means. It is necessary to modify that order to allow policy bodies a means to request permission to meet in person to consider personnel matters when necessary; and

WHEREAS, Given the economic impacts of the COVID-19 emergency and the required business closures, it is in the public interest to delay the due date for annual assessment fees for various permits issued by the Department of Public Works to provide more time for permit holders to pay such fees; and

NOW, THEREFORE,

I, London N. Breed, Mayor of the City and County of San Francisco, proclaim that there continues to exist an emergency within the City and County threatening the lives, property or welfare of the City and County and its citizens;

In addition to the measures outlined in the Proclamation and in the Supplements to the Proclamation dated March 11, March 13, March 17, March 18, March 23, March 27, March 31, April 1, April 10, April 14, April 23, April 30, May 11, May 13, May 18, May 29, June 2, June 9, and June 13, 2020, it is further ordered that:

(1) Section 2 of the 16th Supplement to the Emergency Proclamation is revised and replaced as follows:

Public meetings of City commissions, boards, and advisory bodies other than the Board of Supervisors and its committees must comply with the following conditions for all public meetings:

a. The meetings must occur by teleconference or other electronic means without providing a physical meeting place, and the commission, board, or advisory body must comply with all applicable law governing public meetings during the emergency, including allowing public observation and participation;

- b. The commission, board, or advisory body must prioritize any urgent action items necessary for public health, safety, and essential government function; and
- c. Before scheduling a meeting, a policy body that is not established in the Charter must confer with the department that provides administrative and clerical support to the body, to ensure that the meeting will not unreasonably require the time of staff who are otherwise deployed or participating in the City's response to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Upon request from the policy body chairperson, the Mayor may waive the requirement in subsection (a) and allow members of a policy body to convene at a physical location for the sole purpose of discussing and/or taking action on an item concerning a personnel matter. However, the policy body shall not provide a physical location for members of the public to attend and shall comply with all applicable requirements concerning public observation and participation. The policy body members and other participants shall follow all applicable health directives.

This Order shall remain in place until July 31, 2020, unless terminated earlier by the Mayor or unless the Governor rescinds his executive order authorizing public meetings to occur by electronic means without providing a physical meeting place under state law.

(2) Notwithstanding any City law, the deadline to pay annual public right-of-way occupancy assessment fees in Sec 2.1.1 of the Public Works Code for Major Encroachment, Minor Encroachment, Overwide Driveway, Street Improvement and Vault Permits is extended from July 1, 2020 to September 30, 2020.

WHEREAS, On May 7, 2020, as directed by Governor Newson's Executive Order N-60-20, the State Public Health Officer issued a process for seeking a local variance from the Resilience Roadmap; the process requires a county self-attestation submitted at the discretion of the county's Local Health Officer based on a set of criteria related to county disease prevalence and preparedness; this variance allows counties to move through the roadmap at a rate and an order determined by the Local Health Officer; and

WHEREAS, The readiness criteria that the state requires to submit this attestation include: stable hospitalization of COVID-19 patients on a 7-day average of daily percent change of less than 5% or no more than 20 COVID-19 hospitalizations on any single day in the past 14 days; no more than 25 new cases per 100,000 residents in the past 14 days or less than 8% positive test results in the past 7 days; daily testing volume of 1.5 per 1,000 residents per day; testing availability for at least 75% of residents within 30 minutes driving time; hospital capacity to accommodate a 35% surge in COVID-19 cases while maintaining care to non-COVID-19 patients; sufficient protective supplies for essential workers, including having a more than 14-day supply of personal protective equipment for skilled nursing facilities; and availability of temporary housing for 15% of homeless residents; and

WHEREAS, The process further provides that the Local Health Officer's attestation be accompanied by a letter of support from the county's board of supervisors; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco's Health Officer, Dr. Tomás Aragón, has indicated that San Francisco meets the readiness criteria and other factors required to apply for a variance seeking to progress further into the Resilience Roadmap, and Dr. Aragón is in the process of preparing an attestation in support of the variance; now, therefore, be it MOVED, That the Board of Supervisors supports the Health Officer's decision to prepare and submit an attestation seeking a variance to allow San Francisco to progress further into the Resilience Roadmap as the Health Officer determines appropriate and consistent with the City's phased and measured approach to help keep San Francisco residents safer and healthier; and, be it FURTHER MOVED, That the Clerk of the Board shall prepare a letter of support from the Board of Supervisors to accompany the attestation of the Health Officer, and transmit that letter to the Health Officer within 48 hours of the effective date of this motion for submission to the California Department of Public Health.

What are Prop Q Purchases?

Pursuant to Chapter 21.03(a) of the Administrative Code, the Purchaser has delegated signature and approval authority to City departments for certain classes of commodities and general services (currently up to \$10,000 including tax and shipping)*. These purchases are commonly referred to citywide as "Delegated Departmental Purchases" or, more often, "Prop Q Purchases."

When exercising their Prop Q purchasing authority, departments are allowed to make certain purchases without a competitive bidding process but must exercise "good judgement" when placing their orders.

The following report is a summary of the Prop Q purchases that were made during the last quarter. The Office of Contact Administration (OCA), in collaboration with the Controller's Office, periodically review Prop Q transactions to ensure compliance with the stated rules and regulations associated with these purchases.





File No. 200478 - Ordinance calling and providing for a special election to be held in the City and County of San Francisco on Tuesday, November 3, 2020, for the purpose of submitting to San Francisco voters a proposition to incur bonded indebtedness of not to exceed \$438,500,000 to finance the acquisition or improvement of real property, including: facilities to deliver services for persons experiencing mental health challenges, substance use disorder, and/or homelessness; parks, open space, and recreation facilities, including green and climate resilient infrastructure; and streets, curb ramps, street structures and plazas, and related costs necessary or convenient for the foregoing purposes; authorizing landlords to pass-through 50% of the resulting property tax increase to residential tenants under Administrative Code, Chapter 37; providing for the levy and collection of taxes to pay both principal and interest on such Bonds; incorporating the provisions of the Administrative Code relating to the Citizens' General Obligation Bond Oversight Committee's review of Bond expenditures; setting certain procedures and requirements for the election; adopting findings under the California Environmental Quality Act; and finding that the proposed Bonds are in conformity with the General Plan, and the eight priority policies of Planning Code, Section 101.1(b).

As you know, the Planning Department has proposed an ordinance to 'streamline' the CEQA process in San Francisco, known as SER - Standard Environmental Requirements. Under the SER ordinance, projects that formerly might have needed extensive review under CEQA would be approved unilaterally by Planning Department staff if the projects met specific requirements. This could eliminate a few months of review, but it could also eliminate public notice, public hearings, and input that could, and often does, result in a better project. Objections to the SER Ordinance were submitted in extensive letters to the Planning Department and Commissions by both the Sierra Club and Richard Drury, a prominent local CEQA attorney. These objections include the following: • The proposed SER process will have a negative impact on transparency and public participation in the CEQA process; • Once the SER ordinance has been passed by the Board of Supervisors, the definition of what projects are exempt from CEQA review will be decided solely by the Planning Department and the Planning Commission. On behalf of the Building Owners and Managers Association (BOMA) of San Francisco and the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, we are writing to express our opposition to the Emergency Ordinance – Cleaning and Disease Prevention Standards in Tourist Hotels and Large Commercial Office Buildings (File #200638). The health and safety of our office building employees, service providers, tenants and our visitors has long been a top priority for us. Now more than ever, it is our chief concern as we have begun the process of building re-

occupancy. The proposed ordinance however, is redundant when we have guidance from agencies such as Cal/OSHA and the California Department of Public Health covering the same matter. Having multiple authorities issuing guidance and standards is confusing and accomplishes little. The other agencies with medical expertise are the ones tasked by law with issuing this type of guidance and they have done so, and the Board of Supervisors should not interfere.

We note with particular interest that the proposed ordinance does not include "a building or set of buildings owned by the City or by any other unit of government, whether local, state, or federal". The exemption for municipal buildings seems to be an acknowledgement that compliance with this ordinance will be burdensome and expensive so the City does not want to impose those burdens on itself.

The Emergency Order requires cleaning and disinfecting high-traffic areas every 30 minutes. What is the science behind this proposed requirement? This is impracticable and likely impossible to accomplish. Disinfection, when done properly, is laborious and slow, with most disinfectants requiring several minutes of contact time. There is a lengthy list of these high-traffic areas, including all surfaces in lobbies, hallways, stairways, etc. To actually do this would require an army of employees disinfecting continuously. It also does not demarcate what surfaces need to be on this cycle within a commercial office building. Just common areas that the property manager controls, or, will tenants be expected to clean and disinfect their lobby areas every 30 minutes?

Employee protection, including PPE and training, is under the authority of Cal/OSHA which is designated as the agency to control occupational safety in California under Federal OSHA. Under the state/federal framework laid out in the federal OSHA statute, states can be authorized to regulate occupational safety but their standards need to be approved by federal OSHA as being at least as effective as federal OSHA standards.

There is a reference to providing Medical Waste containers where needed without any context. Medical waste generally refers to waste that may be contaminated with blood, not from routine disinfection. This reference either needs to be explained or removed to avoid confusion.

The anti-retaliation provisions present several problems, or actually new iterations of issues raised above. First, there is already a Cal/OSHA program for whistleblowers and protection against retaliation for reporting unsafe work environments or refusing to work in an unsafe work environment. There is no need for a second program, which may encourage employees not to use the Cal/OSHA program, which could be seen as weakening the authorized program. In addition, the combination of the anti-retaliation provisions with the enforcement provisions creates a private cause of action straight to San Francisco Superior Court for claims

that an employee was retaliated against for complaints about workplace safety. This is in contrast with both state and federal whistleblower programs, which call for an administrative fact-finding process, with appeals to administrative judges and then to court as a last resort. Furthermore, the enforcement provision is not limited to retaliation; it creates a right for an employee to bring an action of any violation of the EO in court, to be awarded damages, including a penalty of \$1,000 per violation, exemplary damages, and attorney fees. This is clearly creating a whole separate enforcement regime from the authorized Cal/OSHA system of inspections and enforcement and penalties, undercutting that program, and is likely not acceptable to either Cal/OSHA or federal OSHA. California went through this years ago with Prop 65, when federal OSHA said that the occupational exposure arm of Prop 65 could not lawfully be implemented until Cal/OSHA adopted regulations addressing Prop 65 in the context of workplace exposures and federal OSHA approved those regulations with notice in the Federal Register. Violations of occupational safety standards belong in the Cal/OSHA system, not the courts.

We feel that it is in the best interest of public health that office buildings and hotels follow guidelines developed by the medical experts, not guidelines legislated by the Board of Supervisors and targeted at only specific industries.

We ask that you <u>no</u>t approve this ordinance, and instead, allow the medical experts to provide the guidance.

Please see updates below to San Francisco's Minimum Compensation Ordinance (MCO) and the Health Care Accountability Ordinance (HCAO) effective July 1, 2020.

The MCO generally requires City Contractors, and tenants at San Francisco International Airport to pay a minimum hourly wage rate to their covered employees.

Effective July 1, 2020, the following are the rates for the MCO:

For contracts entered into or amended on or after October 14, 2007

- MCO For-Profit Rate is \$18.24/hour
- MCO Non-Profit Rate is \$16.50/hour
- MCO Public Entities Rate is \$16.50/hour

For contracts entered into or prior to October 14, 2007

- For work performed with the City of San Francisco, vendors must pay no less than the San Francisco Minimum Wage (\$16.07/hour effective 7/1/20)
- For work performed outside of San Francisco, vendors must pay \$10.77/hour

Please inform all current and prospective contractors and tenants who are subject to these changes. For further information about the MCO visit http://www.sfgov.org/olse/mco. Should you have any questions, please contact the Office of Labor Standards Enforcement (OLSE) at (415) 554-7903.

The HCAO generally requires City Contractors, and tenants at San Francisco International Airport to offer health insurance to their covered employees, or to pay a fee to the City for use by the Department of Public Health (DPH). The HCAO requires DPH to adjust this fee rate annually in response to the most currently available data on statewide HMO premium rate changes.

DPH has determined that the fee that must paid by employers in lieu of providing health insurance that meets the minimum standards shall increase to \$5.60 per hour per employee (capped at \$224 per week) effective July 1, 2020.

San Francisco hotels already have guidelines developed by the Hotel Council of San Francisco, California Hotel & Lodging, and American Hotel & Lodging that are all based on medical expert guidance from CDC, CDPH and CAL OSHA guidelines. As well, our industry's leading management companies have also already adopted stringent COVID 19-era protocols for health and safety such as Hilton *CleanStay* and Marriott's *Committed to Clean* programs.

We believe the proposed ordinance will place employees at our hotels at *increased risk of contracting COVID 19* as a result of its daily room cleaning mandate, which will inherently result in greater close-quarters interaction between employees and guests. We are aware of no scientific data supporting the proposition that daily room cleaning will reduce the transmission of COVID 19 – and common sense and logic together dictate that there would only be *greater COVID 19 transmission* as a result of the greater close-quarters interactions from daily cleaning. The ordinance's "every 30 minutes" cleaning requirement ignores the reality that competent and professional hotel management companies with decades of experience have already developed stringent requirements to provide safe guest and employee experiences in light of the COVID 19 threat. And the ordinance's daily linen and towel cleaning requirements are obviously contrary to City's environmental and sustainability goals.

Lastly, please understand that if the ordinance is passed, we expect many hotels in San Francisco will simply keep their doors shut rather than face its burdensome requirements.

For all of these reasons, we ask that you not approve this ordinance and allow the medical experts to provide the guidance.

Frequent cleaning of the door handles and strategically positioned sanitizer stations - both measures included in the brand/manager guidelines - are sufficient to ensure limited transmission of the virus. Requiring the deployment of a doorman only increases the possibility of transmission between humans.

Two final points:

- 1. If this ordinance is so important to public safety, why then are government buildings not included? I believe the safety of all that enter our government offices is no less important than the safety of private sector workers and travellers needing temporary accommodations.
- 2. While some may believe this ordinance will fill job vacancies, I can assure you that the opposite is true. Every hotel owner/manager has developed models that estimate operating costs at varying occupancy levels using pre-COVID staffing models and set opening dates based on that criteria. If this ordinance is passed,

operating a hotel will require significantly more labor, which is the highest cost line item in hotels. When we plug the new labor costs into our models, they tell us we'll need more revenue/occupancy to sustain those labor costs. Given the lack of any kind of material demand in San Francisco, that will push opening dates further out, possibly to the end of year, impacting the entire hotel staff, not just housekeepers. Extended closures will also affect your city's tax base by impaired values on hotels and reduce tax income. This ordinance will ultimately hurt workers and tax revenues.

17	Section 2. Declaration of Emergency under Charter Section 2.107.
18	(a) Section 2.107 of the Charter authorizes passage of an emergency ordinance in
19	cases of public emergency affecting life, health, or property, or for the uninterrupted operation
20	of any City or County department or office required to comply with time limitations established
21	by law. The Board of Supervisors hereby finds and declares that an actual emergency exists
22	that requires the passage of this emergency ordinance.
23	(b) On February 25, 2020, Mayor London Breed proclaimed a state of emergency in
24	response to the COVID-19 pandemic. On March 3, 2020, the Board of Supervisors concurred

in the February 25 Proclamation.

- (c) March 16, 2020, the County Health Officer issued Order No. C19-07, replaced by Order No. C19-07b on March 31, 2020, extended and replaced by Order No. C19-07c on April 29, 2020, extended and replaced by Order No.C19-07d on May 17, 2020, and extended and replaced by Order No. C19-07e on June 1, 2020, directing San Franciscans to stay in their homes and follow social distancing requirements when outside the home. Order No. C19-07e also allowed a limited number of businesses and activities to resume while the Health Officer continues to assess the transmissibility and clinical severity of COVID-19.
- (d) On May 28, 2020, Mayor London Breed announced a phased-in plan for reopening San Francisco over the coming weeks and months, aligned with the State's guidelines and based on San Francisco's risk-modelling to protect the public health and control the spread of COVID-19 (Plan).
- (e) Under Phase 2b of San Francisco's Plan, currently targeted for June 15, offices where workers cannot telecommute may reopen. Under Phase 3, currently targeted for mid-August, hotels, hospitality services and short term rentals may reopen.
- (f) On May 12, 2020, the California Departments of Public Health (CDPH) and Industrial Relations (Cal/OSHA) issued *COVID-19 Industry Guidance: Hotels and Lodging* to provide guidance for the hotel and lodging industry to support a safe and clean environment for employees and guests. Thorough cleaning and disinfecting of sleeping spaces, bathrooms, linens, public areas, employee work and break areas are key to preventing the spread of COVID-19, keeping employees and guests safe, and building confidence in both employees and guests that their health is of utmost concern, and thus key to restoring public confidence in the hospitality industry. Such public confidence in turn will help build the hospitality industry's economic recovery.

(g) This emergency ordinance is necessary to reduce the spread of COVID-19, while
preparing for the reopening of large office buildings and the hospitality industry in order to
implement the economic recovery.
Section 3. Definitions.
As used in this Ordinance, the following terms shall have the following meanings:
"Contagious Public Health Threat" means any contagious, infectious, or communicable
disease that the Department may from time to time determine poses an imminent and
proximate threat to public health, and shall include SARS-CoV-2, the novel coronavirus that
causes COVID-19.
"Covered Establishment" means a Tourist Hotel or Large Commercial Office Building
within the geographic boundaries of the City and County of San Francisco.
"COVID-19" means the Coronavirus Disease 2019.
"Department" means the San Francisco Department of Public Health.
"Disinfectant" means an Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered product
that has qualified for use against Contagious Public Health Threats.
"Employee Dining Room" means any space designated by the Operator for Employees
to take legally or contractually mandated breaks.
"Employees" means full-time and part-time employees, casual or on-call employees, or
independent contractors who perform work at the Covered Establishment, whether employed
directly by the operator of the establishment or by another entity.
"Operator" means any person or business entity that employs Employees directly or

"Large Commercial Office Building" shall mean any building or set of buildings (which

shall mean buildings on the same lot, adjacent lots, or within the same block and owned by

indirectly at a Covered Establishment.

the same entity) in the City containing more than 50,000 square feet of Office Space as that term is defined in the San Francisco Planning Code Sections 102 and 320(f).

"Tourist Hotel" shall mean any building or set of buildings (which shall mean buildings on the same lot, adjacent lots, or within the same block and owned by the same entity) in the City containing guest rooms or suites of rooms intended or designated to be used for commercial tourist use by providing accommodation to transient guests on a nightly basis or longer, as defined in San Francisco Admnisitrative Code Section 41.4, and Health Code Section 594.1.

Section 4. Cleaning standards for Covered Establishments

(a). Each Operator shall establish, implement, and maintain written cleaning standards designed to reduce the transmission of Contagious Public Health Threats. The standards shall provide for disinfection of porous and non-porous surfaces using appropriate EPA-registered and approved disinfectant products that have qualified for use against such Contagious Public Health Threats. Disinfectants used must be labeled to be effective against viral pathogens. Use of diluted bleach solutions should consist of 5 tablespoons per gallon of water. Alcohol solutions must contain a minimum of 70% alcohol. If no EPA-registered disinfectant exists that may be used on non-porous surfaces effectively or without causing damage to the material, the operator shall use such other cleaning agent as is appropriate for the material while using an EPA-registered disinfectant on all other surfaces. Each operator shall follow the manufacturer's instructions for all cleaning and disinfection products for concentration, application method and contact time for safe and effective use. Additionally, employees shall be trained on the proper use of cleaning and disinfection products per the product manufacturer's guidelines and Cal/OSHA safety requirements.

Commented [EVD(1]: (f) "Office space" shall mean space within a structure intended or primarily suitable for occupancy by persons or entities which perform for their own benefit or provide to others services at that location, including but not limited to professional, banking, insurance, management, consulting, technical, sales and design, or the office functions of manufacturing and warehousing businesses, but shall exclude the following: Retail use; repair; any business characterized by the physical transfer of tangible goods to customers on the premises; wholesale shipping, receiving and storage; any facility, other than physicians' or other individuals' offices and uses accessory thereto, customarily used for furnishing medical services, and design showcases or any other space intended and primarily suitable for display of goods. This definition shall include all uses encompassed within Section 102 of this Code.

- (b) Cleaning standards under this section shall at a minimum require the following procedures:
- areas, items, and fixtures with which employees or guests may be expected to have regular physical contact. High-contact areas shall include, at a minimum, door and door handles at all exterior entrances, door handles at interior entrances regularly accessed by multiple employees and guests, elevator controls, handrails, stairways, stairwells, instruments used by multiple individuals such as computer keyboards, touch screens, credit card readers, printers, telephones, and light switches, surfaces such as countertops, furniture, and desks in high usage areas, and ice and vending machines. Shared items and equipment shall be disinfected before being transferred to a new employee or after each employee's shift. Employees directly assisting customers shall be provided with personal hand sanitizers. Employees shall clean and disinfect high-contact areas at least every 30 minutes, and more frequently where appropriate. Employees shall be provided with adequate time during their shift to perform the cleaning requirements described within this document.
- (2) Public areas. All surfaces in lobbies, waiting areas, dining areas, hallways, lunch rooms, loading docks, handwashing facilities, and other public areas must be cleaned and disinfected regularly throughout the day, including without limitation, walls, windows and glass surfaces, desks, table tops and furniture, door handles, and light switches. Porous surfaces such as carpeted floor, rugs, and drapes, shall be disinfected using disinfectant where available for the item, or where not, using appropriate cleaners indicated for use on these surfaces.
- (3) Exterior doors. Each Operator shall have dedicated personnel responsible for regularly disenfecting exterior doors, and at any time that such doors cannot

- (4) Elevators. All elevators, including elevator buttons, shall be cleaned and disinfected regularly throughout the day.
- (5) Restrooms. All surfaces in public and non-public restrooms shall be cleaned and disinfected regularly throughout the day, including sinks, faucets, walls, mirrors, toilets, toilet paper dispensers, soap dispensers, dryers, paper towel dispensers, and door handles. The Covered Establishment shall ensure that hand sanitizer is available in all public restrooms.
- (6) Meeting rooms. All surfaces in meeting rooms and convention spaces shall be cleaned and disinfected regularly, including during meeting breaks, including table tops, chairs, dry erase boards, markers, staplers, tape dispensers, remote controls, table projectors, charging ports.
- (7) Tourist Hotel guest rooms. All surfaces in Tourist Hotel guest rooms that have been occupied in the preceding 24 hours shall be cleaned and disinfected on a daily basis, including, without limitation, walls, windows, mirrors, desks, table tops, furniture, minibars, interior and exterior handles of doors, interior door locks, faucets, toilets, and other items, headboards and footboards of beds, light switches, remote controls, telephones, keyboards, touch screens. Porous surfaces such as carpeted floor, rugs, and drapes, shall be disinfected using disinfectant where available for the item, or where not, appropriate cleaners indicated for use on these surfaces. Bed linens and towels shall be changed no less than daily, unless the guest requests otherwise. Bedscarves and bedspreads shall be changed upon each guest departure. All dirty linens shall be removed and placed in sealed, single-use bags within the room before being transported. All dirty linens and laundry must be cleaned at high temperatures and according to the CDC Guidelines for Environmental Infection Control in

Health-Care Facilities. Hand sanitizer dispensers shall be installed in main entrances and exits utilized by employees and guests and other high contact and public areas per section (1) and (2) above, including fitness centers, pools, and salons. Notwithsdanding paragraph (5) above, restrooms in occupied Tourist Hotel guest rooms must be cleaned at minimum once per day. Remove all local tourist attraction pamphlets, magazines, menus, notepads, etc from rooms. Important information may be provided on a single-use basis or in electronic form. If a presumptive case of a Contagious Public Health Threat occurs, the guest room must be quarantined and removed from use until the case is cleared or confirmed as a non-threat. If a positive case of a Contagious Public Health Threat occurs, the guest room must undergo a more stringent sanitization protocol per CDC Cleaning and Disinfection for Community Facilities recommendations, or other protocols as may be deemed appropriate by the Department. For purposes of this subsection, no covered establishment shall offer any incentive to any guest for declining guest room cleaning on a daily basis. Guests shall be presumed to have elected daily guest room cleaning unless they affirmatively indicate their preference not to receive it.

- (8) Dining and bar facilities. All tables, bar tops, menus, check presentation holders, writing utensils, and computer screens shall be disinfected between each use. Other areas shall be cleaned and disinfected regularly throughout the day.
- (9) Employee Dining Room. The Employee Dining Room shall be treated in accordance with (2).
- (10) Shipping and receiving areas. All shipping and receiving areas, including waste management areas, shall be cleaned and disinfected regularly throughout the day.
- (11) Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). Each Operator shall provide any PPE necessary to comply with this Section at no cost to Employees, and shall ensure that such PPE is replaced, cleaned, and used in conformance with manufacturer directions.

- (c) Public Health Guidance. Any other relevant guidance regarding cleaning standards issued by the Department, by the California Department of Public Health, by Cal/OSHA and/or other regulatory agencies, or established pursuant to Executive Order shall be implemented by the Covered Establishment. In the event of a confict between cleaning standards, the most stringent standards shall apply.
- (d) Copies of the cleaning standards shall be posted at areas where employees regularly receive daily instruction regarding work duties and on bulletin boards where the operator regularly posts official communications with employees. Copies of the cleaning standards shall be made available to guests, to employees, and to employee bargaining representatives upon request, and shall be translated into any language spoken by 20% or more of Employees at that Covered Establishment. Copies of the cleaning standards shall be submitted electronically to the Department upon request.

Section 5. Training.

 Each Operator shall provide comprehensive and ongoing training for all its Covered Employees in the following subjects: Contagious Public Health Threat symptoms, how the Contagious Public Health Threats are spread, prevention of the spread of Contagious Public Health Threats, the requirements of this Ordinance, the cleaning standards required under Section 4, and employee rights and responsibilities under this Ordinance. Such training shall be performed on paid time and shall be conducted in a language in which the employee is fluent.

23 Section 6. No Retaliation

No person shall discharge, reduce in compensation, increase workload, impose fees or charges, change duties or otherwise take adverse action against any employee for opposing

any practice proscribed by this Ordinance, for participating in proceedings related to this Ordinance, for seeking to enforce his or her rights under this Ordinance by any lawful means, or for otherwise asserting rights under this Ordinance, including without limitation for refusing to perform work that they believe poses a risk to themselves or others, or for reporting work conditions they believe may be unsafe.

Section 7. Enforcement

- (a) The Department shall have authority to enforce these standards under Health Code Sections 594, 596 and 596.5, including an order of closure as provided by Health Code Section 596(e)(6), or any successor provisions.
- (c) An employee may bring a civil action in the San Francisco Superior Court for violations of Section 6 and may be awarded:
- (1) All actual damages (including, but not limited to, lost pay and benefits) suffered by the employee and for statutory damages in the sum of \$1,000, whichever is greater; and
- (2) Punitive damages, as may be authorized under California State Civil Code section 3294.
- (3) The court shall award reasonable attorneys' fees and costs to an employee who prevails in any such enforcement action.
- (d) Nothing in this Ordinance shall preclude any person from bringing a civil action based on any requirements set forth in this Ordinance, where such civil action is otherwise recognized under the law.

Section 8. Report to the Board

On or before a date six months following passage, the Department shall report to the Board of Supervisors on the initial implementation and effectiveness of this Ordinance in

promoting public health and shall advise the Board on the need for further action. The Department shall make a second report to the Board on or before a date 12 months following passage, and annually thereafter, on the effectiveness of this law in promoting public health and the necessity of its continued implementation.

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Section 9. Undertaking for the General Welfare.

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In enacting and implementing this emergency ordinance, the City is assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach proximately caused injury. This emergency ordinance does not create a legally enforceable right by any member of the public against the City.

If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this emergency

ordinance, or any application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held to be invalid or

Consistent with Charter Section 2.107, this emergency ordinance shall become effective immediately upon enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the

The property at 1420 Taraval Street was built in early 1907, with the 2nd and 3rd floors set back around 10 feet from the sidewalk, as well as at least three feet of detached distance from our property. Our 4-unit property next door at 1414 Taraval Street was built in 1936, all of the windows on the west side are original, and those two 3-story buildings are detached at least three feet apart. All of the residents who live in our 4-unit building enjoy beautiful views, natural and healthy sunlight from the west side windows, good quality air circulation, and a greater sense of safety during emergency evacuations, etc.

In their new project, the owner plans to rebuild a four-story 45-foot tall new building to replace the current 3-story much shorter old building. If the new building is attached to our property, it will completely block our windows on the west side. This will have a significant effect on our residents' living conditions. Covering the windows would block out the natural lighting, wasting more electricity to turn on artificial electric lights during the daytime and increasing the utility bills. Additionally, blocking the windows would impact the views on the west side and air circulation, which would cause health problems for tenants as well as financial loss for us. the value of our property will decrease if our original built windows were to be blocked by the next door new project. That is really unfair to us - who will compensate us?

When the pre-application meeting was conducted at 1420 Taraval street on April 12, 2018, my husband Anthony (Tony) Lee and myself were out of the country. My son Ben Lee attended the meeting to express our concerns and opposition that their new project would cover up our west side windows of our apartment building. His attendance was not recorded but "Tony Lee" was printed on the sign in sheet instead. Ben's oppositions were not included in the summary of discussion from the pre-application meeting report signed under penalty of perjury under the laws of the state of California (please see attachment). This is a very serious and alarming infraction.

I spoke with Mr. Peter Mandel, the owner of 1420 Taraval Street, several times, and he always verbally agreed to our concerns and promised that he would ask his architect Mr Wiliam Pashelinsky to correct the plan. But he never followed up with any corresponding actions. He also talked to me over the phone and said that he would send an email to Mr William Pashelinsky and copy to me. But I never received any email from him or the copy he supposedly sent to Mr. Pashelinsky.

He was not only perfunctory to us, but the official pre-application meeting report also omitted all of our questions/concerns, as well as any project sponsor response. Since the City Planning was misled by the project sponsor's falsified report. according to the Affidavit he signed (Atachment P.1, No. 3. ...)" I understand that I am responsible for the accuracy of this information and that erroneous information may lead to suspension or revocation of the permit". As the owner of 1414 Taraval Street who is personally impacted by the proposed project at 1420 Taraval Street, I am urging you to vote against the conditional use authorization for 1420 Taraval Street in file #200261 on the Board of Supervisors agenda for Jun 23, 2020. These are the reasons why I'm asking you to vote No on the conditional use authorization:

When the pre-application meeting was conducted at 1420 Taraval street on April 12, 2018, I was out of the country. My son Ben Lee attend the meeting to express our concerns and opposition in that the project would cover up the side windows of our apartment building. His attendance was not recorded (see attachment page 2 on the meeting sign-in sheet) and his oppositions were not included in the summary of discussion from the pre-application meeting report (see attachment page 3) signed under penalty of perjury under the laws of the state of California. Furthermore, my name was printed on the sign in sheet (see attachment page 2) when I clearly was not there. This is a very serious and alarming infraction. I ask you to vote no on this project and request revocation of the permit to investigate the perjury.

Furthermore, we have several major concerns:

The property at 1420 Taraval Street was built in 1907, with the 2nd nd 3rd floors set back around 10 feet from the sidewalk. Our 4-unit property next door at 1414 Taraval Street was built in 1936, all of the windows on the west side are original, and the two 3-story buildings have been detached with at least three feet of distance between the two properties over 80 years.

- 1. The owner of 1420 Taraval St. plans to rebuild a new building attached to our property, and it will completely cover our westside windows. This will block out the natural light, wasting more electricity to turn on electric lights during the daytime and increasing the utility bills.
- 2. Rebuilding a new attached building that blocks the windows would also negatively impact the air circulation and sunlight of our building, which would cause health problems for tenants.
- 3. Tenants, especially in the front two units, are currently able to see street and ocean views from the only side window. They can also look down the street to check the L Taraval streetcar

coming from this window, so they know when they need to leave to catch the streetcar. If the city passes this request to build, it will ruin the tenants' views and inconvenience their commutes.

- 4. If the city allows the owner to rebuild as planned, it will have a significant negative effect on our tenants' living conditions, causing them to complain and renegotiate the rent, at a further financial loss to us. Who is going to compensate our loss?
- 5. The value of our property will decrease if our original windows were to be blocked by the next door new project. That is really unfair to us. Who will compensate us?

Therefore, we have ask that instead of completely block our windows they leave at least three feet of space outside our windows.

On the official pre-application meeting report, all of our questions/concerns, as well as any project sponsor response was omitted. Since the City Planning was misled by the project sponsor's falsified report, according to the Affidavit he signed, Any decisions made based on their untrue statements should be invalid.

Dear Supervisors,

I write to you as a concerned physician in San Francisco. While I welcome any efforts to move people who are currently unhoused into individual housing units, I am concerned that the recent settlement with UC Hastings and the City and County of San Francisco may lead to street sweeps, further risking the spread of COVID-19.

To be clear, I encourage all efforts to bring as many people experiencing homelessness into individual housing units as possible. With recent outbreaks of COVID-19 in homeless shelters, such as at MSC South, it is crucial to move with the greatest urgency to house people experiencing homelessness in non-congregate settings.

At the same time, as a health care worker, I know the value of harm reduction strategies. In the era of COVID-19, if people experiencing homelessness cannot be housed in a way that allows social distancing, sanctioned encampments that include sanitation measures, distancing, and support services are an important harm reduction strategy. The Fulton Street sanctioned encampment is an important harm reduction strategy and should not be closed, particularly as experts predict a likely second wave in the fall.

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has given clear guidance: "Unless individual housing units are available, do not clear encampments during the community spread of COVID-19" as this can cause people to disperse, break connections with providers, and increase the spread of COVID-19. Clearing sanctioned encampments without having individual housing units available may lead to exactly this type of spread. In addition, the UC Hastings lawsuit settlement may lead to clearing of unsanctioned encampments and even further spread COVID-19.

As a health care worker, I know how important housing is to health and the importance of harm reduction strategies. I urge you to do everything within your power to house all members of our community in individual housing units but never to resort to clearing of encampments.

COVID-19 Epidemic in San Francisco's Nursing Homes

Dear Mayor Breed,

I request that you provide a comment for an article I am writing on the COVID-19 outbreaks in San Francisco's nursing homes. I'm sure my readers will be interested in your knowledge and insights. Please comment on the questions on page 2.

On June 2, news surfaced that the Department of Public Health (DPH) had informed the Health Commission that DPH had completed universal COVID-19 testing in 17 of the 21 Skilled Nursing Facilities (SNF's) in San Francisco.

On June 4, I submitted a public records request to DPH asking for data on the number of COVID-positive patient tests and the number of COVID-positive staff tests uncovered during testing in each of the completed 17 SNF's, and asked for a list of the four SNF's in which the baseline universal testing had then not yet been completed.

DPH responded on June 5, declining to respond, saying: "The San Francisco Dept. of Public Health does not have responsive records at this time." For good measure, DPH tossed in the bogus claim, "We are committed to protecting the privacy and confidentiality of patients."

Luckily, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) had just rolled out its new web site, reporting COVID data for over 15,000 SNF's nationwide at *COVID-19 Nursing Home*

Data (https://data.cms.gov/stories/s/bkwz-xpvg). The data posted to CMS' new web site does not "de-identify" cases by reporting "<11" cases, as does the California Department of Public Health's web site for facilities having fewer than 11 cases. If a given facility has only one COVID case, that's what CMS reports, accurately. The claim of protecting patient privacy by hiding behind HIPAA is bogus, precisely because there's no way on earth for anyone to be able to identify given patient names from aggregate data subsets. A reasonable person would think that if any agency is going to hide behind HIPAA, it would be CMS, which chose not to go that ridiculous route.

To review some background:

- As early as March 6, the City closed LHH to all visitors. Soon after, San Francisco Health
 Officer Tomás Aragón appears to have issued another Public Health Order prohibiting nonessential visitors from entering *all* long-term care facilities within San Francisco city limits,
 in addition to LHH.
- As early as March 26, six staff and one resident had tested COVID positive at LHH.
- On March 27, as Mayor you submitted a letter to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services requesting that the fed's send 140 federal staff to "to slow the spread of COVID-19 [and protect] our vulnerable skilled nursing residents." At that point, LHH had just seven COVID infections (one resident and six staff). You may have gotten six federal or state medical staff to help, but as of June 7 there have been at least 172 staff and residents infected in San Francisco nursing homes, including 71 cases at LHH alone, a ten-fold increase at LHH since March 27.
- On April 15, DPH announced it would implement contact tracing.
- On April 16, Mayor Breed issued an order making wearing facial coverings in public
 facilities mandatory in the City. By contrast, it took Governor Newsom until June 18 before
 he nonchalantly got around to bothering two months later to issue an order requiring all
 Californians to wear facial coverings in public.
- On May 1, news surfaced that DPH would conduct baseline, universal COVID testing of all staff and all residents in all San Francisco SNF's beginning on May 4 (which didn't actually begin at LHH until May 6).
- During the Mayor's press conference on May 19, San Francisco Director of Public Health,
 Dr. Grant Colfax, presented an update on "universal testing" in all of the City SNF's. Colfax
 indicated on May 19 that there were a total of 29 COVID infections at LHH 18 staff and
 11 residents up from a total of 7 cases on March 27. It's thought that Colfax has not
 provided an update on the number of COVID infections at LHH since May 19.
- During the Mayor's many daily COVID press conferences during April and May, it is thought Dr. Colfax has never reported just how many patient deaths have occurred in San Francisco SNF's since the pandemic began.

Given the data COVID-19 data CMS reported on its web site as of June 7 for San Francisco's 19 SNF's (attached on the next page), please comment on the following anomalies:

1. Since Dr. Colfax appears to have last reported on May 19 during your press conference that LHH only had 29 COVID infections at LHH — 18 staff and 11 residents — please indicate how in just 18 calendar days LHH went to having 71 confirmed cases — 46 staff and 25 residents — between May 20 and June 7, which represents a 144.8% change increase across those 18 calendar days.

- 2. Please indicate how the total number of staff and patient COVID cases rose to a total of 172 cases across all 19 SNF's by June 7, given that that Dr. Aragón had ostensibly locked down all of the SNF's to visitors as early as two months earlier in mid-March.
- 3. Given that CMS reports a total of 18 COVID-related deaths in San Francisco SNF's through June 7, please comment on why Drs. Colfax and Aragón have not mentioned to date that those 18 deaths represent about 38% of San Francisco's now 48 COVID-related deaths as of June 22.
- 4. Please comment on why DPH's *COVID-19 Data Tracker* web site contains no information whatsoever on any of its various demographics sub-pages any information about COVID cases and data in San Francisco's SNF's. Since congregate living facilities pose one of the higher risks of COVID morbidity and mortality, the absence of this data reporting in San Francisco is disturbing.

Due to deadline considerations, your response by Friday, June 26 would be helpful and appreciated, as will any pointers to other sources and resources that may shed light on these issues for my readers.

Dear Board of Supervisors,

I write to you as a concerned physician in San Francisco. While I welcome any efforts to move people who are currently unhoused into individual housing units, I am concerned that the recent settlement with UC Hastings and the City and County of San Francisco may lead to street sweeps, further risking the spread of COVID-19.

To be clear, I encourage all efforts to bring as many people experiencing homelessness into individual housing units as possible. With recent outbreaks of COVID-19 in homeless shelters, such as at MSC South, it is crucial to move with the greatest urgency to house people experiencing homelessness in non-congregate settings.

At the same time, as a health care worker, I know the value of harm reduction strategies. In the era of COVID-19, if people experiencing homelessness cannot be housed in a way that allows social distancing, sanctioned encampments that include sanitation measures, distancing, and support services are an important harm reduction strategy. The Fulton Street sanctioned encampment is an important harm reduction strategy and should not be closed, particularly as experts predict a likely second wave in the fall.

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) has given clear guidance: "Unless individual housing units are available, do not clear encampments during the community spread of COVID-19" as this can cause people to disperse, break connections with providers, and increase the spread of COVID-19. Clearing sanctioned encampments without having individual housing units available may lead to exactly this type of spread. In addition, the UC Hastings lawsuit settlement may lead to clearing of unsanctioned encampments and even further spread

COVID-19.

As a health care worker, I know how important housing is to health and the importance of harm reduction strategies. I urge you to do everything within your power to house all members of our community in individual housing units but never to resort to clearing of encampments.

As a former resident of Japantown and current community member, I urge you to support the \$25 million allocation for the Japantown Peace Plaza currently included in the proposed Health and Recovery Bond Measure. My husband is a small business owner in Japantown and my daughter attends the preschool there, Nihonmachi Little Friends. My father-in-law also worked at the local grocery store there pre-covid 19, we all used to live in Japantown, and we are members of the JCCCNC center there as well. As a 4th generation Japanese American, Peace Plaza is an important space for us as a community and for our future generations.

The Japantown community has waited nearly 20 years for the space to be properly repaired and to create an open space that appropriately reflects the priorities of our residents, community organizations, businesses and visitors.

As you are aware, the Peace Plaza is the only open space in Japantown and is deeply symbolic of the plight and struggles of San Francisco's Japanese American community. This project is particularly meaningful for the Japantown community because the Peace Plaza area was once occupied by Japanese American residents and businesses. After being forcibly removed and incarcerated by the military during World War II, the Japanese American community was forced out a second time by the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency. The eviction of our community resulted in the loss of a staggering amount of wealth for the families and businesses who had no choice but to accept whatever sale price was offered for their property.

While our community does not dwell on the fact that the city forcibly acquired ownership of the area where the Peace Plaza was built, we do feel that San Francisco has a responsibility to take care of the space. We understand that San Francisco has many urgent priorities, but our community is adamant that we have been more than patient and it is time for this city to address this matter. The residential base of our community may never return to this area and having the means to bring people back is critical to the economy of this neighborhood. Having an open space which addresses the needs and represents the character of Japantown is vital to the long-term sustainability of this community.

absolutely necessary starting point. The historic Fillmore area is almost completely covered with high-injury intersection and corridors. All intersection surrounding Buchanan Mall is a high-injury corridor. Webster Street which is a half block West and runs parallel with Buchanan Mall is listed as a high injury corridor. Turk Street which passes through the heart of the Fillmore and the middle of Buchanan Mall is a high-injury corridor. Last year the Board of Supervisors declared a State of Emergency on Pedestrian and Bicyclist injuries and these intersections and corridors were identified as areas with concentrations of severe/fatal pedestrian injuries. The Buchanan Mall is surrounded by public housing and senior centers which has a high concentration of youth, families and seniors. Buchanan Mall creates a urgent need and opportunity to create safe walking spaces for residents to play, walk, exercise, travel and get fresh air.

The Fillmore has long felt the blunt of racist transportation policies that prioritized more white and affluent residents in the Richmond and Sunset District over those in the inner city. In fact, the first "Urban Renewal" project in the Fillmore/Western Addition was designed to widen Geary Blvd in order to provide residents of the Richmond District a more efficient way of reaching their jobs in the downtown area of San Francisco. As a result, thousands of Black and Japanese residents were displaced in the 1960s and hundreds of businesses bulldozed. 108 acres were bulldozed, of which 37 acres were streets, 43 acres were residential, and 15 acres were for commercial or industrial uses. The 2nd phase of Urban Renewal bulldozed 40 square blocks, which is when Buchanan Mall was built. The Fillmore was one of the most walkable neighborhoods in the 1960s and this was destroyed by racist government policies.

Today the corridors in the Fillmore are used for high-speed traffic so residents can fly through the Fillmore to get to work and back from the Richmond District, Sunset and other affluent neighborhoods. The Buchanan Mall has long been neglected and never truly realized as a way to mitigate the communities' risk for pedestrians. Now is the time to fully commit to the Buchanan Mall through investment to help undo years of racist government policies in the Fillmore.

I'm writing to ask that the \$18 million allocated for Citywide Parks in the current proposal of the 2020 Health and Recovery Bond be allocated entirely to McLaren Park.

COVID-19 has impacted the neighborhoods surrounding McLaren Park most heavily, with rates of infection double those of the citywide average. We know that providing safe convenient access to open space is a critical strategy for managing the spread of COVID-19, and as a way to help people stay emotionally and psychologically healthy during the stress of this pandemic.

Golden Gate Park is filled every day with pedestrians, cyclists, and groups of friends socializing in a safe and healthy fashion because it is 1) easy to access from each adjacent neighborhood, and 2) amenity rich -- convenient and clean restrooms, bike racks, signage and attractions are in every area of the park.

McLaren Park, in contrast, remains relatively neglected, isolated from transit, topographically separated from neighborhoods, inadequately signed, and with an underdeveloped circulation network to allow and encourage

safe, predictable, comfortable movement across the park. In 2017, the Recreation and Park Commission adopted a McLaren Park Vision plan that identified and described a series of improvements that could remedy these persistent issues, finally making the park accessible to all.

A \$1 invested in Golden Gate Park will barely make a difference for park users already able to enjoy that amazing open space. That same \$1 investment would yield \$20 worth of impact this year at McLaren Park. Please consider increasing the budget allocated to McLaren Park from \$6 million to \$18 million so that substantive progress can be made towards realizing the goals of the McLaren Vision Plan.

Black Lives Matter has brought to national attention the struggles that BIPOC individuals and communities experience to feel safe and welcome across all types of public open spaces that white Americans enjoy without second thought. Parks are no exception, and it is an obvious statement of San Francisco's geography that the west side of the city enjoys easy safe access to an extraordinary array of open spaces, from Lake Merced, to Ocean Beach, to Golden Gate Park and the Presidio.

McLaren Park is the only open space on the east side of the city that approaches the scale, grandeur, and reach of those west side spaces. I'm encouraged to see that Crocker Amazon and Herz Playground have both been allocated funding for improvements, but would be discouraged to see those investments offered as a rationale for continued neglect of McLaren Park.

This is a moment to push for investment in the southeast's open spaces equal to the substantive, persistent, and celebrated investments of San Francisco's marquee parks.

If the 2020 Health and Recovery G.O. Bond is to live up to its title, each proposed allocation needs to be evaluated for: 1) Timeliness - when and how long will it take for the community to enjoy this benefit? 2) Improved health outcomes - does this investment support neighborhoods hit hardest by COVID-19?

3) Impact - does this investment expand needed access, or simply refresh existing resources? McLaren Park scores highly by any of these criteria.

On behalf of the San Francisco Japantown Foundation, we urge you to support the \$25 million allocation for the Japantown Peace Plaza currently included in the proposed Health and Recovery Bond Measure. The proposed redesign and renovation was initiated by a former board member of our foundation, the late Mr. Bob Hamaguchi and we believe it is time for Japantown to have an open space that appropriately reflects the priorities of our residents, community organizations, businesses and visitors.

As you are aware, the Peace Plaza is the only open space in Japantown and is deeply symbolic of the plight and struggles of San Francisco's Japanese American community. This project is particularly meaningful for our community because the Peace Plaza area was once occupied by Japanese American residents and businesses. After being forcibly removed and incarcerated by the military during World War II, the Japanese American community was forced out a second time by the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency. The eviction of our community resulted in the loss of a staggering amount of wealth for the families and businesses who had no choice but to accept whatever sale price was offered for their property.

My family operated a hotel where the Peace Plaza is located today and were among the businesses that were forcibly evicted during redevelopment. It was not possible to reestablish our family's hotel after being forced out by the San Francisco Redevelopment Agency and the current proposal to redesign and renovate the plaza is a long, overdue gesture to acknowledge the damage that was done to Japantown.

We understand that San Francisco has many urgent priorities, but our community has waited nearly 20 years to properly renovate the plaza and it is time for this city to address this matter. The residential base of our community may never return to this area and having the means to bring people back is critical to the economy of this neighborhood. Having an open space which addresses the needs and represents the character of Japantown is vital to the long-term sustainability of this community.

We urge you to support the full \$25 million current allocated for Peace Plaza in the Health and Recovery bond.

Dear Supervisors:

I am writing on behalf of Grow Potrero Responsibly asking for your support of Jackson Park as a named project in the 2020 Health and Recovery Bond with an allocation of a minimum of \$10 million.

Our organization has long advocated for investment in the "complete neighborhoods" promised to us in the Eastern Neighborhoods Plan. Comprised of large swaths of formerly industrial land recently converted to housing, and historically home to underserved communities, Potrero Hill has never had the amenities such as open space and recreational facilities enjoyed in other residential neighborhoods. We are shouldering the burden of thousands of new housing units, yet we've never received adequate funding for our neighborhood park.

After years of neglect, Jackson Park is in increasingly poor condition, heavily used by growing numbers of neighbors and athletes from throughout the City. Because the Eastern Neighborhoods Plan failed to provide adequate funding for infrastructure, the Friends of Jackson Park, led a campaign to leverage private funds with the expectation that the Park would be on a 2020 parks bond.

Arguably the neighborhood should not be forced to secure private funding for its public park. Nonetheless, the Friends of Jackson Park, following the recommendation of SFRPD, raised \$9 million in pledges from local businesses and real estate developers. With an additional \$8 million in IPIC funding and a project that will be shovel-ready, it is this bond money that would bring the project to fruition.

Now, during the pandemic, our community has grown to rely on our neighborhood park for health and healing. To delay funding will mean it could be years before renovations could begin.

Frankly, Jackson Park's omission as a named project is egregious given the neighborhood's best efforts to secure amenities that others take for granted. Our neighborhood's need for better open spaces has been overlooked for too long now. The need is urgent. The goal of a renovated park that serves our community is tenable only if it's included on the Bond.

My name is George Omi. I am here today to urge you to support to its full amount, the 25 million dollar allocation for the Japan Town Peace Plaza, currently included in the proposed Health and Recovery Bond Measure.

I was born in 1930, to Japanese immigrant parents, and was raised in San Francisco during the Great Depression. I grew up in the Japanese Town of old, until the War began, when all of us of Japanese ancestry, were forcibly evicted from California.

Four years later, many of us returned to San Francisco from internment camps. It took several years for stores like Nichi Bei Bussan, Honnami Taiheido, Uoki Sakai, Seiki Brothers, Soko Hardware, Takahashi Trading and Aki Hotel to return to business again.

But then came the Redevelopment Agency with Eminent domain, and the demolition of streets, hotels, restaurants and stores, followed by the rise of the Miyako Hotel, the mall, the Peace Plaza and the Pagoda.

But soon, the newness of the Plaza wore off with an un-repairable leakage of water, from the Plaza to the subterranean garage below. The plaza was gradually stripped of its adornments: reflecting pools, arcade and eternal flame, and instead of a place for meditation and worship, it became a place for community gathering.

Today, the plaza is the only open space in Japan Town and has become a center piece of activity, the heart and soul of Japanese Town, where people of San Francisco and the Bay Area, and visitors from all over the world, come to celebrate and enjoy its festivals, arts and crafts, literature and foods of Japan.

Of particular import is that Japan Town's Cherry Blossom Festival and Parade is one of the most popular of all festivals in the City and draws more than 200,000 people annually. Unfortunately, the plaza is in dire need for repair.

Last year, through public meetings and hearings in JapanTown, the Park & Recreation Department, together with the Department of Public Works, developed a site plan for renovation, which satisfied the community. 

Dear Supervisors:

To meet the needs of a quickly growing residential community, the Potrero Boosters Neighborhood Association requests that you dedicate at least \$10 million to Jackson Playground as a named project in the 2020 Health and Recovery Bond.

Construction continues apace on the hundreds of housing units within one-half mile of Jackson Playground ("Jackson"). Jackson cannot adequately satisfy current neighborhood demand, and its renovation is a key mitigation in the Eastern Neighborhoods Plan rezoning. If Jackson does not receive timely funding in this bond cycle, its untenable condition will further deteriorate, leaving thousands of members of our community without adequate open space and Recreation and Parks programming.

Indeed, our community's need has been demonstrated during our ongoing shelter in place, as Jackson is regularly packed with our neighbors seeking outdoor exercise. It should not have taken COVID-19 for Jackson to become a true neighborhood-serving park.

Jackson meets the investment priorities identified by the San Francisco Recreation and Park Department ("SFRPD"). Specifically:

• Jackson is located in a high growth area. Jackson is centrally located in the area zoned for high density, mixed-use development in the Eastern Neighborhoods Plan, and its renovation was identified as a necessary mitigation under that plan. Several mixed-use developments are under construction within one block of Jackson, and more are under construction, entitled or being entitled within half a mile of the park.

- Renovation of Jackson would address safety issues. The clubhouse facility at Jackson is in ill repair and poor seismic condition, and its bathrooms are not ADA compliant. The lack of unprogrammed community-serving space often results in our neighbors encroaching on the fields while games are being played, creating a safety risk. Playground equipment is regularly damaged, and often goes weeks without repair.
- Renovation will enhance Jackson's role as a multi-use community facility. Jackson's sports fields serve the whole of the City. Its clubhouse is the site of a popular afterschool program. Its playground and fields are used daily by the school across the street. While Jackson provides these services, it lacks unprogrammed open space and non-sports programming desperately needed for the whole of the community. A renovation would enhance Jackson's City-wide strengths while allowing it to better serve the surrounding neighborhood.
- Jackson is deficient and many of its facilities are in poor condition. While many of Jackson's deficiencies (both physical and programmatic) are outlined elsewhere in this letter, we would further point out that the baseball and softball fencing is aging and its bleachers are beyond their useful life. There are drainage issues within the facility, and areas where runoff spills directly onto the surrounding sidewalks.
- Jackson will be shovel-ready when bond funds become available. Friends of Jackson Park ("FoJP") has spearheaded the design of a new Jackson, working in concert with SFRPD to judiciously refine the needs of the neighborhood into an actionable design. FoJP has conducted significant public outreach, and the major hurdle to finalizing the design is having the clear top-line budget number that the parks bond would establish.
- Jackson has raised significant outside funding. FoJP has worked tirelessly to raise funds for a Jackson renovation, with over \$9 million in pledges from local developers and businesses. FoJP has successfully lobbied for \$8 million from the Interagency Plan Implementation Committee through the Eastern Neighborhoods Citizens Advisory Committee. With an additional \$10 million in funding from the bond, SFRPD will be able to deliver a new Jackson.

In sum, Jackson clearly meets SFRPD's investment priorities.

Moreover, the renovation of Jackson would serve as a leadership model for community involvement in parks planning. FoJP has prudently spent a small fraction of the money it's raised to conduct significant community outreach, synthesizing needs and developing a comprehensive renovation design. FoJP has worked hand-

in-hand with SFRPD in refining the design to better reflect budgetary realities and City priorities.

The Potrero Boosters Neighborhood Association has been involved in many parks planning processes, both with SFRPD and with other planning partners. The process led by FoJP in partnership with SFRPD is notable is that it has been consistently smooth and productive. Completing the process—completing the park renovation—would show how well a public-private partnership may work to the benefit of the community.

But for that to happen, 2020 Health and Recovery Bond must specifically name Jackson Playground and dedicate at least \$10 million to its renovation.

Please take this step to ensure that our growing neighborhood has the facilities it so desperately needs.



Hello Mayor Breed and City Supervisors,

As a resident of district 10 for over a decade and a parent of 2 young children, I have seen the evaporation of many young families in our neighborhood since my first child was born 4 years ago. Much of this is simply the lack of public amenities which aim to accommodate long term residents and in particular families with children, i.e. decent and accessible parks. Having a simple playground with some green space is a basic need which our neighborhood is hard pressed to find, and one which I would hope and expect the city would support. During the shelter in place, that missing amenity has become ever more important as we've been asked to maintain locally. I urge the city and those making these decisions to recognize there are areas of San Francisco, in the eastern neighborhoods, which have been rapidly growing in population due to previously instituted zoning for increased density, yet are still largely lacking basic amenities needed to service these growing populations.

See the SF planning map (2014) which listed Jackson park as a priority from the eastern neighborhoods plan. We have yet to see dedicated improvements pursued by the city which the neighborhood has been working tirelessly to be prepared. Designs and permitting processes are well underway, but without the completed funding arm we may not have the capacity to realize what was envisioned. At the same time, all the housing density approved by the eastern neighborhoods plan is finally being realized where we are seeing projects adjacent and within 2 blocks adding over 1000 new residents. Beyond growht this is in an area identified in dire need for recreation access (found from online sources 2011) Jackson park falls in the middle of a RED zone of poor access to public recreation.

We need this park to be improved and to be capable of accommodating the needs of it's existing and growing resident population, please consider this with all seriousness for yet another life line of continued residential and community livability.




Like many residents of San Francisco, I love this city, but I struggle to find grounds for optimism in its future. Wealthy homeowners have made our city unaffordable, dysfunctional, and inequitable. We have one of the largest budgets per capita, yet utter squalor in the heart of our downtown. Everyone is getting squeezed out, except the uber-rich.

I'm writing today about something very particular: the way we blindly privilege our police. I'm sick of seeing overpaid, under-trained officers turn regular interactions in our city into flashpoints of fear, discrimination, and violence.

Earlier this week, I woke up to the sounds of breaking glass at 4am. Looking out the window, I saw firefighters pulling out shattered panes of glass in a generations-old corner store, cleaning up what some vandal did overnight. Two police cars blocked the road next to the firetruck, lights flashing. Three officers stood by, watching the firemen work, without another soul in sight.

Why am I as a taxpayer funding armed guards to idly watch firemen repairing broken windows? Why do officers harass our unhoused residents who have nowhere to go? Why do we grant total impunity to officers who shoot to kill in San Francisco? Why do we spend more than half a BILLION dollars and rising every year on the wasteful and harmful actions of SFPD, especially against Black people?

I want to some leader, any leader, to step up and enact meaningful reforms:

Reduce the police budget by at least 25% this year (not the pathetic 3.7% cut proposed earlier this month). Stop feeding the fire, and reallocate those resources to community needs, like addressing the housing crisis.

Require civil lawsuits against police officers to be paid from their pension funds. Officers, like any other society member, should face consequences for misconduct.

- Withhold pensions for cops involved in excessive force incidents.
- Suspend the use of paid administrative leave for cops under investigation.
- Stop re-hiring police officers with misconduct and excessive force records.

Any elected or appointed leader should immediately return donations from the San Francisco Police Officers Association (SFPOA). It should be disqualifying for someone like Paul Henderson (who directs the Department of Police Accountability) to receive <u>four figure donations</u> from SFPOA.

Will our leaders step up to meaningfully reform the shock troops our community pays for in blood and money? If not now, in this moment, then when?

My name is Abby Murray, and I'm writing in support of the city's ongoing efforts to shift resources away from policing and toward community services and infrastructure - especially alternatives to policing (social services, mental health and medical resources), and affordable housing, childcare, and education.

I moved to San Francisco three years ago to work in affordable housing. As a newcomer, the dire humanitarian crisis on our streets shocked me to my core, especially the fact that the majority of unhoused people on our streets are black and people of color. I watched myself slowly become acclimated to this "new normal," feeling helpless. The housing and homlessness crises have felt intractable. I know how incredibly expensive and slow and complicated it is to address these problems. But as our nation has confronted COVID, and protests calling for rapid and meaningful change to policing in America and anti-Black racism, I have been encouraged by the steps San Francisco's leadership has taken. Thank you all for your actions at this time. At the same time, I feel incredibly strongly that we *must* seize this moment to make large scale, dramatic systems changes that can meaningfully move the needle to creating the kind of equitable society that America should be.

I hope that your 2021 budget will reflect a commitment to, and investment in, the idea that safe communities of opportunity are not created through policing alone - but through economic opportunity, education, and community resources. I respect the role of the police, but believe the city's budget for SFPD is not in balance with other critical investments that we need. And I see the comments from my neighbors on Nextdoor, complaining about the homeless encampment on Geary and 17th, or incidents with people suffering mental episodes, and the break ins, and other issues. I know you have to address the concerns of these neighbors. But I truly hope that you can do so by considering what will actually solve these issues, not just hide them from the view of wealthier residents.

I know that budget reallocation alone can't solve homelessness or fix the enormous wealth and opportunity gap. I understand the SFPD budget was

\$611M last year, which translates to fewer than 900 units of new affordable housing (not including the ongoing services and operations). But - I want you to know that I support seizing this moment to imagine new and equitable systems, and creating a budget driven by community investment, not "law and order". Please continue your work to invest in affordable housing and set an example of integrating racial justice and investment in black and low-income communities with our budgetary priorities.

My name is Maggie Walters, and I am a resident of San Francisco. I am writing to you today to demand that you immediately redirect funding from the San Francisco Police Department towards BIPOC communities.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

- 1. Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
- 2. Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.
- 3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.
- 4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.
- 5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.
- 6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

- 1. Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
- 2. Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.
- 3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.
- 4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.
- 5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.
- 6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.

My name is Raha Hashemi, and I am a resident of San Francisco . I am writing to you today to demand that you immediately redirect funding from the San Francisco Police Department towards BIPOC communities.

The senseless killings of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Tony McDade, and countless others have demonstrated the infuriating prevalence of police violence and brutality in communities across America. While these events are devastating, they should not come as a surprise. Since the 1600s, policing has been a tool to enforce the social order — an order that oppresses and brutalizes BIPOC Americans.

For too long, policy-makers and law enforcement have upheld a system founded upon racialized fear to brutalize and devastate BIPOC communities. Additionally, most policing reforms (e.g. implicit bias training, diversification, and enhanced accountability) fail to address the root problems inherent to policing, as demonstrated by the implementation (and clear failure) of these programs in the Minneapolis Police Department.

Thus, I am demanding that you take the following actions immediately:

- 1. Defund the San Francisco Police Department by reinvesting 50% of this budget in BIPOC communities, collaborating with leaders from these communities to identify areas of need (including, but not limited to healthcare, housing, and education). This could mean transforming the role of first responders for most calls, social workers, mental health experts, and community leaders have the right expertise to solve the problem, as seen in Dallas.
- 2. Abolish qualified immunity and other legal protections for police officers who have committed acts of violence. Nearly every single officer involved in racialized violence has never faced serious punishment. Hold officers to the same legal standard as the rest of the citizenry and punish these acts of unnecessary violence.
- 3. Demilitarize the local police force immediately. This includes, but is not limited to, stopping the deployment of excessively militarized police (especially in the ongoing demonstrations), restricting police departments from using federal grant money for military weaponry, returning whatever military equipment has already been received, banning no-knock raids, and restricting the use of SWAT teams.
- 4. Open investigations into all officers with reports of police abuse and release body counts for all officers.

- 5. Cut all ties between the San Francisco Police Department and local public schools.
- 6. Ban ICE from all protests and gatherings in San Francisco.

These actions are only first steps. Racialized police brutality is a systemic problem that requires federal, state, and local action, and I am demanding that you do your part. Black Lives Matter.

At this moment of extraordinary transformation, as across the nation statues are coming down and murals are going up and the very face of the nation is changing to greet the rising non-white majority generation and affirm that Black Lives Matter, our city is scarred and scored with the names of some monstrous racists. This might be a good time to change some place names.

Of course most of what's named after individuals in this city is, with a few exceptions, is named after white men; some of them—Saint Francis himself for example—are beneficent, and some are mixed. For example John C. Fremont ordered killings of Native Americans and Mexicans and helped steal California from Mexico, but he was also the first Republican candidate for president and ran on an antislavery platform four years before Abraham Lincoln did the same. Others—Millard Fillmore, for example—are so lost in the mists of time that their names mean other things, and there's a reclaiming to how Fillmore now means the great Black neighborhood at the heart of the Western Addition, or did.

But I salute the city for taking Phelan's name off a street a little while ago and replacing it with Frida Kahlo's. And there are a few names that should really go.

General Funston committed hideous human rights abuses in the Philippines and then did much to burn down San Francisco in the hours and days after the 1906 earthquake, by regarding the public as an enemy and himself and his soldiers as competent firefighters, which they were not. So Fort Funston is a federal decision, but could we please rename Funston Street after, say, one of this city's greatest and most forgotten heroines, Mary Ellen Pleasant (1814-1904), the ex-slave, Underground Railroad operative, and civil rights activist who sued to integrate the city's streetcars?

Of course Columbus Avenue is problematic for reasons that hardly need stating. Wouldn't it be beautiful to rename it after Jose Sarria (1922-2013), aka Empress Jose aka the Widow Norton, who was a trailblazing out gay leader—and candidate for the Board of Supervisors in 1961, first out gay candidate for elected office in the nation and maybe the world, and who was both a beloved role model, performer, and as founder of the Imperial Court system, philanthropist? Sarria's public career began at the Black Cat Café, just off Columbus.

Sutter Street was named after John Sutter, and what prompted me to write to you is the taking down of a statue of Sutter in Sacramento, though I've been thinking about all this for a long time. Sutter enslaved vast numbers of Native Californians to build himself an empire in the central valley, sold and gave away other Native Californians, and he is said to have sexually exploited a large number of very young Native girls.

It's not my decision, but I thought it might be a good moment to bring up the names I've been reflecting on for decades. Jose Sarria and Mary Ellen Pleasant seem like the two city heroes most deserving of further commemoration.

Dear Mayor Breed,

Mad Mob SF is a grass roots group of people with lived experience in the mental health system. To fight stigma, members openly identify as consumers, patients, clients, survivors, people with mental health challenges, disabilities, barriers, mad gifts or mental illness. We support consumer-directed mental health care and recovery services, the full integration of people with mental health disabilities into our society, and stable dignified housing for all. We ally with others who are directed by these core principles. Mad Mob SF opposes all forms of discrimination. We know that systemic racism has caused all kinds of harm, including mental health distress and our members have first have knowledge about how to remedy it.

Mayor Breed, we too want the police out of all non-criminal matters, especially those involving people identified as mentally ill, the homeless and those needing care for substance abuse problems. Mad Mob SF calls for an end to the role of law enforcement as first responders in the civil commitment "5150" process, as well as the conduct of "well-being" checks in our residences and on our streets. Police carry guns and other weapons and are hired and trained to enforce criminal laws. They have proven ill- equipped to interact with people in mental health crisis and don't belong in our schools.

The data indicates at least 25% of all police killings involve people in a mental health crisis. As with law enforcement killings in general, those killed by the police during mental health crises are disproportionately people of color, more often Black. We now have a real opportunity to remedy this injustice by getting the police out of crisis intervention. Full implementation of this reform will ensure that everyone involved in a mental health crisis walks away alive and that all people in distress have a real opportunity to get the care they want and need.

As you noted in your June 11th press conference, there are already well-established models in our country which provide a proven alternative to calling the police such as the Crisis Assistance Helping Out On the Streets - CAHOOTS. Based in Oregon, the CAHOOTS system of over 30 years relies on trauma-informed de-escalation and harm reduction. Under the model, instead of police, highly trained plain-clothed paramedics and mental health workers are dispatched in a van with a dove on the side for calls such as welfare checks or potential overdoses. Mad Mob endorses this type of model as it helps avoid unnecessary physical and emotional trauma and recognizes that the patient is the expert in their own situation and that voluntary resources are the best way to help. Clinical staff employ "unconditional positive regard" which means complete support and acceptance for the people they encounter. This is consistent with one of Mad Mob's

mantras, "Nothing About Us Without Us!" Given the urgency, existing programs providing similar services to the unhoused and people in crisis should be augmented immediately.

Because of the long history of broken promises to Black people and people diagnosed as mentally ill, there is a compelling need for transparency, accountability and effective oversight. These goals can only be accomplished if the real stakeholders direct the planning and implementation of this program and public officials make a full commitment to the infrastructure necessary to provide support and services to people in need in San Francisco. Mad Mob SF stands ready to make sure that this happens.

Mayor Breed, we request that at your next press conference you describe what immediate and specific actions you have or are taking to get law enforcement out of mental health matters and the timeline for completing them. People in such dire need cannot wait for the creation of a "systemic response plan" over the next year. This is an emergency which calls for action now. 




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

June 2020 Demographics Report





Dear Ms. Calvillo:

The American Staffing Association submits the following comments regarding the above-referenced legislation. ASA represents California's staffing firms. In 2018, these firms placed almost 3 million temporary and contract employees in California, many of whom worked in San Francisco City and County and bridged to permanent employment with staffing clients.

The proposed legislation would create a right to reemployment for eligible employees who were laid-off after the city declared a state of emergency following the outbreak of Covid-19. If such right were construed to apply to temporary assignments, the proposed legislation would have an extremely negative impact on temporary and other workers whose employment is, by nature, flexible and unpredictable, and *whose assignments can last for as little as one day*. We do not believe that this is the intent of the legislation and, for the avoidance of doubt and to avoid destroying short-term job opportunities, we request that the legislation specifically exempt temporary assignments.

Staffing firms employ temporary and contract employees and assign them to clients to fill in for absent employees or provide extra support during busy times or seasons. The following example illustrates how, if interpreted to apply to temporary assignments, the bill could lead to unintended and harmful results.

• A hotel's front desk employee calls in sick. The legislation would require the employer to ask former employees to fill in. Since many former employees have the skills to answer phones and perform administrative tasks, for a large employer, this could require asking many former employees whether they would want to return to work. Such requirement makes no sense because, by the time the hotel asks and hears back from these employees, the workday likely would be over, no one would have covered for the sick employee, and his duties would have gone unfulfilled.

Such a requirement makes little sense and we do not believe that is the Board of Supervisors' intent. Thus, for the avoidance of doubt, we urge you to amend the legislation by:

Adding the following to Section 6. Employer's Obligation to Make Offer of Reemployment to Eligible Workers Following Layoff:

(b) Offer of Reemployment Following Layoff to Similar Position. Where an Employer has initiated a Layoff after the Beginning of the Public Health Emergency and subsequently seeks to hire a person to any position that is substantially similar to the Eligible Worker's Supervisor former position and the position is also located in the City, an Employer shall first offer the Eligible Worker an opportunity for reemployment to the substantially similar position before offering the position to another person. For the purpose of this Section 6, a "substantially similar position" includes any of the following: a position

with comparable job duties, pay, benefits, <u>duration</u>, and working conditions to the Eligible Worker's position at the time of Layoff; any position in which the Eligible Worker worked for the Employer in the 12 months preceding the Layoff; and any position for which the Eligible Worker would be qualified, including a position that would necessitate training that an Employer would otherwise make available to a new employee to the particular position upon hire.

I am a San Francisco resident and I am writing to strongly urge you to OPPOSE THE NOMINATIONS OF NANCY TUNG AND GEOFFREY GORDON-CREED TO THE POLICE COMMISSION.

I urge you to follow the recommendation of the Rules Committee to reject these nominees. Following 7 hours of hearings & public testimony, the vast majority of which was in opposition to the nominations of Nancy Tung and Geoffrey Gordon-Creed, the residents of San Francisco have made it clear that they demand nominees who better reflect San Francisco values as well as a desire for police accountability and real change.

Nancy Tung has taken positions contrary to the views and values of most San Franciscans and should not represent us on the Police Commission. Geoffrey Gordon-Creed is not qualified to serve on the Police Commission: he has no record of engaging on criminal justice issues or of representing communities impacted by policing policies.

Nancy Tung supported Proposition H, which would have STRIPPED THE POLICE COMMISSION OF THE POWER TO OVERSEE TASER USE-OF-FORCE POLICY. This neutering of civilian oversight is what drove Chief Scott and many other public safety leaders to oppose the proposition. We need Commissioners who respect the Police Commission, not people who support legislation to undermine the Commission. Gordon-Creed took no public position on Proposition H.

NANCY TUNG CONTINUES TO SUPPORT GIVING TASER WEAPONS TO SF POLICE OFFICERS, despite SF voters overwhelmingly rejecting deadly Taser weapons in 2018. Tasers do not replace guns, they replace descalation tactics; they are used in addition to and more broadly than guns. A UCSF Study found that deploying tasers in California cities INCREASED use of force and in-custody deaths. Nancy Tung is out of step with the majority of San Franciscans on adding yet another deadly weapon to our streets. A google search for Geoffrey Gordon-Creed "taser" reveals no results.

NANCY TUNG OPPOSES CLOSING SAN FRANCISCO'S JUVENILE HALL, even though the U.S. Department of Justice has documented human rights abuses at San Francisco's facility. Housing children in cages is 2,660% more expensive than utilizing restorative justice approaches. We need Police Commissioners who recognize that children don't belong in cages. GORDON-CREED HAS NO RECORD ON JUVENILE LAW ISSUES and no published position on closing Juvenile Hall.

As a candidate for District Attorney, Nancy Tung ACCEPTED MONEY FROM THE POLARIZING AND CONSERVATIVE POA. She even accepted \$500 from RYAN CROSBY, WHOSE EXTREME RACIAL AND GENDER BIAS RESULTED IN A LAWSUIT AGAINST THE CITY. The POA is a far-right organization that regularly condones heinous acts of police violence and trafficks in racist fear-mongering. By accepting their money, Tung made clear that she can NEVER be trusted to hold SFPD officers ACCOUNTABLE. The POA DOES NOT REFLECT SAN FRANCISCO VALUES like tolerance, compassion, and diversity, but I do, and I hope you will, too.

NANCY TUNG OPPOSED ENDING CASH BAIL, which incarcerates people on the basis of wealth and reinforces racial disparities in San Francisco's criminal justice system. Gordon-Creed has never written or spoken publicly about cash bail.

Nancy Tung has repeatedly OPPOSED PROSECUTING POLICE OFFICERS WHO WERE INVOLVED IN SHOOTINGS of San Francisco residents to date. AS WE'RE SEEING NOW IN MINNEAPOLIS, FAILING TO HOLD LAW ENFORCEMENT ACCOUNTABLE IS DETRIMENTAL TO PUBLIC SAFETY. We need Police Commissioners who recognize that a community's trust in law enforcement depends on how accountable law enforcement is to the community. There are no public statements from Gordon-Creed regarding the deadly shootings of Mario Woods, Luis-Gongora Pat, Alex Nieto, Jessica Williams or any other person killed by the SFPD.

We NEED civilian Police Commissioners who are INDEPENDENT from the Police Department they are supposed to monitor. We need Police Commissioners who will exercise meaningful independent oversight over the Police Department, especially with respect to disciplinary action.

San Francisco deserves Police Commissioners who not only represent the diversity of our city and prioritize victim's rights, but can also serve as an independent check on the police department. I am writing on behalf of the Safer Inside Coalition, in support of the ordinance proposed by Mayor London Breed and Supervisor Matt Haney to amend the Health Code to authorize overdose prevention programs (OPPs). These OPPs will be legally sanctioned facilities where people are able to use pre-obtained drugs in a clinical setting with expert medical supervision and sterile supplies.

Safer Inside is a community coalition dedicated to advocating for supervised consumption services, or overdose prevention programs, in San Francisco. Coalition members include Glide, St. Anthony's Foundation, Drug Policy Alliance, HealthRIGHT360, San Francisco AIDS Foundation, San Francisco Drug Users Union, Gubbio Project, and Harm Reduction Coalition, among others. The coalition grew out of a community process to address substance use and discarded syringes in the Tenderloin. We have provided education and opportunities for discussion throughout the Tenderloin and the rest of San Francisco, particularly the Safer Inside educational display at Glide, attended by thousands of individuals.

This proposal for supervised consumption at OPPs would extend the harm reduction strategies already in use in San Francisco, and is designed to further reduce the health and societal problems associated with drug use. San Francisco has a strong history of creating innovative programs to provide access to sterile syringes to

prevent HIV, hepatitis C, and other infectious diseases, broaden the use of the lifesaving drug naloxone, and expand effective substance use disorder treatment programs such as medication assisted treatment. OPPs would build on that historic effort.


OPPs have been extensively evaluated to show an incredible benefit to people who use drugs, their families, their neighborhoods, and the community at large. Providing people who use drugs with a community of care saves costs due to a reduction in the transmission of infectious disease, overdose and overdose death, and reliance on law enforcement, courts and jails, emergency rooms, and related medical services. A 2016 study found that every dollar spent in San Francisco on an OPP would generate \$2.33 in savings, for a total annual net savings of \$3.5 million for a single 13-booth facility. Given the current budget shortfalls in San Francisco, this makes more sense than ever.

Studies on the impact of Insite—Vancouver's first supervised injection facility—have shown that it reduced discarded syringes in the streets, the number of people injecting in public, and led to reduced instances of needle sharing in addition to their thousands of referrals to community-based services, research also shows no associated local increase in the number of people who use drugs, drug trafficking or consumption crimes, or relapse rates, and not a single fatality at the OPP Studies from other countries, too, have yielded similar results. Additionally, OPPs address inequity around drug use by providing the most marginalized individuals who use drugs on the streets or in other risky conditions with the dignity and privacy often only available to those with the financial means to a home.

San Francisco wants and needs these programs. In 2017, the Board of Supervisors convened a task force to review the issue, and the task force unanimously recommended moving forward with the programs to improve public health and safety in San Francisco. Polling in San Francisco has shown strong support for these services, with the most recent poll from the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce and Dignity Health finding that 77 percent of San Franciscans polled supported opening OPPs, an increase from 67 percent support the previous year Earlier this year, the San Francisco Chronicle editorialized that "Legislators and the governor should back San Francisco's efforts to stem the scourge of drug addiction with a carefully monitored indoor injection site.

It is more necessary than ever to move forward with opening OPP in San Francisco. The covid-19 public health crisis and the actions to prevent its spread have highlighted the need for more services for people who use drugs in San Francisco. The increase in deaths, primarily overdose deaths, among unhoused people in San Francisco points to the need for more overdose prevention efforts. OPPs provide additional opportunities to reach people at great risk of covid-19 transmission with health education, sanitary supplies, and safer conditions.

It is imperative that we switch the modus operandi around drug use toward one of health and inclusion. By directing resources spared from criminalizing people who use drugs, we can create systems that heal rather than exacerbate the wounds of our community. We firmly believe in the value of OPPs and the positive impact they offer to San Francisco as a whole. We are grateful for the leadership of Mayor Breed and Supervisor Haney in introducing this ordinance. We respectfully request your AYE vote in support of this important legislation. It is widely documented that black and brown people are disproportionately affected by the criminal justice system. I support the Smarter Sentencing Act because:

Please consider this formal notice that our local cannabis permits at 150 Potrero (YMCM LLC) are no longer operational: T0060CF, T0061MF, T0074DF. Please confirm no other action is required on our part. Also be advised that we have submitted a request to the California Bureau of Cannabis Control to cancel our microbusiness state license at this location.

We think it is important to also take this opportunity to provide critical feedback to the City of San Francisco (SF) regarding unnecessary limitations legal cannabis businesses face that are more prohibitive than other industries. It is our hope that our feedback will lead to changes that help evolve and improve the SF cannabis program, creating viable, longterm, business opportunities for all legal cannabis operators. We implore you to hear our story and internalize this as you consider the ramifications for our industry, the negative impact on equity applicants, small businesses and PDR jobs, and be open to making changes for the future.

NorCal Cannabis has been operating compliantly in the legal SF cannabis space since permitting began in SF. We were here before SF put Article 16 in place, when the Department of Public Health (SFDPH) trailblazed to create legal opportunities for cannabis businesses ahead of any other city in California. Businesses like ours started in 2015 with the specific intent of building something legal and compliant. Because of the work SFDPH was doing, we chose to invest in SF and the future cannabis program. We are actively involved in providing input to all decision makers related to local cannabis laws and regulations especially from a business operations point of view. We have advocated tirelessly at all levels of SF government for fair cannabis policy. Most importantly we've employed hundreds of people under our equity plan, providing healthcare, livelihoods and upward mobility.

Unfortunately, our expectations and efforts have not worked out as hoped. The closure of YMCM is not an isolated incident, it is the second business we have closed in SF since Article 16 was launched. The closure of YMCM reaffirmed for us that laws and regulations continue to unnecessarily limit business opportunities.

At the point we recognized it was time for us to move on from YMCM, like any business we explored an exit strategy by reaching out to multiple parties, including equity applicants, to determine interest in taking over the cultivation, manufacturing and distribution business. Ultimately, the restriction on selling or transferring ownership beyond 49% of a cannabis permit resulted in the inability to successfully sell or transfer our business to any potential new owner or operator and is ultimately resulting in it's closure.

Because of SF limits on ownership transfers, we had no viable business opportunities to pass this fully operational, legal cannabis business to a new owner. The inability to sell or transfer our permit results in two important impacts to the SF community.

1. Lost Opportunity for Equity Applicants to Acquire an Operational Business.

In our City, two of the biggest obstacles equity applicants face is access to real estate and capital needed to build their business. After putting over \$2.5M into the development of this space over the last 4 years, we had both to offer. We would have proudly passed this business along to an equity applicant for as little as \$0, but based on current city obstacles, instead of being able to transfer our permit to someone who could use it immediately, the City's laws make this a no-win scenario for everyone.

2. Loss of PDR jobs.

The inability to transfer or sell this license comes at loss to the residents of SF who lose access to already rare manufacturing jobs and opportunities in SF as more and more manufacturing-type businesses (PDR) struggle with the difficulties of SF's economic environment and move to less expensive places to operate or are driven out of business completely.

While we believe in the intent of the Equity Program, those intentions have not come to fruition except for a small handful. While we understand ownership transfer limitations were created to protect equity businesses, our situation demonstrates this needs to be revisited and reconsidered. Not only were equity businesses unable to take advantage of our situation, but transfer restrictions will also limit their businesses from similar opportunities in the future if they decide it's time for them to move on. The best outcome for businesses and SF would be a pathway for businesses that have overcome the initial hurdles of permitting and licensing to have a path to transfer ownership to a party that will keep the business operational.

In addition, the reality of physical displacement through gentrification and the unreasonable restrictions surrounding relocation of existing businesses is creating huge inequities. All San Franciscans are familiar with the struggles of our real estate market where small businesses are often pushed out by landlords raising rent or redeveloping. The realities for pre-existing cannabis businesses are consistent with the small business community but the difference is that the City does not allow cannabis businesses to move to a new location. We can't forget that the pre-existing MCDs are the business who pioneered medical cannabis and the City's now infamous compassion programs which served thousands of chronically ill patients who needed cannabis. Our policies should help these businesses survive, even as the cannabis industry evolves and grows to include prioritizing growth from within the community of equity applicants currently in the pipeline.

I understand this struggle intimately because our business currently faces the reality of displacement at two permitted locations in SF that we have been operating legally since before Article 16, one that is a nonstorefront delivery business (in District 3) and the other a microbusiness (in District 10) specializing in cultivation.

I believe the policies governing business displacement and relocation are not aligned with the Board of Supervisors intent in their development of SF's cannabis program and Article 16 and should be revisited. The following changes would go a long way towards realigning SF's cannabis program:

 Legislative updates are needed to evolve Article 33 to address business struggles if Article 16 applications cannot be processed in a more timely manner for existing operators due to current tiered priority ranking required by law.

Nonstorefront and Storefront Retail are still locally permitted by the SFDPH under Article 33. It is time for the City to recognize that the original expectations surrounding timelines for transitioning from Article 33 to Article 16 are completely off track. This reality means that requirements under Article 33, which was once thought to be on the fast track for outgoing policy, needs to evolve to ensure the business health of existing businesses operating under Article 33. Without immediate action, current business limitations will perpetuate the struggle and eventual extinction of the businesses responsible for being the foundation of legal, compassionate cannabis businesses in SF.

2. Allow existing MCDs to relocate with more reasonable requirements.

After years of commitment to operating legally and compliantly with huge financial outputs, we will be left with nothing because we cannot relocate. Because of SF restrictions, when we lose our lease, due to our landlord's decision to redevelop the property, our business has no viable path forward to continue operating in a new location. Current requirements to relocate our MCD nonstorefront business include finding a location that has, or had, an active dispensary open within the past 18 months-3 years, and being a verified equity applicant. Ideally, fair policy would require that we be held to the same planning standards as those businesses who were offered temporary permits under Article 16 instead of having to achieve a higher bar that is frankly unrealistic due to a lack of available locations that were previously permitted, and allow businesses that were created before the equity program the same opportunity to relocate with a robust equity plan, instead of verified equity applicant status.

While we understand that SF cannabis laws and regulations were thoughtfully created, the expectation was that the program would evolve to address unforeseen needs and impacts. We have arrived at the time that unintended consequences of certain restrictions are smothering the ability of businesses to succeed in a changing economic environment. We hope that SF works quickly and creatively with operators to implement changes to provide people and businesses, including the equity community, a real opportunity for long term business success, including changes to ownership transfers and relocation requirements as discussed in this letter.

Subject: Changes to the Minimum Compensation Ordinance (MCO) and Health Care

Accountability Ordinance (HCAO) - Effective July 1, 2020

Please see updates below to San Francisco's Minimum Compensation Ordinance (MCO) and the Health Care Accountability Ordinance (HCAO) effective July 1, 2020.

The MCO generally requires City Contractors, and tenants at San Francisco International Airport to pay a minimum hourly wage rate to their covered employees.

Effective July 1, 2020, the following are the rates for the MCO:

For contracts entered into or amended on or after October 14, 2007

- MCO For-Profit Rate is \$18.24/hour
- MCO Non-Profit Rate is \$16.50/hour
- MCO Public Entities Rate is \$16.50/hour

For contracts entered into or prior to October 14, 2007

- For work performed with the City of San Francisco, vendors must pay no less than the San Francisco Minimum Wage (\$16.07/hour effective 7/1/20)
- For work performed outside of San Francisco, vendors must pay \$10.77/hour

The HCAO generally requires City Contractors, and tenants at San Francisco International Airport to offer health insurance to their covered employees, or to pay a fee to the City for use by the Department of Public Health (DPH). The HCAO requires DPH to adjust this fee rate annually in response to the most currently available data on statewide HMO premium rate changes.

DPH has determined that the fee that must paid by employers in lieu of providing health insurance that meets the minimum standards shall increase to \$5.60 per hour per employee (capped at \$224 per week) effective July 1, 2020.
