1	[Charter Amendment - Department of Sanitation and Streets, Sanitation and Streets Commission
2	and Public Works Commission]
3	Describing and setting forth a proposal to the voters at an election to be held on November
4	3, 2020, to amend the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco to create the
5	Department of Sanitation and Streets to succeed to specific duties currently performed by
6	the Department of Public Works; to create a Sanitation and Streets Commission to oversee
7	the Department of Sanitation and Streets; to create a Public Works Commission to oversee
8	the Department of Public Works; and to require an annual performance audit and cost
9	and waste analysis for both departments; and affirming the Planning Department's
10	determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.
11	
12	Section 1. The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this
13	proposed Charter Amendment comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (California
14	Public Resources Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of
15	the Board of Supervisors in File No. 200510 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board
16	affirms this determination.
17	
18	Section 2. The Board of Supervisors hereby submits to the qualified voters of the City
19	and County, at an election to be held on November 3, 2020, a proposal to amend the Charter of
20	the City and County by revising Sections 3.104, 16.129, and F1.102, adding Sections 4.138,
21	4.139, and 4.141, and revising and renumbering Section 4.130 as Section 4.140, to read as
22	follows:

25	Asterisks (* * * *) indicate the omission of unchanged Charter subsections.

2	SEC. 3.104. CITY ADMINISTRATOR.
3	* * * *
4	The City Administrator shall have power to:
5	6. With the concurrence of the Mayor, appoint and remove the directors of the
6	Departments of Administrative Services, Solid Waste, <u>and Public Guardian/Administrator</u> , and
7	Public Works, and such other department heads which are placed under his or her the City
8	<u>Administrator's</u> direction;
9	* * * *
10	
11	SEC. 4.138. DEPARTMENT OF SANITATION AND STREETS.
12	(a) Establishment. There shall be a Department of Sanitation and Streets, which
13	shall come into existence three months after the Transition Date for the Sanitation and Streets
14	Commission in Section 4.139(d). The Department shall be headed by the Director of Sanitation
15	and Streets, who shall be qualified by either technical training or management experience in
16	environmental services or the maintenance, sanitation, or cleaning of public spaces; and shall
17	have a demonstrated knowledge of best practices regarding cleaning and maintenance of high-
18	traffic or publicly accessible areas. The Department shall assume all responsibilities previously
19	under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Works that pertain to the duties specified in
20	subsection (b).
21	(b) Duties. Except as otherwise provided in the Charter or pursuant to Section
22	4.132, in addition to any other duties assigned by ordinance, the Department shall have the
23	following duties:
24	(1) efficient and systematic street sweeping, sidewalk cleaning, and litter
25	abatement;

1	(2) maintenance and cleaning of public restrooms in the public right of way;
2	(3) provision and maintenance of city trash receptacles;
3	(4) removal of illegal dumping and graffiti in the public right of way;
4	(5) maintenance of public medians, and of street trees in the public right of
5	way pursuant to section 16.129;
6	(6) maintenance of City streets and sidewalks;
7	(7) construction, repair, remodeling, and management services for City-
8	owned buildings and facilities; and
9	(8) control of pests on City streets and sidewalks.
10	The Board of Supervisors may limit, modify, or eliminate the duties set forth in
11	subsections (1) through (8), and may transfer any of those duties to the Department of Public
12	Works or other City departments, by ordinance approved by two-thirds of the Board. Nothing in
13	this Section 4.138 shall relieve property owners of the legal responsibilities set by local or State
14	law, including as those laws may be amended in the future.
15	(c) Refuse Collection and Disposal Ordinance. The Director of Sanitation and Streets
16	shall perform the responsibilities assigned to the Director of Public Works by the Refuse
17	Collection and Disposal Ordinance of November 8, 1932, as it may be amended from time to
18	<u>time.</u>
19	(d) Administrative Support. By no later than the Transition Date in Section 4.139(d),
20	the Board of Supervisors shall by ordinance require the City Administrator, the Department of
21	Public Works, and/or any other City department to provide administrative support for the
22	Department, which shall include but need not be limited to human resources, performance
23	management, finance, budgeting, technology, emergency planning, training, and employee safety
24	services. At any time more than two years and three months after the Transition Date, the Board

1	of Supervisors may adopt ordinances requiring the Department of Sanitation and Streets to
2	assume responsibility for some or all of that administrative support.
3	(e) Transition.
4	No later than July 1, 2022, the City Administrator shall submit to the Board of
5	Supervisors a proposed ordinance amending the Municipal Code, including but not limited to the
6	Public Works Code, to conform to Sections 3.104, 4.139, 4.140, 4.141, 16.129, F1.102, and this
7	Section 4.138, as adopted or amended by the voters at the November 3, 2020 election.
8	
9	SEC. 4.139. SANITATION AND STREETS COMMISSION.
10	(a) Purpose. There is hereby established a Sanitation and Streets Commission. The
11	Commission shall set policy directives and provide oversight for the Department of Sanitation
12	and Streets.
13	(b) Membership and Terms of Office.
14	(1) The Commission shall consist of five members, appointed as follows:
15	Seats 1 and 2 shall be appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the
16	Board of Supervisors. Each nomination shall be the subject of a public hearing and vote within
17	60 days. If the Board of Supervisors fails to act on a nomination within 60 days of the date the
18	nomination is transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the nominee shall be deemed
19	confirmed. Seat 1 shall be held by a person who is a small business owner. Seat 2 shall be held
20	by a person with experience in project management.
21	Seat 3 shall be appointed by the Controller subject to confirmation by the Board
22	of Supervisors. The nomination shall be the subject of a public hearing and vote within 60 days.
23	If the Board of Supervisors fails to act on a nomination within 60 days of the date the nomination
24	is transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the nominee shall be deemed confirmed.
25	Seat 3 shall be held by a person who has a background in finance and audits.

1	Seats 4 and 5 shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors. Seat 4 shall be held
2	by a person who has a background in either urban forestry, urban design, or environmental
3	services. Seat 5 shall be held by a person with significant experience in cleaning and
4	maintaining public spaces.
5	(2) Members of the Commission shall serve four-year terms; provided,
6	however, the term of the initial appointees in Seats 1 and 4 shall be two years.
7	(3) Members may be removed at will by their respective appointing officer.
8	(c) Duties. With regard to the Department of Sanitation and Streets, beginning three
9	months after the Transition Date in subsection (d), the Commission shall exercise all the powers
10	and duties of boards and commissions set forth in Sections 4.102, 4.103, and 4.104, and may
11	take other actions as prescribed by ordinance. In addition, the Commission shall:
12	(1) review and evaluate data regarding street and sidewalk conditions,
13	including but not limited to data collected by the Department, and annual reports generated by
14	the Controller;
15	(2) establish minimum standards of cleanliness for the public right of way,
16	and set baselines for services to be administered by the Department;
17	(3) approve all contracts proposed to be entered into by the Department,
18	provided that the Commission may delegate this responsibility to the Director of the Department,
19	or the Director's designee;
20	(4) perform an annual cost analysis evaluating whether there are
21	inefficiencies or waste in the Department's administration and operations; and
22	(5) perform an annual review on the designation and filling of Department
23	positions, as exempt, temporary, provisional, part-time, seasonal or permanent status, the
24	number of positions that are vacant, and at the Commission's discretion, other data regarding
25	

1	the Department's workforce. This function shall not in any way limit the roles of the Civil
2	Service Commission or the Department of Human Resources under the Charter.
3	(d) Transition provisions.
4	(1) The Commission shall come into existence on the Transition Date, which
5	shall be either July 1, 2022 at noon or an earlier date established by the Board of Supervisors by
6	written motion adopted no later than January 1, 2022. The Mayor, Board of Supervisors, and
7	Controller shall make initial appointments to the Commission by no later than three months
8	before the Transition Date. The terms of all five members shall commence at noon on the
9	<u>Transition Date.</u>
10	(2) The Commission shall have its inaugural meeting by no later than 30 days
11	after three members of the Commission have assumed office.
12	(3) The Director of Public Works or person serving in an acting capacity as
13	<u>Director of Public Works, at the time the Commission comes into existence, shall perform the</u>
14	duties of the Director of the Department of Sanitation and Streets in an acting capacity until the
15	Commission appoints a new Director in accordance with the Charter provisions governing
16	appointment of a department head serving under a commission.
17	
18	SEC. <u>4.140</u> 4.130. DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS.
19	Except as otherwise specified in the Charter, including in Section 4.138(b)(7), The duties
20	and functions of the Department of Public Works shall design, build, and improve the City's
21	infrastructure and public right of way, and assume any other duties be-assigned by the City
22	Administrator, by ordinance or pursuant to Section 4.132. <u>The Department shall be headed by</u>
23	the Director of Public Works, who shall be qualified by either technical training or management
24	experience in engineering or architecture.

1	SEC. 4.141. PUBLIC WORKS COMMISSION.
2	(a) Purpose. There is hereby established a Public Works Commission. The
3	Commission shall set policy directives and provide oversight for the Department of Public
4	Works.
5	(b) Membership and Terms of Office.
6	(1) The Commission shall consist of five members, appointed as follows:
7	Seats 1 and 5 shall be appointed by the Board of Supervisors. Seat 1 shall be held
8	by a registered professional engineer licensed in the State of California, with a background in
9	civil, mechanical, or environmental engineering, and Seat 5 shall be an at-large position.
10	Seats 2 and 4 shall be appointed by the Mayor subject to confirmation by the
11	Board of Supervisors. Each nomination shall be the subject of a public hearing and vote within
12	60 days. If the Board of Supervisors fails to act on a nomination within 60 days of the date the
13	nomination is transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the nominee shall be deemed
14	confirmed. Seat 2 shall be held by a registered architect licensed in the State of California, and
15	Seat 4 shall be an at-large position.
16	Seat 3 shall be held by a person with a background in finance with at least 5
17	years in auditing experience, appointed by the Controller subject to confirmation by the Board of
18	Supervisors. The nomination shall be the subject of a public hearing and vote within 60 days. If
19	the Board of Supervisors fails to act on a nomination within 60 days of the date the nomination is
20	transmitted to the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, the nominee shall be deemed confirmed.
21	(2) Members of the Commission shall serve four-year terms; provided,
22	however, the term of the initial appointees in Seats 1, 3, and 5 shall be two years.
23	(3) Commissioners may be removed from office at will by their respective
24	appointing authority.
25	(c) Powers and Duties.

1	(1) With regard to the Department of Public Works, beginning on September
2	1, 2022, the Commission shall exercise all the powers and duties of boards and commissions set
3	forth in Sections 4.102, 4.103, and 4.104, and may take other actions as prescribed by
4	ordinance.
5	(2) The Commission shall oversee the Department's performance, including
6	evaluation of data collected by the Department, the Controller, and other City agencies.
7	(3) The Commission shall approve all contracts proposed to be entered into
8	by the Department, provided that the Commission may delegate this responsibility to the
9	Director of Public Works, or the Director's designee.
10	(4) The Commission shall require the Director of Public Works, or the
11	Director's designee, to provide the Commission with proof of adequate performance of any
12	contract entered into by the Department, based on written documentation including
13	documentation that work has been inspected and approved by the appropriate City departments
14	or officers.
15	(5) The Commission shall perform an annual review on the designation and
16	filling of Department positions, as exempt, temporary, provisional, part-time, seasonal or
17	permanent status, the number of positions that are vacant, and at the Commission's discretion,
18	other data regarding the Department's workforce. This function shall not in any way limit the
19	roles of the Civil Service Commission or the Department of Human Resources under the
20	<u>Charter.</u>
21	(d) Transition provisions.
22	(1) The Mayor, Board of Supervisors, and Controller shall make initial
23	appointments to the Commission by no later than noon on June 1, 2022. The Commission shall
24	come into existence on either July 1, 2022 at noon, or noon of the date that three members of the
25	Commission have assumed office, whichever is later. The terms of all five members shall

1	commence at noon on July 1, 2022, regardless of when the Commission comes into existence.
2	The Board of Supervisors may by ordinance modify the dates set forth in this subsection (a).
3	(2) The Commission shall have its inaugural meeting by no later than three
4	months after the terms of the initial members begin.
5	(3) The Director of Public Works at the time the Commission comes into
6	existence shall remain in that position unless removed from it in accordance with the Charter
7	provisions governing removal of a department head serving under a commission. If a person is
8	serving in an acting capacity as Director at the time the Commission comes into existence, the
9	preceding sentence applies, except that the position shall also be considered vacant for purposes
10	of the next sentence. If the position of Director is vacant for any reason, including removal of
11	the incumbent Director, the position shall be filled in accordance with the Charter provisions
12	governing appointment of a department head serving under a commission. In that event, a
13	person removed from the position under the first sentence of this subsection may be considered
14	for appointment to the position.
15	
16	SEC. 16.129. STREET TREE MAINTENANCE.
17	(a) Definitions. For purposes of this Section 16.129:
18	* * * *
19	"Maintenance" (and its root "Maintain") shall mean those actions necessary to
20	promote the life, growth, health, or beauty of a Tree. Maintenance includes both routine
21	maintenance and major maintenance. Routine maintenance includes adequate watering to ensure
22	the Tree's growth and sustainability; weed control; removal of Tree-well trash; staking;
23	fertilizing; routine adjustment and timely removal of stakes, ties, Tree guards, and Tree grates;
24	bracing; and Sidewalk repairs related to the Tree's growth or root system. Major maintenance

includes structural pruning as necessary to maintain public safety and to sustain the health,

1	safety, and natural growth habit of the Tree; pest and disease-management procedures as needed
2	and in a manner consistent with public health and ecological diversity; and replacement of dead
3	or damaged Trees. Pruning practices shall be in compliance with International Society of
4	Arboriculture Best Management Practices and ANSI Pruning Standards, whichever is more
5	protective of Tree preservation, or any equivalent standard or standards selected by the Director
6	of the Department of Sanitation and Streets Public Works.
7	* * * *
8	"Street Tree" shall mean any Tree growing within the public right-of-way, including
9	unimproved public streets and Sidewalks, and any Tree growing on land under the jurisdiction of
10	the Department of Public Works or the Department of Sanitation and Streets. "Street Tree" does
11	not include any other forms of landscaping.
12	* * * *
13	(g) Beginning in fiscal year 2018-2019, the City may suspend growth in the City's \$19
14	million contribution to the Fund under subsection (f) of this Section 16.129 if the City's
15	projected budget deficit for the upcoming fiscal year at the time of the Joint Report or Update to
16	the five-year financial plan as prepared jointly by the Controller, the Mayor's Budget Director,
17	and the Board of Supervisors' Budget Analyst exceeds \$200 million adjusted annually by
18	changes in aggregate discretionary revenues as defined in subsection (f) of this Section 16.129.
19	(h) Administration and Use of the Fund. The Department of <u>Sanitation and</u>
20	<u>Streets</u> Public Works shall administer the Fund. Monies in the Fund shall only be used for the
21	following purposes:
22	(1) Maintenance and Removal of Street Trees;
23	(2) Necessary costs of administering the Fund; and
24	

1	(3) Making grants totaling up to \$500,000 annually to the San Francisco Unified
2	School District exclusively to fund Maintenance and Removal of Trees on School District
3	property.
4	* * * *
5	(i) Annual Reports. Commencing with a report filed no later than January 1, 2019,
6	covering the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018, the Department of <u>Sanitation and Streets</u> Public
7	Works shall file annually with the Board of Supervisors, by January 1 of each year, a report
8	containing the amount of monies collected in and expended from the Fund during the prior fiscal
9	year, and such other information as the Director of the Department of <u>Sanitation and</u>
10	<u>Streets</u> Public Works, in the Director's sole discretion, shall deem relevant to the operation of this
11	Section 16.129.
12	* * * *
13	
14	F1.102. STREET, SIDEWALK, AND PARK CLEANING AND MAINTENANCE.
15	(a) The Services Audit Unit shall conduct annually a performance audit of the City's
16	street, sidewalk, and public park maintenance and cleaning operations. The annual audit shall:
17	(1) Include quantifiable, measurable, objective standards for street, sidewalk,
18	and park maintenance, to be developed in cooperation and consultation with the <u>Department of</u>
19	Sanitation and Streets, the Department of Public Works, and the Recreation and Park
20	Department;
21	* * * *
22	(b) The Services Audit Unit shall conduct annually a cost and waste analysis evaluating
23	whether there are inefficiencies or waste in the administration and operations of the Departmen
24	of Sanitation and Streets, and the Department of Public Works or inefficiencies or waste in the
25	division of labor between the two departments. The annual audit shall make quantifiable,

1	measurable recommendations for the elimination of inefficient operations and functions, and
2	shall include:
3	(1) Consolidation of duplicative and overlapping activities and functions;
4	(2) Integration and standardization of information maintenance systems that
5	promote interdepartmental sharing of information and resources;
6	(3) Departmental accounting for expenditure of resources in terms of effectiveness
7	of the service or product delivered;
8	(4) Departmental deployment and utilization of personnel, the City's personnel
9	procurement system, and reforms to enhance the quality of work performance of public
10	employees; and
11	(5) Methods of operation to reduce consumption and waste of resources.
12	(\underline{bc}) In addition, all City agencies engaged in street, sidewalk, or park maintenance
13	shall establish regular maintenance schedules for streets, sidewalks, parks and park facilities,
14	which shall be available to the public and on the department's website. Each such department
15	shall monitor compliance with these schedules, and shall publish regularly data showing the
16	extent to which the department has met its published schedules. The City Services Audit Unit
17	shall audit each department's compliance with these requirements annually, and shall furnish
18	recommendations for meaningful ways in which information regarding the timing, amount and
19	kind of services provided may be gathered and furnished to the public.
