Our city has been at the forefront of much of this action -- I was at the impressively large protest on June 3rd that started in front of Mission High and several since then.

SFPD has been a waste of our resources. Last year, the SFPD budget was \$611,701,869, the majority of which comes from the San Francisco general fund. While we've been spending extraordinary amounts on policing, we have not seen improvements to safety, homelessness, mental health, or affordability in our city. Instead, we see wasteful and harmful actions of our police. In 2017, I worked at a (now defunct) startup, RideAlong, aimed at improving the response of police to mental health crisis calls by giving PDs a way to share information & resources, emphasizing de-escalation and alternatives to taking people to ERs and jails as responses. Board & Mayor,

There's been a lot of important conversation lately about rethinking public safety, decreasing the use of sworn officers and redirecting funds from the SFPD towards better uses.

I want to bring your attention to something that's happening in Berkeley, which has received coverage in the <a href="NYTimes">NYTimes</a> and <a href="SF Chronicle">SF Chronicle</a>. The city council will be considering a plan to shift traffic enforcement duties from Berkeley Police to civilianized positions in a new organization ("BerkDOT").

I strongly encourage you to work on making this happen in San Francisco. Traffic enforcement stops make up 52% of police contacts nationwide. They have been part of the stories in the killings of Black Americans such as Philando Castile, Sandra Bland, and Maurice Gordon.

In San Francisco, the numbers are clear and <u>have been reported</u>. I took a look at the latest data from the SFPD on traffic enforcement, <u>available on their website</u>.

- Black motorists make up over 17% of traffic enforcement stops, despite making up only around 5% of the San Francisco population.
- Black and Hispanic motorists account for **70% of traffic violation stops that result in a police** search.
- Black and Hispanic motorists account for 61% of traffic violation stops that result in an incustody arrest.

San Francisco's <u>Vision Zero website</u> says that "law enforcement will help create safe, livable streets in San Francisco." Safety, for who, though? As someone who cares deeply about transportation equity and safe streets, trying to address unsafe traffic conditions with a law enforcement system rooted in racism and violence is simply trading one kind of harm for another.

Thank you for the great discussion of the SFPD budget at the Board of Supervisors meeting today. I live and work in District 9, and I was able to make a 1-minute comment during the meeting, but I would ask that you please enter the full 2-minute statement into the record:

Good afternoon, Supervisors, Chief Scott, and city staff. My name is Sanjay Wagle, and I live and work in San Francisco, in District 9. Thank you for your presentations and discussion, and thank you for your service to our city.

I live just 4 blocks from where Alex Nieto was killed by San Francisco police in Bernal Heights Park.

I am calling to request that the City enact substantial cuts to SFPD's budget and to redirect that funding to public health, mental health, housing, education and other services for our communities.

As we heard, SFPD's budget has increased by about 60% - or over \$200M/year - over the past 10 years. Imagine if we had invested that much in housing, transit, education and healthcare instead.

I am grateful for Chief Scott's comments on reforming SFPD and shifting from a warrior to a guardian mindset. But the fundamental problem is structural: we are asking SFPD to do so many jobs that we should have asked others to do. We need

to shift resources to programs that are better placed to build up the health and safety of our communities.

We especially need to reinvest in communities that have been targeted for over-policing and over-imprisonment, including Black and other People of Color, and the unhoused. As was previously mentioned, Black people make up just 5% of San Francisco's population, but account for 35% of our homeless population, 54% of our jail population — and 40% of people killed by police.

Cutting SFPD's budget will not result in chaos. Less than 5% of SFPD calls are in response to violent crime. Most calls are related to public health, unhoused people, traffic, and noise complaints.

These are \*not\* jobs that armed police do well. These are \*not\* jobs armed police should be doing.

To quote the SF Public Defender, Mano Raju, "A much smaller, much altered police department and policing model is what San Franciscans are calling for and the current moment demands, nothing less."

I plan to vote based on how our Supervisors and our Mayor take action to redirect funding from SFPD to reinvest in community health and safety for all San Franciscans.

Thank you so much for your attention to this important subject.

My name is Maggie, and I live in San Francisco.

The time is now to defund the SFPD and redirect funds towards public health, housing, and reparations for communities that have been most targeted by policing and imprisonment, including Black, Indigenous, and People of Color, trans communities, and the unhoused. If you go to <a href="DefundSfpdNow.com">DefundSfpdNow.com</a> there is a list of specific, concrete cuts you can make right now.

We need to reimagine what Public Safety For All looks like.

The American police system was designed to protect wealthy white people, and rarely upholds the dignity and rights of marginalized communities. The SFPD budget has exploded in the last two years, growing by more than \$100 million dollars. We could house every unhoused person in the city with the SFPD budget. We could provide top-level community assistance and mental health resources for those in need with that money.

The facts show that the SFPD disproportionately targets the Black community.

- Black people make up just 5% of San Francisco's population, but account for 35% of our homeless population, 54% of our jail population and 40% of people who are killed by police. If Black Lives Matter, let's house Black families, not murder them.
- Black and latinx residents together make up 20% of the city's population, but they accounted for 78% of all
  individuals booked or cited for drug sales in 2017. Meanwhile Salesforce is celebrated for boosting the profits of
  white-owned pharmaceutical companies.
- In 2019, Black students made up 43% of all SF school district youth that were arrested, cited, or detained at school, despite being only 7% of the student body.

This Board is considering making racially motivated 911 calls illegal, which I think is a fantastic idea. But we need to go beyond that and change how the city interacts with the Black community.

We are not asking for chaos, but public safety for all. I think that would be the true reflection of the San Francisco spirit. We must defund SFPD and refund our communities.

My name is Gabrielle Tañedo, and I live and work in the Tenderloin, San Francisco. I'm emailing today, because like many others, I am calling for the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to DEFUND, DISARM, and DISBAND SFPD.

Please reallocate to public schools, extra curricular activities for disadvantaged youth, public libraries, public gardens, music programs, computer science, dance lessons, art programs. Please invest in our children, OUR city's future! Please please.

The history of policing is clear. American policing began with slave patrols. Modern-day policing was a response to the rise of labor unions. Today, less than 5% of SFPD calls for service are seeking response to violent crime. Most calls are related to public health, unhoused people, traffic, and noise complaints. And yet, police continue to respond violently to all issues across the board.

Chaos is 20,000 people living on the street, people dying because they can't afford healthcare, and Black individuals making up 5% of our city but 40% of our jails.

Given the global outrage against police killings and brutality, we in San Francisco have an opportunity to dramatically change the way we protect our communities. It is evident that slashing the police budget is an important way to accomplish this goal.

The police are an institution whose main goal and purpose is to protect private property and the rich who own the wealth. Abolishing the police without abolishing the profit system it protects will only result in the privatization of the same type of armed forces that currently exists.

By drastically slashing the SFPD budget, we can both transfer and fund services that currently fall under the police duties to other departments who are better trained to handle areas such as mental health and domestic violence to name just a few.

Disarming and demilitarizing the police is another way to reduce the budget and redirect funds to provide jobs, job training programs, housing, healthcare and education to the city's most underserved communities. We need to stop using taxpayers' money to weaponized the police who turn their arsenal against the community, especially the Black, Brown and houseless communities. We also need to recall their weapons immediately.

In addition to slashing the police budget, we need to make the department accountable to the people they serve. We should create an elected Civilian Review Board with the power to fire cops. There should be the establishment of an Independent Prosecutor, elected and separate from the District Attorney's office, to take action against police crimes.

San Francisco has a \$12.1 billion budget. This is a lot of money and we can do better in how we distribute the funds. Putting the working class of San Francisco first should

My name is Kathryn Majersky and I am a resident of San Francisco. I am commenting on the Budget and Appropriations Committee being held on 7/8/20, and in particular on the Hearing - Police Department - Budget Analysis.

Now, more than ever, we must move to defund the police. Policing at its core is a racist and violent system of managing communities. These often ineffective and harmful interventions must not be further funded. The San Francisco Police Department regularly escalates tension in street-level situations, and their policing tactics in marginalized and vulnerable communities must be stopped.

At a time when the city will face a budget shortfall due to COVID and other considerations, the Mayor is contemplating cuts across departments. These cuts will negatively impact essential programming and services; meanwhile, the police budget is bloated and this money would be better served in other city departments. I urge the Board of Supervisors to support appropriate cuts to the San Francisco Police Department so that other critical community services can be fully funded and even expanded. Anti-violence programming, including anti-violence shelter beds, are severely underfunded as it is. Defunding the police will free up funds to serve survivors of violence and will allow for the creation of additional intervention resources by trained mental health service and crisis de-escalation providers who can respond to incidents that the Police currently inflame and mismanage.

We must respond and align with the current movement to protect Black lives. We will be unable to do this until the police force is defunded. It is my hope that the appropriations committee will recommend that the Board respond to the concerns of San Francisco citizens by moving to defund this department.

### **RE:** Police Department - Budget Analysis

Dear Supervisor Fewer and Distinguished Members of the Budget and Appropriations Committee:

On behalf of GLIDE, I am writing in response to your hearing on the budget for the San Francisco Police Department. GLIDE is a leading social service provider in San Francisco's Tenderloin neighborhood; closing the civil justice gap is crucial for GLIDE's community. We have worked for decades to break cycles of poverty and marginalization for low-income San Franciscans, and we know that people thrive not by punishment but through education, opportunity, supportive services, and respect.

In many counties across the state, community organizations are successfully responding to emergency situations involving people experiencing a public health crisis, people who are unhoused, people experiencing a mental health crisis, people exposed to intimate partner or community violence, people who use substances chaotically, and people involved in natural or climate disasters. Despite their positive impact and the cost savings that community-oriented responses to emergencies present, San Francisco has done little to support and scale these efforts. Instead, law enforcement officers continue to respond to emergencies that would be better addressed by community organizations with trained peer support experts and interventionists, mental health providers, or crisis counselors.

In many instances, involvement by law enforcement officers increases the threat of feeling unsafe, risk of arrest or deportation, harm to the individual in crisis, and unnecessary costs including the time spent by the responding officers. The presence of armed officers can unfortunately quickly escalate a crisis. In worst case scenarios, officers use force in response to a person in crisis, resulting in unnecessary and unjust deaths and serious bodily injury to those who simply need the care and support of trained professionals.

People of color experience discrimination at every stage of the criminal legal system. They are more likely to be stopped, searched, arrested, convicted, harshly sentenced, and burdened with a lifelong criminal record and debilitating associated debt. Many of the worst tragedies of the criminal legal system—from the enforcement of slavery to current-day mass

incarceration—are inextricably linked to our nation's history personal and institutional discrimination based on race, class, gender, sexual orientation, and ability.

We must reimagine what public safety for all looks like so that young people of color, people with disabilities, people who are gender nonconforming, people who are likely to face disproportionate police contact, people who are formerly incarcerated, people with immigration status issues and people who are unhoused or homeless can safely access quality emergency services that are culturally appropriate and from trained professionals with relationships and a track record of service in their communities.

These vulnerable populations face significant barriers to engaging with law enforcement and other first responder personnel because of deep rooted fears and stigma generated by their status. In these circumstances, the presence of trained professionals from community-oriented organizations with a track-record of service can prove more beneficial than engagement from law enforcement officers.

As you evaluate the budget for the police department, we ask that funding be redirected to community programs that provide life-affirming and restorative resources for *all* San Franciscans, including those that provide child care and dependent care, education, food security, harm reduction, housing security, job development, mental health and physical health care, parenting resources, transportation assistance, and other interventions and supportive services. We also ask that funding be redirected toward reparations for communities that have been most targeted by policing and imprisonment.

I am shocked to learn that the SFPD's budget is still expected to be more than \$700 million. In the middle of the pandemic and an incredible economic crisis, the police must be defunded and these resources redirected towards social services such as education, mental health and employment training and transportation.

But, not only does the current budget not include reducing the department's budget, it is increasing by \$43 million!

We are cutting Muni lines that San Francisco residents need, especially low-income residents who are already being disproportionately harmed by Covid-19 medically and financially. Muni's fare losses to could be covered by defunding the police by \$168 million.

Further, the Mayor is cutting \$40 million from the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing and adding \$43 to the SFPD. - SFPD's annual budget keeps getting bigger yet this investment in policing hasn't made us safer. SFPD is a lethal threat to our Black & Brown communities. #DefundSFPD, #DefendBlackLives
- San Francisco's charter was written to protect the police, even if they don't protect our communities. We must eliminate the police requirement so our communities determine what resources we need. That way we can #DefundSFPD, #RefundOurCommunities and invest in us.
- For too long our city budget cuts funding for schools, parks, libraries, affordable housing, and more, all while increasing funding for police. Our communities need investment to keep us safe. #DefundSFPD
- To justify the growth of their bloated budget, the SFPD targets and criminalizes Black and Indigenous People of Color, poor people, trans people, and unhoused people. #DefundSFPD must happen alongside decriminalization and re-investment in these communities.
- Much of the SFPD's recent bloated growth has gone to specialized units, whose sole purpose is to harass our communities and help police encroach further into schools, hospitals, and

- transit systems. #DefundSFPD means decriminalizing our public spaces.
- San Francisco spends more per capita on policing than most major cities including New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, and Seattle. At the same time, our education spending per capita is HALF--or less-- than that of other major cities. #DefundSFPD and invest in youth.
- SF spends more on the police than on the Department of Children, Youth and Families, the Environment, Homelessness Services, the Human Rights Commission, and the Public Defender's office combined. Safety requires we #DefundSFPD and re-invest in community.
- In 1994—a time when our country's politicians labeled Black and Brown children "Super-Predators"— the voters of San Francisco passed a charter amendment to set a minimum police staffing level of 1,971 officers. To #DefundSFPD, we must amend the charter.
- The starting salary of a police officer is \$90K, while the starting salary of a teacher is only ⅓ as much. We have to invest in our youth, not just police them. #DefundSFPD

As family of Luis Góngora Pat we know of the **horror and trauma inflicted by police without ever seeing justice**. SFPD is a decadent and decayed institution. It's time to change.

By reimagining the \$700 million proposed police budget, we can do so much for our communities of color, young people, seniors, unhoused folks, and more. This includes investing in affordable housing, healthcare, community-led safety measures, and more. Each of these stand in stark contrast to the ways SFPD has unjustly targeted people of color and the most system impacted communities every single day.

Reimagining public safety would move us away from a reliance on police to respond to social issues, such as poverty, homelessness, and behavioral health challenges.

We join our community in demanding that this board votes to immediately significantly defund the SFPD and invest that money in a San Francisco that truly keeps people safe and works for all of us.

In just the past 13 months, we have had to pay out \$14.7 million dollars to settle lawsuits related to racism, sexism, and police brutality by SFPD officers.

In 2019, San Francisco Police Officers pointed their guns at San Franciscans 2.4 times EVERY DAY. And only 14 of those 868 times were in defense of self or others.

I am offering public comment on the police budget. I think it would be inappropriate to not allocate at least 35% of the SFPD budget away from the SFPD and towards more pressing budgetary concerns.

I understand that Chief Scott is pushing a narrative that reforms can only take place if their budget is maintained and I would like to push back against that narrative. I understand reforms may have made some improvements, but I believe that as a whole, the problems with policing are rampant enough to justify a drastic decrease in funding for SFPD. Reforms haven't worked in the large scale, SFPD spent tens of millions settling civil rights suits in just a year. In San Francisco, according to U.S. Census Bureau data, use of force fatalities still disproportionately affect black and hispanic populations.

While Chief Scott highlights the positions he says are 'integral to reform' as a significant part of the increase in SFPD budget over the last 10 years, the number of on the ground officers has also increased significantly, as shown in his own graphs. If the department is genuinely committed to reforms, the budgetary cuts could be targeted more towards on the ground officers and away from reform efforts.

Hi, my name is Christine. I live in D3 and represent the San Francisco chapter of the ACLU in joining the community today to ask the Board to defund SFPD.

By now, we all know the racist roots of policing in this country. The first police were slave patrols, and modern day policing was a response to the rise of labor unions. Today, here in San Francisco, Black people make up 5% of the population. But of the people killed by SFPD? A whopping 40% are Black. So police continue to be the very perpetrators of the violence that they claim to prevent, all while helping to drive gentrification in the city.

We fully support the demands for the city to reimagine public safety, as brought forth by the communities that have been most targeted by policing and incarceration — including Black, Brown, Indigenous, and poor people.

Marginalized communities will not be decriminalized until we defund the police. Decades of failed reforms show us that the only way to reduce police violence is to reduce police presence itself.

San Francisco spends more per capita on policing than most major cities, including Los Angeles and Chicago. SFPD is asking for more than \$700 million; we need that money to go directly to our communities and to life-affirming resources instead. Less than half of SFPD's proposed budget could house every single unhoused person in the city. And instead of militarizing police, let's invest in community-based violence prevention. Instead of disrupting student learning, let's fund student support staff and restorative justice programs.

We have a lot to build, and the good news is that there are communities with deep experience and bold ideas that are already doing some of the work. We urge the board to especially center Black and trans lives in creating a community investment and reparations plan. For a start, again — please defund SFPD. Thank you.

After listening into almost five hours of today's SDPD budget meeting without a chance to make a public comment, I'd like to pass on what I would have said here.

My name is Abigail Schott-Rosenfield. I live in District 7, and I've lived in the city my whole life. I support the demand shared by dozens of others on today's call to **Defund SFPD immediately** and share that money with SF communities instead.

It's been demonstrated again and again that police presence does nothing to keep the most vulnerable people in this city safe, and it's a violent policy to continue funding police instead of—just for example--supporting SF public schools who don't have even close to enough funds to pay teachers fair salaries, or cover basic classroom supplies so teachers don't have to buy them themselves, or give disabled kids the care and attention they need. My mom's been an SFUSD teacher for years and she STILL doesn't make as much as the starting salary of an SF police officer—and who does more to keep kids safe and well, teachers, or police?

Or we could talk about the ongoing homelessness crisis. Tripling the number of police officers who respond to homelessness hasn't done anything to help people find the food and shelter and healthcare they need to survive. **Criminalising homelessness at all is unjust, and we need to turn our attention to investing in affordable housing** to actually address the problem instead of just ignoring it.

Thank you for the great discussion of the SFPD budget at the Board of Supervisors meeting today. I live and work in District 9, and I was able to make a 1-minute comment during the meeting, but I would ask that you please enter the full 2-minute statement into the record:

Good afternoon, Supervisors, Chief Scott, and city staff. My name is Sanjay Wagle, and I live and work in San Francisco, in District 9. Thank you for your presentations and discussion, and thank you for your service to our city.

I live just 4 blocks from where Alex Nieto was killed by San Francisco police in Bernal Heights Park.

I am calling to request that the City enact substantial cuts to SFPD's budget and to redirect that funding to public health, mental health, housing, education and other services for our communities.

As we heard, SFPD's budget has increased by about 60% - or over \$200M/year - over the past 10 years. Imagine if we had invested that much in housing, transit, education and healthcare instead.

I am grateful for Chief Scott's comments on reforming SFPD and shifting from a warrior to a guardian mindset. But the fundamental problem is structural: we are asking SFPD to do so many jobs that we should have asked others to do. We need to shift resources to programs that are better placed to build up the health and safety of our communities.

We especially need to reinvest in communities that have been targeted for over-policing and over-imprisonment, including Black and other People of Color, and the unhoused. As was previously mentioned, Black people make up just 5% of San Francisco's population, but account for 35% of our homeless population, 54% of our jail population — and 40% of people killed by police.

Cutting SFPD's budget will not result in chaos. Less than 5% of SFPD calls are in response to violent crime. Most calls are related to public health, unhoused people, traffic, and noise complaints.

These are \*not\* jobs that armed police do well. These are \*not\* jobs armed police should be doing.

To quote the SF Public Defender, Mano Raju, "A much smaller, much altered police department and policing model is what San Franciscans are calling for and the current moment demands, nothing less."

I plan to vote based on how our Supervisors and our Mayor take action to redirect funding from SFPD to reinvest in community health and safety for all San Franciscans.

Thank you so much for your attention to this important subject.

16	attended by thousands of San Franciscans, including many families and children, peaceful
17	protestors came face-to-face with officers armed with flexible baton rounds and chemical

20	Berkeley, on the use of kinetic impact projectiles (KIPs) in crowd control: 3 percent of people
21	hit by KIPs, which include rubber bullets and tear gas canisters, die from their injuries; and
22	WHEREAS, The usage of rubber bullets and tear gas still continues despite the grave
23	health risk they pose; and
24	WHEREAS, Using tear gas in the war was banned during the Chemical Weapons
25	Convention of 1993, yet it is still allowed for use by law enforcement officers; and

1	WHEREAS, A New York Times article states "tear gas may cause damage to people's
2	lungs and make them more susceptible to getting a respiratory illness, according to studies on
3	the risks of exposure. The gas can also incite coughing, which can further spread the
4	[Coronavirus] from an infected person;" and
5	WHEREAS, A study conducted by the University of Chile showed "that CS gas, also

Hi, my name is Leticia Arce and I'm a San Francisco resident and housing lead organizer with Causa Justa :: Just Cause. I live in Ingleside, district 7.

I am submitting my public comment via email since I will be interpreting the hearing for members of our community that don't understand or speak English. I am emailing to urge you to heed the calls of the community and the thousands of people who have been marching in our streets to defund the SFPD and invest in our communities. We cannot afford to not fund and invest in the real needs of our people in the middle of pandemic. We spend more on SFPD than homeless services, parks and rec, libraries, and our workforce development program COMBINED. This is a travesty.

Our police department does not keep our communities safe. Less than 5% of SF's police calls are responding to violent crime. I've been in conversation with a community member who lives in the Excelsior about her experience with police. She is a tenant that has been facing extreme and violent harassment from her landlord and a neighbor. She has tried to mediate and when that didn't work, she has had no choice but to resort to calling the police but the harassment continues. She said the police don't actually do anything to resolve the situation. I am writing to ask you to **Defund SFPD and invest in institutions and programs that uplift our community.** 

The proposed police budget is \$700 million. That stands in upsetting disproportion to our investment in homeless services and support for the unhoused. Additionally, SFPD should not receive a \$23 million dollar increase in funding while schools are facing \$26 million dollars in cuts. Educating our citizens and providing housing for those who are without it should be more important than a police force that overwhelmingly responds to non-violent crimes.

Our police force is dealing with chiefly non-violent issues that could be handled by other bodies more effectively. Arrests for non-violent crimes can have life-ruining consequences. And, Black individuals accounted for 41% of the arrests in the City and County of San Francisco between 2008 and 2014, despite only accounting for 6% of the population of the county.

Police reform efforts are not enough. We cannot expect to fix a broken system with reform. Instead, we need to re-invest in our communities and defund SFPD. Invest this money in affordable housing, education, community services, and healthcare.

## Good afternoon,

My name is Lisabeth Castro-Smyth, I am a social worker, living and working in San Francisco.

I am writing to ask that the city **Defund SFPD and invest in our communities**. This is the only path forward to truly making our neighborhoods and people safer.

Our police department does not keep our communities safe. Less than 5% of SF's police calls are responding to violent crime. Instead these calls are for routine traffic stops, noise complaints, reports of homelessness, or mental health breakdowns. These calls would be so much better served by sending experts who are well trained in responding.

In my 7 years working as a school social worker with SFUSD, I haven't witnessed police help our SF children and families. The people I've seen respond and serve our communities are teachers, para-educators, social workers, nurses, outreach workers, CPS workers, non-profits & grassroots CBOs, such as SFWAR and Causa Justa. However, we spend more on SFPD than homeless services, parks and rec, libraries, and our workforce development program COMBINED.

Currently, the police budget includes funding for School Resource Officers, Weapons and military style equipment, shot spotteres, police cars, overtime to cover protests and other events, weapons training, academy classes for new officers, mounted police and stable care, marine patrol, thousands of responses to psychiatric crisis, and a full 83 officers dedicated to addressing homelessness. Experts should be responding to calls or psychiatric crisis, NOT the police.

Armed police have caused great harm to our communities. The greatest police impact I've

seen on the elementary school where I work was in 2018 when the SFPD shot and killed the young family member of 5 of my students. This is what the police provide to the residents of SF, in exchange for our tax dollars - terror.

In 2019, Black students made up 43% of all SFUSD youth that were arrested, cited, or detained at school, despite being only 7% of the student body. Why should SFPD get a \$23 million dollar increase while schools are facing \$26 million dollars in cuts? What does this budget say about our values?

My name is Grace and I am a registered voter in San Francisco, CA. I am writing to you today to ask what you are doing to ensure that your officers are not abusing their power and are held accountable for their actions.

After witnessing the death of George Floyd at the hands of the Minneapolis Police Department, I am left feeling outraged, frustrated, and hurt. The system has failed yet another black man and we are anxiously waiting to see if the officers responsible for his death will face consequences.

As a resident of San Francisco, I want to make sure that my local police department is taking the necessary preventative measures to ensure that incidents like this will not occur in the future. So I ask:

- Are the police officers in the SF Police Department being trained to de-escalate altercations by using peaceful conflict resolution strategies?
- Are the police officers in the SF Police Department forbidden from using carotid restraints (chokeholds, strangleholds, etc.) and hog-tying methods?
   Furthermore, are they forbidden from transporting civilians in uncomfortable positions, such as face down in a vehicle?
- Are the police officers in the SF Police Department required to intervene if they witness another officer using excessive force? Will officers be reprimanded if they fail to intervene?
- Are the police officers in the SF Police Department forbidden from shooting at moving vehicles?
- Is there a clear and enforced use-of-force continuum that details what weapons and force are acceptable in a wide variety of civilian-police interactions?
- Are the officers in the SF Police Department required to exhaust every other possible option before using excessive force?
- Are the officers in the SF Police Department required to give a verbal warning to civilians before drawing their weapon or using excessive force?
- Are the officers in the SF Police Department required to report each time they threaten to or use force on civilians?
- Are the officers in the SF Police Department thoroughly vetted to ensure that they do not have a history with abuse, racism, xenophobia, homophobia / transphobia, or discrimination?

- Are the officers in the SF Police Department trained to perform and seek necessary medical action after using excessive force?
- Is there an early intervention system enforced to correct officers who use excessive force? Additionally, how many complaints does an officer have to receive before they are reprimanded? Before they are terminated? More than three complaints are unacceptable.

Statistics have indicated that by enforcing these policies, there is a significant decrease in civilian complaints and injury due to excessive force. If any of the policies are not currently in place, then what is being done to ensure that they are going to be enforced in the near future? What can I do, as a concerned citizen, to set these policies in motion?

I also want to increase the level of trust between the police department and the community. To establish trust, there has to be transparency. I would like to see the SF Police Department collect and report data on civilian deaths that occurred in custody and as a result of an officer's use of excessive force. The data should be broken down by demographics and should showcase the race, gender, sexuality, and religion of the civilians. Allowing the public access to this information will show us where we, as a community, fall short.

Thank you for your time and I hope that we can work together to protect the SF community. I refuse to let the next hashtag come from here.

After witnessing the death of George Floyd at the hands of the Minneapolis Police Department, I am left feeling outraged, frustrated, and hurt. The system has failed yet another black man and we are anxiously waiting to see if the officers responsible for his death will face consequences.

As a resident of San Francisco, I want to make sure that my local police department is taking the necessary preventative measures to ensure that incidents like this will not occur in the future. So I ask:

- Are the police officers in the SF Police Department being trained to deescalate altercations by using peaceful conflict resolution strategies?
- Are the police officers in the SF Police Department forbidden from using carotid restraints (chokeholds, strangleholds, etc.) and hog-tying methods?
   Furthermore, are they forbidden from transporting civilians in uncomfortable positions, such as face down in a vehicle?
- Are the police officers in the SF Police Department required to intervene if they witness another officer using excessive force? Will officers be reprimanded if they fail to intervene?
- Are the police officers in the SF Police Department forbidden from shooting at moving vehicles?
- Is there a clear and enforced use-of-force continuum that details what weapons and force are acceptable in a wide variety of civilian-police interactions?
- Are the officers in the SF Police Department required to exhaust every other possible option before using excessive force?
- Are the officers in the SF Police Department required to give a verbal warning to civilians before drawing their weapon or using excessive force?
- Are the officers in the SF Police Department required to report each time they threaten to or use force on civilians?
- Are the officers in the SF Police Department thoroughly vetted to ensure that they do not have a history with abuse, racism, xenophobia, homophobia /

- transphobia, or discrimination?
- Are the officers in the SF Police Department trained to perform and seek necessary medical action after using excessive force?
- Is there an early intervention system enforced to correct officers who use excessive force? Additionally, how many complaints does an officer have to receive before they are reprimanded? Before they are terminated? More than three complaints are unacceptable.

Statistics have indicated that by enforcing these policies, there is a significant decrease in civilian complaints and injury due to excessive force. If any of the policies are not currently in place, then what is being done to ensure that they are going to be enforced in the near future? What can I do, as a concerned citizen, to set these policies in motion?

I also want to increase the level of trust between the police department and the community. To establish trust, there has to be transparency. I would like to see the SF Police Department collect and report data on civilian deaths that occurred in custody and as a result of an officer's use of excessive force. The data should be broken down by demographics and should showcase the race, gender, sexuality, and religion of the civilians. Allowing the public access to this information will show us where we, as a community, fall short.

Thank you for your time and I hope that we can work together to protect the SF community. I refuse to let the next hashtag come from here.

## Good afternoon,

My name is Izzy Ullmann and I am an SF Resident.

I am writing to you to demand that you vote to defund and abolish SFPD during the budget process.

Police create and perpetuate harm. They target the most marginalized community members- folks who are BIPOC, trans and gender queer, unhoused folks, folks with disabilities and mental illness. Police destroy communities. They are rooted in slave catching and suppression of labor uprisings. Police instigate, escalate, harm, violate, destruct, decimate and murder. There is no purpose for them in our communities and we must divest from policing and invest in community support and liberation.

Across the city, we have been demanding that y'all defund, disarm, disband and abolish the police. The time is now.

It is an illusion that police respond to crime-- that is less than 5% of SFPD calls. They spend their time being called to harass unhoused people, and deal with traffic issues and noise complaints. Their existence is unnecessary.

The police criminalize San Francisco's black and brown communities, many of whom have called SF home for much longer than many of the gentrifiers the police pretend to protect. Policing harms individuals and it tears communities apart.

As someone supporting undocumented folks through their immigration proceedings, I see how the police destroy our communities. They charge students and youth with racist crimes that have penalties that could get them deported. They terrorize our trans black and latinx communities and imprison survivors of domestic violence for defending themselves.

It is abhorrent to watch as the SFPD budget is INCREASED while we are seeing budget cuts taken to the mental health services in SF schools, cuts taken to the rapid response network which responds to community members' calls to report ICE detentions, a deep lack of support for our unhoused, black, Latinx, and indigenous community members through the COVID pandemic, leading to drastically higher infection and death rates in these communities. This is all interconnected.

Rather than investing in health, housing, legal services, mental health support, education and liberation in black and latinx communities in SF, we are investing in their incarceration. Black folk make up 5% of SF's population but 54% of the jail population. Black and Latinx folks together make up 20% of SF residents but 78% of folks booked or cited for drug sales in 2017. We spend \$4 million dollars on a gang unit that explicitly does NOT police white people but rather exists to track, control and incarcerate black and brown youth.

Why should SFPD get a \$23 million dollar increase AFTER budget cuts when schools are facing 26 million dollars in cuts? For less than half of the SFPD budget (\$320 million), we can house every unhoused person in SF and still have so much money left for healthcare, mental health services, free public transit, education, universal childcare, anti-violence and programs dedicated to serving and uplifting BIPOC, trans and gender queer folks, and immigrants in the city.

Some initial cuts could include:

- police in schools and housing (\$10 M)
- units that target BIPOC (\$28.9 M)
- unnecessary specialized units (\$25.3 M)
- traffic and airport units (\$56.4 M)
- publicly funded PR, Community engagement units (\$1.5 M)
- patrol and investigative units (\$79.3 M)
- personnel, training and capital increases (\$76.1 M)
- make police oversight independent of SFPD (\$8.4 M)

My name is Christina Zhou, and I am a resident of D6 in Soma.

I'm writing in to ask that we divest from SFPD and invest in the community. The fact of the matter is, budgets are constrained, and the current budget doesn't reflect the priorities and values that we hold dear, especially when Black communities are disproportionally harmed by police misconduct. Surface level reform has already been achieved in SF, but it is clear that this is not enough.

I don't think defunding SFPD alone will solve all racial justice challenges, but I think it is a powerful tactic to signal a shift in priorities and unlock resources for the organizations and departments best suited for tasks such as traffic enforcement, mental health crises, homelessness, and others. I don't think that switching the ownership of these activities to a different entity is a foolproof way to avoid mismanagement, but the fundamentals of our current policing system make it difficult to see a future where this can be incrementally improved within the SFPD. I am hesitant to advocate for near-term disbanding of the police and criminal justice system even if it's a concept I'm open to seeing in the future. Instead, changes like this may make it easier to prioritize police resources towards where they are most effective. The outcome of this budget should be what is most likely to achieve public safety for SF at large, not how to enable the police force to continue to do the work that in many cases is actively harming communities here in this city.

My name is Mallory Adiego and I live and work in San Francisco.

San Francisco has a history and a reputation for driving towards equality and justice despite political and cultural forces around us trying to prevent our progress. Now is the time to be an example and continue our fight for justice by defunding, disarming and disbanding SFPD. We can show the rest of the country and the world how it is possible to live safely and peacefully in a major city without racist and violent oppression from a police force.

We demand the defunding of SFPD in THIS YEAR's budget and we ask that it be redirected towards public health, housing, and reparations for communities that have been most targeted by policing and imprisonment, including Black, Indigenous, and People of Color, trans communities, and the unhoused. We've identified specific, concrete cuts you can make right now, collected at DefundSfpdNow.com

We must reimagine what Public Safety For All looks like. We've heard from many politicians that what we need is not defunding but reform. But what they're ignoring is the fact that decades of attempts to reform the SFPD have failed.

- Since 2016, The U.S. Department of Justice, followed by the California DOJ, has been trying to reform SFPD following the "Frisco 5" hunger strikes, several shootings, and multiple incidents of excessive use of force as well as racist, sexist and homophobic behavior and text messages between officers.
  - To date, SFPD has completed only 6 of the 54 reforms meant to address bias.
- And these reforms have failed. In the fourth quarter of 2019, 76% of all uses of force by SFPD were against people of color.
- Last year, despite Black San Franciscans making up only 5% of the City's population, Black people accounted for almost 40% of all police searches.
- 735 transgender and non-binary San Franciscans were stopped or searched in 2019.

- 5 out of the 5 officers who shot Mario Woods had undergone Crisis Intervention Training.
- Since 2013 SFPD has settled 665 litigation claims at a cost of \$33.4 million dollars to taxpayers. This is money being spent ON TOP OF SFPD's bloated budget! In just the past 13 months, we have had to pay out \$14.7 million dollars to settle lawsuits related to racism, sexism, and police brutality by SFPD officers.
- In 2019, San Francisco Police Officers pointed their guns at San Franciscans 2.4 times EVERY DAY. And only 14 of those 868 times were in defense of self or others.
- SFPD has made little to no progress because they have no incentive to do so, as long as their budget keeps increasing regardless. Moreover, such progress is fundamentally at odds with the structure and purpose of American policing.

Dear Supervisors Fewer, Walton, Mandelman, Yee, and my Supervisor Ronen,

As a climate advocate and resident of San Francisco's District 9, I recognize that the allocation of the City's budget affects our City's climate-- which includes the mental and physical well-being of the black community, the Latinx community, and other systemically disadvantaged communities.

I strongly support reducing the police budget to prioritize investment in the health and wellbeing of our City's seriously underserved black communities. I say black communities specifically, because there is significant evidence that the African American communities in San Francisco have been hurt more than any other group by policing practices-- not only in the United States as a whole-- but specifically in San Francisco as well.

We need to look at the systemic problems, and first prioritize investment where it is most lacking, **in collaboration with the local communities** so planning and implementation is done appropriately and effectively.

Regarding the specifics of the budget, it is unconscionable and extremely inefficient that \$40 million dollars is planned to be cut from the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing while \$43 million is added to SFPD's budget. How about we redress this by considering the adage "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of "cure" and redressing the situation.

Similarly, crime is down 30 percent from a year ago, and the job of the police is to respond to crime: a 30 percent decrease in crime means a 30 percent decrease in the need for policing; we should free up that money for services that will actually prevent crime and keep this decline going.

There are so many ways to support our City to be safer and more successful, especially as we are

dealing with the repercussions of the pandemic. Some considerations:

- "One stop shops" in low income neighborhoods for free cloth masks, washing stations, and opportunity to ask questions on how to stay safe during COVID
- "Technology centers" to help low income kids and adults get connected to the internet and get the services they need
- More washing and bathroom stations for homeless people
- Support for MUNI and slow streets which allow front-line workers to get to work on time and help their neighbors safely (as well as reducing public health expense both by reducing accidents and pollution related health issues). (Muni is looking at a 90% drop in fare revenue —nearly \$168 million-- Why would we allow line shutdowns when we could cover that loss with less than a quarter of the \$736 million this budget proposes to spend on policing)

I urge the City to work with community groups representing low income people, especially in the City's black neighborhoods to decide where and how best to allocate the freed-up resources.
