3	Reenactment of emergency ordinance (Ordinance No. 77-20) to limit the spread of

17	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
18	
19	Section 1. CEQA Findings.
20	The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this
21	ordinance comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public Resources
22	Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the Board of
23	Supervisors in File No. 200373 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board affirms
24	this determination.

Section 2. Declaration of Emergency Pursuant to Charter Section 2.107.

- (a) Section 2.107 of the Charter authorizes passage of an emergency ordinance in
 cases of public emergency affecting life, health, or property, or for the uninterrupted operation
 of any City or County department or office required to comply with time limitations established
 by law. An emergency ordinance enacted under Charter Section 2.107 automatically
 terminates on the 61st day after passage, but may be reenacted upon the same terms and
 conditions applicable to its initial enactment.
- 8 (b) Pursuant to Charter Section 2.107, the City enacted Ordinance No. 77-20, an 9 emergency ordinance, to require the City, through service agreements with third parties, to 10 provide, staff, and maintain restrooms equipped with toilets and hand washing facilities, at a 11 ratio of one restroom per 50 unsheltered people, concentrated in areas with the greatest 12 need, located within 1,000 feet of any encampment, and for select "pit stop" restrooms to be 13 open 24 hours per day during the public health emergency related to COVID-19. That 14 emergency ordinance became effective when enacted, on May 15, 2020, and terminates 15 automatically on July 14, 2020, unless reenacted.
- (c) The Board of Supervisors hereby finds that the findings declared in Sections 1, 2
 and 3 of Ordinance No. 77-20 remain valid and compelling, and declares further that an actual
 emergency continues to exist that requires the reenactment of that emergency ordinance to
 reduce the likelihood of COVID-19 infection among unsheltered individuals.

- 21 Section 3. Reenactment of Emergency Ordinance.
- 22 Consistent with Charter Section 2.107, this emergency ordinance reenacts for an 23 additional 60 days the emergency ordinance temporarily requiring the City, through service 24 agreements with third parties, to provide, staff, and maintain restrooms equipped with toilets 25 and hand washing facilities, at a ratio of one restroom per 50 unsheltered people,

and for select "pit stop" restrooms to be open 24 hours per day during the public health
emergency related to COVID-19 (Ordinance No. 77-20).
Section 4. Effective Date, Expiration.
(a) If enacted prior to the expiration of Ordinance No. 77-20, this reenacted emergency
ordinance shall become effective immediately upon the date of expiration of Ordinance No.
77-20, and shall itself expire on the 61st day following its effective date unless reenacted as
provided by Charter Section 2.107.

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LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Emergency Ordinance - Restroom and Hand Washing Facilities for Unsheltered People]

Reenactment of emergency ordinance (Ordinance No. 77-20) to limit the spread of COVID-19 by requiring the City, through service agreements with third parties, to provide, staff, and maintain restrooms equipped with toilets and hand washing facilities, at a ratio of one restroom per 50 unsheltered people, concentrated in areas with the greatest need, located within 1,000 feet of any encampment, and for select "pit stop" restrooms, open 24 hours per day; waive the requirement under Charter, Section 9.118, that the Board of Supervisors approve the service agreements for restrooms equipped with toilets and hand washing facilities; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

Existing Law

An emergency ordinance (Ordinance No. 77-20) required the City to procure, through service agreements, restroom units equipped with both a toilet and a hand washing facility, at a ratio of one restroom unit per 50 unsheltered individuals. Such restroom units shall be concentrated in areas with the greatest need, and located within 1,000 feet of any encampment. The hours of operation for all existing and new "pit stop" restrooms shall be 24 hours per day seven days per week, except at the following locations: corner of Market Street and Church Street; corner of Haight Street and Buena Vista Avenue; corner of 16th Street and Capp Street; corner of 18th Street and Mission Street; Washington Square Park on Union Street near Stockton Street; and adjacent to the Great Highway near the Beach Chalet, by no later than three weeks after the effective date of Ordinance 77-20.

If an adequate supply of such units is not available to meet the required 1:50 ratio, the City shall procure alternative toilet units sufficient to meet the required ratio, and must accompany them with a corresponding hand washing station.

The requirements of Charter Section 9.118, regarding Board of Supervisors approval of the service agreements authorized by this emergency ordinance, are waived.

The Department of Public Works is authorized to develop rules and regulations in order to implement and administer the ordinance.

Amendments to Current Law

The proposed emergency ordinance reenacts Ordinance No. 77-20, with the result that it does not terminate on July 14, 2020, but rather is extended for an additional 60 days.

Background Information

The emergency ordinance, and reenactment of that emergency ordinance, addresses the present high risk of COVID-19 spread through lack of adequate sanitation and hygiene facilities for unsheltered individuals. On March 22, 2020, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) issued Interim Guidance: "Responding to Coronavirus Disease 2019 COVID-19 among People Experiencing Unsheltered Homeless," which was updated on May 13, 2020, and specifically provides that one method of preventing the spread of COVID-19 among those who are unsheltered is to "[e]nsure nearby restroom facilities have functional water taps, are stocked with hand hygiene materials (soap, drying materials) and bath tissue, and remain open to people experiencing homelessness 24 hours per day. If toilets or handwashing facilities for encampments of more than 10 people."

The CDC guidance recommending the provision of restrooms is clear. But thousands of unsheltered people are unable to maintain proper personal hygiene and to comply with the social distancing requirements to wash their hands frequently and thoroughly. The lack of restrooms equipped with a toilet and hand washing facility that enable unhoused people to maintain personal hygiene and to frequently and thoroughly wash their hands, poses a severe and imminent threat to the health, safety, and well-being of themselves and others.

The United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees Emergency Handbook establishes standards for the ratio of toilets to individuals at one toilet for 50 people in an emergency. This ratio corresponds to the standards set by Sphere, an international humanitarian organization that provides disaster relief response guidance. To meet the needs of San Francisco's approximately 5,180 unsheltered individuals at a ratio one restroom for 50 unsheltered persons, the City needs approximately 65 additional restrooms.

The prevalence of underlying health conditions among people experiencing homelessness increases their vulnerability to COVID-19 infection, and therefore increases the likelihood that COVID-19 will spread rapidly through the homeless community. This makes it especially important that unsheltered individuals have access to free, public restrooms with hand washing facilities.

Having a sufficient number of restrooms equipped with hand washing facilities will allow people experiencing homelessness to maintain proper personal hygiene and to frequently and thoroughly wash their hands, and will help slow community spread of COVID-19.

MANDATE STATEMENT

City Charter Section 2.107 states that the Board of Supervisors may pass emergency ordinances on their first reading with a 2/3 affirmative vote. Emergency ordinances become effective upon approval by the Mayor, the expiration of the ten-day period for the Mayor to approve or veto, or the Board of Supervisors' override of the Mayor's veto. Emergency ordinances expire sixty days after their passage.

BACKGROUND

In May 2020, the Board of Supervisors approved an emergency ordinance (Ordinance No. 77-20) in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency, requiring the City to enter into service agreements with third parties to provide, staff, and maintain restrooms equipped with toilets and hand washing facilities. The ordinance required one restroom for every 50 unsheltered individuals.

The City's Pit Stop program, which began in July 2014 and is administered by the Department of Public Works (Public Works), provides restrooms, toilet, and handwashing facilities at 24 locations throughout the City. The Park Stop program provides an additional seven restroom, toilet, and handwashing facilities at Recreation and Park Department sites. In April 2020, in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency, Public Works entered into contracts for temporary Pit Stop locations.

As of July 2020, the Public Works reports 63 restroom locations with 137 toilets as shown below:

Of the 24 existing Pit Stop locations, three were already operating 24 hours per day, 7 days per week prior to passage the Ordinance No. 77-20. According to Public Works staff, between May 2020 and July 2020, the Department increased hours to 24/7 at 14 Pit Stop locations shown below:

The Attachment provides the locations and hours for the 63 Pit Stop locations.

Ordinance No. 77-20's 1:50 ratio criteria is based on the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) Emergency Sanitation Standards. The standards advise the ratio of community toilets in the immediate, short term is 1 toilet for 50 persons.¹ The most recent Point in Time Count conducted on January 24, 2019 found that there were 5,180 unsheltered persons in San Francisco.² Based on that population estimate, the City has one toilet for every 38 unsheltered

individuals, but only has one toilet available 24 hours/7 days per week for every 84 unsheltered individuals.

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed emergency ordinance would reenact Ordinance No. 77-20, which requires the City, through service agreements with third parties, to provide staff and maintain restrooms equipped with toilets and hand washing facilities, at a ratio of one restroom per 50 unsheltered people, concentrated in areas with the greatest need, located within 1,000 feet of any encampment, and for select "pit stop" restrooms to operate 24 hours per day.

The proposed ordinance would also waive the requirement under Charter, Section 9.118 that the Board of Supervisors approve contracts with amounts of \$10 million or more, or with terms of more than 10 years; and affirm the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

Ordinance No. 77-20 expired on July 14, 2020. The proposed ordinance would extend the emergency authorization by 60 days through September 12, 2020.

FISCAL IMPACT

Public Works has three contracts to provide service monitors to the Pit Stop program, shown below.

Contract costs are approximately \$387,000 per week to provide services for 63 Pit Stop locations. Estimated service costs for 32 temporary Pit Stop locations, added in response to the COVID-19 public health emergency, are approximately \$200,000 per week or \$1.7 million for the 60 day extension of the emergency ordinance.

RECOMMENDATION

Approval of the proposed emergency ordinance is a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.

Reenactment of emergency ordinance (Ordinance No. 77-20) to limit the spread of COVID-19 by requiring the City, through service agreements with third parties, to provide, staff, and maintain restrooms equipped with toilets and hand washing facilities, at a ratio of one restroom per 50 unsheltered people, concentrated in areas with the greatest need, located within 1,000 feet of any encampment, and for select "pit stop" restrooms, open 24 hours per day; waive the requirement under Charter, Section 9.118, that the Board of Supervisors approve the service agreements for restrooms equipped with toilets and hand washing facilities; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.
