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3	Resolution to declare war on racism from the City and County of San Francisco.
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5	WHEREAS, Systemic and institutionalized racism is prevalent in the United States; and
6	WHEREAS, Racial discrimination in many forms, including in education, hiring, and pay
7	practices, contributes to persistent racialized earnings gaps; and
8	WHEREAS, The murder of George Floyd by a Minneapolis police officer was
9	unjustified and act of racism; and
10	WHEREAS, The unjustified killings of scores of other unarmed Black and Brown
11	people by police officers across the country are further horrific examples of acts of racism;
12	and
13	WHEREAS, Black Americans are more likely than white Americans to be arrested, and
14	once arrested, they are more likely to be convicted, and once convicted, they are more likely
15	to experience lengthy prison sentences; and
16	WHEREAS, On average, Black men in the United States receive sentences that are
17	19.1% longer than those of white men convicted for the same crimes; and
18	WHEREAS, High-school dropout rates are least among whites and highest among
19	Latinx, while college enrollment rates are least among Blacks and highest among whites; and
20	WHEREAS, Black students represent 19% of students with disabilities—yet are 36% of
21	those with disabilities who are restrained at school; and
22	WHEREAS, When Black students and white students commit similar infractions, Black
23	students are suspended and expelled three times more often than white students; and
24	WHEREAS, Black students represented only 15% of total U.S. student enrollment, but
25	they made up 35% of students suspended once, 44% of students suspended more than once,

1	and 36% of students expelled, and the 0.5. Department of Education concluded that this
2	disparity is "not explained by more frequent or more serious misbehavior by students of color
3	and
4	WHEREAS, Repeated suspensions and expulsions also eventually convince many
5	students to drop out, and a disproportionate number of those leaving school are African
6	American, Latinx, or Native American; and not surprisingly, the graduation rate for those
7	students lag well behind the rate for white students; and
8	WHEREAS, Black students make up 16% of student enrollment, but represent 27% of
9	students referred to law enforcement and 31% of students subjected to arrest; and
10	WHEREAS, As of the last quarter of 2019, the median White worker made 28% more
11	than the typical Black worker and more than 35% more than the median Latinx worker; and
12	WHEREAS, Black individuals are twice as likely to be unemployed than white
13	individuals; and once employed, Black individuals earn nearly 25% less than their white
14	counterparts; and
15	WHEREAS, Black workers are less likely than white workers to be employed in a job
16	that is consistent with their level of education; and
17	WHEREAS, White patients in the U.S. receive better quality health care than about
18	34% of Latinx patients, 40% of Black patients, and 40% of Native American patients; and
19	WHEREAS, Blacks, Latinx, and residents of Asian, Arab, Middle Eastern, and South
20	Asian descent are victims of hate speech and hate crimes in large part because of racism;
21	and
22	WHEREAS, The Urban Institute continues to find significant levels of discrimination
23	against African American, Latinx, Asian, Arab, Middle Eastern, and Native Americans looking
24	for homes to buy or apartments to rent; and
