WHEREAS, The permanent loss of independent venues and theaters will have tremendous economic impacts on the city of San Francisco and the country at large including not only the direct impact on venue owners and staff, but also the artists who perform at these venues, the companies and individuals that provide rentals and other services to these venues, the hospitality and tourism industry which relies on these venues for entertainment for their guests, the restaurants and bars that cater to those visiting these venues, taxi and rideshare companies and drivers, parking lots and parking attendants, and more; and

WHEREAS, On July 22, 2020, Senators John Cornyn and Amy Klobuchar introduced Senate Bill 4258, the Save Our Stages (SOS) Act which authorizes the Small Business Administration (SBA) to make grants to eligible live venue operators, producers, promoters, or talent representatives to address the economic effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on these venues; and

WHEREAS, The SOS ACT specifies that the SBA may make 1) an initial grant of up to \$12 million dollars to an eligible operator, promoter, producer, or talent representative which must be used for costs incurred between March 1, 2020, and December 31, 2020, and 2) make a second supplemental grant that is equal to 50% of the initial grant and may be used for expenses incurred through June 30, 2021; and

WHEREAS, The SOS Act has bi-partisan support with 42 co-sponsors and appropriates \$10 billion of Federal funds to provide aid to these venues; now, therefore, be it RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges Congress to expeditiously support
