**RESOLUTION NO.** 

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[San Francisco's Recommitment to Vision Zero]

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Resolution calling for a citywide recommitment to Vision Zero and urging the Mayor,
San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA), the Department of Public
Health, and other Vision Zero partner agencies to further advance the updated Action
Strategy to reduce and end traffic fatalities by 2024 through an evolved approach that
is bold, proactive, and strategic in quickly improving street conditions and advancing
longer-term transformative policies for safer streets.

WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco adopted Vision Zero as a policy to 10 11 eliminate traffic fatalities by 2024 supported by the San Francisco Board of Supervisors 12 through a resolution on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 140047, which is hereby declared to be a part of this resolution as if set forth fully herein; and 13 WHEREAS, The basic principle underlying Vision Zero is that traffic fatalities and 14 injuries are entirely preventable and constitute a public health crisis with approximately 30 15 16 people dying each year and more than 500 severely injured annually in San Francisco; and WHEREAS, The original Vision Zero Action Strategy in 2015 focused on the three-17 point plan known as the three "E's": Engineering, Education, and Enforcement; and 18 WHEREAS, The 2017 Action Strategy evolved to a Safe System's approach to move 19 beyond traditional approaches to safety (Engineer, Education, and Enforcement); and 20 21 WHEREAS, The Vision Zero Action Strategy 2019 Update released by San Francisco's Vision Zero Task Force built upon a Safe Systems approach and acknowledged that more is 22 23 needed to get to zero traffic fatalities, including, advancing more transformative policies, taking strategic actions, and establishing complementary goals grounded in the foundation of 24 25

equity and acknowledging the historic disparities impacting vulnerable communities and
 communities of color; and

WHEREAS, The Vision Zero High Injury Network guides the city's investments in
infrastructure and engineering projects with 50% of the corridors within Communities of
Concern, in which the SFMTA currently has 53 miles of projects completed or in construction;
and

7 WHEREAS, Slowing speeds and improving street design are proven effective in
8 reducing injuries and deaths; and

9 WHEREAS, In the midst of a national and local reckoning with systemic racism, there 10 is a need to also re-evaluate traffic enforcement and how to effectively improve street safety 11 without disparately harming communities of color that have a historically had negative

12 interactions with law enforcement; and

WHEREAS, The need for Vision Zero is still a high priority with traffic deaths still
occurring at an alarming rate; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the City and County of San
Francisco to make a stronger recommitment to meeting the goals of Vision Zero and evolve
by also elevating real-time Evaluation and to ground the initiative in authentic Equity and
Engagement, with a sensitivity to how policies impact communities of color; and

19 RESOLVED, That the SFMTA Board of Directors adopt and implement this renewed 20 initiative and also incorporate a short-term plan with clear, measured goals that expedites

21 immediate improvements on the High-Injury Network and also identifies quick-build projects,

- 22 daylighting, and other more cost-effective tools beyond the High-Injury Network that are
- 23 geographically diverse across the city; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors also urges the SFMTA Board of Directors to design an interactive dashboard to monitor the progress of projects and for the SFMTA to also develop additional engagement tools to elevate and solicit input from residents
 to identify dangerous crosswalks, intersections, or corridors for quick-build improvements;

3 and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors strongly urges the SFMTA
Board of Directors to continue to implement a more proactive approach to assessing street
safety that is not limited to just evaluating prior deaths and injuries at the location, but also
studies "close calls" or other risk factors that warrant safety improvements, and, be it

8 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors strongly urges the Mayor to 9 identify a dedicated lead staff person or that will work closely with the team overseeing the 10 City's Vision Zero Action Strategy by promoting interagency cooperation and collaboration to 11 fast-track projects and to also help develop citywide collective policymaking; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors strongly urges SFMTA, the Transportation Authority, Department of Public Health, and partnering Vision Zero agencies to strengthen citywide training and education on slower speeds and safe driving among city personnel and contractors maximizing the use of technology like the vehicle telematics program to support this goal; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors will commit to working with the
SFMTA, the County Transportation Authority, the Mayor's office, Department of Public Works,
Department of Public Health, and other local entities to maximize resources and funding to
effectively meet Vision Zero goals; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby directs the Clerk of the Board to send a copy of this resolution to the Office of the Mayor, the Office of the City Administrator, Director of SFMTA, SFMTA Board of Directors, the County Transportation Authority, the Director of the Department of Public Works, the Director of Public Health, and the San Francisco Health Commission.
