Major Initiative Update

November 18, 2020



"Big C"

- Adopted budget assumed \$735 million from the unlock of Big C for homelessness and mental health programming
- Appropriated funds currently on Budget & Finance Committee reserve
- Upcoming Our City, Our Home Committee meeting to hear spending proposals from City departments, with details to be posted in advance of that meeting
- Anticipated request to release funds from committee reserve in December or January



"Baby C"

- Adopted budget assumed \$435 million from the unlock of Baby C
- Appropriated funds currently on Budget & Finance Committee reserve
- OECE will present high level spending framework to committee this afternoon
- Additional legislative steps required to officially unlock funds forthcoming
- Department will be required to bring more detailed spending proposals and request release of reserves



Public Safety Reinvestment

 Adopted budget assumed \$120 million (\$60 million per year) from the redirection of public safety funding towards efforts to repair racially disparate policies on health, housing, and economic outcomes for the City's African American community

 Human Rights Commission has facilitated 32 community meetings to date and is developing spending proposals for review

Anticipate that first round of funding could be available by year end
