1 [Multifamily Housing Revenue Bonds - 1151 Fairfax Avenue and 112 Middle Point Road  
2 (Hunters View Phase 3) - Not to Exceed \$75,000,000]

3 **Resolution declaring the intent of the City and County of San Francisco (“City”) to**  
4 **reimburse certain expenditures from proceeds of future bonded indebtedness;**  
5 **authorizing the Director of the Mayor’s Office of Housing and Community Development**  
6 **(“Director”) to submit an application and related documents to the California Debt Limit**  
7 **Allocation Committee (“CDLAC”) to permit the issuance of residential mortgage**  
8 **revenue bonds in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$75,000,000 for 1151**  
9 **Fairfax Avenue and 112 Middle Point Road; authorizing and directing the Director to**  
10 **direct the Controller’s Office to hold in trust an amount not to exceed \$100,000 in**  
11 **accordance with CDLAC procedures; authorizing the Director to certify to CDLAC that**  
12 **the City has on deposit the required amount; authorizing the Director to pay an amount**  
13 **equal to such deposit to the State of California if the City fails to issue the residential**  
14 **mortgage revenue bonds; approving, for purposes of the Internal Revenue Code of**  
15 **1986, as amended, the issuance and sale of residential mortgage revenue bonds by the**  
16 **City in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$75,000,000; authorizing and**  
17 **directing the execution of any documents necessary to implement this Resolution, as**  
18 **defined herein; and ratifying and approving any action heretofore taken in connection**  
19 **with the Project, as defined herein, and the Application, as defined herein.**

20  
21 WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco (“Board  
22 of Supervisors”), after careful study and consideration, has determined that there is a  
23 shortage of safe and sanitary housing within the City and County of San Francisco (“City”),  
24 particularly for low and moderate income persons, and that it is in the best interest of the  
25 residents of the City and in furtherance of the health, safety, and welfare of the public for the

1 City to assist in the financing of multi-family rental housing units; and

2 WHEREAS, Acting under and pursuant to the powers reserved to the City under  
3 Sections 3, 5, and 7 of Article XI of the Constitution of the State of California and Sections  
4 1.101 and 9.107 of the Charter of the City and County of San Francisco, the City has enacted  
5 the City and County of San Francisco Residential Mortgage Revenue Bond Law (“City Law”),  
6 constituting Article I of Chapter 43 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, in order to  
7 establish a procedure for the authorization, issuance and sale of residential mortgage revenue  
8 bonds by the City for the purpose of providing funds to encourage the availability of adequate  
9 housing and home finance for persons and families of low or moderate income, and to  
10 develop viable communities by providing decent housing, enhanced living environments, and  
11 increased economic opportunities for persons and families of low or moderate income; and

12 WHEREAS, In addition, pursuant to Division 31 of the Health and Safety Code of the  
13 State of California, and particularly Chapter 7 of Part 5 thereof (“State Law”), the City is  
14 empowered to issue and sell bonds for the purpose of making mortgage loans or otherwise  
15 providing funds to finance the development of multi-family rental housing including units for  
16 lower income households and very low income households; and

17 WHEREAS, HV Partners 3 LP, a California limited partnership (or an affiliate thereof or  
18 successor thereto) (the “Borrower”) desires to construct an 118-unit affordable residential  
19 rental housing development located at 1511 Fairfax Avenue and 112 Middle Point Road, San  
20 Francisco, California 94124 (“Project”); and

21 WHEREAS, The Borrower has requested that the City assist in the financing of the  
22 Project through the issuance of one or more series of tax-exempt mortgage revenue bonds  
23 (“Bonds”); and

24 ///

25 WHEREAS, The City expects that proceeds of the Bonds will be used to pay certain

1 costs incurred in connection with the Project prior to the date of issuance of the Bonds; and  
2 WHEREAS, The City intends to issue the Bonds in an amount not to exceed  
3 \$75,000,000 and to loan the proceeds of the Bonds to the Borrower (“Loan”) to finance the  
4 costs of the Project; and

5 WHEREAS, The Bonds will be limited obligations, payable solely from pledged  
6 security, including Project revenues, and will not constitute a debt of the City; and

7 WHEREAS, The Board of Supervisors has determined that the moneys advanced and  
8 to be advanced to pay certain expenditures of the Project are or will be available only for a  
9 temporary period and it is necessary to reimburse such expenditures with respect to the  
10 Project from the proceeds of the Bonds; and

11 WHEREAS, Section 1.150-2 of the United States Treasury Regulations requires that  
12 the Board of Supervisors declare its reasonable official intent to reimburse prior expenditures  
13 for the Project with proceeds of the Bonds; and

14 WHEREAS, The interest on the Bonds may qualify for tax exemption under Section  
15 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (“Code”), only if the Bonds are  
16 approved in accordance with Section 147(f) of the Code; and

17 WHEREAS, The City now wishes to approve the issuance of the Bonds in order to  
18 satisfy the public approval requirements of Section 147(f) of the Code; and

19 WHEREAS, The Project is located wholly within the City; and

20 WHEREAS, On November 24, 2020, the City caused a notice stating that a public  
21 hearing with respect to the issuance of the Bonds would be held by the Mayor’s Office of  
22 Housing and Community Development on December 7, 2020, published in the Notices section  
23 of the Mayor’s Office of Housing and Community Development website ( at  
24 <https://sfmohcd.org/notices-0>); and

25 WHEREAS, The Mayor’s Office of Housing and Community Development held the

1 public hearing described above on December 7, 2020, and an opportunity was provided for  
2 persons to comment on the issuance of the Bonds and the Project; and

3 WHEREAS, This Board of Supervisors is the elected legislative body of the City and is  
4 the applicable elected representative authorized to approve the issuance of the Bonds within  
5 the meaning of Section 147(f) of the Code; and

6 WHEREAS, Section 146 of the Code limits the amount of tax-exempt private activity  
7 bonds, which include qualified mortgage bonds, that may be issued in any calendar year by  
8 entities within a state and authorizes the legislature of each state to provide the method of  
9 allocating authority to issue tax-exempt private activity bonds within the respective state; and

10 WHEREAS, Chapter 11.8 of Division 1 of Title 2 of the Government Code of the State  
11 of California governs the allocation in the State of California of the state ceiling established by  
12 Section 146 of the Code among governmental units in the State having the authority to issue  
13 tax-exempt private activity bonds; and

14 WHEREAS, Section 8869.85(b) of the Government Code requires that a local agency  
15 file an application for a portion of the state ceiling with or upon the direction of the California  
16 Debt Limit Allocation Committee (“CDLAC”) prior to the issuance of tax-exempt private activity  
17 bonds, including qualified mortgage bonds; and

18 WHEREAS, CDLAC procedures require an applicant for a portion of the state ceiling to  
19 certify to CDLAC that applicant has on deposit an amount equal to one-half of one percent  
20 (0.5%) of the amount of allocation requested not to exceed \$100,000; now, therefore, be it

21 RESOLVED, By the Board of Supervisors of the City and County of San Francisco, as  
22 follows:

23 Section 1. The Board of Supervisors finds and determines that the foregoing recitals  
24 are true and correct.

1           Section 2. The Board of Supervisors adopts this Resolution for purposes of  
2 establishing compliance with the requirements of Section 1.150-2 of the United States  
3 Treasury Regulations. This Resolution does not bind the Board of Supervisors to issue the  
4 Bonds, approve the Loan or to make any expenditure, incur any indebtedness or proceed with  
5 the Project.

6           Section 3. The Board of Supervisors hereby declares its official intent under United  
7 States Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2 to use proceeds of the Bonds to reimburse  
8 expenditures incurred in connection with the Project. The Board of Supervisors hereby further  
9 declares its intent to use such proceeds to reimburse the Borrower for actual expenditures  
10 made by the Borrower on the Project.

11           Section 4. On the date of the expenditure to be reimbursed, all reimbursable costs of  
12 the Project will be of a type properly chargeable to a capital account under general federal  
13 income tax principles.

14           Section 5. The maximum principal amount of debt expected to be issued for the Project  
15 is \$75,000,000.

16           Section 6. This Board of Supervisors, as the applicable elected representative of the  
17 governmental unit having jurisdiction over the area in which the Project is located, hereby  
18 approves the issuance of the Bonds for purposes of Section 147(f) of the Code.

19           Section 7. This approval of the issuance of the Bonds by the City is neither an approval  
20 of the underlying credit issues of the proposed Project nor an approval of the financial  
21 structure of the Bonds.

22           Section 8. The Board of Supervisors hereby authorizes the Director of the Mayor's  
23 Office of Housing and Community Development, including any acting or interim director, or  
24 such person's designee ("Director"), on behalf of the City, to submit an application  
25 ("Application"), and such other documents as may be required, to CDLAC pursuant to

1 Government Code Section 8869.85 for an allocation for the Project of a portion of the state  
2 ceiling for private activity bonds in a principal amount not to exceed \$75,000,000.

3 Section 9. An amount equal to one-half of one percent (0.5%) of the amount of the  
4 CDLAC allocation requested for the Project, not to exceed \$100,000 (“Deposit”), is hereby  
5 authorized to be held on deposit in connection with the Application and the applicable CDLAC  
6 procedures, and the Director is authorized to certify to CDLAC that such funds are available.

7 Section 10. If the City receives a CDLAC allocation for the Project and the Bonds are  
8 not issued, the Mayor’s Office of Housing and Community Development is hereby authorized  
9 to cause an amount equal to the Deposit to be paid to the State of California, if and to the  
10 extent required by CDLAC.

11 Section 11. The officers and employees of the City, including the Director, are hereby  
12 authorized and directed, jointly and severally, to do any and all things necessary or advisable  
13 to consummate the receipt of an allocation from CDLAC and otherwise effectuate the  
14 purposes of this Resolution, consistent with the documents cited herein and this Resolution,  
15 and all actions previously taken by such officers and employees with respect to the Project,  
16 consistent with the documents cited herein and this Resolution, including but not limited to the  
17 submission of the application to CDLAC, are hereby ratified and approved.

18 Section 12. This Resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption by the Board  
19 and approval by the Mayor.

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**Project Description**

**Hunters View Phase III**

**Overview**

The funds described in the “Financing Structure” section below will be used to finance the development of Hunters View Phase III, a 118-unit affordable multifamily housing project located at 1151 Fairfax Avenue (address on the site permit), San Francisco, CA 94124 in the City and County of San Francisco (the “Project”). This is the 4<sup>th</sup> affordable project in the Hunters View redevelopment project.

Upon completion, the Project will include approximately 176,489 square feet of gross floor area, comprised of 117,622 square feet of residential area and 35,407 square feet of non-residential area. Plans for non-residential spaces include a community education space featuring a self-serve library kiosk, space for a cafe/commercial kitchen, lobbies and lounges, property management and services offices, a community room, a meeting room, bike rooms, and laundry rooms.

Total project costs, including the cost to acquire the land and construct new buildings, will be approximately \$114,281,568, or \$968,488 per dwelling unit.

The residential unit distribution, which will include 1 2-bedroom superintendent unit, is:

100% percent of the residential units will serve households earning less than 50% percent of the San Francisco County Area Median Income (AMI).

**Residents**

No residents will be displaced as the site is currently a vacant lot.

**Site Description and Scope of Work**

Address: 112 Middle Point Road  
Block/Lot: Block 14, Lot 3  
Block 17, Lot 4

The scope of work for the Property amenities will include:



- San Francisco Public Library outpost outfitted with Internet access available to all residents of the neighborhood on the ground floor of Block 14. HOPE SF residents experience disproportionately less access to library and learning facilities. The ground floor of Block 17 will include space for a future cafe and commercial kitchen on the ground floor of Block 17, which fulfills a critical gap in a neighborhood with limited access to markets or healthy foods.
- All new infrastructure for the western end of Hunters View, including new streets, streetlights, sidewalks, and streetscape landscaping.
- Hunters View Park, a new park for the neighborhood, located between Blocks 14 and 17. At approximately 0.71 acres, Hunters View Park will be the largest open space at Hunters View, and feature multiple elements for residents of all ages, including play structures for children, picnic and barbeque areas for families, and shaded seating for seniors and others to interact, relax, and enjoy views of the Bay.

An investor limited partner will own a 99.99% interest in the borrower entity.

**Financing Structure**

The following sources of capital financing are expected to be utilized:

- tax-exempt bonds issued by the City;
- 4% low income housing tax credits (LIHTC);
- CA Housing and Community Development Multifamily Housing Program (MHP);
- a conventional first mortgage; and
- soft debt from the City.

The sale of LIHTC will generate equity financing for the Project. The amount of private activity tax-exempt bonds used during construction will be sized specifically to meet the 50% of aggregate basis test required for the LIHTC.

**Schedule**

Infrastructure financing is anticipated to close by June 2021 with vertical construction, the affordable buildings, commencing four (4) to six (6) months after the infrastructure financial closing. All infrastructure and vertical construction is scheduled to be completed by March 2024.

## **Narrative Description of Project Sponsor Experience**

The development team (Ridgepoint Non-Profit Housing Corp, The John Stewart Company, and Devine & Gong) have successfully completed 3 prior phases of Hunters View, completing 286 affordable apartments and re-housing 70% of the residents that lived onsite in 2012 at the establishment of the San Francisco Housing Authority's right-to-return processing order.

**Ridge Point Nonprofit Housing Corporation**, is a nonprofit housing corporation founded in 1968 for the purpose of developing and operating low and moderate-income housing and community facilities for the residents of Bayview Hunters Point. Ridgepoint recently completed renovations of two large multi-family housing projects in Hunters Point. Ridgepoint developed Ridgeview Terrace in 1968, which is a 100-unit HUD-financed affordable housing development. In 2012, Ridgepoint refinanced the property and as of late 2013 has completed renovations to prolong the useful life of the property. Also, in 2002, Ridgeview acquired Jackie Robinson Apartments, which is an At-Risk HUD-financed affordable housing development. Ridgeview renovated the property and has preserved it as affordable housing. Jackie Robinson Apartments is adjacent to Hunters View. Ridgepoint places special emphasis on resident and community involvement and generating training and employment opportunities in all of its development efforts. Since 1968 Ridgepoint has had a presence in the Hunters Point community and is notably one of the few nonprofit development partners to buy-out its for-profit partner, helping to ensure long-term affordability of housing in the Bayview neighborhood.

**The John Stewart Company (JSCo)**, was founded in 1978, and is a for-profit company that provides property management, construction management, financial consulting services and develops affordable communities in the Bay Area and throughout California. As a developer in San Francisco, JSCo has developed numerous residential, mixed-use and transit-oriented projects over the past 30 years using all relevant affordable housing financing sources. JSCo has built or rehabilitated over 4,000 units, serving very low-income seniors, families and individuals. JSCo brings significant HOPE VI and other public housing revitalization and management experience to Hunters View. In addition to leading the redevelopment of Phase I of Hunters View, JSCo co-developed North Beach Place in partnership with BRIDGE Housing Corporation and Em Johnson Interest (a local minority-owned development company). JSCo provides property management for multiple Housing Authority properties in California (including the Housing Authorities of Richmond, Oakland, Benicia, Los Angeles, Monterey County and Santa Clara County) and five HOPE VI/Mixed Finance sites, including North Beach Place (341 units) and Valencia Gardens (260 units) in San Francisco and Mandela Gateway (174 units), Chestnut-Linden Court (151 units), Acorn Apartments (294 units) and Tassaforanga Village (157 units) in Oakland. JSCo is the largest manager of affordable housing in California and currently oversees over 30,000 multifamily units across the state.

**Devine & Gong, Inc. (DGI)**, is a for-profit Oakland-based real estate finance and development services firm formed in 1985 which specializes in government-subsidized affordable housing. DGI has expertise in securing permanent financing and raising equity capital through low-income housing tax credits as well as all other relevant affordable housing financing services. DGI is an expert in the financing of public housing revitalizations, including HOPE VI funding, and has been a consultant to housing authorities on numerous HOPE VI and other public housing revitalization projects, including projects with housing authorities in Los Angeles; Oakland, CA, and; King County, WA. DGI has a long-term financial consulting relationship

with the Seattle Housing Authority (SHA) and has been the financial consultant for three of its nationally recognized HOPE VI developments: New Holly, High Point, and Rainier Vista.

The Bonds of each issue will be part of a plan of finance issued in one or more series from time to time, including bonds issued to refund such bonds in one or more series from time to time outstanding, and at no time to exceed in outstanding principal amount the maximum principal amount for such issue. Each issue of the Bonds will be paid entirely by the applicable Borrower from the revenues of the applicable Project, in accordance with the applicable Loan Agreement. Neither the full faith and credit nor the taxing power of the City, the State of California (the "State") or any other political corporation, subdivision or agency of the State is pledged to the payment of the principal, premium, if any, or interest on any of the Bonds, nor shall the City, the State or any other political corporation, subdivision or agency of the State be liable or obligated to pay the principal, premium, if any, or interest on any of the Bonds.

The Public Hearing is intended to comply with the public approval requirements of Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

All those interested in matters related to the issuance of any of the Bonds and to the financing of any of the Projects are invited to attend and be heard at this hearing by telephone only. Interested parties may call into the hearing at the time and number indicated above or submit written comments, which must be received prior to the Public Hearing, to the City, c/o Joyce Slen, Mayor's Office of Housing and Community Development, 1 South Van Ness Avenue, 5th Floor, San Francisco, CA 94103.
