I am proud of the hard work and accomplishments of the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force, and I am seeking reappointment to it. I have devoted nearly 15 years to a career in public service with county and municipal governments, specifically in offices specializing in creating and maintaining public records, as well as election related services. As an individual committed to government transparency and accessibility, I was honored to be among those recognized by the Ann Arbor Chronicle (local media) for my work in making local government more accessible to the community -- specifically, they noted my "steadfast competence and professionalism ... symbolic of the many staff who work on the front lines of our local governments, who help citizens navigate the bureaucracy of our public sector, and whose capable, often thankless work on a daily basis makes our community a better place." I am a member of the LGBT community and have lived on the west side of San Francisco since 2011. I currently reside in the Sunset/Parkside neighborhood with my husband.

Business and/or professional experience:

I am currently the Chief of the County Clerk-Recorder's Office in Alameda County, a division of the County's Auditor-Controller Agency. The Office I lead acts as the official custodian for over 25 million public records, serves over 100,000 customers each year, and collects and distributes approximately \$175 million annually in revenue. I manage operations responsible for recording/archiving approximately 250,000 official public records per year, collecting documentary transfer tax, providing certified copies of vital records, issuing marriage licenses, registering notaries, and all other County Clerk duties. I am also responsible for responding to numerous Public Records Act requests and subpoenas timely and accurately. I am proud to have been instrumental in expanding our office hours, opening a satellite office, and upgrading our software system so that the public has more convenient access to our records and services. Furthermore, I understand the trust that the public places in government safeguarding their records -- and to that end, I have worked closely with the District Attorney's Office to identify instances of fraudulent recorded documents in order to protect our most vulnerable residents. Prior to my work with Alameda County, I served as the Director of Elections for Washtenaw County -- Michigan's sixth largest county, and home to the City of Ann Arbor -- where I oversaw all elections within the County as well as managed the administration of the County's 28 local municipalities for election related issues; managed the retention of numerous official documents; published legally required notices; assured various public meetings complied with the State's Open Meetings Act; and responded to Freedom of Information Act requests. In addition, I oversaw the County's enforcement of Michigan's Campaign Finance Act and performed related compliance audits.

I have been a member of San Francisco's Sunshine Ordinance Task Force since my appointment to Seat 10 in November 2018. I serve as Chair of the Information Technology Committee, and I also serve as a member of the Rules Committee and the Education, Outreach, & Training Committee. A gift is anything of value for which you have not provided equal or greater consideration to the donor. A gift is reportable if its fair market value is \$50 or more. In addition, multiple gifts totaling \$50 or more received during the reporting period from a single source must be reported.

It is the acceptance of a gift, not the ultimate use to which it is put, that imposes your reporting obligation. Except as noted below, you must report a gift even if you never used it or if you gave it away to another person.

If the exact amount of a gift is unknown, you must make a good faith estimate of the item's fair market value. Listing the value of a gift as "over \$50" or "value unknown" is not adequate disclosure. In addition, if you received a gift through an intermediary, you must disclose the name, address, and business activity of both the donor and the intermediary. You may indicate an intermediary either in the "source" field after the name or in the "comments" section at the bottom of Schedule D.

Commonly reportable gifts include:

- · Tickets/passes to sporting or entertainment events
- Tickets/passes to amusement parks
- · Parking passes not used for official agency business
- Food, beverages, and accommodations, including those provided in direct connection with your attendance at a convention, conference, meeting, social event, meal, or like gathering
- Rebates/discounts not made in the regular course of business to members of the public without regard to official status
- Wedding gifts (See Reference Pamphlet, page 16)
- An honorarium received prior to assuming office (You may report an honorarium as income on Schedule C, rather than as a gift on Schedule D, if you provided services of equal or greater value than the payment received. See Reference Pamphlet, page 10, regarding your ability to receive future honoraria.)
- Transportation and lodging (See Schedule E.)
- Forgiveness of a loan received by you

Reminders

- Gifts from a single source are subject to a \$500 limit in 2019. See Reference Pamphlet, page 10.
- Code filers you only need to report gifts from reportable sources.

Gift Tracking Mobile Application

• FPPC has created a gift tracking app for mobile devices that helps filers track gifts and provides a quick and easy way to upload the information to the Form 700. Visit FPPC's website to download the app.

You are not required to disclose:

- Gifts that were not used and that, within 30 days after receipt, were returned to the donor or delivered to a charitable organization or government agency without being claimed by you as a charitable contribution for tax purposes
- Gifts from your spouse or registered domestic partner, child, parent, grandparent, grandchild, brother, sister, and certain other family members (See Regulation 18942 for a complete list.). The exception does not apply if the donor was acting as an agent or intermediary for a reportable source who was the true donor.
- Gifts of similar value exchanged between you and an individual, other than a lobbyist registered to lobby your state agency, on holidays, birthdays, or similar occasions
- Gifts of informational material provided to assist you in the performance of your official duties (e.g., books, pamphlets, reports, calendars, periodicals, or educational seminars)
- A monetary bequest or inheritance (However, inherited investments or real property may be reportable on other schedules.)
- Personalized plaques or trophies with an individual value of less than \$250
- Campaign contributions
- Up to two tickets, for your own use, to attend a fundraiser for a campaign committee or candidate, or to a fundraiser for an organization exempt from taxation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The ticket must be received from the organization or committee holding the fundraiser.
- Gifts given to members of your immediate family if the source has an established relationship with the family member and there is no evidence to suggest the donor had a purpose to influence you. (See Regulation 18943.)
- Free admission, food, and nominal items (such as a pen, pencil, mouse pad, note pad or similar item) available to all attendees, at the event at which the official makes a speech (as defined in Regulation 18950(b)(2)), so long as the admission is provided by the person who organizes the event.
- Any other payment not identified above, that would otherwise meet the definition of gift, where the payment is made by an individual who is not a lobbyist registered to lobby the official's state agency, where it is clear that the gift was made because of an existing personal or business relationship unrelated to the official's position and there is no evidence whatsoever at the time the gift is made to suggest the donor had a purpose to influence you.

To Complete Schedule D:

- Disclose the full name (not an acronym), address, and, if a business entity, the business activity of the source.
- Provide the date (month, day, and year) of receipt, and disclose the fair market value and description of the gift.

See the FPPC fact sheet entitled "Limitations and Restrictions on Gifts, Honoraria, Travel, and Loans" to read about travel payments under section 89506(a).

You are not required to disclose:

- Travel payments received from any state, local, or federal government agency for which you provided services equal or greater in value than the payments received, such as reimbursement for travel on agency business from your government agency employer.
- A payment for travel from another local, state, or federal government agency and related per diem expenses when the travel is for education, training or other inter-agency programs or purposes.
- Travel payments received from your employer in the normal course of your employment that are included in the income reported on Schedule C.
- A travel payment that was received from a non-profit entity exempt from taxation under Internal Revenue Code Section 501(c)(3) for which you provided equal or greater consideration, such as reimbursement for travel on business for a 501(c)(3) organization for which you are a board member.

Note: Certain travel payments may not be reportable if reported via email on Form 801 by your agency.

To Complete Schedule E:

- Disclose the full name (not an acronym) and address of the source of the travel payment.
- Identify the business activity if the source is a business entity.
- Check the box to identify the payment as a gift or income, report the amount, and disclose the date(s).
 - **Travel payments are gifts** if you did not provide services that were equal to or greater in value than the payments received. You must disclose gifts totaling \$50 or more from a single source during the period covered by the statement.

When reporting travel payments that are gifts, you must provide a description of the gift and the **date(s)** received. If the travel occurred on or after January 1, 2017, you must also disclose the **travel destination**

- **Travel payments are income** if you provided services that were equal to or greater in value than the payments received. You must disclose income totaling \$500 or more from a single source during the period

covered by the statement. You have the burden of proving the payments are income rather than gifts. When reporting travel payments as income, you must describe the services you provided in exchange for the payment. You are not required to disclose the date(s) for travel payments that are income.

Example:

City council member MaryClaire Chandler is the chair of a 501 (c)(6) trade association, and the association pays for her travel to attend its meetings. Because MaryClaire is deemed to be providing equal or greater consideration for the travel

payment by virtue of serving on the board, this payment may be reported as income. Payments for MaryClaire to attend other events for which she is not providing services are likely considered gifts. Note that the same payment from a 501(c)3 would NOT be reportable.

Example:

Mayor Kim travels to China on a trip organized by China Silicon Valley Business Development, a California nonprofit, 501(c)(6) organization. The Chengdu Municipal People's Government pays for Mayor Kim's airfare and travel costs, as well as his meals and lodging during the trip. The trip's agenda shows that the trip's purpose is to promote job creation and economic activity in China and in Silicon Valley,

so the trip is reasonably related to a governmental purpose. Thus, Mayor Kim must report the gift of travel, but the gift is exempt from the gift limit. In this case, the travel payments are not subject to the gift limit because the source is a foreign government and because the travel is reasonably related to a governmental

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Hello Mr. Young,

I hope your end of the year is going well. Regrettably, due to a personal appointment that I cannot move, I will not be able to attend the hearing on 1/11/2021. Given the difficulty of scheduling such appointments during these trying times, I hope the Committee members will understand.

For the record, please make sure it is noted that I attempted to converse with Supervisors Mar and Stefani. I did not hear back from either office but am more than happy to talk with them to further discuss the merits of my application beyond what is expressed in the testimony below.

Dear Chair Ronen and members of the Rules Committee,

I am humbled to have individuals ranging from Donna Hillard, Executive Director of Code Tenderloin, to Andrew Broderick, of the SF Tech Council supporting my application to the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force. As conveyed by the letters sent in by these leaders and others, I am confident that my background will allow me to contribute to the important mission of the Task Force. As a graduate student that has suffered with mental illness, I am also confident that I will bring a diverse perspective that is needed on the Task Force.

Before discussing my qualifications, I want to share the origin of my personal interest in this position. My first job--as the Executive Assistant to Governor Kate Brown of Oregon--exposed me to the importance of transparency, accountability, and meaningful public participation. Governor Brown assumed her current office, in part, because those aforementioned traits were absent during the creation of *Cover Oregon*, the state's response to the Affordable Care Act. Consequently, I was on the frontlines of restoring the faith of Oregonians in their government.

This required thinking about all the ways in which we could connect with community members. In my capacity, it meant assisting with the Governor's social media and updating her website to be more Oregonian-friendly. Those efforts required working closely with the Governor's legal counsel to understand what was permissible to share. Oftentimes, I found myself pushing back, trying to make sure that my friends and family members knew that their elected officials were working hard on their behalf and how to push back when they questioned if those officials were misguided.

My own tangles with Public Records Laws inspired my efforts to bridge the gap between community awareness and government action. I have channeled those efforts in manifold ways since arriving in San Francisco more than three years ago. First and foremost, I have done my part to inform the public of local government action and ways they can get involved. In more than thirty articles in local newspapers, I have brought San Franciscans closer to their government.

Additionally, I have studied these issues through my graduate education in law at UC Berkeley, where I have studied constitutional law and privacy law, courses that pertain directly to the obligations of the Task Force. I have also professionally dealt with transparency related laws in my capacity as a Legal Assistant on Google's Legal Investigations Support team.

My desire to keep San Franciscans informed has also manifested itself through two projects of mine: first, Neighborhood News Network, and, second, No One Left Offline (NOLO). NOLO got started during the pandemic with one goal: make sure San Franciscans had the Internet required to thrive. Since that time, NOLO has helped distribute more than 100 hotspots, each with a year of Internet. These devices are now essential to residents staying up to date on what their government is up to. I am thankful for the opportunity to make sure San Franciscans have that chance and hope to further that work as a member on the Task Force.

I cannot speak for all Millennials, but I know that many of my friends and fellow students have come to expect transparency. They rely on entities like the Task Force to make sure that expectation is being met. If fortunate enough to join this Task Force, I will work tirelessly to make sure that the Sunshine Ordinance is enforced, that the Task Force has the institutional resources and support it requires, and that agencies with numerous violations are held accountable. Young people in this city, as well as all residents, deserve as much, especially when there is so much on the line.

I would like to share my experiences with Kevin Frazier and why I feel he would be an excellent addition to the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force. In the time that I have known Kevin he has proven to be an amazing, talented and ambitious gentleman.

I was first introduced to Kevin by a merchant/member of the Clement Street Merchants Association. He voluntarily came to us with an amazing idea, which was Community Action Nights. The idea was to bring together individuals who would like to help out the community and have the funds to do so, but aren't sure how to go about assisting directly. And these nights would be conducted at the Plough and Stars, one of our local legacy businesses. I was very excited to participate in this effort and we began planning. Unfortunately, this idea was forced to a halt due to the pandemic.

Even though it appeared we likely wouldn't be proceeding with Community Action Nights, Kevin generously reached out to see what support he could provide for the CSMA during the first week of the pandemic. Kevin started a GoFund me for our neighborhood, "Support in Place: Save our Community & Small Biz". Through this, we were able to raise funds to buy gift cards and donate them to three Non-profit organizations: Richmond District Neighborhood Center, YMCA and RAM's.

He then created a Zoom event to start a conversation about the state of The Richmond. We had a few of the merchants from Clement street on the call, along with myself, "Post-COVID in The Richmond: creating a better normal". This proved to be a valuable conversation as there was a considerable amount of concern and uncertainty at this time and I think we all benefited from coming together to share our thoughts, feelings and information.

Throughout this unprecedented time Kevin has continually reached out to share what he's been working on and to ask me to connect him with different merchants in our association to conduct interviews and to give help where he can. His assistance has been appreciated by many.

It's been great working with Kevin and it's always fun hearing about what he is working on. I believe that Kevin would be a great addition to the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force, as he pays a great deal of attention to what is best for our communities and when he has an idea he moves with it. Any group would be very fortunate to have someone of Kevin's abilities on their team.

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





Board Qualifications:

The Sunshine Ordinance Task Force (the "Task Force") was established to advise the Board of Supervisors and provide information to other City departments on appropriate ways in which to implement Administrative Code, Chapter 67 (The San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance of 1999) (the "Ordinance"). The Task Force shall develop goals to ensure practice and timely implementation of the Ordinance; propose amendments to the Ordinance; receive and review the annual report of the Supervisor of Public Records and may request additional reports or information; and make referrals to a municipal office with enforcement power under the Ordinance, the California Public Records Act, or the Brown Act, whenever it concludes a person has violated the provisions of the Ordinance.

The Task Force consists of a total of thirteen (13) members:

> Eleven (11) voting members appointed by the Board of Supervisors

- Two (2) members nominated by the local chapter of the Society of Professional Journalists; one (1) shall be an attorney and one (1) shall be a journalist.

- One (1) member shall be a member from the press or electronic media.

- One (1) member shall be a journalist from a racial/ethnic-minority-owned news organization and nominated by New California Media.

- One (1) member nominated by the local chapter of the League of Women Voters.
- Two (2) members of the public experienced in consumer advocacy.
- Four (4) members of the public who have demonstrated interest in, or have experience in,

the issues of citizen access and participation in local government.

> One (1) member shall be the Mayor, or his/her designee, and serve as a non-voting member.
 > One (1) member shall be the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors, or his/her designee, and serve as a non-voting member.

At all times, the Task Force shall include at least one member who shall be a member of the public who is physically handicapped. All members must have experience and/or demonstrated interested in the issues of citizen access and participation in local government. The City Attorney's Office shall assign an attorney to the Task Force who is experienced in public-access law matters and serve as a legal advisor and advocate to the Task Force.

The term of each appointed member shall be two years unless removed by the Board of Supervisors. In the event of such removal or vacancy during the term of office of any appointive member, a successor shall be appointed for the unexpired term of the office vacated.

In addition to regular Task Force meetings, Task Force members are expected to participate in committee work.

Reports: The Task Force shall report annually to the Board of Supervisors on any practical or policy problems encountered in the Administration of the Ordinance. The Task Force shall, as it sees fit, issue public reports evaluating compliance with the Ordinance and related California laws by the City or any department, office or official.

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Executive Summary

In 2008, San Francisco voters overwhelmingly approved a City Charter Amendment (section 4.101) establishing as City policy for the membership of Commissions and Boards to reflect the diversity of San Francisco's population, and that appointing officials be urged to support the nomination, appointment, and confirmation of these candidates. Additionally, it requires the San Francisco Department on the Status of Women to conduct and publish a gender analysis of Commissions and Boards every two years.

The 2019 Gender Analysis of Commissions and Boards includes more policy bodies such as task forces, committees, and advisory bodies, than previous analyses, which were limited to Commissions and Boards. Data was collected from 84 policy bodies and from a total of 741 members mostly appointed by the Mayor and Board of Supervisors. These policy bodies fall under two categories designated by the San Francisco Office of the City Attorney.¹ The first category, referred to as "Commissions and Boards," are policy bodies with decision-making authority and whose members are required to submit financial disclosures to the Ethics Commission. The second category, referred to as "Advisory Bodies," are policy bodies with advisory function whose members do *not* submit financial disclosures to the Ethics Commission. This report examines policy bodies and appointees both comprehensively as a whole and separately by the two categories.

The 2019 Gender Analysis evaluates the representation of women; people of color; lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and questioning (LGBTQ) individuals; people with disabilities; and veterans on San Francisco policy bodies.

Key Findings

Gender

- Women's representation on policy bodies is 51%, slightly above parity with the San Francisco female population of 49%.
- Since 2009, there has been a small but steady increase in the representation of women on San Francisco policy bodies.

Race and Ethnicity

- People of color are underrepresented on policy bodies compared to the population. Although people of color comprise 62% of San Francisco's population, just 50% of appointees identify as a race other than white.
- While the overall representation of people of color has increased between 1
 2009 and 2019, as the Department collected data on more appointees, the representation of people of color has decreased over the last few years. The percentage of appointees of color decreased from 53% in 2017 to 49% in 2019.

10-Year Comparison of Representation

As found in previous reports, Latinx and Asian groups are underrepresented on San Francisco policy bodies compared to the population. Latinx individuals are 14% of the population but make up only 8% of appointees. Asian individuals are 31% of the population but make up only 18% of appointees.

Race and Ethnicity by Gender

- On the whole, women of color are 32% of the San Francisco population, and 28% of appointees. Although still below parity, 28% is a slight increase compared to 2017, which showed 27% women of color appointees.
- Meanwhile, men of color are underrepresented at 21% of appointees compared to 31% of the San Francisco population.



- Both White women and men are overrepresented on San Francisco policy bodies.
 White women are 23% of appointees compared to 17% of the San Francisco population.
 White men are 26% of appointees compared to 20% of the population.
- Black and African American women and men are well-represented on San Francisco policy bodies. Black women are 9% of appointees compared to 2.4% of the population, and Black men are 5% of appointees compared to 2.5% of the population.
- Latinx women are 7% of the San Francisco population but 3% of appointees, and Latinx men are 7% of the population but 5% of appointees.
- Asian women are 17% of the San Francisco population but 11% of appointees, and Asian men are 15% of the population but just 7% of appointees.

10-Year Comparison of Representation of Women of Color on Policy Bodies

Additional Demographics

- Out of the 74% of appointees who responded to the survey question on LGBTQ identity, 19% identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, nonbinary, queer, or questioning, and 81% of appointees identify as straight/heterosexual.
- Out of the 70% of appointees who responded to the question on disability, 11% identify as having one or more disabilities, which is just below the 12% of the adult population with a disability in San Francisco.
- Out of the 67% of appointees who responded to the question on veteran status, 7% have served in the military compared to 3% of the San Francisco population.

Proxies for Influence: Budget & Authority

- Although women are half of all appointees, those Commissions and Boards with the largest budgets have fewer women and especially fewer women of color. Meanwhile, women exceed representation on Boards and Commissions with the smallest budgets and women of color reach parity with the population on the smallest budgeted Commissions and Boards.
- Although still underrepresented relative to the San Francisco population, there is a larger percentage of people of color on Commissions and Boards with both the largest and smallest budgets compared to overall appointees.
- The percentage of total women is greater on Advisory Bodies than Commissions and Boards. Women are 54% of appointees on Advisory Bodies and 48% of appointees on Commissions and Boards. However, the percentages of people of color and women of color on Commissions and Boards exceed the percentages of people of color and women of color on Advisory Bodies.

Appointing Authorities

Mayoral appointments include 55% women, 52% people of color, and 30% women of color, which is more diverse by gender and race compared to both Supervisorial appointments and total appointments.

I. Introduction

Inspired by the 4th UN World Conference on Women in Beijing, San Francisco became the first city in the world to adopt a local ordinance reflecting the principles of the U.N. Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination (CEDAW), an international bill of rights for women. The CEDAW Ordinance was passed unanimously by the San Francisco Board of Supervisors and signed into law by Mayor Willie L. Brown, Jr. on April 13, 1998.² In 2002, the CEDAW Ordinance was revised to address the intersection of race and gender and incorporate reference to the UN Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Race Discrimination. The Ordinance requires City Government to take proactive steps to ensure gender equity and specifies "gender analysis" as a preventive tool to identify and address discrimination. Since 1998, the Department on the Status of Women has employed this tool to analyze the operations of 10 City Departments using a gender lens.

In 2007, the Department on the Status of Women conducted the first gender analysis to evaluate the number of women appointed to City Commissions and Boards. The findings of this analysis informed a City Charter Amendment developed by the Board of Supervisors for the June 2008 Election. This City Charter Amendment (Section 4.101) was overwhelmingly approved by voters and made it city policy that:

- The membership of Commissions and Boards are to reflect the diversity of San Francisco's population,
- Appointing officials are to be urged to support the nomination, appointment, and confirmation of these candidates, and
- The Department on the Status of Women is required to conduct and publish a gender analysis of Commissions and Boards every 2 years.

The 2019 Gender Analysis examines the representation of women; people of color; lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and questioning (LGBTQ) individuals; people with disabilities; and veterans on San Francisco policy bodies primarily appointed by the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors. This year's analysis included more outreach to policy bodies as compared to previous analyses that were limited to Commissions and Boards. As a result, more appointees were included in the data collection and analysis than even before. These policy bodies fall under two categories designated by the San Francisco Office of the City Attorney. The first category, referred to as "Commissions and Boards," are policy bodies with decision-making authority and whose members are required to submit financial disclosures to the Ethics Commission, and the second category, referred to as "Advisory Bodies," are policy bodies with advisory function whose members do not submit financial disclosures to the Ethics Commission of methodology and limitations can be found at the end of this report on page 23.

II. Gender Analysis Findings

Many aspects of San Francisco's diversity are reflected in the overall population of appointees on San Francisco policy bodies. The analysis includes 84 policy bodies, of which 823 of the 887 seats are filled leaving 7% vacant. As outlined below in the summary chart, slightly more than half of appointees are women, half of appointees are people of color, 28% are women of color, 19% are LGBTQ, 11% have a disability, and 7% are veterans.

However, further analysis reveals underrepresentation of particular groups. Subsequent sections present comprehensive data analysis providing comparison to previous years, detailing the variables of gender, race/ethnicity, LGBTQ identity, disability, veteran status, and policy body characteristics of budget size, decision-making authority, and appointment authority.

A. Gender

On San Francisco policy bodies, 51% of appointees identify as women, which is slightly above parity compared to the San Francisco female population of 49%. The representation of women remained stable at 49% from 2013 until 2017. This year, the representation of women increased by 2 percentage points, which could be partly due to the larger sample size used in this year's analysis compared to previous years. A 10-year comparison shows that the representation of women appointees has gradually increased since 2009 by a total of six percentage points.

Figures 3 and 4 analyze Commissions and Boards. Figure 3 showcases the five Commissions and Boards with the highest representation of women appointees as compared to 2015 and 2013. The Children and Families (First Five) Commission and the Commission on the Status of Women are currently comprised of all women appointees. This finding has been consistent for the Commission on the Status of Women in 2015 and 2017. While the Ethics Commission has 100% women appointees, much more than 2015 and 2017, its small size of five appointees means that minimal changes in its demographic composition greatly impacts percentages. This is also the case for other policy bodies with a small number of members. The Library Commission and the Commission on the Environment are fourth and fifth on the list at 71% and 67% women, respectively, with long standing female majorities on each.





Out of the Commissions and Boards in this section, 23 have 40% or less women. The five Commissions and Boards with the lowest representation of women are displayed in Figure 4. The lowest percentage is found on the Board of Examiners where currently *none* of the 13 appointees are women. Unfortunately, demographic data is unavailable for the Board of Examiners for 2017 and 2015. Next is the Building Inspection Commission at 14%, which is a decrease of female representation compared to 2017 and 2015. The Oversight Board of Community Investment and Infrastructure, Fire Commission, and Sunshine Ordinance Task Force also have some of the lowest percentages of women at 17%, 20%, and 27%, respectively. Unfortunately, the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force did not participate in previous

In addition to Commissions and Boards, Advisory Bodies were examined for the highest and lowest percentages of women. This is the first year such bodies have been included, thus comparison to previous years is unavailable. Figure 9 below displays the five Advisory Bodies with the highest and the five with the lowest representations of women. The Workforce Community Advisory Committees has the greatest representation of women at 100%, followed by the Office of Early Care and Education Citizen's Advisory Committee at 89%. The Advisory Bodies with the lowest percentage of women are the Urban Forestry Council at 8% of the 13-member body and the Abatement Appeals Board at 14% of the 7-member body.

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B. Race and Ethnicity

Data on racial and ethnic identity was collected for 706, or 95%, of the 741 surveyed appointees. Although half of appointees identify as a race or ethnicity other than white or Caucasian, people of color are still underrepresented compared to the San Francisco population of 62%. The representation of people of color has increased since 2009 but has decreased following 2015. The number of appointees analyzed increased substantially in 2017 and 2019 compared to 2015, and these larger data samples have coincided with smaller percentages of people of color. The percentage decrease following 2017 could be partially due to the inclusion of more policy and advisory bodies, as the representation of people of color on Commissions and Boards dropped only slightly from 53% in 2017 to 52% in 2019.

The racial and ethnic breakdown of policy body members compared to the San Francisco population is shown in Figure 7. This analysis reveals underrepresentation and overrepresentation in San Francisco policy bodies for certain racial and ethnic groups. Half of all appointees are white, an overrepresentation by more than 10 percentage points. The Black and African American community is well represented on appointed policy bodies at 14% compared to 5% of the population of San Francisco. Characterizing this as an overrepresentation is inaccurate given the representation of Black or African American people on policy bodies has been consistent over the years while the San Francisco population has declined over the same period.³ Furthermore, the most recent nationwide estimate for the Black or African American population is 13%, which is nearly equal to the 14% of Black or African American appointees present on San Francisco policy bodies.⁴

Considerably underrepresented racial and ethnic groups on San Francisco policy bodies compared to the San Francisco population are individuals who identify as Asian or Latinx. While Asians are 31% of the San Francisco population, they only make up 18% of appointees. While the Latinx population of San Francisco is 14%, only 8% of appointees are Latinx. Although there is a small population of Native

Americans and Alaska Natives in San Francisco of 0.4%, none of the surveyed appointees identified themselves as such.

The next two graphs illustrate Commissions and Boards, and Advisory Bodies with the highest and lowest percentages of people of color. As shown in Figure 8, the Commission on Community Investment and Infrastructure remained at 100% from 2017, while the Juvenile Probation Commission has returned to 100% this year after a dip in 2017. Next is the Health Commission, Immigrant Rights Commission, and Housing Authority Commission at 86%, 85%, and 83%, respectively. Percentages of people of color on both the Health Commission and the Housing Authority Commission increased following 2015, and have remained consistent since 2017.

There are 23 policy bodies that have 40% or less appointees who identified a racial and ethnic category other than white. Although the Public Utilities Commission has two vacancies, *none* of the current appointees identify as people of color. The Historic Preservation Commission and Building Inspection Commission are both at 14% representation for people of color. The Building Inspection Commission had a large drop from 43% in 2015, with the percentage of people of color decreasing to 14% in 2017 and remaining at this percent for 2019. Lastly, the War Memorial Board of Trustees and City Hall Preservation Advisory Commission have 18% and 20%, respectively.

In addition to Commissions and Boards, Advisory Bodies were examined for the highest and lowest percentages of people of color. This is the first year such bodies have been included, thus comparison to previous years is unavailable. All members of the Workforce Community Advisory Committee are people of color. People of color comprise 80% of the Sugary Drinks Distributor Tax Advisory Committee, and 75% of appointees on the Children, Youth and Their Families Oversight and Advisory Committee, the Golden Gate Park Concourse Authority, and the Local Homeless Coordinating Board. Out of the five Advisory Bodies with the lowest representation of people of color, the Ballot Simplification Committee and the Mayor's Disability Council have 25% appointees of color, and the Abatement Appeals Board has 14% appointees of color. The Urban Forestry and the Pedestrian Safety Advisory Committee have no people of color currently serving.

C. Race and Ethnicity by Gender

White men and women are overrepresented on San Francisco policy bodies, while Asian and Latinx men and women are underrepresented. While women of color continue to be underrepresented at 28% compared to the San Francisco population of 32%, this is a slight increase from 2017 which showed 27% women of color. Meanwhile, men of color are 21% of appointees compared to 31% of the San Francisco population.

The following figures present the breakdown for appointees and the San Francisco population by race and ethnicity and gender. White men and women are overrepresented, holding 27% and 23% of appointments, respectively, compared to 20% and 17% of the population, respectively. Asian men and women are both greatly underrepresented with Asian women making up 11% of appointees compared to 17% of the population while Asian men comprise 7% of appointees and 15% of the population. Latinx men and women are also underrepresented, particularly Latinx women, who are 3% of appointees and 7% of the population, while Latinx men are 5% of appointees and 7% of the population. Black or African American men and women are well-represented with Black women comprising 9% of appointees and Black men comprising 5% of appointees. Pacific Islander men and women, and multiethnic women also exceed parity with the population. Although Native American men and women make up only 0.4% of San Francisco's population, none of the surveyed appointees identified themselves as such.

D. LGBTQ Identity

Lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and questioning (LGBTQ) identity data was collected from 548, or 75%, of the 741 surveyed appointees, which is much more data on LGBTQ identity compared to previous reports. Due to limited and outdated information on the population of the LGBTQ community in San Francisco, it is difficult to adequately assess the representation of the LGBTQ community. However, compared to available San Francisco, larger Bay Area, and national data, the LGBTQ community is well represented on San Francisco policy bodies. Recent research estimates the national LGBT population is 4.5%.⁵ The LGBT population of the San Francisco and greater Bay Area is estimated to rank the highest of U.S. cities at 6.2%,⁶ while a 2006 survey found that 15.4% of adults in San Francisco identify as LGBT⁷.

Of the appointees who responded to this question, 19% identify as LGBTQ and 81% identify as straight or heterosexual. Of the LGBTQ appointees, 48% identify as gay, 23% as lesbian, 17% as bisexual, 7% as queer, 5% as transgender, and 1% as questioning. Data on LGBTQ identity by race was not captured. Efforts to capture data on LGBTQ identity by race for future reports would enable more intersectional analysis.

E. Disability Status

Overall, 12% of adults in San Francisco have one or more disabilities, and when broken down by gender, 6.2% are women and 5.7% are men. Disability data for transgender and gender non-conforming individuals in San Francisco is currently unavailable. Data on disability was obtained from 516, or 70%, of the 714 appointees who participated in the survey. Of the 516 appointees, 11.2% reported to have one

or more disabilities, which is near parity with the San Francisco population. Of the 11.2% appointees with one or more disabilities, 6.8% are women, 3.9% are men, 0.4% are trans women, and 0.2% are trans men.

F. Veteran Status

Overall, 3.2% of the adult population in San Francisco has served in the military. There is a considerable difference by gender, as male veterans are 3% and female veterans are 0.2% of the population. Data on veteran status was obtained from 494, or 67%, of appointees who participated in the survey. Of the 494 appointees who responded to this question, 7.1% have served in the military. Like the San Francisco population, there is a large difference by gender, as men comprise 5.7% and women make up only 1.2% of the total number of veteran appointees. Of participating appointees, 0.2% of veterans are trans women. Veteran status data on transgender and gender non-conforming individuals in San Francisco is currently unavailable.

G. Policy Bodies by Budget

This report also examines whether policy bodies with the largest and smallest budget sizes and other characteristics are demographically representative of the San Francisco population. In this section, budget size is used as a proxy for influence. Although this report has expanded the scope of analysis to include more policy bodies compared to previous reports, this section of analysis was limited to Commissions and Boards with decision-making authority and whose members file financial disclosures with the Ethics Commission. The purpose of this analysis is to evaluate the demographics for the spectrum of budgetary influence of policy bodies with decision-making authority in San Francisco.

Overall, appointees from the 10 largest budgeted Commissions and Boards are 55% people of color, 41% women, and 23% women of color. Appointees from the 10 smallest budgeted Commissions and Boards are 54% people of color, 52% women, and 32% women of color. Although still below parity with the San Francisco population, the representation of people of color on both the largest and smallest budgeted policy bodies is greater than the percentage of people of color for all appointees combined (50%). For women and women of color, their representation meets or exceeds parity with the population on the 10 smallest budgeted bodies. However, it falls far below parity for the 10 largest budgeted bodies. The representation of total women and women of color is greater on smaller budgeted policy bodies by 27%, and 39%, respectively.

H. Comparison of Advisory Body and Commission and Board Demographics

The comparison of the two policy body categories in this section provides another proxy for influence, as Commissions and Boards whose members file disclosures of economic interest have greater decisionmaking authority in San Francisco than Advisory Bodies whose members do not file economic interest disclosures. The percentages of total women, LGBTQ people, people with disabilities, and veterans are larger for total appointees on Advisory Bodies. However, the percentages of women of color and people of color on Commissions and Boards slightly exceeds the percentages of women of color and people of color on Advisory Bodies.

I. Demographics of Mayoral, Supervisorial, and Total Appointees

Figure 24 compares the representation of women, women of color, and people of color for appointments made by the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, and by the total of all approving authorities combined. Mayoral appointments are more diverse, and consist of more women, women of color, and people of color compared to Supervisorial appointments. Mayoral appointments include 55% women, 30% women of color, and 52% people of color, while Supervisorial appointments are 48% women, 24% women of color, and 48% people of color. The total of all approving authorities combined average out at 51% women, 28% women of color, and 50% people of color. This disparity in diversity between Mayoral and Supervisorial appointments may be due in part to the appointment section process for each authority. The 11-member Board of Supervisors only sees applicants for specific bodies through the 3-member Rules Committee or by designees, stipulated in legislation (e.g. "renter," "landlord," "consumer advocate"), whereas the Mayor typically has the ability to take total appointments into account during selections, and can therefore better address gaps in diversity.

III. Conclusion

Since the first gender analysis of Commissions and Boards in 2007, the representation of women appointees on San Francisco policy bodies has gradually increased. The *2019 Gender Analysis* finds the percentage of women appointees is 51%, which slightly exceeds the population of women in San Francisco.

When appointee demographics are analyzed by gender and race, women of color continue to be underrepresented on San Francisco policy bodies compared to the San Francisco population. Most notably underrepresented are Asian women who make up 17% of the population but only 11% of appointees, and Latinx women who make up 7% of the population but only 3% of appointees. Additionally, men of color are underrepresented relative to their San Francisco population, primarily Asian and Latinx men.

Furthermore, when analyzing the demographic composition of larger and smaller budgeted Commissions and Boards, women are underrepresented on those with the largest budgets, and overrepresented or reach parity with the population on smaller budgeted Commissions and Boards. These two trends are amplified for women of color appointees. Women comprise 41% of total appointees on the largest budgeted policy bodies, which is 8 percentage points below the population, and women of color comprise 23% of total appointees on the largest budgeted policy bodies, 9 percentage points below their San Francisco population. Comparatively, women are 52% of total appointees on the smallest budgeted policy bodies, and women of color are 32% of appointees, which is equal to the San Francisco population. However, the issue of largest and smallest budgeted policy bodies does not seem to impact the representation of people of color. People of color make up 55% of appointees on the largest budgeted policy bodies and 54% of appointees on the smallest budgeted policy bodies compared to 50% of total appointees. Nonetheless, these percentages still fall below the San Francisco population of people of color at 62%.

In addition to using budget size as a proxy for influence, this report analyzed demographic characteristics of appointees on Commissions and Boards who file disclosures of economic interest and have decision-making authority, and appointees on Advisory Bodies who do not file economic interest disclosures. Over half (54%) of appointees on Advisory Bodies are women, while 48% of appointees on Commissions and Boards are women. Although 48% is only slightly below the San Francisco population of women, women comprise a decently higher percentage of appointees on Advisory Bodies compared to Commissions and Boards.

This year's report features more data on LGBTQ identity, veteran status, and disability than previous gender analyses. The *2019 Gender Analysis* found a relatively high representation of LGBTQ individuals on San Francisco policy bodies. For the appointees that provided LGBTQ identity information, 19% identify as LGBTQ with the largest subset being gay men at 48%. It is recommended for future gender analyses to collect LGBTQ data by race and gender to provide additional intersectional analysis. The representation of appointees with disabilities is 11%, just below the 12% population. Veterans are highly represented on San Francisco policy bodies at 7% compared to the veteran population of 3%.

Additionally, this report evaluates and compares the representation of women, women of color, and people of color appointees by the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, and by the total of all approving authorities combined. Mayoral appointees include 55% women, 30% women of color, and 52% people

of color, which overall is more diverse by gender and race compared to both Supervisorial appointees and total appointees.

This report is intended to advise the Mayor, Board of Supervisors, and other appointing authorities, as they select appointments for policy bodies of the City and County of San Francisco. In spirit of the 2008 City Charter Amendment that establishes this biennial Gender Analysis report requirement and the importance of diversity on San Francisco policy bodies, efforts to address gaps in diversity and inclusion should remain at the forefront when making appointments in order to accurately reflect the population of San Francisco.

IV. Methodology and Limitations

This report focuses on City and County of San Francisco Commissions, Boards, Task Forces, Councils, and Committees that have the majority of members appointed by the Mayor and Board of Supervisors and that have jurisdiction limited to the City. The gender analysis reflects data from the policy bodies that provided information to the Department on the Status of Women through digital and paper survey.

Data was requested from 90 policy bodies and acquired from 84 different policy bodies and a total of 741 appointees. A Commissioner or Board member's gender identity, race/ethnicity, sexual orientation, disability status, and veteran status were among data elements collected on a voluntary basis. Data on lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, or questioning (LGBTQ) identity, disability, and veteran status of appointees were incomplete or unavailable for some appointees but are included to the extent possible. As the fundamental objective of this report is to surface patterns of underrepresentation, every attempt has been made to reflect accurate and complete information in this report. Data for some policy bodies was incomplete, and all appointees who responded were included in the total demographic categories. Only policy bodies with full data on gender and race for all appointees were included in sections comparing demographics of individual bodies. It should be noted that for policy bodies with a small number of members, the change of a single individual greatly impacts the percentages of demographic categories. As such, these percentages should be interpreted with this in mind.

The surveyed policy bodies fall under two categories designated by the San Francisco Office of the City Attorney document entitled *List of City Boards, Commissions, and Advisory Bodies Created by Charter, Ordinance, or Statute.*⁸ This document separates San Francisco policy bodies into two different categories. The first category includes Commissions and Boards with decision-making authority and whose members are required to submit financial disclosures with the Ethics Commission, and the second category encompasses Advisory Bodies whose members do not submit financial disclosures with the Ethics Commission. Depending on the analysis criteria in each section of this report, the surveyed policy bodies and appointees are either examined comprehensively as a whole or examined separately in the two categories designated by the Office of the City Attorney.

Data from the U.S. Census 2013-2017 American Community Survey 5-Year Estimates provides a comparison to the San Francisco population. Figures 26 and 27 in the Appendix display these population estimates by race/ethnicity and gender.

Dear Chair Ronen and Rules Committee Members,

I am submitting testimony opposing any re-appointment of David Pilpel to the SOTF.

Attached, please find:

- A. Testimony I submitted to the Rules Committee opposing Mr. Pilpel's application for appointment to SOTF on April 27, 2016 when then-Supervisor Katy Tang was Chairperson of the Rules Committee, and
- B. Testimony submitted to the Rules Committee by labor leader Claire Zvanski on April 26, 2016 opposing Mr. Pilpel's application for appointment to SOTF in 2016; Ms. Zvanski's letter is a public record in the background files of the Rules Committee and her testimony was more than likely posted on-line in the public correspondence file for the Rules Committee's hearing on Pilpel's application in 2016.

Both my testimony in April 2016 and Ms. Zvanski's testimony in April 2016 are part and parcel of the historical record on why Mr. Pilpel should never be re-appointed to SOTF — not now, and not ever.

In summary, the reasons the current Rules Committee should not even recommend to the full Board of Supervisor Pilpel for appointment to SOTF include:

- 1. Although the Rules Committee in 2016 forwarded a recommendation to the full Board of Supervisors to potentially consider Pilpel for re-appointment to the SOTF, the full Board had the wisdom not to do so, and Mr. Pilpel was **not** re-appointed to SOTF when his term expired in 2016.
- 2. Pilpel's prior disruptive behavior as a member of two policy bodies the SFMTA's *Citizens Advisory Council* (CAC) and the PUC's CAC prevented his being re-appointed to either policy body. Mr. Pilpel's application dated January 6, 2021 cited his service on those two policy bodies in the "Civic Activities" section of his application, but he failed to note to this Rules Committee that he was **not** re-appointed to either policy body.

I learned the weekend of April 24, 2016 by reliable report that former Supervisor Katy Tang — the then-chairperson of the Rules Committee — was responsible for, or instrumental in, blocking David Pilpel's re-appointment to both the SFMTA Citizen's Advisory Council (CAC) and to the SF PUC's Citizen's Advisory Committee (CAC) due to many complaints from both CAC members and SFMTA staff.

- 3. Public testimony submitted in April 2016 (see attached) documented Pilpel's previous history of rifling through the desks of SFMTA employees at MUNI's headquarters after hours. He did so not as a once or twice occurrence, but as a regular practice. By report, he continued to snoop around City offices for a number of years.
- 4. Pilpel has refused to recuse himself from hearing SOTF complaints after the complainants noted his conflict of interest, or perceived conflicts of interest.

- 5. Pilpel's attendance record at 15 SOTF meetings held between October 2013 and August 2014 when he was appointed on the SOTF was pathetic; he missed four 26.7% of those 15 meetings.
- 6. Pilpel was observed engaging in *ex parte* communications with City department employees named as respondents in Sunshine complaints filed with SOTF, jeopardizing the outcome of proceedings for the complainants.
- 7. Two complaints were filed with the Ethics Commission for violations of the Statements of Incompatible Activities applicable to Board of Supervisors and SOTF members.
- 8. Pilpel withheld and misrepresented key information regarding due process issues from the Rules Committee in 2014 when the 2014 Rules Committee was considering re-appointing him to SOTF in 2014.
- 9. By report, Pilpel also exhibited on-going disruptive behavior when he served on the Redistricting Task Force, but of course, he also didn't mention that in his January 6, 2021 application for re-appointment to the SOTF.
- 10. On April 6, 2016, an hour-and-a-half into a Sunshine Task Force meeting, Pilpel suddenly requested being recused from hearing a complaint filed by Ray Hartz, Jr. involving the Ethics Commission. The MP3 audio of that meeting shows that then-Task Force Member Mark Rumold a lawyer who held a Task Force seat reserved for nominations from the Society of Professional Journalists noted that the Task Force may potentially want to eventually discuss whether Pilpel had abused his duties as a member of the Task Force often.

The now current Rules Committee must not make the same mistake of forwarding Pilpel's name to the full Board of Supervisors for consideration of re-appointment to the SOTF.

This time, on January 11, 2011 the Rules Committee should forward an explicit recommendation to the full Board of Supervisors clearly rejecting appointing Mr. Pilpel and specifically declining to submit his name for any further consideration by the full Board of Supervisors.

As I noted in April 2016, leopards rarely change their spots and tigers rarely change their stripes. Both animals rarely change their behavior. So, too, with David Pilpel.

It's time to stop considering him for appointment to any Board or Commission in City government, since he's far too disruptive to transparency and accountability.

Re: Opposition to Re-Appointment of David Pilpel to Sunshine Ordinance Task Force

Dear Rules Committee Members,

Please do not approve recommending applicant David Pilpel to another term on the SOTF for the following reasons.

Prior Disruptive Behavior Prevented His Re-Appointment to Two CAC's

Mr. Pilpel's behavior as a member of other policy bodies has been totally disruptive.

Despite Pilpel's claim on his application that he has served on the SFMTA CAC, SFPUUC CAC, and on the Redistricting Task Force, he was not re-appointed to the MTA CAC in 2009 or earlier, reportedly due to his disruptive behavior and badgering of MTA CAC members and MTA staff. Similarly, within approximately the past year Pilpel was not re-appointed to the PUC CAC for the largely the same reason, as Supervisor Tang must be aware. And by report, Pilpel was extremely disruptive when he served on the Redistricting Task Force.

Poor Attendance Record

Between October 2, 2013 and August 24, 2014, the SOTF held 15 meetings. Pilpel was absent four times -26.7% — of those 14 meetings.

Refusal to Recuse Himself vs. Recusal From Hearing Complaints

- On May 5, 2015, a Sunshine complaint filed by Brian Browne against the SF PUC was calendared for a hearing before the Sunshine Task Force. Browne aware that Pilpel was then serving on the PUC's CAC requested that Pilpel recuse himself from hearing Browne's complaint due to a potential conflict of interest. Pilpel refused, and announced that although he was a member of the PUC's CAC, he should NOT have to recluse himself. Browne's complaint was continued to a future meeting of the Task Force.
- On April 6, 2016, an hour-and-a-half into the Sunshine Task Force's meeting, Pilpel suddenly requested being recused from hearing a complaint filed by Ray Hartz, Jr. involving the Ethics Commission. Pilpel admitted he had attended the Ethics Commission's January 25 meeting and had testified several times that the Commission was making a mistake because he felt an item on the Ethics Commission's agenda "was not framed properly for public discussion." Pilpel felt the Ethics Commission was not conducting themselves appropriately. Subsequently Hartz filed a Sunshine complaint concerning the Ethics Commission's January 25 meeting.

Pilpel claimed he had been speaking as a "private citizen" but it was obvious he was providing advice to the Ethics Commission in his role as a member of the Sunshine Task Force.

Hartz's complaint that was supposed to be heard on April 6 involved the new Executive Director of Ethics, LeeAnn Pelham. The draft minutes of the Task Force's April 6 minutes only reported that Pilpel wanted to avoid the appearance of bias.

Pilpel requested to be recused from hearing the matter. The MP3 audio file of the April 6 Task Force meeting shows that Pilpel stated during the meeting that "my view is that I have either bias, or the appearance thereof" [for having spoken during the Ethics Commission's meeting on January 25]. But there should have been no need for him to recuse himself if he had, in fact, been speaking as a private citizen. And there should have been no question about whether Pilpel was engaging in "bias" if he had been speaking as a member of the public.

The MP3 audio also shows that Task Force Member Mark Rumold — a lawyer who holds a Task Force seat reserved for nominations from the Society of Professional Journalists — noted that potentially the Task Force may want to eventually discuss whether Pilpel has abused his duties as a member of the Task Force often, and that, if so, the Task Force we could take some action later.

There doesn't seem to be much rhyme or reason as to when Pilpel decides whether or not to request being recused from hearing items on the agenda.

Ex Parte Communications

On May 5, 2015 following the hearing on Brian Browne's Sunshine complainant, Pilpel raced up to the SFPUC representative who had attended the hearing and who was enroute to the elevator, and began speaking with the PUC rep. Browne reportedly said "Mr. Pilpel, I hope you are not talking to her about my case." It's one of many examples — not an isolated occurrence — of Pilpel having sidebar — *ex parte* — conversations with respondents regarding Sunshine complaints prior to hearing the merits of a complainant's formal complaint.

Undermining Sunshine Complainants

Also in 2015, Pilpel submitted a letter to the Ethics Commission prior to an Ethics Commission hearing involving a Sunshine complaint Paula Datesch had filed against the Art Commission that the Task Force had referred to the Ethics for enforcement. Pilpel intentionally interfered with the Ethics Commission's deliberations by offering his so-called "personal opinion" on a matter that the Task Force had already ruled on and had concluded. Pilpel has no compulsion about trying to overturn Sunshine Task Force decisions that he doesn't agree with, and is brazen enough to show up at Ethics hearings to intentionally undercut official Orders of Determination the Task Force had issued.

It is thought Pilpel has interfered with other concluded Orders of Determination issued by the Task Force after-the-fact, and this is not an isolated incident.

Two Ethics Complaints Involving Violations of the Statement of Incompatible Activities Applicable to the Board of Supervisors and SOTF Members

In 2014 I filed two Ethics complaints against Mr. Pilpel alleging that he had violated the SIA applicable to SOTF members. In the first Ethics complaint, I noted Pilpel had identified himself during public comment at a meeting of the Ethics Commission as "David Pilpel, Member of SOTF," rather than as a member of the public, as if he were authorized to speak on behalf of the full Task Force.

After I filed my complaints, Pilpel became somewhat more careful to claim he addresses policy bodies as a member of the public, although he has been reported by other observers as having continued to identify himself as a member of SOTF when addressing other policy bodies.

Mr. Pilpel had *not* sought an Advance Written Determination that testifying to the Ethics Commission about a Sunshine Complaint adjudicated and finalized by the full Task Force is *not* incompatible with his official duties.

In my second Ethics complaint, the underlying issue was not whether Mr. Pilpel is permitted to speak before other policy bodies on issues *outside* the scope of his duties as a member of the Sunshine Task Force (for example speaking during a meeting of a Commission considering a land use matter that might affect Mr. Pilpel's neighborhood). Instead, the underlying issue was whether Pilpel is permitted to speak to another policy body on issues that are *inside* the scope of his duties as a Sunshine Task Force member (i.e., speaking about a matter inside the scope of his duties, *after* the full Task Force had concluded the matter and referred it to the Ethics Commission for enforcement).

When Mr. Pilpel voluntarily became a member of the Task Force, he was automatically bound under the governing SIA to restrict his testimony on matters falling *inside* the scope of his duties before other bodies. As a member of the Task Force, he has a duty to support and abide by decisions reached by a majority of Task Force members.

Pilpel's *ex parte* communications with other Policy Bodies and his testimony during other Policy Body meetings are a ruse when he claims to be speaking as a private citizen. His claims are a sham, when not a pretense or pretext, since it is clear he is trying to provide testimony in his role as a member of the Task Force, not so much as a member of the public.

His ruse needs to stop, and the Rules Committee can do so by refusing to advance him for consideration for re-appointment to the Task Force. Please refuse to support him application; it's long overdue that you dump him off of SOTF.

Pilpel Withheld Key Information from Rules Committee in May 2014

To the extent that Pilpel sought to sway the Rules Committee into re-appointing him to the Sunshine Task Force on May 15, 2014 by blabbing his wild assertion that members of the SOTF didn't understand where "due process attaches," he may have gamed re-appointment to the Task Force by withholding informing Supervisors Yee and Tang on May 15 that just 17 days earlier when Pilpel had raised the "due process" issue during the Sunshine complaint hearing involving Phil Ginsburg before the Ethics Commission, Deputy City Attorney Josh White who advises the Ethics Commission, had to interject and inform Ethics Commissioners that "due process" didn't apply.

It is completely egregious that Pilpel — who must have fully understood DCA White's clear City Attorney advice — withheld DCA White's advice from Tang and Yee in 2014, and repeated the "due process" misinformation that White had shot down, during his testimony seeking re-appointment to the Task Force. Indeed, it could be argued that by ignoring DCA White's "City Attorney opinion," and repeating due process misinformation, Pilpel had failed Katy Tang's "litmus test" of undying fealty to City Attorney "advice" as a condition of appointment to the Task Force.

Conclusion

The Rules Committee should not make the same mistake twice by referring Mr. Pilpel for re-appointment to the Task Force again, after he duped you in May 2014.

After all, leopards rarely change their spots, and tigers rarely change their stripes. Both animals rarely change their behavior. So, too, with David Pilpel. It's time to get rid of him as being too disruptive.

It is my understanding that the Rules Committee will be considering appointments to the Sunshine Task Force this Thursday, April 28. It is also my understanding that **David Pilpel** has submitted his application for reappointment to that task force.

I have known David for more than 25 years. He was a teenager when I used to have to physically extract him from offices at MUNI headquarters (on Presidio at Geary in those days). He was regularly rifling through desks of managers and other employees and also going through our file cabinets for "information" on various projects and issues. He would often come in after hours when those managers would have gone home for the day. This was not a once or twice occurrence. It was a regular practice for a very long time. He was reported, but he continued to do this as long as the doors of the building were not locked. Later, security measures were taken and he could not easily access our building after hours. So, he would come in and "visit" with various managers at the end of the day but not leave the building at closing.

Mr. Pilpel has continued to probe/snoop into City business and City offices over the years. As a retired City employee with nearly 40 years of service behind me, I found and continue to find Mr. Pilpel's methods despicable and his motives questionable. While I support transparency and the public's right to know, I also understand the need for files and work products to remain protected. There is a time and place for everything.

All this is to say that I don't believe Mr. Pilpel is appropriate for reappointment to the Sunshine Task Force. Colleagues of mine have told me of his ongoing unorthodox methods in seeking information and also his harassment of both City employees and elected/appointed individuals. These are unprofessional methods and behaviors that should not be rewarded by appointment to an official City body, especially the Sunshine Task Force.

Please reject the reappointment of David Pilpel to the Sunshine Task Force.

Dear Chair Ronen and Rules Committee Members,

I am submitting testimony opposing any re-appointment of David Pilpel to the SOTF.

Attached, please find:

- A. Testimony I submitted to the Rules Committee opposing Mr. Pilpel's application for appointment to SOTF on April 27, 2016 when then-Supervisor Katy Tang was Chairperson of the Rules Committee, and
- B. Testimony submitted to the Rules Committee by labor leader Claire Zvanski on April 26, 2016 opposing Mr. Pilpel's application for appointment to SOTF in 2016; Ms. Zvanski's letter is a public record in the background files of the Rules Committee and her testimony was more than likely posted on-line in the public correspondence file for the Rules Committee's hearing on Pilpel's application in 2016.

Both my testimony in April 2016 and Ms. Zvanski's testimony in April 2016 are part and parcel of the historical record on why Mr. Pilpel should never be re-appointed to SOTF — not now, and not ever.

In summary, the reasons the current Rules Committee should not even recommend to the full Board of Supervisor Pilpel for appointment to SOTF include:

- 1. Although the Rules Committee in 2016 forwarded a recommendation to the full Board of Supervisors to potentially consider Pilpel for re-appointment to the SOTF, the full Board had the wisdom not to do so, and Mr. Pilpel was **not** re-appointed to SOTF when his term expired in 2016.
- 2. Pilpel's prior disruptive behavior as a member of two policy bodies the SFMTA's *Citizens Advisory Council* (CAC) and the PUC's CAC prevented his being re-appointed to either policy body. Mr. Pilpel's application dated January 6, 2021 cited his service on those two policy bodies in the "Civic Activities" section of his application, but he failed to note to this Rules Committee that he was **not** re-appointed to either policy body.

I learned the weekend of April 24, 2016 by reliable report that former Supervisor Katy Tang — the then-chairperson of the Rules Committee — was responsible for, or instrumental in, blocking David Pilpel's re-appointment to both the SFMTA Citizen's Advisory Council (CAC) and to the SF PUC's Citizen's Advisory Committee (CAC) due to many complaints from both CAC members and SFMTA staff.

- 3. Public testimony submitted in April 2016 (see attached) documented Pilpel's previous history of rifling through the desks of SFMTA employees at MUNI's headquarters after hours. He did so not as a once or twice occurrence, but as a regular practice. By report, he continued to snoop around City offices for a number of years.
- 4. Pilpel has refused to recuse himself from hearing SOTF complaints after the complainants noted his conflict of interest, or perceived conflicts of interest.

- 5. Pilpel's attendance record at 15 SOTF meetings held between October 2013 and August 2014 when he was appointed on the SOTF was pathetic; he missed four 26.7% of those 15 meetings.
- 6. Pilpel was observed engaging in *ex parte* communications with City department employees named as respondents in Sunshine complaints filed with SOTF, jeopardizing the outcome of proceedings for the complainants.
- 7. Two complaints were filed with the Ethics Commission for violations of the Statements of Incompatible Activities applicable to Board of Supervisors and SOTF members.
- 8. Pilpel withheld and misrepresented key information regarding due process issues from the Rules Committee in 2014 when the 2014 Rules Committee was considering re-appointing him to SOTF in 2014.
- 9. By report, Pilpel also exhibited on-going disruptive behavior when he served on the Redistricting Task Force, but of course, he also didn't mention that in his January 6, 2021 application for re-appointment to the SOTF.
- 10. On April 6, 2016, an hour-and-a-half into a Sunshine Task Force meeting, Pilpel suddenly requested being recused from hearing a complaint filed by Ray Hartz, Jr. involving the Ethics Commission. The MP3 audio of that meeting shows that then-Task Force Member Mark Rumold a lawyer who held a Task Force seat reserved for nominations from the Society of Professional Journalists noted that the Task Force may potentially want to eventually discuss whether Pilpel had abused his duties as a member of the Task Force often.

The now current Rules Committee must not make the same mistake of forwarding Pilpel's name to the full Board of Supervisors for consideration of re-appointment to the SOTF.

This time, on January 11, 2011 the Rules Committee should forward an explicit recommendation to the full Board of Supervisors clearly rejecting appointing Mr. Pilpel and specifically declining to submit his name for any further consideration by the full Board of Supervisors.

As I noted in April 2016, leopards rarely change their spots and tigers rarely change their stripes. Both animals rarely change their behavior. So, too, with David Pilpel.

It's time to stop considering him for appointment to any Board or Commission in City government, since he's far too disruptive to transparency and accountability.

Re: Opposition to Re-Appointment of David Pilpel to Sunshine Ordinance Task Force

Dear Rules Committee Members,

Please do not approve recommending applicant David Pilpel to another term on the SOTF for the following reasons.

Prior Disruptive Behavior Prevented His Re-Appointment to Two CAC's

Mr. Pilpel's behavior as a member of other policy bodies has been totally disruptive.

Despite Pilpel's claim on his application that he has served on the SFMTA CAC, SFPUUC CAC, and on the Redistricting Task Force, he was not re-appointed to the MTA CAC in 2009 or earlier, reportedly due to his disruptive behavior and badgering of MTA CAC members and MTA staff. Similarly, within approximately the past year Pilpel was not re-appointed to the PUC CAC for the largely the same reason, as Supervisor Tang must be aware. And by report, Pilpel was extremely disruptive when he served on the Redistricting Task Force.

Poor Attendance Record

Between October 2, 2013 and August 24, 2014, the SOTF held 15 meetings. Pilpel was absent four times -26.7% — of those 14 meetings.

Refusal to Recuse Himself vs. Recusal From Hearing Complaints

- On May 5, 2015, a Sunshine complaint filed by Brian Browne against the SF PUC was calendared for a hearing before the Sunshine Task Force. Browne aware that Pilpel was then serving on the PUC's CAC requested that Pilpel recuse himself from hearing Browne's complaint due to a potential conflict of interest. Pilpel refused, and announced that although he was a member of the PUC's CAC, he should NOT have to recluse himself. Browne's complaint was continued to a future meeting of the Task Force.
- On April 6, 2016, an hour-and-a-half into the Sunshine Task Force's meeting, Pilpel suddenly requested being recused from hearing a complaint filed by Ray Hartz, Jr. involving the Ethics Commission. Pilpel admitted he had attended the Ethics Commission's January 25 meeting and had testified several times that the Commission was making a mistake because he felt an item on the Ethics Commission's agenda "was not framed properly for public discussion." Pilpel felt the Ethics Commission was not conducting themselves appropriately. Subsequently Hartz filed a Sunshine complaint concerning the Ethics Commission's January 25 meeting.

Pilpel claimed he had been speaking as a "private citizen" but it was obvious he was providing advice to the Ethics Commission in his role as a member of the Sunshine Task Force.

Hartz's complaint that was supposed to be heard on April 6 involved the new Executive Director of Ethics, LeeAnn Pelham. The draft minutes of the Task Force's April 6 minutes only reported that Pilpel wanted to avoid the appearance of bias.

Pilpel requested to be recused from hearing the matter. The MP3 audio file of the April 6 Task Force meeting shows that Pilpel stated during the meeting that "my view is that I have either bias, or the appearance thereof" [for having spoken during the Ethics Commission's meeting on January 25]. But there should have been no need for him to recuse himself if he had, in fact, been speaking as a private citizen. And there should have been no question about whether Pilpel was engaging in "bias" if he had been speaking as a member of the public.

The MP3 audio also shows that Task Force Member Mark Rumold — a lawyer who holds a Task Force seat reserved for nominations from the Society of Professional Journalists — noted that potentially the Task Force may want to eventually discuss whether Pilpel has abused his duties as a member of the Task Force often, and that, if so, the Task Force we could take some action later.

There doesn't seem to be much rhyme or reason as to when Pilpel decides whether or not to request being recused from hearing items on the agenda.

Ex Parte Communications

On May 5, 2015 following the hearing on Brian Browne's Sunshine complainant, Pilpel raced up to the SFPUC representative who had attended the hearing and who was enroute to the elevator, and began speaking with the PUC rep. Browne reportedly said "Mr. Pilpel, I hope you are not talking to her about my case." It's one of many examples — not an isolated occurrence — of Pilpel having sidebar — *ex parte* — conversations with respondents regarding Sunshine complaints prior to hearing the merits of a complainant's formal complaint.

Undermining Sunshine Complainants

Also in 2015, Pilpel submitted a letter to the Ethics Commission prior to an Ethics Commission hearing involving a Sunshine complaint Paula Datesch had filed against the Art Commission that the Task Force had referred to the Ethics for enforcement. Pilpel intentionally interfered with the Ethics Commission's deliberations by offering his so-called "personal opinion" on a matter that the Task Force had already ruled on and had concluded. Pilpel has no compulsion about trying to overturn Sunshine Task Force decisions that he doesn't agree with, and is brazen enough to show up at Ethics hearings to intentionally undercut official Orders of Determination the Task Force had issued.

It is thought Pilpel has interfered with other concluded Orders of Determination issued by the Task Force after-the-fact, and this is not an isolated incident.

Two Ethics Complaints Involving Violations of the Statement of Incompatible Activities Applicable to the Board of Supervisors and SOTF Members

In 2014 I filed two Ethics complaints against Mr. Pilpel alleging that he had violated the SIA applicable to SOTF members. In the first Ethics complaint, I noted Pilpel had identified himself during public comment at a meeting of the Ethics Commission as "David Pilpel, Member of SOTF," rather than as a member of the public, as if he were authorized to speak on behalf of the full Task Force.

After I filed my complaints, Pilpel became somewhat more careful to claim he addresses policy bodies as a member of the public, although he has been reported by other observers as having continued to identify himself as a member of SOTF when addressing other policy bodies.

Mr. Pilpel had *not* sought an Advance Written Determination that testifying to the Ethics Commission about a Sunshine Complaint adjudicated and finalized by the full Task Force is *not* incompatible with his official duties.

In my second Ethics complaint, the underlying issue was not whether Mr. Pilpel is permitted to speak before other policy bodies on issues *outside* the scope of his duties as a member of the Sunshine Task Force (for example speaking during a meeting of a Commission considering a land use matter that might affect Mr. Pilpel's neighborhood). Instead, the underlying issue was whether Pilpel is permitted to speak to another policy body on issues that are *inside* the scope of his duties as a Sunshine Task Force member (i.e., speaking about a matter inside the scope of his duties, *after* the full Task Force had concluded the matter and referred it to the Ethics Commission for enforcement).

When Mr. Pilpel voluntarily became a member of the Task Force, he was automatically bound under the governing SIA to restrict his testimony on matters falling *inside* the scope of his duties before other bodies. As a member of the Task Force, he has a duty to support and abide by decisions reached by a majority of Task Force members.

Pilpel's *ex parte* communications with other Policy Bodies and his testimony during other Policy Body meetings are a ruse when he claims to be speaking as a private citizen. His claims are a sham, when not a pretense or pretext, since it is clear he is trying to provide testimony in his role as a member of the Task Force, not so much as a member of the public.

His ruse needs to stop, and the Rules Committee can do so by refusing to advance him for consideration for re-appointment to the Task Force. Please refuse to support him application; it's long overdue that you dump him off of SOTF.

Pilpel Withheld Key Information from Rules Committee in May 2014

To the extent that Pilpel sought to sway the Rules Committee into re-appointing him to the Sunshine Task Force on May 15, 2014 by blabbing his wild assertion that members of the SOTF didn't understand where "due process attaches," he may have gamed re-appointment to the Task Force by withholding informing Supervisors Yee and Tang on May 15 that just 17 days earlier when Pilpel had raised the "due process" issue during the Sunshine complaint hearing involving Phil Ginsburg before the Ethics Commission, Deputy City Attorney Josh White who advises the Ethics Commission, had to interject and inform Ethics Commissioners that "due process" didn't apply.

It is completely egregious that Pilpel — who must have fully understood DCA White's clear City Attorney advice — withheld DCA White's advice from Tang and Yee in 2014, and repeated the "due process" misinformation that White had shot down, during his testimony seeking re-appointment to the Task Force. Indeed, it could be argued that by ignoring DCA White's "City Attorney opinion," and repeating due process misinformation, Pilpel had failed Katy Tang's "litmus test" of undying fealty to City Attorney "advice" as a condition of appointment to the Task Force.

Conclusion

The Rules Committee should not make the same mistake twice by referring Mr. Pilpel for re-appointment to the Task Force again, after he duped you in May 2014.

After all, leopards rarely change their spots, and tigers rarely change their stripes. Both animals rarely change their behavior. So, too, with David Pilpel. It's time to get rid of him as being too disruptive.

It is my understanding that the Rules Committee will be considering appointments to the Sunshine Task Force this Thursday, April 28. It is also my understanding that **David Pilpel** has submitted his application for reappointment to that task force.

I have known David for more than 25 years. He was a teenager when I used to have to physically extract him from offices at MUNI headquarters (on Presidio at Geary in those days). He was regularly rifling through desks of managers and other employees and also going through our file cabinets for "information" on various projects and issues. He would often come in after hours when those managers would have gone home for the day. This was not a once or twice occurrence. It was a regular practice for a very long time. He was reported, but he continued to do this as long as the doors of the building were not locked. Later, security measures were taken and he could not easily access our building after hours. So, he would come in and "visit" with various managers at the end of the day but not leave the building at closing.

Mr. Pilpel has continued to probe/snoop into City business and City offices over the years. As a retired City employee with nearly 40 years of service behind me, I found and continue to find Mr. Pilpel's methods despicable and his motives questionable. While I support transparency and the public's right to know, I also understand the need for files and work products to remain protected. There is a time and place for everything.

All this is to say that I don't believe Mr. Pilpel is appropriate for reappointment to the Sunshine Task Force. Colleagues of mine have told me of his ongoing unorthodox methods in seeking information and also his harassment of both City employees and elected/appointed individuals. These are unprofessional methods and behaviors that should not be rewarded by appointment to an official City body, especially the Sunshine Task Force.

Please reject the reappointment of David Pilpel to the Sunshine Task Force.

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Dear Chair Peskin and Rules Committee Members: (Written comment re SOTF appointments)

First, I will repeat my oral comments: that your Committee should immediately recommend Seat 4 for appointment, eventually appoint a full 11 person body, should encourage more young people and journalists to join, and ensure the Task Force has understanding of the modern technologies the City uses to house their public records (the last of which I think the Task Force has, in good measure). I say that as a young person, a professional computer scientist, and someone who has anonymously worked with journalists to break numerous stories about SF and beyond using the CPRA.

Second, one of your applicants Mr. Pilpel today urged the Committee to take two positions that do not pass legal muster. I speak to his positions, not his person:

(a) removing "unimportant" complaints before conducting a hearing. SOTF cannot prejudge substantiative decisions about dismissal outside of a public hearing. Many SOTF complainants do not have the legal or financial resources to prepare substantial legal briefs for their cases, nor can they rattle off legal citations. That doesn't make their cases dismissible by fiat. This is a fundamental access-to-justice issue. Three examples:

- Months ago, a complainant Mr. Warfield asked SOTF to demand released a *single phrase* that was important to him that the City withheld. Without hearing the case, SOTF would never have been able to determine that this information, *because it identified a paid City contractor*, was in fact disclosable. Under Mr. Pilpel's rubric, who would have known this case about one phrase was important? And how would that be fair to Mr. Warfield?
- Another complainant argued that, although records had been previously disclosed under civil discovery, he was separately requesting similar records under the PRA. Again, the City argued for the frivolity of the case. And yet the rules of exemption under Public Records Act/Sunshine disclosure are not the same as civil discovery, and thus the complainant can be entitled to more disclosure under PRA than under a suit.
- Yet another complainant argued that she had been excluded from a public meeting. The City asked the case be thrown out because it was captioned as a public records, not a public meeting, case. I argued (in public comment) in the Complainant's favor that just because her complaint had been mischaracterized by City employees did not mean her rights could be ignored. This mischaracterization required a hearing to prevent dismissal of her case.

Tribunals like SOTF cannot prejudge a complaint before conducting a hearing, nor can they do so outside of a Brown Act-noticed public meeting setting. Consider if Mr. Pilpel's own complaints against the City could be dismissed prior to the Board hearing them, and just apply the Golden Rule.

(b) banning anonymous records requesters, like me. Be thoughtful about the legality of such a position, and whether your Committee will endorse it.

No court has ever held, nor is there any section of law stating, that the Public Records Act, Brown Act, nor the Sunshine Ordinance permit anyone in government to demand your identity (*except when the disclosure decision depends on your identity, such as for crime victims*). In fact, important constitutional cases re: the CPRA have been conducted under a pseudonym even in court (see *Publius v Boyer-Vine*).

I engage, anonymously, with the City and with other journalists day in and day out. I and others like me have a right to investigate City wrongdoing while protecting my identity, and disclosing my identity would allow retaliation against and endanger me. My **anonymous** requests, complaints, and vigorous pursuit of the City's executive agencies have brought the following benefits and stories to the public:

- Production of the Harlan Kelly Walter Wong text messages, whose topics and alleged evasion of the PRA/Sunshine are directly referenced in the US DOJ charges against Kelly
- Production of Public Works invoices re: Mohammed Nuru and the holiday party contractors
- Ensuring that the Police Commission, City Attorney's Office, Police Department justifies their redactions, *as required by law*, (SOTF 19098, 19121, 19120). As the Police Commission and Police Department previously testified, my complaints caused their departments to go through retraining, and now police misconduct (SB 1421) records will be properly produced.
- Working with the CIO and CISO at the Department of Technology on their pilot program for accurate production of electronic public records. I programmed, for free, the initial version of the open source software to do this work more easily and gave it to DT, and I pursued the SOTF complaints (SOTF 19044, 19047, 19097, 19098, 19119) that made this an enforceable right for all members of the public under the Ordinance, *over 14 years after the Board (incl Sup. Peskin) made the same principled decision for its own records.* This is the result of the long-standing project discussed by SOTF members, which involved numerous hearings and consultations with City departments. My anonymous complaints and the SOTF's decisions have caused *meaningful change* in how the City handles electronic records.
- Forcing the revelation of the Mayor's second, previously hidden, business calendar and the same for the Chief of Police (SOTF 19047, 19108). These officials have their "public" Prop G calendar, and also a more detailed calendar that they previously would not disclose, but now must and in fact do.
- Production of Mayor Breed/Chief Scott text messages about treatment of homeless persons, which spurred numerous members of the SF community to actively become records requesters
- Ensuring that the people have the right to know the *topics* of the Mayor and Chief Scott's scheduled future meetings, even if security concerns mean we cannot know the location (SOTF 19103, 19108)
- Production of copies of Breed and Elsbernd's texts, even though they had deleted their own copies (I went to the rest of the City for their own copies).
- Forced multiple department heads to create a proper Proposition G calendar noting their past meetings *who never do so before*
- and much more

All of these were a result of my anonymous requests and complaints. I am extremely proud of my work and thankful for the SOTF's considered judgment in my cases, even when they have to spend months researching legal intricacies or when they eventually rule against me. In doing all this, I am certainly not a popular person in City Hall, and also probably with some of you. But that shouldn't matter. Sadly, while I repeatedly offer agencies the opportunity to use my complaints as a learning experience and to commit in writing to improve so I can withdraw the issue, only two departments have ever taken me up on these offers: Emily Murase of the Dept on Status of Women and Linda Gerull of the Department of Technology, and I commend them for it (as did the SOTF recently). In general, City agencies are adamant that they don't have to abide by the various rules that ensure government transparency, until SOTF forces them to do so. Mere education via "suggestions" without any teeth does not cause meaningful improvements (as someone who has often pled for months with the City to comply before SOTF orders are issued).

Finally, I will not speak for or against applicant David Pilpel himself, but only his positions. I am no judge of his character, and have no idea who he is, outside of a Google search showing some history with the City. To my knowledge, I have never met, and as far as I can tell, I have no personal issue with this applicant. Apparently, my only interaction with Mr. Pilpel is I have once spoken in support of his public comments made at SOTF, *because it is the ideas that should determine who is right, not the person speaking them, whether anonymous or not.*

Dear Chair Ronen and Rules Committee Members,

I am submitting testimony opposing any re-appointment of David Pilpel to the SOTF.

Attached, please find:

- A. Testimony I submitted to the Rules Committee opposing Mr. Pilpel's application for appointment to SOTF on April 27, 2016 when then-Supervisor Katy Tang was Chairperson of the Rules Committee, and
- B. Testimony submitted to the Rules Committee by labor leader Claire Zvanski on April 26, 2016 opposing Mr. Pilpel's application for appointment to SOTF in 2016; Ms. Zvanski's letter is a public record in the background files of the Rules Committee and her testimony was more than likely posted on-line in the public correspondence file for the Rules Committee's hearing on Pilpel's application in 2016.

Both my testimony in April 2016 and Ms. Zvanski's testimony in April 2016 are part and parcel of the historical record on why Mr. Pilpel should never be re-appointed to SOTF — not now, and not ever.

In summary, the reasons the current Rules Committee should not even recommend to the full Board of Supervisor Pilpel for appointment to SOTF include:

- 1. Although the Rules Committee in 2016 forwarded a recommendation to the full Board of Supervisors to potentially consider Pilpel for re-appointment to the SOTF, the full Board had the wisdom not to do so, and Mr. Pilpel was <u>not</u> re-appointed to SOTF when his term expired in 2016.
- 2. Pilpel's prior disruptive behavior as a member of two policy bodies the SFMTA's *Citizens Advisory Council* (CAC) and the PUC's CAC prevented his being re-appointed to either policy body. Mr. Pilpel's application dated January 6, 2021 cited his service on those two policy bodies in the "Civic Activities" section of his application, but he failed to note to this Rules Committee that he was **not** re-appointed to either policy body.

I learned the weekend of April 24, 2016 by reliable report that former Supervisor Katy Tang — the then-chairperson of the Rules Committee — was responsible for, or instrumental in, blocking David Pilpel's re-appointment to both the SFMTA Citizen's Advisory Council (CAC) and to the SF PUC's Citizen's Advisory Committee (CAC) due to many complaints from both CAC members and SFMTA staff.

- 3. Public testimony submitted in April 2016 (see attached) documented Pilpel's previous history of rifling through the desks of SFMTA employees at MUNI's headquarters after hours. He did so not as a once or twice occurrence, but as a regular practice. By report, he continued to snoop around City offices for a number of years.
- 4. Pilpel has refused to recuse himself from hearing SOTF complaints after the complainants noted his conflict of interest, or perceived conflicts of interest.

- 5. Pilpel's attendance record at 15 SOTF meetings held between October 2013 and August 2014 when he was appointed on the SOTF was pathetic; he missed four 26.7% of those 15 meetings.
- 6. Pilpel was observed engaging in *ex parte* communications with City department employees named as respondents in Sunshine complaints filed with SOTF, jeopardizing the outcome of proceedings for the complainants.
- 7. Two complaints were filed with the Ethics Commission for violations of the Statements of Incompatible Activities applicable to Board of Supervisors and SOTF members.
- 8. Pilpel withheld and misrepresented key information regarding due process issues from the Rules Committee in 2014 when the 2014 Rules Committee was considering re-appointing him to SOTF in 2014.
- 9. By report, Pilpel also exhibited on-going disruptive behavior when he served on the Redistricting Task Force, but of course, he also didn't mention that in his January 6, 2021 application for re-appointment to the SOTF.
- 10. On April 6, 2016, an hour-and-a-half into a Sunshine Task Force meeting, Pilpel suddenly requested being recused from hearing a complaint filed by Ray Hartz, Jr. involving the Ethics Commission. The MP3 audio of that meeting shows that then-Task Force Member Mark Rumold a lawyer who held a Task Force seat reserved for nominations from the Society of Professional Journalists noted that the Task Force may potentially want to eventually discuss whether Pilpel had abused his duties as a member of the Task Force often.

The now current Rules Committee must not make the same mistake of forwarding Pilpel's name to the full Board of Supervisors for consideration of re-appointment to the SOTF.

This time, on January 11, 2011 the Rules Committee should forward an explicit recommendation to the full Board of Supervisors clearly rejecting appointing Mr. Pilpel and specifically declining to submit his name for any further consideration by the full Board of Supervisors.

As I noted in April 2016, leopards rarely change their spots and tigers rarely change their stripes. Both animals rarely change their behavior. So, too, with David Pilpel.

It's time to stop considering him for appointment to any Board or Commission in City government, since he's far too disruptive to transparency and accountability.

Dear Rules Committee Members,

Please do not approve recommending applicant David Pilpel to another term on the SOTF for the following reasons.

Prior Disruptive Behavior Prevented His Re-Appointment to Two CAC's

Mr. Pilpel's behavior as a member of other policy bodies has been totally disruptive.

Despite Pilpel's claim on his application that he has served on the SFMTA CAC, SFPUUC CAC, and on the Redistricting Task Force, he was not re-appointed to the MTA CAC in 2009 or earlier, reportedly due to his disruptive behavior and badgering of MTA CAC members and MTA staff. Similarly, within approximately the past year Pilpel was not re-appointed to the PUC CAC for the largely the same reason, as Supervisor Tang must be aware. And by report, Pilpel was extremely disruptive when he served on the Redistricting Task Force.

Poor Attendance Record

Between October 2, 2013 and August 24, 2014, the SOTF held 15 meetings. Pilpel was absent four times -26.7% — of those 14 meetings.

Refusal to Recuse Himself vs. Recusal From Hearing Complaints

- On May 5, 2015, a Sunshine complaint filed by Brian Browne against the SF PUC was calendared for a hearing before the Sunshine Task Force. Browne aware that Pilpel was then serving on the PUC's CAC requested that Pilpel recuse himself from hearing Browne's complaint due to a potential conflict of interest. Pilpel refused, and announced that although he was a member of the PUC's CAC, he should NOT have to recluse himself. Browne's complaint was continued to a future meeting of the Task Force.
- On April 6, 2016, an hour-and-a-half into the Sunshine Task Force's meeting, Pilpel suddenly requested being recused from hearing a complaint filed by Ray Hartz, Jr. involving the Ethics Commission. Pilpel admitted he had attended the Ethics Commission's January 25 meeting and had testified several times that the Commission was making a mistake because he felt an item on the Ethics Commission's agenda "was not framed properly for public discussion." Pilpel felt the Ethics Commission was not conducting themselves appropriately. Subsequently Hartz filed a Sunshine complaint concerning the Ethics Commission's January 25 meeting.

Pilpel claimed he had been speaking as a "private citizen" but it was obvious he was providing advice to the Ethics Commission in his role as a member of the Sunshine Task Force.

Hartz's complaint that was supposed to be heard on April 6 involved the new Executive Director of Ethics, LeeAnn Pelham. The draft minutes of the Task Force's April 6 minutes only reported that Pilpel wanted to avoid the appearance of bias.

Pilpel requested to be recused from hearing the matter. The MP3 audio file of the April 6 Task Force meeting shows that Pilpel stated during the meeting that "my view is that I have either bias, or the appearance thereof" [for having spoken during the Ethics Commission's meeting on January 25]. But there should have been no need for him to recuse himself if he had, in fact, been speaking as a private citizen. And there should have been no question about whether Pilpel was engaging in "bias" if he had been speaking as a member of the public.

The MP3 audio also shows that Task Force Member Mark Rumold — a lawyer who holds a Task Force seat reserved for nominations from the Society of Professional Journalists — noted that potentially the Task Force may want to eventually discuss whether Pilpel has abused his duties as a member of the Task Force often, and that, if so, the Task Force we could take some action later.

There doesn't seem to be much rhyme or reason as to when Pilpel decides whether or not to request being recused from hearing items on the agenda.

Ex Parte Communications

On May 5, 2015 following the hearing on Brian Browne's Sunshine complainant, Pilpel raced up to the SFPUC representative who had attended the hearing and who was enroute to the elevator, and began speaking with the PUC rep. Browne reportedly said "Mr. Pilpel, I hope you are not talking to her about my case." It's one of many examples — not an isolated occurrence — of Pilpel having sidebar — *ex parte* — conversations with respondents regarding Sunshine complaints prior to hearing the merits of a complainant's formal complaint.

Undermining Sunshine Complainants

Also in 2015, Pilpel submitted a letter to the Ethics Commission prior to an Ethics Commission hearing involving a Sunshine complaint Paula Datesch had filed against the Art Commission that the Task Force had referred to the Ethics for enforcement. Pilpel intentionally interfered with the Ethics Commission's deliberations by offering his so-called "personal opinion" on a matter that the Task Force had already ruled on and had concluded. Pilpel has no compulsion about trying to overturn Sunshine Task Force decisions that he doesn't agree with, and is brazen enough to show up at Ethics hearings to intentionally undercut official Orders of Determination the Task Force had issued.

It is thought Pilpel has interfered with other concluded Orders of Determination issued by the Task Force after-the-fact, and this is not an isolated incident.

Two Ethics Complaints Involving Violations of the Statement of Incompatible Activities Applicable to the Board of Supervisors and SOTF Members

In 2014 I filed two Ethics complaints against Mr. Pilpel alleging that he had violated the SIA applicable to SOTF members. In the first Ethics complaint, I noted Pilpel had identified himself during public comment at a meeting of the Ethics Commission as "David Pilpel, Member of SOTF," rather than as a member of the public, as if he were authorized to speak on behalf of the full Task Force.

After I filed my complaints, Pilpel became somewhat more careful to claim he addresses policy bodies as a member of the public, although he has been reported by other observers as having continued to identify himself as a member of SOTF when addressing other policy bodies.

Mr. Pilpel had *not* sought an Advance Written Determination that testifying to the Ethics Commission about a Sunshine Complaint adjudicated and finalized by the full Task Force is *not* incompatible with his official duties.

In my second Ethics complaint, the underlying issue was not whether Mr. Pilpel is permitted to speak before other policy bodies on issues *outside* the scope of his duties as a member of the Sunshine Task Force (for example speaking during a meeting of a Commission considering a land use matter that might affect Mr. Pilpel's neighborhood). Instead, the underlying issue was whether Pilpel is permitted to speak to another policy body on issues that are *inside* the scope of his duties as a Sunshine Task Force member (i.e., speaking about a matter inside the scope of his duties, *after* the full Task Force had concluded the matter and referred it to the Ethics Commission for enforcement).

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When Mr. Pilpel voluntarily became a member of the Task Force, he was automatically bound under the governing SIA to restrict his testimony on matters falling *inside* the scope of his duties before other bodies. As a member of the Task Force, he has a duty to support and abide by decisions reached by a majority of Task Force members.

Pilpel's *ex parte* communications with other Policy Bodies and his testimony during other Policy Body meetings are a ruse when he claims to be speaking as a private citizen. His claims are a sham, when not a pretense or pretext, since it is clear he is trying to provide testimony in his role as a member of the Task Force, not so much as a member of the public.

His ruse needs to stop, and the Rules Committee can do so by refusing to advance him for consideration for re-appointment to the Task Force. Please refuse to support him application; it's long overdue that you dump him off of SOTF.

Pilpel Withheld Key Information from Rules Committee in May 2014

To the extent that Pilpel sought to sway the Rules Committee into re-appointing him to the Sunshine Task Force on May 15, 2014 by blabbing his wild assertion that members of the SOTF didn't understand where "due process attaches," he may have gamed re-appointment to the Task Force by withholding informing Supervisors Yee and Tang on May 15 that just 17 days earlier when Pilpel had raised the "due process" issue during the Sunshine complaint hearing involving Phil Ginsburg before the Ethics Commission, Deputy City Attorney Josh White who advises the Ethics Commission, had to interject and inform Ethics Commissioners that "due process" didn't apply.

It is completely egregious that Pilpel — who must have fully understood DCA White's clear City Attorney advice — withheld DCA White's advice from Tang and Yee in 2014, and repeated the "due process" misinformation that White had shot down, during his testimony seeking re-appointment to the Task Force. Indeed, it could be argued that by ignoring DCA White's "City Attorney opinion," and repeating due process misinformation, Pilpel had failed Katy Tang's "litmus test" of undying fealty to City Attorney "advice" as a condition of appointment to the Task Force.

Conclusion

The Rules Committee should not make the same mistake twice by referring Mr. Pilpel for re-appointment to the Task Force again, after he duped you in May 2014.

After all, leopards rarely change their spots, and tigers rarely change their stripes. Both animals rarely change their behavior. So, too, with David Pilpel. It's time to get rid of him as being too disruptive.

Dear Supervisors:

It is my understanding that the Rules Committee will be considering appointments to the Sunshine Task Force this Thursday, April 28. It is also my understanding that **David Pilpel** has submitted his application for reappointment to that task force.

I have known David for more than 25 years. He was a teenager when I used to have to physically extract him from offices at MUNI headquarters (on Presidio at Geary in those days). He was regularly rifling through desks of managers and other employees and also going through our file cabinets for "information" on various projects and issues. He would often come in after hours when those managers would have gone home for the day. This was not a once or twice occurrence. It was a regular practice for a very long time. He was reported, but he continued to do this as long as the doors of the building were not locked. Later, security measures were taken and he could not easily access our building after hours. So, he would come in and "visit" with various managers at the end of the day but not leave the building at closing.

Mr. Pilpel has continued to probe/snoop into City business and City offices over the years. As a retired City employee with nearly 40 years of service behind me, I found and continue to find Mr. Pilpel's methods despicable and his motives questionable. While I support transparency and the public's right to know, I also understand the need for files and work products to remain protected. There is a time and place for everything.

All this is to say that I don't believe Mr. Pilpel is appropriate for reappointment to the Sunshine Task Force. Colleagues of mine have told me of his ongoing unorthodox methods in seeking information and also his harassment of both City employees and elected/appointed individuals. These are unprofessional methods and behaviors that should not be rewarded by appointment to an official City body, especially the Sunshine Task Force.

Please reject the reappointment of David Pilpel to the Sunshine Task Force.

Thank you very much for your consideration of this request. Claire Zvanski (37.5 years retired career public service with CCSF; 26 years on HSS board) Obviously, I am a pro-transparency advocate, so I'll give my pro-transparency recommendations for your consideration after now having a chance to do research on the candidates. The following analysis assumes that recently recommended Seat 4 Padmanaban will be successfully approved by the Board.

At the moment, the 4 non-expired SOTF seats have:

- 3 women and 1 man, and
- 3 new members (Dean Schmidt attorney, Jennifer Wong technologist, Jaya Padmanaban journalist) and 1 member with experience (Lila LaHood journalist/publisher).

If gender parity and an expertise/freshness balance is a goal, you can recommend 4 men and 2 women, and 3 continuing and 3 new members.

This would give 5 men, 5 women, 4 experienced, and 6 new members, in total. (Seat 3 remains unfilled)

You can also add both a City employee and a member of the public who has requested records before - each may be risky on their own, but together add a diverse perspective.

On that basis, I recommend:

- 1. Appointing new members:
 - Laurie **Jones Neighbors** (re: helping bridge the digital divide and bring public access to underserved communities)
 - ADA Ryan Khojasteh (City employee perspective, young person, and attorney)
 - Kai **Forsley** (records requesters' perspective, Civil grand jury investigative experience, librarian)
- 2. Reappointing Chris **Hyland**, Bruce **Wolfe**, and Matt **Yankee**. They have a deep understanding of the policy and technology issues from their own work and past cases, and all have years of public service. Furthermore, at least one appointee (Wolfe) must have a disability. (Disclosure: all 3 have obviously voted for and against various cases I have brought before them)
- 3. Seeking legal advice about the effect, if any, of appointing Khojasteh.

Finally, I did not initially understand the vocal (and written) outcry at the first hearing against Mr. Pilpel (I wasn't around back before 2016). I have since researched his prior actions not only on this Task Force but also at other City public bodies. **SOTF members must not be permitted to both be a third-party neutral in a public hearing at SOTF and also be an advocate defending a party on the same issue before a different tribunal like the Ethics Commission when their position loses at SOTF. For example, would members of your Board vote on a CEQA appeals hearing, and then, if the member is in the minority losing position, now go to Court and be a party's advocate? If a three-judge Federal appeals panel hears a case and a judge loses in a 2-to-1 vote does the judge in the minority now go the Supreme Court to advocate against their peers? Of course not. SOTF rulings are enforceable**

at Superior Court, but actions like Pilpel's create the appearance of impropriety and conflict of interest that may invalidate those rulings.

As I've previously described, apart from Mr. Pilpel's prior inappropriate prior actions as a City official, his policy positions would create lawsuits against the City. Contrary to Mr. Pilpel's beliefs, the City can neither discriminate against anonymous meeting attendees/requesters nor subjectively determine which requests or meetings are more important vs less important. Around 5-6 anonymous voices (including me) are present at SOTF, and all of us would have to sue the City instead - that means the City would owe attorneys fees and court costs if we win. At least for me, I have a track record of winning public records cases, and as long as they go through SOTF without requiring Court intervention, the City owes me no money.
