[Energy Efficiency Steering Committee.]

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2	Ordinance amending the San Francisco Administrative Code by adding Article II to
3	Chapter 5, Sections 5.2-1 through 5.2-8, to: create an Energy Efficiency Steering
4	Committee to advise the Board of Supervisors on planning and decision-making
5	regarding energy efficiency projects; provide for the Committee's membership,
6	organization, and duties; and set a sunset date for the Committee.

9	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
11	Section 1. The San Francisco Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding
12	Sections 5.2-01 through 5.2-8, to read as follows:
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14	ARTICLE II: ENERGY EFFICIENCY STEERING COMMITTEE
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16	SEC. 5.2-1. CREATION OF COMMITTEE.
17	This ordinance shall establish the Energy Efficiency Steering Committee of the City and Count
18	of San Francisco.
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20	SEC. 5.2-2. PURPOSES AND POLICIES.
21	The purpose of this legislation is to create and maintain a high-level discussion between the
22	community and the City on the spending and allocation of energy efficiency funds. The Energy
23	Efficiency Steering Committee ("the Committee") shall advise the Board of Supervisors on planning

1	and decision-making regarding energy efficiency projects, and the spending and allocation of new
2	monies for such purposes.
3	The Committee's recommendations shall be shaped by the following policies:
4	1. The City should give priority in connection with energy efficiency spending to low income
5	communities and communities that are disproportionately impacted by localized health and economic
6	threats of toxic pollution;
7	2. The City should create or adjust specific programs and policies to that ensure jobs and other
8	economic benefits in energy efficiency and green sector industries specifically benefit low income San
9	Francisco residents in targeted environmental justice communities;
10	3. The City should have a model of interdepartmental collaboration and action and a targeted
1	set of metrics upon which energy efficiency programs will be evaluated;
12	4. The City should design and implement energy efficiency policies and programs to achieve
13	health benefits in targeted environmental justice communities.
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15	SEC. 5.2-3. MEMBERSHIP.
16	(a) Voting members of the Committee generally shall be drawn from individuals and
17	organizations with an understanding of the needs of low income communities, as well as technical
18	expertise in the areas of economic and workforce development, environmental health, employer
19	contracting, small business, green jobs, and energy efficiency.
20	(b) The Committee shall consist of 7 voting members, appointed by the Board of Supervisors as
21	<u>follows:</u>
22	(1) Seat 1: A person recommended by a community-based organization that deals
23	primarily with environmental justice;
24	(2) Seat 2: A person recommended by a community-based organization that deals
25	primarily with environmental justice;

1	(3) Seat 3: A person recommended by a community-based organization that works
2	with under-employed, low wage workers in underserved communities and communities of color, and
3	having experience with vocational education and training issues in the City's diverse communities
4	related to age, gender, race, and immigration;
5	(4) Seat 4: A person recommended by a community-based organization that works with
6	under-employed, low wage workers in underserved communities and communities of color, and having
7	experience with vocational education and training issues in the City's diverse communities related to
8	age, gender, race, and immigration;
9	(5) Seat 5: A person with a background in labor organizing;
10	(6) Seat 6: A person with a background in research and/or and education on green
11	sector industries who is currently employed at an economic development consulting firm and/or
12	college or university; and,
13	(7) Seat 7: A person with a background in green jobs in the small business community.
14	(c) Representatives from the Office of the Mayor, the Department of the Environment, the
15	Public Utilities Commission, the Office of the Controller, the Economic and Workforce Development
16	Department, the Department of Public Health, and the Office of Contract Administration shall serve as
17	non-voting members of the Committee. All City departments, commissions, boards, and agencies shall
18	cooperate with the Committee in conducting its business.
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20	SEC. 5.2-4. ORGANIZATION AND TERMS OF OFFICE.
21	(a) The term of each voting member of the Committee shall be one year. Voting members may
22	serve multiple terms.
23	(b) Voting members of the Committee shall serve at the pleasure of the Board of Supervisors.
24	(c) In the event a vacancy occurs during the term of office of any member, the Board of
25	Supervisors shall appoint a successor for the unexpired term of the office vacated.

1	(d) Services of the voting members of the Committee shall be voluntary and members will serve
2	without compensation.
3	(e) The Committee will be staffed by personnel assigned by the Department of the Environment.
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5	SEC. 5.2-5. POWERS AND DUTIES.
6	(a) The Committee may hold hearings and submit recommendations to the Board of
7	Supervisors, the Mayor, and other City officers and departments on the spending and allocation of
8	energy efficiency funds.
9	(b) No later than one year after the date that all seven voting members of the Committee have
10	been appointed, the Committee shall submit to the Board of Supervisors a set of policy standards for
1	how the City will equitably spend energy efficiency monies throughout the City.
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13	SEC. 5.2-6. REPORT.
14	The Committee shall submit quarterly reports to the Board of Supervisors.
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16	SEC. 5.2-7. MEETINGS.
7	The place, date and time of meetings of the Committee shall be prescribed by rule of the
18	Committee; provided, however that the Committee shall hold a regular meeting not less than once
19	every month. All meetings shall, except as provided by general law, be open to the public.
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1	<u>SEC. 5.2-8. SUNSET.</u>
2	The Committee shall terminate by operation of law one year after the date that all seven voting
3	members have been appointed, unless the Board of Supervisors by resolution extends the term of the
4	Committee for an additional year.
