Laws, Mandates and Policies

California Penal Code 4.5, Peace Officers

Secs 830 – 832.19 defines a peace officer and provides certain powers to fulfill their responsibilities.

California Penal Code 5, Arrest by Whom and How Made

Secs 833 – 851.93 provides the authority for arrest.

CA Penal Code §836: Authority of Peace Officers to Arrest


An officer may arrest any person with a warrant or without a warrant, when certain circumstances occur.

CA Penal Code §1203.2

Stipulates conditions under which probation is subject to revocation.

SFPD Policy and Procedures for Arrests

Department General Order 5.04, *Private Person's Arrest*Department General Order 6.12, *Arrest of a Person on Parole or Probation*Department General Order 6.18, *Warrant Arrest*



Case Filing/Rebooking

Arrest

An officer determines if there is probable cause to arrest an individual for a known violation.

If probable causes exists, the individual is arrested and booked into the San Francisco County Jail.

Booking

The Assigning Officer of the investigative unit/detail assigns the case to an Investigator as a "Rebooking."

Rebooking

Follow-up investigation is conducted, and the case is presented to the District Attorney's Office for review and a filing decision.


Filing

DA will decide to file on booked charges, add or change to more appropriate charges, not file charges, and/or request further investigation.

Charges


Data Collection & Tracking

- Tracking of an arrest begins shortly after an individual is booked into the County Jail during the fingerprinting process, captured via LiveScan, which is completed by San Francisco Sheriff's Deputies.
- Information obtained from the California Department of Justice is tracked and managed by the SFPD Identification Bureau to include:
 - Offender information
 - Type of crime
 - Offense
- Probation/parole violation information is later captured after being entered into Crime Data Warehouse, which is not only the SFPD report writing system, but the records management system that maintains all our data in a web-based environment.

2018 - 2020




Between 2018 to 2020


