Resolution requesting the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency to create a youth
lifeline discount Fast Pass for qualified low-income youth.
WHEREAS, A high proportion of San Francisco's youth population use MUNI to get to school,
work, the location of their extracurricular activities, and many other places; and
WHEREAS, According to the Fall 2008 YouthVote Student Survey, which polled 8,256 San
Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) high school students, nearly seventy percent of
respondents (69.3%) use some form of public transportation to get to or from school and over
forty percent (44.2%) of these students (who ride public transportation to school)—and thirty
percent (30.6%) of overall respondents—must take more than one train or bus to get to
school; ¹ and
WHEREAS, According to section 8A.115 of the City Charter, San Francisco has a Transit
First Policy, the second point of which declares, "Public transit [] is an economically and
environmentally sound alternative to transportation by individual automobiles. Within San
Francisco, travel by public transit [] must be an attractive alternative to travel by private
automobile;" and
WHEREAS, The San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) will have raised
the cost of the Youth Fast Pass 100% within a 12 month period given that the pass cost \$10
per month in May of 2009 and will cost \$20 per month as of May 2010; and,

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- 1 WHEREAS, The current cost of MUNI fares and fast passes are already a financial burden to
- 2 many youth, especially those in low-income families who are already struggling to make ends
- 3 meet; and
- 4 WHEREAS, The SFMTA already recognizes the need to offer reduced fast passes to needy
- adults in the form of the discounted Lifeline pass, which costs half the price (\$30) of a regular
- 6 Adult Fast Pass (\$60); and
- 7 WHEREAS, Qualifying for free lunch² depends on living at 130% of the Federal poverty
- 8 guidelines, yet qualifying for a MUNI Lifeline depends on living at 200% of the Federal poverty
- guidelines³, and in 2008 the median family income in San Francisco was \$87,583⁴; and
- 10 WHEREAS, Of students enrolled in the SFUSD in the 2008-2009 school year, 39.7% (21,951)
- 11 qualified for free lunch;5 and
- 12 WHEREAS, In November of 2009, the unemployment rate for Americans between 16 and 19
- years old was over 40%, which is the highest rate of teenage unemployment in the United
- 14 States since World War II; and
- 15 WHEREAS, Assuming the 21,951youth who qualify for free lunches do not currently purchase
- a Youth fast pass were to purchase to a Youth Lifeline Pass at the rate of \$10 per month, the
- 17 SFMTA could potentially generate an additional \$2,634,120 in fare revenue; and
- 18 WHEREAS, The San Francisco Youth Commission passed a resolution on February 1, 2010
- advocating for the creation of a Youth Lifeline in the interest of protecting low income young
- 20 people's access to public transportation; now, therefore, be it
