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[Supporting Assembly Bill 2511 Regarding Limiting Annual Percentage Rate of Payday Loans]

Resolution supporting Assembly Bill 2511 regarding limiting the annual percentage rate of payday loans to customers receiving unemployment benefits.

WHEREAS, AB 2511 authored by Assembly Member Nancy Skinner would provide that payday loans provided to consumers receiving unemployment insurance benefits would have to have an annual percentage rate (APR) of no more than 36%; and

WHEREAS, Californians receiving unemployment insurance benefits have already taken a substantial cut in their take-home pay, already need to re-budget and prioritize their expenses, and are not served by replacing that income with debt at annual interest rates of 459%; and,

WHEREAS, Recently, the Los Angeles Times reported that "[t]he payday loan industry has found a new and lucrative source of business: the unemployed"; and

WHEREAS, According to the Department of Labor Statistics, the average Californian receiving unemployment insurance benefits receives \$317.59 per week, or \$1,270.36 per month, a mere 31.6% of the average wage in California; and,

WHEREAS, Given the high price of payday loans and the short term for payoff (2 weeks), most struggling borrowers cannot meet basic expenses and pay off their loan upon receipt of their subsequent unemployment check; and,

WHEREAS, Allowing payday lenders – the largest of which are located out of state – to target unemployed Californians with loans they can't afford sends state and federal money intended to assist California and Californians out of state and into the pockets of payday lenders; and,

WHEREAS, Too many of San Francisco's families lack the resources and assets to build a stable foundation for financial success long into the future, particularly during this period of high unemployment and financial instability; and,

WHEREAS, Financial institutions in San Francisco have joined together to launch Bank
On San Francisco to help connect previously unbanked families to mainstream financial
institutions, creating the opportunity for families to access affordable basic financial services;
and,

WHEREAS, AB 2511 would support these efforts by limiting the maximum amount of interest that could be charged to a borrower receiving unemployment benefits to 36%; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the City of San Francisco supports AB 2511; and, be it FURTHER RESOLVED, That the City of San Francisco urges the California State Legislature to pass, and Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger to sign AB 2511 into law.
