12	WHEREAS, In November 2015, the National League of Democracy (NLD) won a
13	general election by a landslide, while the military still retained significant seats in Parliament;
14	and
15	WHEREAS, While there is hope for a full transition to a democratic government, there
16	is growing concern of human rights abuses and displacement of ethnic minorities, such as the
17	Rohinga people; and
18	WHEREAS, In November 2020, an election was held in which the National League of
19	Democracy (NLD) won with more than 80% of the votes claiming a majority of the
