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[Accept and Expend Grant - Substance Abuse Offender Treatment Program - \$370,182]

Resolution authorizing the San Francisco Department of Public Health to accept and expend retroactively a grant from the California Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs in the amount of \$370,182 to fund the Substance Abuse Offender Treatment Program for the period July 1, 2009, through June 30, 2010.

WHEREAS, DPH was awarded a grant from the ADP in the amount of \$370,182 for a project entitled "Substance Abuse Offender Treatment Program (OTP);" for the period of July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010; and,

WHEREAS, The purpose of this grant is to allow DPH to provide residential substance abuse treatment services for approximately 133 clients; and,

WHEREAS, As required by the funder, \$41,131 in matching funds from local general funds will be allocated toward this project; and,

WHEREAS, DPH will subcontract with the Walden House, Inc., in the amount of \$41,131 for the period of July 1, 2009 through June 30, 2010; and,

WHEREAS, DPH is seeking retroactive approval because DPH did not receive the grant award until March 3, 2010; and,

WHEREAS, The budget does not include a provision for indirect costs in order to maximize the use of grant funds on direct services; now therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That DPH is hereby authorized to retroactively accept and expend a grant in the amount of \$370,182 from the ADP; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That DPH is hereby authorized to retroactively accept and expend the grant funds pursuant to San Francisco Administrative Code section 10.170-1; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby waives inclusion of indirect costs in the grant budget; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of Health is authorized to enter into the agreement on behalf of the City.

Budget and Justification

Residential Substance Abuse Treatment Services

State Funding (90%): \$370,182 Local Match (10%): \$41,131

Total (100%): \$411,313

Contracted residential substance abuse treatment services for OTP-eligible clients provided by licensed, nonprofit, community-based, substance abuse treatment organizations. OTP-eligible clients are 1st and 2nd-time non-violent adult drug offenders who use, possess, or transport illegal drugs for personal use and who have been ordered by the court to receive substance abuse treatment services as part of their sentence. Residential treatment services include 24/7 housing accompanied by individual and group counseling, 12-step groups, parenting education, addiction and recovery education, case management, physical fitness, and/or other treatments and activities as determined by protocols of the contracted treatment provider and CBHS.

Service Units

Units of Service (UOS): 4,015

The OTP grant and local match are budgeted to generate 4,113 UOS as follows:

State funding: 10 treatment slots x 365 days = 3,650 UOS Local match: 1 treatment slot x 365 days = 365 UOS Total: 11 treatment slots x 365 days = 4,015 UOS

Cost per UOS: \$102.44

The OTP grant and local match cost per UOS are budgeted as follows:

State funding: \$370,182 funding / 3,650 UOS = \$101.42 Local match: \$41,131 funding / 365 UOS = \$112.69 Net: \$411,313 funding / 4,015 UOS = \$102.44 *

Unduplicated Clients (UDC): 33

Based on average 120 day treatment cycles, the OTP grant and local match are budgeted to serve 33 UDC as follows:

State funding: 10 treatment slots x 3 treatment cycles per year = 30 UDC

Local match: 1 treatment slots x 3 treatment cycles per year = 3 UDC

Total: 11 treatment slots x 3 treatment cycles per year = 33 UDC

Point-in-time Capacity: 11

The OTP grant and local match support 11 residential slots; therefore during any given 24-hour period, the point-in-time capacity is 11.

Chapter 3.5, 2009 Statutes (Assembly Bill 1-4X, Committee on Budget)

This letter transmits the Fiscal Year (FY) 2009-10 initial allocation for the Substance Abuse Offender Treatment Program (OTP).

The Budget Act maintains \$18 million for OTP and allows the Department of Alcohol and Drug Programs (ADP) to make a one time only change to the current allocation methodology. The new methodology distributes fifty percent of the funds based on the standard methodology of \$2,500 per million instead of population. The standard methodology builds in a base allocation for counties.

The FY 2009-10 OTP allocation formula is the following:

- Fifty percent (50%) on the standard methodology of \$2,500 per million,
- Twenty-five percent (25%) on the show rate (percentage of offender ordered to treatment that actually begin treatment),
- Twenty-five percent (25%) on the completion rate (percentage of offenders ordered to drug treatment that completed treatment).

ADP will notify counties of final allocation amounts once OTP application reviews are completed. Amendments to the OTP application will be released via a separate letter. If you have questions contact your OTP county liaison or OCJC at (916) 445-7456.

The strong collaboration between OTP and criminal justice entities including the San Francisco Adult Probation Department (ADP), the Parole and Community



Services Division of the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation (Parole), and the Superior Court of California (Court) builds on the multi-year collaboration between these entities and the County's Prop 36 program. This collaboration contributes to timely and effective reporting to the Court with regard to individual compliance of each OTP participant. It is ultimately the OTP Case Manager who provides APD, Parole, and the Court with written reports providing a comprehensive clinical snapshot of the participant's compliance and progress in meeting all treatment goals and expectations. The APD and Parole may also offer recommendations to the Court regarding what actions should be taken with respect to other conditions of probation or parole.

A team of OTP Clinicians/Case Managers maintains contact with community based treatment providers and reports a client's compliance with their treatment plan to APD, Parole, and the Court. Additional case conferencing with the appropriate entity is performed for those clients who are non-compliant or in need of additional services and/or support. Each OTP client is assigned an OTP Clinician/Case Manager who is the conduit of information between the treatment providers and the criminal justice collaborative entities.

OFFENDER TREATMENT PROGRAM GOALS

San Francisco County proposes to utilize its OTP allocation for the purpose of enhancing treatment capacity for clients in need of residential substance abuse treatment services. This will be accomplished through the provision of residential services at former Prop 36 treatment providers.

Levels of acuity with regard to substance use continue to increase among OTP eligible (formerly Prop 36 eligible) clients in San Francisco. County data indicates that the majority of clients are age 36 or older (62%) and are presenting with long and extensive histories of substance use. Additionally, 40% of all new clients are homeless or marginally housed.

Providing Residential Treatment capacity for OTP-eligible clients will result in a reduction in the amount of time defendants wait to access this service. This engagement will result in improved outcomes, and will enhance the OTP clinician's capability in matching the client to the intensity of services required.

Substance Abuse Offender Treatment Program (OTP) FY 2009-10 OTP Application

Increase proportion of offenders who enter, remain in, and complete treatment. How?

San Francisco's OTP will utilize the SFDPH Behavioral Health Access Center (BHAC) to provide assessment, placement, and case management services for OTP-eligible clients. BHAC serves as an entry point into the larger countywide system of care and is complimented by an onsite pharmacy, physician services, and mental health assessment and diagnosis. Utilization of BHAC intensive case management services further enables the OTP program to increase the proportion of OTP-eligible offenders who enter, remain in, and complete substance abuse treatment as well as fulfill its goals to enhance treatment services, reduce delays, and utilize a drug court model for OTP-eligible clients.

Reduce delays in the availability of appropriate services. How?

By providing capacity in the Residential Substance Abuse Treatment modality for OTP-eligible clients, the amount of time defendants wait to access this service will decrease. This will result in improved outcomes, and will enhance the OTP clinician's capability in matching the client to the level of service required.

Employ a drug court model, including dedicated court calendars with regularly scheduled reviews of treatment progress, and strong collaboration by the courts, probation, and treatment.

How?

San Francisco County employs the Drug Court model in the ongoing operation of OTP. In addition to a dedicated calendar, specifically assigned criminal justice staff interface with the program on a regular basis to ensure program continuity. Court for OTP-eligible clients is in session three (3) days per week and involves pre-court case conferencing with treatment, probation, judicial, district attorney, and public defender staff.
