2	
3	Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to require the Department of
4	Homelessness and Supportive Housing to establish a Safe Sleeping Sites Program to
5	provide unsheltered persons with a safe place to sleep overnight; and affirming the
6	Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

12	Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco:
13	
14	Section 1. Environmental Findings.
15	The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this
16	ordinance comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public Resources
17	Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the Board of
18	Supervisors in File No. 201187 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board affirms
19	this determination.
20	
21	Section 2. General Findings.
22	(a) San Francisco has struggled with homelessness for nearly four decades. Since
23	the 1980's, successive mayoral administrations have implemented different and sometimes
24	divergent strategies to address the City's most enduring crisis.

- (b) In 1982, Mayor Dianne Feinstein launched a network of church-based emergency winter shelters and soup kitchens. In the late 1980s and early 1990s, Mayor Art Agnos took a different approach, unveiling the "Beyond Shelter" plan to provide unhoused people access to supportive services and a pathway to long-term housing. In 1990, Mayor Agnos opened the City's first two Multi-Service Centers, which were homeless shelters with onsite mental health and substance use disorder services.
- (c) In 1993, Mayor Frank Jordan instituted the Matrix Program which tasked police officers accompanied by social workers or health aides with clearing unhoused people from City streets and connecting them to services. In the first six months of the program, police issued over 6,000 citations for quality-of-life misdemeanors, such as public inebriation or sleeping in doorways. In 1992, voters approved Mayor Jordan's Proposition J, which banned aggressive panhandling. Voters also approved Mayor Jordan's 1994 ballot measure, also named Proposition J, which banned loitering within 30 feet of an automated teller machine for more than one minute.
- (d) After his election in 1996, Mayor Willie Brown declared homelessness unsolvable at a local level, and insisted any measurable improvement would require state and federal dollars to fund the housing and services needed to keep people off the streets. During his two terms in office, Mayor Brown's administration nonetheless added thousands of units of affordable and subsidized housing, including leasing and renovating single room occupancy hotels for low-income and unhoused people.
- (e) Prior to his election as Mayor in 2004, as a member of the Board of Supervisors, Gavin Newsom authored a 2002 ballot measure, entitled "Care Not Cash," which reduced City-funded General Assistance cash payments to unhoused people, and redirected the savings to fund services and supportive housing. According to a 2008 City Controller's audit, the Care Not Cash program housed 2,127 people between its implementation in 2003 and

- December 2007. The Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("HSH")
 estimates that Care Not Cash led to the creation of 1,300 units of permanent supportive housing.
 - (f) In 2004, Mayor Newsom introduced his "Ten Year Plan to Abolish Chronic Homelessness," which proposed to create 3,000 units of permanent supportive housing by 2010, and to replace shelters with 24-hour crisis clinics and sobering centers. By 2014, the City was still 300 units shy of the 3,000 pledged units, and had reduced the number of shelters beds by a third, from 1,910 beds in 2004 to 1,145 beds in 2014.
 - (g) Mayor Newsom authored two additional voter-approved ballot measures aimed at responding to homelessness: Proposition M in 2003, which amended the City's panhandling and loitering bans, and Proposition L in 2010, which made it illegal to sit or lie on sidewalks citywide from 7am to 11pm.
 - (h) Mayor Ed Lee oversaw the opening of the City's first Navigation Center in 2015, and in 2016 created HSH, pledging to spend at least \$1 billion over the next four years to address homelessness. Mayor Lee directed implementation of the City's Coordinated Entry system, seeking to improve the coordination of services by consolidating the dozens of Cityfunded homeless service groups into one system with a shared database. In the winter of 2017, shortly before his death, Mayor Lee pledged to move 1,000 unhoused people off the streets, and open two more Navigation Centers.
 - (i) Today, nearly four decades after Mayor Feinstein first attempted to respond to rising homelessness in San Francisco, the issue continues to vex the City. According to the Homeless Point-in-Time Count conducted on January 24, 2019, more than 8,035 people were experiencing homelessness at that time, a 17% increase from 2017. Among those surveyed, 5,180 were unsheltered, with 86% of unsheltered individuals sleeping outdoors in streets, parks or tents. According to a database of homeless individuals who use health care and

- other services, the number of people experiencing homelessness over the course of a year is estimated to be much higher than the number of people who experience homelessness on a given night, with estimates that more than 17,500 people experience homelessness in San Francisco during a given year.
- (j) During those same four decades, San Francisco has earned an international reputation for the severity of its homelessness crisis, with widespread reports of the City's street conditions appearing in media outlets around the world. In January 2017, Leilani Farha, a United Nations Special Rapporteur on adequate housing, issued a report finding that San Francisco's response to its unhoused population constitutes cruel and inhumane treatment, and is a violation of international human rights law including laws establishing the rights to life, housing, health and water and sanitation. Her report further stated "[T]he scope and severity of the living conditions in informal settlements make them one of the most pervasive violations of the human rights of dignity, security, health and life worldwide."
- (k) San Francisco voters expressed their own dissatisfaction with the current state of homelessness in a Dignity Health CityBeat Poll conducted in January 2020. 71% of San Francisco voters identified homelessness and street conditions as the top issue facing the City, and 89% stated that homelessness and street behavior had gotten worse in the past few years.
- (I) The COVID-19 pandemic and the City's Shelter in Place response exacerbated street conditions and contributed to an increase in the number of tent encampments citywide, with large numbers of unhoused people seeking shelter in neighborhoods throughout the City. This was at least partly due to a 75% reduction in available shelter beds, and a halt on new admissions to the shelter system in the early days of the pandemic, in compliance with guidance from the Centers for Disease Control requiring social distancing in the City's homeless shelters, thus necessitating a decrease in the shelter capacity. This reduction in

- shelter capacity is estimated to have forced nearly 1,000 unhoused people to return to City streets. From January to May 2020, the number of tents citywide increased by 71%.
- (m) Although encampments increased across the City during Shelter in Place, the increase and related impacts were felt more severely in neighborhoods where homelessness was most acute prior to COVID-19. In the Tenderloin, the number of tents increased 285% between January and May 2020.
- (n) On May 4, 2020, UC Hastings Law School filed a lawsuit on behalf of a group of Tenderloin residents and business owners over conditions in the neighborhood. As part of a settlement, the City agreed to achieve a 70% reduction in the number of tents by July 20, 2020. By July 3, 2020, the number of tents in the Tenderloin decreased by 65%. By July 10, 2020, the City reduced the number of tents in the Tenderloin by over 73%. As of August 18, 2020, the City had moved 87% of tents from the Tenderloin, and placed more than 600 people into Shelter in Place (SIP) hotels or other shelter. Since the Hastings lawsuit, three other lawsuits have been filed against the City. These lawsuits, except one filed by a plaintiff proceeding in propria persona, have been dismissed.
- (o) Following the issuance of new guidance from the Department of Public Health ("DPH") regarding street encampments, the City's Healthy Streets Operations Center began resolving encampments in other neighborhoods as well, subject to the availability of alternative placements.
- (p) Notwithstanding such efforts, conditions on our streets remain unacceptable. While some progress has been made in parts of the City, many thousands of people continue to sleep in unregulated, unsafe encampments without access to basic services such as water, food, sanitation, or bathrooms.
- (q) As demonstrated by the summary of mayoral initiatives above, the reality that thousands of individuals remain without homes or shelter is not for lack of effort or investment

- in solutions by the City. Since 2004, San Francisco has housed 26,000 homeless people.
- 2 Today, the City has more than 8,000 units of permanent supportive housing which house
- 3 approximately 10,000 formerly homeless individuals every night who would otherwise be
- 4 homeless.

- (r) Since 2015, the City's development of the Navigation Center model has represented a significant expansion of shorter-term shelter as well. Navigation Centers are unlike traditional emergency shelters because they are service-intensive and low-barrier, and provide case management, meals, showers, laundry, and 24-hour access, and allow guests to bring their partners, pets, and belongings.
- (s) Since 2015, HSH has opened eight Navigation Centers, four of which are currently operating. According to HSH, from the launch of Navigation Centers in 2015 through the end of 2019, 48% of Navigation Center exits were either to permanent housing or reunifications with family or friends through the Homeward Bound program. Over 5,000 clients have been served at Navigation Centers from 2015 to December 2019.
- (t) In October 2018, Mayor Breed announced a commitment to open at least 1,000 additional shelter beds, including Navigation Center beds, by the end of 2020. Prior to the outbreak of the coronavirus pandemic, the City was close to meeting this goal, and anticipates opening 880 of the proposed 1,000 beds by March 2021.
- (u) In November 2018, the voters approved Proposition C ("Prop. C"), creating a new gross receipts tax on high-grossing companies estimated to generate over \$300 million annually for homeless housing and services. In June 2020, a state appeals court upheld a lower court decision validating Prop. C, and on September 9, the California Supreme Court denied further legal review, freeing up nearly \$500 million in revenue that had been collected but remained unspent pending resolution of the litigation.

- 1 (v) During Shelter in Place, the City has acquired over 2,441 SIP hotel rooms to 2 provide shelter to homeless individuals determined to be medically vulnerable to COVID-19. 3 The cost of providing a hotel room is approximately \$260 per person per night, although the 4 City anticipates that 75% of costs may be reimbursed by the Federal Emergency 5 Management Agency.
 - (w) On September 29, the Board of Supervisors enacted the Fiscal Year 2020-21 budget, which includes funding for the acquisition or leasing of an additional 1,500 permanent supportive housing units over the next two years, largely funded through Prop. C revenue. These units, proposed in Mayor Breed's Homelessness Recovery Plan, represent the largest one-time expansion of permanent supportive housing in San Francisco in 20 years. The budget for HSH increased from \$367,690,818, in Fiscal Year 2019-20, to \$850,065,660, for Fiscal Year 2020-21, with the bulk of the increase paying for Shelter in Place hotel rooms and new permanent supportive housing units.
 - (x) San Franciscans are justifiably frustrated that after multiple decades and many billions of dollars of investment in additional shelter bed capacity, hotel placements, and permanent supportive housing units, thousands of unsheltered people continue to sleep on the streets night after night, and that the City relies on residential neighborhoods to serve as campsites of last resort for unhoused people, including individuals struggling with significant behavioral health conditions and substance use disorders.
 - (y) The Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals in a case entitled Martin v. City of Boise, 902 F.3d 1031 (9th Cir. 2018), held that the Eighth Amendment's prohibition on cruel and unusual punishment bars a city from criminally prosecuting people for sleeping on public property when those persons have committed no offenses other than sleeping on public property, and the city has not offered alternative shelter.

- (z) Notwithstanding the many investments described above, San Francisco has never established a comprehensive citywide strategy for meeting the shelter needs of the unhoused. Safe sleeping sites offer a potential strategy for addressing the needs of thousands of people who continue to suffer outside every night.
- (aa) Safe sleeping sites are designated and officially sanctioned outdoor spaces for unsheltered people, providing an organized area to stay with access to amenities and services that may include handwashing stations, bathrooms, daily meals, social services, and access to the City's Coordinated Entry System.
- (bb) Safe sleeping sites offer a scalable and sustainable strategy for addressing the needs of those people who continue to shelter outside every night and for whom the City does not have an available housing unit or shelter available.
- (cc) On May 8, 2020 the Board of Supervisors unanimously enacted Resolution 191-20, urging the City to establish safe sleeping sites for unsheltered people, to encourage social distancing, improve sanitation, and slow the spread of COVID-19.
- (dd) Subsequent to introduction of Resolution 191-20, on May 5, 2020 Supervisors Sandra Lee Fewer and Gordon Mar introduced legislation authorizing the use of San Francisco park property for temporary shelter and other measures in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, and directed the Recreation and Park Department ("RPD") to provide to the Board of Supervisors with a list of potential locations for such uses. RPD and the Real Estate Division submitted a list of 42 potential sites. The sponsors tabled the legislation on May 18, 2020.
- (dd) On May 13, 2020, the City established its first sanctioned and supervised safe sleeping site on Fulton Street between the Asian Art Museum and the Main Library, which provides space for safely distanced tents, 24/7 access to bathrooms and handwashing stations, daily meals, and health care services. As of October 14, 2020, the City has opened

- six Safe Sleeping Sites, five of which are active. In total, the active Safe Sleeping sites provide a place to sleep to approximately 213 unhoused individuals. Safe sleeping sites are a proven model providing safe places to sleep and access to services for unhoused individuals who were otherwise unable to access housing, shelter or services. However, the HSH Fiscal year 2020-21 Budget includes funding for only 150 safe sleeping site placements, with funding decreasing to just 50 placements in 2021-22.
- (ff) Because the City's safe sleeping sites provide outdoor space with socially distanced areas for sleeping, access to sanitation and bathrooms, and 24/7 onsite security, guests are at lower risk of contracting and spreading COVID-19 than in congregate shelters where guests sleep in confined indoor spaces close to others, or unregulated encampments where is little access to sanitation and no enforcement of social distancing.
- (gg) Safe sleeping sites are a preferred option of unhoused people. According to a survey of 584 unhoused individuals conducted by the Coalition on Homelessness between June 3 and August 30, 2020, 58% of unhoused people surveyed prefer a "legal free campsite" to existing shelters.
- (hh) Because the City lacks sufficient capacity in the shelter system or adequate housing alternatives to accommodate the thousands of people still living in tent encampments, far too many unhoused people continue to seek shelter on the streets. By establishing a network of safe sleeping sites so that every unsheltered person who is unable to access a shelter bed or housing unit can be offered a placement, San Francisco can ensure that all unhoused people have a safe place to spend the night, and no neighborhood's sidewalks need serve as shelter of last resort.

Section 3. The Administrative Code is hereby amended by adding Chapter 118, consisting of Sections 118.1 to 118.8, to read as follows:

2	<u>CHAPTER 118:</u>
3	SAFE SLEEPING SITES
4	
5	SEC. 118.1. TITLE.
6	This ordinance shall be known as "A Place for All Ordinance."
7	
8	SEC. 118.2. SAFE SLEEPING SITE POLICY.
9	It shall be the policy of the City and County of San Francisco ("City") to ensure that every
10	person experiencing homelessness in San Francisco has a safe place to sleep overnight. First and
11	foremost, the City is committed to expanding opportunities for safe, affordable, and permanent housing
12	for all residents. To supplement permanent housing, the City is committed to expanding opportunities
13	for people experiencing homelessness to have temporary shelter, including but not limited to,
14	Navigation Centers, adult emergency shelters, crisis stabilization units, family shelters, and shelters for
15	transitional aged youth ("TAY"). To the extent that there is insufficient permanent housing and
16	temporary shelter for people experiencing homelessness in San Francisco, it shall be the policy of the
17	City to expeditiously establish and operate a network of temporary Safe Sleeping Sites where
18	individuals may safely take shelter for the night, and to provide transportation as reasonably needed to
19	and from such locations.
20	
21	SEC. 118.3. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE SAFE SLEEPING SITES PROGRAM.
22	(a) Subject to the budgetary aid fiscal provisions of the Charter, the Department of
23	Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("HSH") shall establish a Safe Sleeping Sites Program (the
24	"Program"). By no later than 18 months after the Effective Date, the City shall have opened as many
25	Safe Sleeping Sites as are necessary to accommodate all of the Unsheltered people in San Francisco

1	who are willing to accept a referral to such sites, based on the most recent estimate prepared by HSH			
2	pursuant to Section 118.5, with such excess capacity as HSH reasonably determines may be necessary			
3	to ensure that a space at a Safe Sleeping Site will generally be available for anyone accepting such			
4	placement.			
5	(b) HSH shall coordinate with the Division of Real Estate, the Recreation and Park			
6	Department, the Human Services Agency, the Port of San Francisco ("Port"), the Public Utilities			
7	Commission ("PUC"), the Municipal Transportation Agency ("MTA"), and such other City			
8	departments, offices, agencies, boards, and commissions as may be necessary or appropriate for			
9	successful implementation of the Program.			
10				
11	SEC. 118.4. DEFINITIONS.			
12	As used in this Chapter 118, the following words or phrases shall mean:			
13	"City" means the City and County of San Francisco.			
14	"Effective Date" means the effective date of the ordinance in Board File No. 201187, enacting			
15	this Chapter 118			
16	"Safe Sleeping Site" means an outdoor lot or facility meeting the operational requirements set			
17	forth in Section 118.7, as may be applicable, where Unsheltered individuals may sleep overnight in			
18	their own tent or bedding and may access services.			
19	"Unsheltered" means having a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not			
20	designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings, including a			
21	car, park, abandoned building, bus or train station, airport, or camping ground.			
22				
23	SEC. 118.5. ANNUAL ESTIMATE OF THE NUMBER OF UNSHELTERED PEOPLE.			
24	Within 60 days of the Effective Date, and every year thereafter, HSH shall prepare an estimate			
25	of the number of Unsheltered people in San Francisco who are willing to accept a referral to a Safe			

1	Sleeping Site, which estimate shall be used to determine the number of Safe Sleeping Sites that the City
2	is required to operate, consistent with Section 118.3. HSH shall calculate the estimate in collaboration
3	with the Controller, using the most accurate and current data sources available, including but not
4	limited to the Point-in-Time Homeless Count, tent counts, and data collected and maintained by HSH
5	and other City departments reflecting the rate of acceptance of referrals to Safe Sleeping Sites among
6	people who are offered such placement.
7	
8	SEC. 118.6. SURVEY OF REAL PROPERTY.
9	(a) The Director of Real Estate shall conduct a survey of real property in the City to identify
10	lots appropriate for use as Safe Sleeping Sites, and shall submit the findings of such survey to the
11	Board of Supervisors no later than three months after the Effective Date. The survey shall include
12	vacant or unused sites owned or controlled by the City; sites owned or controlled by the City that are
13	being used for other purposes but could feasibly be converted to a Safe Sleeping Site; private property,
14	including property owned by non-City agencies, that could be leased or acquired by the City; and such
15	other information, if any, as the Director of Real Estate deems appropriate to aid in identifying lots as
16	intended by this Section 118.6. As part of the survey, the Director of Real Estate, in consultation with
17	the Planning Department, shall note whether the use of a particular lot as a Safe Sleeping Site would
18	require a variance, conditional use permit, or amendment of the Planning Code.
19	(b) The Director of Real Estate shall annually update the survey of real property required
20	by subsection (a) and shall submit such updated survey to the Board of Supervisors.
21	
22	SEC. 118.7. OPERATIONAL REQUIREMENTS.
23	(a) Applicability of Requirements. The location of a facility or lot on property under the
24	jurisdiction of the MTA, PUC, or the Port requires the approval of the agency with jurisdiction over the
25	property.

(b) Operational Requirements for Safe Sleeping Sites. Each Safe Sleeping Site shall:				
(1) Accommodate up to 150 Unsheltered individuals;				
(2) Prepare and implement a Safety Plan to ensure that the site is safe and secure;				
(3) Prepare and implement an Intake Plan designed to support Unsheltered people				
and address street encampments;				
(4) Prepare and implement an Exit Plan to assist clients who are exiting the site to				
relocate to places other than the street;				
(5) Provide access to clean and regularly-serviced bathroom facilities, and may also				
provide access to showers;				
(6) Be open and available for use during hours to be established by HSH, but at a				
minimum shall be open from 8:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m.				
(c) Transportation. HSH shall ensure that transportation is provided between Safe Sleeping				
Sites and designated HSH shelter reservation sites, access points, and other designated pick-up/drop-				
off locations to persons who have been assigned a reservation at a Safe Sleeping Site by HSH or its				
designee, and shall provide expanded pick-up/drop-off service during wet weather events and				
emergency conditions. For purposes of this subsection (c), "transportation" shall not include bus or				
light rail service operated for public transportation by the MTA.				
SEC. 118.8. IMPLEMENTATION.				
(a) The Director of HSH may issue rules, regulations, and/or guidelines, applicable to the				
Program, consistent with the objectives and requirements of this Chapter 118.				
(b) To the extent consistent with Charter requirements, the Director of HSH may enter into				
contracts or other agreements with other City departments, public agencies, and private entities to aid				
in the administration of this Chapter 118.				

1	(c) All City officers and entities shall cooperate with the Director of HSH in the
2	implementation and administration of this Chapter 118.
3	(d) Within 60 days of the Effective Date, HSH shall submit to the Mayor and the Board of
4	Supervisors a plan to open enough Safe Sleeping Sites to serve 500 Unsheltered people within nine
5	months of the Effective Date, and enough Safe Sleeping Sites to meet the requirements set forth in
6	Section 118.3 within 18 months of the Effective Date ("Implementation Plan"). The Implementation
7	Plan shall include, but not necessarily be limited to:
8	(1) An estimate of the cost of implementing the Safe Sleeping Sites program during
9	the 18-month implementation period, and the annual cost of operating the Program once it is fully
10	operational. These estimates shall specify what portion of the costs, if any, can be paid for out of
11	money that has already been appropriated to HSH's budget, and what portion of the costs would
12	require a new appropriation;
13	(2) An analysis of the cost-effectiveness of different Safe Sleeping Site models;
14	(3) A description of any services to be provided on the site of a Safe Sleeping Site,
15	including but not limited to case management, treatment referrals, and/or coordinated entry referrals;
16	(4) A description of any accommodations that may be provided at some or all of the
17	Safe Sleeping Sites, such as but not limited to cots, tents, pods, tuff sheds, and/or tiny homes.
18	(5) A description of the method by which HSH intends to select contractors or
19	grantees to implement and/or operate the Safe Sleeping Sites Program.
20	(e) Within two years of the Effective Date and annually thereafter, the Controller shall
21	submit to the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors, as well as HSH, a report evaluating the Program,
22	including an assessment of the number of Unsheltered persons served, the number of safe sleeping
23	spaces made available, the average nightly occupancy rate for each Safe Sleeping Site, and data
24	showing the number and percentage of exits from Safe Sleeping Sites that are made to permanent

housing, shelter, the streets, or another location, and any programmatic recommendations, along with
a resolution to accept the report.
Section 4. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after
enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the
ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board
of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.
Section 5. Undertaking for the General Welfare. In enacting and implementing this
ordinance, the City is assuming an undertaking only to promote the general welfare. It is not
assuming, nor is it imposing on its officers and employees, an obligation for breach of which it
is liable in money damages to any person who claims that such breach proximately caused
injury.

LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Administrative Code - Safe Sleeping Sites Program]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to require the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing to establish a Safe Sleeping Sites Program to provide unsheltered persons with a safe place to sleep overnight; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

Existing Law

Currently, there is no law requiring the City to operate outdoor sites where unsheltered people may sleep overnight and receive access to services.

Amendments to Current Law

The proposed ordinance, known as the "A Place for All Ordinance," would establish that it is the policy of the City and County of San Francisco ("City") to expeditiously establish and operate a network of temporary Safe Sleeping Sites where individuals may safely take shelter for the night, and would require the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing ("HSH") to establish a Safe Sleeping Sites Program.

Subject to the budgetary aid fiscal provisions of the Charter, and within 18 months of the effective date of the ordinance, HSH would be required to open as many Safe Sleeping Sites as are necessary to accommodate all of the unsheltered people in San Francisco who are willing to accept a referral to such sites, with such excess capacity as may be necessary to ensure that a space at a Safe Sleeping Site shall generally be available for anyone accepting such placement. HSH would conduct an annual estimate of the number of unsheltered people willing to accept referral to a site to inform the number of Safe Sleeping Sites that must be opened.

Once opened, Safe Sleeping Sites would be required to accommodate up to 150 unsheltered individuals; prepare and implement a safety plan, intake plan, and exit plan; provide access to clean and regularly-serviced bathrooms; and be open and available for use from at least 8:00 p.m. to 8:00 a.m. In addition, HSH would be required to provide private transportation between Safe Sleeping Sites and designated HSH shelter reservation sites, access points, and other designated pick-up/drop-off locations to persons who have been assigned a reservation at a Safe Sleeping Site.

Background Information

As of January 2019, more than 8,035 people in San Francisco were experiencing homelessness. 5,180 of these individuals were unsheltered, 86% of whom were sleeping outdoors in streets, parks or tents.

The COVID-19 pandemic and the City's Shelter in Place response exacerbated street conditions and contributed to an increase in the number of tent encampments citywide, with large numbers of unhoused people seeking shelter in neighborhoods throughout the City. This was at least partly due to a 76% reduction in available shelter beds, and a halt on new admissions to the shelter system in the early days of the pandemic, in compliance with guidance from the Centers for Disease Control requiring social distancing in the City's homeless shelters, thus necessitating a decrease in the shelter capacity. This reduction in shelter capacity is estimated to have forced nearly 1,000 unhoused people to return to City streets. From January to May 2020, the number of tents citywide increased by 71%.

On May 13, 2020, the City established its first sanctioned and supervised safe sleeping site on Fulton Street between the Asian Art Museum and the Main Library, which provides space for safely distanced tents, 24/7 access to bathrooms and handwashing stations, daily meals, and health care services. As of October 14, 2020, the City has opened six safe sleeping sites, five of which are active. In total, the active safe sleeping sites provide a place to sleep to approximately 213 unhoused individuals.

Safe sleeping sites are a preferred option of unhoused people. According to a survey of 584 unhoused individuals conducted by the Coalition on Homelessness between June 3 and August 30, 2020, 58% of unhoused people surveyed prefer a "legal free campsite" to existing shelters.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Legislative Objectives

• The proposed ordinance would establish the Safe Sleeping Sites Program, to be administered by the Department of Homelessness & Supportive Housing (HSH), to provide a sufficient number of outdoor sites to offer outdoor accommodation to people experiencing homelessness desiring access to dedicated Safe Sleeping Sites.

Key Points

- The COVID Command Center currently operates six Safe Sleeping Villages, which in addition
 to the above services, provide clients with meals and access to medical and social services.
 The average cost of operating a Safe Sleeping Village is \$193 per person per night.
- Unlike Safe Sleeping Villages currently operated by the COVID Command Center, the proposed ordinance does not require provision of on-site clinical, medical, or social services. We estimate the average cost of operating a limited-service Safe Sleeping Site is \$93 per person per night.
- HSH has stated the potential number of persons that could need accommodations at these sites could be as low as 500, and as high as 5,000 based on available data.

Fiscal Impact

- The estimated annual cost of operating limited-service Safe Sleeping Sites for 500 people would be \$16.9 million. The estimated annual cost of operating a full-service Safe Sleeping Village for 500 people is \$34.7 million. One-time costs for site preparation of existing Safe Sleeping Villages were \$50,000 to \$299,124 per site.
- The cost estimates do not include transportation to sites, which is required by the proposed legislation, or departmental staffing requirements.

Policy Consideration

According to COVID-19 Command Center (CCC) staff, the Safe Sleep Village model
is an effective model that meets program goals of providing safe places for occupants and
neighborhoods. However, CCC staff expressed concerns regarding the limited-service
model discussed above for Safe Sleeping Sites, noting that one limited-service site was
closed, and another, on Jones Street, has been converted to a hybrid Safe Sleeping
Village/Site service model due to neighborhood concern.

Recommendations

- Request the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing and the COVID Command Center provide details to the Board of Supervisors within sixty days on Safe Sleeping Program costs and a process to control costs.
- Approval of the proposed ordinance is a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.

MANDATE STATEMENT

City Charter Section 2.105 states that all legislative acts shall be by ordinance, approved by a majority of the members of the Board of Supervisors.

BACKGROUND

According to the 2019 San Francisco Point-in-Time Count, the City had 8,035 persons experiencing homelessness in 2019, of which 5,180 were unsheltered. In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the City has reduced shelter capacities and established the COVID-19 Alternative Shelter Program including the Shelter in Place (SIP) program (hotels and a trailer site), congregate shelter and Safe Sleep. There are currently six active Safe Sleep Programs operated by the COVID Command Center.

Existing Safe Sleeping Program

In response to the need for social distancing to limit the spread of COVID-19, the Department of Emergency Management (DEM) (as part of the Emergency Operations Center) set up the Safe Sleeping Program, consisting of Safe Sleep Sites and Safe Sleeping Villages. Safe Sleep Sites were smaller sites that provided 24/7 security, a port-a-potty, a washing station, and garbage removal services. In contrast to Safe Sleeping Villages, Safe Sleeping Sites were not staffed by a services provider, and had no on-site food services, or access to clinical and social services. Safe Sleep Sites typically included less than 20 marked tent spaces separated by at least six feet, in accordance with CDC recommendations to reduce risk of COVID transmission. The COVID-19 Command Center has closed one Safe Sleep Site and has converted the Jones site into a hybrid Site/Village type model due to safety issues and opposition from neighborhood residents.

Safe Sleeping Villages provide 24/7 staffing by a service provider with experience working with people experiencing homelessness. Staff ensures a safe environment, monitor and record entrances and exits of all site residents, and conduct regular check-ins with site occupants. Residents are provided with behavioral health and harm reduction services, access to medical attention, food and water, as well on on-site bathrooms, showers, charging stations, and garbage service.

The COVID-19 Command Center has been able to sustain six Safe Sleeping Village locations noted below in Table 1.

As shown above, the annualized cost of the six Safe Sleeping Programs is approximately \$18.2 million, or \$190 per night per tent. According to Ms. Emily Cohen, HSH Interim Director of Strategy and External Affairs and Ms. Dylan Schneider, HSH Manager of Policy and Legislative Affairs, the existing Safe Sleep contracts were negotiated by the Emergency Operations Center, and then by the COVID Command Center. As of this writing, Safe Sleep Villages have been operating for more than nine months. According to HSH, start-up costs for each site ranged from \$50,000 to \$299,124 per site. These costs are for construction work usually done by Department of Public Works.

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed ordinance would amend the Administrative Code to make it City policy that all persons experiencing homelessness have a safe place to sleep. The proposed ordinance would establish the Safe Sleeping Sites Program, to be administered by the Department of Homelessness & Supportive Housing (HSH), to provide a sufficient number of outdoor sites to offer outdoor accommodation to people experiencing homelessness desiring access to dedicated Safe Sleeping Sites.

Transportation will be offered from the sleeping sites to HSH shelter reservation sites, Access Points, and "other pickup/drop off locations."

Projected Need

HSH will need to provide forward-looking estimates of the number of persons who are likely to become homeless in the coming year. The results of the bi-annual Point in Time Counts of homeless persons are typically available in June of the same year. This data would be used along with other data sources including the quarterly tent and vehicle count conducted by the Healthy Streets Operations Center (HSOC). Additional analysis would need to be conducted to develop a

metric to inform the rate of acceptance of these sites as required in the proposed legislation. However, the Department currently estimates the proposed program could require outdoor accommodation to be provided to as low as 500 and to upwards to 5,000 individuals based on the 2019 count of unsheltered count.

To determine the number of outdoor lots that must be procured, HSH and the Controller's Office are required to prepare, within 60 days following passage of the proposed ordinance and annually, an estimate of the number of people experiencing homelessness that would be willing to accept a referral to a Safe Sleeping Site.

Site Procurement

The Department of Real Estate will oversee site identification and acquisition, which may be publicly or privately owned. To assist in meeting the capacity mandate, the Department of Real Estate is directed to conduct a survey of real property in the City, and report to the Board of Supervisors within three months the number of actual or potentially feasible sites, and estimates of site procurement costs. The survey of property would be updated annually. Utilization of any land or sites with improvements owned by Municipal Transportation Agency, San Francisco Public Utilities Commission, and the Port will require approval by the governing commissions for these entities.

No information is presently available as the availability of locations that could provide appropriate sites for setting up these Safe Sleeping Sites, or the cost of site procurement.

Operating Requirements

Section 118.7 of the proposed ordinance requires all Safe Sleeping Sites accommodate up to 150 persons, provide access to bathrooms, ensure safety, as well as intake and exit planning, and to be open 8pm to 8am. The proposed ordinance also requires HSH to provide transportation between shelter reservation sites, access points, and other designated pick-up/drop-off locations.

Unlike Safe Sleeping Villages currently operated by the COVID Command Center, the proposed ordinance does not require provision of on-site clinical, medical, or social services.

Implementation

Within sixty days, HSH shall submit a plan to the Mayor and to the Board of Supervisors for opening Safe Sleeping Sites to accommodate 500 people within nine months and a plan to open sufficient sites to be able to accept all persons that HSH estimates would desire to relocate into Safe Sleeping Sites with an appropriate tent space within two years. The legislation requires the plan to include cost estimates.

Reporting

The proposed ordinance would require HSH to report on the effectiveness of the program within two years and then annually thereafter.

Pending Amendments

We have reviewed amendments to the legislation that may be proposed at the April 21, 2021 Budget & Finance Committee. The primary modifications introduced into the operating requirements include the provision of a disability access plan, access to harm reduction services, and provision of on-site personal protective equipment and disinfection of common surfaces. In addition, the sites would have to provide access electricity, garbage services, and showers.

The amendments also lengthen the time by which HSH must prepare and submit the implementation plan from 60 to 120 days subsequent to the passage of the proposed ordinance. HSH will be mandated to conduct an analysis to determine which models appear most effective, clarify and standardized CBO contracting procedures, develop a geographical plan for site location and community outreach strategies.

FISCAL IMPACT

As noted in Table 1 above, the average cost of a Safe Sleeping Village is \$190 per tent per night, excluding one-time capital costs. Table 2 presents an estimate the more scaled down Safe Sleeping Site model required by the proposed ordinance. To create the estimate, we have removed CBO expense, and included a separate line estimate for private security services.

Estimates in Table 2 below do not include transportation costs or harm reduction and other possible on-site support required by the amendments to the legislation, noted above, and which would increase total costs. Based on these assumptions, the estimated cost of the more stripped-down implementation would be \$93 per tent per night (or \$2,778 per person per month).

The total annual cost of operating Safe Sleeping Sites according to the minimal requirement of the proposed ordinance (not including transportation, harm reduction and other on-site support) would range from approximately \$16.9 million and \$169 million annually, depending on the

number of persons served, as shown in Table 3. This is approximately one-half of the cost of the current operational models at Safe Sleeping Villages, although the actual numbers could be higher if we were to include transportation, harm reduction, and other limited support services. As noted above, one-time costs for site preparation of existing Safe Sleeping Villages were \$50,000 to \$299,124 per site.

Departmental Staffing Requirements

HSH estimates that implementing and operating Safe Sleeping Sites for 5,000 individuals and complying with the ordinance's reporting requirements could require hiring nine additional staff. Based on the FY 2020-21 salary schedules, the total annual cost of these positions is \$1,395,245. In addition, the actual staffing needs including additional staff at other City Departments such as Real Estate and others are not yet known. The creation of nine new positions that was estimated by HSH in the HSH's budget to support the Safe Sleeping Sites program would be subject to Board of Supervisors future appropriation approval.

Funding Source

According to HSH, under current federal policy, Safe Sleep Program Sites are classified as congregate shelter, and as such are not eligible for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) reimbursements. In addition, FEMA funding is likely to be eliminated, or significantly reduced, in FY 2021-22, assuming the U.S. has emerged from the COVID-19 pandemic. Hence the HSH budget will need to absorb the full cost of setting up and operating these Safe Sleeping Sites. Additionally, FEMA funds are only available to safely shelter COVID-vulnerable individuals and not an ongoing source of revenue.

The Board of Supervisors has previously authorized the release of \$49.3 million in Proposition C funds from Budget and Finance Committee reserve to HSH, of which \$25.9 million was designated to fund congregate shelter, Safe Sleep Sites, and shelter provider compensation (File 20-1378). \$232.4 million of Proposition C monies remain on Budget & Finance Committee reserve in FY 2020-21.

POLICY CONSIDERATION

Limited-Service Model

According to COVID-19 Command Center (CCC) staff, the Safe Sleep Village model is an effective model that meets program goals of providing safe places for occupants and neighborhoods. However, CCC staff expressed concerns regarding the limited-service model discussed above for Safe Sleeping Sites, noting that one limited-service site was closed, and another, on Jones Street, has been converted to a hybrid Safe Sleeping Village/Site service model due to neighborhood concerns. For this reason, the Board may wish to consider implementing a hybrid, reduced service model as an alternative. However, to date, HSH and CCC have not developed a specific hybrid model proposal.

Variance in Operating Costs

As shown in Table 1, operating costs for Safe Sleeping Villages vary from \$131 to \$271 per person per night. In an effort to standardize costs, HSH stated it has started to collect and analyze budget and spending information in the interests of finding means to reduce total spending without compromising the provision of on-site services.

New Program

Because this is a new program for which a funding source has not yet been identified but would likely include General Fund sources, we consider approval of the proposed ordinance to be a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- Request the Department of Homelessness and Supportive Housing and the COVID Command Center provide details to the Board of Supervisors within sixty days on Safe Sleeping Program costs and a process to control costs.

At our **Monday, November 2, 2020, meeting**, the Youth Commission voted to take no position on the following motion:

No position on BOS File No. 201187 - [Administrative Code - Safe Sleeping Sites Program]

The Youth Commissioners voted to include the following questions, comments, and recommendations:

Questions:

- What is the long-term goal of this legislation to bridge the needs of houseless folks?
 Similarly, are these encampments just because of the pandemic or a longer term strategy?
- How is this related, or does it include, other places homeless people sleep (for example, homeless people using their vehicles)?
- How does this incorporate taking care of not only physical safety but also mental and emotional safety?
- What other/alternative plans do they have to provide resources at the sites?
- How is the need of housing included in this legislation?
- What percentage of people in Safe Sleeping Sites are Transitional Aged Youth (TAY) and how does this compare to the general TAY population experiencing homelessness?
- Since many Safe Sleeping Sites have been opened in the last 6 months why is there a slowing of urgency when the COVID-19 pandemic is still happening?
- Why is public transportation not available for those using Safe Sleeping Sites?

Recommendations:

- Using data, specific targets should be set based on the number of TAY in Safe Sleeping Sites so TAY needs aren't excluded
- There should be clear links to coordinated entry and be explicit on how this is connected to the coordinated entry as well as
- Be explicit and intentional with connecting TAY in Safe Sleeping Sites to TAY specific services since their needs are different than adults

Comments:

- The Youth Commission advises the legislative sponsors to expand their idea of what this
 legislation could be. As there was no legislative expert from a sponsoring office to speak
 on this legislation, the Youth Commission posed concerns of the long-term sustainability.
- The broad sentiment from the Youth Commission is that this seems "bare minimum" and there was overall concern that there was nothing mentioned on TAY specific population and their needs.
- In general, more intentional focus is needed not only on TAY specific resources and support but also more emphasis on resources and support as a response to a global pandemic (PPE/masks, etc.) to keep this particular population safe and healthy.

I have lived in District 8 for almost 15 years (20 in SF) and I opened Heroic Italian in the Castro this past Dec at the peak of the pandemic. Over the past 20 years I have watched out city degrade due to ineffective policies. Some highlights:

- 1. Arriving early to see a show with my wife downtown and taking a stroll down Market street looking for a place to grab a drink. A gentleman starts to urinate in the middle of the sidewalk...not a tree or wall...middle of the sidewalk...we turned around and waited inside for the show to start: We no longer arrive early for a show. This is lost sales to local business
- 2. My business has been open for 4 months- I have cleaned up needles twice, human feces 4 times, vomit once and now keep the door locked until we open at 11:30 so that I don't have to worry about people walking in- yes we have a team to clean the streets but that's a band aid not the solution. I am not excited about opening for breakfast even though it seems to be a possible business opportunity
- 3. Not sure of his name yet but the gentleman who wears army gear and stands at the corner of Castro and 18th screaming at everyone is not a nice experience. If it wasn't for the fact that I have a Black Belt and know self-defense I would be concerned walking by the guy.
- 4. Parklets are an amazing addition to the city but many of them become evening homes.

 Several on 18th street are regular heroin huts now. I don't want to sit to eat in a parklet that might not have been properly cleaned up after one of these nights.

A Place for All might not be a perfect solution but it a least is a positive 1st step and worth trying out. The simple fact that you cant move someone without offering them a home is ludicrous but this is an elegant solution to getting people off the street and into some sort of health place to stay. You can't flat out say NO to this proposal unless you have another solution that is better. I am all hears in hearing solutions, but have not heard of a better one yet.

Be threatened with actual weapons twice (this had never to be before in the Castro, although I know it sometimes happens). I'm struggling sleeping now because of it.

- Start a block safety program with SFPD because I witnessed or heard of two separate incidents where elderly neighbors were chased into our building. One with a 2x4. He is also on video throwing a 2x4 at someone's car shattering the rear window. What if that were my neighbor's head?
- Deal with ongoing harassment from people in my driveway 24/7
- Call 911 so many times, I can't even count. There was only one other time in my life where I had to call 911
- Start carrying pepper spray with me wherever I go
- Be potentially exposed to COVID-19 because none of these folks who we cannot avoid do not ever wears masks or take any precautions to keep us all safe
- Witness a domestic violence assault and a very intense physical assault- both less than 50 feet from my window
- Watch a wall get lit in fire also less than 50 feet from my window. The call to 911 sent a truck but they didn't even stop to check out the tent abs reported "no merit"?! You can still see the burn marks on the wall.
- Clean poop off the street on a daily basis because the city doesn't have resources to respond
- Spend endless amount of personal time, money, city resources, on these problems

Dear President Walton,

This letter is to express our strong opposition to Supervisor Mandleman's legislation entitled "A Place for All".

In summary, this legislation makes it the policy of San Francisco to ensure that every unhoused person on the streets in San Francisco has a tent, which would cost \$288,000,000, given the current expenditures on Safe Sleeping Villages of an average of \$72k per person per year. We believe this is poorly timed, given we could put people in hotels that already have the infrastructure in place and the federal government would pay for it in full. We also believe this is an incredibly low bar, to shoot for everyone having a tent instead of housing, when providing flex pool housing subsidies for people is less than half the cost.

We have worked with Supervisor Mandleman to adjust this legislation, and while he was open to some changes, fundamentally he has been unwilling to move away from the "tents for all" concept.

### Existing Experience with Safe Sleeping Villages

There are two types of sanctioned encampments in San Francisco, one is referred to as a safe sleeping site and the other safe sleeping village. The site has little infrastructure, staffing and is much more informal, while the Safe Sleeping Villages ensure fundamental human rights such as sanitation, shower, water, garbage service, food and bathrooms are provided. Currently

there is one safe sleeping site and three Safe Sleeping Villages. The city started with two safe sleeping sites in the tenderloin - one they had to close for safety reasons and the other has had to be reorganized, emptied, and changed staffing several times. Serious shortfalls such as lack of sanitation, garbage buildup, lack of safety, have meant these sites have been unable to meet the basic needs of residents there. The Safe Sleeping Villages have provided a solid experience overall for camp residents, however because the lack of existing infrastructure has been very expensive with an *average* per person cost of almost \$72,000 annually. This cost has been lower in the larger sites, however the larger sites have been much more challenging for the residents staying there. For some unhoused people, with no indoor options, safe sleeping sites can be a successful option, however this should be considered only an interim intervention. It is not humane to keep people in tents for long periods of time. All of the sites are temporary, as development is going to occur on each of these sites and are only available temporarily.

## Coalition on Homelessness Position on Organized Encampments

COH has supported Safe Sleeping Programs as an alternative form of *shelter*, and our research shows unhoused people prefer this to traditional *shelter*. However, this is not to be confused with an alternative to housing -- unhoused people prefer housing. We firmly view Safe Sleeping Programs as *temporary* respites from criminalization and harsh street conditions and not *permanent* solutions to homelessness. We prefer them to be placed on unused temporary property such as pre-development sites. As we note later, the shelter system needs to be "right sized" to ensure successful movement through the system.

We support these as a way to diversify the shelter system, and have supported the opening of these in SF. We want these spaces to have democratic rule, and to have basic minimum standards including bathrooms, showers, hand washing and drinking water, and garbage service. These sites must also have 24 hour access, as unhoused constituents have felt night-time only access to be too much of a burden, too destabilizing to be helpful. We also have insisted that there be community access to these sites to move away from complaint driven placements.

### Shooting for Very Expensive Dirt instead of a Reachable Moon

Safe Sleeping Villages are typically developed on empty lots, and therefore rarely have existing infrastructure, water hook ups, bathrooms, showers or other fundamental sanitation requirements necessary for hygienic and safe conditions. This means the infrastructure needs to be built or brought in. This has driven up the costs dramatically. The average cost of the Safe Sleeping Villages has been just under \$72,000 per person per year, according to HSH, whereas the cost of a permanent housing subsidy for someone to rent an apartment in the private market is priced at about \$40,000 per person per household, including intensive services. This form of housing, called flex pool housing, has been incredibly successful in Los Angeles. In San Francisco, pre-pandemic we were limited with a lack of apartments inside San Francisco, a very tight housing market, and unwillingness of landlords to accept subsidies. That is no longer the case. The legislation calls for tents for all unsheltered people. This is a very low bar when you can have housing for all for less money.

### Poor Timing

Due to the pandemic, we have a plethora of permanent and short term housing opportunities for homeless people if we invest homeless dollars in a smart way. The SIP hotels are now 100% reimbursable by FEMA up to October 1st and accessible to all

unhoused people as the restrictions on who can access these rooms has broadened dramatically. These are buildings that already have doors, rooms, infrastructure, staffing, showers, bathrooms, and food service. It is simply a matter of moving people into the empty hotel rooms that are already staffed. We will have about 500 of these rooms ready to move in soon, and 250 more per month while the program lasts. City energy should be focused on filling those rooms. The city also has over 700 vacancies in permanent supportive housing. City energy should be put towards filling those vacancies as well. As previously noted, we also have landlords willing to rent, and housing subsidies sitting on the table, unutilized. We also have the opportunity to purchase tourist and student hotels. The homeless department is currently overwhelmed with a combination of vacant positions, is stretched across multiple pre-existing efforts to address a supportive housing vacancy crisis and to expand the emergency shelter system, and responding to the pandemic. The timing of this legislation could not be worse. It calls for the department to embark on yet another very time intensive effort of opening up hundreds of safe sleeping slots in a short period of time while having a plan to open thousands more. The real estate department is also struggling to keep up and should be focused on assessing acquisitions for permanent housing.

### Failed Experience in other Municipalities such as New York City

The legislation states that within 60 days of passage, HSH should submit a plan to serve 500 unsheltered people within 9 months. By another 9 months, the legislation states that HSH should be able to serve all who are "willing". Within 60 days of passage, HSH must prepare an estimate of unsheltered people willing to accept referral.

Our long standing position is that we do not support a "shelter for all" policy because in other areas such as New York City this has meant a massive resource dump into temporary accommodation at the expense of housing. In NYC people spend their entire lives in large congregate shelters, moving from site to site, and it has turned into de facto housing for impoverished people at a considerable expense given the lack of dignity such facilities are able to provide. Our position is clear and matches national best practices – we support a small shelter system with a diversity of shelter such as safe sleeping campsites, navigation centers and traditional shelters, but the size of that system should be kept relatively small. In comparing the cost of shelter to the cost of housing, it appears the amount spent to shelter could be used to make rents affordable. For example, family shelter costs about \$35k per family per year for shelter, for an individual at a Navigation Center it is about \$36K per year per person, and safe sleeping sites as mentioned are costing \$80k per person per year. We believe the overwhelming majority of homeless dollars expended should go to permanent housing. This proposal would use all dollars and more for shelter.

### Right Sizing the Shelter System

As of four years ago, our position is to increase the shelter system by 1,000 shelter beds to eliminate the shelter wait list. This position was adopted by Mayoral Administration, DHSH, and we sized Prop C to meet that need. Shelter has been expanded significantly since then and we are close reaching the 1,000 bed expansion. We have had several shelter population priorities, to be served in that 1,000 including full service emergency family shelter, full service shelter in the Bayview, shelter serving the trans community and an additional youth navigation center, and vehicular housed parking. All of these are in process or have been achieved.

Our vision for the system has been to invest heavily in prevention to decrease numbers experiencing homelessness, invest heavily in behavioral health and to invest heavily in housing so stays in shelters are brief and rare. This means the right size shelter system as has been the lesson in municipalities across the country. Those with the most success, such as Houston, Texas have moved the dial on homelessness by ensuring the "right sized" investments in each portion of the system, avoiding the NYC trap of investing too much in emergency shelter only to see those shelters fill up and unhoused people being stuck.

# Work Around Constitutional Protections for Unhoused People

Unsheltered people enjoy constitutional protections against being displaced when they have nowhere else to go. According to the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling Martin vs. City of Boise, cities can't arrest or punish people for sleeping on public property unless they provide adequate and relatively accessible **indoor accommodations** that also accommodate disabilities. As Supervisor Mandleman was unwilling to insert language that no sweeps shall occur in conjunction with the creation of safe sleeping sites, and as his communications with neighborhood groups have suggested that the creation of such sites will allow police to remove those unable to move into a camp, we believe that this legislation is an attempted workaround of constitutional rights of unhoused people. We do not believe that an offer of a "tent" qualifies as an indoor accommodation, and believe that the constitutional rights of unhoused people will be violated in this process.

In sum, we urge you to vote no on Supervisor Mandleman's legislation. It sets the bar too low for San Francisco, is poorly timed, outrageously expensive, would suck resources away from less expensive permanent solutions, and violate basic human rights.

The Civic Center Community Benefit District supports the *Place for All* ordinance goal of increasing the number of Safe Sleeping Sites in San Francisco.

Safe Sleeping Sites provide a modicum of support, structure and sanitation absolutely essential for those unable to secure safe shelter by any other means. The Safe Sleeping Sites currently operating in our area - Fulton Street and 33 Gough - have already provided critical relief to individuals in need and suffering in our community (photos attached) but we need to do more.

As long as the COVID-19 pandemic is still causing a significant reduction in shelter space and other housing assistance programs are at capacity, the Safe Sleeping Site model is a realistic, pragmatic and humane option for immediate support for the homeless now.

Moreover, as long as the stock of affordable and supportive housing remains woefully insufficient in San Francisco and the Bay Area in general, the Safe Sleeping Site model offers an immediate stop gap while the more complex and lengthy process for more affordable and supportive housing unfolds. We believe that such *Place for All* sites should be spread throughout the City, as many neighborhoods are seeing an influx of campers and sleepers - those outer neighborhoods dwellers should not be directed to sites solely in Civic Center, Tenderloin and SoMa. And in all cases, the City should seek to inform and hear from the community prior to opening a new site.

The *Place for All* ordinance includes an annual review and report on the program, providing an opportunity to evaluate its effectiveness. We believe individual outcomes and program costs should be included in such evaluations, allowing the Board of Supervisors to make informed decisions on the future of the Safe Sleeping Site model and its place in the spectrum of responses to the regional homeless crisis.

Dear President Walton,

This letter is to express our strong opposition to Supervisor Mandleman's legislation entitled "A Place for All".

In summary, this legislation makes it the policy of San Francisco to ensure that every unhoused person on the streets in San Francisco has a tent, which would cost \$288,000,000, given the current expenditures on Safe Sleeping Villages of an average of \$72k per person per year. We believe this is poorly timed, given we could put people in hotels that already have the infrastructure in place and the federal government would pay for it in full. We also believe this is an incredibly low bar, to shoot for everyone having a tent instead of housing, when providing flex pool housing subsidies for people is less than half the cost.

We have worked with Supervisor Mandleman to adjust this legislation, and while he was open to some changes, fundamentally he has been unwilling to move away from the "tents for all" concept.

#### Existing Experience with Safe Sleeping Villages

There are two types of sanctioned encampments in San Francisco, one is referred to as a safe sleeping site and the other safe sleeping village. The site has little infrastructure, staffing and is much more informal, while the Safe Sleeping Villages ensure fundamental human rights such as sanitation, shower, water, garbage service, food and bathrooms are provided. Currently

there is one safe sleeping site and three Safe Sleeping Villages. The city started with two safe sleeping sites in the tenderloin - one they had to close for safety reasons and the other has had to be reorganized, emptied, and changed staffing several times. Serious shortfalls such as lack of sanitation, garbage buildup, lack of safety, have meant these sites have been unable to meet the basic needs of residents there. The Safe Sleeping Villages have provided a solid experience overall for camp residents, however because the lack of existing infrastructure has been very expensive with an *average* per person cost of almost \$72,000 annually. This cost has been lower in the larger sites, however the larger sites have been much more challenging for the residents staying there. For some unhoused people, with no indoor options, safe sleeping sites can be a successful option, however this should be considered only an interim intervention. It is not humane to keep people in tents for long periods of time. All of the sites are temporary, as development is going to occur on each of these sites and are only available temporarily.

## Coalition on Homelessness Position on Organized Encampments

COH has supported Safe Sleeping Programs as an alternative form of *shelter*, and our research shows unhoused people prefer this to traditional *shelter*. However, this is not to be confused with an alternative to housing -- unhoused people prefer housing. We firmly view Safe Sleeping Programs as *temporary* respites from criminalization and harsh street conditions and not *permanent* solutions to homelessness. We prefer them to be placed on unused temporary property such as pre-development sites. As we note later, the shelter system needs to be "right sized" to ensure successful movement through the system.

We support these as a way to diversify the shelter system, and have supported the opening of these in SF. We want these spaces to have democratic rule, and to have basic minimum standards including bathrooms, showers, hand washing and drinking water, and garbage service. These sites must also have 24 hour access, as unhoused constituents have felt night-time only access to be too much of a burden, too destabilizing to be helpful. We also have insisted that there be community access to these sites to move away from complaint driven placements.

#### Shooting for Very Expensive Dirt instead of a Reachable Moon

Safe Sleeping Villages are typically developed on empty lots, and therefore rarely have existing infrastructure, water hook ups, bathrooms, showers or other fundamental sanitation requirements necessary for hygienic and safe conditions. This means the infrastructure needs to be built or brought in. This has driven up the costs dramatically. The average cost of the Safe Sleeping Villages has been just under \$72,000 per person per year, according to HSH, whereas the cost of a permanent housing subsidy for someone to rent an apartment in the private market is priced at about \$40,000 per person per household, including intensive services. This form of housing, called flex pool housing, has been incredibly successful in Los Angeles. In San Francisco, pre-pandemic we were limited with a lack of apartments inside San Francisco, a very tight housing market, and unwillingness of landlords to accept subsidies. That is no longer the case. The legislation calls for tents for all unsheltered people. This is a very low bar when you can have housing for all for less money.

#### Poor Timing

Due to the pandemic, we have a plethora of permanent and short term housing opportunities for homeless people if we invest homeless dollars in a smart way. The SIP hotels are now 100% reimbursable by FEMA up to October 1st and accessible to all

unhoused people as the restrictions on who can access these rooms has broadened dramatically. These are buildings that already have doors, rooms, infrastructure, staffing, showers, bathrooms, and food service. It is simply a matter of moving people into the empty hotel rooms that are already staffed. We will have about 500 of these rooms ready to move in soon, and 250 more per month while the program lasts. City energy should be focused on filling those rooms. The city also has over 700 vacancies in permanent supportive housing. City energy should be put towards filling those vacancies as well. As previously noted, we also have landlords willing to rent, and housing subsidies sitting on the table, unutilized. We also have the opportunity to purchase tourist and student hotels. The homeless department is currently overwhelmed with a combination of vacant positions, is stretched across multiple pre-existing efforts to address a supportive housing vacancy crisis and to expand the emergency shelter system, and responding to the pandemic. The timing of this legislation could not be worse. It calls for the department to embark on yet another very time intensive effort of opening up hundreds of safe sleeping slots in a short period of time while having a plan to open thousands more. The real estate department is also struggling to keep up and should be focused on assessing acquisitions for permanent housing.

### Failed Experience in other Municipalities such as New York City

The legislation states that within 60 days of passage, HSH should submit a plan to serve 500 unsheltered people within 9 months. By another 9 months, the legislation states that HSH should be able to serve all who are "willing". Within 60 days of passage, HSH must prepare an estimate of unsheltered people willing to accept referral.

Our long standing position is that we do not support a "shelter for all" policy because in other areas such as New York City this has meant a massive resource dump into temporary accommodation at the expense of housing. In NYC people spend their entire lives in large congregate shelters, moving from site to site, and it has turned into de facto housing for impoverished people at a considerable expense given the lack of dignity such facilities are able to provide. Our position is clear and matches national best practices – we support a small shelter system with a diversity of shelter such as safe sleeping campsites, navigation centers and traditional shelters, but the size of that system should be kept relatively small. In comparing the cost of shelter to the cost of housing, it appears the amount spent to shelter could be used to make rents affordable. For example, family shelter costs about \$35k per family per year for shelter, for an individual at a Navigation Center it is about \$36K per year per person, and safe sleeping sites as mentioned are costing \$80k per person per year. We believe the overwhelming majority of homeless dollars expended should go to permanent housing. This proposal would use all dollars and more for shelter.

#### Right Sizing the Shelter System

As of four years ago, our position is to increase the shelter system by 1,000 shelter beds to eliminate the shelter wait list. This position was adopted by Mayoral Administration, DHSH, and we sized Prop C to meet that need. Shelter has been expanded significantly since then and we are close reaching the 1,000 bed expansion. We have had several shelter population priorities, to be served in that 1,000 including full service emergency family shelter, full service shelter in the Bayview, shelter serving the trans community and an additional youth navigation center, and vehicular housed parking. All of these are in process or have been achieved.

Our vision for the system has been to invest heavily in prevention to decrease numbers experiencing homelessness, invest heavily in behavioral health and to invest heavily in housing so stays in shelters are brief and rare. This means the right size shelter system as has been the lesson in municipalities across the country. Those with the most success, such as Houston, Texas have moved the dial on homelessness by ensuring the "right sized" investments in each portion of the system, avoiding the NYC trap of investing too much in emergency shelter only to see those shelters fill up and unhoused people being stuck.

# Work Around Constitutional Protections for Unhoused People

Unsheltered people enjoy constitutional protections against being displaced when they have nowhere else to go. According to the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruling Martin vs. City of Boise, cities can't arrest or punish people for sleeping on public property unless they provide adequate and relatively accessible **indoor accommodations** that also accommodate disabilities. As Supervisor Mandleman was unwilling to insert language that no sweeps shall occur in conjunction with the creation of safe sleeping sites, and as his communications with neighborhood groups have suggested that the creation of such sites will allow police to remove those unable to move into a camp, we believe that this legislation is an attempted workaround of constitutional rights of unhoused people. We do not believe that an offer of a "tent" qualifies as an indoor accommodation, and believe that the constitutional rights of unhoused people will be violated in this process.

In sum, we urge you to vote no on Supervisor Mandleman's legislation. It sets the bar too low for San Francisco, is poorly timed, outrageously expensive, would suck resources away from less expensive permanent solutions, and violate basic human rights.
