14	Section	1. Article XIII of Chapter 10 of the Administrative Code is hereby amended by
15	adding Section	10.100-72, to read as follows:
16	<u>SEC. 10.100-72.</u>	FOOD EMPOWERMENT MARKET FUND.
17	(a) Estal	plishment of Fund. The Food Empowerment Market Fund (the "Fund") is established
18	<u>as a category fou</u>	r fund to receive any monies appropriated or donated to address food insecurity in the
19	<u>City's most vulne</u>	erable neighborhoods and equip those communities with tools and skills to produce
20	and prepare their	r own healthy and culturally appropriate food and to define their own food systems,
21	<u>otherwise referre</u>	ed to as "food sovereignty." Donations to the Fund are deemed approved for
22	acceptance and e	expenditure.
23	<u>(b)</u> Use a	f Fund. The Human Services Agency (HSA) shall use monies in the Fund to provide
24	grants to nonpro	fit organizations to establish and operate food empowerment markets.

1	(c) Food Empowerment Market Defined. For purposes of this Section 10.100-72, a "food
2	empowerment market" shall mean a community facility having the following characteristics:
3	(1) The facility has a free food market for the distribution of donated or discounted food
4	and other supplies related to cooking and dining from commercial grocery retailers, food suppliers,
5	and community food banks, as well as from any other sources;
6	(2) The facility has a community kitchen that teaches healthy cooking, restaurant skills,
7	and culinary education, using, in whole or in part, the donated food and supplies;
8	(3) The facility has cultural and linguistic competence in addressing food security,
9	nutrition, and related issues for the City's vulnerable residents, based on demonstrated empathy and
10	understanding of and respect for the values, historical context, expectations, language, and experience
11	<u>of diverse communities;</u>
12	(4) The facility provides referrals to government and community social services
13	addressing food security, nutrition, and related issues; and
14	(5) The facility provides food and services to any San Francisco resident who is:
15	(A) Receiving public assistance, including programs such as Calfresh, Medi-Cal,
16	and Cash-Aid;
17	(B) A member of the undocumented community; or
18	(C) An individual ineligible for government assistance but affiliated with or
19	sponsored by a San Francisco community-based agency doing work related to food security, nutrition,
20	and related issues. Such individuals shall, subject to HSA's rules and the market's own procedures, be
21	allowed to access the services and programs of the market for a specified time.
22	(d) Administration of Fund. HSA shall administer the Fund.
23	(1) No later than six months after the effective date of the ordinance in Board File
24	Noenacting this Section 10.100-72, and prior to issuing any grants, HSA shall adopt rules for
25	the grant program consistent with this Section.

1	(A) HSA shall consult with the Food Security Task Force established in Article
2	X of Chapter 5 of the Administrative Code, on the development of the rules for the grant program,
3	including consideration of the "2018 Assessment of Food Security" report issued by the Task Force.
4	(B) HSA shall consult with the Office of Economic and Workforce Development
5	(OEWD) on the development of the rules for the grant program as they affect the community kitchen
6	component.
7	(2) The rules shall at a minimum establish a selection process for awarding grants,
8	eligibility criteria for providers receiving grants, procedures for determining the size and frequency of
9	grant awards, processes for disbursement of grant funds, restrictions on the use of grant funds, and
10	reporting obligations for grantees. The rules may provide for separate grants programs for the initial
11	establishment of the food empowerment markets and for the subsequent ongoing operation of those
12	markets.
13	(3) The rules shall require that grantees work on an ongoing basis with the Department
14	of Public Health, OEWD, and HSA to implement the food empowerment markets program and other
15	City programs and guidance regarding food security, community nutrition, and public health where
16	relevant to the operation of the food empowerment markets. Grantees shall cooperate with the
17	Department of Public Health in the preparation of the biennial Food Security and Equity Report
18	required by Administrative Code Chapter 59A, and, after the report is issued, shall conform their
19	operations as much as possible to the relevant findings and recommendations contained in the report.
20	(4) The rules shall require each food empowerment market to have a community
21	advisory board and shall include guidelines for the selection and administration of the advisory boards.
22	(5) Within 15 days after adopting initial rules for the grant program under
23	subsection (d)(1), HSA shall submit a copy thereof to the Board of Supervisors. These rules shall not
24	become effective, and HSA shall issue no grants thereunder, until at least 30 days after HSA has
25	submitted the rules to the Board of Supervisors. Any subsequent rules or rule amendments adopted by

1	HSA shall become effective immediately upon adoption, unless those subsequent rules or rule
2	amendments specify otherwise.
3	(6) HSA shall award grants for the establishment and operation of one food
4	empowerment market each in Supervisorial Districts 6, 9, 10, and 11, in no particular order, and
5	according to the boundaries of those districts as of the time of the grant award. Thereafter, HSA may
6	expand the program to other Supervisorial districts. There is no limit on the number of food
7	empowerment markets that may be located in a particular Supervisorial district, nor is there a
8	requirement that all Supervisorial districts have a food empowerment market.
9	(e) Reporting. HSA shall, within the first two weeks of July, submit an annual report to the
10	Board of Supervisors and the Mayor describing the implementation of the grant program.
11	
12	Section 2. Effective Date. This ordinance shall become effective 30 days after
13	enactment. Enactment occurs when the Mayor signs the ordinance, the Mayor returns the
14	ordinance unsigned or does not sign the ordinance within ten days of receiving it, or the Board
15	of Supervisors overrides the Mayor's veto of the ordinance.

LEGISLATIVE DIGEST

[Administrative Code - Food Empowerment Market Fund]

Ordinance amending the Administrative Code to establish a special fund for grants to nonprofit agencies to establish and operate food empowerment markets, and designating the Human Services Agency to administer and establish rules for the program.

Existing Law

City law does not currently provide for a program of local food empowerment markets or a grant program to fund creation and operation of such markets.

Amendments to Current Law

The proposed legislation is an ordinance that would amend the Administrative Code to create a special fund to provide grants to nonprofit organizations to establish and operate food empowerment markets. Money in the fund would come from City appropriations or any gifts made to the City to support this program.

Under the ordinance, a "food empowerment market" would be a community facility operated as a free food market or pantry for the distribution of donated or discounted food and other supplies related to cooking and dining from commercial grocery retailers and community food banks, as well as from any other sources. A market would also include a community kitchen that would teach healthy cooking and restaurant skills, using, in whole or in part, the donated food and supplies. A market would be open to any San Francisco resident who is:

- Receiving public assistance, including programs such as Calfresh, Medi-Cal, and Cash-Aid;
- A member of the undocumented community; or
- A senior aged 65 years or older.

In addition, the market would accept daily meal vouchers issued by service agencies or community organizations to persons in need who were not included in one of the categories listed above.

The Human Services Agency (HSA) would administer the fund. The ordinance would include a timeline for HSA to adopt rules for the program, including a selection process for awarding grants and eligibility criteria for grant recipients. Initially, HSA would award grants for one food empowerment market each in Supervisorial Districts 6, 9, 10, and 11. After that,

HSA could expand the program to other Supervisorial districts. There would be no limit on the number of food empowerment markets that could be located in a particular Supervisorial district, nor would there be a requirement that all Supervisorial districts have a food empowerment market.

The overall goal of the program would be to address food insecurity in the City's most vulnerable neighborhoods and equip those communities with tools and skills to produce their own healthy and culturally appropriate food and to define their own food systems, otherwise referred to as "food sovereignty."

The ordinance would require HSA to consult with the Food Security Task Force on the development of the grant process, including consideration of the "2018 Assessment of Food Security" report issued by the Task Force. HAS would also consult with the Office of Economic and Workforce Development (OEWD) on development of the rules as they affected the community kitchen component of the grant program. And the rules for grant recipients would require them to work on an ongoing basis with the Department of Public Health, OEWD, and the Human Services Agency to implement City programs and guidance regarding food security, community nutrition, and public health where relevant to the operation of the markets. Grantees would be required to cooperate with the Department of Public Health in the preparation of the biennial Food Security and Equity Report pursuant to Administrative Code Chapter 59A, and, after the report is issued, to conform their operations as much as possible to the relevant findings and recommendations contained in the report

HSA would submit an annual report on the program to the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor.
