3	Resolution supporting California State Assembly Bill No. 37 introduced by Assembly
4	Member Marc Berman that would extend the requirements to mail a ballot to every
5	registered voter for all elections and apply them to all municipal elections and require a
6	vote by mail tracking system to be accessible to voters with disabilities.
7	
8	WHEREAS, The Coronavirus (COVID-19) forced Mayor London N. Breed to issue the
9	City and County of San Francisco's first public health order requiring residents to shelter-in-
10	place on March 16, 2020, while local health officials sought methods to control and eliminate
11	the virus' deadly impact to San Francisco's residents; and
12	WHEREAS, Governor Gavin Newsom issued a stay at home order to protect the health
13	and well-being of all California residents on March 19, 2020, and provide a statewide unified
14	response to the COVID-19 pandemic; and
15	WHEREAS, On May 8, 2020, Governor Newsom issued an Executive Order to send
16	every registered voter a vote-by-mail ballot for the November 3, 2020, General Election
17	because of the COVID-19 pandemic; and
18	WHEREAS, The City and County of San Francisco received record number of returned
19	ballots and voter turnout for the November 3, 2020, general election that accounted for more
20	than 2/3 of the County's registered voters voting largely by mail-in ballots; and
21	WHEREAS, A supermajority of legislators in the California Assembly and Senate
22	recently supported and successfully passed Senate Bill No. 29 (SB 29) that continues the
23	state's universal vote-by-mail system until the end of 2021; and

1	WHEREAS, Assembly Bill No. 37 (AB 37) would permanently extend the State's
2	universal vote-by-mail system by extending the requirements to mail a ballot to every
3	registered voter to all elections and apply them to all municipal elections; and
4	WHEREAS, AB 37 would also require a vote by mail tracking system to be accessible
5	to voters with disabilities; and
6	WHEREAS, AB 37 would provide vote by mail ballot are deemed timely if cast on or
7	before election day and, if returned by mail, received no later than 7 days after Election Day;
8	therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED, That the City and County of San Francisco and the San Francisco Board
10	of Supervisors supports Assembly Bill No. 37 which would permanently extend the
11	requirements to mail a ballot to every registered voter to all elections and apply them to all
12	municipal elections; and, be it
13	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of the City and
14	County of San Francisco distribute this Resolution to San Francisco's State Legislative
15	Delegation and to California Governor Gavin Newsom.

An act to amend Sections 3000.5 and 3019.7 of 3000.5, 3016.7, 3019.7, 3020, and 15101 of, and to repeal Section 3016.5 of, the Elections Code, relating to elections.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 37, as amended, Berman. Elections: vote by mail ballots.

Existing law-required requires county elections officials to mail a ballot to every registered voter for-the November 3, 2020, statewide general election. Existing law, for the November 3, 2020, statewide general election, also required county elections officials to use a specified Secretary of State vote by mail tracking system or a system that meets the same specifications. all elections proclaimed or conducted prior to January 1, 2022. Existing law requires county elections officials to use a specified Secretary of State vote by mail tracking system or a system that meets the same specifications.

This bill would extend these the requirements to mail a ballot to every registered voter to all elections. By requiring a county elections officials to mail a ballot to every registered voter, and to take other actions, this

bill would impose a state-mandated local program. elections and apply them to all local elections officials. This bill would require a vote by mail tracking system to be accessible to voters with disabilities. The bill would also make various conforming and technical changes.

Existing law requires county elections officials to permit voters with a disability, and military or overseas voters, to cast a ballot using a certified remote accessible vote by mail system, and required county elections officials to permit any voter to cast a ballot using a certified remote accessible vote by mail system for the November 3, 2020, statewide general election.

This bill would require county elections officials to permit any voter to cast a ballot using a certified remote accessible vote by mail system for any election.

Under existing law, a vote by mail ballot is timely cast if it is voted on or before election day and, if returned by mail, received by the voter's elections official via the United States Postal Service, or a bona fide private mail delivery company, no later than 3 days after election day.

This bill would provide instead that a vote by mail ballot is timely cast if it is voted on or before election day and, if returned by mail, received no later than 7 days after election day. This bill would authorize an elections official to consider any information from the United States Postal Service or a bona fide private mail delivery company that indicates the date on which the ballot was mailed, in order to determine whether a vote by mail ballot was timely cast.

Existing law authorizes a jurisdiction in which vote by mail ballots are cast to begin processing vote by mail ballot return envelopes 29 days before the election. Existing law authorizes a jurisdiction having the necessary computer capability to start processing vote by mail ballots on the 15th business day before the election, except, for the statewide general election held on November 3, 2020, these jurisdictions were authorized to start processing the ballots on the 29th day before the election. Existing law authorizes all other jurisdictions to start processing vote by mail ballots at 5 p.m. on the day before the election.

This bill would authorize a jurisdiction having the necessary computer capability to start processing vote by mail ballots the 29th day before any election.

By requiring local elections officials to mail a ballot to every registered voter, and to take other actions, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program. The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that the bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to the statutory provisions noted above.
