17	Section 1. Environmental Findings.
18	The Planning Department has determined that the actions contemplated in this
19	ordinance comply with the California Environmental Quality Act (California Public Resources
20	Code Sections 21000 et seq.). Said determination is on file with the Clerk of the Board of
21	Supervisors in File No. 210653 and is incorporated herein by reference. The Board affirms
22	this determination.

24	Section 2. The Park Code is hereby amended by deleting revising Section 12.50, as

#### SEC. 12.50. SUNSET PROVISIONS.

Unless extended by ordinance, the paragraphs in Sections 12.05(a), 12.06(a), 12.34(a), and 12.46(a) that authorize temporary increases and decreases of non-resident Adult fees at certain specialty attractions, adopted via Ordinance No. 194-19, and any such increases or decreases that the Department General Manager may have approved pursuant to those paragraphs, shall expire by operation of law on June 30, 2021. Upon expiration of those paragraphs, the City Attorney shall cause those paragraphs and this Section 12.50 to be removed from the Park Code.

### SEC. 12.50. SUNSET PROVISIONS.

(a) Consistent with Ordinance No. 194-19, the paragraph in Section 12.06(a) that authorizes temporary increases and decreases of non-resident Adult fees at the Coit Tower Elevator, and any such increases or decreases that the Department General Manager may have approved pursuant to that paragraph, shall be deemed to have expired by operation of law on June 30, 2021.

(b) Unless extended by ordinance, the paragraphs in Sections 12.05(a), 12.06(a), 12.34(a), and 12.46(a) that authorize temporary increases and decreases of non-resident Adult fees at certain specialty attractions, adopted via Ordinance No. 194-19, and any such increases or decreases that the Department General Manager may have approved pursuant to those paragraphs, shall expire by operation of law on December 7, 2021. Upon expiration of those paragraphs, the City Attorney shall cause those paragraphs, the above-referenced paragraph of Section 12.06(a), and this Section 12.50 to be removed from the Park Code.

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### **REVISED LEGISLATIVE DIGEST**

(7/20/2021, Amended in Board)

[Park Code - Non-Resident Fees at Certain Specialty Attractions]

Ordinance amending the Park Code to allow the Recreation and Park Department to continue setting non-resident adult admission fees for the Japanese Tea Garden, the Coit Tower Elevator, the Conservatory of Flowers, and the San Francisco Botanical Garden by flexible pricing until December 7, 2021; clarifying that the increased non-resident adult admission fees for the Coit Tower Elevator shall be deemed to have expired by operation of law on June 30, 2021; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

### **Existing Law**

The Park Code imposes admission fees for the Japanese Tea Garden, the Coit Tower Elevator, the Conservatory of Flowers, and the San Francisco Botanical Garden. There are different rates for children, adults and seniors, plus a discount for San Francisco residents.

In 2019, the Board of Supervisors authorized the Recreation and Park Department to set the non-resident adult admission fees through "flexible pricing," meaning that the Department may temporarily increase or decrease the fees based on factors such as customer demand, rates at comparable facilities, adverse weather conditions, and facility conditions. (Admission fees for non-resident youth and seniors, and for San Francisco residents of all ages, are exempt from flexible pricing.) The flexible pricing system is scheduled to sunset on June 30, 2021.

#### Amendments to Current Law

This version of the digest corresponds with a second set of amendments made on July 20, 2021. The first set of amendments would have allowed the Recreation and Park Department to continue to use flexible pricing for non-resident adult visitors at the four facilities in question until December 7, 2021. This second set of amendments modified that version, by removing the Coit Tower Elevator from the list of facilities where flexible pricing would be extended. Thus, flexible pricing at the Coit Tower Elevator expired by operation of law on June 30, 2021, but at the other three facilities will be extended to December 7, 2021.

# Specialty Gardens/Coit – Flexible Admission Pricing

## Reason for this Ordinance

- Adopted Flexible Pricing for Tourist Attractions in 2019.
- Board Added Following Requirements:
  - Request for a Report on use of flexible pricing (report was submitted in Spring 2021)
  - Sunset Clause to come back in 2021 for Provision to continue

# 2019 Approved Flexible Pricing at Specialty Gardens and Coit Tower

- Applies to Four Major Tourist Locations
  - 1) Japanese Tea Garden
  - 2) Conservatory of Flowers
  - 3) Botanical Garden
  - 4) Coit Tower Elevator (viewing of murals are free)
- Allow Adjustments to Non Resident Adult Rates

Increases of up to 50%

Decreases of up to 25%

- Does not apply to SF Residents
- Does not apply to Non Resident Seniors or Youth





P Specialty Gardens Provide a Number of Free Admissions for Low Income Including Nonresidents

### **Gardens for All Program**

Provides 4 free admissions to anyone with an Electronic Benefit Transfer card showing membership in the CalFresh or SNAP food-assistance programs, whether they live in the city or not.

### San Francisco For All Program

Also provides City residents in the Medi-Cal health insurance with their Medi-Cal card and proof of San Francisco residency.

- Botanical Garden open to all SF residents for Free
- Gardens have a variety of fee days and times
- Murals at Coit Tower open to all for free

## Implementation at Japanese Tea Garden

- Code allowed a temporary increase of up to 50% during the months of March through October only
- Instituted in March 2020 increasing pricing by \$2 from \$10 to \$12 during the period for nonresident adults (20% increase)



# Implementation at Conservatory of Flowers

- Code allowed an increase of up to 50% on Fridays through Sundays only.
- Instituted in October 2019 increasing pricing by \$2 from \$9 to \$11 (22% increase)
- Note- Facility was closed due to Covid-19 for 9 months





# Implementation at Botanical Garden

- Code allowed a temporary increase of up to 50% on Saturdays and Sundays only
- Instituted starting in November 2019 increasing pricing by \$3 from \$9 to \$12 (33% increase)
- Museums for All

## Implementation at Coit Tower

- Code allowed a temporary increase of up to 50% between 11 am and 4 pm for an elevator ride
- Not Implemented
  - \* Intended to Start Implementing in
  - Spring/Summer 2020
  - \*Coit Tower was closed at the time due to Covid 19 until just a few weeks ago
- Viewing of murals remains free and open to the public
