The Dead Must Not Be Permitted to Injure the Living.

ERTAIN benevolent associations were years ago permitted to bury their dead in the City Cemetery, which is now to be devoted to the uses of a park. One society whose dead have for years had the hospitality of the city without charge now declines to remove the remains and will attempt to prevent the city from devoting its property to a proper use. It is impossible to prevent quarrelsome people from going to law if they have the money to pay for it, but there is no equity in the contention of this society, and it should receive no consideration from the public.
