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450 O'Farrell Redesign Essential Workforce Housing Project Outreach Summary

Between November 2020 and October 2021, the project team conducted community outreach for the re-envisioned 450 O'Farrell project with the purpose of sharing changes made to the project, soliciting feedback, and responding to questions and concerns. Outreach included virtual meetings with stakeholders representing business, residential and social services; providing information electronically via Forge's website, a Facebook page, and YouTube channel; hosting a series of community meetings via Zoom; and door-to-door canvassing. Below is a summary of the project team's efforts:

- 42 virtual stakeholder meetings
- 3 canvassing events
- 4 community meetings
- 74 letters of support received for the Planning Commission
- 124 signatures received in support of the project for the Planning Commission
- 45 letters of support received for the Board of Supervisors

1.0 INTRODUCTION

In 2018, the original 450 O'Farrell luxury housing project was approved by the San Francisco Planning Commission. Since then, Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist has partnered with Forge Development Partners to redesign the project to better meet the needs of the local community. The redesigned project better fits the area by replacing all luxury housing with essential housing for teachers, firefighters, police, and other essential workers; increasing the number of units from 176 to 316; and increasing affordable units from 28 to 45.

The report summarizes outreach conducted by The Fifth Church of Christ Scientist, Forge Development Partners and Craig Communications (the project team) in support of the 450 O'Farrell Street redesigned Essential Housing project.

2.0 COMMUNICATION MATERIALS



The 450 O'Farrell redevelopment project is currently approved, entitled, and permitted by the City of San Francisco as luxury-rate apartment housing. Subsequently, the owner, Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist has partnered with Forge Development Partners (Forge) to redesign the project to better meet the needs of the local community. The revised project shifts from luxury-rate housing to Essential Housing benefiting the workforce, and increasing the number of apartments from 176 to 302, and almost doubling the number of apartments set aside for below-market-rate housing for the most economically vulnerable. The project still includes a new turnkey church worship space and public reading room allowing Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist to continue its healing mission and better serve the Tenderloin community that it has called home for almost 100 years.

As amended, the project complies with the San Francisco General Plan and is subject to the Housing. Accountability Act.

Who is Forge Development Partners?

Forge is a privately held San Francisco-based developer whose mission is to provide affordable housing for San Francisco's essential workers. Through unique design and construction techniques, Forge creates projects that are sustainable and environmentally beneficial at a price point that allows the middle-income workforce to remain in the city where they work.

What has changed from the currently permitted project?

Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist and Forge are working closely with the City to make the following changes:

- Converting a 176-unit luxury-rate housing project to a 302-unit Essential Housing project that benefits the workforce and provides well-designed housing for small families and almost doubles the number of new housing units in the development
- Increasing the number of units set aside for below-market-rate housing from 28 to 60 units:
 - 45 on-site MOH BMR affordable units are provided at rental rates equal to 40% AMI and qualifying incomes starting at \$20,000 per year





- 15 units will be provided at 50% AMI (bringing our inclusionary rate to 20%)
- Increasing the amount of amenity and outdoor space by 80% through a combination of roof decks, interior courtyards, and other shared amenities for residents
- Using the approved façade which includes several smaller, human-scale frontages more in line with the other buildings and historic character of the neighborhood
- Promoting transit-first solutions and reducing traffic and cars in the neighborhood by removing
 resident parking spaces and encouraging the use of public transit via adjacent and nearby MUNI and
 BART lines

How would the community benefit from the project?

Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist has worked with the community for years as part of the current approval to construct a development that fits within the existing neighborhood and becomes a place for all to enjoy. The project, now supporting Essential Housing, further benefits the community in the following ways

- Creating a housing project that more fits the needs of the community and the demographic of the neighborhood by converting to Essential Housing, and increasing the number of total units, and significantly increasing the number of BMR units

The graphic above compares the ranges of qualifying incomes of the permitted and amended project. As you can see, the permitted project has only 28 units available to those making under \$26,000 and \$49,000 a year. The other 148 units are all luxury market-rate units with the least expensive unit requiring the tenant to make at least \$130,000 a year. The permitted project offers no options to San Franciscans making between \$49,000 and \$130,000 a year, i.e. a significant portion of the workforce.

The proposed project, on the other hand, focuses on the exact range of people the permitted project ignores: The Middle. The most affordable units are available to folks making as little as \$20,000 a year, while the most expensive market rate units are available to folks making \$115,000 a year, or 130% AMI. Between those two markers is a diverse array of units suitable for members of San Francisco's workforce. There is no longer a vast divide between Below Market Rate and Market Rate Units because the entire development is affordable by design.

Our unit types range in average size from 346 square feet to 500 square feet. We maximize our use of space through an interior design scheme centered around flexibility. All units utilize modular storage spaces, surfaces, and furnishings that allow for areas to be converted for different uses over the course of the day.

All bathrooms are full bathrooms and include:





YIMBY Law submits this letter to inform you that the Planning Commission has an obligation to abide by all relevant state housing laws when evaluating the above captioned proposal, including the Housing Accountability Act (HAA).

California Government Code § 65589.5, the Housing Accountability Act, prohibits localities from denying housing development projects that are compliant with the locality's zoning ordinance or general plan at the time the application was deemed complete, unless the locality can make findings that the proposed housing development would be a threat to public health and safety. The most relevant section is copied below:

(j) When a proposed bousing development project contplies with applicable, objective general plan and zoning standards and criteria, including design review standards, in effect at the time that the housing development project's application is determined to be complete, but the local agency proposes to disapprove the project or to approve it upon the condition that the project be developed at a lower density, the local agency shall bee its decision regarding the proposed tousing development project upon written findings supported by substantial evidence on the record that both of the following conditions exist:

(1) The housing development project would have a specific, adverse impact upon the public health or safety unless the project is disapproved or approved upon the condition that the project be developed at a lower density. As used in this paragraph, a "specific, adverse impact" means a significant, quantifiable, direct, and unavoidable impact, based or objective, identified written public health or safety standards, publicles, or conditions as they existed on the date the application was deemed complete.

(2) There is no reasible method to satisfactorily intugate or avoid the adverse impact, identified pursuant to paragraph (1), other than the disapproval of the bousing development project or the approval of the project upon the condition that it be developed at a lower density.

...

(4) For purposes of this section, a proposed housing development project is not inconsistent with the applicable zoning standards and criteria, and shall not require a rezoning, if the housing development project is consistent with the objective general plan standards and criteria but the zoning for the project site is inconsistent with the general plan. If the local agency has compiled with paragraph (3), the local agency may require the proposed housing development project to comply with the objective standards and criteria of the zoning which is consistent with the general plan, however, the standards and criteria shall be applied to facilitate and accommodate development at the density allowed on the site by the general plan and proposed by the proposed housing development project.

The applicant proposes to demolish three existing buildings and construct a mixed use building up to 13-stories on O'Farrell and Shannon Streets and up to 4-stories on Jones Street. The project is now proposed to include 302 group housing rooms with a total of 316 beds.

The above captioned proposal is zoning compliant and general plan compliant, therefore, your local agency must approve the application, or else make findings to the effect that the proposed project would have an adverse impact on public health and safety, as described above.

I am signing this letter both in my capacity as the Executive Director of YIMBY Law, and as a resident of California who is affected by the shortage of housing in our state.

Dear Board of Supervisors and Planning Commission,

I am writing to support and urge you to adhere to the decision approving the building project located on O'Farrell Street sponsored by Fifth Church of Christ Scientist, "450 O'Farrell Church and Essential Housing Project". I served for many years as the Vice President of the Executive Board at Fifth Church where I was responsible to review the proposals, plans, contracts, designs, financing and other documents for this project. This was during 20 years as a member. I attended public meetings held by the Planning Commission and on-line recent hearing.

As the project has already been approved and this approval has now been contested I am giving you my informed and experienced input. There has been ample, if not excessive, opportunity for the community to modify, agree with, provide recommendations, study, approve, refute etc. the various solutions and modifications and compromises made by the church to the plans over approximately 30 years. The Tenderloin has languished in degradation, danger, drug dealing etc. It is desperate for solutions. We must move on now to innovative solutions.

Affordable housing and need for relief from the conditions in the Tenderloin is clear. The approved plan (which incorporates neighborhood recommendations) will benefit seniors and San Francisco minimum/lower wage households and, so importantly, parents who can take advantage of the new grade school and cultural resources of our beautiful city. Many of these families have both parents working in the City. These workers are spending precious time commuting long distances often on multiple public transports. The cost of BART, MUNI, Ferry and East Bay buses devour from 10% to 20% of a day's pay. One-way BART Dublin to Civic Center is \$7.10 per adult, \$3.30 per child over 5 or, two-way, \$20.80 - for five days about a weeks cost for food. What time is left over for help with homework? Family time? Rest?

An important consideration is that many of the different cultures of workers have lifestyles with strong social traditions of family and community and who use and welcome communal kitchens, venues and gathering rooms to celebrate and get together. This will provide needed company and enrichment opportunities for senior people who are alone. We see so many large groups having a great time cooking and playing in parks all the time.

The sizes of the apartments are enough to feed and care for individuals and families in privacy and safety. San Francisco should be at the forefront of housing innovation. I have seen <u>every</u> objection over the years, Frankly this transformative project should be welcomed and embraced. Not everyone will ever be satisfied and it is time to act. PLEASE maintain the approval. It is time. It is needed. It will help so many.

A Tenderloin church wants to add more housing to the area. Critics say it isn't the right type of housing

Christian Science officials warned the San Francisco Board of Supervisors that it would be violating the religious institution's civil rights if it fails to approve a Tenderloin development that would include a new church as well as a contentious market-rate group housing development.

At a Tuesday board meeting, Ela Strong, president of the board of the Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist, said that upholding an appeal of a proposed development at 450 O'Farrell St. would "violate our civil rights under the Constitution."

"Our right to be able to engage in religious exercise is at stake here," Strong said. "We cannot meet our religious needs in our current building. The proposed new church facility is essential for us."

The comments came during an appeal of approved plans to construct a 13-story group housing complex, which would include 316 new dwelling units, a new church and ground-level space for a Christian Science reading room. The builder, Forge Development Partners, took the project over from a previous developer, who had won approvals to build 176 conventional apartments. Forge is partnering with the church on the development. The Planning Commission approved the project in June.

The project would produce 316 space-efficient studio units for households earning between \$26,000 to \$115,000 per year. The group home units would not have full kitchens, instead offering two-burner stoves, a microwave and minifridge. There would be a communal kitchen for residents wishing to use an oven.

The Board of Supervisors didn't vote on the appeal, instead continuing it until its Oct. 5 meeting.

The project is being appealed by Tenderloin Housing Clinic, which argues that the neighborhood, which has the largest concentration of residential hotel units in the United States, does not need more 350-square-foot micro-units, but instead is badly in need of larger apartments for low-income families currently jammed into tiny spaces.

Critics say the group housing developers are exploiting a loophole in the planning code that allows what likely will be temporary corporate housing — micro-units lacking full kitchens — to be classified as permanent housing. The building will have 632 beds, with units ranging from 320 to 850 square feet.

Pratibha Tekkey, director of community organizing for the Tenderloin Housing Clinic, said the previous approval would have brought "much-needed family housing" to the neighborhood. Tenderloin resident David Elliot Lewis said the idea of micro-units and shared kitchens might have made sense prior to the pandemic, but no longer.

"We live in the age of respiratory illness," he said. "It's the wrong design for our era."

Longtime Tenderloin resident Karen Taylor called the proposed building "a warehouse for people" and said that the switch from larger units to group housing was "a bait and switch."

"The last thing the Tenderloin neighborhood needs right now is market-rate group housing," said Sara Shortt, director of Public Policy & Community Organizing for HomeRise, an affordable housing group. "We need permanent housing in the neighborhood to allow families to build roots and create community."

Forge contends that the current calculus of construction costs and rents makes a conventional building there impossible and that the previous builder, Trammell Crow, abandoned the project because the economics didn't work.

A 1,200-square-foot unit would cost \$1.2 million to build and would have to bring in about \$7,500 a month in rent in order to make money— about double what a two-bedroom unit in the Tenderloin currently rents for, said Forge founding partner Richard Hannum. In contrast, the average unit at the Forge project would be \$3,500 a month.

"In the end our goal is to create housing that people can afford to live in, and to build the church," said Hannum.

While Tuesday's appeal hearing was focused on whether the planning commission had acted properly in approving the project, the discussion veered into a debate on the condition of the O'Farrell Street block in question, between Taylor and Jones.

Strong said the addition of as many as 632 residents in the new building would bring positive activity to a block that has been plagued by drug dealing and other illegal activity, which she said has "resulted in a significant reduction in church attendance."

"Regularly there is drug use and violence in front of the church. Tent encampments often block the front and side entrances. This limits access to the church by those wishing to enter it," she said. "Garbage, human excrement and hypodermic needles must be cleaned up by the church daily. Sometimes several times a day."

Supervisor Matt Haney, who represents the Tenderloin, took issue with the way Strong characterized the street.

"You might want to think about how people experience those words, and how you can create love and respect," he said, adding that the church should aspire to bring "healing and compassion for everyone in the neighborhood, including people who may be on your block and who may need your help."

Proponents of the O'Farrell project point out that the property is one of dozens of underutilized church-owned lots that could be redeveloped for housing, and that other religious institutions may be put off if the Board of Supervisors upholds the appeal, torpedoing the project.

In a letter to the board, Michael Pappas, who heads the San Francisco Interfaith Council, said "the religious community will be watching" what happens with the vote and that the result will give "a clear indication of the sincerity of the city's goal of re-purposing religious properties."

Corey Smith of the Housing Action Coalition said that rejecting the project would send the wrong message to other religious institutions.

"I worry the city is going to lose out on the ability to build housing of all types on congregation land," he said.

Legislative changes likely for group housing as Tenderloin appeal looms

If the number of delays a San Francisco development project endures in a single year were a competition, the developers seeking to transform an aging Tenderloin church into a group housing complex at 450 O'Farrell St. would have already taken home a medal

Votes on the 316-unit project were continued five times this year by the San Francisco Planning Commission, which finally — and with some reluctance — approved it 4-2 in June. The approval came with conditions that the developer provide more group housing rooms greater than 500 square feet and improve amenities.

But the commission's approval was quickly appealed by neighborhood groups and affordable housing developers taking issue with the small units, which they said did not respond to community needs. The appeal sent the project to the Board of Supervisors for additional scrutiny on Sept. 8 — but that hearing was again delayed.

On Tuesday, the board finally took up the appeal, and after much deliberation that included calls for changes to city code that would more effectively guide the construction

of group housing, voted to continue the hearing once more. The project's fate will now be decided Oct. 5, allegedly.

The saga of 450 O'Farrell includes many twists and turns and dissection of the planning code, hitting a nerve in the debate of how to build housing equitably in a city that remains unaffordable to many of its residents.

Here's the gist: In January, Forge Development Partners shifted from an alreadyauthorized, 176-unit housing project with traditionally sized units at the site — approval of which was a four-year journey that also was <u>marked by controversy</u> and ended with a <u>previous developer shelling out \$1.5 million</u> to quiet opponents before ditching the project.

When Forge partnered with the Fifth Church of Christ Scientist to move the site's redevelopment along, it pitched plans for what ultimately morphed into a 316-unit group housing project with up to 632 beds and construction of a replacement church. Forge and the church said previously that the change to the smaller units was made to provide more affordable housing to middle-income households in the working-class neighborhood. This type of housing is also more affordable to build.

To the chagrin of the project's opponents, Forge's project was able to retain the 13.5% affordability rate of the original project that was approved in 2018, rather than having to provide 25% of its units at affordable rate in accordance with current law.

San Francisco Planner Carly Grob explained Tuesday that the onsite affordability of a project is "dictated by the point at which the project files an environmental evaluation application."

Because the group housing project was "found to be in substantial conformity with the project that was approved in 2018 and did not require a new environmental evaluation, it was able to retain the 13.5% on-site rate, which was grandfathered," she said. Grob said the residential use and project massing did not change, so it did not have to seek a new environmental impact analysis even though the number of units nearly doubled. Additional environmental review would have had implications for the affordability rate, said Grob.

The changes were not welcomed by the community, which rejected the idea of group housing in a neighborhood grappling with a list of socio-economic challenges and is already home to a majority of the city's single-room occupancy hotels. The project's opponents at one point requested that Forge include 35 units at 1,000 square feet.

That brings us to the heart of that issue surrounding 450 O'Farrell — the definition of group housing, or lack thereof.

As planning officials and supervisors concluded at Tuesday's hearing, the lines between group housing and regular dwelling units are blurred. Grob confirmed that there are "no

size maximums for group housing rooms and the minimums would be dictated by the building code."

Forge's Richard Hannum said Tuesday that his team has worked with the Planning Department for months to "provide units that are substantially larger" and confirmed that they were told that the "new upper limit, as defined by Planning, is 850 square feet per unit" to qualify as group housing. Forge's project features units between 350 and 600 square feet in size.

A 2005 interpretation by the city's then-zoning administrator found that the distinction between group housing and a normal dwelling unit hinges on its kitchen; group housing does not require a full kitchen in each unit.

Group housing is prohibited at market-rate levels in certain areas of the city, including Central SoMa. In the Tenderloin, however, zoning allows a density of one group housing room for every 70 square feet of lot area without requiring public review.

Supervisor Aaron Peskin on Tuesday called the department's determination in regard to 450 O'Farrell a "line call" and said that the interpretation of what constitutes group housing "has been stretched and stretched again and in this case arguably stretched to the limit."

The discussion over 450 O'Farrell and recent proliferation of group housing proposals in the Tenderloin and other parts of the city has led city leaders to take closer look at current guidelines and how group housing is defined.

"One of the central issues raised in recent discussions of group housing projects is the physical similarity between, A, typical group housing rooms and, B, conventional dwelling units. Whether this should be addressed, particularly vis-à-vis architecture and amenities, and if so how, would likely be a point of focus in any future legislation," said Dan Sider, the Planning Department's chief of staff.

Sider added that the department has done some "good analysis" on the topic.

"We've also had some interest in the topic from our electeds," he said. "I imagine that once 450 O'Farrell is adjudicated we will see a push toward legislative changes."

San Francisco Interfaith Council Executive Director Michael Pappas noted, "Seven years ago, the San Francisco Interfaith Council (SFIC)

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



New Tenderloin housing

The San Francisco Planning Commission recently approved a housing project at 450 O'Farrell St sponsored by the Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist. The project includes 316 apartments with private bathrooms and modern cooking facilities, a new Church building, and a street-level neighborhood reading room open to the public during the week. The Church's partner for the approved project is Forge Development Partners LLC. It is anticipated that project construction will begin in the fourth quarter of 2021. (The Registry)

New East Bay Costco

Plans for a new Costco warehouse as well as a housing and retail development envisioned at the current NewPark Mall will head to the Newark City Council for possible final approval in July. A nearly 162,000-square-foot Costco is planned to go up on a roughly 11-acre portion of the NewPark Mall site to help take pressure off of a nearby Fremont location and another in southern Hayward. Two large two-story buildings on the southeastern side of the mall — the previous sites of the 120,000-square-foot JCPenney, and the 87,000-square-foot Burlington and Mervyn's — would both be demolished to make way for the warehouse. Cannabis grew during pandemic

San Francisco's cannabis industry saw a lot of new growth during the pandemic as the city's Office of Cannabis approved more permits for cannabis-related businesses in 2020 than in any previous year. While other businesses were forced to close, at least 10 cannabis retail shops opened in the city last year. In the summer of 2018, the office began accepting applications and by the end of 2019, it had issued their first two permits. Tenderloin microunit project finally wins approval amid calls for tighter group housing regulations

A Tenderloin group housing project that was revised three times and delayed half a dozen times won San Francisco Planning Commission approval Thursday — but not without several commissioners calling for tighter regulations on group housing construction in the city.

The commission with a 4-2 vote authorized the conversion of a previously approved 176-unit, traditional residential project at the site of the Fifth Church of Christ,

Scientist at 450 O'Farrell St. into 316 much-smaller-sized group housing units. The project, which still needs approval of the full Board of Supervisors, was approved on the condition that the developer convert its ground floor retail space into group housing and also analyzes such a conversion for the building's basement, among other things.

The commission's approval came despite several commissioners pushing for another continuance, with some recommending that the city's Board of Supervisors consider making legislative changes to current code that regulates group housing projects, proposals for which have increased throughout the city in recent years.

"From a policy perspective I have a number of concerns about how we are using group housing versus residential housing," said Commissioner Sue Diamond, who at a previous hearing on the project cited the lack of kitchen access in group housing units as a concern.

Group housing differs from traditional dwelling units in that it does not require a full kitchen in each unit. This type of housing is prohibited at market-rate levels in certain areas of the city, including Central SoMa. In the Tenderloin, however, current zoning allows a density of one group housing room for every 70 square feet of lot area without requiring public review.

The 450 O'Farrell project represents the years-long effort by the church, working with Forge Development, to redevelop its underutilized land into housing and build a new church facility on its property.

Forge CEO Richard Hannum said his team responded to feedback from the commission and the community by adding three communal kitchens to the project, as well as expanding amenity spaces, among other things. The project's unit count was also increased from a previous proposal that called for 302 units.

"I am not very happy about the fact that the changes to this project resulted in many more units with much less open space than the original version, all of which is permissible by changing from residential to group housing," said Diamond. "I do believe from a policy perspective that our legislature, the Board of Supervisors, should be looking at the issue of ... how much group housing do we want, what's the appropriate open space ratio, where group housing should be located and where it shouldn't be located."

The version of the project approved on Thursday features group housing rooms between 350 and 600 square feet. Building larger units would compromise the financial feasibility, the developer has

Tenderloin microunit project finally wins approval amid calls for tighter group housing regulations - San Francisco Business Times said. As a result of the delayed hearings the cost of the project will be about \$1,200 per square foot for the 218,155-square-foot project, said Hannum.

Hannum told me previously that the switch from a 176-unit residential project to group housing was made to keep down construction costs and provide more affordable housing to the Tenderloin community. Single-room occupancy hotel housing in the city is typically priced at 75% of the cost of renting a market-rate studio, and Hannum said that rents for his project would vary range from \$962 for a studio to \$1,373 for a three-bedroom group housing unit — although a city planner on Thursday pointed out that these prices are not yet set in stone.

For the past year-and-a-half, the project has drawn the ire of Tenderloin community groups and residents, who argued that the modified proposal failed to address a dire need for family housing in the neighborhood, which is already saturated with single room occupancy hotels.

"Tenderloin residents are concerned about the increasing number of group housing projects being proposed in the neighborhood. Group housing are housing units with mini kitchens, not full kitchens in each unit, and shared community kitchens. In the case of this project, three community kitchens would be shared by 600 residents," said Colleen Rivecca, director of Community Organizing, Policy & Planning for the Tenderloin Community Development Corp.

"Residents of Tenderloin feel this project does not meet the needs of the community, especially those of working families, and will only replicate the status quo of overcrowding in the Tenderloin and inadequate kitchen facilities in homes of Tenderloin residents," she added.

Commissioner Kathrin Moore, who opposed the project, said that her concerns are not about "architecture, but about fundamental policy."

"When a project comes back with this extreme measure of change I believe a policy discussion has to be proceeding with decisions which put further group housing in the Tenderloin, of which there

were three more recently approved projects in (the city)," said Moore. "The Tenderloin has never been given the opportunity to fully mature as a full-fledged community with appropriate housing for the people who live there. Family housing I think needs a discussion – 600 square feet are allocated for four people to live in. That just doesn't work."

Tenderloin group housing project delayed—again—amid more calls for revised guidelines

A group housing project proposed at the site of a Tenderloin church sparked a lengthy discussion on the need for updated guidelines governing such microunit projects at a San Francisco Planning Commission hearing Thursday.

Years in the making, the project at 450 O'Farrell St. has taken many shapes — the latest iteration proposes 316 group housing rooms with a maximum of 632 beds, along with a new church. The site was originally permitted in 2018 for 176 units, but its developers pivoted on those plans early this year by seeking approval for a group housing project targeting middle-income households instead.

A vote on the change was delayed Thursday for a third time this year to June 10. The proposal was first slated to come before the commission in January With 302 group housing units ranging from 350 to 600 square feet, but it was modified last month to feature larger units with more beds in response to neighborhood opposition.

Some members of the community and several commissioners called on the Planning Department to take a closer look at current guidelines and the definition of group housing.

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Group housing differs from traditional dwelling units in that it does not require a full kitchen in each unit. This type of housing is prohibited at market-rate levels in certain areas of the city, including Central SoMa. In the Tenderloin, however, current zoning allows a density of one group housing room for every 70 square feet of lot area without requiring public review.

Forge Development, which is developing the 450 O'Farrell site in partnership with the Fifth Church of Christ, Scientist, said that along with partial kitchens in each unit the plan is to provide a communal kitchen as an amenity. That did not sit. well with Commissioner Sue Diamond.

"I cannot conceive of approving a project for 600 people that only has one cooking facility. We need to make sure that if we are providing these smaller units that they are useful to the broader population," said Diamond, adding that she feels the group housing definition "generally needs some updating."

site at 450 D'Ennell St. Since 2010, 24 buildings with 775 group housing rooms have been completed or are in the pipeline, according to planning staff, though many more have been proposed in recent months. On Thursday, the commission considered another Tenderloin group housing project on Turk Street. That project was also continued at the behest of the district's supervisor, Matt Haney.

Forge CEO Richard Hannum told me previously that the switch from regular dwelling units to group housing was made to provide more affordable housing. This housing type is also more affordable to build.

"The church is requesting approval for change from luxury units to innovative workforce housing. Building housing on underutilized land that working families can

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afford has been at the heart of our mission statement for the project," said Ella Strong, president of the church's board. "It will benefit the local community and enable the church to engage in religious exercise, which it is unable to do in its current structure."

Tenderloin residents and several community groups and affordable developers, however, have organized in opposition in recent months to what they describe as being market-rate units in comparison to the neighborhood's plethors of single-room occupancy hotels, which historically have served as truly affordable housing for low-income San Franciscans. They said that the proposed project perpetuates overcrowding in Tenderloin households and comes at price points not affordable to current residents.

"Additional market-rate group housing is not what the community needs," said Gabriela Ruiz of the Tenderloin Neighborhood Development Corp. "We would like to see a pause on market rate group housing in the Tenderloin in the future."

Others, however, argued that more housing is needed in the community and that the church is setting an example for other congregations by actively attempting to develop its excess land into housing.

"The core problem is that we don't have enough homes for the number of people who want to live in San Francisco, so adding housing at all income levels is important. We have a proposal that will provide middle-income housing because of its design with no subsidies, that's a win-win," said Corey Smith. "This project started a conversation around an opportunity to build new homes on congregation land around the city."

Development group changes course at housing project to replace church

The second attempt at replacing the Fifth Church of Christ Scientist at 450 O'Farrell St. could result in 300 group housing units.

Forge Development Partners won approval in 2018 to build 176 luxury units, a ground-floor retail or restaurant space and a replacement church at the Tenderloin site — but has since had a change of heart.

The developer is now seeking a conditional use approval from the San Francisco Planning Commission to build group housing instead. A hearing on the proposed change scheduled for Thursday has been postponed to March 11.

"We realized that the project which was approved, which was the best we could do at the time, didn't really meet the needs of the neighborhood and didn't fulfill the mission of the church, which is to provide well designed housing that working

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Group nousing proposed in SoMA and Tenderion - San Francisco Business Times households can afford," David Murray, a representative of the Fifth Church of Christ Scientist, told me on Thursday.

The proposal to demolish the 1923 church touched off a fierce battle with preservationists, but San Francisco Heritage, which was spearheading the effort to block the demolition, ultimately withdrew its objection.

The church began working with Forge after another developer originally selected to build the project dropped out. The new partners re-imagined the proposal into something more affordable in a neighborhood that has historically been one of the city's last enclaves of low-cost housing.

The development team said it is now targeting essential workers, or the "missing middle," rather than wealthier renters.

Forge's revised project includes the demolition of three buildings: the 26,904-square-foot church and a 1,400-square-foot parking at 450 O'Farrell St.; a one-story, 4,415-square-foot vacant retail building at 474 O'Farrell St.; and a one-story, 1,012-square-foot restaurant and residential building at 532 Jones St.

With the city's approval, Forge would then build a 13-story mixeduse building with 302 group housing rooms ranging from 350 to 600 square feet each, a 10,181 square-foot church and open space. The overall budget for the project is \$150 million.

Forge founder Richard Hannum said his team and the church are working to increase the project's overall affordability. While the original propsal called for 28 of the total units to be affordable, the current plan is to set aside 60 units to be rented at below market rates.

In another group housing proposal, San Francisco-based Carmel Pertners on Tuesday filed a new proposal with the city's Planning Department seeking approval to construct a seven story project with 238 rooms in the South of Market neighborhood.

The rooms, envisioned to be located on the second to seventh floors of the building, would span an average 400 square feet, although 12 are proposed at 350 square feet. A lobby and amenity space would be located on the ground floor.

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Group housing proposed in SoMA and Tenderson - San Francisco Austriass Times

The project calls for the demolition of a 13,000-square-foot warehouse and a 7,000-square-foot parking lot currently located at 925 Bryant St. The project features common kitchens and living areas, and Carmel Partners is proposing an outdoor, common open space in the form of a 5,597-square-foot roof deck.

Carmel Partners, which did not respond to a request for comment on Thursday, is requesting a state density bonus of 46.25% — the state program allows developers to increase the overall number of housing units at a site in exchange for including more affordable housing in a proposed project.

To achieve that bonus, 14% of the project's units must be made available at 50% of the area median income, or at the very-low-income level. The project also proposes to provide 4.5% of the units at low income and 4.5% at moderate income levels.

Activists seek new guidelines to cover group housing in San Francisco

Affordable housing providers and community groups want the city to temporarily halt approvals of group housing projects in the Tenderloin and other parts of San Francisco, saying new guidelines for such projects are needed.

The Tenderloin Neighborhood

Development Corp. and other groups have successfully delayed hearings on two projects scheduled to go before the Planning Commission. The projects together represent more than 400 units.

Opponents want to send the developers back to the drawing board, contending the projects fall short of meeting the needs of likely residents at an affordable price, and want regulations or legislation to ensure all group housing projects are equitable. Other groups joining the drive are the Community Housing Partnership, Senior Disability Action and the Glide Foundation.

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"We just need a pause to understand this idea that so much is driven by financial dynamics regarding what gets built and to what extent it serves the Tenderloin community," TNDG Director Don Falk told me.

Other group housing projects have been proposed in recent months, including a seven-story project with 238 rooms in the South of Market neighborhood and a 225-bed project in the Mission District.

The chief of staff to Supervisor Matt Haney, whose District 6 includes the Tenderloin, said Haney's office has met with all of the stakeholders to discuss the concerns but declined to comment on what course of action the supervisor will take.

One of the sticking points for the opponents is the size of proposed units. They are seeking larger units to reduce crowding. Group housing rooms do not contain full kitchens, and in the Tenderloin, current zoning allows a density of one group housing room for every 70 square feet of lot area.

"Residents have expressed concerns around the size of the group housing units, replicating a lot of the overcrowding that already exists in the Tenderloin and the real need for more affordable housing," said Gabby Ruiz, policy and planning manager at TNDC.

The two projects whose hearings before the commission have already been delayed are: a 101-unit group housing project at 468 Turk St., and a 303-unit project set to replace the Fifth Church of Christ Scientist at 450 O'Farrell St.

The Fifth Church of Christ Scientist project has already been delayed four times at the request of TNDC and the Tenderloin Housing Clinic, prompting developer Forge to agree to make changes.

Forge originally won approval for a 176-unit apartment building with units between 700 and 1,000 square feet but last year pivoted on those plans, opting to build group housing instead to ensure that the project pencils out and to provide more affordable housing to the community, according to David Murray,

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a representative of the Fifth Church of Christ Scientist. The reasoning: While the original project would provide 28 affordable units, the group housing project would provide 60 below marketrate rooms.

Forge Founder Richard Hannum told me Thursday the project's design is being re-worked after the developers received clarification from Planning Department's zoning administrator regarding how big the units could be to still qualify as group housing. They will now be 600 square feet, up from 350, and 317 units are planned.

Brett Gladstone, a land-use attorney representing 468 Turk St.'s developers — the owners of a nearby Tenderloin bar — said that the lot was purchased "at the top of the market in 2018" and due to high construction costs and the small size of the lot, the project's feasibility hinges on revenue from a greater number of rental units.

The project proposes group housing units that are on average 250 square feet.

"To get a maximum number of units and thus make it pencil, we have to make the smallest possible units," Gladstone said, adding that current zoning "allows units as small as what we were doing."

It is unclear if the developers of 468 Turk St. plan to reconfigure their proposal to win opponents' blessing. Gladstone said the team agreed to delay the approval hearing to conduct further community engagement.

He noted that the project is providing 25% of its proposed units as affordable, with 10 units offered at 50% of the area median income — a requirement of the city's Inclusionary Affordable Housing Program and the state Density Bonus Law, which the developers are invoking to increase the nine-story building's density.

But the project's detractors said in a March 23 letter that "developing housing is more than designing a structure that is financially feasible and then building it and collecting rent. A housing development proposal is a proposal by a developer to be

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an ongoing part of a neighborhood."

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
