[Accept and Expend Grant - Department of Public Works - \$417,339]

Resolution authorizing the Department of Public Works (DPW) to apply for, accept and expend \$417,339 in federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) Transportation Enhancement funds for the Corbin Place Stair Replacement Project.

WHEREAS, Metropolitan Transportation Commission (MTC), the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) for the nine counties of the San Francisco Bay region, has made \$417,339 in cost savings from the federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (ARRA) available for reprogramming; and

WHEREAS, These funds are designated for Transportation Enhancement projects such as pedestrian and bicycle facilities; and

WHEREAS, The ARRA funds will cover 100 percent of eligible costs as defined by the Federal Highway Administration and administered by Caltrans; and,

WHEREAS, The Department of Public Works (DPW) has designed a pedestrian facility project, the Corbin Place Stair Replacement, that is estimated to cost \$450,000, and that is ready to meet the deadlines for timely use of ARRA funds; and

WHEREAS, DPW plans to use proceeds from Certificates of Participation to fund the remaining \$32,661 cost of the Corbin Place Stair Replacement project; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to ARRA, and any regulations and/or guidance promulgated thereunder, eligible project sponsors wishing to receive ARRA funds for a project shall submit an application first with the appropriate MPO, for review and inclusion in the MPO's Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); and

WHEREAS, DPW is an eligible project sponsor for ARRA funds; and

WHEREAS, MTC requires a resolution adopted by the responsible implementing agency stating that:

- DPW understands that the ARRA funding is fixed at the programmed amount, and therefore any cost increase cannot be expected to be funded with additional ARRA or other MTC-programmed funds; and
- 2. The Corbin Place Stair Replacement project will comply with the procedures specified in MTC's Regional Project Funding Delivery Policy (MTC Resolution No. 3606, revised) and with all project-specific requirements as set forth in MTC's Regional ARRA Program (MTC Resolutions Nos. 3885 and 3896); and the Corbin Place Stair Replacement project will be implemented as described in the application, and, if approved, as included in MTC's TIP; and
- The Corbin Place Stair Replacement project will comply with all the project-specific requirements as set forth in the federal ARRA and appropriate applicable regulations or guidance;

now, therefore be it

RESOLVED, That DPW is authorized to execute and file an application for funding under the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 for Transportation Enhancement funds for the Corbin Place Stair Replacement project; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That DPW understands that the ARRA funding for the project is fixed at the MTC approved programmed amount, and that any cost increases must be funded by DPW from other funds, and that DPW does not expect any cost increases to be funded with additional ARRA or MTC-programmed funds; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That DPW understands the funding deadlines associated with these funds and will comply with the applicable provisions and requirements of the Regional ARRA Program (MTC Resolution Nos. 3885 and 3896) and Regional Project Funding Delivery

The project is located at Corbin Place Stair between 17th Street and Corbett Street. The proposed project includes reconstruction of the existing stairway, handrails, and adjacent retaining walls. The total length of the replacement stairway is approximately 57 feet. The limit of the stair work is limited to the stair width plus stair curb (approx. 8 foot in width). The work limit also includes replacement of four 23 foot long retaining walls on both end of the stairway and is located on 17th street and Corbett Street sidewalk. The dimension of the retaining wall is 3 foot tall and 1 foot wide. The project limit will be within the public right of way and will not alter the existing alignment of the stairway and adjacent streets. Removable fencing would be placed at the project entrances to prevent unwanted pedestrian trespassing.

NEED AND PURPOSE (Describe how is project above and beyond a standard transportation project)

The Corbin Place Stair Replacement Project is an enhancement project above and beyond a standard transportation project. The proposed project would replace the ageing and severely damaged concrete stairway, handrails, and adjacent retaining walls. The proposed project would enhance the conditions of the stairway and sidewalk and will serve to improve pedestrians' safety. The project would include upgrading the stair structure and handrail for compliance with ADA requirements.

RELATIONSHIP (TE projects must have a relationship to surface transportation; describe relation to surface transportation)

Proposed project has a direct relationship to the surface transportation system. Corbin Place Stair is a frequently traveled stairway for pedestrian to travel and is providing a short and direct passage for pedestrians to access between 17th street and Corbett Avenue which allows pedestrian to travel in a more efficient manner. The stairway is open to the general public and serves a transportation need for the general public.





For TE projects proposed for funding from American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009

Assembly Bill X3-20 added Sections 2420-2423 to the Streets and Highways Code which requires that transportation projects proposed for transportation enhancement activities using federal funds provided specifically by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 be programmed and allocated based on the following priorities:

- (1) In programming and allocating these funds, the department and the metropolitan planning organizations, county transportation commissions, and regional transportation agencies shall give priority to the sponsors of eligible projects that partner with, or commit to employ the services of, a Community Conservation Corps or the California Conservation Corps to construct or undertake the project, provided those projects meet the requirements of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
- (2) After all eligible projects have been selected pursuant to paragraph (1), the department and the metropolitan planning organizations, county transportation commissions, and regional transportation agencies shall next give priority to projects that provide facilities for pedestrians and bicyclists, provided those projects meet the requirements of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.
- (3) After all eligible projects have been selected pursuant to paragraph (2), the department and the metropolitan planning organizations, county transportation commissions, and regional transportation agencies may fund any project eligible in accordance with paragraph (35) of subdivision (a) of Section 101 of Title 23 of the United States Code.

For projects proposed for funding with all federal TE funds

Senate Bill 286 (Chapter 373, Statutes of 2008) added Sections 2370-2374 to the Streets and Highways Code which requires the selection of all TE projects to be based on projects which partner with, or commit to employ the services of a Community Conservation Corps or the California Conservation Corps. The department, in consultation with Community Conservation Corps, the California Conservation Corps, the commission, regional transportation planning agencies, county transportation commissions or authorities, and congestion management agencies, developed the following criteria that give priority in the selection of TE projects. The information below is provided to project sponsors to assist them in understanding how projects will be selected. Regional transportation planning agencies, county transportation commissions or authorities, and congestion management agencies, when selecting candidates for transportation enhancement projects, shall utilize the selection criteria below.

The RTPAs are required to use the following criteria in prioritizing and selecting TE projects for programming in the Regional Transportation Improvement Programs (RTIP):

- (1) TE eligible projects whose sponsor is partnering with, or has agreed to employ the services of a Community Conservation Corps or the California Conservation Corps (collectively referred to as corps), shall be selected first for funding (the scope of the work performed by the corps will be identified in page 6 of the TE application);
- (2) After all TE eligible projects described in paragraph (1) have been selected for funding; the remaining eligible TE projects may be selected.

TE Project candidates that meet the following specific categories are exempt from the above selection criteria and may compete on an equal basis with all project candidates in category (1) above:

- (a) Projects that have been selected and programmed in a RTIP prior to June 25, 2009.
- (b) Projects for which no corps will partner with the sponsor or agree to provide services. A project sponsor can request this exemption only by certifying on the TE Application, with the concurrence of the California Conservation Corps and the California Association of Local Conservation Corps, which the sponsor notified both organizations about the available project, but that no corps in the state was prepared to serve as a partner or provide services.

The department, regional transportation planning agencies, county transportation commissions or authorities, or congestion management agencies shall be authorized to enter into cooperative agreements, grant agreements, or procurement contracts with Community Conservation Corps pursuant to the simplified contract requirements authorized by Section 18.36(j) of Title 49 of the Code of Federal Regulations in order to enable community conservation corps to utilize transportation enhancement project funds.

Section 2370(a) of the Streets and Highways Code is specific as to which organizations can be considered as a Community Conservation Corps or the California Conservation Corps. "Community Conservation Corps" shall have the same meaning as defined in Section 14507.5 of the Public Resources Code. 
