[Budget and Legislative Analyst Review of Aging in Place Practices and Resources]

Motion directing the Budget and Legislative Analyst to conduct a review of practices and resources that might enable aging adults in the City and County of San Francisco to live in their homes and communities independently. Specific areas of review may include: (1) determining the approximate number of seniors on affordable housing and public housing waitlists in San Francisco; (2) collecting and summarizing demographic information about seniors in San Francisco; (3) reviewing independent living programs and models including shared housing programs, cross-generational aging in place programs, volunteer health advocacy programs, and the non-profit retirement villages model; and (4) providing legislative recommendations for incentives that encourage property owners to make residential upgrades that increase accessibility and safety.

WHEREAS, The U.S. Census estimates that the senior population in San Francisco was 160,169 in 2008, or approximately 20% of the City's population of 798,196; and

WHEREAS, The California Department of Finance projects that the number of seniors in San Francisco will increase by 90,551, or 56.5, percent from 160,169 to 250,720 by 2030; and

WHEREAS, The San Francisco Human Services Agency's Department of Aging and Adult Services reports that the majority of San Francisco seniors reside in older apartments and houses that may not meet their safety and accessibility needs; and

WHEREAS, The number of assisted living facilities and programs in San Francisco that provide publically subsidized home modification services to address seniors' needs is small

relative to the total senior population, and such assisted living facilities and programs are not anticipated to expand in the near future; now, therefore, be it

MOVED, That the Budget and Legislative Analyst is hereby directed to conduct a review of practices and resources that might enable aging adults in the City and County of San Francisco to live in their homes and communities independently, and to provide legislative recommendations for incentives that would encourage property owners to make residential upgrades that increase accessibility and safety.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Legislative Objectives

<u>File 10-0939:</u> Motion directing the Budget and Legislative Analyst to conduct a special project to review Aging in Place Practices and Resources.

Fiscal Impact

The existing FY 2010-11 appropriation for Budget and Legislative Analyst services would cover the costs of the proposed project. Therefore, there would be no additional costs to the City.

Key Points

To implement the proposed project, the Budget and Legislative Analyst would:

- Determine the approximate number of aging adults on affordable housing and public housing waitlists in San Francisco.
- Collect and summarize demographic information about aging adults in San Francisco.
- Review independent living programs and models including shared housing programs, cross-generational aging in place programs, volunteer health advocacy programs, and the non-profit retirement village model.
- Provide legislative recommendations for incentives that encourage property owners to make residential upgrades that increase accessibility and safety for aging adults.

The Budget and Legislative Analyst estimates that the proposed project would require approximately 255 service hours. The Budget and Legislative Analyst has sufficient performance audit and project service hours to complete this and other performance audits and projects previously approved by the Board of Supervisors or pending before the Government Audit and Oversight Committee.

Recommendation

Approval of the proposed motion is a policy matter for the Board of Supervisors.

BACKGROUND

The Budget and Legislative Analyst provides performance audit and project services to the Board of Supervisors. The Agreement between the Budget and Legislative Analyst Joint Venture Partnership and the Board of Supervisors defines the Budget and Legislative Analyst scope of services and requires that the Budget and Legislative Analyst submit an annual work plan estimating the allocation of staff hours for each service category and major project for input, review and approval by the Board of Supervisors.

The Board of Supervisors approved the Budget and Legislative Analyst work plan for 2010 on February 23, 2010 (File 10-0148), allocating approximately 4,450 service hours for performance audits and special projects.

DETAILS OF PROPOSED LEGISLATION

The proposed motion would direct the Budget and Legislative Analyst to conduct a special project to review practices and resources that might enable aging adults in the City and County of San Francisco to live in their homes and communities independently.

To implement the proposed project, the Budget and Legislative Analyst would:

- Determine the approximate number of aging adults on affordable housing and public housing waitlists in San Francisco.
- Collect and summarize demographic information about aging adults in San Francisco, including identifying average income level, neighborhoods where aging adults live, languages spoken by aging adults, and race/ethnicity of aging adults, as well as providing a comparison of aging adult populations in San Francisco versus in other California cities.
- Review independent living programs and models including shared housing programs, cross-generational aging in place programs, volunteer health advocacy programs, and the non-profit retirement village model.
- Identify best practices in shared housing programs, cross-generational aging in place programs, and the non-profit retirement village model.
- Provide legislative recommendations for incentives that encourage property owners to make residential upgrades that increase accessibility and safety for aging adults.

The Budget and Legislative Analyst estimates that the proposed project would require approximately 255 service hours. The Budget and Legislative Analyst has sufficient performance audit and project service hours to complete this and other performance audits and projects previously approved by the Board of Supervisors or pending before the Government Audit and Oversight Committee. We estimate completing the proposed project by approximately September 30, 2010. The Budget and Legislative Analyst will conduct the project based on priorities established by the Board of Supervisors.
