[Landmark Tree Designation of Redwood Tree Located at 46 Stillings Avenue]

Ordinance designating the redwood tree (sequoia sempervirens) located at 46 Stillings Avenue (Assessor's Block No. 6734, Lot No. 023) as a landmark tree pursuant to Public Works Code Section 810, making findings supporting the designation, and requesting official acts in furtherance of the landmark tree designation.

Be it ordained by the People of the City and County of San Francisco: Section 1. Findings.

- (a) Public Works Code Section 810 establishes a procedure for the nomination, designation, and removal of landmark trees.
- (b) On February 22, 2010, property owner, Marguerite Rubenstein, nominated the Redwood tree located on her property at 46 Stillings Avenue (Assessor's Block 6734, Lot 023) for landmark status.
- (c) The Board of Supervisors adopted landmark tree designation criteria in Resolution No. 440-06. The Board of Supervisor amended the criteria in Resolution No. 63-09. A copy of these Resolutions are on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 100880 and is incorporated herein by reference.
- (d) On May 28, 2010, after a duly noticed public hearing, the Urban Forestry Council adopted Resolution No. 005-10 recommending that the Board of Supervisors designate this tree for landmark status based on the abovementioned landmark tree designation criteria. A copy of said Resolution is on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in File No. 100880 and is incorporated herein by reference.

- (e) The Urban Forestry Council determined that this Redwood tree qualifies as a landmark tree based on the criteria set forth below and as further delineated in the City's landmark tree designation criteria:
- (1) Physical Attributes: The tree has a distinguished form, with two well formed co-dominate trunks, a balanced pyramidal form, and is attractive in the context of the informally forested back yard. The tree is in good condition, stable, with a low center of gravity, and performing with vigor on the site; and
- (2) Environmental: This tree is centered on the property and located close to the residence and may be helping to prevent soil erosion as well as serving as a wind or sound barrier. The tree is visible from public property as well as by the surrounding neighbors. It is a prominent landscape feature, contributing to the overall effect of a forested back yard area and neighborhood.
- (f) The Board of Supervisors adopts as its own the findings of the Urban Forestry Council in regard to this tree.

Section 2. Landmark Tree Designation.

(a) Based on the above mentioned findings, the Board of Supervisors designates the Redwood tree (*Sequoia sempervirens*), located at 46 Stillings Avenue (Assessor's Block 6734, Lot 023) as a landmark tree.

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(b) The Board of Supervisors directs the Department of Public Works to record the landmark designation of this tree on the property record of ) located at 46 Stillings Avenue (Assessor's Block 6734, Lot 023) and list the tree in the Department's Official Book of Landmark Trees.

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## **LEGISLATIVE DIGEST**

[Landmark Tree Designation of Redwood Tree, Sequoia sempervirens, located at 46 Stillings Avenue.]

Ordinance designating the Redwood Tree (Sequoia sempervirens) located at 46 Stillings Avenue (Assessor's Block 6734, Lot 023) as a landmark tree pursuant to Public Works Code Section 810, making findings supporting the designation, and requesting official acts in furtherance of the landmark tree designation.

## **Existing Law**

Public Works Code Section 810 establishes a procedure for the nomination, designation, and removal of the landmark trees. The Board of Supervisors adopted landmark tree designation criteria in Resolution No. 440-06. The Board of Supervisors admended the landmark tree designation criteria in Resolution No. 63-09.

#### **Amendments to Current Law**

This legislation designates the Redwood tree (*Sequoia sempervirens*) located at 46 Stillings Avenue (Assessor's Block 6734, Lot 023) as a landmark tree in accordance with the procedures set forth in Public Works Code Section 810. This ordinance also directs the Department of Public Works to record the landmark designation of this tree on the subject property and list the tree in the Department's Official Book of Landmark Trees.

#### **Background Information**

The Urban Forestry Council determined that this tree qualifies for landmark tree status under the City's landmark tree designation criteria. This legislation designates the subject tree as a landmark tree pursuant to Public Works Code Section 810, and thus brings the tree within the regulatory framework of the Public Works Code Urban Forestry Ordinance.

To the Urban Forestry Council:

The Landmark Tree Committee is pleased to submit one tree to the Council for adoption as a Landmark. The tree is a coast redwood (*Sequoia sempervirens*) located in the back yard at 46 Stillings Avenue (cross Congo).

The tree was sponsored for landmarking by the homeowner, Ms. Maggi Rubenstein.

The tree is a good physical specimen. It consists of two well-formed co-dominant trunks, with a balanced pyramidal form, over-all. The tree appears thrifty and well-maintained. Exhibiting some effects of the prevailing wind, the canopy is nonetheless well-formed, and the tree appears to have the vigor to perform well on the site. It appears to be stable, with a low center of gravity, and growing at a slow to moderate pace. It is very attractive in the context of the informally forested back yard.

The tree contributes to the environmental quality of the neighborhood. It is centered on the property, close to the residence. While the top is visible from the street, most of the tree is not visible to the public. Only uphill neighbors would have full view of the tree, but in total it contributes to the overall effect of a forested back-yard area and neighborhood, visible to other neighbors and passers-by.

It should be noted that this nomination is being disputed, with two neighbors objecting to the landmarking. There is a history of contention over tree-related issues between these neighbors, but the committee notes that the nominated tree has never been the object of this contention. Concerns about safety related to the nominated tree were brought up by the neighbors, but no issues relating to litter, shading or view were expressed. The tree does not overhang adjoining properties, and appears to pose minimal hazard potential.

The Committee recommended it unanimously for landmarking.

On behalf of the Committee I submit to the full Council, requesting this tree be forwarded to the Board of Supervisors for landmarking.
