The Public Safety and Neighborhood Services Committee met in regular session, in-person with remote access and public comment via telephone, on Thursday, May 25, 2023, with Chair Catherine Stefani presiding. Chair Stefani called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m.

230336 [Liquor License Issuance - 628 Divisadero Street - The Independent]

Hearing to consider that the issuance of a Type-90 on-sale general music venue liquor license to The Independent LLC, to do business as The Independent located at 628 Divisadero Street (District 5) will serve the public convenience or necessity of the City and County of San Francisco. (Public Safety and Neighborhood Services Committee)

03/31/23; REFERRED TO DEPARTMENT. Referred to the Planning Department and Police Department for recommendation.

04/20/23; RESPONSE RECEIVED. The Planning Department recommends approval. Recommend approval for ABC Type-90 license in conjunction with principally-permitted Nighttime Entertainment use doing business as The Independent, in the Divisadero Street NCT Zoning District per Planning Code, Section 759. Subject to the operating conditions of Planning Code, Section 202.2(a)(1).

05/18/23; RESPONSE RECEIVED. The Police Department submitted a response recommending approval with the following conditions:

1) Petitioner(s) shall actively monitor the area under their control in an effort to prevent the loitering of persons on any property adjacent to the licensed premises as depicted on the ABC-253; and 2) Between the hours of 12:00 pm and 2:00 am or at any time the premises are providing entertainment, the petitioner(s) shall provide at least one (1) uniformed security guard(s) on the premises and shall maintain order therein and prevent any activity which would interfere with the quiet enjoyment of their property by nearby residents or the surrounding community. The licensed uniform security guard must be licensed by the State of California Department of Consumer Affairs.

Heard in Committee. Speakers: Officer Joel Salmonson (Police Department); John Gunton, General Manager (The Independent); presented information and answered questions raised throughout the discussion.

A determination that the public convenience or necessity would be served was recommended by the committee.

220814 [Health Code - Designating City Attorney to Represent City in Certain Conservatorship Proceedings]

Ordinance amending the Health Code to designate the City Attorney rather than the District Attorney to represent the City in judicial proceedings to establish a "Murphy Conservatorship," a conservatorship for individuals who have been found mentally incompetent during a criminal proceeding involving a charge of death, great bodily harm, or a serious threat to the physical well-being of another person; there has been a finding of probable cause and the proceeding has not been dismissed; as a result of a mental health disorder, the individual is unable to understand the nature and purpose of the criminal proceeding or assist counsel in the conduct of the defense; and the individual represents a substantial danger of physical harm to self or others by reason of mental disease, defect, or disorder.

Ordinance amending the Police Code to provide that cannabis retail permit applications will not be accepted as of the effective date of this Ordinance; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

Chair Stefani moved that this Ordinance be AMENDED, AN AMENDMENT OF THE WHOLE BEARING SAME TITLE, on Page 1, Lines 21-25, and Page 2, Lines 1-8 by updating the Background, Findings, and Purpose to read, 'As of May 9, 2023, the existing cannabis retail industry in San Francisco includes 65 operating Storefront Cannabis Retail businesses, 15 operating Delivery-Only Cannabis Retail businesses, no operating Microbusiness permittees, and no Medicinal Cannabis Retail businesses separate from the Storefront Cannabis Retail and Delivery-Only Cannabis Retail businesses previously listed. (b) As of May 9, 2023, there are 63 pending applications for Storefront Cannabis Retail business permits, 9 pending applications for Delivery-Only Cannabis Retail business permits, and 28 pending applications for Microbusiness permits that include retail activities. As of May 9, 2023, there were 32 pending applications for existing Medicinal Cannabis Retail permit conversion from Article 33 of the San Francisco Health Code to Article 16 of the San Francisco Police Code.'
