251235 [Formal Policy Discussions - December 16, 2025]

Pursuant to Charter, Sections 2.103 and 3.100(7), and Administrative Code, Section 2.11, the Mayor shall discuss eligible topics submitted from the Supervisors. The Mayor may address the Board initially for up to five minutes. Discussion shall not exceed two minutes per question or answer.

The following topic was noticed on the agenda representing District 5:

1. Fentanyl State of Emergency Ordinance

Mayor Daniel Lurie addressed the Board of Supervisors regarding the work done over the last year and thanked the individual Members of the Board for their collaboration on various policies and programs effectuated. President Mandelman then invited Supervisor Mahmood to ask his question related to the noticed topic.

Supervisor Mahmood began the discussions by asking the following question: What specific resources, tools, contracts, etc., have been used under the Fentanyl State of Emergency Ordinance to address the fentanyl crisis over the last year? Mayor Lurie responded resources have been unlocked through this Ordinance to get fentanyl off San Francisco streets by supporting certain initiatives, executing contracts to provide services, advancing supportive housing projects, opening mental health and substance abuse recovery beds, executing grants to fund critical programs, and bringing on consultants to accelerate hiring of police officers.

Supervisor Mahmood then followed up with the following question: The Board of Supervisors adopted a Resolution in support of Drug Market Intervention earlier this year, will you sign on to support this Drug Market Intervention approach as well? Mayor Lurie responded he will support all actions to further this initiative. Mayor Lurie did not ask any follow-up questions related to this topic.

Following public comment this matter was filed. No further action was taken.
