Resolution declaring a state of emergency regarding pedestrian and cyclist fatalities in San Francisco.

Speakers: Joel Kamisher; Anakh Sul Rama; Javier Bremond; Curtis Bradford; Troy Gaspard; Gail Seagraves; Junebug; Jessica Lehman, Executive Director (Senior and Disability Action); John McCormick (Tenderloin Community Development Corporation); Laura Sinai (Tenderloin People's Congress); Hillary Brown; spoke on various concerns related to the hearing matter.

Heard in Committee. Speaker: Supervisor Matt Haney (Board of Supervisors); presented information and answered questions raised throughout the discussion.

Supervisors Walton, Mandelman, and Stefani requested to be added as co-sponsors.

Chair Mandelman moved that this Resolution be AMENDED, AN AMENDMENT OF THE WHOLE BEARING SAME TITLE, to add recitals which identify traffic safety as a national public health crisis, to reference the February 2019 updated Vision Zero Action Strategy, to identify San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency efforts to improve high-injury corridors and walking conditions, as well as the Better Market Street project, and to reference Police Department enforcement efforts including 19 intersection approaches planned for red light camera enforcement; to urge the SFMTA and all City agencies to take emergency actions to immediately double the number of red light cameras installed at major high-injury intersections, to expand Parking Control Office enforcement, to increase enforcement by SFPD to 50% Focus on the Five citations and meet the productivity of prior years of enforcement activity, to immediately identify solutions to lower speed limits and observed speeds to 25 miles per hour or the lowest legal limit on the High Injury Network, and to immediately begin planning pedestrianized blocks in the Tenderloin; to urge the Mayor to direct and fund City agencies to implement these emergency actions to save pedestrian and cyclist lives on our streets; and to make other clarifying, conforming, and clerical amendments. 190756 [Police Code - Cannabis Retailers at Permitted Cannabis Events]**Sponsors: Mandelman; Walton**

Ordinance amending the Police Code to require that cannabis retailers at permitted events hold Cannabis Business Permits issued by the City, that applicants for Cannabis Event Permits identify the retailers that will be selling cannabis goods at such events and affirm that said retailers hold City-issued Cannabis Business Permits, and that recipients of Cannabis Event Permits take steps to reasonably ensure that only said retailers will sell cannabis goods at such events; to provide that a material false statement made in connection with an application for a Cannabis Event Permit may be subject to administrative penalty, cause for denial of a pending or future application for a Cannabis Business Permit, and cause for suspension or revocation of an existing Cannabis Business Permit; and affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act.

07/17/19; REFERRED TO DEPARTMENT. Referred to the Office of Cannabis, the San Francisco Police Department, the Recreation and Parks Department, and the Board of Appeals for informational purposes. Referred to the Small Business Commission for review and comment. Referred to the Planning Department for environmental review.

07/25/19; RESPONSE RECEIVED. Not defined as a project under CEQA Guidelines Sections 15378 and 15060(c)(2) because it would not result in a physical change in the environment.

09/23/19; RESPONSE RECEIVED. On September 23, 2019, the Small Business Commission voted unanimously to recommend approval of the ordinance.

Supervisor Walton requested to be added as a co-sponsor.

Chair Mandelman moved that this Ordinance be **AMENDED, AN AMENDMENT OF THE WHOLE BEARING NEW TITLE**, on Page 1, Lines 8-10, by inserting 'to require that Cannabis Event Permit applicants commit to specific actions to support the City's equity goals as a condition of permit issuance; and'; on Page 3, Lines 9-10, by inserting 'an Event Permit Equity Plan as described in subsection (e)'; on Page 4, Lines 4-25, by inserting '(e) Equity Criteria for Cannabis Event Permit Applicants. As a condition of permit issuance, Applicants for Cannabis Event Permits must submit to the Director for review and approval a written "Event Permit Equity Plan," in which the applicant describes the specific actions it will take to support the City's equity goals as described in Section 1604(a), the dates by which the applicant will take the listed actions, and an estimated dollar value for each of the actions. Actions a Cannabis Event Permit applicant may take to satisfy this requirement include but are not limited to the following: (1) Ensuring that a minimum of 30% of all work hours expended in preparing and executing the event that is the subject of the requested Cannabis Event Permit (the "Event") are performed by workers who meet at least three of the criteria set forth in Section 1604(b)(4); (2) Providing training and mentorship opportunities to workers who meet at least three of the criteria set forth in Section 1604(b)(4); (3) Ensuring that a substantial portion of Cannabis-related products showcased and sold at the Event are provided by businesses that are one of the following: Equity Operators, as defined in Section 1604(c)(5)(A); Medical Cannabis Dispensary permit holders that have been verified as Equity Applicants under Section 1604; or Cannabis Businesses in jurisdictions outside San Francisco with a local equity program, as defined in Section 26240(e) of the California Business and Professions Code, that are classified as Equity Operators or the equivalent under the governing law of that jurisdiction; and/or (4) Donating cash, in-kind goods, services, and/or technical assistance to community organizations that serve equity goals.'; on Page 6, Lines 3-4, by inserting ', or may deny a Cannabis Event Permit in his or her reasonable discretion'; on Page 6, Lines 22-23, by inserting '(6) The applicant has not made a good faith effort to comply with its Event Permit Equity Plan, submitted under subsection (e);' and making other conforming amendments.
