Ordinance renewing and extending a prior waiver and refund of investigation fees imposed by Building Code, Section 107A.5, for persons registered with the Office of Cannabis through December 31, 2020; amending the Health Code to extend the date beyond which temporary Medical Cannabis Dispensary Permits issued under Article 33 of the Health Code are rendered invalid, from December 31, 2019, to December 31, 2020; amending the Police Code to extend the date beyond which Temporary Cannabis Business Permits issued under Article 16 of the Police Code cannot be extended from December 31, 2019, to December 31, 2020; and amending the Planning Code to extend the date by which a Grandfathered Medical Cannabis Dispensary, as defined in the Planning Code, must have received a permit to operate from the Department of Public Health to be deemed a Temporary Cannabis Sales use, as defined in the Planning Code, from December 31, 2019, to December 31, 2020.

Chair Fewer moved that this Ordinance be AMENDED, AN AMENDMENT OF THE WHOLE BEARING NEW TITLE, to amend the title to reflect the substituted version introduced on October 22, 2019; to extend the maximum duration of a Temporary Cannabis Retail Sales Use from one year to four years, from January 1, 2019, to January 1, 2022; and to make other clarifying and conforming amendments.

Ordinance renewing and extending a prior waiver and refund of investigation fees imposed by Building Code, Section 107A.5, for persons registered with the Office of Cannabis through December 31, 2020; amending the Health Code to extend the date beyond which temporary Medical Cannabis Dispensary Permits issued under Article 33 of the Health Code are rendered invalid, from December 31, 2019, to December 31, 2021; amending the Police Code to extend the date beyond which Temporary Cannabis Business Permits issued under Article 16 of the Police Code cannot be extended from December 31, 2019, to December 31, 2021; amending the Planning Code to extend the date by which a Grandfathered Medical Cannabis Dispensary, as defined in the Planning Code, must have received a permit to operate from the Department of Public Health to be deemed a Temporary Cannabis Sales use, as defined in the Planning Code, from December 31, 2019, to December 31, 2021; amending the Planning Code to extend the duration of a Temporary Cannabis Retail Sales Use to up to four years, to expire on January 1, 2022; affirming the Planning Department's determination under the California Environmental Quality Act; and making findings of consistency with the General Plan, and the eight priority policies of Planning Code, Section 101.1, and findings of public necessity, convenience, and welfare under Planning Code, Section 302.

Resolution retroactively authorizing two agreements for CleanPowerSF to purchase electricity-related products from Pacific Gas & Electric Company for a term of January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2022, for a total cost of \$26,070,118; and retroactively authorizing the sale of electricity-related products to Pacific Gas & Electric Company and Southern California Edison Company for a term of January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2022, in an amount not to exceed \$3,500,000. (Public Utilities Commission)

AN AMENDMENT OF THE WHOLE BEARING NEW TITLE, to reduce the number of agreements from two to one; on Page 1, Line 5, to reduce the total cost from \$26,070,118 to \$11,070,118 and to remove 'and retroactively authorizing the sale of electricity-related products to Pacific Gas & Electric Company and Southern California Edison Company for a term of January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2022, in an amount not to exceed \$3,500,000; on Page 2, Line 13, to remove 'and the second in the amount of \$15,000,000'; on Page 2, Lines 14-18, to remove 'WHEREAS, The CPUC's September 20, 2019 notice to CleanPowerSF materially changed the quantities of RA that CleanPowerSF is required to procure in the different geographical areas and CleanPowerSF must engage in several purchases and sales of RA in a short timeframe in order to balance its RA supplies with its RA obligations and meet the compliance deadline of October 31, 2019: and'; on Page 2, Lines 19-21, to remove 'WHEREAS, CleanPowerSF entered into an agreement to sell RA to PG&E in an amount not to exceed \$2,000,000 and a second agreement to sell RA to Southern California Edison Company (SCE) in an amount not to exceed \$1,500,000; on Page 3, Line 18, to remove 'and \$15,000,000'; on Page 3, Lines 20-24, to remove 'FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors hereby retroactively authorizes the General Manager of the Public Utilities Commission to enter into an agreement to sell RA to PG&E in the amount of \$2,000,000 with the term of January 1, 2020, through December 31, 2022, and an agreement to sell RA to SCE in the amount of \$1,500,000 with the term of January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2022; and, be it'; to remove the reference to the Southern California Edison (SCE) Company agreement throughout the legislation; and to make other conforming and clarifying amendments.
